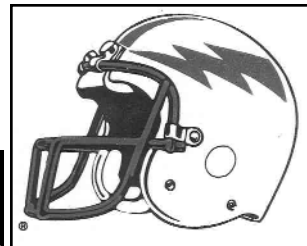

Game Facts

Television: The game will be televised by ESPN.

Radio: KVOR AM 740 in Colorado Springs, 1510 KCKK in Denver and 1570 KSXT in Northern Colorado. KVOR's Jim Arthur (play-by-play) and News First 5/30's Lee Douglas (color) call the action. They are joined for the pre- and post-game shows by Jay Ritchie. The game will also be broadcast nationally by ESPN radio. Clay Matvick (play-by-play), Larry Coker (color) and Sarah Kustok (sidelines) will call the action.

Streaks: **Air Force** has won three straight and six of it's last seven games. **California** has lost three straight and six of its last seven.

Rankings: Neither team is ranked. Air Force is receiving votes in all three polls.

Recently: **Air Force** defeated San Diego State, 55-23, in Falcon Stadium on Nov. 17 to close out the regular season. **California** lost at Stanford, 20-13, on Dec. 1.

Coaches: **Air Force** is coached by Troy Calhoun (Air Force, 1989), who is in his first season. Calhoun has led the Falcons to a 9-3 overall mark and has a 6-2 mark in conference games. **California** is coach by Jeff Tedford (Fresno State, 1983), who is in his sixth season. Tedford has led Cal to a 49-24 career record.

Let's go bowlin'

Air Force is 8-8-1 all-time in bowl games, dating back to the 1958 season. Air Force enters the game with a one-game bowl losing streak, falling to Virginia Tech, 20-13, in the 2002 San Francisco Bowl. The Falcons had won their previous two bowl games, beating Fresno State, 37-34, in the 2000 Silicon Valley Bowl and Washington, 45-25, in the 1998 O'ahu Bowl.

The series

Air Force and California will play for the eighth time overall and first in a bowl game. The Bears lead the overall series, 5-2, including a 56-14 victory in Falcon Stadium in 2004 in the last meeting. Air Force is 2-2 vs. Cal in California and 0-3 at home. The Falcons are 1-1 vs. Cal coach Jeff Tedford. The teams first played in 1961 in California. The Falcons won the game, 15-14. The Bears won the next four meetings. Air Force picked up it's second victory of the series in 2002 at Cal, beating the 23rd-ranked Bears, 23-21. The Bears' victory in Falcon Stadium two years later was as the 13th-ranked team in the nation and featured the first-career start for Air Force quarterback Shaun Carney, just a freshman at the time.

Last meeting vs. California -- 2004

Air Force was beaten, 56-14, by 13th-ranked California in Falcon Stadium in the season opener for both schools.

Cal running back J.J. Arrington rushed for 181 yards and three touchdowns to lead the Bears, who out-rushed Air Force, 342-182. Arrington opened the scoring with an 11-yard scoring run to give the Bears a 7-0 lead. The Falcons answered when freshman quarterback Shaun Carney hit Robert McMenomy with a 10-yard scoring strike to tie the game. The touchdown capped a 17-play, 77-yard drive that took 6:19 off the clock. The Falcons converted all five third-down conversions on the drive.

Arrington added his second TD of the quarter to give Cal a 14-7 lead. Quarterback Aaron Rodgers then added a one-yard run early in the second quarter to give Cal a 21-7 lead. The Falcons then posted another impressive drive, going 80 yards in eight plays to make it 21-14 at halftime with a Dan Shaffer two-yard run.

The biggest play of the game came on Cal's opening drive of the second half. Arrington dove over the pile from the one-yard line and fumbled into the endzone after being hit by John Rudzinski. Air Force recovered, but officials ruled that Arrington had crossed the goal line before the fumble, giving Cal a 28-14 lead. The Bears rolled from that point, holding Air Force to just 56 total yards in the second half. Cal finished the game with 573 total yards while holding the Falcons to just 271.

Marshawn Lynch added 92 yards rushing and Rodgers hit 11 of 16 passes for 208 yards. Air Force was led by Carney, who rushed for 75 yards on 18 carries. Hit also hit nine of 15 passes for 89 yards with a touchdown and interception.

Air Force vs. the Pac-10 Conference

Air Force is 27-31-2 all-time against teams from the Pac-10 conference. Air Force's most recent game vs. a team from the conference was in 2005 vs. Washington in Seattle at Seahawks Stadium. The Falcons won the game, 20-17. The Falcons are 1-2 vs. the Pac-10 in bowl games. The Falcons lost to Arizona State, 33-28, in the 1987 Freedom Bowl and to Oregon, 41-13, in the 1997 Las Vegas Bowl. The Falcons defeated Washington, 45-25, in the 1998 O'ahu Bowl.

Playing in Fort Worth

Air Force is 0-3 all-time playing in Fort Worth, Texas. The Falcons have lost all three games at Amon Carter Stadium to TCU. The Falcons lost 27-9 in 1989, 35-34 in 1998, which was AF's only loss of that season, and 38-14 in 2006 in the season finale.

Air Force has record-breaking season

Air Force finished the regular season with a 9-3 overall mark and a 6-2 mark in the Mountain West Conference for a second-place finish.

- Air Force posted a five-game turnaround from last season, when the team was 4-8, which is the second-best turnaround in school history and best since 1957-58 (six games)
- The team's nine wins are the most since 2000, when the team also went 9-3
- Air Force's 6-2 MWC mark is the best in school history and best conference mark overall since going 7-1 in the WAC in 1998
- Air Force posted just the third undefeated home record (6-0) in school history and the team's 3-3 road mark is the best since 2002

Going for No. 10

Air Force will be attempting to win its 10th game of the year during the bowl season. The team's nine wins already tie for sixth in a single-season in Air Force history and are the most since 2000. If Falcons record their 10th win it would tie as the third most in school history and mark just the sixth time in school history the Falcons have won 10 or more games. The 1998 and 1985 teams are tied for the top mark with 12 wins. The 1983, 1991 and 1997 teams all won 10 games.

Biggest turnarounds in 2007

Air Force has posted the nation's second-largest turnaround in 2007. The Falcons improved five games from last year's 4-8 mark to finish the regular season at 9-3. Air Force is tied with Kansas, Central Florida, UConn and Memphis with five-game turnarounds. Only Illinois, who has a seven-game improvement, ranked better.

One of America's top young coaches

Air Force head coach Troy Calhoun is one of America's top young coaches. In his first year at Air Force, the 1989 Academy graduate led the Falcons to the most wins ever by a first year head coach, along with the nine wins by Ben Martin in 1958. Calhoun led the team to six conference wins which is the most ever by a first-year head coach, breaking the mark of four set by Fisher DeBerry in 1984. Calhoun began his coaching career at the Academy, then after serving his military commitment, was an assistant at Ohio University, later becoming the offensive coordinator. He was the offensive coordinator at Wake Forest before joining the National Football League with the Denver Broncos from 2003-05. He was the offensive coordinator for the Houston Texans in 2006 before returning to his alma mater this season as the sixth head coach in school history.

Playing best when it matters most

The Falcons entered 2007 with a 12-24 record over the last six games of the season since 2001. The Falcons went 5-1 this season over the final six games which is the best mark since the 1998 team was 6-0. Coaches often say that you must play your best in October and November. Air Force has also done that this season, posting a 6-1 mark in the two months combined.

Record-setting win in South Bend

Air Force posted one of the biggest wins in service academy football history this season, defeating Notre Dame, 41-24, at Notre Dame Stadium in South Bend, Ind. The win is the largest by a service academy over Notre Dame in 44 years. Air Force's win at Notre Dame was its fourth in the last 25 years, matching USC. Only Michigan State (seven) and Boston College (five) have won more games at Notre Dame Stadium over the last 25 years.

Teammates Chad Hall and Shaun Carney among elite tandem's in MWC history

Air Force quarterback Shaun Carney (2,453 yards) and WR-Z Chad Hall (2,543 yards) are currently ranked eighth and fifth, respectively, on the MWC's all-time list for rushing yardage. Carney and Hall are the second quarterback/running back/wide receiver combo from one team to be listed among the league's all-time rushers, joining the Colorado State tandem of QB Brad Van Pelt (2001-03) and RB Cecil Sapp (1999-02).

Two of the nation's best anchor Falcon defense

Senior cornerback Carson Bird has six interceptions on the season, which ranks first in the conference and seventh in the nation. Bird has nine takeaways on the season, to go with three multi-takeaway games, intercepting a pass and recovering fumbles against South Carolina State and BYU and recording two interceptions against Colorado State. His six picks are tied for fourth all-time at the Academy and are the most interceptions since Brian Watkins had six in 1994. Bird has eight career interceptions, which ties him for 10th all-time at the Academy. He is currently tied for fifth all-time in conference interceptions. Bird is one pick shy of the MWC single-season record of seven picks, held by Utah's Eric Weddle (2006) and UNLV's Kevin Thomas (2001). Bird was awarded with first-team all-Mountain West Conference honors this season.

Senior outside linebacker John Rabold is establishing himself as one of the best defensive players in the Mountain West Conference. Rabold is second in the conference in tackles for loss with 16.5 for 66 yards. In addition, he is sixth in the conference with 5.5 quarterback sacks for 45 yards. He also leads the conference in fumbles recovered with an average of .33 per game. He recovered a fumble against Notre Dame and returned it 19 yards for his first-career touchdown. Rabold has had at least one tackle for loss in 10 straight and 11 of 12 games this season. Against Notre Dame, he led the team with nine tackles and matched his career-high with 2.5 tackles for loss, including a quarterback sack. Rabold was named first-team all-MWC in 2007.

Hall-American

Senior WR-Z Chad Hall is establishing himself as one of the best players in college football this season. The Atlanta, Ga., product has had a record-breaking senior season. He was named a third-team All-American by Rivals.com and was the Mountain West Conference's offensive player of the year. Some of this season's highlights include:

Record-setting quarterback Shaun Carney

As a four-year starter, senior quarterback Shaun Carney has put his name atop several Air Force passing records. Carney has broke the Air Force career passing yardage, passing touchdowns and total yardage records this season. Carney tossed a pair of touchdowns against Wyoming to break the school passing touchdowns record and now has 38 for his career. At Colorado State, Carney broke the school passing yardage record. Earlier in the season against Navy, Carney had 300 yards of total offense to set the school record for total offense. Carney has passed for 5,323 yards and has 7,776 yards of total offense. Carney is also tops at Air Force in completion percentage 61.9 and passing efficiency 146.50. Carney has been outstanding over his last seven games. He has hit 74 of 112 passes, a 66.1 completion percentage. He has thrown for 897 yards and six touchdowns with just two interceptions.

