

# 2008-09 ACC WOMEN'S BASKETBALL MEDIA GUIDE

## ACC WEEKLY HONORS & POSTSEASON AWARDS

The ACC announced the formation of a women's basketball voting panel, consisting of national and local media members, as well as school representatives, beginning in the 2008-09 season. The "Blue Ribbon Panel," whose members will serve either a one- or two-year term, will vote for the league's preseason poll, weekly honors and postseason All-Conference teams.

The ACC, with nominations from its 12 member institutions, will designate approximately 24 media members who cover ACC Women's Basketball regularly to the panel. The two dozen individuals cannot be directly affiliated with an ACC program and do not necessarily have to come from the schools' geographical areas.

In addition, each school will be permitted to nominate one at-large member, who is affiliated with the institution (i.e., school radio personality or school newspaper beat writer), to serve on the panel.

Both of these groups will be asked to commit to a two-year term and will be held accountable to voting on a consistent basis, including Player and Rookie of the Week selections, which will be announced on Tuesday afternoons.

In addition to the 36 members, the league's media relations office will invite additional national and selected persons to the panel, including ACC television partners.

Finally, all 12 league head coaches will receive one ballot to vote on preseason and postseason accolades; however, they will not be permitted to vote on a weekly basis or for their own student-athletes.

The designated "Blue Ribbon" panel will also be responsible for naming the All-ACC teams, All-Freshmen team, Coach of the Year, Player of the Year, and Rookie of the Year. The teams and individual award winners will be announced during the week immediately following the conclusion of the regular season.

In addition, the 12 head coaches will announce an All-Defensive Team, Defensive Player of the Year, and Sixth Player of the Year honor, an accolade that began in 2008.

## ACC INTERVIEW POLICY

All postgame interviews with coaches will be conducted in a press interview area designated by the host sports information director. There will be a maximum 10-minute "cooling off" period, at which time the first available head coach will begin a 10-minute interview session. Should both coaches be ready to begin their interviews at the same time, preference for the first session should be given to the visiting coach. The second head coach should be ready to enter the interview area not more than 10 minutes after the start of the first interview. Once a head coach exits his/her lockerroom for the postgame interview, that team's lockerroom will then be open to the media. The players will be made available to the media in the lockerroom or an area designated by the host SID.

# TRADITION OF EXCELLENCE

## The Tradition

Consistency. It is the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 56th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 109 national championships, including 57 in women's competition and 52 in men's. In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 145 times in men's competition and 92 times in women's action.

Since 1977, when the league adopted women's basketball and a tradition of excellence was established, the ACC has continued to soar to new heights.

The 2005-06 season marked the first time in NCAA history that a conference sent three teams to the same Final Four. The title game pitted an automatic ACC winner as second-seeded Maryland faced No. 1 seed Duke. The Terrapins claimed their first national title in school history and the league's second with a thrilling 78-75 overtime game at the TD Banknorth Garden in Boston, Mass., on April 4, 2006.

Following the 2006-07 season, Duke became the first ACC team and only the 14th in NCAA history to finish a regular season undefeated (29-0), while the 34 wins for North Carolina marked the most in program history.

The 2007-08 season was no different in the continuation towards excellence as eight ACC teams earned postseason bids, including six NCAA Tournament berths. It also marked the sixth consecutive year the league has sent at least six to the Big Dance. Joining North Carolina and Maryland as representatives of the ACC in the NCAA Tournament were Duke, Florida State, Georgia Tech, and Virginia. Boston College and NC State represented the league in the Women's NIT, marking the first-ever appearance for the Eagles and the Wolfpack's first since 1976. NC State advanced to the semifinals, giving the squad 21 wins for the season, their third 20-plus win tally in the past four years.

For the third consecutive year, a pair of ACC teams earned two of the No. 1 seeds to the NCAA Tournament. North Carolina, which picked up the school's fourth consecutive ACC Tournament crown, finished 30-2 and earned a No. 1 slot for the fourth consecutive year, while Maryland, which concluded the season 30-3 overall and was 19-0 in College Park, Md., earned another top seed in the NCAA postseason tourney.

Over the years, ACC women's basketball teams have gained global recognition through their television exposure. The 2007-08 schedule featured 57 televised games and included 96 television appearances. In addition, the ACC broadcasted nine games on ESPN2 and seven on Fox Sports Net and affiliates. Twenty-seven match-ups were featured on the league's regional sports network, which includes Comcast SportsNet, Fox Sports Net South, SunSports and New England's Sports Network (NESN). To conclude the 2007-08 season, the ACC finished 64-54 (.542) in front of a national televised audience, including a 23-12 mark against non-conference foes.

