BLACK KNIGHTS KICK OFF 2011 AT NORTHERN ILLINOIS

Army begins quest for back-to-back winning seasons

- The Black Knights kick off their 122nd season of competition on Saturday evening with their first trip Northern Illinois. It is the third straight season that Army has started its campaign away from West Point, and the fifth consecutive season the Black Knights have made their season debut opposite a Mid-American Conference foe.
- Head coach Rich Ellerson's third season begins on Saturday. In only two seasons, Ellerson has guided the Black Knights to 12 victories, its first winning season since 1996 and its first bowl win since 1985. Ellerson's 12 wins in his first two seasons are the most by an Army coach since Tom Cahill won 16 games in 1966 and 1967.
- After a 12-year losing streak in season openers, the Black Knights have started 1-0 in each of Ellerson's first two seasons. Army has not won three straight season debuts since an eight-game winning streak from 1990-96.
- Offensively, Army returns plenty of experience at the skill positions, but must replace four starters along the offensive front. The good news is that, while not boasting a great number of starts during their career, the front five is full of upperclassmen who have seen plenty of field duty during their West Point tenure. Left guard Frank Allen is the lone returning starter, listing with the first team in all 13 games a year ago. Of the 13 players listed on the depth chart, five are seniors, five are juniors, two are sophomores and one is a freshman.
- Junior FB **Jared Hassin** is back in the lineup after recording the 14th 1,000-yard rushing season in Academy history. Hassin ran for a team-high 1,013 yards and nine touchdowns in 13 games as a sophomore. Only Carlton Jones (2004-2005) and Mike Mayweather (1988-90) have run for at least 1,000 yards in consecutive seasons.
- Junior QB **Trent Steelman** is scheduled to start his 26th consecutive game on Saturday. Steelman has been under center in every game of his Army career. Steelman's current streak already ranks second in Army history behind Leamon Hall's 30 straight turns from 1975-77.
- Senior linebackers **Steven Erzinger** and **Andrew Rodriguez** highlight the returning lettermen on defense. Erzinger has started 25 straight games and was the Black Knights' second-leading tackler last season with 76 stops. Rodriguez led the team with 85 tackles during the 2009 season before missing all of 2010 with a back injury. Junior DE **Jarett Mackey** also bring his 4.0 sacks and 6.5 tackles for loss back to the defensive front.

SCOUTING THE HUSKIES

- Northern Illinois is the first of six teams the Black Knights will face with head coaches in their first year on their respective sidelines. NIU coach Dave Doeren came to DeKalb after five seasons as defensive coordinator in Wisconsin. A 16-year collegiate coaching veteran, Doeren has been a part of eight bowl teams, including all five years with the Badgers. He also helped USC to the 1998 Sun Bowl as a graduate assistant, Kansas to the 2003 Tangerine Bowl and 2005 Fort Worth Bowl as linebackers coach and as co-defensive coordinator, respectively.
- Fifth-year senior QB Chandler Harnish returns to lead the high-octane Northern Illinois offense. Harnish led the Huskies to 450.0 yards per game last season, the 19th-best average in the nation. Individually, he ranked 32nd nationally with 258.92 yards of offense per game. He threw for 2,530 yards and 21 touchdowns, while rushing for 836 yards and seven scores. Harnish's 2010 pass efficiency rating of 157.82 was the 11th best in the country last season.
- Senior Jasmin Hopkins is the team's top returning running back. Hopkins played in 13 games last season, running for 366 yards and two touchdowns on only 38 carries (9.6 yds/rush). Hopkins and sophomore Akeem Daniels (8.7 yds/carry) will try to replace Chad Spann who ran for 1,388 yards and 22 touchdowns during his final season.
- Northern Illinois returns its top two receivers in Willie Clark and Martel Moore. Clark caught 42 passes for 602 yards and seven scores, while Moore added 40 receptions for 525 yards and four scores.
- Defensively, the Huskies were among the nation's best units in 2010. NIU ranked 26th in total defense, allowing 334.71 yards per game. The team ranked 14th nationally in scoring defense at 18.93 points per game. Junior SS Tommy Davis is the Huskies' leading returning tackler. Davis posted 73 stops, fourth best on the team last season, and recovered a team-high four fumbles.
- Junior DE Sean Progar racked up 10.0 tackles for loss, including four sacks in 2010. Program ranked second on the team in tackles behind the line and was third on the team in sacks a year ago.
- Sophomore Mathew Sims takes over the full-time kicking duties in 2011. In limited time last season, he hit two of his three field goal tries and four of his six extra point opportunities. Sims also kicked off twice for an average of 46.0 yards per kick.
- The Huskies will also have a new punter in 2011. Josh Wilber handled the punting duties last season, but redshirt junior Ryan Neir is now listed first on the depth chart.
- Northern Illinois was picked to finish second in the MAC West Division in the conference's preseason media poll. The Huskies received eight first-place votes and finished just two points behind preseason favorite Toledo. Northern Illinois also garnered three votes to win the 2011 MAC Championship Game. Army will also face East Division preseason favorite Miami (Ohio) this season.

