SEC FOOTBALL VIDEO REPLAY

THE OBJECTIVE

To allow for specific types of officiating calls to be immediately reviewed during all games hosted by SEC teams.

THE COACHES' CHALLENGE

The head coach may challenge the ruling of any reviewable play. He retains a challenge if his initial challenge is successful and thus results in a reversal by the replay official. The head coach will then have a single challenge that he may use anytime during the game if his team has not used all its timeouts. Thus a team may have a total of two challenges in the game, but only if the first results in a reversal of the on-field ruling.

THE SOURCE

All reviewable video comes direct from either the television network broadcasting the game or other TV production facilities that meet established conference standards. The Southeastern Conference has used instant replay since 2005.

THE PLAYS

Reviewable

1. Plays governed by Sideline, Goal Line, End Zone, and End Line:
 - a. Scoring Plays, including the ball in possession of a runner breaking the plane of the goal line
 - b. Runner/receiver in or out of bounds
 - c. Recovery of loose ball in and out of bounds
2. Passing Plays:
 - a. Pass ruled complete/ incomplete/ intercepted in the field of play and end zones
 - b. Touching of a forward pass by a player or an official
 - c. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off beyond the line of scrimmage
 - d. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing off after change of possession
 - e. Forward or backward pass thrown from behind the line of scrimmage
 - f. Quarterback (Passer) starts arm forward, ball comes loose and play is ruled incomplete (if ball is quickly recovered)
 - g. Quarterback (Passer) throws incomplete swing pass that is close to being forward or backward, and pass is ruled forward (if ball is quickly recovered)
3. Miscellaneous:
 - a. Runner ruled not down.
 - b. Runner ruled down (when ball carrier is judged down by rule and the ball is fumbled, play may be reviewed if recovery of ball occurs in the immediate action following fumble and is prior to any official signaling ball is dead. Also reviewable when runner is ruled out of bounds near goal line.)
 - c. Forward progress with respect to first down
 - d. Touching of a kick
 - e. Number of players on field
 - f. Clock adjustments (in conjunction with reviewed plays)
 - g. Fourth-down/try fumble plays
 - h. Field Goal Attempts (only when ball is ruled below or above the crossbar, inside or outside the uprights when it is lower than the top of the uprights.)
 - i. The game clock expires at the end of a half. If at the end of the game, the time may be restored to the clock only if the score is tied or the team that would next snap the ball trails by eight points or fewer.

THE PROCESS

Each SEC football stadium has a secured replay booth equipped with the HD Instant Replay system provided by XOS Digital. Three individuals work in the booth for the duration of the game: 1. Replay Official, 2. Communicator, 3. Technician. The Replay Official and the Communicator are selected and assigned by the Conference Office.

A live HD video feed is sent directly to the replay booth from the TV truck. The Technician watches the feed on an input monitor while recording it into the XOS Digital Replay System. The Technician also marks the beginning of each play while the Communicator marks all incoming replays.

Each play and subsequent replay then appears on a touch screen in front of the Replay Technician. As the Technician and the Communicator mark the incoming video, each view will appear as a small picture on the computer touch screen. At any time, the Replay Technician can touch the thumbnail and immediately send that play or replay to the Replay Official.

With the Communicator's assistance, the Replay Official can quickly jump between replays while playing back the video. All replay video navigation is done via a jog shuttle remote controlled by the Replay Official. All video is viewed on an HD monitor that sits in front of the Replay Official. The touch screen is only used to select the replays and to log specific play data in the event a call is overturned.

While all plays are reviewed between the whistle and the beginning of the next play, the Replay Official can stop play on the field by using a pager system. Five onfield officials wear pagers. If play is stopped the Referee announces on the stadium PA microphone that play has been stopped so the previous play can be reviewed. The Referee then proceeds to the sideline headset, which provides direct communication to the Replay Official in the booth. Once the play has been reviewed, the Replay Official notifies the Referee, who then announces the decision on the stadium PA system.

THE EQUIPMENT

Each SEC member institution uses the HD Replay System developed by XOS Digital of Orlando, FL. The replay systems are maintained by the home institution with technical support from XOS Digital.

SEC FOOTBALL ON TELEVISION

CBS SPORTS

CBS Sports continues to be the exclusive national network broadcaster of SEC home football games, including the SEC Championship Game. CBS Sports will showcase the top conference matchups each week of the package with the "SEC Game of the Week". The agreement also includes a prime time game and doubleheader opportunities. In addition, CBS Sports continues its coverage of SEC regular-season basketball. In addition to the broadcast rights on CBS Sports, this 15-year contract includes certain digital, internet, wireless, Video-on-Demand, data and enhanced highlight rights across all CBS platforms, including CBS College Sports Network and CBSSports.com. Also, simulcasts of CBS Sports games will be available for distribution by the CBS College Sports Network.