The league's women's basketball programs continue to rank among the best in the country



in terms of the NCAA Tournament, having made 144 appearances and won 194 games in the last 31 years, including 32 wins by a number one seed. In addition to sending three teams to the same Final Four for the first time in history, the league has boasted such national accomplishments as sending at least one team to the "Sweet 16" for 20 consecutive years and at least one to the Final Four in 11 of the last 20 years. The conference has also made 14 trips to the Final Four in the last 27 years with three teams finishing second and North Carolina and Maryland capturing National Championships in 1994 and 2006, respectively.

Since 1989, the ACC has placed 14 players on the All-Final Four team, while Maryland's Laura Harper joined the ranks of Virginia's Dawn Staley and North Carolina's Charlotte Smith, who was dubbed the NCAA Tournament Most Outstanding Player in 2006. In all, 65 ACC players have been named to the NCAA Tournament All-Region teams with 10 Most Outstanding Player recognitions.

Eight players have garnered National Player of the Year accolades while competing under the ACC banner. Staley was a back-to-back selection in 1991 and 1992, while Smith received the ESPY award in 1995. Duke's Alana Beard was recognized with National Player of the Year honors in both 2003 and 2004, and UNC's Ivory Latta earned ESPN.com National Player of the Year in 2006. In 2007, Duke guard Lindsey Harding was named the Naismith Trophy Women's College Player of the Year presented by AT&T.

Five league coaches have combined to earn 13 national Coach of the Year honors. Duke's Gail Goetsenkors, North Carolina's Sylvia Hatchell, Virginia's Debbie Ryan, Maryland's Chris Weller and NC State's Kay Yow have all garnered national recognition.

Seven ACC representatives, including coaches and student-athletes, have participated in the Olympics. NC State's Yow, assisted by Hatchell of UNC, headed up the 1988 gold medal-winning Olympic team. Maryland's Vicky Bullett was a member of both the 1988 and 1992 Olympic teams. Staley, a three-time Olympian, struck gold in Athens as a member of the 2004 title squad. Duke's Goetsenkors served as an assistant coach on the gold medal-winning team in Athens.

Since the inaugural season of the Women's National Basketball Association (WNBA) in 1997, the ACC has been a recognizable presence in the league. Sixty-nine former ACC stars have played on the hardwood in the WNBA, while five former players have worked the sidelines as coaches. Four ACC players were selected in the first round of the 2008 WNBA Draft as the foursome was selected in the first 14 picks of the round. In all, eight league players were selected in the 2008 WNBA Draft, while the league tabbed a league-record of nine selectees in 2006 and 2007.

In addition, ACC women's basketball players have earned first-team Academic All-America honors 10 times, including Virginia's Val Ackerman in 1981, the former President of the WNBA. In 1997, NC State's

Jennifer Howard was tabbed GTE CoSIDA Academic Player of the Year after posting a flawless 4.0 grade point average throughout her career. Thirteen players have earned ACC postgraduate scholarships, while three others were named NCAA Postgraduate Scholars.

## 2007-08 In Review

The 2007-08 academic year saw league teams capturing four national team titles and 12 individual NCAA crowns. In all, the ACC has won 43 national team titles over the last 12 years. The ACC has won two or more NCAA titles in 26 of the past 28 years.

A total of 140 ACC teams placed in NCAA postseason competition in 2007-08. League teams compiled a 119-69 (.633) mark against non-conference opponents in NCAA championship competition. In addition, the ACC had 154 student-athletes earn first team All-America honors this past year. Overall, the league had 258 first, second or third team All-Americans. In addition, the ACC produced 10 national Players of the Year and five national Coach of the Year honorees.

## The Championships

The conference will conduct championship competition in 25 sports during the 2008-09 academic year - 12 for men and 13 for women.

The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954. The conference did not conduct championships in cross country, wrestling or tennis during the first year.

The 12 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse. Fencing, which was started in 1971, was discontinued in 1981.

Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship meet being held in tennis at Wake Forest University.

Championships for women are currently conducted in cross country, field hockey, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing, while volleyball determines its champion in regular season play.

## A History

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgewick Inn near Greensboro, N.C., with seven charter members - Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest - drawing up the conference by-laws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of bylaws was adopted and the name became officially the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Suggestions from fans for the name of the new conference appeared in the region's newspapers prior to the meeting in Raleigh. Some of the names suggested were: Dixie, Mid South, Mid Atlantic, East Coast, Seaboard, Colonial, Tobacco, Blue-Gray, Piedmont, Southern Seven and the Shoreline.

Duke's Eddie Cameron recommended that the name of the conference be the Atlantic Coast

Conference, and the motion was passed unanimously. The meeting concluded with each member institution assessed \$200.00 to pay for conference expenses.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted the University of Virginia as the league's eighth member. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971, when the University of South Carolina tendered its resignation.

The ACC operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when the Georgia Institute of Technology was admitted. The Atlanta school had withdrawn from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964.

The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State University.

