# ATLANTIC 10 FOOTBALL CONFERENCE

Embarking on its 10th season in 2006, the Atlantic 10 Football Conference continues to hold the distinction of being the premier conference in I-AA. Although the league did not extend its string of consecutive national champions to three, the 2005 campaign was not without great achievements.

The 2005 season marked the 15th consecutive season that the A-10 received multiple postseason berths as New Hampshire and Richmond advanced to the quarterfinals of the NCAA playoffs, the longest active streak in the nation. Eight teams appeared in the national rankings during the 2005 season and 13 different players earned All-America honors, including New Hampshire quarterback Ricky Santos, who was runner-up in the voting for the prestigious Walter Payton Award, presented to the most outstanding player in I-AA. It marked the sixth consecutive year that an Atlantic 10 student-athlete finished in the top three in the voting. In addition, Villanova's Brian Hulea and Shannon James of Massachusetts were finalists for the Buck Buchanan Award, presented to the top defensive player in I-AA.

For the fourth time in league annals, the Eddie Robinson Award was presented to a head coach in the Conference as Sean McDonnell of New Hampshire became the 19th recipient of the award in 2005. Presented annually by The Sports Network to the most outstanding coach in I-AA, McDonnell guided UNH to an 11-2 record and the program's first-ever No. 1 ranking. He joins current head coaches Andy Talley of Villanova (1997) and James Madison's Mickey Matthews (1999) and former Boston University coach Dan Allen (1993) as recipients of the Eddie Robinson Award, giving the Atlantic 10 the distinction of being the only league with three current head coaches who have won the prestigious honor.

In 2004, James Madison claimed the national championship with a 31-21 win over Montana and in the process became the first program to reach the championship game by winning three road playoff games since the field expanded to 16 teams in 1986. With Delaware registering the lone shutout in the 29-year history of the championship en route to capturing the 2003 crown, the Atlantic 10 became the first Conference to have two different teams win the title in consecutive seasons. Massachusetts defeated Georgia Southern, 55-43, to claim the 1998 title.

What sets the Atlantic 10 apart from other leagues is that its success is not limited to select institutions. In 2004, Delaware and James Madison were joined in the 16-team playoff field by New Hampshire and William & Mary, giving the Conference a record four teams in the postseason. Moreover, all four teams advanced to the quarterfinals, a first for any conference. Since the start of the 2001 season, 10 of the league's 12 current members have advanced to the playoffs.

Despite long odds, the Atlantic 10 has also enjoyed great triumphs over I-A foes. An A-10 team has defeated a I-A program in six of the last eight seasons, including victories by Maine over Mississippi State and New Hampshire versus Rutgers in 2004.

The A-10 has seen four of its student-athletes named the recipient of the Walter Payton Award - William & Mary quarterback Lang Campbell (2004), former Villanova standouts Brian Westbrook (2001) and Brian Finneran (1997) and New Hampshire running back Jerry Azumah (1998). In 2001, linebacker Derrick Lloyd of James Madison became the first A-10 player to win the Buck Buchanan Award, marking the first time in history that the winners of the Walter Payton and Buck Buchanan Awards hailed from the same conference.

The Atlantic 10 Football Conference officially assumed operational control of the Yankee Conference on July 1, 1997, marking the end of a 50-year legacy. Yet a new era began in collegiate football. Delaware, Hofstra, James Madison, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Northeastern, Rhode Island, Richmond, Towson, Villanova, and William & Mary make up the 12-team membership of the league.

The Atlantic 10 Football Conference traces its roots to December 3, 1946 when the Code of the Yankee Conference went into effect. Originally established as an all-sports conference for the New England land grant colleges, the six charter members of the Yankee Conference included Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Rhode Island and Vermont. In 1973, Boston University joined the Conference as its first non-land grant institution.

After the 1974 season, Vermont withdrew from the league. Then, upon the formation of Division I-AA football in 1978, the league disbanded all sports except football. Membership remained stable until 1986 when Delaware and Richmond were admitted. Villanova gained admittance in 1988 and, in 1993, the Conference grew again with James Madison, Northeastern and William & Mary joining the league. Boston University withdrew from the league when it suspended its football program following the 1997 season. Connecticut withdrew following the 1999 season and Hofstra was added beginning with the 2001 campaign. Towson played its first season of Atlantic 10 Football Conference competition in 2004.

Since 1978, Atlantic 10 Football Conference members have accumulated 61 playoff berths, 15 Lambert Cups, 74 final top 25 rankings, and 34 final top 10 rankings. The Conference is fully intent on remaining the best NCAA I-AA conference in the country. In light of the success achieved by the Yankee Conference since 1947 and the Atlantic 10 Football Conference since 1997, the Atlantic 10 figures to continue its national prominence in 2006.

