2009 PREVIEW

The 2009 Atlantic Coast Conference Field Hockey Championship, hosted by the University of Virginia, will be the 27th in league history. Overall, the city of Charlottesville has played host to the championship a total of five times (1984, 88, 94, 98, & 2003).

Maryland, ranked first in the most recent National Field Hockey Coaches Association Top-20 poll, clinched the regular-season title and the top seed in the championship with a 4-1 win over North Carolina (Oct. 24) in Chapel Hill. The Terrapins will be looking for their second conference title in as many years, their third in the last five, and eighth overall.

In addition to Maryland, North Carolina (second), Virginia (third), Wake Forest (sixth), Boston College (nine), and Duke (14) are all ranked by the NFHCA. The second-ranked Tar Heels have dominated the Championship since its inception in 1983, winning the first nine titles, and 16 of the 25 overall.

Host Virginia locked in the third season and concluded the regular season with a 16-2 overall record, its best mark since the 1998 season (15-3) when the Cavaliers advanced to both the ACC championship game and the semifinal round of the NCAA Tournament. Coincidentally, the 1998 ACC Championship was also hosted by Virginia.

Wake Forest assumed the fourth seed with an 11-5 win over Boston College (Oct. 31) in Winston-Salem, forcing the Eagles into the fifth seed. The Demon Deacons are looking for their fifth straight appearance in the ACC championship game, and have achieved the feat nine times out of the last 11 seasons, including eight of the past nine.

Since joining the league prior to the 2005 season, Boston College has not advanced past the first round, but is boasting its best regular-season record—a 13-6 mark—since the 2006 season.

Duke rounds out the six-team field with one of its youngest rosters to date. A total of 12 freshmen and sophomores make up the 17-person Blue Devil roster. Duke has not reached the championship game since 2003.

The 2009 Atlantic Coast Conference Field Hockey Championship will be held on November 5, 6, and 8 in Charlottesville, Va. and will be hosted by the University of Virginia. The ACC champion will receive the conference's automatic berth in the NCAA Tournament. The championship game will be telecast by the league's regional sports network, including live broadcasts on Fox Sports South, Fox Sports Florida, Comcast SportsNet Mid-Atlantic or CSN+, and a tape-delay broadcast on the New England Sports Network.

All-ACC Field Hockey Team Announced

Top-ranked Maryland sweeps trio of individual honors

GREENSBORO, N.C. – Maryland junior forward Katie O'Donnell was selected as the 2009 Atlantic Coast Conference Offensive Player of the Year—becoming the league's first three-time recipient of the award—and headlines the 2009 All-ACC Field Hockey team, announced today. In addition to O'Donnell, Terrapin senior defender Emma Thomas was selected as the Defensive Player of the Year and 22nd-year head coach Missy Meharg was voted by her peers as the Coach of the Year to give Maryland a trio of individual honors.

O'Donnell, who also won the award as a freshman (2007) and sophomore (2008), was picked by the coaches to repeat as the Offensive Player of the Year after she led the league in points with 65 on 21 goals and a league-leading 23 assists. O'Donnell sparked a Maryland offense that scored a league-high 90 goals and helped the top-ranked Terrapins (National Field Hockey Coaches Association) to a perfect 18-0 regular-season, as well as a 5-0 record in league play and the No. 1 seed in this weekend's ACC Championship.

Thomas anchored a Terp defense that currently ranks eighth nationally by giving up just 1.10 goals per game. This season, Thomas' first as an All-ACC selection, she ranked sixth in the ACC with 19 goals and added 10 assists to stand in eighth. The High Wycombe, England native is the fourth Terrapin to earn Defensive Player of the Year honors since the league initiated separate awards for offensive and defensive players in 2004.

Meharg, who has been picked ACC Coach of the Year five times during her 22-year career, guided Maryland to its first undefeated regular-season in school history. The Terps began 2009 as the preseason favorite by the NFHCA and never relinquished their top spot, with 12 wins over ranked opponents, including the last seven straight.

Overall, the 18-member All-ACC team includes five selections from North Carolina—the most by any league team—including freshman midfielder Kelsey Kolojejchick, the only first-year player to earn All-ACC honors. Maryland follows with four selections, while Virginia and Wake Forest each have three. Duke has two picks and Boston College has one to round out the list.

The Freshman of the Year award will be voted on by the coaches at the 2009 ACC Field Hockey Championship, hosted by the University of Virginia on November 5, 6, and 8.

Game Preview

Fifth-seed Boston College will bring its 13-5 overall and 1-4 Atlantic Coast Conference records into the first round of the 2009 ACC Field Hockey Championship against fourth-seed Wake Forest, who holds an 11-5 overall and 2-3 ACC record coming into the match.

The Eagles, currently ranked ninth by the National Field Hockey Coaches Association, are led by senior forward **Chelsey Feole**, who is second in the league with both 24 goals scored and 1.33 goals per game, and has scored a goal in 14 of the Eagles' 18 games this season. Entering the game with 128 career points to her credit, **Feole** ranks second all-time in school history in that category. **Feole** is also second on the squad with 11 assists.

Junior midfielder/forward **Janna Anctil** has also provided a steady offensive attack for the Eagles in 2009 with 10 goals and 12 assists, both of which rank second on the team.

Wake Forest, currently ranked sixth by the NFHCA and winners of three of their last four games, enter the game without a go-to offensive attack. Instead, 13 Demon Deacons have notched goals this season, including freshman midfielder **Lizzie Rae**, who has recorded a team-high 10 goals in 2009. Sophomore midfielder **Lauren Greenwald** has been the primary feeder for the Deacs this season with a team-high nine assists and a 0.56 assists per game average, which rank ninth and eighth in the league, respectively.

