Detroit 24, Chicago 13 – Detroit's Steve Griffin denied the city of Chicago its second pro football title in three years (the Chicago Bears won the NFL's Super Bowl in 1986) with two interceptions, a fumble recovery and six receptions for 52 yards. Trailing 21-7, Chicago marched to Detroit's 11-yard line at the end of the first half, only to be intercepted by Griffin, who reclaimed 49 yards as time ran out. With Chicago trailing by just eight points, Griffin made his second aerial steal to regain the ball with 3:41 remaining in the game. Dwayne Dixon caught five passes for 63 yards, recovered a key fumble, knocked down a pass and added two tackles en route to Ironman of the Game honors. Detroit rookie George LaFrance, who would go on to compete in six more ArenaBowls, had one catch for nine yards.

Orlando 62, Tampa Bay 31 - Rick Hamilton rushed for an ArenaBowl-record 82 yards and three touchdowns and Chris Barber had three of Orlando's six interceptions as the Predators won their first ArenaBowl over the expense of the rival-Tampa Bay Storm. Orlando had played in three of the previous 11 ArenaBowls, losing each of them. Tampa Bay lost its first ArenaBowl in five appearances. Orlando led by seven at halftime before taking advantage of Tampa Bay turnovers to blow the game open with 23 straight points. Barry Wagner intercepted an errant pass from Peter Tom Willis to open the half, setting up Hamilton's five-yard score. On the ensuing kickoff, George LaFrance fumbled the ball back into the end zone and was tackled by Webbie Burnett for a safety. Orlando took the free kick and drove 34 yards, ending with Hamilton's 10-yard run with 10:02 remaining. Wagner capped the rally with a 48-yard missed field goal return that gave Orlando a 47-17 lead with 5:25 remaining in the third quarter. The Predators intercepted Willis six times, including a 22-yard interception return by Damon Mason for a third quarter touchdown. The Predators led 24-17 at halftime after dominating the second period behind two of Barber's interceptions. Trailing 14-10, Orlando coach Jay Gruden elected for a fake field goal and backup QB Connell Maynor ran 3 yards to give Orlando a 17-14 lead at 7:47 remaining. After Bjorn Nittmo tied it with a 44-yard field goal, Hamilton turned a third-and-inches dive into an ArenaBowl record 36-yard touchdown run to put Orlando ahead for good.

Albany 59, Orlando 48 - Eddie Brown set two ArenaBowl records with 12 receptions for 185 yards and tied the championship game record with four touchdown receptions as he garnered game MVP honors and helped lead the Firebirds to their first ArenaBowl title. Albany, celebrating its 10th season in the League, won in its first ArenaBowl appearance, while Orlando lost for the fourth time in five tries. The two teams combined to set six records, including combined points in a game (107), while Albany set six team records and Orlando set one. The two teams opened the game by combining for 35 points. Albany held a 21-14 lead as the teams traded scores throughout the first period. Albany took control of the game in the second frame, as Brown scored his second touchdown of the contest to help stake the Firebirds to a 38-21 halftime advantage. Orlando snuck right back into the game by scoring 13 unanswered points in the third quarter on two Jack Jackson touchdown receptions to pull within four heading into the final stanza. Brown scored his fourth and final touchdown with 54 seconds left to give the Firebirds what looked like an insurmountable lead, 52-42, after taking in QB Mike Pawlawski's sixth touchdown pass of the game. Orlando quickly battled back, as Jackson scored his third touchdown of the game, this time from 39 yards out only 28 seconds later to pull the defending champions within four points of the lead with 26 seconds to play. Brown recovered the ensuing onside kick and Albany put the game away as Jon Krick grabbed a six yard pass from Pawlawski in the back of the endzone to secure a championship for the Firebirds. Pawlawski's 347 passing yards and seven touchdowns set ArenaBowl records. Orlando's Barry Wagner earned Ironman of the Game honors as he totaled 190 all-purpose yards, including eight receptions for 109 yards and two touchdowns, while contributing four tackles and one interception on defense.

