# WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

### By the Numbers...

North Carolina, which concluded the 2009 season with a 28-7 record, earned its first-ever Pre-season Women's NIT title, with an 80-79 escape at then-ranked No. 2 Oklahoma on Nov. 23.

The ACC was one of four leagues with SEVEN teams owning more than 20 wins.

ACC teams broke the league-record for non-conference wins in a single season with 156.

The ACC was one of two leagues to place seven student-athletes on the Naismith midseason candidate list, while Virginia was one of only two schools in the country to place THREE players from one team on the the midseason list.

Entering the 2010 season, head coach Debbie Ryan needs just one victory to earn her 700th victory at UVa.

The ACC boasted THREE of the Top FIVE teams in steals in the country throughout the season.

The ACC placed five on the 2008-09 Women's John R. Wooden Award Watch list, which is composed of 35 student-athletes.

The ACC captured its second straight ACC/Big Ten Challenge victory with a 7-4 outcome over the 11 games.

Junior Monica Wright, who led the league in scoring (20.5 ppg) and owned the top single-game scoring high with 35 points, grabbed a league season-high nine steals on Dec. 4 at Illinois.

North Carolina earned head coach Sylvia Hatchell her 800th career victory on Jan. 11, when the Tar Heels defeated NC State in OT. Only five women's basketball coaches have reached the 800-win plateau - Pat Summitt, Jody Conradt, Andy Landers and Vivian Stringer.

# ACC IN THE WNIT

Georgia Tech's appearance in the 1992 WNIT not only marked the school's first postseason tournament appearance, but also the first WNIT title for an ACC school. Boston College, which made its second consecutive WNIT showing after the Eagles made NCAA appearances in seven of the last 10 years. All 12 ACC schools have now participated in the WNIT at least once. Georgia Tech, Clemson and Miami each have received four WNIT bids, Florida State, Virginia and Virginia Tech have three appearances, while Boston College, North Carolina, NC State and Wake Forest have earned two berths. Duke and Maryland have each earned one bid.

### WEEKLY/POSTSEASON AWARDS

The ACC formed a women's basketball voting panel, consisting of national and local media members, as well as school representatives, which began in the 2008-09 season. The "Blue Ribbon Panel," whose members will serve either a one- or two-year term, will vote for the league's preseason poll, weekly honors and postseason All-Conference teams.

The ACC, with nominations from its 12 member institutions, will designate approximately 24 media members who cover ACC Women's Basketball regularly to the panel. The two dozen individuals cannot be directly affiliated with an ACC program and do not necessarily have to come from the schools' geographical areas.

In addition, each school will be permitted to nominate one at-large member, who is affiliated with the institution (i.e., school radio personality or school newspaper beat writer), to serve on the panel.

Both of these groups will be asked to commit to a two-year term and will be held accountable to voting on a consistent basis, including Player and Rookie of the Week selections, which will be announced on Tuesday afternoons.

In addition to the 36 members, the league's media relations office will invite additional national and selected persons to the panel, including ACC television partners.

Finally, all 12 league head coaches will receive one ballot to vote on preseason and postseason accolades; however, they will not be permitted to vote on a weekly basis or for their own student-athletes.

The designated "Blue Ribbon" panel will also be responsible for naming the All-ACC teams, All-Freshmen team, Coach of the Year, Player of the Year, and Rookie of the Year. The teams and individual award winners will be announced during the week immediately following the conclusion of the regular season.

In addition, the 12 head coaches will announce an All-Defensive Team, Defensive Player of the Year, and Sixth Player of the Year honor, an accolade that began in 2008.

### PRESEASON PREDICTIONS

North Carolina, the recipient of 15 of the 42 first-place votes, was selected as the top preseason pick for the 2008-09 Atlantic Coast Conference Women's Basketball season, as determined by a vote of the newly formed Blue Ribbon Panel.

