NOTES

- Maryland won its fourth NCAA title on Nov. 20, becoming just the third program to win at least four NCAA field hockey championships. Old Dominion (nine) and North Carolina (four) are the other two.
- The ACC had three teams in the NCAA semifinals for the third straight season, and fourth time in the last six years.
- At least one ACC team has appeared in the national semifinals in each of the last 17 seasons.
- An ACC school appeared in the title game for the seventh consecutive season in 2005.
- With Maryland and Duke advancing to the title game, there was an all-ACC final for the third straight year. Duke and Wake Forest played in each of the two previous championship contests.
- Maryland was making its sixth title game appearance, and first since 2001. Duke was making its third, with each of them coming in the last three seasons.
- There have now been six All-ACC finals (1987, 1993, 1995, 2003, 2004 and 2005).
- ACC teams have won 11 NCAA titles, including the last four and nine of the last 13.
- Wake Forest won its first NCAA title in 2002 in Louisville, the site of this year's championship.
- Five ACC schools earned spots in the NCAA Championship field for the second time in league history (1999 was the first).
- The ACC has had at least three teams in the NCAA tournament in each of the last 11 seasons, including 2005.

ACC CHAMPIONSHIP RECAP

TERPS WIN SIXTH ACC TITLE ON LAST-MINUTE GOAL

No. 3 Maryland Tops No. 1 Wake Forest for 2005 ACC Field Hockey Championship

COLLEGE PARK, Md. – In an Atlantic Coast Conference Field Hockey Championship title game clash between the top two seeds and two of the top three teams in the nation, neither side disappointed as Maryland scored with just 41.1 seconds left to take a 3-2 win over Wake Forest and claim the 2005 ACC championship on Sunday.

Tournament MVP Susie Rowe blasted home a rebound with just seconds remaining to give the Terrapins their sixth ACC title. After Maryland drew a penalty corner with about a minute to play, Rowe, a freshman from London, England, corralled Paula Infante's blocked shot and scorched it home for the decisive score.

Rowe also scored twice in the final seven minutes against Duke in the semifinals on Friday to rally Maryland to the win in that game.

The championship contest was a thrilling back-and-forth affair with several exciting moments and near-misses. Maryland (19-2), ranked third in the nation and seeded second in the tournament, jumped out to an early lead, with Janneke van Leeuwen converting a Rowe pass at the 4:13 mark. The play started on a penalty corner, with Rowe lining up to fake a shot at the top of the circle. She then found van Leeuwen open in front of the net, and van Leeuwen pounded the ball home from close range to put the Terrapins up, 1-0.

No. 1 seed and top-ranked Wake Forest (19-1) had a couple of promising scoring opportunities turned away after that. About 10 minutes into the contest, the Demon Deacons' Tracey Scott stole a Maryland pass in front of the net, and attempted to poke it past Terrapin keeper Kathryn Masson. Masson saved the shot, and Haley Scott's shot off the rebound sailed wide.

The Deacons had another chance thwarted in the 25th minute, when Christine Suggs put a shot on frame when Masson was drawn out. Maryland's Kristina Edmonds stepped in front of the shot, however, earning the defensive save and keeping the Terps in the lead for the moment.

Masson made an outstanding save in the 26th minute, swiping away Tracey Scott's slow-rolling attempt just before it could cross the goal line. Wake's Maeke Boreel played a ball from behind the midfield mark, finding a streaking Scott alone in Maryland's half of the field. Scott drew Masson out and was able to get a shot off, but Masson raced back to the goal and made a diving stick save.

The Deacons finally broke through against Maryland's defense in the 28th minute, with Suggs scoring off a penalty corner. Suggs pushed the ball in to Boreel, who handled the stop and slid the ball over to Lauren Crandall. Crandall then passed the ball back to Suggs, who was all alone on the left side in front of the goal and put it away to even the score.

The Terrapins went back on top just minutes later, as Jackie Ciconte put away a rebound in the 34th minute. After Infante's shot off a penalty corner was blocked, Ciconte battled for possession in front of the Deacon goal and was able to slap a shot home to put Maryland back in front. The Terps led at the half, 2-1.

Wake Forest drew even again in the 51st minute, when Crandall scored off a penalty corner. After Wake was awarded the corner for a takedown just outside the circle, Suggs pushed the ball in and Boreel handled the stick stop, setting up Crandall's scoring strike.

Maryland had a pair of close-range shots saved with about 10 minutes to play, when Wake Forest keeper Kristina Gagliardi stopped a pair of Ciconte attempts from just a few feet from the goal. Gagliardi saved Ciconte's first attempt, but Ciconte pounced on the rebound and reeled off another shot. Gagliardi was again up to the challenge, this time saving the shot from her back to keep the game tied at 2-2.

Maryland's Rowe, Infante and Lauren Powley and Wake Forest's Crandall and Ariel Meyers and were named to the ACC Championship All-Tournament Team. Rowe became just the third freshman in league history to be named the tournament's MVP, joining Maryland's Jessica Wilk in 1986 and North Carolina's Judith Jonckheer in 1984. Suggs was named the ACC Freshman of the Year during the postgame awards ceremony.

The win was the 300th of Maryland coach Missy Meharg's career.

The game was played before a Maryland Field Hockey and Lacrosse Complex-record crowd of 1,306.

NCAA 25TH ANNIVERSARY TEAM

Five Former ACC Players Earn Spots on NCAA 25th Anniversary Field Hockey Team

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. – Five former Atlantic Coast Conference players were voted to the NCAA 25th Anniversary Field Hockey Team, the NCAA announced Friday. Kelly Doton, Leslie Lyness, Carla Tagliente, Cindy Werley and Jana Withrow were all named to the team.

Wake Forest back Kelly Doton won the Honda Award as the national field hockey player of the year in 2003 and was named the national Player of the Year by womensfieldhockey.com in 2002 and 2003. A three-time All-American and two-time ACC Player of the Year, Doton helped the Demon Deacons to a pair of national titles during her tenure, and was named to the NCAA All-Tournament Team in each of her four seasons.

North Carolina midfielder Leslie Lyness was a two-time All-American for the Tar Heels in the late 1980s, earning the distinction in 1988 and 1989. Lyness helped North Carolina to its first national championship in 1989, and was named to the NCAA All-Tournament team in 1987 and 1989. Lyness won the Honda Award as the nation's top field hockey player as a senior in 1989.

Maryland forward Carla Tagliente led the Terrapins to their third-ever NCAA championship in 1999, when she was also named to the NCAA All-Tournament Team. The 1997 ACC Freshman of the Year, Tagliente earned All-America honors in each of her four seasons.

North Carolina midfielder Cindy Werley earned the Honda Award as the national field hockey player of the year twice during her career, doing so in 1996 and 1997. Werley led the Tar Heels to NCAA titles in both of those seasons and was a member of the NCAA All-Tournament team in 1994, 1996 and 1997. Werley was twice named the ACC's Player of the Year and was a three-time All-American.

North Carolina goalkeeper Jana Withrow helped the Tar Heels to NCAA titles in 1995, 1996 and 1997. Withrow was an NCAA All-Tournament selection in 1995, and was an All-American in 1996 and 1997.

Joining the five ACC players on the team were Old Dominion's Marina DiGiacomo, Christy Morgan and Robin Smith, Connecticut's Tracey Fuchs, Iowa's Kristy Gleason and Massachusetts' Judy Strong. Beth Anders, who has led Old Dominion to nine national titles, was selected as the team's coach.

Several NCAA women's championships are celebrating their 25th anniversaries during the 2005-06 season, and the NCAA will release 25th Anniversary Teams for those sports throughout the year.
