LAST SEASON'S TURNAROUND

Air Force finished 10-3 overall last season. The Falcons were 5-3 in the Mountain West, finishing fourth in the Mountain Division. The Falcons were 2-10 in 2013 and the eight-game turnaround is a school record, breaking the mark of the 1958 team, that went 9-0-2 following a 3-6-1 mark the previous year. The eight-game turnaround tied as the best in the nation.

AIR FORCE TOPS IN GSR

Air Force has a graduation success rate of 93, according to the latest data from the NCAA. The Falcons have the highest GSR in the Mountain West and among the three service academies. Essentially, that translates to over 90 percent of the recruited varsity athletes that entered the Academy during the four year period of 2004-07 (i.e., Classes of 2008, 2009, 2010, and 2011) either graduated from the Academy or left academically eligible.

AIR FORCE TOP PUBLIC INSTITUTION

Air Force football is one of just six schools to have a 90 percent Graduation Success Rate (GSR) each of the last three years. The Falcons are the only service academy, Mountain West Conference school and public institution to be over 90 percent each of the last three years.

This data was part of a release recently by the American Football Coaches Association. Duke University, Northwestern University, University of Notre Dame and Stanford University will share the American Football Coaches Association's 2014 Academic Achievement Award, which is presented by the Touchdown Club of Memphis.

This year's award marks the seventh time the NCAA's Graduation Success Rate (GSR) formula has been used to select the winner. From 1981 to 2007, the award was presented based on a formula used by the College Football Association and AFCA. Since 2008, the criteria for the AFCA's Academic Achievement Award is based on the highest NCAA GSR, at least 15 students in the GSR Cohort, and a Federal Graduation Rate of 75 percent or better.

Sixty-one other institutions will be recognized for graduating 75 percent or more of their football student-athletes. Thirteen of those institutions -- Air Force, Arizona State, Army, Ball State, Central Florida, Miami (Fla.), Middle Tennessee State, Minnesota, Northern Illinois, Rice, South Carolina, UCLA and Wake Forest -- achieved a rate of 90 percent or better. The remaining 48 institutions are: Alabama, Arkansas, Boise State, Boston College, Central Michigan, Cincinnati, Colorado State, Connecticut, Florida, Florida Atlantic, Florida State, Hawaii, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Kansas State, Kent State, Kentucky, Louisiana-Lafayette, Memphis, Miami (Ohio), Michigan, Mississippi State, Navy,

Nebraska, Nevada, North Texas, Oregon State, Penn State, Pittsburgh, Purdue, Rutgers, San Diego State, San Jose State, Syracuse, TCU, Temple, Toledo, Troy, USC, Utah State, Virginia, Virginia Tech, Washington, Washington State, Western Kentucky and Wyoming.

AIR FORCE AT HOME

Air Force is 36-14 in Falcon Stadium under head coach Troy Calhoun, including a 6-0 mark in 2014. The 2014 season was just the fourth time in school history and second under Calhoun, that Air Force has posted a 6-0 home mark.

Air Force finished 5-1 at home in 2012 which ties as the fourth best mark in school history and the third time under Calhoun the team has accomplished it. Air Force combined for 10 wins at home in 2009 and 2010 which is the third most in two seasons in school history.

MORE ABOUT 2014 AT HOME: Not only was Air Force 6-0 at home last season, but the Falcons had some significant wins. The Falcons became the first team from the Mountain Division of the conference to beat Boise State since the Broncos joined the conference. In addition, the Falcons defeated service-academy rival Navy at home for the first time since 2010 and only the second time since 2002. Air Force closed out the season by beating No. 21 Colorado State. Air Force never trailed at any point during the first three home games and only trailed for 23:41 total.

COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF'S TROPHY

Air Force defeated Army, 23-6, at West Point Nov. 1 to win its record 19th Commander-in-Chief's Trophy. The title is the first since 2011 and third in the last five years. Air Force opened CIC action with a 30-21 win over Navy in Falcon Stadium Oct. 4. The 2014 season marks the 43rd year of trophy competition. The trophy goes annually to the winning academy with the best record in round-robin competition. The Falcons have a series-best 56-30 overall record and 19 titles.