North Carolina returns three starters and 10 letterwinners from last year's squad that finished the 2007-08 season with 33 wins, becoming just the fifth program in NCAA history to win at least 30 games in four or more consecutive seasons. Returning starters Rashanda McCants, Cetera DeGraffenreid and Heather Claytor give the Tar Heels a great deal of experience and talent coming into the season. In addition, head coach Sylvia Hatchell enters the season just 16 wins shy of becoming the fourth coach in NCAA Division I history to reach the 800 win plateau. Hatchell's current career record of 784-275 in 33 seasons makes her the third-winningest active coach in Division I.

All-American and Nancy Lieberman Award winner Kristi Toliver, who highlights a group of eight All-ACC returnees for the league, was named the 2008-09 Preseason Player of the Year. After breaking the 30-year-old ACC single-season assists record (275) in 2007-08, Toliver needs just three assists to break the Maryland career mark, which has stood since 1983. She enters the 2008-09 campaign having handed out 581 for her career.

Joining the 5-7 guard on the ACC Preseason Team is teammate Marissa Coleman, North Carolina's Rashanda McCants, Duke's Chante Black and Virginia's Monica Wright.

McDonald's, Parade and Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA) High School All-American Lynetta Kizer headlines the Maryland 2008 recruiting class. The 6-3 center and four-year letterwinner at Potomac High School, was named the 2008-09 Preseason ACC Rookie of the Year.

The Tar Heels' first-place preseason selection is their sixth in ACC history and the first in the last four years.

The Blue Ribbon Panel, beginning in the 2008-09 season, consists of national and local media members, as well as school representatives. In addition to the league's preseason poll, the panelists will vote on weekly honors and postseason All-Conference teams.

All proceeds of The Classic directly benefit the Kay Yow/WBCA Cancer Fund™.

This tournament ignites the passion in the participating coaches and I am excited about heading to Greensboro and the heart of ACC land, in the place that Kay has experienced so much success."

"Greensboro has earned the reputation of being the very best tournament host city for women's basketball," ACC Associate Commissioner Nora Lynn Finch stated. "With the FORE! 4Kay Golf Classic coming to Greensboro next September, we will have the opportunity to earn the reputation as being the best host city for golf, too! Everyone associated with the ACC Women's Basketball Tournament welcomes men's and women's basketball coaches and fans from across the country to Grandover for a golf classic that will help enrich Coach Yow's legacy as a great humanitarian, visionary, and generous community leader."

Among the well-known coaches and supporters who participated in the Inaugural Classic, which was held at the Cowboys Golf Club in Dallas, Texas on September 8, were Geno Auriemma (Connecticut), Jody Conradt (formerly at Texas), Bill Self (Kansas), Tubby Smith (Minnesota), Pat Summitt (Tennessee), Nick Valvano (The V Foundation), Nancy Lieberman (Broadcaster), and Debbie Antonelli (Broadcaster). All prizes were provided by Nike.

Yow is a past president and founding member of the WBCA, and serves as a leader and a galvanizing voice for the Association. She was an Olympic Gold Medal head coach in 1988, NCAA® Elite Eight® and Women's Final Four® coach in 1998, Women's Basketball Hall of Fame inductee in 2000, as well as a Naismith Basketball Hall of Fame inductee in 2002. Yow won the inaugural Jimmy V ESPY for Perseverance at the 2007 ESPY Awards. Yow was first diagnosed with breast cancer in 1987, and is currently battling the disease for the third time.

In December 2007, Yow established the Kay Yow/WBCA Cancer Fund™ in partnership with The V Foundation as a 501 c(3) charitable organization committed to being a part of finding an answer in the fight against women's cancers through raising money for scientific research, assisting the underserved and unifying people for a common cause.

### CHOW FOR YOW

The Atlantic Coast Conference head women's basketball coaches have banded together in support of their colleague and NC State former head women's basketball coach Kay Yow to develop the "Chow 4Yow - Dinner with the Coach" initiative.