ESPN

ESPN is the exclusive national cable home and the syndication rights holder for the SEC, including every SEC home football game (excluding those on the network broadcast package).

ESPN and ESPN2: The networks have increased coverage by combining to televise a minimum of 20 SEC games annually, including Saturday night and two primetime Thursday matchups.

ESPNU: The 24-hour college sports network presents an SEC Game of the Week (generally in primetime and a minimum of 13 games annually) as well as the studio show *SEC Weekly*.

SEC Network (ESPN Regional Television): The nation's largest syndicator of collegiate sports programming, is the official over-the-air syndication home for the SEC and will feature an SEC Game of the Week (generally at noon ET), with a minimum of 13 games each season throughout the SEC footprint and beyond. In addition, ERT produces the integrated SEC Studio show, hosted by Dari Nowkhah, with analyst Matt Stinchcomb, a former University of Georgia and NFL standout.

ESPN360.com: Simulcasts of SEC game telecasts are offered on the broadband sports network.

ESPN Mobile TV: Live games are simulcast on mobile phones.

ESPN International: The agreement includes global rights to present live games and encore presentations.

ESPN Deportes: ESPN holds domestic Spanish-language rights for SEC football on the 24-hour, U.S.-based network.

ESPN GamePlan: The out-of-market college football pay-per-view service, offers SEC action.

ESPN Classic: The network may telecast select SEC live games as well as historic and immediate encore presentations.

ESPN.com: Extensive SEC content, including highlights, will be presented online.

COMCAST/ CHARTER SPORTS SOUTHEAST

Comcast / Charter Sports Southeast (CSS), the regional sports channel focusing on college sports in the southeast, has an agreement with ESPN to televise live Southeastern Conference (SEC) content including a minimum of six football games, twenty men's basketball games, and sixteen women's basketball games as well as fifty SEC Olympic sports each year. The agreement began with the 2009-10 academic year and goes for five years.

FOX SPORTS NET

Fox Sports Net's (FSN) regional sports networks serving the SEC territory – FOX Sports South, FOX Sports Carolinas, FOX Sports Tennessee, Sun Sports, FOX Sports Southwest and FOX Sports Houston – will be the outlets for a minimum of 92 SEC athletic events each year. Events will include eight live, exclusive football games, 20 men's basketball games, 24 women's basketball games (16 regular season, eight tournament), 16 baseball games (10 regular season, six tournament) and 24 additional Olympic sporting events (softball, volleyball, soccer, gymnastics). SEC athletic events on FSN will be distributed to more than 22 million cable and satellite households throughout the SEC territory.

INSTITUTIONAL MEDIA PACKAGES

As part of the SEC's television contracts, each conference institution was able to maintain a contractual television arrangement of its own. As part of this arrangement, each SEC institution has the ability to televise one pay-per-view football game per year as well as to host its own tape-delayed game package, coaches' TV shows as well as other sport packages.

SEC FOOTBALL SHOWS ON TELEVISION

SEC Weekly on ESPNU

SEC Weekly, a one-hour program airs Thursdays at 4:30 p.m. ET on ESPNU, throughout the academic year and will cover SEC sports, including sport-by-sport previews, reviews, specials and features on student-athletes. The show is hosted by Cara Capuano with analyst Matt Stinchcomb, a former University of Georgia All-America and NFL player. *SEC Weekly* is a product of ESPN's landmark 15-year agreement with the Southeastern Conference. ESPNU will complement the show with SEC game telecasts, including football, basketball, Olympic sports and select conference championships.

SEC Gridiron Live

SEC Gridiron LIVE, airing live every Wednesday at 10 p.m. ET, breaks down every SEC game with footage, interviews and analysis. Tim Couch, former Kentucky standout and top pick in the 1999 NFL Draft, joins the live, weekly one-hour show as an analyst, with host Charles Davis and analyst Randy Cross. Also new to the SEC Gridiron LIVE team is social media host Kristina Akra. SECGridironLIVE.com is the hub for the show's social networking component, allowing viewers to participate in the live show and interact instantaneously with the broadcast team and SEC fans across the country.

CBS College Sports SEC Tailgate

Beginning Sept. 18, CBS Sports will start SEC programming with its live pre-game show COLLEGE FOOTBALL TODAY followed by the "SEC Game of the Week" CBS College Sports Network will broadcast SEC TAILGATE on select Saturdays at 2:00 PM, ET, from the site of CBS Sports' SEC Game of the Week. The show brings fans a fast paced and authoritative look at football and life in the SEC. The show captures all the excitement, traditions and festivities from the various campuses and stadiums across the SEC, and features local SEC legends and celebrity alumni.

SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE FOOTBALL NOTES

SEC - FOUR STRAIGHT NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

● Alabama's 37-21 win over Texas in the 2010 BCS National Championship Game gave the Southeastern Conference its fourth straight BCS National Championship and its sixth BCS title overall. The SEC is now 6-0 in BCS National Championship Games (LSU 2-0, Florida 2-0, Alabama 1-0, Tennessee 1-0).

● Alabama is the fourth SEC team to win a BCS National Championship and the third different SEC team to win it during the last four seasons. Tennessee won the BCS' first national title in 1998, LSU won the crown in 2003, Florida's claimed the national championship in 2006 and 2008 while LSU took the title in 2007 and Alabama claimed the national title this past season. The Big 12 has two BCS national titles followed by the ACC, Big Ten, Pac-10 and Big East with one each.

● The SEC is the first conference to claim four consecutive Associated Press (first poll - 1936), National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame (first poll - 1959), Football Writers Association of America (first poll - 1954) and USA Today or UPI Coaches Poll (first poll - 1950) national championships.

● Since SEC expansion in 1992, the SEC has the most national championships (AP, USA Today) with eight. During that time, the SEC has had more teams with national titles than any other conference (4). Here is a breakdown:

SEC - Florida (2008, 2006, 1996), LSU (2003, 2007), Tennessee (1998), Alabama (1992, 2009)

Big 12 - Texas (2005), Oklahoma (2000), Nebraska (1994, 1995, 1997)

ACC - Florida State (1999, 1993)

SEC IN BOWL GAMES

● The SEC has the most wins (14) and the highest winning percentage of any conference that has three-or-more appearances in BCS bowl games. The SEC is 14-5 in BCS games (.737 percentage).

● The SEC finished 6-4 in bowl games this season. Since 2006, the SEC is 25-11 in post-season bowl games (.694). The league has posted a non-losing bowl record for seven straight seasons. The last time the league finished under .500 in bowl games was in 2002 (3-4).

● Since conference expansion in 1992, the SEC has won at least five bowl games in nine of 18 seasons. The SEC has won at least six bowl games during the last four seasons (6-3 in 2006; 7-2 in 2007; 6-2 in 2008; 6-4 in 2009). Those years are the only ones since 1992 the league has won six bowl games.

● The schools that currently comprise the SEC have appeared in 379 bowls (including 2009-10). That is by far the most of any conference in the nation. In its history, the SEC is 196-170-13 in post-season bowl games, a 53.4 winning percentage. The SEC has the nation's top bowl winning percentage surpassing the Pac-10 (120-107-6, 52.8 percentage). Below is a look at how the various conferences have fared in bowl games in its history (using 2009 conference alignments):

● The SEC finished the 2009 season with a non-conference mark of 48-10 (.828). Counting bowl games, the SEC bested its best-ever win total in non-conference games of 47 set in 2007 (40-8 regular season/7-2 bowl mark) and 2006 (41-7 regular season/6-3 bowl mark). Since conference expansion, the SEC's best non-conference winning percentage (counting bowl games) is 37-5 (.881), set in 1997 (32-4 regular season/5-1 bowl mark).

SEC LEADS NATION IN ATTENDANCE AGAIN

● For the 29th straight season, the SEC recorded the largest total attendance figure of any conference in the nation. In 2009, a total of 6,560,738 fans attended 86 games, an average of 76,288 per contest, also tops in the nation. SEC stadiums were filled to 98.10 percent of capacity for each home game in 2009. The SEC had seven of the top 15 schools in total attendance in 2009 - Tennessee (3), Auburn (6), LSU (6), Alabama (7), Florida (8), Georgia (13) and South Carolina (15).

● Since 2000, the Southeastern Conference has had more teams ranked in the final USA Today Coaches Poll than any other conference. The SEC has had 43 teams ranked in the last nine final USA Today Coaches polls, an average of almost five per season. The Big 12 is second with 36 teams ranked since 2000. The SEC has led or tied for lead in most teams ranked in the final USA Today Coaches Polls in seven of the last nine seasons.

● Three SEC schools were among the top 10 in most players on 2009 opening weekend rosters. LSU and Miami (Fla.) led the nation with 41 each, while Georgia was sixth with 35 and Tennessee seventh with 30.

● The SEC had 49 players selected in the 2010 NFL Draft. The number represents the most SEC players ever taken in the NFL Draft. The SEC had the most players taken among conferences in the draft. Behind the SEC's 49 selections were the Big Ten (34), ACC (31), Big 12 (30) and Pac-10 (29).

The highest ranked team at the end of the season, which was unranked at the beginning, was Auburn in 1993 (finished fourth). Arkansas was unranked at the start of the 2006 season.

SEC BOWL AGREEMENTS

The Southeastern Conference has agreements to send nine of its member institutions to postseason bowl games following the 2010 season.