THE RAM-FALCON TROPHY

Air Force and Colorado State compete each year for the Ram-Falcon Trophy. The 2014 season marked the 36th year of the trophy competition with Air Force holding a 21-14 lead. The trophy's origin is tracked back to Shelly Godkin, a former ROTC commander at Colorado State. He watched the teams play in 1978 and sought to translate his impressions into a trophy symbolic of an annual game. The first Ram-Falcon trophy game was in 1980.

AFA HAS THIRD LONGEST STREAK

- Air Force has scored in a school record 271 consecutive games.
- The streak is the third longest active streak in the nation and eighth longest in Division I-A history.
- The Falcons were last shutout by Mississippi, 13-0, in the 1992 Liberty Bowl.

OWENS TOPS 1,000-YARD MARK

Junior tailback Jacobi Owens finished third in the conference and 29th nationally in rushing with a 105.4 per-game average last season as a sophomore. Owens led the team in rushing in seven of the 10 games he played and topped the 100-yard mark five times. Owens rushed for 66 yards on 16 carries vs. Nevada to become just the third sophomore in Air Force history to top the 1,000-yard mark in a season. Owens joins Dee Dowis, who had 1,315 yards in 1987, and Pat Evans, who rushed for 1,015 in 1984. He finished the season with 1,054 yards on 204 carries with five touchdowns and a 5.2 yards per carry average. His 1,054 yards is the 14th-best single season mark in Air Force history. Owens missed the final three games of the season with a foot injury. Owens had one of the most successful debuts in school history vs. Nicholls State, rushing for 233 yards on 23 carries to set a record for most yards by a player in his first-career start. Owens averaged 10.1 yards per carry and had four runs of 20 or more yards. His 233 yards are the seventh most in school history and second most by a sophomore. Only Air Force Hall of Famer Dee Dowis rushed for more as a sophomore with 241 yards vs. Utah in 1987. He topped the 100-yard mark for the second time this season with 122 yards and a career-best two touchdowns on 25 carries at Georgia State. Owens added his third 100-yard game of the season with a 24-carry, 108-yard effort vs. Boise State. He also scored a touchdown and had a long run of 23 yards. Owens led the Falcons with 78 yards on 23 carries against Navy and had 74 yards on 18 carries in the second half, as the Falcons took control of the game. Owens recorded his fourth 100-yard game vs. Army with 118 yards on a career-high 27 carries. Owens added 135 yards and a touchdown on 18 carries at UNLV in a return to his home state.

BROWN ALL-AROUND THREAT

Senior receiver Garrett Brown recorded 36 receptions for 535 yards and a team-best six touchdowns last season. Brown averaged 14.9 yards per catch. He has caught a pass in 18 straight games which is the longest active streak on the team. Brown had his best day as a Falcon at Georgia State in a return to his home state. Brown recorded career highs in every receiving category with six catches for 96 yards and two touchdowns with a long catch of 37 yards. In addition, he rushed for a career-high 62 yards on four carries with a career-long run of 42 yards. Brown had five catches for 88 yards vs. Colorado State, including a 26-yarder in the final minute to set up the game-winning field goal.

ROBINETTE LEADS THE FALCONS

Junior receiver Jalen Robinette posted one of the best seasons in school history last year. Robinette led the Falcons in receiving with team bests of 43 catches for 806 yards, which is the seventh-best single-season effort in school history. He ranked sixth in the Mountain West in receiving with 62.0 mark. His 806 yards is the best since Jason Brown had 874 in 2005. He is averaged 18.7 yards per reception and had a pair of 100-yard receiving games with 118 yards on four catches at Georgia State and 105 yards on four catches at Utah State. He also recorded a career-long 58 yard reception vs. the Aggies. Robinette, an honorable mention all-MW selection, is the first Falcon with two 100-yard receiving games in a season since Jason Brown had three in 2005. Robinette matched his career high with five catches

for 36 yards vs. Navy. His biggest play was with his arm, connecting on a 54 yard touchdown pass to receiving mate Garrett Brown. Robinette had his best game as a Falcon in Air Force's 48-38 win at Georgia State with four catches for a career-best 118 yards to record his first-career 100-yard receiving game.