The Kay Yow/WBCA Cancer Fund™ is the sole charity beneficiary of the Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA). With 100 percent of the league's women's basketball coaches and administrative staffs supporting the initiative, each school will conduct a "Dinner with the Coach" fundraiser this upcoming 2008-09 season at his or her institution. All proceeds will be pooled together as a single donation to the Kay Yow/WBCA Cancer Fund™.

"It is not surprising that the ACC women's basketball coaches want to show their support for the late Coach (Kay) Yow," said ACC Associate Commissioner Nora Lynn Finch. "It is heart warming to see them unite through such an intimate fundraising effort as the "Dinner with the Coach" theme! While Chow 4Yow is not an ACC sponsored initiative, it certainly is an initiative that the conference applauds and supports in any way that we can. Our coaches are excited about engaging others from their athletics department and coaching staff in ways that will bring positive attention to their basketball programs and Universities, while honoring one of their own!"

"It is a great thing when we as coaches can step out and use our notoriety to help promote fundraising for curing cancer," said Virginia head women's basketball coach Debbie Ryan, who battled pancreatic cancer in 2000. "Through this initiative, we will have the opportunity to get strong community involvement and reach out to so many people."

Specific parameters were identified by the league's women's basketball committee, which is comprised of a representative from all 12 ACC institutions. Each head coach, with assistance from their marketing staffs, will select a fundraiser and/or promotion (for example, a raffle or an auction) to allow the winner(s) to enjoy a private dinner with the institution's head coach.



### NEW FACES

Nora Lynn Finch joined the Atlantic Coast Conference in July 2008 to fill the position of Associate Commissioner for Women's Basketball Operations and Senior Woman Administrator. Finch's responsibilities include management and promotions of the annual women's basketball tournament, regular-season conference scheduling, liaison work with the national and regional television networks and serving as the commissioner's liaison to the league's 12 women's basketball programs and senior woman administrators.

Finch joined the ACC with a rich background in college athletics, including over 30 years at NC State, most recently as the department's Senior Associate Director and Senior Woman Administrator. In her time at NC State, she was a member of several key committees on both the ACC and NCAA levels, including the NCAA Division I Management Council, NCAA Division I Championships Cabinet and the NCAA Division I Membership Committee.

Highly respected and active in the sport of women's basketball, Finch was named the chair of the inaugural NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Committee in 1981 and served in that capacity until August 1988. In 1987, the Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA) awarded her its first WBCA Special Recognition Award for Athletics Administrators. The ACC presented her with its inaugural women's basketball Distinguished Service Award in 1989.

A 1970 graduate of Western Carolina, Finch graduated magna cum laude with a bachelor's degree in education and also earned a master's degree in education from Western Carolina. Before joining NC State, she directed the women's basketball teams at Wake Forest University (1971-73) and Peace College (1973-77) and was also Director of Athletics at Peace College (1973-77).

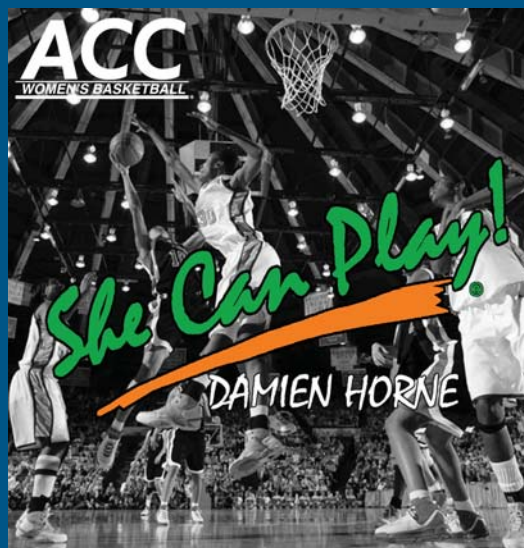

The ACC unveils the league's first-ever theme song for women's basketball in conjunction with the opening of the league's 2008-09 women's basketball regional sports television package.