The winner of the SEC Championship Game will automatically participate in the Bowl Championship Series comprised of the Sugar, Rose, Orange and Fiesta Bowls.

The Capital One Bowl has the second selection, making its pick following the BCS selections. The bowl must select the team with the next best overall record or a team that is within one win of the team with the next best overall record.

The AT&T Cotton and the Outback Bowls share the third and fourth selections from the SEC. The Cotton Bowl has the first preference of teams from the Western Division and the Outback Bowl has first preference of teams from the Eastern Division. The Cotton or Outback Bowl can select teams outside of its divisional preference, but must not select them before the opposite bowl selects from its divisional preference.

The Chick-fil-A Bowl has the fifth selection of preference from the SEC. New to the SEC bowl rotation this year, the Gator Bowl has the sixth selection from the SEC.

The Franklin American Mortgage Music City Bowl has the seventh selection from the SEC.

In selections 8-9, the AutoZone Liberty and Birmingham Bowls share the selection over the four-year agreement.

2010 BOWL CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES SCHEDULE

Following the 2010 college football regular season, the Bowl Championship Series will determine the National Championship. The BCS National Championship Game, which will stand alone from the four traditional BCS bowls but will be hosted by each of the bowls once during a four-year cycle.

The BCS consists of the Discover Orange, Allstate Sugar, Rose Bowl Game, Tostitos Fiesta Bowl and the Tostitos BCS National Championship Game. The conferences with automatic berths include the Atlantic Coast, Big East, Big Ten, Big 12, Pac-10 and Southeastern Conferences.

ESPN will televise all of the Bowl Championship Series games.

The Bowl Championship Series guarantees a matchup between college football's top two teams in a true national championship game.

The BCS uses regional consideration regarding team selection. Specifically, as a member of the BCS, the Rose Bowl will host the Big Ten and Pac-10 champions in those years in which either the Rose Bowl does not have the national championship game or the Big Ten and Pac-10 champion is not ranked No. 1 or No. 2. Other "regional consideration" tie-ins include the SEC champion in the Sugar Bowl, the ACC champion in the Orange Bowl and the Big 12 champion in the Fiesta Bowl.

SEC MISSION STATEMENT

"The purpose of the Southeastern Conference is to assist its member institutions in the maintenance of programs of intercollegiate athletics which are compatible with the highest standards of education and competitive sports."

THE SEC

The Southeastern Conference sponsors championships in 20 sports – 11 women's sports and nine men's sports. They include baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, football, men's and women's golf, gymnastics, soccer, softball, men's and women's swimming and diving, men's and women's tennis, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball.

2009-10 ANOTHER BANNER ATHLETIC YEAR FOR THE SEC

The SEC claimed four national championships in the 2009-10 year. SEC teams have won at least four national titles every year since 1991. In eight of its 20 sponsored sports, the SEC had either the national champion or the national runners-up. The SEC had national championships in football (Alabama), men's indoor track & field (Florida), women's swimming & diving (Florida) and baseball (South Carolina).

In its 77 year history, the Southeastern Conference has won 183 team national championships, including 67 since 2000. In this decade, the SEC has won at least one national championship in 16 of its 20 sponsored sports with the exception of women's cross country, volleyball, soccer and softball.

SEC LEADS ALL CONFERENCES IN 2009-10 OVERALL SPORTS CONFERENCE VS. CONFERENCE SURVEY

In a statistical survey that is based on NCAA championship and rankings, the Southeastern Conference placed first in both men's and women's sports. The survey, compiled each year since 1986 by Bo Carter, takes into account final NCAA championship standings in 10 men's and 11 women's sports and poll rankings in football. Each conference gets 20 points for a team that wins a national championship, 19 for a second place finish and down to 1 point for a 20th place finish. Wrestling is included in the men's totals, but the sport is not sponsored by the Southeastern Conference.

In the 10 men's sports for the survey, the SEC had 398 points with the Pac-10 coming in second with 396 points, followed by the Big 12 with 395 points, Big Ten with 279.5 points, ACC with 238 points and the Big East with 83 points. In the 11 women's sports the SEC sponsors, the SEC led the way with 502.5 points followed by the Pac-10 with 480 points, the Big 12 with 382 points, ACC with 369 points, Big Ten with 221 points and the Big East with 164 points.

Combining the 21 sports in the survey, the SEC had 900.5 points to pace all conferences followed by the Pac-10 with 876 points, Big 12 with 777 points, ACC with 607 points, Big Ten with 500.5 points and the Big East with 247 points. The SEC has had the highest men's point total in 17 seasons since 1986-87, the first year this survey was done, and in 11 of the last 12 seasons. The SEC has had the highest women's point total five times since 1986-87, including three of the last six years.