The conference expanded to 11 members on July 1, 2004, with the addition of the University of Miami and Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University. On October 17, 2003, Boston College accepted an invitation to become the league's 12th member starting July 1, 2005.

## The Schools

**Boston College** was founded in 1863 by the Society of Jesus to serve the sons of Boston's Irish immigrants and was the first institution of higher education to be founded in the city of Boston. Originally located on Harrison Avenue in the South End of Boston, the College outgrew its urban setting toward the end of its first 50 years. A new location was selected in Chestnut Hill and ground for the new campus was broken on June 19, 1909. During the 1940s, new purchases doubled the size of the main campus. In 1974, Boston College acquired Newton College of the Sacred Heart, 1.5 miles away. With 15 buildings on 40 acres, it is now the site of the Law School and residence halls. In 2004, BC purchased 43 acres of land from the archdiocese of Boston; this now forms the Brighton campus.

**Clemson University** is nestled in the foothills of the Blue Ridge Mountains near the Georgia border, and the tiger paws painted on the roads make the return to I-85 easier. The school is built around Fort Hill, the plantation home of John C. Calhoun, Vice President to Andrew Jackson. His son-in-law, Tom Clemson, left the land to be used as an agricultural school, and in 1893 Clemson opened its doors as a land-grant school, thanks to the efforts of Ben Tillman.

**Duke University** was founded in 1924 by tobacco magnate James B. Duke as a memorial to his father, Washington Duke. Originally the school was called Trinity College, a Methodist institution, started in 1859. In 1892, Trinity moved to west Durham where the east campus with its Georgian architecture now stands. Nearby are Sarah P. Duke gardens, and further west the Gothic spires of Duke Chapel overlook the west campus.

**Florida State University** is one of 11 universities of the State University System of Florida. It was established as the Seminary West of the Suwannee by an act of the Florida Legislature in 1851, and first offered instruction at the post-secondary level in 1857. Its Tallahassee campus has been the site of an institution of higher education longer than any other site in the state. In 1905, the Buckman Act reorganized higher education in the state and designated the Tallahassee school as the Florida Female College. In 1909, it was renamed Florida State College for Women. In 1947, the school returned to a co-educational status, and the name was changed to Florida State University.

Next to I-85 in downtown Atlanta stands **Geor-**

**gia Institute of Technology**, founded in 1885. Its first students came to pursue a degree in mechanical engineering, the only one offered at the time. Tech's strength is not only the red clay of Georgia, but a restored gold and white 1930 model A Ford Cabriolet, the official mascot. The old Ford was first used in 1961, but a Ramblin' Wreck had been around for over three decades. The Ramblin' Wreck fight song appeared almost as soon as the school opened, and it is not only American boys that grow up singing its rollicking tune, for Richard Nixon and Nikita Krushchev sang it when they met in Moscow in 1959.

The **University of Maryland** opened in 1856 as an agricultural school nine miles north of Washington, D.C., on land belonging to Charles Calvert, a descendant of Lord Baltimore, the state's founding father. The school colors are the same as the state flag: black and gold for George Calvert (Lord Baltimore) and red and white for his mother, Alice Crossland. Maryland has been called the school that Curley Byrd built, for he was its quarterback, then football coach, athletic director, assistant to the president, vice-president, and finally its president. Byrd also designed the football stadium and the campus layout, and suggested the nickname Terrapin, a local turtle known for its bite, when students wanted to replace the nickname Old Liners with a new one for the school.

The **University of Miami** was chartered in 1925 by a group of citizens who felt an institution of higher learning was needed for the development of their young and growing community. Since the first class of 560 students enrolled in the fall of 1926, the University has expanded to more than 15,000 undergraduate and graduate students from every state and more than 114 nations from around the world. The school's colors, representative of the Florida orange tree, were selected in 1926. Orange symbolizes the fruit of the tree, green represents the leaves and white, the blossoms.

The **University of North Carolina**, located in Chapel Hill, has been called "the perfect college town," making its tree-lined streets and balmy atmosphere what a college should look and feel like. Its inception in 1795 makes it one of the oldest schools in the nation, and its nickname of Tar Heels stems from the tar pitch and turpentine that were the state's principal industry. The nickname is as old as the school, for it was born during the Revolutionary War when tar was dumped into the streams to impede the advance of British forces.

**North Carolina State University** is located in the state capital of Raleigh. It opened in 1889 as a land-grant agricultural and mechanical school and was known as A&M or Aggies or Farmers for over a quarter-century. The school's colors of pink and blue were gone by 1895, brown and white were tried for a year, but the students finally chose red and white to represent the school. An unhappy fan in 1922 said State football players behaved like a pack of wolves, and the term that was coined in derision became a badge of honor.