# A-10 TIE-BREAKING PROCEDURE

The following tie-breaker format is utilized for determining the overall champion of the Atlantic 10 Football Conference:

## TIE WITHIN DIVISION

1. Head-to-head competition.
2. Division winning percentage.
3. Record versus the highest-placed teams in the division and proceeding down.
4. Record versus the highest-placed common opponents in the opposite division and proceeding down.
5. Should a tie remain, one (1) point will be awarded for a victory versus a I-AA opponent from the following conferences: Big Sky, Big South, Gateway, Ivy, Mid-Eastern Athletic, Ohio Valley, Patriot, Southern, Southland, Southwestern Athletic, and current independents; one-half (0.5) point will be awarded for a victory versus a I-AA opponent from the following conferences: Metro Atlantic, Northeast, and Pioneer; and two (2) points will be awarded for a victory versus a I-A opponent. In addition, one (1) point will be deducted for a loss to a Division II or Division III opponent. Points will not be awarded for a victory versus a Division II or III institution, nor will points be deducted for a loss to a Division I-A or I-AA institution. The team with the most points would be declared the automatic qualifier.
6. If the above tie-breakers fail, a conference call with the directors of athletics from the institutions not involved in the tie will be convened by the Commissioner. The directors of athletics, with input from the head coaches, would then declare the Conference's automatic qualifier.

*Note:* All ties are broken in descending order. When arriving at another set of tied teams while comparing records, use each team's record against the tied teams as a group rather than individually.

*Note:* Once a team has been eliminated at any point, the process reverts back to the beginning with the remaining tied teams.

*Note:* Only Conference games will be considered when applying the above provisions.

## TIE OUTSIDE DIVISION

1. Head-to-head competition.
2. Combined winning percentage versus all common Atlantic 10 opponents.
3. Should a tie remain, one (1) point will be awarded for a victory versus a I-AA opponent from the following conferences: Big Sky, Big South, Gateway, Ivy, Mid-Eastern Athletic, Ohio Valley, Patriot, Southern, Southland, Southwestern Athletic, and current independents; one-half (0.5) point will be awarded for a victory versus a I-AA opponent from the following conferences: Metro Atlantic, Northeast, and Pioneer; and two (2) points will be awarded for a victory versus a I-A opponent. In addition, one (1) point will be deducted for a loss to a Division II or Division III opponent. Points will not be awarded for a victory versus a Division II or III institution, nor will points be deducted for a loss to a Division I-A or I-AA institution. The team with the most points would be declared the automatic qualifier.
4. If the above tie-breakers fail, a conference call with the directors of athletics from the institutions not involved in the tie will be convened by the Commissioner. The directors of athletics, with input from the head coaches, would then declare the Conference's automatic qualifier.

*Note:* If there are a minimum of three teams involved in a tie, the outside division tie-breaker will be used.

*Note:* All ties are broken in descending order. When arriving at another set of tied teams while comparing records, use each team's record against the tied teams as a group rather than individually.

*Note:* Once a team has been eliminated at any point, the process reverts back to the beginning with the remaining tied teams. If the remaining teams are all from the same division, then the tie within division tie-breaker will be used; if not, continue with above.

*Note:* Only Conference games will be considered when applying the above provisions.

# COMMISSIONER LINDA BRUNO



The 2006-07 season marks the 13th season with Linda Bruno as commissioner of the Atlantic 10 Conference. In that time, she has guided the league to unprecedented prosperity and acclaim while bettering the quality of the student-athlete experience.

Bruno spearheaded the Atlantic 10's move into college football by orchestrating the league's operational takeover of the Yankee

Conference in 1997. Since then, she has presided over a league that has seen three national champions crowned - Massachusetts (1998), Delaware (2003), and James Madison (2004) - the only three national champions in the history of the Yankee/Atlantic 10 Football Conferences. Since 1997, four players have earned the prestigious Walter Payton Award as the best player in Division I-AA football, one player has earned the Buck Buchanan Award as the division's top defensive player - all firsts in league history - and three coaches have won the Eddie Robinson Award as the best coach in I-AA. Moreover, Bruno strengthened the Atlantic 10 Football Conference with the additions of Hofstra University (2001) and Towson University (2004).

Since being named the fourth full-time commissioner of the Atlantic 10 Conference on June 14, 1994, Bruno has strengthened the Atlantic 10's membership with the additions of Charlotte, Dayton, Fordham, La Salle, Richmond and Saint Louis; negotiated television deals that are the most lucrative and extensive packages in league history; was among the first to sign a contract with College Sports Television; added women's rowing, men's and women's outdoor track & field, and women's lacrosse to the Conference's championship slate; and created officiating bureaus for baseball, field hockey, men's and women's soccer, and women's volleyball to better serve those Atlantic 10 programs.