Harrison putting up solid special teams numbers

Junior Ryan Harrison has done a solid job for Air Force handling all kicking chores in 2007. Harrison has 16 field goals on the season, which is tied for fourth for a single season in Air Force history. Harrison is tied with Joey Ashcroft, who kicked 16 in 2002, and Jim Sturch, who had 16 in 1978. Harrison has scored 89 points which is the most by a Falcon kicker since Ashcroft's 95 points in 2002. Harrison is one of two kickers in school history (Dave Lawson, 1975) to hit three 50-yard field goals in a season. He has three of the 10 longest field goals in NCAA Div. I this season and his 57-yard field goal vs. TCU is tied for the longest in NCAA Div. I this season. Harrison also maintains a 43.0 average as a punter and has eight punts downed inside the 20. Harrison has shown off his booming leg on kickoffs as well, leading the conference with 26 touchbacks. The next closest teams are Utah and Colorado State with 13 each.

An Old School Look

In addition to the Lightning Bolts on each side, the Falcons have had the stripes on the helmet from 1980 to 2006. Air Force originally had just the Lightning Bolts on the helmet for the first 25 years from the program's inception in 1955. There is also a slight alteration to the Lightning Bolts as the silver lining of the blue bolts has been replaced by an all-blue bolt.

All-time record

Air Force has an all-time record of 311-263-13 in its 52nd season. The program is 168-109-3 at home and 143-154-10 in away/neutral site games.

101st Blocked Kick

Junior Ryan Kemp blocked Navy kicker Joey Bullen's field goal attempt in the fourth quarter, giving Air Force its 101st blocked kick since 1990. The 101 blocks ranks second nationally since 1990, trailing only Virginia Tech. Air Force got the 100th blocked kick against TCU, when Chris Thomas blocked Chris Manfredini's 20-yard attempt in the third quarter.

All-conference honors for Air Force

Air Force took home two of the top three individual honors in the Mountain West Conference in 2007, as head coach Troy Calhoun was named MWC coach of the year and senior WR/RB Chad Hall was named offensive player of the year. Calhoun is the first Air Force coach to win the award in his first season and just the second to ever win it, joining Fisher DeBerry, who won the award in 1985, 1995 and 1998. Hall is the sixth player to win the conference's offensive player of the year award and first non-quarterback. Air Force producing leaders on and off the field

The Air Force football team was one of three Mountain West Conference athletic teams to earn a Public Recognition Award from the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) for earning high scores in the latest Academic Progress Rate (APR) compilation.

The award is provided to those teams that have an NCAA Division I Academic Progress Rate in the top 10 percent of all squads in their respective sport.

According to APR information submitted for the 2003-04, 2004-05 and 2005-06 academic years, the New Mexico women's tennis program earned a perfect 1,000 multiyear APR to capture the Public Recognition Award. The Lobos are coached by Kathy Kolankiewicz.

Led by Dave Rose, BYU men's basketball notched 994 APR points out of a possible 1,000. With 994, the Cougar hoopsters lead all BYU athletic teams in APR.

Air Force football, which is currently under the helm of Troy Calhoun, earned a multiyear APR of 975, 20 points above football programs at private institutions, and more than 40 points above all programs in the Football Bowl Subdivision.

Falcons honoring Air Force units with patches on uniforms in 2007

The Air Force football team is honoring several different units throughout the Air Force by wearing their official patches on its uniforms in 2007. The team will honor 10 of the Air Force's Heritage Wings and Groups by wearing patches on their home uniforms; and six USAF Air and Space Expeditionary Wings by wearing patches on their away uniforms.

The Heritage Wings and Groups date back to the foundations of the Air Force, beginning on Aug. 1, 1907, when the U.S. Army Signal Corps established a small Aeronautical Division to take "charge of all matters pertaining to military ballooning, air machines and all kindred subjects." But, it was not until May 26, 1909, that military aviation was born, when Lts. Frank P. Lahm and Benjamin D. Foulois made their first ascent and qualified as the airship's first Army pilots. The National Security Act of 1947 created a separate Department of the Air Force, headed by a Secretary of the Air Force; from that law, today's Air Force was officially born on Sept. 18, 1947.

The 10 patches represent active duty units that have colorful and distinguished histories. These "heritage units" not only represent the legacy of the Air Force past, but also the promise of its future. Each Air Force mission and capability is represented with this cross-section of units.

The Air and Space Expeditionary Force concept is the Air Force's vision for the 21st century to organize, train, equip and deploy forces for contingency operations while remaining ready to meet national crises. AEF also helps create a mindset and culture that embraces the unique characteristics of air and space power - range, speed, flexibility and precision. A typical AEF consists of a full spectrum of air and space capabilities and is balanced, flexible and sustainable. It is also tailored to meet combatant commander requirements. Head Coach Troy Calhoun

Sometimes people seem born for a particular job or situation. That has never been the case more than Troy Calhoun being the head football coach at the Air Force Academy. The coach ushers in a new era of Falcon football this season as Calhoun replaces the legendary Fisher DeBerry, who retired last season after 23 years as head coach.

Calhoun, a 1989 Academy graduate, is the sixth head coach in school history and first graduate to hold the position. He brings with him an impressive resume at the collegiate and professional levels that is flooded with success at every stop.

Calhoun is fresh off completing his first season with the Houston Texans as offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach. The 2006 Texans were one of only two NFL teams to triple their number of wins from the previous year.

They also were the last team to defeat the Indianapolis Colts on their way to the Super Bowl championship. On offense, the Texans had the NFL's leading receiver (Pro Bowler Andre Johnson with 103 catches), the NFL's best quarterback completion percentage (68.4 percent) and quarterback David Carr tied an NFL record against Buffalo with 22 straight completions.

Calhoun became a well-rounded NFL coach, working as a defensive assistant, special teams assistant and offensive assistant with the Denver Broncos from 2003-05. He began his NFL coaching career by serving as the defensive assistant under defensive coordinator Larry Coyer in 2003. He was a part of the NFL's fourth-ranked defense. The Broncos' defense ranked seventh against the run and sixth against the pass. Denver's defense yielded a mere 17.6 points per game as they made the playoffs for the first time since 2000.

In 2004, Denver utilized Calhoun's offensive prowess moving him to offensive assistant/special teams. On the offensive side of the ball, the Broncos ranked fifth in the NFL, averaging 395.8 yards per game. Broncos' quarterback Jake Plummer set a team record for passing with 4,089 yards and tied a team record with 27 touchdown passes. Coupled with an outstanding passing attack, the Broncos finished fourth in the NFL in rushing. The offense's ability to combine the run and the pass led to Denver ranking second in the NFL in time of possession with 32:37 per game. The Broncos' special teams connected on 29 field goals, second best in the NFL.

Calhoun worked closely with Broncos head coach Mike Shanahan in the 2005 season, serving as the assistant to the head coach. He helped the Broncos win the AFC West title for the 10th time in their history. Denver reached the AFC Championship game for the first time in seven seasons. Their 14-4 record was the best since Denver finished the 1998 season with a 17-2 mark on their way to winning Super Bowl XXXIII. The offense finished fifth in the NFL averaging 360.4 yards per game. The defense was stout against the run, finishing second in the NFL with 85.2 yards per game. Denver finished with an undefeated record at home during the regular season for the fifth time in team history. During Calhoun's three years in Denver, the Broncos made the playoffs every season, averaging over 11 wins per season.

Prior to the NFL, Calhoun was an offensive coordinator for six seasons on the collegiate level. He began his coaching career at Air Force, where he worked as a graduate assistant from 1989-90. He started at quarterback for the Academy in 1986 and was one of only two freshmen to letter for the 1985 team that finished fifth in the final polls with a 12-1 record that included wins over national powers Notre Dame and Texas.

Calhoun served his country from 1989-95 as an active duty officer in the Air Force. He was the Falcons' recruiting coordinator and the junior varsity offensive coordinator in 1993-94.

He moved to Ohio University in 1995 where he served as the quarterbacks coach for two seasons. Calhoun guided the play of quarterback Kareem Wilson. In 1996, Wilson was named the Mid-American Conference Player of the Year. Wilson set a pair of Ohio records with 282 rushing yards and four rushing touchdowns against Bowling Green. He set an Ohio record with 14 rushing touchdowns in 1996.

Calhoun was promoted to offensive coordinator in 1997. During his first season at the helm, the offense totaled 612 yards against Eastern Michigan, second most in school history. The Bobcats defeated Maryland in 1997, marking the school's first win against a team from the ACC in school history. The '97 Bobcats' 8-3 record was the school's best in 29 years.

During his last season in 2000 at Ohio, the Bobcats won two games against bowl teams, Minnesota and Marshall, for the first time in school history. Calhoun's 2000 offense set a school record with 418.1 yards per game and rushed for a school best 3,553 rushing yards.

Calhoun moved to Wake Forest in 2001. The Demon Deacons were one of only seven teams in the country to score more than 30 points in each of the final four games. During his second season, Wake led the ACC in total offense with 408.1 yards per game. His offense had a league-best 990 plays and was efficient with the ball, committing only 16 turnovers to lead the ACC. The 2001 season culminated with a 38-17 bowl victory over Oregon to give Wake Forest its first back-to-back winning seasons since the ACC expanded from eight teams.

Groomed on the basics of integrity and passion, Calhoun is a native of Roseburg, Ore., and was raised in a home where both kids graduated from the Air Force Academy and were varsity letterwinners on nationally-ranked teams. Calhoun finished at the Academy on the superintendent's list and graduated with over a 3.0 grade point average and a military performance average of better than 3.0. He and his wife, Amanda, live in Colorado Springs and have two children, Tyler (five) and Amelia (three).

Brian Knorr



**Assistant Head Coach /
ILBs**

Brian Knorr is in his sixth season overall at Air Force and second since returning to the Academy in 2005. He returns back to coaching inside linebackers this year after coaching the Falcons and studs the

past two years. In addition to his linebacker coaching duties he will also work with the kicking team specialists. This season marks his first as the assistant head coach and inside linebackers coach.

In 2005, he was nominated by the Academy Football program as their nominee for the NCAA Assistant Coach of the Year.

Knorr is a 1986 graduate of the Academy where he earned his bachelor's degree in management. He lettered three years for Air Force as a quarterback during one of the most successful times in Academy history. Air Force won 30 games during his three years as a letterman, the best three-year run in school history.

Following graduation, Knorr served in the Air Force at Wright-Patterson AFB in Dayton, Ohio, before returning to the Academy as a captain in 1992. While at Wright-Patterson, Knorr earned his master's in business administration from Dayton in 1991. Knorr was the assistant offensive line coach, junior varsity head coach and administrative assistant to the head coach while at the Academy.

Knorr left the Academy in 1995 to become the inside linebacker coach at Ohio for former Falcon assistant Jim Grobe. He was elevated to defensive coordinator in 1999 and led the Bobcats' resurgence on the defensive front. Ohio ranked in the top five in the Mid-American Conference in scoring, rushing and total defense every year during his tenure. His 2000 unit was one of only five in the nation to hold opponents to less than 30 points in every contest. During this time he coached five different players that made first-team all-conference.