SEC LEADS DIVISION I CONFERENCES IN MOST FIRST-TEAM ESPN THE MAGAZINE CoSIDA ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS

The Southeastern Conference had 15 of its student-athletes earn first-team ESPN The Magazine / CoSIDA Academic All-America status in 2009-10, more than any other Division I conference in the nation. The Big 12 had 14 while the Big Ten and Pac-10 had 13 student-athletes each earn the honor.

The SEC had 36 total student-athletes earn either first, second or third team mention. That total is second overall to the Big 12 Conference, which had 39. The Big Ten was third with 34 total student-athletes earned first, second or third team mention.

The SEC's academic success of its student-athletes in 2009-10 was not just Academic All-Americans. The league honored 2,424 of its own student-athletes who made the SEC Academic Honor Roll. The league also honored Auburn swimmer Jordan Anderson and Tennessee track & field athlete Phoebe Wright with its McWhorter Scholar-Athletes of the Year as well as naming a scholar-athlete of the year in each of its sports.

Among honors given by the NCAA, SEC student-athletes also shined. Three student-athletes from the SEC – Florida's Tim Tebow (football), Georgia's Courtney Kupets (gymnastics) and Alabama's Brittany Rogers (softball) were honored this past year with the Today's Top VIII Award from the NCAA. Since 2004, the SEC has had 10 student-athletes awarded this honor, more than any other conference in the country. The SEC also had 13 student-athletes receive NCAA Postgraduate Scholarships in 2009-10, more than any other conference in the nation.

SEC SPORTSMANSHIP STATEMENT

The SEC has developed a sportsmanship statement for its institutions to follow. It states: "Coaches and student-athletes of a member institution, as well as individuals employed by or associated with that institution, including alumni, fans, patrons and boosters, shall conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their behavior shall at all times reflect the high standards of honor and dignity that characterize participation in the collegiate setting. For intercollegiate athletics to promote the character development of participants, to enhance the integrity of higher education and to promote civility in society, coaches, student-athletes and all others associated with these athletics programs and events should adhere to such fundamental values as respect, fairness, civility, honesty and responsibility. These values should be manifested not only in athletics participation but also in the broad spectrum of activities affecting the athletics program. It is the responsibility of each member institution to establish policies for sportsmanship and ethical conduct in intercollegiate athletics consistent with the educational mission and goals of the institution. Furthermore, member institutions are responsible for educating on a continuing basis all constituencies about these policies."

SEC TOPS IN FAN SUPPORT

The Southeastern Conference has led the nation in total attendance in football every year since 1981 (29 straight years). Since 1988, the SEC has led the nation in average attendance. More than 6.5 million fans witnessed first-hand, the excitement of SEC football in 2009. The average capacity of the 12 SEC stadiums during the last 10 years has been 97 percent. Every year since 1988, the SEC has had at least four teams ranked in the top 10 in average attendance.

In men's basketball, the SEC has finished second in national average attendance for four straight seasons and has finished in the top three every year since 1994 (17 straight years). Kentucky has led the nation in 14 of the last 15 years in attendance. In 2009-10, five SEC schools finished in the top 30 in average attendance.

In women's basketball, after finishing third in the nation for 10 straight seasons, the SEC was second in national average attendance in 2009-10. The SEC has had at least two schools in the top 25 in average attendance every year since 1999-2000. Tennessee has led the nation in attendance in 10 of the last 11 seasons. In 2009-10, the SEC had four schools finish in the top 25 in average attendance.

In baseball, the SEC and one of its institutions have led the NCAA in total and average attendance for the last 13 seasons, and 18 of the last 24 years. The SEC and its member institutions own virtually all regular season, conference tournament, NCAA Regional and Super Regional attendance records. The SEC has broken its own national record each of the last five seasons in total attendance, after having set a goal of 1.5 million fans in 2005 as part of the league's "Drive for 1.5 ... Pack the Parks" promotion.

THE COACHES

Gene Chizik is in his second season at Auburn with a record of 9-5 (.642) and in his fourth season overall with a record of 14-24 (.368). The Tigers' offensive coordinator is Gus Malzahn and the defensive coordinator is Ted Roof.

Dan Mullen is in his second season at MSU and overall with a record of 6-7 (.462). Les Koenning serves as the offensive coordinator and the co-defensive coordinators are Manny Diaz and Chris Wilson.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN AUBURN HAS THE BALL

Auburn has totaled at least 500 yards of offense in five of Gus Malzahn's 14 games as offensive coordinator, after not reaching that mark in its last 40 games prior to his arrival. In his Auburn debut, Cam Newton rushed for 177 yards and two touchdowns while completing 9-of-14 passes for 186 and three scores in Auburn's 52-26 win against Newton. Newton accounted for 357 total offensive yards and five touchdowns, both highs in the SEC in Week One. He leads the SEC in rushing and total offense, and is second in passing efficiency and all-purpose yards.