Orlando 41, Nashville 38 - David Cool kicked a 19-yard field goal as time expired to lift the Orlando Predators over the Nashville Kats, 41-38, in ArenaBowl XIV. Cool was perfect after missing a 22-yarder with 7:03 left, redeeming himself to give the Predators (14-3) their second title in the past three seasons. Nashville backup quarterback James Brown replaced starter Andy Kelly with 11:48 left in the fourth quarter for Nashville (12-6). Brown threw an interception on his second play from scrimmage, but tossed a 45-yard touchdown pass to Darryl Hammond that helped the Kats tie the game with 5:37 remaining. Brown's two-point conversion flip to Cory Fleming tied the game at 38 apiece. After the Predators took the kickoff to their 12-yard line, Orlando's Rick Hamilton rushed twice to advance the ball to the Nashville 3, setting up a fourth down situation as the clock wound down. The Predators called time out with 1.7 seconds left for the winning attempt. The Predators' Connell Maynor threw for 202 yards on 17-of-28 passing with four touchdowns, including three in the first 19 minutes of the game. James Baron was named the Ironman of the Game for his play on the offensive and defensive lines. Baron recorded two of the Kats' record six sacks on Maynor and caught a touchdown pass in the third quarter for 28 yards. Nashville QB Andy Kelly was 13-of-24 passing for 180 yards and four touchdowns before exiting with a left leg injury early in the fourth quarter. With his four touchdown performance, Orlando QB Connell Maynor moved to second all-time in ArenaBowl career touchdown passes, with 10. Orlando head coach Jay Gruden was the only QB with more ArenaBowl TD tosses than Maynor in 2000, with 17.

Grand Rapids 64, Nashville 42 - Offensive specialist Terrill Shaw caught 12 passes, including an ArenaBowl record five touchdown receptions, as the Grand Rapids Rampage defeated the Nashville Kats 64-42 in ArenaBowl XV. Shaw, the game MVP, collected 172 receiving yards as the Rampage won its first championship in only the fourth season of AFL play for the Grand Rapids franchise. Nashville lost its second straight ArenaBowl in its second appearance. Quarterback Clint Dolezel was 26-of-36 for 308 yards for Grand Rapids and passed for seven scores. Two of his touchdowns went to Demo Odems, who was named the Ironman of the Game. Odems recorded six receptions for 70 yards on offense and had a key pass deflection that ended a crucial drive for the Kats in the fourth quarter. Grand Rapids set a new ArenaBowl record for most points scored, scoring on every offensive possession except the last, when kicker Brian Gowins attempted a 60-yard insurance field goal that fell short with 23 seconds left. Defensively, JoJo Polk led the way with four pass deflections and a key interception that set up a second-quarter scoring drive for the Rampage. Nashville, behind quarterback Andy Kelly (12-26 for 243 yards and three touchdowns), could not hold back the Grand Rapids defensive front, which pressured Kelly all game long, contributing to the Kats' defeat.

San Jose 52, Arizona 14 – San Jose QB John Dutton earned game MVP honors, throwing for 236 yards and five touchdowns while completing 20-of-26 passes (76.9 percent). The five touchdown passes by Dutton tied him with Jay Gruden for the third-most thrown in a championship game. Dutton's performance was all the more dramatic considering that he spent most of 2002 as the backup to SaberCats QB Mark Grieb, who was inactive for the playoffs after suffering an injury late in the regular season. It was the first-ever ArenaBowl title won by the SaberCats in their first appearance in the title game. The 38-point win was the largest margin of victory in ArenaBowl history, while the 52 points scored by the SaberCats was the sixth-most in championship game history. Arizona, which won AFL titles in 1994 and 1997, suffered the franchise's first loss in an ArenaBowl. WR/DB Omarr Smith earned Ironman of the Game honors after recording five solo tackles, one interception and a fumble recovery on defense, to go along with four receptions for 34 yards and nine rushing yards on offense. OS James Hundon caught eight passes for 97 yards and three scores for San Jose. Veteran WR/DB Barry Wagner moved into a tie for second place in ArenaBowl history for career rushing touchdowns with three after scoring on a two-yard run in the second quarter. Arizona QB Sherdrick Bonner completed 14-of-32 passes for 172 yards, one touchdown and one interception. OS Maurice Bryant caught eight passes for a game-high 126 yards and a score for the Rattlers, who were held scoreless for the first three quarters of the game before averting the shutout with 14 fourth quarter points.