In 2000, Knorr was tabbed to replace long-time friend and mentor Jim Grobe as head coach at Ohio University. This hiring marked the first Air Force Academy graduate to be named a head coach at the Division I level. During his tenure as head coach, he coordinated the special teams to include a punt team that led the NCAA in punting in 2001. His tutee, Dave Zastudil, was an All-American punter and current standout for the Cleveland Browns. He also coached seven players that went on to play in the National Football League. During his four years as head coach, Ohio had an 11-35 record, including a 4-7 mark with a win at Southeastern Conference foe Kentucky in 2004.

Affectionately know as "Sunny" when he was at the Academy because of his great personality, Knorr was born on Dec. 20, 1963 and is a native of Shawnee Mission, Kan. He and his wife Julie, a native of Fort Wayne, Indiana, have a daughter Katie (11) and twins Reagan (8) and Brett (8).

Tim DeRuyter



**Defensive Coordinator /
Safeties**

Tim DeRuyter is in his fifth season overall at Air Force and first since returning to the Academy following the 2006 season. This season is his first as the defensive coordi-

nator/safeties coach.

A 1985 USAFA graduate, DeRuyter comes to the Falcons after two seasons as Nevada's co-defensive coordinator. He worked with the Wolf Pack safeties and directed the pass defense along with coach Barry Sacks.

Prior to his stint at Nevada, DeRuyter spent three years at Ohio University, serving as defensive coordinator and secondary coach. He helped produce the 25th-ranked defense in the NCAA and the No. 2 defense in the Mid-American Conference in 2004. Prior to his stint in Athens, Ohio, he worked for three years at Navy. He also worked at Air Force for four years as a full-time military coach and served one year as a graduate assistant. He also worked at Ohio University from 1995-98 as defensive coordinator.

All told, DeRuyter has 16 years of coaching experience, all at the NCAA Division I-A level, and has coached in five bowl games. He has experience with both 4-3 and 3-4 defensive schemes and in pressure, attack-style philosophies. DeRuyter's defenses have traditionally been ranked among the national leaders during his 16-year coaching career at three different I-A schools.

A three-year letterman for the Falcons, DeRuyter earned a bachelor's degree in management and received an M.B.A. in market strategy from Regis University in Denver in 1992. As an outside linebacker, he helped the Falcons to three bowl game victories during his playing career. DeRuyter attended St. John Bosco High School in Bellflower, Calif., where he graduated in 1981.

Born Jan. 3, 1963, the 44-year-old DeRuyter and his wife, Kara, have a son, Jake, and a daughter, Christina.

Clay Hendrix



**Co-Offensive
Coordinator / OL**

Clay Hendrix is in his first season at the Academy as the offensive line coach.

Hendrix comes to Air Force after completing 19 seasons at NCAA I-AA Furman as

the offensive line coach, including the last five as assistant head coach. Since joining the staff in 1988, he played a central role in Furman's success as his offensive lines helped the Paladins post a 147-73-1 record, win six Southern Conference titles and claim the 1988 NCAA I-AA national crown.

The success Furman enjoyed over the last seven years, including a combined 65-24 record and three league titles, has been due in large measure to the work of Hendrix-directed fronts.

A product of Commerce, Ga., he starred as an offensive guard as a prep, helping Commerce to a 13-1-1 record and the 1981 AA state championship. A 1986 Furman graduate, he was a three-year starter from 1982-85 when Furman rolled up a 39-10-1 record. He also played on three league title teams and four nationally-ranked squads, including the 1985 national runner-up team. Furman also recorded impressive wins over South Carolina (1982), Georgia Tech (1983), and N.C. State (1984 & '85) during his tenure. He was named all-state in 1985.

Following graduation, he joined Dick Sheridan's coaching staff at North Carolina State as a graduate assistant before returning to Furman in 1988.

He and his wife, the former LeeAnn Hedgpeth of Taylors, S.C., have two sons, Clayton Callaway, and William McDaniel.

Ron Burton



Defensive Line

Ron Burton is in his fifth season as defensive line coach at the Academy.

During his first four seasons, Burton developed Monty Coleman and Gilberto Perez into honorable mention all-

conference performers. He also coached two-year starter Ryan Carter, an Academic All-American in 2003 and 2004. In 2006, Burton pieced together a solid defensive front, despite numerous injuries.

Prior to coming to the Academy, Burton was the defensive line coach at Grand Valley State and helped the school to the NCAA Division II national championship in 2002, the first in school history. GVSU was a perfect 14-0 in Burton's first season at the school. Prior to his stint at GVSU, Burton was the linebackers coach at Indiana for five seasons (1997-01) where he was responsible for the development of two Butkus Award nominees, Justin Smith and Jabar Robinson.

Burton was a four-year letterman at the University of North Carolina (1982-86), where he made three bowl appearances and was named team captain and best defensive lineman as a senior. His eight sacks during the 1986 season presently ties him for seventh on UNC's single-season sack list. He graduated in 1987 with a degree in industrial relations.

Moving on to the next level, Burton spent four seasons playing linebacker in the NFL with the Dallas Cowboys (1987-89), Phoenix Cardinals (1989) and the Los Angeles Raiders (1990). He started 15 games in 1988 at outside linebacker for the Cowboys. While playing for Los Angeles, Burton was on the team that played in the 1990 AFC Championship Game.

After spending two seasons as a graduate assistant for North Carolina, Burton took his first full-time assistant coaching position at Morehead State in 1994. He worked with the defensive backs for one season and then went to Eastern Michigan where he served two seasons as the linebackers coach.

Burton was an all-state, all-district and all-region selection as an outside linebacker at Highland Springs High School (Va.). He was also named the prep player of the year in 1982.

A native of Highland Springs, Va., Burton and his wife, Andrea, have four children, Ronald, Ryan, Roya and Reid.

Lt. Col. Steve Senn



JV Head Coach

Lt. Col. Steve Senn is in his third season at the Academy, and fourth overall, as the junior varsity head coach and varsity assistant coach.

Senn is a 1990 graduate of the Academy where he earned his bachelor's degree in social sciences. While at the Academy, Senn lettered three years in football as a wide receiver and helped the Falcons to a pair of bowl games. He holds the school record for receiving yards in a bowl game with 150 set in the 1989 Liberty Bowl. He is also the record holder for touchdown catches in a bowl game with two, which he did in both the 1987 Freedom Bowl and 1989 Liberty Bowl.

Following graduation, Senn served for one year as an assistant coach with the football team before going to undergraduate pilot training at Reese AFB, Texas. He was then assigned to Dover AFB, Del., where he was a C-5 aircraft commander from 1993-96. Senn was then a C-27A evaluator pilot at Howard AFB in Panama from 1996-99. He returned to the C-5 as an evaluator pilot while stationed at Travis AFB, Calif., from 1999-2002. Prior to returning to the Academy, he was a C-20H instructor pilot at Ramstein AB, Germany, from 2002-05.

Senn attended Cibola High School in Albuquerque, N.M., where he graduated in 1985 and was a first-team all-state quarterback and free safety. Senn and his wife, Sophie, who is a lieutenant colonel in the Air Force and is the chief of the Spanish division in the foreign language department at the Academy, have two children, Arran and Eric.

Capt. Charlton Warren



Cornerbacks

Capt. Charlton Warren is in his third season overall, first as the cornerbacks coach and second as recruiting coordinator at the Academy. Warren was the junior varsity defensive coordinator prior to this season.

Warren is a 1999 graduate of the Academy where he earned his bachelor's degree in human factors engineering. He was also a three-year football letterman as a defensive back. Warren won the team's Mr. Intensity Award as a senior and helped the program to two consecutive 10-win seasons for the first time in school history in 1997-98.

Warren began his military career at the Academy in the admissions office as the Southeast U.S. admissions coordinator for the minority enrollment office from 1999-2000. He then went to Warner Robins AFB, Ga., from 2000-03 where he was the C-130 avionics program manager for the Air Logistics Center. While stationed there, Warren earned an MBA from Georgia College and State University. He was also recognized as the company grade officer of the quarter in 2002.

Before returning to the Academy in 2005, Warren was stationed at Eglin AFB, Fla., from 2003-05 as the MK-82 joint direct munitions program manager for the Air Armament Center. He also worked as the anti-spoof/anti-jam program manager while at Eglin. Warren was honored as part of the weapons program team of the quarter in 2003 and the direct attack group company grade officer of the quarter in 2004.

Jemal Singleton



Running Game Coordinator / RBs

Jemal Singleton enters his fifth season overall and second as running backs coach at the Academy. In his first season as the running backs coach in 2006, he mentored Chad Hall into one of the most

explosive running backs in the MWC. Hall was a second-team all-league selection and became the first AFA halfback since 1989 to lead the team in rushing. Hall was fourth in the league in rushing yards per game.

One of Singleton's greatest accomplishments in 2006 was the dramatic decrease in the number of fumbles. In 2005, the Falcons had 28 fumbles. However, in Singleton's first season in 2006, the Falcons had just 19 fumbles, an average of nearly one less fumble per game.

Singleton is a 1999 graduate of the Academy where he earned his bachelor's degree in social sciences. While at the Academy, Singleton helped lead the school to new heights. The team won 10 or more games in back-to-back seasons for the first time in school history during his junior and senior years. The 1997 team was 10-3 while the 1998 squad was 12-1 and won the school's first outright conference title. Singleton, a co-captain of the '98 squad, was a three-year letterwinner in football at halfback and was an honorable mention all-Western Athletic Conference selection his senior year.

Singleton began his Air Force and coaching career at the USAFA Prep School in 2000. He served as an instructor and assistant head coach/offensive coordinator. He was then stationed at Little Rock AFB in Jacksonville, Ark., from January 2001 to January 2003 as a public affairs officer. He returned to the Academy in the spring of 2003 and served as the executive officer for the athletic director before taking over as the junior varsity defensive coordinator and varsity assistant coach.

The son of a retired Air Force sergeant, Singleton was born in Incirlik, Turkey. He graduated from Taft High School in San Antonio, Texas, where he was a three-year letterman and all-state honoree. He was also the district most valuable player as a senior.

Singleton and his wife, Jennifer, have one daughter, Morgan.

Blane Morgan



Co-Offensive Coordinator / QBs

Blane Morgan is in his sixth season overall and first as quarterbacks coach at the Academy. Morgan was wide receivers coach for two years and a junior varsity assistant

before that prior to this season.

Morgan is a 1999 graduate of the Academy, where he became the winningest starting quarterback in school history. Morgan led the Falcons to a 12-1 season in 1998 as a senior while earning Western Athletic Conference offensive player of the year honors. Morgan also led the Falcons to a 10-3 mark as a junior and finished his career with a 20-3 overall record as a starter. He is only the second quarterback in school history to win his first seven starts.