The Bulldog defense allowed Memphis just 237 yards of offense, including just 41 on the ground. Chris White posted six total tackles and recorded 2.5 tackles for loss, a new career high, and the highest total of tackles behind the line for a Bulldog linebacker since 2006. In the season-opener against Memphis, Maurice Langston picked up where the secondary left off in 2009, intercepting two passes to lead the nation in that category.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN MISSISSIPPI STATE HAS THE BALL

Defensive end Antoine Carter opened his senior season on a positive note, setting career highs for sacks (2.5) and tackles for loss (3.5) while helping Auburn hold Arkansas State to just 43 yards rushing. Daren Bates started all 13 games at safety as a true freshman in 2009, but converted to linebacker prior to this season. It proved to be a good move, as Bates led the team with a career-high 10 tackles in the season opener. Airion Savage, who missed both the 2008 (knee) and 2009 (Achilles) seasons in their entirety before being granted a sixth year of eligibility, was second on the team with seven tackles, including one for loss.

In his first collegiate game, redshirt freshman quarterback Tyler Russell completed 13-of-16 passes for 256 yards and four touchdowns. Brandon Heavens had 112 receiving yards and his first two career touchdowns, while Chad Bumphis had 100 yards receiving and two scores. Chris Relf earned his first career starting nod in the season opener, and completed 7-of-9 passes for 116 yards and a touchdown. Vick Ballard led all rushers with 60 yards to go along with his two touchdowns. His second quarter TD run went for 51 yards while his third-quarter touchdown came from 1-yard out.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Senior kicker Wes Byrum is just 63 points away from becoming Auburn's all-time leading scorer. He currently ranks fifth with 250 career points. Demond Washington had 126 kickoff return yards last week, which is the 12th best total in school history. Junior Quindarius Carr averaged 9.4 yards per punt return including an 18-yarder. Senior Ryan Shoemaker had a net of 37.5 yards on his four punts, and freshman Craig Sanders made tackles on three consecutive kickoffs.

Senior Sean Brauchle began 2009 as the kicker, but a midyear injury allowed junior Derek DePasquale to step in and do an admirable job. Brauchle made six consecutive field goals in the first half of the season, and DePasquale hit 10-of-12 down the stretch. Heath Hutchins handled every punt a year ago and forced 22 to be fair caught. He also placed 11 inside the opponent's 20 yard line. Leon Berry became the first Mississippi State player to record 1,000 yards in kickoff returns in a single season a year ago. Bumphis had a 35 yard punt return versus Memphis.

SERIES/GAME NOTES

Thursday night's game will be a battle between the two top-ranked teams in the nation in passing efficiency. Auburn leads the all-time series with Mississippi State, 58-23-2 ... Thursday's meeting between the two schools will mark the 56th consecutive year the two schools have played each other ... Auburn has won 21 of the last 28 in the series ... Mississippi State has been held to an average of 12.3 points per game over the past 11 games...Mississippi State has averaged just 82.8 yards passing per game against the Auburn defense over the past four meetings, and has not thrown for 200 yards against the Tigers since 2002.

THE COACHES

Mark Richt is in his 10th season at Georgia and overall with a record of 91-27 (.771). The Bulldogs' offensive coordinator is Mike Bobo and Todd Grantham serves as the defensive coordinator.

Steve Spurrier is in his sixth season at South Carolina with a record of 36-28 (.563) and in his 26th season overall with a record of 225-109-2 (.673). Spurrier serves as the Gamecocks' offensive coordinator and the defensive coordinator is Lorenzo Ward.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN GEORGIA HAS THE BALL

In his Georgia debut, Aaron Murray completed 17-of-26 passes for 160 yards and three touchdowns against Louisiana-Lafayette. The Georgia offensive line did not allow a sack in opener. The five Bulldog offensive line returning starters have combined to start an SEC-leading 132 games in their careers. In 2009, this unit led the SEC with the fewest sacks allowed with only 12 in 13 games. After 707 days, senior SE Kris Durham returned to the lineup for a home game against UL. He led the team with five catches for 83 yards (both career highs) and one touchdown.

The Gamecock rushing defense came up big against Southern Miss, allowing just 67 yards on the ground on 27 attempts by the Golden Eagles. With Southern Miss throwing the ball 57 times last Thursday, it is no surprise that the defensive backfield made the majority of the plays for Carolina. Akeem Auguste led the way with eight stops, including one for loss, while DeVonte Holloman had seven tackles and his second career interception.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN SOUTH CAROLINA HAS THE BALL

The complete Bulldog front proved effective in the new 3-4 scheme as the Ragin' Cajuns were held to just 14 yards rushing and 128 yards overall (UL's only score of the game came on a 60-yard TD pass). Despite playing in only 10 games as a sophomore, Justin Houston finished second in the SEC in 2009 with a team-leading 7.5 sacks and 15 tackles for loss. Houston picked up where he left off in the 2010 opener by recording a sack and two tackles. Senior ILB Akeem Dent tied for a team-high six tackles, including a sack, against the Ragin' Cajuns. Sporting three new starters in the secondary, the Bulldog cornerbacks and safeties recorded three INTs and allowed just eight completions versus UL.