Tampa Bay seemed to be in trouble when quarterback John Kaleo went down in the third quarter with a sprained back, but backup Pat O'Hara filled in admirably, completing 7-of-13 passes for 103 yards, two touchdowns and a rushing score, allowing the Storm offense to continue to hum. Samuels had five receptions for 109 yards and three touchdowns to become the first player to win both game MVP and Ironman honors in an ArenaBowl. Kaleo and O'Hara combined to throw for 239 yards on 15-of-26 passes with three touchdowns. The Storm defense forced the Rattlers offense into a

plethora of miscues, as Arizona had five turnovers, including four fumbles and one interception thrown by QB Sherdrick Bonner. The crowd of 20,469 marked a record-high in attendance at the St. Pete Times Forum for an AFL game, and was the second-highest attended ArenaBowl.

Arizona had swept the season series with San Jose and had won the last three contests overall against the SaberCats before falling in the championship game. Grieb was named Offensive Player of the Game with his performance. The crowd of 17,391 was the largest to witness an AFL game at America West Arena. The game saw eight ties and multiple lead changes, with the final possession determining the outcome of the contest. With 30 seconds left in the game, Bonner had to start from his own 11-yard line trailing 69-62. He drove the Rattlers to the San Jose five with two seconds to play. The final play of the game was a Bonner pass that sailed over the head of WR Orshawante Bryant and through the end zone incomplete, preserving the winning margin for San Jose.

Colorado 51, Georgia 48 – Clay Rush drilled a 20-yard field goal as time expired to give the Colorado Crush a 51-48 win in ArenaBowl XIX over the Georgia Force in Colorado's third season in the AFL. Rush's connection gave Colorado its final lead in a game in that the team never trailed, despite sharing the lead three times in the fourth quarter. The final deadlock came with 18 seconds remaining after Matt Nagy found Chris Jackson for a 20-yard score, but left just enough time for the Crush to strike back. Colorado got the ball with 18 seconds remaining at its own five-yard line. Quarterback John Dutton threw deep, connecting with receiver Kevin McKenzie for 37 yards. An illegal hands to the face penalty on Georgia moved the Crush forward to the Force four-yard line, setting up the winning field goal attempt. Colorado's Willis Marshall ran for three scores in the first half, the most for one player in an ArenaBowl since Art Schlichter ran for four in ArenaBowl IV. Marshall also snared six receptions for 111 yards and a score, and tacked on four tackles on defense to walk away with Ironman and Offensive Player of the Game honors. Colorado's win was a milestone for co-owners Pat Bowlen, Stan Kroenke and John Elway, as each were a part of NFL Championship teams. The Denver Broncos won two Super Bowls under Bowlen's stewardship and Elway's quarterbacking, while Kroenke was a minority owner of the St. Louis Rams during that team's championship season with Arena Football alum Kurt Warner behind center in 1999.

Chicago 69, Orlando 61 – Las Vegas was a fitting setting for high-octane offensive performances by Chicago and Orlando, with the Rush coming out on top, 69-61. The defining moment of the game came when WR/LB Etu Molden caught a pass off the net with less than two minutes left, extending Chicago's lead to 62-47. The lead proved to be insurmountable at that point, sending the Rush home with the franchise's first ArenaBowl title. Orlando was held scoreless in the first quarter, the first time any team failed to score in the first quarter in ArenaBowl history. The Predators offense then reeled off four touchdowns in the second period, including two to WR/LB Javarus Dudley in less than a minute to take a 14-10 lead. The second score was set up after the Predators forced a turnover on the next kickoff return. The Rush responded with three second quarter touchdowns of their own, including two to offensive specialist Bobby Sippio. They added a 51-yard field goal in the closing seconds of the first half to take a 34-28 lead into halftime. The Rush continued to keep the pressure on the Predators throughout the second half. A Matt D'Orazio 15-yard touchdown pass to Dajuan Alfonzo gave the Rush a two possession lead with 27 seconds remaining in the game that Orlando was unable to overcome. D'Orazio was named Offensive Player of the Game, while Dennison Robinson won Defensive Player of the Game honors. Chicago's Bob McMillen was named Ironman of the Game. The announced crowd of 13,476 was the highest attendance at an AFL game at the Thomas & Mack Center, exceeding the attendance for ArenaBowl XIX (also played at the TMC), which had an attendance of 10,822.