BRINGING THE STEELHAMMER

Junior safety Weston Steelhammer was a first-team all-conference performer in 2014. Steelhammer ranked fourth in the conference and 13th nationally in interceptions with six. He had an interception in three straight games and his six picks are the fifth-most in Air Force history and most since Anthony Wright had seven in 2009. Steelhammer had a record-setting performance in Air Force's win over Boise State. Steelhammer tied a school record with three interceptions and had two tackles for loss and a sack in the victory. He is the fourth player in school history and first since Anthony Wright vs. Houston in 2009 to have three interceptions in a game. He earned Mountain West defensive player of the week honors as well as National Football Foundation, Colorado Chapter, player of the week honors. In addition, Steelhammer earned Walter Camp national player of the week honors, the Football Writers Association of America Bronko Nagurski National Defensive Player of the Week award and the Jim Thorpe Defensive Back of the Week honor.

HANSEN NAMED ALL-CONFERENCE

Senior defensive lineman Alex Hansen earned second-team all-conference honors last season. Hansen led all Air Force defensive linemen with 56 total tackles and was second on the team in tackles for loss with 10 for 25 yards. He also had 3.5 sacks, three pass breakups and a blocked extra point. Hansen had a streak of 10 straight games with a tackle for loss at one point during the season. Hansen is the team's career active leader in TFLs with 21.0 and sacks with 7.5. He is also the career active leader in blocked kicks with three, all PATs.

FULLBACKS CARRY THE LOAD

Air Force junior fullbacks Shayne Davern and D.J. Johnson return this season after carrying the load last year for Air Force. The pair has combined for 843 yards rushing and 16 touchdowns last season. Davern was third on the team in rushing with 513 yards and had a eight touchdowns. Johnson was fifth on the team in rushing with 330 yards and a team-best-tying eight touchdowns. The pair combined for 184 yards rushing and three touchdowns in Air Force's 38-24 win over Western Michigan in the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl. Davern, who was named the game's most valuable player rushed for 101 yards and two scores. Johnson added a career-high 83 yards and a touchdown. The pair combined for 118 yards and two touchdowns in Air Force's win over No. 21 Colorado

State. Johnson had 60 yards and a score while Davern had 58 and a TD. Each had big days in Air Force's win over New Mexico. The pair combined for 136 yards and three touchdowns on 31 carries. Davern led the Falcons with 85 yards on 16 carries, averaging 5.3 yards per carry. Johnson chipped in with 51 yards and three touchdowns on 15 carries. His three TDs were the most by a Falcon last season and most by an Air Force fullback since Mike DeWitt scored four vs. New Mexico in 2011. The pair combined for 138 yards and two touchdowns vs. Nevada, including the game-winning TD by Davern in overtime. Davern rushed for 97 yards on 21 carries and scored two touchdowns. Johnson added 41 yards on six carries.

FALCONS ADD TWO TO COACHING STAFF

Air Force head football coach Troy Calhoun added two new assistant coaches. Steed Lobotzke and Derek Lewis have been added as offensive assistant coaches. Lobotzke, a 1992 Academy graduate, will coach tight ends while Lewis will coach receivers.

Steed Lobotzke

Lobotzke spent the 2014 season at Winston-Salem State where the Rams made a trip to the CIAA Championship. He spearheaded the Ram offense that recorded eight-straight 400-plus yard games and Winston-Salem State ended the year with a No. 10 national ranking. Prior to WSSU, Lobotzke spent 13 years at Wake Forest, including 11 seasons as the Deacons' offensive coordinator and offensive line coach. He also coached the running backs, tight ends and fullbacks. During his tenure, the Wake Forest offense broke many school and ACC records. In 2012, junior wide receiver Michael Campanaro caught 7.9 passes per game, which led the ACC and was the second-best mark in ACC history. His 79 receptions in 2012 were the fourth-highest single-season mark for a Wake Forest player and were achieved despite the fact that he missed almost three games with an injury. Campanaro's 16 catches against Boston College set an ACC single-game record. The 2011 team came within a field goal of playing for the ACC championship and went to the Music City Bowl. The squad scored 338 points - third-best in Wake Forest history - and only had 12 turnovers, which was the lowest total in school history and the best in the ACC that season.