The **University of Virginia** was founded in 1819 by Thomas Jefferson and is one of three things on his tombstone for which he wanted to be remembered. James Madison and James Monroe were on the board of governors in the early years. The Rotunda, a half-scale version of the Pantheon which faces the Lawn, is the focal point of the grounds as the campus is called. Jefferson wanted his school to educate leaders in practical affairs and public service, not just to train teachers.

**Virginia Tech** was established in 1872 as an all-male military school dedicated to the original land-grant mission of teaching agriculture and engineering. The University has grown from a small college of 132 students into the largest institution of

higher education in the state during its 132-year history. Located in Southwest Virginia on a plateau between the Blue Ridge and Alleghany Mountains, the campus consists of 334 buildings and 20 miles of sidewalks over 2,600 acres. The official school colors - Chicago maroon and burnt orange - were selected in 1896 because they made a "unique combination" not worn elsewhere at the time.

**Wake Forest University** was started on Calvin Jones' plantation amid the stately pine forest of Wake County in 1834. The Baptist seminary is still there, but the school was moved to Winston-Salem in 1956 on a site donated by Charles H. and Mary Reynolds Babcock. President Harry S. Truman attended the ground-breaking ceremonies that brought a picturesque campus of Georgian architecture and painted roofs. Wake's colors have been black and gold since 1895, thanks to a badge designed by student John Heck who died before he graduated.

**CLEMSON** -- Charter member of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association in 1894; a charter member of the Southern Conference in 1921; a charter member of the Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) in 1953.

**DUKE** -- Joined the Southern Conference in December, 1928; charter member of the ACC in 1953.

**FLORIDA STATE** -- Charter member of the Dixie Conference in 1948; joined the Metro Conference in July, 1976; joined the ACC July, 1991.

**GEORGIA TECH** -- Charter member of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association in 1894; charter member of Southern Conference in 1921; charter member of the SEC in 1932; joined the ACC in April, 1978.

**MARYLAND** -- Charter member of the Southern Conference in 1921; charter member of the ACC in 1953.

**MIAMI** -- Charter member of the Big East Football Conference in 1991; joined the ACC in July, 2004.

**NORTH CAROLINA** -- Charter member of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association in 1894; charter member of the Southern Conference in 1921; charter member of the ACC in 1953.

**NC STATE** -- Charter member of the Southern Conference in 1921; charter member of the ACC in 1953.

**VIRGINIA** -- Charter member of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association in 1894; charter member of the Southern Conference in 1921; resigned from Southern Conference in December 1936; joined the ACC in December, 1953.

**VIRGINIA TECH** -- Charter member of the Southern Conference in 1921; withdrew from the Southern Conference in June, 1965; became a charter member of the Big East Football Conference in Feb. 5, 1991; joined the ACC in July, 2004.

**WAKE FOREST** -- Joined the Southern Conference in February, 1936; charter member of the ACC in 1953.

# COMMISSIONER JOHN SWOFFORD



Now in his 12th year as commissioner, John Swofford has made a dramatic impact on the Atlantic Coast Conference and college athletics during his career. He is regarded as one of the top administrators in the NCAA.

Swofford assumed his role as the fourth fulltime commissioner of the Atlantic Coast Conference in July of 1997. He follows James H. (Jim) Weaver, the league's first Commissioner from 1954-1970, Robert (Bob) James, who served from 1971-1987 and Eugene F. (Gene) Corrigan, who held the position from 1987 to 1997.

In addition to overseeing one of the nation's largest athletic conferences, Swofford has been pivotal in positioning the Atlantic Coast Conference for the future. In 2003, on behalf of the nine league institutions and the ACC Council of Presidents, he introduced Miami, Virginia Tech and Boston College as the newest members of the ACC.

With the expansion, Swofford's leadership and negotiating skills helped bring the conference extended and enhanced television contracts in both football and basketball. In May of 2004, the league extended its relationships with ABC, ESPN and Raycom Sports by renegotiating its football television agreements. Highlights included the rights to the Inaugural ACC Football Championship Game and significant increases in the number of televised games through 2010.

In May of 2000, Swofford negotiated one of the nation's most lucrative basketball television contracts with Raycom Sports through the 2010-11 season. After the addition of the three new conference members, under Swofford's guidance, Raycom increased its financial commitment to the ACC basketball package in May of 2004. During his tenure, the ACC has become the only conference to have television packages with two national cable networks - ESPN and Fox Sports Net. The results of these packages increased the television audience of ACC basketball by over 25 percent.

In order to reach the expanding audience of ACC fans, Swofford also negotiated an agreement with XM Satellite Radio, to broadcast the league's football, men's and women's basketball games nationally.

In the sport of basketball, Swofford was a prime mover in the creation of the ACC/Big Ten Challenge that began in men's basketball in 1999. This past year, the two conferences hosted the inaugural ACC/Big Ten Women's Basketball Challenge.