San Jose 55, Columbus 33 – The San Jose SaberCats won their third championship in six seasons, 55-33, over the Columbus Destroyers. San Jose QB Mark Grieb was named ArenaBowl MVP on the strength of a 24-of-29, 218 yard, four touchdown performance. The SaberCats defense was able to pressure Columbus into a pair of costly turnovers, as both Clevan Thomas and Omarr Smith had interceptions for San Jose. The SaberCats did not have a turnover in the game. With the win, San Jose head coach Darren Arbet joined Tim Marcum as the only head coaches in AFL history to win at least three ArenaBowls. San Jose got the first defensive stop of the game midway through the second quarter on Thomas' interception on a ball thrown by the Destroyers' QB Matt Nagy that was tipped at the line of scrimmage by 'Cats defensive lineman George Williams. Williams then entered the game on offense and caught a one-yard pass from Grieb to give the SaberCats a 27-14 lead that the team would carry on to the second half. After being outscored by Columbus 13-7 in the third quarter, San Jose's offense found a rhythm in the fourth quarter with 21 points to close out the game. In the fourth quarter, San Jose scored on rushing touchdowns by James Roe and Brian Johnson, giving the team three total rushing touchdowns for the night. Columbus, which led the League in rushing during the regular season, managed only one score on the ground on only 11 total yards, while San Jose had 13 total rushing yards. The announced attendance of 17,056 set an AFL record for highest attendance at a game played at a neutral site.

Philadelphia 59, San Jose 56 – Philadelphia QB Matt D'Orazio completed an outstanding season to lead the Soul to their first ArenaBowl title over San Jose, 59-56. The veteran joined John Dutton as the only quarterbacks to lead two different teams to wins in ArenaBowl championships (Dutton accomplished the feat with San Jose in 2002, then Colorado in 2005). D'Orazio completed 26-of-43 passes for 302 yards and seven touchdowns to win game MVP honors for the second time in his career. He began the season as the backup to Tony Graziani after being released by Chicago following an injury-plagued 2007 campaign. Soul receiver Chris Jackson earned Offensive Player of the Game honors by catching 11 passes for 146 yards and three touchdowns. San Jose scored touchdowns on its first three possessions, but Philadelphia made two key defensive stops to turn a 20-14 deficit into a 34-20 advantage. The SaberCats turned the ball over on downs to stop one possession and Soul defensive back Eddie Moten picked off San Jose quarterback Mark Grieb on the next. It was the only interception of the game thrown by Grieb, who led the AFL in interceptions thrown in 2008. Grieb had another miscue in the third quarter when he fumbled the ball through the end zone, allowing Philadelphia to take a 46-27 lead. San Jose made the last half-minute interesting, scoring 16 points in 11 seconds with the help of an onside kick they caught on the hop and returned to the Philadelphia 14. Philadelphia, which rallied from a 33-7 deficit on the road to beat San Jose 58-57 in the regular season, finally sealed the win by recovering a second onside kick. San Jose's Rodney Wright set an ArenaBowl record with 13 catches, including seven in the first quarter. Jason Geathers, a linebacker subbing for injured wide receiver James Roe, added five touchdown receptions, tying an ArenaBowl record (also held by Roe, set in ArenaBowl XVIII). The game marked the first ArenaBowl that used instant replay review. Philadelphia survived three replay challenges by San Jose, while the Soul was successful on its lone challenge of the game.

Spokane 69, Tampa Bay 57 – The Storm and Shock went into the ArenaBowl with similar regular seasons statistics, but the Shock proved to be the offensive powerhouse in the first matchup of the two franchises in league history. The Storm were the first to draw blood as LB Eric Ortiz rushed in a three-yard score with approximately 8:16 remaining in the first quarter to take a 7-0 lead. Spokane wasn't far behind, however, scoring a touchdown of their own minutes later. The Shock marched down the field, driven by the QB Kyle Rowley-to-WR Markee White connection. Rowley eventually found an open WR Huey Whittaker for a touchdown, sending the crowd into a frenzy. The excitement of the score was overshadowed in the waning minute of the quarter, however, when Shock DL Jeremy Geathers sacked and forced Tampa QB Brett Dietz to fumble. The fumble was recovered by DL Richard Clebert, who was taken down just shy of a score. The second quarter was all about White, as Rowley found him open four times for scores. White's second touchdown of the quarter was a wide open leaping catch as he crashed against the back boards to bring the score to 20-7 in favor of the Shock. The Storm began to slowly chip away at the Shock's lead and eventually managed to take a one-point advantage with less than 30 seconds left in the half. But with 10 seconds left, Rowley once again found White for an easy score to take a 34-28 halftime lead. The Shock utilized the third quarter to slowly build a lead, aided by multiple penalties on the Storm. Tampa Bay's only score of the quarter came in the final minutes when Ortiz again rushed in another score to head into the fourth quarter down 35-48. Rowley found the open hands of Whittaker and White, as well as OL Ed Ta'amu, who rushed in a score to put the Shock up 62-41. Tampa Bay had one last score in the final minute to put them within 12, but Spokane obtained possession and watched the final seconds click off the clock as the sold out crowd of 11,017 erupted