In 2006, Wake Forest won 11 games and the ACC Championship. The offense produced 4,298 yards, the third-highest total in school history and put up Wake Forest's fourth-best scoring season with 302 points. Wake Forest also ranked sixth in the nation in fewest turnovers. Freshman quarterback Riley Skinner was named ACC Rookie of the Year after leading the ACC in pass efficiency (139.6) and breaking the Wake Forest record for completion percentage (65.8 percent). On November 13, 2006, Lobotzke was chosen as the Master Football Coaches MCS Nike Offensive Coordinator of the Week after Wake Forest defeated Florida State 30-0 in Tallahassee.

Lobotzke went to Wake Forest along with head coach Jim Grobe after serving under Grobe the previous four years at Ohio University as the centers and guards coach. In his four seasons at Ohio, the offensive line paved the way for four of the top five rushing seasons in school history. Lobotzke's ties with Grobe go back to their days

at the Air Force Academy when Grobe personally recruited him. The Northern California native attended the Academy and lettered on the football team in 1990-1991, playing on the offensive line. As a player, Lobotzke helped lead Air Force to three Liberty Bowl appearances. He earned second-team All-Western Athletic Conference honors as a junior and was named to the first team as a senior before being invited to play in the East-West Shrine Football Classic.

After graduating from the Academy in 1992 with a degree in economics, Lobotzke began his coaching career at his alma mater. He served as a graduate assistant in the 1992 and 1993 season, helping lead the team to another Liberty Bowl berth in 1992. Following his tour of active military duty, Lobotzke joined the Ohio staff in 1997.

Lobotzke is married to the former Kristin Hazen of Warren, Ohio. The couple has two daughters: Capri and Gia.

Derek Lewis

Lewis was the tight ends coach at Florida for three seasons prior to coming to the Academy. In 2012 at Florida, he coached all-Southeastern Conference selection Jordan Reed, who led the team with 45 catches for 559 yards. He also added three touchdowns. Reed ranked ninth nationally in catches by a tight end and 13th in receiving yards by a tight end. Reed was a third-round pick by the Washington Redskins in 2013.

In 2011, Lewis' group of tight ends caught 47 passes for 584 yards (12.4 ypc) and three touchdowns. Reed finished second on the team with 28 catches and third on the team with 307 receiving yards.

Lewis coached tight ends at Minnesota from 2007-10. While at Minnesota, Lewis tutored Nick Tow-Arnett to an All-Big Ten Honorable Mention selection following the 2009 season after Tow-Arnett finished second on the team with 37 receptions for 505 yards and three touchdowns. As a group, Gopher tight ends in 2009 averaged over 13 yards per reception.

Prior to going to Minnesota, he was the defensive ends coach at North Texas. From 2005-06, Lewis worked at Texas as a graduate assistant, where he was part of the staff that captured the 2005 BCS National Title. He also coached TE David Thomas who owns UT career records for receptions, receiving yards and touchdowns by a tight end, in addition to the Texas single-game record for receptions by a tight end (10, 2006 Rose Bowl). Thomas was a third-round selection by the New England Patriots in 2006.

Lewis is a 1998 graduate of the University of Texas with a bachelor's degree in kinesiology. While with the Longhorns, Lewis was a solid four-year receiving tight end who started 16 career games. He played in three bowl games (1995 Sugar Bowl; 1997 Fiesta Bowl; 1999 Cotton Bowl) and was a member of two conference championship teams (1995 SWC; 1996 Big 12). Lewis was voted 1998 first-team All-Big 12 by conference coaches after being named third-team All-Big 12 in 1997. Lewis hauled in 18 catches for 236 yards and six touchdowns in a senior campaign that was highlighted by his 61-yard reception on fourth and inches that helped seal the 1996 Big 12 Championship game for Texas. He finished his career ranked third all-time at Texas in TDs by a tight end (8), ranked fifth in career receptions by a tight end (47), and ranked seventh on the school's chart for receiving yards by a tight end (551).

A native of New Orleans, La., Lewis spent two seasons as a member of the St. Louis Rams (1999-2000) and was part of the Super Bowl XXXIV championship team. Lewis and his wife, Adonis, have one son, Myles.