The song "She Can Play", written and composed by Nashville singer/songwriter Damien Horne, first aired in two women's basketball promotional spots on Sunday, Jan. 11 in the Fox Sports Net and affiliates' production of the NC State at North Carolina game and again during the Clemson at Florida State contest.

Horne, who was raised in Hickory, North Carolina and is one of 12 children, offers a collection of R&B melodies, catchy pop hooks, and distinctive elements of hip-hop, soul, and rock. An NCAA Division II player during his college days, Horne's story, full of challenges in the pursuit of one's dreams, brings an element of empowerment and inspiration to each of the league's student-athletes and fans alike.

"Initially, we brought Damien in to work specifically with the Boys and Girls Club through one of our Tournament outreach programs," said ACC Associate Commissioner Nora Lynn Finch. "But after I read his story and heard a song that Damien had composed and dedicated to his niece ("Ain't She"), I knew that he had much more to offer ACC Women's Basketball than a few hours in an outreach program. My vision was then to have Damien compose a theme song, centered on our She Can Play! logo and slogan, that gives life to the brand of ACC Women's Basketball. We gave Damien the vision and merely 20 minutes later he delivered a song that I know will resonate with ACC fans of all ages and, in particular, our women's basketball fans."

Horne began his musical journey at age 11, singing in his local Salvation Army Church. He was soon competing in local talent shows and performing in a traveling production of Godspell. After graduation, he followed his dreams to Hollywood, where he soon found himself homeless. While that quest leads most to destruction, it led Horne to redemption and eventually found himself back in Carolina with a band called Stellar Tree.

One evening, while playing for tips on Nashville's historic 2nd Avenue, Horne was invited to perform with MuzikMafia (Musically Artist Friends In Alliance), the Nashville-based artist collaborative that yielded multi-platinum recording artists Big & Rich and Gretchen Wilson. Horne's music is supported by the group's mission to promote greatness in all genres without prejudice.

"ACC Basketball is the best ... just like the song says," said Horne jokingly, "I grew up in North Carolina watching the ACC teams play and am thrilled to have this opportunity to write a song for them that I hope the players and the fans can both relate to and enjoy."

Horne and the ACC are committed to highlighting the energy, skill and excitement of ACC women's basketball. The "She Can Play" song and music video will be featured throughout the 2008-09 season and will culminate with a live performance by Horne in March at the 32nd annual ACC Women's Basketball Tournament in Greensboro, N.C.

One of the most beloved figures in NC State history and one of the most respected coaches in the nation, Women's Basketball Coach Kay Yow, died peacefully on Jan. 24 after a long, heroic battle with breast cancer.

Yow, 66, had been supported by her family and her staff in the last several days and was even able to visit with her entire team at WakeMed Cary Hospital earlier this week.

Yow, who was in her 38th year of coaching, will be remembered for the hundreds and thousands of lives she touched through basketball and through her tireless efforts to fight cancer.

"It has been an honor and a privilege to work with Coach Yow for the last 15 seasons. I suddenly find myself grasping to retain everything she has ever said and ever taught me," said interim head coach Stephanie Glance.

Yow announced Jan. 6 that she would not return to the team this season as she continued her fight against a disease she was first diagnosed with in 1987. She said at the time it was one of the hardest decisions she has ever had to make.

The Hall of Fame coach had been in the hospital on the recommendation of her oncologist, Dr. Mark Graham, who cited it was in her best interest to get the proper care she needed at the time.

The disease first recurred during the 2004-05 season, forcing her to miss two games that year and 16 more in the 2006-07 season.

Yow had missed four straight games this season before taking leave with what was described as an extremely low energy level.