Highly respected by his peers, Swofford was a force in the development and growth of the Bowl John D. Swofford ACC Commissioner John Swofford Championship Series (BCS) to determine an annual

national champion in Division I football. In addition to being involved with the BCS since its inception, he is currently serving as the Coordinator of the BCS, a role in which he also served in 2000 and 2001.

Since becoming Commissioner in 1997, Swofford has been responsible for securing increased bowl opportunities for the ACC. The past three seasons, a league-record eight teams earned bowl bids and in 2002, the conference set an NCAA record when seven of its nine teams (78%) participated in bowl play. This year, the ACC has agreements in place with nine bowls including the FedEx Orange Bowl, home to the ACC Champion since 2006.

During Swofford's first 11 years as Commissioner, ACC teams have won 39 national team titles and 1,075 ACC teams have participated in various NCAA championships - an average of over 97 NCAA teams per year.

A long-time advocate of the importance of academics and student-athlete welfare, Swofford stimulated the formation of the league's first-ever ACC Student-Athlete Advisory Committee. This group of current ACC student-athletes gives the conference direct feedback on their experiences participating at the highest level of college athletics.

In 2006, the prestigious ACC Men's Basketball Tournament was awarded out to 2015. Throughout Swofford's tenure, the iconic event will have traveled to many dynamic cities within the footprint of the league including Atlanta, Ga., Washington D.C. and Tampa, Fla., in addition to the traditional stops in Greensboro and Charlotte. The 2001 ACC Tournament in Atlanta set NCAA attendance records for single session (40,083), per session average (36,505) and total attendance (182,525).

Swofford placed an added emphasis on the development of women's basketball in the ACC with the hiring of an Associate Commissioner for Women's Basketball to oversee all aspects of the sport on both a conference and national level.

The Director of Athletics at the University of North Carolina from 1980 to 1997, Swofford was instrumental in building North Carolina's athletics department into one of the country's most respected programs. He became the school's athletic director on May 1, 1980 and at the age of 31, he was the youngest major college Athletics Director in the nation at the time.

During his tenure, Tar Heel athletic teams claimed 123 ACC championships and 24 national collegiate titles, including two in men's basketball and one in women's basketball. During the 1993-94 year, the Tar Heels captured the inaugural Sears Directors' Cup, emblematic of the collegiate all-sports champion and finished in the Top Six of the Sears Cup standings in each year of Swofford's tenure that the award was given.

Under his leadership, North Carolina enjoyed tremendous growth in its athletic facilities, including the construction of the Smith Center, a complex which includes a 21,572-seat basketball arena, the Koury Natatorium and the Frank H. Kenan Football Center. He initiated the idea and provided the impetus for the founding of North Carolina's trademark licensing program.

The University chose to recognize his many accomplishments by establishing the John D. Swofford women's athletics scholarship and naming an auditorium in the school's football complex in his honor.

John and his wife Nora reside in Greensboro, N.C. Together they have three children, Autumn, who is married to Sherman Wooden; Chad Swofford; and Nora's daughter, Amie, who is married to Keith Furr.

# FINCH NAMED ACC ASSOCIATE COMMISSIONER

Nora Lynn Finch joined the Atlantic Coast Conference in July 2008 to fill the position of Associate Commissioner for Women's Basketball Operations and Senior Woman Administrator. Finch's responsibilities include management and promotions of the annual women's basketball tournament, regular-season conference scheduling, liaison work with the national and regional television networks and serving as the commissioner's liaison to the league's 12 women's basketball programs and senior woman administrators.

"Nora Lynn's varied experiences at the national level, her numerous contributions to the ACC and her lengthy and very successful tenure at NC State make her a superb fit for this position," said ACC Commissioner John Swofford. "I am extremely excited about her joining our staff. She is a proven administrator – effective, knowledgeable and energetic. She is highly respected nationally and within our conference and knows the landscape of women's basketball inside out. Her many relationships along with her integrity and value system will serve our conference well."

Finch joined the ACC with a rich background in college athletics, including over 30 years at NC State, most recently as the department's Senior Associate Director and Senior Woman Administrator. In her time at NC State, she was a member of several key committees on both the ACC and NCAA levels, including the NCAA Division I Management Council, NCAA Division I Championships Cabinet and the NCAA Division I Membership Committee.

Highly respected and active in the sport of women's basketball, Finch was named the chair of the inaugural NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Committee in 1981 and served in that capacity until August 1988. In 1987, the Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA) awarded her its first WBCA Special Recognition Award for Athletics Administra-

tors. The ACC presented her with its inaugural women's basketball Distinguished Service Award in 1989.

A 1970 graduate of Western Carolina, Finch graduated magna cum laude with a bachelor's degree in education and also earned a master's degree in education from Western Carolina. Before joining NC State, she directed the women's basketball teams at Wake Forest University (1971-73) and Peace College (1973-77) and was also Director of Athletics at Peace College (1973-77).