Jacksonville 73, Arizona 70 – Jacksonville Sharks QB Aaron Garcia threw the most important pass of his 17-year career in ArenaBowl XXIV. With two seconds left on the clock, the Sharks lined up on the Rattlers’ 10-yard line. Dodging a sack, Garcia threw a 10-yard pass in the end zone to wide receiver Jeron Harvey. The score put Jacksonville ahead 73-70, upending the Arizona Rattlers on a gutsy call as time expired. The opening quarter saw the Rattlers jump on the board first with a two-yard rush from Odie Armstrong. Jacksonville answered by scoring just a minute later. Both teams scored two touchdowns the first quarter, but Jacksonville missed both extra points, putting the score at 14-12. To start the second quarter, Jacksonville took the lead for the first time after Jomo Wilson recovered a fumble in the end zone. After trading scores for most of the quarter, with 15 seconds left in the first half, Jacksonville fumbled in Arizona’s territory, giving Arizona the chance to take back the lead. The Rattlers went into halftime with the lead, 35-32. A defensive battle in the third eventually gave the ball to the Rattlers in the red zone, leading to a 9-yard touchdown reception by Odie Armstrong. Jacksonville ended the scoring for the third quarter after nabbing a touchdown, but missed another extra point to make the score 38-42. The fourth quarter started with Armstrong bulldozing his way into the end zone for Arizona to make it a two-possession game. The Sharks answered with a 45-yard drive to score on a touchdown by Simmons. The Sharks posted 35 points in the fourth quarter, while Arizona had 28, the most combined points in any quarter in ArenaBowl history. In the final minute of play, each team scored two touchdowns. Arizona was the first to score in the final minute with a five-yard pass to WR Chris Jackson to nab a three point lead. Twelve seconds later, Jacksonville scored. Arizona scored once more, but Garcia would end up heaving the 10-yard touchdown pass with no time left on the clock to seal the victory for Jacksonville.

Arizona 72, Philadelphia 54 – For the first time since 1997, the Foster Trophy headed back to Arizona, as the Rattlers defeated the Philadelphia Soul, 72-54, to win ArenaBowl XXV in New Orleans. The championship victory marked the third AFL title in franchise history. Coming into the game, Arizona had lost in each of their last four ArenaBowl appearances including 2011’s last-second thriller against the Jacksonville Sharks. Nick Davila, National Guard MVP of the Game, Nick Davila, finished his MVP night 23-for-30 for 266 yards and nine touchdowns, seven of which found Offensive Player of the Game, Maurice Purify. The All-Arena receiver came away with nine catches for 143 yards. Brandon Anderson led the Rattlers defense with 10 tackles, while Brown added five tackles and two interceptions. For the Soul, Raudabaugh completed 26-of-42 passes for 285 yards and seven touchdowns. He also earned the unenviable distinction of becoming the first quarterback in AFL history to throw three interceptions in a single half, tossing three picks in the first two periods of play. Ironman of the Game, Jeff Hughley, led the Soul in receiving yards with 93, while Larry Brackins finished with a team-high four touchdown receptions. Derrick Ross also found the end zone twice for the Soul. Arizona did not trail in the game.