A native of Gibsonville, N.C., Yow led the U.S. women's basketball team to a gold medal in 1988, directed her Wolfpack club to the 1998 Final Four and in 2002, became just the fifth female coach inducted into the James Naismith Basketball Hall of Fame.

She entered her 34th season as head mentor of the Wolfpack women's program in 2008-09. Her NC State record of 680-325 left her as one of only three women's coaches at the Division I level to coach 1,000 games at one institution. On Dec. 14 in a victory over Ole Miss, Coach Yow took her place alongside legendary Tennessee coach Pat Summitt and former Texas coach Jody Conradt.

Yow's all-time collegiate record of 737-344 spanned 38 seasons, four with Elon College. She was one of just six coaches to ever compile over 700 victories and began this season as the most tenured coach in the active ranks.

There is really no right place to begin talking about Coach Yow. Her accomplishments extend beyond the basketball world, but it is within that world that she has become so accomplished.

Yow guided her squads to 20 NCAA Tournaments, 11 trips to the Sweet 16, and a trip to the Elite Eight and Final Four in 1998. She collected five (1978, 1980, 1983, 1985, 1990) Atlantic Coast Conference regular season championships, four (1980, 1985, 1987, 1991) ACC Tournament titles, amassed 21, 20-win seasons and a staggering 29 winning seasons.

Yow was forced to take a leave of absence because of progression in her breast cancer and missed roughly two months (16 games) of the 2006-07 season, but fought back to make a triumphant return to the bench in a win over long-time rival Virginia on January 26, 2007. Later on that season in a win over No. 2-ranked North Carolina, the Reynolds Coliseum court was christened "Kay Yow Court."

## ACC/BIG TEN CHALLENGE

The ACC won its second straight ACC/Big Ten Challenge, collecting seven wins over Big Ten opponents.

The Challenge, which is in the second year of a four-year agreement, matches 11 teams from each conference in head-to-head competition. The annual Challenge will ideally be held on the first Wednesday, Thursday and Friday after Thanksgiving, following the men's basketball ACC/Big Ten Challenge.

Six of this year's Challenge's 11 games were televised, including four on the Big Ten Network (BTN), and two on BTN.com.

The ACC won the inaugural Big Ten/ACC Challenge, 8-3, which featured games outside the traditional timeframe. Since the 1999-2000 season, the two conferences have squared off in head-to-head competition on 68 occasions with the ACC holding a 38-31 advantage.

"The Atlantic Coast Conference is pleased to be part of the Big Ten/ACC Challenge for women's basketball," said ACC Commissioner John Swofford. "To be able to showcase our women's basketball teams in premier competition with the Big Ten Conference in a great event like this will create excitement and enthusiasm with our participating teams and their fans."

In addition, the official title of the Challenge will rotate each year beginning with the Big Ten/ACC Women's Basketball Challenge in 2007. The 2008 event will be referred to as the ACC/Big Ten Women's Basketball Challenge and will continue to mirror the official title of the two conferences' Challenge agreement for men's basketball.

The Big Ten and ACC conference offices will coordinate the 11-game schedule each season and matchups may repeat from year-to-year in efforts to coordinate similar opponents. The ACC will select its top 11 teams from the previous season from its 12-team membership.

### 2009 ACC LEGENDS

The ACC announces its fifth annual class of ACC Women's Basketball Legends to be honored at the 2009 ACC Women's Basketball Tournament. The honorees will be recognized during the ACC Legends Luncheon on Friday, March 6, as well as on the court at halftime of the first semifinal game on Saturday, March 7. The ACC Women's Basketball Legends program honors past players from each of the ACC's 12 schools who have contributed to the league's rich tradition.

Included in the class are 11 former student-athletes and two former head coaches that represent four decades of ACC Women's Basketball competitors. Below is a complete list of this year's legends and the accolades from their playing career.