"This is simply a dream come true for me and I couldn't be more excited about the opportunity to join the ACC staff. John Swofford's leadership and vision is second to none and I think he is the best commissioner in college athletics," said Finch. "I am proud of the relationships I have forged with the women's basketball coaches throughout the years and I hope to continue building on the national prominence that exists in the ACC."



## CURTIS JOINS ACC ADMINISTRATION

Charlene Curtis, former Wake Forest head basketball coach, has been named as the league's Coordinator of Women's Basketball Officials, beginning this season.

Curtis, who has served as a women's basketball analyst for Fox Sports Net and ESPNU for the past three years, is a former head coach at Wake Forest, Temple, and Radford, and was an assistant at Virginia, Georgetown, and Connecticut. Curtis also served as an assistant with the WNBA's Charlotte Sting and several USA Basketball teams.

A Big South Conference Hall of Fame member as a coach, Curtis has been a women's basketball officials evaluator for the last four years for the South Atlantic Women's Basketball Officiating (SAWBO) organization.

When not analyzing the game, Curtis can be found instructing future athletes on the hardwood as Curtis serves on her local Big Brothers Big Sisters Board of Directors and the Radford President's Advisory Council, in addition to conducting camps, clinics and basketball skills set sessions.

A 1976 graduate of Radford, Curtis earned, with honors, a BS in music education. While playing for the Highlanders, she was the school's first 1,000-point scorer (1,043 career points), a team captain, and MVP in 1975 and 1976. In 1995, she was inducted as a charter member of the Radford Sports Hall of Fame as both a coach and a player. Curtis also holds a master's degree in secondary education administration, which she earned from Virginia in 1982.

# RYAN INDUCTED IN HALL OF FAME

Virginia women's basketball coach Debbie Ryan was inducted as part of the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame Class of 2008 Saturday, June 14 in Knoxville, Tenn.

The 10th group of inductees included award-winning official Patty Broderick, head coach of Central Arizona College Lin L. Laursen, former All-American at both the University of Tennessee and Wayland Baptist College Jill Rankin Schneider, best 5-4 basketball player of all time Suzie McConnell-Serio and three-time Olympian Michele Timms in addition to Ryan.

As head coach of Virginia, Ryan has made 22 NCAA Tournament appearances, three consecutive Final Four berths (1990-92) and is the seventh coach in NCAA Women's Basketball history to reach the 600-win milestone at the same school. Ryan led the 2001 USA Basketball team to the gold medal in the World

University Games, and the 2003 team to a silver medal at the Pan American Games.

"I am humbled and honored to be named to the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame," Ryan said. "My life has been blessed with tremendous players, coaches, staff members, and administrators over the years who have supported me and share equally in this honor. I am very thankful and fortunate to be able to represent the University of Virginia and my entire family in the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame. This is a proud moment for all of us."

The ceremony was hosted by ESPN personalities Beth Mowins and Debbie Antonelli, and radio host Hallerin Hilton Hill, the master of ceremonies, who also co-wrote "The Dream," the official theme song of the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame. During the ceremony, "The



"Dream" was performed by Evelyn Jack.

In addition to celebrating each inductee's crowning basketball achievements with the presentation of the Eastman award, the Induction ceremony featured the music of the Knoxville Symphony Orchestra and the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame Choir, as well as a special performance by nationally-acclaimed singer/song-writer, Jasper Sawyer.

Several of Ryan's former colleagues and players were in attendance, including former UVA Athletics Director Gene Corrigan, and former letterwinner and current president of USA Basketball Val Ackerman, who introduced Ryan's video presentation. Former UVA greats Dawn Staley and Dena Evans also attended the ceremony.

## 2007-08 RECAP & ACC-OLADES

\* For the third consecutive year, a pair of ACC teams earned two of the No. 1 seeds in the 2008 NCAA Tournament. (North Carolina & Maryland)

\* For the sixth consecutive year, the ACC was represented by at least six teams in the 2008 NCAA Field of 64, while NC State and Boston College received bids to participate in the Women's National Invitation Tournament, extending the number of ACC postseason teams to eight.

\* ACC teams posted a 154-51 record against non-conference opponents during the 2007-08 season. In the 31-year history of the league, ACC schools have produced a 2,734-1,095 (.714) record versus non-conference foes.

\* Four ACC players were selected in the first round of the 2008 WNBA Draft. The foursome of ACC student-athletes were tabbed in the first 14 picks.

\* Eight league student-athletes were selected in the 2008 WNBA Draft, one shy of the league's draftee total of 2006 and 2007.

\* The 2008 ACC Women's Basketball Tournament continued to reach new milestones after it set a new total attendance record with 72,114 fans over the four-day event. In addition, the first session of this year's quarterfinals marked the largest single-session crowd in tournament history (12,969).