The last time the Eagles and the Demon Deacons met in the ACC Championship was last season when third-seeded Wake Forest took a 4-3 decision from sixth-seeded Boston College in Durham, N.C.

Sixth-ranked Wake Forest opened a 3-0 lead over ninth-ranked Boston College and never looked back on its way to a 5-2 win on Saturday, October 31, in the season finale for both teams.

The win improves the Demon Deacons to 11-5 overall and 2-3 in the Atlantic Coast Conference, while the loss drops the Eagles to 13-5 overall and 1-4 in the ACC.

Wake opened up a 1-0 lead less than three minutes into the game when sophomore defender **Kaitlin Piosa** found senior midfielder/forward **Raisa Schiller** with a cross-field pass for a goal. The Demon Deacons extended their lead to 2-0 in the 16th minute when senior forward **Kim Romansky** netted a set piece off a penalty corner. Junior forward defender **Liza Casella** was credited with the assist. Senior forward/midfielder **Hilary Moore** increased the Wake Forest lead to 3-0 in the 31st minute with an unassisted goal.

The teams entered halftime with the Deacons leading, 3-0. Wake Forest out-shot the Eagles, 6-4, in the opening half, while neither team controlled the penalty corner battle (2-2).

Boston College senior forward **Chelsey Feole** got the Eagles on the board in the 48th minute when she converted a penalty corner by utilizing a junior defender/midfielder **Emily Kozniuk** assist. The goal was Feole's 24th of the season.

Wake Forest re-directed momentum in its favor in the 55th minute when **Piosa** scored her second goal of the game and fifth of the season off a penalty stroke to make the score 4-1 in favor of the Deacs. Just over four minutes later, **Schiller** added one more insurance goal for Wake with her second goal of the game and fifth of the season in the 59th minute.

Sophomore midfielder/forward **Kate Gillis** looked to keep the Eagles alive with a goal of her own in the 66th minute of play, but the Deacs were able to close out the last five minutes of the game to seal the victory.

Freshman goalkeeper **Kaitlyn Ruhf** logged all 70 minutes in goal for Wake Forest, faced eight Eagle shots and made four saves.

Senior goalkeeper **Kristine Stigas** also logged all 70 minutes between the pipes for the Eagles, and saved seven of the 14 Demon Deacon shots she faced.

Game Preview

Sixth-seed Duke enters the first round of the 2009 Atlantic Coast Conference Field Hockey Championship with an even 9-9 overall record, including a 0-5 mark in the ACC, and will match up with third-seed Virginia, who is 16-2 overall and 3-2 in the ACC this season. The game will feature a bit of deja vu as these two teams met last Saturday, October 31 in the regular-season finale for both teams, with Virginia taking a 2-1 win from the Blue Devils.

Duke, currently ranked 14th by the National Field Hockey Coaches Association, is led by senior forward **Amie Survilla**, who has taken credit for 20 of Duke's 49 goals this season, and ranks fifth in the ACC in both goals (20) and goals per game (1.11). Additionally, **Survilla** has taken 40.1 percent of the Blue Devils shots this season (106-of-262), the highest percentage in the league in 2009. Senior defender **Lauren Miller** and junior forward **Susan Ferger** have also been solid for the Blue Devils. **Miller** sports a .656 shots-on-goal percentage, the highest mark on the team for anyone who has taken more than 10 shots, while **Ferger** is second with eight goals and tied for third with four assists.

Virginia, currently ranked third by the NFHCA, boasts a well-rounded attack, with five players scoring at least five goals and more than 17 points this season. Sophomore midfielder **Paige Selenski** leads the team and ranks third in the ACC with 22 goals and a 1.22 goals per game average, and has also tallied seven assists. **Selenski** also sports a .306 shot percentage and .750 shots-on-goal percentage. Meanwhile, senior midfielder/forward **Traci Ragukas** also shoots above the .300 clip with a .389 shot percentage to go with seven goals and six assists this season.

Virginia closed the regular-season at 16-2 overall, with its only two losses coming to top-ranked Maryland (3-1, Oct. 2) and second-ranked North Carolina (2-1 in OT, Oct. 17).

These two teams also met in last season's ACC Championship, with fourth-seed Virginia claiming a 5-2 win from fifth-seed Duke in the opening round of action.

Fourteenth-ranked Duke took a 1-0 lead into halftime, but could not withstand a two-goal second half from third-ranked Virginia, as the Cavaliers defeated the Blue Devils, 2-1, at the University of Virginia TurfField in Charlottesville, Va. in the regular-season finale for both teams.

The first 20 minutes of action were quiet, until Duke senior defender **Lauren Miller** scored in the 21st minute on a penalty corner to give Duke a 1-0 lead. Sophomore defender **Stefanie Fee** and freshman defender **Abby Hassinger** were credited with assists, while the goal was **Miller's** second since August 30.

The Blue Devils entered halftime with a 1-0 lead, but Virginia held the advantage in shots (11-5) and penalty corners (7-4) in the first half.

It did not take long for the Cavaliers to retaliate. Sophomore midfielder **Paige Selenski** scored her team-leading 22nd goal of the season to tied the game at 1-1 in the 40th minute of play on an assist from sophomore midfielder/defender **Michelle Vittese**.

Virginia increased its lead to 2-1 less than four minutes later when, in a role reversal from the previous goal, **Selenski** fed **Vittese** from the right side of the field for **Vittese's** sixth goal of the season on a two-versus-one break, for what proved to be the final score.

Junior goalkeeper **Kim Kastuk** logged all 70 minutes in goal for the Cavaliers, allowed one goal, and made three saves. For Duke, junior goalkeeper **Samantha Nelson** played the entire game between the pipes, allowed two goals, and notched eight saves.

Virginia out-shot the Blue Devils, 15-8, and held the overall advantage in penalty corners by a 7-5 margin.