- The Black Knights and Huskies have met once before. The Black Knights scored a 21-14 victory at Michie Stadium on Nov. 14, 1992. Saturday marks Army's first visit to DeKalb.

ARMY VERSUS THE MID-AMERICAN CONFERENCE

- Northern Illinois is the first of four Mid-American Conference squads the Black Knights will face in 2011. All four games will take place away from West Point. Army is also scheduled to visit Ball State, Miami (Ohio) and Temple.
- Army played three games against the MAC in 2010, going 2-1. The Black Knights scored wins over Eastern Michigan and Kent State, but lost to Temple.
- 2011 marks the sixth straight season Army has played at least one game versus a MAC opponent. It is the fifth straight year Black Knights have opened the season versus a Mid-American Conference foe (Akron, 2007; Temple, 2008; Eastern Michigan, 2009, 2010).
- The Black Knights are 8-8 against the MAC since 2005. (2005: 1-1; 2006: 1-0; 2007: 1-2; 2008: 1-3; 2009: 2-1; 2010: 2-1).
- Army is 21-13 all-time against teams currently competing in the MAC (Akron, 3-1; Ball State, 2-0; Buffalo, 1-2; Central Michigan, 0-2; Eastern Michigan, 4-0; Kent State, 2-0; Miami, 2-2; Northern Illinois, 1-0; Ohio, 1-0; Temple, 4-4; Western Michigan, 1-1).

THE LAST MEETING — ARMY 21, NIU 14 (NOV. 14, 1992)

WEST POINT, N.Y. — Touchdowns in each of the first three quarters proved just enough as the Black Knights got back on the winning track with a 21-14 victory in their first-ever meeting with Northern Illinois.

Army rushed for 350 yards, while limiting the Huskies to a season-low 89 yards on the ground. Running back Le Shon Johnson, who entered the game averaging 133 yards per game on the ground, ran for only 68 yards versus Army.

The Black Knights controlled the ball for just less than 40 minutes, allowing NIU to have the ball for just seven minutes, 48 seconds during the second half. The Black Knights were forced to punt just three times, while running 88 plays.

Army allowed two NIU quarterbacks to throw for 252 yards, but thwarted drives with interceptions by Aaron Mitchell, Jason Sutton and Mike McElrath.

Northern Illinois broke into the scoring column first, getting a two-yard touchdown run from quarterback Scott Crabtree midway through the first quarter. Army quickly evened the score with a 74-yard march dominated by the ground game. Rookie Akili King did the honors with a one-yard touchdown run. Army added another touchdown before the half ended on a seven-yard run by Steve Weber.

The Black Knights expanded their lead to 21-7 on the final play of the third quarter when Chad Davis cashed in McElrath's interception with a two-yard scoring run. Both sides missed field goal tries in the fourth quarter, but NIU pulled within a touchdown with 2:10 left when Rob Rugai threw a 24-yard touchdown pass to William Patrick. The Huskies on-side kick attempt landed in the arms of John Lane to preserve the Army victory.

ARMY IN OVERTIME

- After playing just one overtime game between 1996 and 2005, Army has had seven games go to an extra session in its last 57 outings.
- Army lost its last overtime game, a 23-20 setback versus Rutgers on Oct. 16, 2010. Army is now 6-2 all-time in overtime. Army is 5-0 at Michie Stadium in overtime.
- Army has played at least one overtime game in each of the last five seasons.
- Army has allowed just 16 points in its eight overtime games. Rutgers' game-winning score was the first time the opponent reached the end zone after regulation since Louisville scored a touchdown in the first overtime in 1999. It stopped a streak of seven straight overtime periods without allowing a touchdown.