#### BOSTON COLLEGE -

##### Holly (Porter) Little (1993-97)

This legend was a dominating rebounder and dead-eye shooter for Boston College from 1993 to 1997... She was named the BIG EAST "Rookie of the Year" in 1994, followed with All-BIG EAST honors in each of her succeeding varsity seasons ... She started and played in all 108 games of her college career ... She scored 1,957 career points, averaging an impressive 18.1 points per game ... She led the team in steals for three seasons and was credited with 182 career assists ... She was inducted into the Boston College Athletic Hall of Fame in 2003.

#### CLEMSON - Jessica Barr-Dennis (1992-94)

This legend played just two seasons at Clemson under head coach Jim Davis from 1992 until 1994 ... She became only the third player in school history to lead the team in scoring, rebounding, and field goal percentage in a single season ... She was named a Kodak All-American in her second and final year as a Tiger ... She became the first Clemson player to be named ACC Player of the Year following the 1993-94 season ... She was inducted into the Clemson Hall of Fame in 2000 and selected to the ACC 50-Year Anniversary Team in 2003.

#### DUKE - Barb Krause (1978-81)

This legend graduated summa cum laude from Duke in 1981 with a double major in philosophy and German ... She served as the team's captain in 1980 and 1981 and was inducted into the Maine Sports Hall of Fame in 1999 ... She still owns the Blue Devils' single-game record for rebounds and her 23 rebounds against Georgia Tech on Jan. 13, 1979 remains an ACC single-game record and ranks second in the Duke single-game record book... She was invited to try out for the 1979 Pan American Games and played professionally in Germany for two years.

#### FLORIDA STATE -

##### Beverly "Bev" Burnett (1984-89)

This legend is one of the most prolific scorers in Florida State women's basketball history ... She finished her career with 1,509 points, a mark that ranks fourth in Seminole history ... She was a four-year letterwinner from 1985 to 1989

and still ranks sixth all-time among FSU players in scoring average at 15.6 points per game ... She earned All-Metro Conference first-team honors in 1988 and 1989 and led the Seminoles in scoring in each of those seasons.

#### GEORGIA TECH -

##### Karen Lounsbury Russell (1988-92)

This legend was a four-year letterwinner for the Georgia Tech women's basketball team from 1989 to 1992 ... She is one of the most exciting Yellow Jackets to have played on the Flats ... A 1992 graduate, she started 114 games and played in a total of 119 ... She was a second-team All-ACC selection in 1990 and finished off a stellar four-year career at Georgia Tech by leading the Jackets to the 1992 WNIT Championship ... She was named in 2006 to the Georgia Tech Athletic Association Hall of Fame.

#### MARYLAND - Chris Weller

##### (Head Coach 1975-2002; Player 1962-66)

This legend was a four-year letterwinner for Maryland from 1962 until 1966 and also participated on the swimming and lacrosse squads ... She became an assistant for two seasons under Dottie McKnight and in 1975 was named the head coach of the Maryland Terrapins, where she remained at the helm until 2002 ... She averaged nearly 20 wins per season in 26 seasons at the helm ... She guided the Terps to three Final Fours, eight Elite Eights, and 10 Sweet 16 appearances ... She was named the ACC and American Sports Foundation's National Coach of the Year in 1989 and recognized as the 1992 Naismith National Coach of the Year and the Basketball Writer's Association of America National Coach of the Year.

#### MIAMI - Kym Hope (1995-99)

This legend was the University of Miami and BIG EAST rebounding champion in 1997-98 ... She was a two-time first-team All-BIG EAST selection and first-team All-BIG EAST Tournament Team member ... A three-year starter, she finished her career among Miami's all-time Top-10 in scoring, rebounds, field goals, blocked shots, free throws, and free throws attempted ... She was a member of Miami's 1997-98 NCAA Tournament team and 1998-99 WNIT team ... She played with the WNBA's Orlando Miracle, the Utah Starzz, the San Antonio Silver Stars and played professionally in Spain, Korea and Greece.