\* North Carolina won its fourth straight ACC Tournament Championship, defeating Duke, 86-73. The Tar Heels finished a perfect 14-0 in ACC play for the first time in school history - the eighth perfect regular season in league history.

\* Georgia Tech won 22 games for the first time since joining the ACC and was just one victory shy of the school record.

\* The Eagles, who posted their best ACC regular-season record since entering the league this season, completed the season with a 21-12 overall record.

\* The Cavaliers, who advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the 22nd time in school history last season, finished the year with a 24-10 overall record and their most team wins since 2000.

\* Maryland and Duke rank among the Top 10 for average attendances set in 2007-08. The Terps averaged nearly 8,000 fans at home (8th), while Cameron Indoor packed 6,750 last season.

\* The ACC saw 13 student-athletes jump into the 1,000-point scoring club in 2007-08.

\* North Carolina's LaToya Pringle broke the Tar Heels' single-season blocked shot mark after tallying 121 in 2006-07 and 95 last season as a senior. With her 336 career blocked shots, the 6-3 forward ranks second behind the all-time ACC career blocked shot record (434), held by Duke's Alison Bales (2003-07).

\* NC State's Khadijah Whittington concluded her college career as one of only three players in ACC history with 1,000 points, 1,000 rebounds, 200 steals and 100 blocks and played all 129 games at NC State over the past four years, never missing a game.

\* Georgia Tech speedster Jacqua Williams had three or more steals in 20 games as a sophomore in 2006-07 on her way to a school-record 95, surpassing Kisha Ford's 13-year old record of 92. Williams has surpassed her own mark in 2007-08 as the junior amassed 118 take-aways over 31 games.

\* Maryland senior Kristi Toliver was the 2008 recipient of the 2008 Nancy Lieberman Award, which recognizes the nation's top collegiate point guard in women's Division I basketball. After breaking the 30-year-old ACC single-season assists record (275) in 2007-08, Toliver needs just three helpers to break the school career mark, which has stood since 1983. She enters the 2008-09 campaign having handed out 581 for her career.

\* UNC head coach Sylvia Hatchell concluded 2007-08 just 16 wins shy of becoming the fourth coach in NCAA Division I history to reach the 800-win plateau.

\* UNC's Hatchell's career record of 784-275 in 33 seasons makes her the third-winningest active coach in Division I, while Wolfpack head coach Kay Yow owns a career record of 729-337, the fifth best in women's basketball, and a 672-318 record in 33 seasons at NCSU.

## CRAWLEY NAMED HEAD COACH AT BOSTON COLLEGE

# THE INAUGURAL BIG TEN/ACC CHALLENGE

The ACC won the inaugural Big Ten/ACC Challenge, 8-3, a tournament which will span at least four years. The Big Ten/ACC Challenge matches 11 teams from each conference in head-to-head competition traditionally on the first Wednesday, Thursday and Friday after Thanksgiving, following the men's basketball Big Ten/ACC Challenge.

Seven of the Challenge's 11 games were nationally televised, including four on the Big Ten Network (BTN), two on ESPN2 and one on ESPNU.

"The Atlantic Coast Conference is pleased to be part of the Big Ten/ACC Challenge for women's basketball," said ACC Commissioner John Swofford. "To be able to showcase our women's basketball teams in premier competition with the Big Ten Conference in a great event like this will create excitement and enthusiasm with our participating teams and their fans."

In addition, the official title of the Challenge will rotate each year beginning with the Big Ten/ACC Women's Basketball Challenge in 2007. The 2008 event will be referred to as the ACC/Big Ten Women's Basketball Challenge and will continue to mirror the official title of the two conferences' Challenge agreement for men's basketball.

# ACC COMES FULL CIRCLE

Last season the ACC saw its initial push to bring the growing fight against breast cancer to the public's eye come full circle with the national announcement of the Kay Yow/WBCA Cancer Fund.

Beginning in 2000, the ACC approved a partnership between its Women's Basketball Tournament and *Friends For An Earlier Breast Cancer Test*, a Greensboro-based foundation committed to providing seed funding for researchers working on a biological earlier detection test. Initially, the tournament donated a percentage of revenues to the organization, and over the nine-year partnership, the four-day tournament has donated and raised over \$90,000 to *Friends'* research grants.

Recently, the Kay Yow/WBCA Cancer Fund, honoring ACC Hall of Fame coach Kay Yow, in partnership with the

Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA) and The V Foundation was established. The fund, which was announced on December 3, 2007, during the Jimmy V Classic, is committed to raising money for scientific research, assisting the underserved and unifying people for a common cause.

Yow's 37-year head coaching career and 33-year stint at NC State has seen her win more than 660 contests (672-318 NC State record) and nearly 730 overall games. Yow also coached the United States team to the Olympic gold medal in 1988. During the past 21 years of her career, Yow has also waged a fight against cancer – a fight that remains ongoing.