ARMY IN SEASON OPENERS

- Army owns a sterling 93-25-3 record in its previous 121 season-opening games (.781).
- The Black Knights' 31-27 victory at Eastern Michigan in last season's opener marked Army's second straight win in its season opener. It is the first time Army has won back-to-back season openers since a seven-game run from 1990-96. Army started 0-1 in 12 straight seasons from 1997-2008.
- While Saturday's game marks just the 11th time Army has opened a season away from Michie Stadium, it has become the norm in recent years. It is the sixth time in seven seasons the Black Knights have made their debut away from Michie Stadium. The Black Knights are 2-8 in their previous season openers away from West Point. The only wins came at Eastern Michigan in 2009 and 2010.
- Army head coach Rich Ellerson is 6-5 in season openers in his previous 11 years as a head coach.

ARMY TEAM NOTES

ROAD WARRIORS

- Army scored its sixth consecutive win on an opponent's home field in the 2010 Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl against SMU at Gerald Ford Stadium in Dallas, Texas. The Black Knights have won six straight games played in their opponent's home stadium for the first time since a six-game winning streak over the 1966 and 1967 seasons. A win on Saturday would Army's longest road winning streak since a 10-game run from 1948-50. During the current streak, Army has lost to Navy twice at Lincoln Financial Field, Rutgers at the New Meadowlands Stadium and Notre Dame at Yankee Stadium.
- Under head coach Rich Ellerson, Army is 7-3 in true road games. The Black Knights were 4-15 on opponents' home fields from 2005-08.

BROTHERLY LOVE

- The Black Knights have three sets of brothers on its current roster — sophomores **Jordan and Julian Crockett**, juniors **A.J. and Jarett Mackey**, and sophomore **Corey** and junior **Zach Watts**.
- The Crockett and Watts' brothers are both sets of twins. Corey Watts attended Lafayette in 2008 and the U.S. Military Academy Prep School in 2009 before enrolling at West Point last season. Zach Watts entered West Point in 2009 after a season at Fork Union Military Academy. A.J. Mackey is 11 months older than Jarett. Both graduated from high school in 2008 and enrolled at West Point in 2009 after a season at the prep school.
- In addition, there are two players on the roster whose older siblings have played at West Point. Sophomore LB Justin Trimble is the third brother to play for the Black Knights. His oldest brother, Jeremy, graduated in 2008 as Army's all-time leader in receptions and receiving yards. Older brother, Jordan, graduated this past spring and was a fixture in the Army secondary, earning Academic All-America accolades last season. Freshman DL Mike Ugenyi is the younger brother of Victor Ugenyi, a 2010 graduate who started three years along Army's defensive front.

YOUTHFUL EXUBERANCE

- Army will experience a youth movement during the 2011 season. The Army roster contains only one player who has earned three varsity letters during their West Point career — senior LB Steven Erzinger. Last year's team featured seven players that had three letters entering the season. Of the 150 players on the current roster, 94 are freshmen or sophomores. Fifty-three players have yet to earn a varsity letter.
- Entering preseason practice, senior CB Antuan Aaron was in the same category as Erzinger, but Aaron suffered a season-ending neck injury during the first week of preseason camp.

LAUNDRY DAY

- Army has ranked in the top 35 in fewest penalties per game every season since 2006. The 34th-place showing (5.42/game) in 2009 is the only time in that span the Black Knights have finished outside the top 10.
- The Black Knights were fourth in the nation in fewest penalties per game (4.23) last season.
- In its seven wins in 2010, the Black Knights averaged 2.9 penalties for 25.0 yards and gave opponents a total of four first downs by penalty. In its six losses, Army committed an average of 5.8 penalties for 59.5 yards and gave its foes 16 first downs by penalty.

FAST STARTS KEY VICTORIES

- After holding a 16-0 lead at halftime in their season-ending win against SMU in the 2010 Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl, Army improved to 10-5 under Rich Ellerson when leading at intermission.
- The win in last season's opener at Eastern Michigan, in which the score was knotted at 14-14 at halftime, was only the 10th time the Black Knights have won when it was either tied or trailing at halftime (10-70) since the start of the 2002 season.
- The Black Knights own a 16-6 mark in their last 22 games when leading at the break.