#### NORTH CAROLINA -

##### Jennifer Alley (Head Coach 1977-86)

This legend served nine years as the first full-time head women's basketball coach at the University of North Carolina ... She helped the Tar Heels capture the 1984 ACC crown and guided her teams to numerous national Top-20 rankings and four NCAA Tournament appearances ... She has served as a teacher, coach, athletic administrator, marketer and fundraiser for the past 38 years ... She currently serves on the Board of Directors of the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame and is a liaison to the Wade Trophy Committee.

#### NC STATE - Trena Trice-Hill (1983-87)

This legend was a dominating center for the Wolfpack from 1983 to 1987 ... She guided the Pack to

four straight NCAA appearances, two ACC Tournament titles and an ACC regular-season title in 1985 ... She averaged 15.1 points and 8.4 rebounds per game, including a double-double as a senior ... She still ranks as the Pack's sixth all-time leading scorer with 1,761 points and fifth all-time leading rebounder with 984 boards ... She was selected to compete on the USA Select National team and USA Basketball Jones Cup team and was named to the ACC's 50th Anniversary team in 2002 ... She became one of NC State's first WNBA players and played with the New York Liberty for two seasons.

#### VIRGINIA - Valerie Ackerman (1978-81)

This legend is a 1981 graduate of the University of Virginia, where she was a four-year starter for the women's basketball team and a two-time Academic All-American ... She was a three-time captain of the Cavaliers and helped Virginia reach national Top-20 rankings her senior year ... She won the ACC scholar athlete award in 1981 and in 1997, she was named Distinguished Alumna by Virginia ... She is the former President of the WNBA and is currently the President of USA Basketball.

## 2009 CHAMPIONS

MARYLAND 92, DUKE 89

Marissa Coleman's 3-point field goal with 2:54 left in overtime gave the Maryland Terrapins the lead for good, and they held on by completing a nearly perfect afternoon from the foul line to defeat Duke 92-89 in the ACC Tournament championship game. The Terps overcame the disappointment of losing a six-point lead in the final 90 seconds of regulation, and they improved to 10-1 in OT during the careers of spectacular seniors Coleman and Kristi Toliver.

"We continue to show that overtime is our time," coach Brenda Frese said. "What a tremendous game. What a tremendous win with two teams that had the will to win."

Coleman finished with 28 points, 15 rebounds and six assists to deliver Maryland its first ACC title since 1989. The Terps went 23-of-24 at the foul line, a tournament record for any game with 10 or more attempts.

"I think it has to go down as one of the greatest games in the history of the ACC Tournament," Duke coach Joanne P McCallie said. "I'm very, very proud of our team. I'm very proud of our fight."

The OT was the first in the ACC finals since the Terrapins lost to Virginia 106-103 in three extra sessions in 1993, a classic some consider the best game involving two ACC teams. The other chief candidate is another Duke-Maryland encounter, the 2006 NCAA finals. In that one, Toliver, then a freshman, forced extra time by hitting a heavily contested 3-pointer at the end of regulation, and her team went on to a 78-75 win in Boston.

As it prepared for another five minutes, Frese reminded her team that it hadn't lost yet.

"We knew they would have momentum after that shot, but we just stayed composed throughout this tournament," Coleman said.

Duke took the lead three separate times in OT, but the Terrapins responded. Coleman's two free throws produced a draw with 3:34 left, and after Karima Christmas put the Devils up 87-85, Coleman demanded the ball and knocked down a trifecta from the top of the key.

"I don't remember who set the screens," said Coleman, the tournament Most Valuable Player.

After Kim Rodgers made two clutch freebies with 12 seconds to play, the lead was again three. The Terrapins would need just about everything they made. Duke forced 19 turnovers while committing only eight, and that margin kept the score tight.

The Devils sought the tie and the Terps decided to play standard defense rather than fouling around midcourt to prevent a 3-point attempt. Frese admitted she didn't have the chance to make a specific directive because the Devils had compelled the Terps to take their final time outs to avoid turnovers.