Morgan's accomplishments as a player at the Academy put him in rare company. He was undefeated as a starter against Air Force's sister academies, going 3-0. He remains the only starting QB in school history to lead the Falcons to an outright conference title. He also posted a 1-1 mark in bowl games, helping the Falcons to the 1998 Oahu Bowl win over Washington.

Morgan came to the Academy from Laughlin AFB, Texas, where he was stationed from July 2000 to February 2003. Prior to that, Morgan was a graduate assistant with the football team during the 1999 season.

Originally from Dallas, Texas, Morgan was a three-year football letterwinner at Trinity Christian Academy in Addison, Texas, where he played for his father, Barry. He was a two-time all-state selection at safety and was team captain his senior year.

Football has been a family affair for the Morgans, as Blane's older brother, Beau, also played football at Trinity Christian Academy and at Air Force. Blane followed Beau as the starting quarterback at both schools.

Morgan and his wife, Mandy, live in Colorado Springs.

Ben Miller



Tight Ends

Ben Miller is in his first season as an assistant coach at the Academy. Miller will serve as tight ends coach.

A 2002 Academy graduate, Miller spent the 2006 season as the offensive graduate assistant at the University of Illinois.

Miller was an all-conference offensive lineman for the Falcons, starting at left tackle as a junior and senior. He played under Illinois offensive coordinator Ed Warinner while at Air Force. After completing his collegiate career, Miller signed a contract with the Cleveland Browns, where he was used as a fullback/tight end/long snapper. In the fall of 2005, he joined the practice squad for the Philadelphia Eagles.

In his NFL off-season, Miller returned to Colorado to assist the Air Force Academy as a graduate assistant coach, helping with scouting reports and recruiting. He spent one year as program manager for ManTech at Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio. Miller graduated from the Air Force Academy with a bachelor's degree in management and still serves in the USAF Reserves.

Matt Weikert



Outside Linebackers

Matt Weikert is in his first year as outside linebackers coach at Air Force.

Weikert served as Wake Forest's operations and video assistant last season in his second stint at the school. He spent the 2005 season as the outside linebackers coach at Tennessee-Chatanooga. Prior to his work at UTC, Weikert worked at Wake Forest for two years as a graduate assistant. The first year he was the defensive graduate assistant, working primarily with defensive coordinator Dean Hood and linebackers coach Brad Lambert. He was also heavily involved with the scout offense in preparing the defensive unit each week, as well as weekly opponent game planning. The second year, he was the offensive graduate assistant, working closely with offensive coordinator Steed Lobotzke and tight end/fullback coach Tom Elrod. He instructed the defensive scout team and was involved in film breakdown and preparation for the upcoming opponent.

Weikert originally joined the Wake Forest staff in August 2002 as a recruiting intern under recruiting coordinator Ray McCartney. A 2002 graduate of Ohio University, Weikert received a bachelor's degree in communications.

While at Ohio, Weikert was a member of the football team for five years, playing four seasons under head coach Jim Grobe. As a senior, Weikert played for current Air Force assistant coach Brian Knorr, who was the head coach at Ohio in 2001. He earned second-team All-Mid-American Conference honors in 2000 after leading the Bobcats in tackles for loss (16) and sacks (6). Weikert had two interceptions and broke up four passes. His 16 tackles for loss ranked third in the conference.

Weikert is a native of Covington, Ohio, where he attended Covington High School. While enrolled at Covington, he was a member of the National Honor Society and was a member of the football, basketball and baseball teams.

Patrick Covington



Offensive Assistant

Patrick Covington enters his first year with the Falcon football coaching staff. Covington will be an assistant coach working with the Falcon offense.

Covington comes to the Academy from Coastal Carolina University, where he was an assistant strength and conditioning coach for the 2006 season. At Coastal Carolina, Covington was part of a coaching staff that led the Chanticleers to the Big South Conference championship with a 9-3 record.

Covington is a 2006 graduate of Furman University. He was a three-year starter and four-year letter winner for the Paladins from 2002-05. A two-time All-Southern Conference selection, he was rated as the No. 6 guard in NCAA I-AA football by The Sports Network. He was a Sports Network First-Team All-American and an Associated Press Second-Team All-American in 2005. That same season, the Furman offense averaged a school-record 469.9 yards of total offense per game. The Paladins ranked third in the nation in rushing and reached the semifinals of the 2005 NCAA I-AA Playoffs.

Covington was also a team captain his senior year and was a 2006 National Strength and Conditioning All-American. Covington is a native of Charlotte, N.C. He attended Myers Park High School in Charlotte where he was a three-year starter and served as a team captain.

Mike Thiessen



Wide Receivers

Mike Thiessen is in his first season as the wide receivers coach at Air Force.

A two-sport star during his collegiate career, Thiessen was an All-American baseball player as a centerfielder in the spring of 2000 and was the Mountain West Conference offensive player of the year in the fall of 2000. A two-year starter at quarterback, Thiessen led the team in rushing and was among the conference leaders in rushing yards and touchdowns in 2000.

He capped off his career by earning offensive most valuable player honors while leading Air Force to a 37-34 win over Fresno State in the Silicon Valley Classic. Thiessen finished the game with 99 yards rushing and 204 yards passing.

Thiessen was a team captain as a senior while rushing for 713 yards and 10 touchdowns and passing for 1,687 yards and 13 scores in 2000. On the diamond, he holds 10 Academy records (six career and four single season), including a school-record 33-game hitting streak.

After graduation in 2001, Thiessen was a 42nd round draft pick of the Arizona Diamondbacks in 2001. He played in 27 games with the Yakima Bears

"A" team and led the squad with a .308 batting average. His first military assignment was at Luke Air Force Base, Ariz., working in the fighter squadron.

He entered the World Class Athlete program and played with the Lancaster Jethawks, an advanced A affiliate of the Diamondbacks in 2003. He hit .278 with five homers and 42 runs scored in 85 games. Following that season, he returned to Luke and worked in personnel.

After three years at Luke AFB, Thiessen returned to the Academy to teach and coach at the Prep School. He served as an instructor in algebra, calculus and chemistry and was the offensive coordinator for the football team for three seasons before joining the Academy varsity staff this season.

Matt McGettigan



Strength / Conditioning

Matt McGettigan is in his first season as the strength and conditioning coach for the Falcon football team.

The work of McGettigan received the ultimate affirmation of excellence when he earned recognition as the 2001 National Collegiate Strength and Conditioning Coach of the Year by the Professional Football Strength and Conditioning Coaches Society. The award underscored the respect McGettigan has from his peers.

McGettigan joined the Iowa State staff in 1996 with coach Dan McCarney. He spent 11 years with the Cyclones before coming to Air Force in the summer of 2007.

Prior to his stint in Ames, he was an assistant strength and conditioning coach at Notre Dame from 1991-95. Before his work with the Fighting Irish, McGettigan served as the strength and conditioning coordinator for Wisconsin-Platteville from 1987-90.

McGettigan completed his undergraduate work in physical education at Luther College in Decorah, Iowa, in 1987, where he was a member of the football team. He is a member of the National Strength and Conditioning Association. In January 1989, McGettigan received his certification as a strength and conditioning specialist. He earned his master's degree in 1989 from Wisconsin-Platteville.

1 Air Force 34, South Carolina State 3 Sept 1, Falcon Stadium, USAFA

AP Article - So much for the question of whether Air Force could successfully implement its new offense.

Shaun Carney passed for 176 yards and a touchdown, and Kip McCarthy ran for 129 yards to lead Air Force past South Carolina State 34-3 Saturday.

New coach Troy Calhoun brought with him a book of new plays for the Falcons' attack, and many of them worked against the Bulldogs. At one point, Air Force (1-0) lined up with five wide receivers and only Carney in the backfield. The next play, three running backs lined up directly behind the Falcons' quarterback.

It all seemed to confuse the Bulldogs (0-1), who play in the Football Championship Subdivision, formerly Division I-AA. South Carolina State forced Air Force to punt only once with its first-team offense on the field.

All four of the Air Force touchdowns were scored on drives 70 yards or more. The senior quarterback Carney led the Falcons 79 yards on 13 plays for a touchdown on the team's first drive, going 3-for-4 for 49 yards. McCarthy capped the drive with a 1-yard touchdown run, the first of his career.

Tight end Travis Dekker, who had only four receptions and no touchdowns last year, was Carney's primary target in the first half. The senior had three catches for 64 yards and a touchdown.

Calhoun dialed back the passing attempts in the second half with a big lead, but he felt the Falcons did exactly what he wanted them to do offensively.

Chad Hall, the Falcons' leading rusher last season who was moved to wide receiver in the spring, took a reverse for an 8-yard touchdown in the second quarter.

South Carolina State led the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference in rushing last year, but was held to just 70 yards on 34 carries. Air Force pressured quarterback Cleveland McCoy all afternoon, collecting six sacks and forcing two turnovers. Cornerback Carson Bird was in on both with a fumble recovery and an interception.

The Bulldogs' brightest spot of the afternoon was the kicking game. Punter Aaron Haire had a 61-yard punt, and kicker Stephen Grantham tied a school-record with a 51-yard field goal.

Air Force snapped a four-game losing streak dating back to last year.

Team Notes

- Air Force played its first game without stripes on its helmet since 1979. The Academy added stripes to the helmet in 1980 and they remained until this season.
- Air Force recorded six sacks vs. SCSU. The team's single-game best last year was five vs. New Mexico. Players with sacks included: Jake Paulson with 1.5, John Rabold, Stephen Larson one (first of his career), Josh Clayton one and Hunter Altman, Chris Thomas and Ryan Kemp with a half sack each.
- Air Force's three touchdown drives in the first half all had at least 10 plays and took at least four minutes in length.
- Air Force snapped a four-game losing streak dating back to last season.
- Air Force won its first-ever game against a team from the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference (MEAC).
- Air Force improved to 12-0 all-time against teams in the Football Championship Subdivision (formerly known as Division I-AA)
- Air Force improved to 31-19-2 all-time in season openers. The Falcons have won 11 consecutive home openers dating back to 1994 vs. Colorado State.
- Air Force's 31-point victory margin is its largest since defeated Army, 43-7, last season. The margin is the largest on opening day since beating Wofford, 49-0, in 2003.

- Air Force head coach Troy Calhoun won his first game as a collegiate head coach. Calhoun, who is the sixth head coach in Academy history, is the fifth coach to win his opening game as Air Force head coach.
- Junior TE Keith Madsen made the first catch of his career on the team's first offensive drive of the game.
- Senior TB Kip McCarthy recorded career highs in every rushing category. McCarthy set a new career high with six carries on Air Force's opening drive of the game which he capped with his first-career touchdown on a one-yard run. He finished the game with 22 carries for 129 yards rushing to record his first-career 100-yard game. His previous career highs were four carries and 17 yards which were both set vs. Colorado State last season. McCarthy also recorded a career-long run of 50 yards. His previous long was 12 yards vs. TCU in 2005. McCarthy is the first Falcon with a 100-yard rushing game since Chad Hall vs. Colorado State last season.
- Junior PK/P Ryan Harrison scored the first points of his career in his first-career start with an extra point on Air Force's opening drive. Harrison also punted twice for a 48-yard average in his first-career game as a punter.
- Junior DE Jake Paulson recorded his career high with 2.0 tackles for loss. Paulson's previous best was 1.5 vs. Wyoming in 2006.
- Senior OLB John Rabold recorded a career-best 2.0 tackles for loss.