- Army made one of its goals for the 2010 season to be the No. 1-ranked team in the nation in turnover margin. Army nearly accomplished that goal, finishing the season ranked third in the country at +1.23 per game.
- Army has lost only two game under Rich Ellerson when on the plus side of the turnover battle and just once when holding at least a two-takeaway advantage. The Black Knights are 10-2 when winning the turnover margin under Ellerson.
- Army had its Academy-record three-game streak without a turnover last season. The Black Knights went 190:04 of game action between giveaways.
- In Army's last 12 wins the Black Knights are averaging 3.2 takeaways and hold a +2.3 turnover margin average (38-11 overall). Conversely, in its last 13 losses, Army is averaging just 1.2 takeaway per game and is on the wrong end of a -0.46 turnover margin average (16-22 overall).
- Since the start of 2006, the Black Knights have posted a 14-4 record when winning the turnover battle. On the flip side, Army is 7-35 when the margin is negative or even.
- Army is 1-9 in its last nine games without forcing an opponent turnover.

THE MAGIC NUMBER

- Army won its 12th straight game when holding an opponent to 14 points or less in its 16-14 win over SMU in the 2010 Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl. The last time the Black Knights allowed 14-or-fewer points and lost was Sept. 2, 2006 in a 14-6 loss at Arkansas State. Since 2000, Army is 15-2 when holding opponents to no more than 14 points.
- After the loss to Navy last season, the Black Knights are 20-107 since 1996 when allowing opponents to score 18-or-more points. In that same span, Army is 29-7 when the opponent tallies 17 or less.

GET OFF THE FIELD

- After allowing the first two opponents of last season to convert on 10 of their 19 third-down tries (52.6 percent), Army gave up 50 first downs on the last 125 third-down tries (40.0 percent).
- In the last 25 games, the Black Knights have allowed their opponents to convert only 27.1 percent of their third downs when the line to make is at least seven yards away (46-170). On the flip side, Army's opponents converted 43 of 63 tries (68.3 percent) with three-or-fewer yards to go.

RICH ELLERSON (HAWAI'I, 1977)

At the end of each practice during **Rich Ellerson's** first two seasons, the Black Knights broke the final team huddle by repeating the phrase, "Stay together. Bring it back." Mission accomplished.

Ellerson brought winning football back to West Point in 2010 when he became just the second coach in Army history to win a postseason game. The Black Knights' 16-14 win over SMU in the Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl secured Army's first winning season since 1996.

One of the nation's true triple-option experts, Ellerson agreed to become Army's 36th head football coach on Dec. 26, 2008.

Ellerson is a veteran of nearly 30 years of coaching on the collegiate ranks, including eight as head coach at Cal Poly prior to his arrival at West Point. Not regarded as a traditional FCS power prior to Ellerson's arrival in 2001, Cal Poly finished each of his last four years ranked in the Top 25 of national FCS polls. The Mustangs won at least seven games during each of Ellerson's last six seasons at the helm and spent the majority of the 2008 season ranked in the top 10 of both the FCS Coaches Top 25 Poll and The Sports Network Division I-AA Poll. Cal Poly was ranked No. 3 in the FCS Coaches Poll for the final seven weeks of the regular season (and the last four weeks of The Sports Network Poll) before they were upset in the first round of the FCS playoffs by Weber State on Nov. 29. Before Ellerson's arrival, the Mustangs had not fashioned a winning season since 1997 and had enjoyed only three winning years since 1990.

It didn't take long for Ellerson to put the Black Knights back on the path back to success. A finalist for the 2010 Liberty Mutual Coach of the Year Award, Ellerson has produced more victories in his first two seasons than any Army coach since Tom Cahill won 16 games during the 1966 and 1967 seasons.

Ellerson was named NCAA Division I-AA Independents Coach of the Year in 2003 and a year later was honored as Great West Football Conference Coach of the Year as well as AFCA Region 5 Coach of the Year individual to accomplish that.

The son of a career U.S. Army officer, the Black Knights' head football coach possesses strong ties to West Point, despite spending the majority of his life on the West Coast. While his father, Col. (Ret.) Geoffrey Ellerson, graduated from the Military Academy in 1935, his oldest brother, Maj. Gen. (Ret.) John, lettered for three years on Army's football team and served as team captain for head coach Paul Dietzel's Black Knights in 1962. His other brother, Col. (Ret.) Geoffrey D. Ellerson Jr., also graduated from West Point in 1963, and his nephew, Geoffrey Ellerson III, is an Army Colonel.

Ellerson, who turned 57 on New Year's Day, was born on Jan. 1, 1954, in Yokohama, Japan, while his father was stationed there. He graduated from Tucson's Salpointe High in 1972.

He and his wife, Dawn, have four children: Sean, 32, Shea, 28, Leta, 25, and Andrew, 18, and one granddaughter, Betty, 2.