Abby Waner, whose remarkable range and quick release make virtually any shot feasible, took a pass, stepped back two feet and fired from just in front of the left sideline. When the shot missed, the Terrapins were champs.

"Abby does take things pretty hard, but we are going to let her know that we have great confidence in her," Duke forward Carrem Gay said. "We have a couple more games to go get what we want."

"The thing I love about overtime – and our players know this – is that it's a mindset," Frese said. "You have to embrace it."

## ROBIN ROBERTS AWARD

Abby Waner of Duke University has been chosen to receive the Robin Roberts/Women's Basketball Coaches' Association (WBCA) Broadcasting Scholarship Award.

The Robin Roberts/WBCA Broadcasting Scholarship Award is presented annually to one female collegiate basketball player who intends to pursue graduate work and a career in sports communications/journalism. As part of the scholarship, \$500 is provided by Robin Roberts for travel to/from the WBCA National Convention for the recipient, while \$4,000 goes directly to the institution for the student's tuition.

This season Waner is averaging 9.7 points, 3.3 rebounds, 3.8 assists and 3.0 steals for the 22-4 Blue Devils. Waner became the first Blue Devil to notch 40 or more three-pointers all four seasons and on Feb. 13 vs. Clemson she became Duke's all-time leader for three-pointers made.

In addition to her work on the court, Waner has worked as a sideline reporter for ESPN numerous times and has worked in the same capacity for the Duke men's basketball and football teams on several occasions. In addition to her summer internship with ESPN, Waner is also a very skilled writer and has done many blogs for GoDuke.com, AP and recently had an article published in the Raleigh News & Observer on the passing of Kay Yow.

## LAW SCHOLARSHIP

The WBCA has selected Georgia Tech's Jacqua Williams as the winner of the Charles T. Stoner Law Scholarship Award. The \$1,000 Charles T. Stoner Law Scholarship Award, named for and presented by Stoner, a former legal consultant for the WBCA, is presented annually to one female collegiate basketball player who intends to pursue a career in law.

A defensive specialist, Williams currently leads the ACC and is fourth nationally with 3.6 steals per game. She also ranks 10th in free throw percentage (74.4), 11th in assists (3.2) and 23rd in points per game (11.6) in the ACC. Williams holds the all-time record for steals at Georgia Tech for both men and women with a current tally of 366. Williams was named to the 2009 All-ACC Defensive Team, marking her second appearance on the team, and has been selected as Georgia Tech's Defensive Player of the Year the last two seasons.

Williams is a two-sport athlete for the Ramblin' Wreck and competes in the 200m and as part of the ACC Champion 400m relay team. Williams has competed at the NCAA Track & Field Championship the last two seasons and also at USA Track & Field sanctioned events.

### TENTH ANNIVERSARY

In the past 31 years of the ACC Women's Basketball Tournament, there have been eight different sites. The inaugural tournament was held in 1978 at University Hall on the campus of the University of Virginia in Charlottesville.

The Tournament then moved to Reynolds Coliseum in Raleigh, N.C., in 1979, hosted by NC State. The University of Maryland's Cole Field House in College Park was the site of the 1980 Tournament, while Clemson University's Littlejohn Coliseum was home to the 1981 event. It returned to Reynolds Coliseum in 1982.

The Conference Tournament remained in North Carolina from 1983 to 1991, hosted by Fayetteville's Cumberland County Memorial Arena. The Tournament then moved to Winthrop Coliseum in Rock Hill, S.C., for a four-year span (1992-96), until the 1997 move to Independence Arena in Charlotte, N.C., which hosted the event for three years.

Over the last nine years, the ACC Women's Basketball Tournament has been held in the Greensboro Coliseum, which will serve as the 2009 ACC Tournament host as well as the 2009 NCAA Men's Basketball First and Second Round host, March 19 & 21.