Carolina produced 449 yards of total offense last week, split almost equally - 224 yards on the ground and 225 yards through the air. Stephen Garcia completed 16-of-23 passes for 193 yards and had five rushes for 38 yards and 2 TDs against Southern Miss. Carolina averaged 6.9 yards per play in the win. T.J. Johnson was selected as the SEC's Offensive Lineman of the Week for his performance in the Gamecocks' 41-13 win over USM. He was making his first career start at center after starting all 13 games as a redshirt freshman at right guard during the 2009 season, where he earned Freshman All-SEC accolades. Marcus Lattimore rushed 14 times for 52 yards and two touchdowns in first collegiate game.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Place-kicker Blair Walsh rank among the nation's best at their respective positions. In 2009, Butler was a consensus All-American and the Ray Guy Award winner, which is given to the nation's top punter. Walsh was one of three finalists for the Lou Groza Award, which is given to the nation's top place-kicker. Both are again on the preseason Watch Lists for their respective awards in 2010. In the first game of 2010, Walsh connected on two FGs, one from 52 yards and the other from 48 yards.

In the first game of the 2010 season, Spencer Lanning showed no signs of rust as he boomed two punts for an average of 52.5 yards and was a perfect 2-for-2 on field goal tries and 5-5 on extra points. Lanning has hit three field goals and 30 PAT attempts in a row.

Urban Meyer is in his sixth season at Florida with a record of 58-10 (.853) and 10th overall with a record of 97-18 (.843). The Gators' offensive coordinator is Steve Addazio and the defensive coordinator is Teryl Austin.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN SOUTH FLORIDA HAS THE BALL

B.J. Daniels threw for 264 yards and two touchdowns Saturday night, helping the University of South Florida launch the Skip Holtz era with a 59-14 rout of Stony Brook in the season opener for both teams. Daniels teamed with Dontavia Bogan on a 59-yard score on the Bulls' first offensive play. The third-year sophomore later threw a 27-yard TD pass to Joel Miller. Miller did not have a career reception before Saturday night. Daniels completed 15 of 22 passes before leaving the game after leading a five-play, 80-yard TD drive to start the second half.

Ahmad Black grabbed an interception in the opener and returned it 40 yards, while leading the team with a career-high 12 tackles. Janoris Jenkins recorded a 67-yard interception return for a touchdown, the first of his career, along with five tackles and three pass breakups. Jonathan Bostic notched the first interception of his career vs. Miami, also tallying five tackles in the game. Jaye Howard earned his first multiple-sack performance in the season opener vs. Miami, totaling 2.5 tackles for loss with five total tackles. RB Marcus Shaw scored his first career touchdown on a 63-yard scamper.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN FLORIDA HAS THE BALL

DT Keith McCaskill recorded his first sack of the season, and his third-and-a-half sack of his career when he took down Stony Brook QB Michael Coulter early in the second half. S Mark Joyce recorded his first career interception with 5:09 left in the third quarter and returned it 33 yards for his first career touchdown. The USF defense tallied four interceptions in the opener last week. Seniors Sabbath Joseph, the Bull's top returning tackler, Donte Spires and Jacquian Williams return to lead the linebacking unit. In his first year as a starter in 2009, Joseph tallied 50 tackles with three forced fumbles, two of which came in USF's 17-7 upset of Florida State.

John Brantley got his first career start last week and completed 17 of 25 passes (60.0 percent) for 113 yards and two touchdowns, while throwing no interceptions and not being sacked. Jeff Demps carried eight times for 98 yards, including a 72-yard score. In three career opening-day games, has rushed for 263 yards and four touchdowns. He also added a 34-yard kickoff return. Playing his first game since officially moving from running back to wide receiver, Chris Rainey led the team with a career-best six receptions for 34 yards and a touchdown.

SPECIAL TEAMS

USF mistakes on special teams led to both of Stony Brook's touchdowns last week, with Faron Hornes fumbling on a punt return at his own 35 and Bulls punter Justin Brockhaus-Kann being ruled down at the USF 27 for a 15-yard loss after going down on one knee to field a bad snap. USF's blocked punt with 9:12 left in the second quarter marks the first time since Oct. 2, 2008, against Pittsburgh, that it blocked a punt and recovered it for a TD.