AP Article - Shaun Carney ran for 113 yards and Air Force stopped Utah twice at the 1-yard line in the final 1:25 in a 20-12 win Sept. 8, the Falcons' first over the Utes in five years.

Jim Ollis and Savier Stevens both ran for touchdowns and the Air Force defense kept Utah from rallying in the fourth quarter.

On third-and-goal from the 1, the Falcons stopped Eddie Wide on a direct snap with 1:09 left. The Utes had one more chance, but Drew Fowler stood up Darryl Poston a couple feet short of the goal line to end Utah's scoring threat.

Air Force (2-0, 1-0 Mountain West) was able to run out the clock and end a four-game losing streak to the Utes (0-2, 0-1).

Utah's Tommy Grady passed for 240 yards and a touchdown in his first college start, but he also threw two interceptions -- including one early in the fourth quarter as Air Force took control.

Air Force went for it on fourth-and-1 from the Utah 47 and lost a yard, but Chris Thomas got the ball right back for the Falcons on the next play when he made a diving interception on a pass by Grady.

On first down, Carney kept the ball on an option and broke it for a 53-yard run. Ollis scored two plays later on a 3-yard run to give the Falcons a 17-6 lead with 12:52 left in the game.

Grady gave Utah its first touchdown on a 34-yard pass to Derrek Richards with 6:24 left in the game to get the Utes within 17-12. Utah went for the 2-point conversion, but Thomas broke through the line and tackled Grady in the backfield.

Grady took the Utes down the field again late in the quarter and Utah could have tied it with a touchdown and a conversion, but Air Force came up with the two stops at the goal line.

Team Notes

- Air Force went seven quarters to open the season without allowing a touchdown. The seven quarter streak is the longest since the 1997 team went eight quarters. The 1997 team held back-to-back opponents Army and Wyoming without touchdowns.
- Air Force improved to 2-0 overall for the first time since 2005.
- Air Force improved to 8-1 in MWC openers. The Falcons have won eight straight conference openers dating back to a 10-7 loss at home to Wyoming in 1999. Air Force improved to 3-0 in MWC openers on the road.

- Senior QB Shaun Carney became the seventh player in Air Force history to surpass the 2,000-yard mark for his career. Carney ranks seventh in Air Force history with 2,087 career rushing yards. He rushed for 113 yards in the game to record the fourth 100-plus yard game of his career. Carney also recorded a 53-yard run in the fourth quarter, his second-longest run ever. His career best is 61 yards vs. New Mexico in 2005.
- Senior FB Ryan Williams recorded his season-long run of 22 yards. His previous long was eight yards in the opener vs. South Carolina State. Williams' career-long run is 43 yards set in 2006 vs. UNLV. Williams also recorded a season-best in rushing yards with 62. He rushed for 21 yards on six carries in the season opener.

3 Air Force 20, TCU 17 - OT Sept 13, Falcon Stadium, USAFA

AP Article - Ryan Harrison's 33-yard field goal on second down gave Air Force a 20-17 overtime victory over TCU on Thursday night, Sept 13.

The Falcons, who overcame a 14-point fourth-quarter deficit, were swarmed on the field by thousands of cadets who hadn't had this much to celebrate in a long time.

Harrison's winner followed a miss by TCU kicker Chris Manfredini, whose 36-yard attempt hit the left upright on the first possession of overtime.

The Falcons had tied it on Jim Ollis' 71-yard TD run on an option pitch from Shaun Carney with 5:55 left. The Frogs were well within Manfredini's range with the wind at his back going toward the south end zone in the final minute of regulation when they went for the touchdown instead on first-and-10 from the 22 only to see cornerback Carson Bird snare Andy Dalton's underthrown pass to Jimmy Young in the end zone.

Twice in the third quarter, the Horned Frogs were turned away near the goal line, on a blocked field goal and an interception.

Finally, Dalton hit Walter Bryant in the back of the end zone for an 11-yard score one play after the Frogs got a first down by the nose of the football, to make it 17-3 with 13:10 left.

But Carney responded by hitting Travis Dekker for 50 yards, setting up a 9-yard touchdown strike to Keith Madsen that pulled the Falcons within a touchdown with 8 minutes remaining.

The Falcons gave up great field position to TCU when Horned Frogs up-man Derek Moore recovered the onside kick, but Air Force forced a three-and-out and took over at its 20.

On fourth-and-one from the Falcons 29, Carney pitched to Ollis, who scampered 71 yards for the tying touchdown with 5:55 left.

TCU capitalized on a blocked punt and an interception to take a 10-3 halftime lead. Stephen Hodges sliced through the Falcons' widespread punt formation to block Harrison's first punt, and Andy Burrell recovered at the Air Force 27. But the Frogs managed to move just five yards and had to settle for Manfredini's 39-yard field goal.

Manfredini's 20-yarder in the third quarter was blocked by Chris Thomas, the 100th blocked kick by Air Force since 1990.

After Steven Coleman's interception at midfield, TCU again had trouble moving the ball. The Frogs committed three penalties and a fumble but still managed to drive downfield for the touchdown on Dalton's 5-yard fade pass to Ervin Dickerson just before he tumbled out of bounds.

After Harrison was wide right on a 50-yard field goal try that was plenty long enough, the Horned Frogs drove to the Falcons 22 before Garrett Rybak forced and recovered a fumble by Christian at the end of an 11-yard scamper.

Harrison then nailed a career-long 57-yarder with 1:31 left before halftime, which was nothing like the thrilling 33-yarder he would hit in overtime.

Team Notes

- The Air Force defense stopped TCU inside the red zone twice in the third quarter, blocking a field goal and making an interception.
- Air Force improved to 3-8 all-time in Thursday night games. The team has won two straight on Thursday night, defeating Colorado State, 24-21, last year.
- Air Force has a three-game winning streak, its longest since 2003 when the team opened the season 5-0.
- Head Coach Troy Calhoun has opened his career with a 3-0 mark, which is the second-best start in Academy history. Only L.T. "Buck" Shaw, who opened 6-0 in Air Force inaugural season of 1956, ranks better.
- Air Force snapped a four-game losing streak to TCU with its first win over the Horned Frogs since 1987. The Falcons improved to 2-4-1 all-time vs. TCU.
- Air Force played its seventh overtime overall and first since 2003. The Falcons improved to 5-2 all-time in overtime games included a 3-1 mark in Falcon Stadium. The overtime tilt was the first for Air Force since 2003 and the fifth vs. a conference opponent. Air Force improved to 4-1 all-time in overtime games vs. conference opponents.

- Senior HB Jim Ollis made his first start of the season and second of his career at halfback. Ollis recorded career highs in rushing attempts with 16 and yards with 138. Ollis scored a touchdown on a career-long run of 71 yards.

AP Article - Max Hall passed for 293 yards and two touchdowns and Brigham Young ended Air Force's unbeaten start with a 31-6 win on Saturday, Sept. 22, the Falcons' first loss under new coach Troy Calhoun.

Harvey Unga ran for 111 yards and caught a touchdown pass and Manase Tonga scored on two short runs for the Cougars.

BYU won its fourth straight against the Falcons.

Air Force finished with 231 yards of offense and was just 3-for-13 on third downs.

Shaun Carney passed for 98 yards and scored Air Force's only touchdown on an 8-yard option run late in the third quarter after BYU was up 24-0.

The Cougars led 17-0 at halftime, then in the third quarter caught the Falcons by surprise on fourth-and-9 from the 29. Rather than attempting a long field goal, the Cougars went for it and Hall threw a perfect sideline pass to Unga out of the backfield for a touchdown with 10:54 left in the third.

Air Force didn't score until Carney's 8-yard run with 3:31 left in the third cut BYU's lead to 24-6. The Falcons went for two and the Cougars snuffed the option run.

Tonga added a 2-yard touchdown run early in the fourth to give BYU a 31-6 lead.

Air Force's defense was holding opponents to an average of 294 yards and fewer than 11 points through the first three games. BYU finished with 452 yards as Hall completed 23 of 33 passes and the Cougars ran 44 times for 159 yards.

BYU led 17-0 at halftime on a 1-yard run by Tonga in the first quarter, a 9-yard pass from Hall to Matt Allen in the second and a 42-yard field goal by Mitch Payne.

Chad Smith was the Falcons' top rusher, gaining 47 yards on just two carries. Smith had a career-long 45-yard run in the game.

Chad Hall had career- and team-high's with six receptions for 80 yards. Hall accounted for 137 all-purpose yards for the Falcons.

Team Notes

- Air Force's scoreless first half marks the first time this season the Falcons have been shutout in a half. It's also the first back-to-back scoreless quarters this season. Prior to the BYU game, Air Force had posted only three scoreless quarters all season.
- Air Force gave up a season-high 31 points. The previous high by an opponent was 17 points vs. TCU last week.

Individual Notes

AP Article - Playing before a record crowd and with Navy's four-year hold on the Commander-in-Chief's trophy on the line, quarterback Kaipo-Noa Kaheaku-Enhada stepped up with two fourth-quarter touchdown runs, leading the Midshipmen to a 31-20 win over Air Force on Saturday.

Kaheaku-Enhada had touchdown runs of 2 and 78 yards..

Air Force quarterback Shaun Carney had a record day in defeat, gaining 300 total yards to become the program's all-time leader with 6,780 yards from scrimmage. Carney also threw for a career-best 237 yards.

Trailing 20-17 early in the fourth quarter, Navy drove 73 yards for the go-ahead touchdown. Kaheaku-Enhada hit O.J. Washington for 53 yards to the Air Force 20. Eric Kettani converted a fourth down at the 11, and then Kaheaku-Enhada scored on fourth down from the 2, giving Navy the lead with 13:01 to play.

After an Air Force punt, Kaheaku-Enhada broke loose for 78 yards to put the Midshipmen up 31-20 with 9:18 left.

Navy, which entered the weekend as the nation's top rushing team, produced 302 rushing yards and 381 yards total.

The Falcons outgained the Midshipmen with 474 yards, but were held without a score three times inside Navy's 20-yard line.

Joey Bullen's 29-yard field goal staked Navy to a 17-13 lead before Chad Hall's 5-yard run put Air Force ahead 20-17 late in the third.

Carney completed 18 of 23 passes and ran for 63 yards. Hall had career highs with 8 catches for 108 yards, and he scored both Falcon touchdowns - both on the ground.

Jim Ollis had 73 yards rushing, but his fourth-quarter fumble allowed Navy to run some time off the clock and protect its 11-point lead.