Her efforts have not gone unnoticed nationally as she was named among the top 20 most influential women in sports business by *Street & Smith's Sports Business Journal* - the only collegiate administrator to be recognized. She earned the 2004 Outstanding Commissioner Award from the All-American Football Foundation and was named 1995 Person of the Year by *Eastern Basketball* magazine.

Bruno's comprehensive background in Division I athletics has provided her with extensive experience in the areas of compliance, membership, television, and licensing, which serve her well as she confronts issues affecting not only the Atlantic 10, but all Division I institutions.

In her role as Atlantic 10 commissioner, Bruno has been instrumental in ensuring that the Conference continues to maximize television exposure. The Emmy Award-winning Atlantic 10 Television Network will again produce three A-10 Football Conference games on its regional package in 2006. In addition, the Conference's contract with College Sports Television will insure that additional football games will be televised during the course of the season.

Bruno also oversees the football, baseball, men's and women's basketball, field hockey, men's and women's soccer, and women's volleyball officiating programs and continues the Conference's dedication to student-athletes by endorsing the sponsorship of Academic All-Conference teams in each of its sports.

Prior to joining the Atlantic 10, Bruno spent 11 years with the Big East Conference, where she served in various capacities. She joined the league in 1983 as its director of championships before being elevated to associate commissioner in 1987. She held that position when she was named commissioner of the Atlantic 10 Conference.

In her previous role, Bruno oversaw the administration of 18 Big East championships, as well as serving as the league's compliance administrator. Additionally, Bruno assisted with the development of the league's women's basketball Game of the Week television package, coordinated its awards programs, and oversaw scheduling in several sports.

The Iona College graduate began her career in intercollegiate athletics in 1977 at her alma mater, serving as an administrative assistant to the director of athletics for one year. She served in several athletics administration positions during her five years at Iona before accepting the position of manager of contests and promotions at Yale University in 1982. After her promotion to assistant athletic director, Bruno joined the Big East in 1983. Bruno was inducted into the Iona Athletic Hall of Fame during the summer of 1998.

A native of Pelham Manor, NY, Bruno received her Master's degree from Iona and currently serves on its Board of Trustees. She resides in Philadelphia, PA.

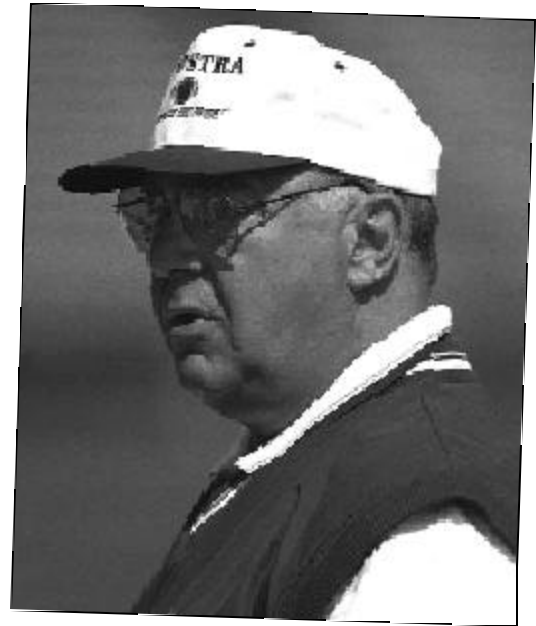

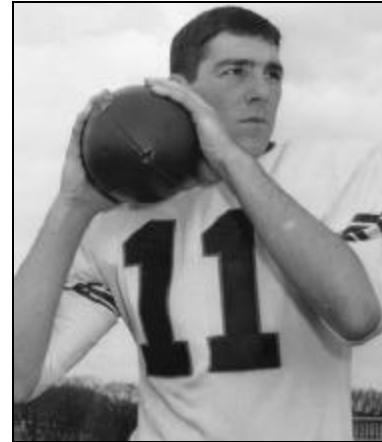

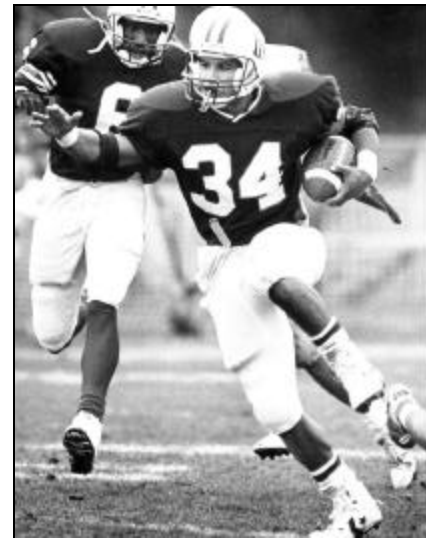