All 12 ACC women's basketball staffs, teams and administrations stand united in this ongoing fight against

breast cancer, encouraging all women's basketball fans and student bodies alike to contributing to the cause in a number of ways, including wearing pink throughout several 2007-08 ACC games, to help educate and motivate everyone to learn about cancer prevention.

# 2009 ACC TOURNAMENT

## GREENSBORO COLISEUM

In the past 31 years of the ACC Women's Basketball Tournament, there have been eight different sites. The inaugural tournament was held in 1978 at University Hall on the campus of the University of Virginia in Charlottesville.

The Tournament then moved to Reynolds Coliseum in Raleigh, N.C., in 1979, hosted by NC State. The University of Maryland's Cole Field House in College Park was the site of the 1980 Tournament, while Clemson University's Littlejohn Coliseum was home to the 1981 event. It returned to Reynolds Coliseum in 1982.

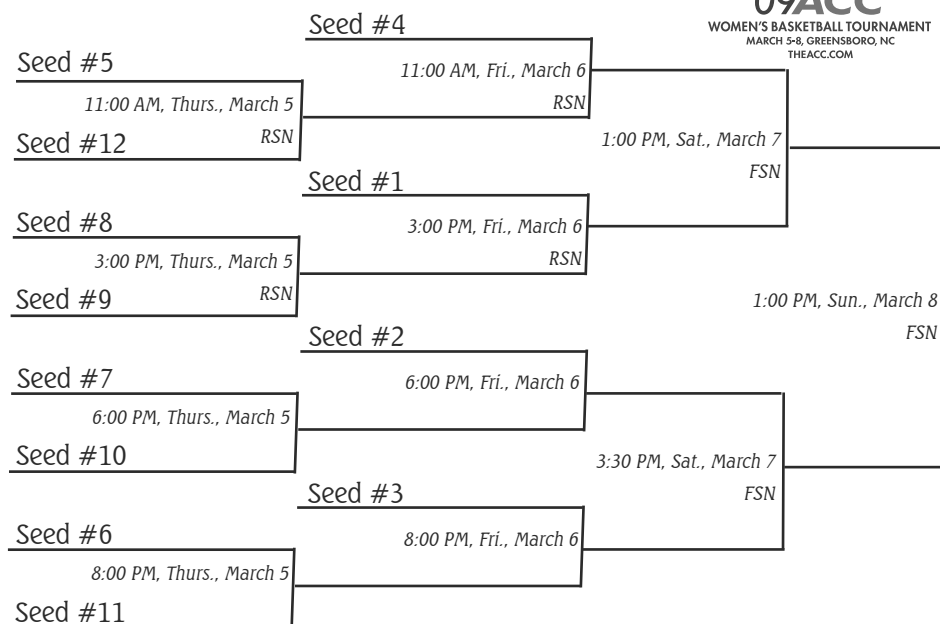
The Conference Tournament remained in North Carolina from 1983 to 1991, hosted by Fayetteville's Cumberland County Memorial Arena. The Tournament then moved to Winthrop Coliseum in Rock Hill, S.C., for a four-year span (1992-96), until the 1997 move to Independence Arena in Charlotte, N.C., which hosted the event for three years.

Over the last nine years, the ACC Women's Basketball Tournament has been held in the Greensboro Coliseum, which will serve as the 2009 ACC Tournament host as well as the 2009 NCAA Men's Basketball First and Second Round host, March 19 & 21.

Tournament MVP Erlana Larkins scored 17 points and grabbed eight rebounds to lead the top-seeded Tar Heels (30-2), who followed up a regular season in which they went unbeaten in conference play. Larkins and other members of UNC's senior class posted a 12-0 record in ACC Tournament games.

UNC freshman point guard Cetera DeGraffenreid matched Larkins for game-high scoring honors with 17 points, and LaToya Pringle and Rashanda McCants added 16 apiece for the Tar Heels.

# 2007-08 IN REVIEW

## MARYLAND'S CRYSTAL LANGHORNE NAMED ACC PLAYER OF THE YEAR



Crystal Langhorne finished the season the same way she started it - as the top player in the ACC. As the league's preseason player of the year, she was also named the winner of the end-of-the-year honor.

The senior post player received 23 of 49 votes cast by

members of the ACC Sports Media Association. North Carolina's Erlana Larkins received 12, Terrapins teammate Kristi Toliver had eight, NC State's Khadijah Whittington had five and the Tar Heels' Rashanda McCants received one vote.

Maryland's career scoring leader and the school's leading rebounder regardless of gender, Langhorne ranked third in the ACC in scoring and third in rebounding last season. She averaged 17.3 points and 9.4 rebounds, while leading the Terrapins to a No. 5 national ranking, a near-perfect ACC season and a No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament.

In doing so, she became just the second Terps player to win the individual award and the first since Vicky Bullett in 1989 - the last time Maryland won the league tournament.