The Falcons' Ryan Harrison hit field goals of 28 and 21 yards, but he also missed from 41 and 32. The latter miss was one of three missed opportunities deep in Navy territory. Ollis was dropped for a loss on fourth down at Navy's 4 in the second quarter, and the Falcons later had to punt after three penalties pushed them back from the Navy 15.

Team Notes

- Air Force's opening scoring drive (Harrison 28 FG) used up 13 plays and 5:58 off the clock. The 13 play-drive ties as the most in a drive this season. AFA also used 13 plays in a touchdown drive in the season opener vs. South Carolina State. The 5:58 off the clock is a new season best. The previous was 4:50 on a touchdown drive vs. South Carolina State.
- Air Force's second-quarter touchdown (Hall 16 run) is its first touchdown in the first half since the season opener vs. South Carolina State. The Falcons scored 24 first-half points in the SCSU game. Since then, the Falcons had scored three points vs. Utah, three points vs. TCU and were shutout vs. BYU in the first half prior to the Navy game.

6 Air Force 31, UNLV 14 Oct. 6, Falcon Stadium, USAFA

AP Article - Chad Hall scored two touchdowns and ran for a career-high 169 yards to help Air Force to a 31-14 Mountain West Conference win over UNLV.

Hall's personal-best 52-yard scamper in the third quarter gave Air Force a 14-7 lead and put the Falcons ahead of UNLV to stay.

Hall's 169 rushing yards were the most by an Air Force running back since Jason Jones had 171 yards against Notre Dame in 1991.

Air Force quarterback Shaun Carney threw for 123 yards and added 73 on the ground, including a career-long 71-yard touchdown run that put the Falcons up 21-7 with 3:38 remaining in the third quarter.

Carney is within seven yards of Air Force's all-time career passing yards mark of 4,789 set by Dave Ziebart in 1979. Carney is already the Falcons' all-time total offense career leader.

Chad Smith opened the scoring for Air Force, capping a 12-play drive with a one-yard plunge with 26 seconds remaining in the first quarter. The drive began on the Air Force 26, after Ryan Kemp and Drew Fowler stuffed Travis Dixon on a quarterback sneak on a fourth-and-one.

UNLV tied the score at 7-7 as time expired in the first half. Freshman quarterback Travis Dixon ran to his left on a second-down play from the 2-yard line, landing on his shoulder in the end zone after being met by a pair of Air Force tacklers.

The Rebels scoring drive covered 65 yards and included a key fourth-down conversion on the Air Force 35, with Dixon passing six yards to Ryan Wolfe for a first down on the 29. It was UNLV's only fourth-down conversion of the night, as the Falcons stopped the Rebels on three other occasions on fourth down.

UNLV closed the gap to 21-14 with 14:45 remaining in the game on a four-yard touchdown run by Frank Summers, but Air Force was able to respond. The Falcons made it a two-possession game with a 28-yard field goal by Ryan Harrison with 7:29 remaining after Rebels punter Brian Pacheco netted just a seven-yard punt that gave Air Force the ball on the UNLV 13.

Air Force capped the scoring with 1:40 remaining when Hall scored his second touchdown of the night, an eight-yard run.

Neither team had trouble moving the ball, with UNLV finishing with 471 yards of total offense and Air Force 432.

Team Notes

- Air Force snapped a two-game losing streak overall and improved to 4-2 overall and 3-1 in conference play.
- Air Force's three conference wins this season in just four games matches last year's mark when the team finished 3-5 overall.
- Air Force improved to 9-4 overall, including a 9-3 mark in conference games. The Falcons improved to 5-1 in Falcon Stadium vs. UNLV.
- Air Force improved to 3-0 this season at home. The Falcons have also beaten South Carolina State and TCU in Falcon Stadium this season.
- Air Force's stop of UNLV running back Frank Summers on fourth-and-one from the Air Force one is the team's second stop of its kind this season. The tackle was made by Drew Fowler and John Rabold. Earlier this season against Utah, the Falcons stopped Utah's Darryl Poston on a fourth-and-one from the one in the fourth quarter. Drew Fowler and Hunter Altman made the stop against Utah.

Individual Notes

- Sophomores Ben Garland (LE) and Stephen Larson (NG) made the first starts of their careers.
- Senior FS Bobby Giannini returned to the starting lineup. Giannini started the first two games of the season, then came off the bench the last three before the UNLV game.
- Senior TB Chad Smith made his first start of the season and fourth of his career. The start is the first for Smith since the New Mexico game in 2005. Smith scored his first touchdown of the season on a one-yard run in the first quarter to give AF a 7-0 lead. The touchdown is the second of his career and first since scoring one vs. CSU in 2005.
- Senior WR Chad Hall rushed for 169 yards vs. UNLV to record the fourth 100-yard rushing game of his career. He had one in 2005 vs. Colorado State and two last year (vs. Colorado State and Wyoming). Hall scored on a career-long run of 52 yards in the third quarter. His previous career-long run was 43 yards vs. Colorado State in 2005. Hall is the fourth different Falcon with a 100-yard game this season. He joins Kip McCarthy (129 vs. South Carolina State), Shaun Carney (113 vs. Utah) and Jim Ollis (138 vs. TCU). Hall's 169 yards are the most by a Falcon since Keith Boyea rushed for 188 yards vs. Colorado State in 2001. The 169 yards are the most by a Falcon running back since fullback Jason Jones rushed for 171 vs. Notre Dame in 1991. The last halfback to rush for more yards was Anthony Roberson, who tallied 186 vs. Utah in 1988. A wide receiver had never rushed for more than 100 yards in a game prior to the UNLV game.
- Senior QB Shaun Carney recorded a career-long 71-yard run for a touchdown in the third quarter. His 71-yard run matches the longest by a Falcon this season. Jim Ollis also had a 71-yard touchdown run this season vs. TCU. Carney's touchdown moves him into 10th place on the Air Force career scoring list with 164 points. He moves past Joey Ashcroft (2001-03), who scored 163. The touchdown is Carney's sixth rushing touchdown in his career vs. UNLV. He has also passed for five scores against the Rebels.

7 Air Force 45, Colorado State 21 Oct. 13, Sonny Lubick Field at Hughes Stadium, Fort Collins, CO

AP Article - Chad Hall and Shaun Carney set school yardage records and Air Force beat Colorado State 45-21 on Oct. 13. The Falcons scored four first-half touchdowns on their way to the blowout win. Hall, a senior wide receiver, ran for four touchdowns and a single-game school-record 256 yards. It was his third 100-yard rushing performance against the Rams, and his fifth overall. Carney completed only one pass in the first half, but the 12-yard completion to Hall was enough to set the school record for passing yards. Dave Ziebart, who played from 1976-79, had the old record of 4,789 yards. Carney finished the game with 52 yards passing and a touchdown. Colorado State quarterback Caleb Hanie threw three first-half interceptions and the Falcons capitalized, returning one for a touchdown and turning another into a scoring drive. The game was delayed 45 minutes because lightning knocked out power to some parts of the stadium.

On the first drive of the game, the Falcons marched 80 yards on 14 plays, capped by Hall's two-yard touchdown run. He added three more, from two yards, six yards, and 13 yards. Falcons linebacker Drew Fowler intercepted a pass in the first half and returned it 26 yards for a touchdown.

Colorado State cut Air Force's lead to seven in the second quarter on a touchdown run by Gartrell Johnson.

Hanie threw four interceptions in the game and just one touchdown, a 7-yard pass to Damon Morton in the third quarter.

Air Force's Carson Bird had two interceptions and Austin Randle had the fourth pick. Ryan Harrison also kicked a 52-yard field goal, his second 50-plus yarder this season and punted just once, placing the ball to the CSU nine yard line.

Team Notes

- Air Force snapped a four-game losing streak at Colorado State, winning for the first time in Fort Collins since 1997 when the team won 24-0. The Falcons also improved to 26-19-1 all-time vs. Colorado State in the series, including an 11-8 mark at CSU.
- The Falcons retain the Ram-Falcon Trophy, winning the prize for the 15th time in 28 years. The Ram-Falcon series began in 1980.
- Air Force improved to 2-0 in October to mark the first time since 2002 the Falcons have posted multiple wins in the month of October. The win over CSU is Air Force's first on the road in October since defeating Navy, 24-18, in 2001. The road win is the first over a conference foe in October since defeated Wyoming, 51-34, in Laramie in 2000. This win also marks Air Force's first back-to-back wins in October since 2002 when the Falcons defeated Navy (48-7) and BYU (52-9) in 2002. Both games were played in Falcon Stadium.
- Air Force recorded four interceptions which ties as the fifth most in a single game in school history. The four INTs are the most since intercepting four vs. Army last season.
- Air Force's 28-point first half is the team's highest of the season. The previous was 24 points in the second half last week vs. UNLV which gives Air Force a four-quarter total of 52 points entering the second half of the CSU game. The 28-point half is Air Force's best since exploding for 43 in the first half vs. Army last season.
- Air Force scored a season high 45 points. The team's previous best was 31 points vs. UNLV. The 45 points tonight are the most since scoring 47 vs. Colorado State in 2004. The 45 points are the most in a conference road game since scoring 49 at UNLV in 2002.
- Air Force's 385 rushing yards are a season high. The previous best was 334 yards vs. Utah on Sept. 8.

Individual Notes

- Senior WRZ Chad Hall recorded a school record 256 yards rushing yards on a career-high 31 carries. Hall is the first Falcon with 200-plus yards rushing since Beau Morgan, who had 217 yards vs. Fresno State in 1996. Hall broke the record of 249 yards set by Dee Dowis vs. San Diego State in 1989.
- Hall recorded his third consecutive 100-yard rushing game vs. Colorado State. Hall has recorded back-to-back 100-yard games for the first time of his career, as he notched 169 yards last week vs. UNLV. He is the first Falcon with back-to-back 100-yard games since quarterback Adam Fitch vs. Army and San Diego State in 2004. Hall is the first non-quarterback with back-to-back 100-yard games since fullback Jason Jones vs. Colorado State and Utah in 1991. Hall also recorded his third straight multiple-touchdown game. Hall rushed for a career-best four touchdowns vs. the Rams. He also rushed for two scores vs. UNLV last week and Navy two weeks ago.
- Senior ILB Drew Fowler scored on a 26-yard interception return in the first quarter. The interception return for a score is the first by a Falcon since Nate Allen went 79 yards vs. Northwestern on Sept. 6, 2003.
- Senior QB Shaun Carney became the career passing leader at Air Force. Carney reached the milestone with his first completion in the first quarter and now has 4,835 career passing yards. He passed Dave Ziebart (1976-79), who threw for 4,789 yards.
- Senior CB Carson Bird recorded his fourth and fifth interceptions of the season. The interceptions are the sixth and seventh of his career. Bird is the active career leader for the Falcons.
- Junior PK Ryan Harrison kicked a 52-yard field goal in the third quarter.