Arizona 48, Philadelphia 39 – For the first time since 1996, the Arena Football League had a repeat champion. The Arizona Rattlers defeated the Philadelphia Soul, 48-39, to win ArenaBowl XXVI in front of a crowd of 12,039 in Orlando and a national audience on the CBS Television Network. The Rattlers became the first team since the Tampa Bay Storm in 1995-96 to repeat as ArenaBowl champions and the only team in League history to beat the same team twice in back-to-back years to win titles. Russell Athletic Offensive Player of the Game and ArenaBowl MVP Rod Windsor led all receivers with 145 receiving yards to go along with a pair of touchdowns in the Rattlers' win. His quarterback, Nick Davila completed 20-of-29 for 315 yards and six scores. Davila also became the League's all-time leader in ArenaBowl touchdown passes with 23 for his career, breaking Mark Grieb's previous career mark of 20. Riddell Defensive Player of the Game Virgil Gray recorded 9.5 tackles and a key interception in the win. The Soul were led on offense by J. Lewis Small Playmaker of the Game Ryan McDaniel, who tied an ArenaBowl record with 13 receptions to go along with 137 yards and two touchdowns. Philadelphia quarterback Dan Raudabaugh tied Kurt Warner's mark for most passes attempted in an ArenaBowl with 51 attempts in the loss. Raudabaugh finished 31-of-51 for 306 yards and four touchdowns with two interceptions. The back-and-forth matchup was a classic AFL meeting that went down to the wire. Just as they did seven times at ArenaBowl XXV, Rattlers quarterback Nick Davila found receiver Maurice Purify for the first score of the game. Dan Raudabaugh answered back with a 15-yard scoring strike of his own to receiver Ryan McDaniel. Just as it appeared the high-powered Rattlers offense would be rolling to another score on their second drive of the game, Philadelphia defensive back Rayshaun Kizer picked off an errant Davila pass off the net to shift the momentum over to the Soul side. However, on the ensuing possession, Rattlers All-Arena defensive back Virgil Gray made an exceptional play on the ball in the end zone to give possession back to Arizona with 28 seconds to play in the first quarter. To open the second quarter, Davila connected with Rod Windsor on a perfectly thrown pass matched with a one-handed catch for a score to put Arizona on top 14-7. Philadelphia answered right back with a lengthy drive, culminating in a Derrick Ross touchdown run to even the score once again. The Rattlers regained the lead with 5:47 to play in the first half after Davila hit Purify on a crossing route for a 47-yard touchdown. The touchdown catch was the longest since ArenaBowl XI when Calvin Schexnayder hauled in a 49-yard score. Philadelphia responded with another long drive, ending with Raudabaugh finding Anthony Jones for a touchdown with 52 seconds left in the first half. The Soul defense stood strong despite the field position, limiting Arizona to a field goal on the drive. Not to be outdone, Arizona stopped the Soul offense on their next drive, as Rattlers nose guard Anttaj Hawthorne blocked a Martinez field goal attempt that would have tied the game. Arizona took a 24-21 lead into the locker room at halftime. Philadelphia received the ball to start the second half and took their first lead of the game on a touchdown catch by McDaniel. Carlos Martinez could not convert on the extra point, limiting the Soul lead to three, 27-24. Arizona would answer right back, however. After Rod Windsor suffered an injury midway through the third quarter, receiver Kerry Reed entered the game and made an immediate impact, hauling in the go-ahead touchdown with just more than six minutes to play in the quarter. Raudabaugh was intercepted in the end zone again on the next drive, this time by Jack linebacker Jeremy Kellem, to give Arizona an opportunity to double-up. The third quarter ended with the Rattlers on top, 31-27. Arizona opened the fourth quarter with a Davila touchdown pass to Windsor, who returned to the lineup after being shaken up in the third. Lindholm tacked on the extra point to give the Rattlers an 11-point lead, 38-27, early in the fourth. The Soul and Tiger Jones answered quickly with a touchdown; however, Martinez missed another extra point off the iron, leaving the score at 38-33, Rattlers with 11:31 to play in regulation. Two minutes later, Davila found Tysson Poots for a 14-yard touchdown to put the Rattlers back up by 12. Philadelphia answered with a Derrick Ross touchdown run to bring the Soul within a touchdown, despite another missed extra point from Martinez. The game reached its high point when Philadelphia forced a fumble as Rod Windsor rushed towards the end zone. However, Philadelphia was unable to capitalize on the turnover, as defensive back Arkeith Brown laid a big hit that broke up a pass to Soul receiver Tiger Jones on fourth down to seal the victory for the Rattlers. To top off the repeat win, AFL Kicker of the Year Garrett Lindholm chipped in a 24-yard field goal to bring the final score to 48-39.