8 Air Force 20, Wyoming 12 Oct. 20, Falcon Stadium, USAFA

AP Article - Air Force safety Bobby Giannini kept running even though he wasn't sure the play was still alive.

It paid off when Wyoming didn't chase him and the senior returned a fumble 85 yards for the game-winning score in the Falcons' 20-12 victory over the Cowboys on Saturday.

The win made Air Force bowl eligible for the first time since 2003.

Wyoming led 9-7 when running back Wynel Seldon lost the ball at the Air Force 15 after being spun around by Giannini early in the fourth quarter.

The play went to review, but was upheld by officials only minutes after a similar play - a fumble by Wyoming quarterback Karsten Sween that was returned for a touchdown - was overturned.

In all, six plays went to review. Three field goals and two extra points were missed and Wyoming had five turnovers.

Ian Hetrick replaced an ineffective Sween, who threw three interceptions, in the fourth quarter. He drove the Cowboys 74 yards, but Wyoming was held to a field goal and was unable to recover the ensuing onside kick.

Air Force quarterback Shaun Carney became the school's leader in touchdown passes with 35 after throwing two against the Cowboys. The record-breaker came when he connected with wide receiver Mark Root for the game's final score. The record was held by Rich Haynie, the Falcons' quarterback from 1971-73.

Wyoming opened the scoring on a 13-yard touchdown pass from Sween to halfback Wade Betschart. Billy Vinnedge missed the extra point.

Air Force responded with a 5-yard touchdown pass from Carney to wide receiver Chad Hall.

Vinnedge added a career-long 57-yard field goal as time expired and the Cowboys took the lead into halftime. The game remained close because Falcons' kicker Ryan Harrison missed first-half field goals from 37, 43, and 46 yards. The Falcons ran for 259 yards, including 167 from Hall. Carney ran for 64 yards.

Team Notes

- Air Force improves to 6-1 overall and 5-1 in Mountain West Conference play. The team's six wins is the most since 2003 when the team finished 7-5. The six wins also make Air Force bowl-eligible for the first time since 2003. Air Force's five conference wins is the most since 2000 and ensures the team's first winning conference slate since going 4-3 in 2002. Air Force's 5-1 conference start is its best since opening 5-1 in 1998 as a member of the Western Athletic Conference.
- Air Force improved to 23-20-3 overall and 14-13 in conference games vs. Wyoming, including a 14-9-1 mark at home vs. the Cowboys.
- Air Force forced five turnovers vs. Wyoming to give the team 19 on the season. The Falcons have forced nine turnovers in their last two games, as the team forced four (four interceptions) last week at Colorado State.

Individual Notes

- Senior CB Carson Bird recorded his sixth interception of the season in the first quarter. His six interceptions tie as the fourth most for a single season in Air Force history and are the most since Brian Watkins had six in 1994. The interception is the eighth of his career which ranks is tied for 10th all-time in Air Force history and is the most since Tim Curry record nine from 1996-98.
- Senior safety Bobby Giannini forced a fumble and returned it 85 yards for a touchdown in the fourth quarter. The 85-yard fumble return is the third-longest in school history and the longest since Adam Zanotti set the school record with a 98-yard return for a touchdown vs. Army in 2006. The touchdown is the first of Giannini's career. The forced fumble is the third of his career and the recovery is his first. The recovery is the sixth turnover of his career (five INTs). Giannini finished the game with a career-best 15 tackles, including a career-best three tackles for loss. He has recorded 23 tackles in his last two games.
- Senior ILB Drew Fowler recorded his third interception this season and second in as many weeks, as he also had one last week at Colorado State. Fowler also finished the game with 12 total tackles to recorded his 12th career game with double figures in tackles.
- Junior PK/P Ryan Harrison recorded a career-long 81 yard punt in the third quarter. The punt is the fifth longest in school and longest since Donny Heaton set the school record of 90 yards at Utah in 2004.
- Senior QB Shaun Carney threw two touchdown passes to give him 35 for his career, making him the career leader at Air Force. Carney passed Rich Haynie (1971-73), who threw 34. Carney also moved into a tie for ninth on the Mountain West Conference career list with 35. He is tied with Brandon Doman of BYU, who threw for 35 from 1999-2001.
- Chad Hall rushed for 167 yards and has recorded 592 yards rushing in his last three games which is the second most in school history for a three game span and most since Beau Morgan set the school record of 618 yards in three straight games in 1996.

9 New Mexico 34, Air Force 31

AP Article - Tailback Rodney Ferguson ran for 146 yards and John Sullivan kicked four field goals, leading New Mexico to a 34-31 victory over Air Force on Thursday night.

The Lobos snapped a three-game losing streak to Air Force, capitalizing on five lost fumbles by the Falcons, all inside their own 30 - including three in the fourth quarter.

Ferguson showed his durability with 41 carries and Sullivan set a school record by hitting his 18th straight field goal, a 36-yarder that put New Mexico ahead 34-31 with 10:10 remaining.

The Falcons got a big break when Sullivan finally missed, sailing wide right on a 32-yard try with 2:18 remaining. But Air Force's Mark Root fumbled and Herbert Felder recovered for the Lobos, who ran out the clock.

New Mexico's defense held Air Force's Chad Hall to 97 yards rushing on 21 carries.

Hall, who came in as the only player in the nation to lead his team in rushing and receiving, added six catches for 66 yards receiving and added 84 yards on four kick returns, two days after missing practice because of illness.

He wasn't slowed by the illness, zigzagging 26 yards on his first carry and scoring on runs of 1 and 18 yards in the first half. But the Lobos kept Hall in check, considering he'd logged 592 yards rushing in the previous three games.

Sullivan, meanwhile, connected from 43, 20, 32 and 36 yards to break the school mark of 16 field goals in a row by Vladimir Borombozin from 2000-01.

Sullivan's 32-yard field goal tied it at 31 early in the fourth quarter, and his 36-yarder on New Mexico's next series completed the scoring.

That possession started after Air Force quarterback Shaun Carney fumbled and Wesley Beck recovered for the Lobos at the Falcons 28. New Mexico scored 14 points off three Air Force fumbles.

Ferguson scored on a 3-yard plunge on fourth-and-1, put New Mexico ahead 28-24 in the third. It was set up when Air Force's Garrett Rybak had a New Mexico punt bounce off his leg and Ian Clark recovered for the Lobos.

The Falcons answered with a 65-yard drive, capped by an 8-yard TD run by Jim Ollis to give Air Force a 31-28 lead late in the third.

Ferguson also had a 1-yard TD that put the Lobos up 7-0.

Team Notes

- Air Force had a season-high five turnovers, all fumbles inside its own 30 yard line.
- Air Force has forced 11 turnovers in the last three games and scored 49 points off them.
- Air Force's touchdown in the second quarter (Chad Hall 18 run) is the quickest AF scoring drive in terms of time this season. The one-play, 18-yard drive took just six seconds.

Individual Notes

- Freshman CB Reggie Rembert made the first start of his career. He started for senior Carson Bird, who did not play due to illness. Rembert is the second freshman to start this season. Fellow rookie Andre Morris, Jr. started earlier this season vs. BYU at outside linebacker.
- Senior ILB Aaron Shanor recorded the first interception of his career in the first quarter. The interception was the 14th by the Falcons this season. Air Force's 14 interceptions are the most since 2001 when the team also had 14.
- Senior WR-Z Ty Paffett scored the first touchdown of his career in the second quarter. The 21-yard run is the longest of Paffett's career.
- Senior ILB John Rabold recorded his second fumble recovery of the season. The fumble was forced by senior OLB Hunter Altman, who forced his first fumble of the season.
- Junior PK Ryan Harrison kicked his 11th field goal of the season which is the most at Air Force since Joey Ashcroft had 13 in 2003.
- Senior FB Todd Newell recorded his career long run of nine yards. His previous long was five yards earlier this season vs. Colorado State.
- Senior WR-Z Chad Hall surpassed last season's rushing total overall in his ninth game of the season. Hall led the Falcons with 784 yards last season in 12 games as a halfback.

10 Air Force 30, Army 10 Nov. 3, Falcon Stadium, USAFA

AP Article - Chad Hall ran for a school-record 275 yards and a touchdown, leading Air Force over Army 30-10 on Nov. 3.

Hall broke his own single-game record of 256 yards, set against Colorado State on Oct. 13.

Oh, and for good measure he also added two other school records to his resume.

He passed Cormac Carney for the career all-purpose yards record and Ernie Jennings for the single-game all-purpose yards mark.

Air Force also set season highs for total yards (542) and yards rushing (437). Hall finished with 333 all-purpose yards to lead Air Force to its first win over Army at home since 2003.

Shaun Carney also did his part to ensure Air Force its first winning record since 2003.

The dual-threat quarterback threw for 105 yards and a touchdown and added 53 yards rushing and another score on the ground.

The Falcons scored the game's first touchdown when Carney connected with wide receiver Spencer Armstrong on a 48-yard pass at the beginning of the second quarter.

Despite the yards, Hall didn't score until his 58-yard run in the third quarter set up a 1-yard touchdown run that gave the Falcons a two-possession lead.

Army only managed 181 yards of total offense, including just 17 yards rushing.

The Black Knights' touchdown came after linebacker Frank Scappaticci intercepted Carney at the Air Force 24 and returned it to the 3. Carson Williams found tight end Ernie Bernal in the end zone for a 2-yard touchdown pass three plays later to tie it.

The game drew the biggest crowd to watch Air Force this season with 46,144 fans in attendance.

Falcon kicker Ryan Harrison was perfect on all three extra-point and three field goal attempts.

Harrison hit from 35, 40 and 56 yards. The 56-yarder was his third field goal of 50-plus yards this season.

Team Notes

- Air Force head coach Troy Calhoun recorded his seventh win which is the third most in school history for a first-year football coach. Ben Martin set the standard with a 9-0-2 mark in 1958 while Fisher DeBerry ranks second with eight wins during an 8-4 mark in 1984.
- The Air Force senior class recorded its first home service academy win in their career. The class entered the game 0-3 with two losses to Navy and one to Army.
- Air Force improved to 28-13-1 all-time vs. Army, including a 17-3 mark at home. The Falcons have won 17 of last 19 games in the series.
- The Falcons completed Commander-in-Chief's Trophy competition with a 1-1 record in 2007. Air Force improved to 47-25 all-time in CIC competition.
- Air Force posted its third win over the final six games of the season which ensures the program its first non-losing streak over the final six games of the regular season since the 2004 team finished 3-3. Air Force is currently 3-1 with games at Notre Dame and at home vs. San Diego State remaining. The last time the team had a winning record over the final six games of the year was in 2000 when the Falcons were 4-2.
- Air Force posted its first November home win since 2004 when the Falcons defeated Colorado State, 47-17. The November win is the first overall since beating New Mexico, 42-24, in Albuquerque in 2005.
- The attendance of 46,144 ranks as the largest this season. Air Force has averaged 43,838 fans the last two home games. AF had 41,531 for its last home game vs. Wyoming on Oct. 20.

Individual Notes

- Senior WR-Z Chad Hall set the school record for rushing yards in a game with 275, breaking his own school record set earlier this season with 256 at Colorado State. Hall also set the single-game all-purpose yard mark at Air Force with 333 while becoming the single-season record holder with over 2,000 yards.
- Senior QB Shaun Carney scored his 28th career rushing touchdown to move into a tie for sixth place in Mountain West Conference history in career rushing touchdowns. Carney moved even with Colorado State's Cecil Sapp, who had 28 from 1999-2002.
- Junior PK/P Ryan Harrison kicked three field goals to give him 14 this season. Harrison kicked a 56-yard field goal in the fourth quarter which is his third field goal of over 50 yards this season. He is the second kicker in school history to have three 50-plus field goals in a season. Dave Lawson also had three in 1975.
- Senior OLB John Rabold recorded his 13th tackle for loss in the first quarter. Rabold has recorded at least one tackle for loss in eight consecutive games and nine of the 10 this season.
- Junior WR-X Spencer Armstrong made his first catch of the season in the first quarter. Armstrong later recorded a career-long reception of 48 yards for a touchdown in the second quarter for his first score of the year. He missed the first five games of the season due to injury. Last year Armstrong made 11 catches for 178 yards.

11 Air Force 41, Notre Dame 24 Nov. 10, Notre Dame Stadium, South Bend, IN

AP Article - Air Force beat Notre Dame 41-24 to record the biggest victory margin for a service academy over the Irish in 44 years.

Quarterback Shaun Carney threw for two touchdowns and ran for another, and Chad Hall ran for 142 yards and had 272 all-purpose yards for Air Force. The Falcons (8-3) scored three straight touchdowns after Notre Dame (1-9) tied the score at 10, and the Irish didn't get any closer than two touchdowns the rest of the way.

Hall did most of the work for Air Force, setting up the touchdowns, but never scored himself. Carney threw a 7-yard pass to wide-open Sean Quintana in the end zone and an 8-yard TD pass to tight end Keith Madsen. He then scored on a 1-yard run on third-and-goal. Spencer Armstrong scored on an 8-yard run. Linebacker John Rabold returned a fumble 19 yards for a touchdown and Ryan Harrison kicked field goals of 19 and 37 yards.

It was the largest margin of victory for Air Force in six wins over the Irish and the biggest by a military academy since Navy beat the Irish 35-14 in 1963 behind Roger Staubach.

Just like against Navy a week earlier, runners repeatedly ran through Notre Dame tackles and the Irish were gashed for big plays on pitches to the outside. The Falcons rushed for 285 yards.

Air Force, which strengthened a bid for its first bowl berth since 2002, improved to 8-0 this season when it has a 100-yard rusher. Hall, who rushed for an Air Force record 275 yards a week ago, added two catches for 31 yards and 99 yards on kickoff returns. Carney was 10-of-16 passing for 120 yards. Making his first start after sitting for two games, Clausen was 22-of-40 for a career-high 246 yards. He threw three touchdown passes after throwing just one in seven previous games, six of them starts. Clausen was one of the few bright spots for the Irish, especially in the second half when he was 17-of-29 for 192 yards with two touchdowns.

The Irish, who were held to 58 yards rushing, had lost eight games in a season twice before, going 2-8 in 1956 and 1960.

It was also the school-record sixth straight home loss. Notre Dame could finish the season winless at home if it doesn't beat Duke next week. The only other times that has happened were in 1887 (0-1), 1918 (0-0-1) and 1933 (0-3-1).

Team Notes

- Air Force recorded its eighth victory of the season, the most since the 2002 team finished the season 8-5.
- Air Force posted its fourth win in the last 25 years (1983-2007) in Notre Dame Stadium, which ties as the third-most in the nation during that span. Air Force matches USC with the four wins and trails only Michigan State with seven wins and Boston College with five.
- Air Force closed the regular season with a 3-1 mark against non-conference opponents. The three wins is the most at the Academy since the 2003 team posted a 3-1 mark. The Falcons also beat South Carolina State and Army. Air Force improved to 7-8 since 2004 vs. non-conference opponents.
- Air Force concludes the regular season with a 3-3 record in road games. The Falcons defeated Utah, Colorado State and Notre Dame. Air Force's three wins and .500 winning percentage are the best since the 2002 team posted a 4-1 road mark.
- Air Force scored its third non-offensive touchdown this season when John Rabold returned a fumble 19 yards for a touchdown in the first quarter.
- The Falcons held Notre Dame to just 58 yards rushing to mark the second straight game and fifth time this season the team has held an opponent under 100 yards. The 58 total is the second-lowest total allowed, trailing only the 17 yards AF allowed Army last week.

Individual Notes

- Senior WR-Z Chad Hall recorded 272 all-purpose yards vs. Notre Dame which is the fourth most in school history. Hall set the school record of 333 vs. Army and now has a school-record 605 all-purpose yards in back-to-back games. Hall has three of the top five single-game marks in school history.
- Chad Hall rushed for 142 yards vs. Notre Dame to record his eighth-career 100-yard rushing performance. The 100-yard effort is his second straight and fifth in the last six weeks.
- Junior PK/P Ryan Harrison kicked two field goals vs. Notre Dame to give him 16 this season which ties as the fourth most in a single-season in Air Force history and is the most since Joey Ashcroft kicked 16 in 2002. Harrison's 16 field goals ties match Ashcroft and Jim Sturch, who had 16 in 1978.
- Senior CB Carson Bird and sophomore SS Chris Thomas each recorded their first quarterback sacks of the season. The sacks are the first by members of the Air Force secondary this season and came on back-to-back Notre Dame drives.
- Senior OLB John Rabold recorded multiple tackles for loss vs. Notre Dame. He had 2.5 tackles for loss, including a quarterback sack. His 2.5 tackles for loss tied a career high. He has recorded at least one stop behind the line of scrimmage in nine straight games and 10 of 11 this season.
- Junior WR-X Spencer Armstrong scored the first rushing touchdown of his career, an eight-yard run in the second quarter to give Air Force a 17-10 lead.

AP Article - Jim Ollis, Ty Paffett and Chad Hall each eclipsed 100 yards rushing and combined for seven touchdowns to lead Air Force over San Diego State 55-23 on Saturday. Air Force (9-3, 5-2, Mountain West Conference) ran for a season-high 569 yards, and Ollis and Paffett each set career highs for yards rushing. San Diego State (4-6, 3-3) planned to stop Hall, the leading rusher in the conference, but had to deal with Ollis and Paffett in the first half. Ollis, a converted quarterback, ran for 163 yards on 15 carries. He opened the Air Force scoring with a 54-yard run in the first and added another 34-yard touchdown to start the third quarter. Paffett, a converted safety, scored a touchdown in every quarter except the fourth. He scored on a 4-yard run in the first quarter, added a 73-yarder midway through the second and had another 4-yard touchdown midway through the third. He finished with 105 yards on just seven carries. Hall had just 25 yards rushing at halftime, but finished with 151 yards and two touchdowns. The Aztecs dominated time of possession in the first half, keeping the ball for nearly eight minutes longer than Air Force, but two costly first-quarter turnovers -- a fumble by running back Brandon Sullivan and an interception thrown by quarterback Kevin O'Connell -- turned into Paffett's 4-yard touchdown and Ollis' 54-yard score. The Aztecs opened the scoring when O'Connell took a keeper for a 1-yard touchdown to cap an 11-play drive. The Falcons countered with three straight touchdown runs from Ollis, Paffett and Hall to build a two-touchdown lead. Paffett's 73-yard score, Air Force's longest play from scrimmage this season, put the Falcons up by 18 points before Atiyah Henderson scored from the 6 to make it 28-17 at halftime. O'Connell was 27-for-43 for 384 yards with a touchdown and an interception. Chaz Schilens had six catches for 188 yards. The teams combined for 1,176 yards of total offense. The win gave the Falcons their first undefeated home season since 1998 and the school's most wins since 2000.

Team Notes

- Air Force closes the regular season with a 9-3 overall record and a 6-2 mark in the Mountain West Conference. Air Force's nine wins are the most since 2000 when the Falcons also finished 9-3. The nine regular season wins are the most since the 1998 team posted 11. The team's six conference wins are the most in school history in the MWC and tie as the third-most in conference play all-time.
- Air Force concluded the season with a 6-0 mark in Falcon Stadium. The undefeated home season is just the third in school history first since the 1998 team was 6-0. The 1985 team is the only other in school history to go undefeated at home with a 6-0 mark.
- Air Force rushed for 569 yards vs. San Diego State which is the seventh most in school history and most since rushing for 583 vs. Cal State Northridge in 2000. The 569 yards vs. SDSU are the most vs. a Division I-A team since getting 640 vs. Utah in 1988.
- Air Force averaged 8.9 yards per carry vs. San Diego State which is the fourth most in school history and most since getting 9.0 vs. San Diego State in 1989.
- Air Force scored a season-high 56 points vs. San Diego State. The previous high was 45 points vs. Colorado State. Air Force's 56 points are the 14th most in school history and most since scoring 56 vs. New Mexico in 1998. The Falcons have scored 30 or more in four straight games which is the longest streak since 2000 when the team scored 30-plus in five straight including a bowl game.
- Air Force had 670 total yards vs. San Diego State which is the third most in school history and most since getting 698 vs. Cal State Northridge in 2000. The school record of 700 yards was set vs. UTEP in 1994.

Individual Notes

- Senior WR-Z/TB Chad Hall became the career all-purpose yards leader in Air Force history in the San Diego State game. Hall recorded 151 rushing yards, 31 receiving yards and 89 return yards to give him 271 for the game and pushed his career total to 3,919. He surpassed the record of Ernie Jennings (1968-70), who had 3,848.
- Chad Hall rushed for 151 yards vs. San Diego State to move into second place on the Air Force single-season rushing list with 1,415 yards. He trails only Beau Morgan, who rushed for 1,494 in 1996. Hall's 100-yard effort is his sixth in the last seven games and ninth time in his career he's topped 100 yards rushing.
- Senior OLB John Rabold recovered his fourth fumble this season which ties as the seventh most in a single season in Air Force history and is the most since Marchello Graddy had five in 2003.
- Senior TB Jim Ollis rushed for a career-best 163 yards on 15 carries to record his second-career 100-yard game.
- Senior FS Bobby Giannini recorded his first interception this season and sixth of his career. He has recorded at least one interception per season during his career at Air Force. .
- Senior WR-Z Ty Paffett rushed for a career-high 107 yards vs. San Diego State. Paffett's previous high for rushing yards was 20 earlier this season vs. New Mexico. Paffett scored on a career-long 73-yard run in the second quarter. The 73-yard run is the longest by a Falcon this season r recorded three catches vs. San Diego State.