Mike Gillislee posted two kickoff returns for 65 yards, including a long of 50. Six other players have posted a 50-yard kickoff return since 1996, but none has had a rush in the same game as long as Gillislee's 41-yard carry against Miami. In 20 of the past 22 games, UF has allowed zero punt return yards. The Gators return punter Chas Henry and kicker Caleb Sturgis. Henry was a 2009 finalist for the Ray Guy Award and Sturgis a semifinalist for the Lou Groza Award.

Florida hosts in-state opponent USF of the Big East for Week 2 action in The Swamp...Florida kicked off the season with a 34-12 win against Miami University, while USF posted a 59-14 victory at home against Stony Brook...This marks the first meeting between the schools, but it is UF's 10th game against an in-state opponent during head coach Urban Meyer's tenure... The Gators hold a 9-0 mark in the previous contests against other Florida schools during that time...In its 2010 debut, UF extended its SEC-best opening-day winning streak to 21 games, the second-longest such active streak in the nation.

Nick Saban is in his fourth season at Alabama with a record of 34-8 (.810) and 17th overall with a record of 140-67-1 (.675). The Crimson Tide's offensive coordinator is Jim McElwain and the defensive coordinator is Kirby Smart.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN PENN STATE HAS THE BALL

Rob Bolden delivered a record-setting performance in the opener to earn Big Ten Co-Freshman of the Week honors. He was 20 of 29 for 239 yards and threw two touchdowns to Brett Brackett to deliver the best passing performance by a Nittany Lion true freshman starter in program history. Bolden was the first Penn State true freshman quarterback to start a game since Wally Richardson vs. Temple in 1992. Senior WR Brett Brackett set career highs in receptions, yards, and touchdowns against Youngstown State, as the co-captain caught eight passes for 98 yards and two touchdowns. Senior tailback Evan Royster earned first-team Big Ten accolades in 2009.

The Crimson Tide has not allowed a 100-yard rusher in an astonishing 35 games, dating back to Oct. 13, 2007. Dont'a Hightower returns this season has 83 career tackles with 6.5 tackles for loss and eight quarterback hurries. Hightower had three tackles - two solo in the season opener. Mark Barron led the league with seven interceptions while garnering third-team All-America honors last season. He registered 76 tackles to rank second on the Alabama defense.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ALABAMA HAS THE BALL

The Nittany Lions have not permitted an opposing rusher to hit the century mark over the last 17 contests. PSU was one of only three teams in the nation that did not allow a 100-yard rusher in 2009. Making his first career start, senior middle linebacker Chris Colasanti recorded a career-best 13 tackles. His previous best was six, set versus Eastern Illinois in 2009. Senior linebacker Bani Gbadyu had a career-best eight tackles, topping his former high of seven, set against Iowa in 2009. Senior co-captain Ollie Ogbu tied a career high with six tackles and Nate Stupar's 1.5 tackles for losses were a career high. His quarterback sack in the second half was the second of his career.

Senior quarterback Greg McElroy passed for 218 yards and a touchdown while completing 13 of 16 pass attempts without throwing an interception in the season opener against San Jose State. McElroy has attempted 114 passes since his last interception versus LSU last season. Trent Richardson rushed for two touchdowns in the early stages of the season opener, scoring on a four-yard run to give Alabama a 7-0 lead with 11:38 remaining in the opening period, then racing 39 yards for a TD. Alabama's 2010 starting five on the offensive line got off to a good start in the season opener against San Jose State, churning out 591 yards of total offense (334 passing, 257 rushing) while allowing just one sack.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Senior placekicker Collin Wagner had a big day last week, connecting on a field goals of 44, 49 and 48 yards. His 49-yarder in the second quarter was a career-long. Junior Chaz Powell electrified the Beaver Stadium throng with a 100-yard kickoff return to open the second half vs. Youngstown State. The return gave the Nittany Lions a 23-7 lead. Powell's kickoff return for a touchdown was Penn State's first since Derrick Williams took a kick back 94 yards for a score versus Illinois in 2008.

The all-important special teams units from last season must be completely overhauled with the loss of record-setting placekicker Leigh Tiffin, four-year starting punter P.J. Fitzgerald and long snapper Brian Selman. Jones and a returning cast must replace All-America return specialist Javier Arenas, who was a mainstay returning kicks and punts during his career. Jones averaged 15 yards per punt return last season and has a 12.3 yards per return average in his career.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN LOUISIANA-MONROE HAS THE BALL

Over the past five seasons, the Warhawks have rushed for over 200 yards as a team 17 times. Junior wide receiver Luther Ambrose is the second fastest man in college football entering the 2010 season. The speedster, who has been electronically timed at 4.28 in the 40-yard dash, finished third at the 2010 NCAA Outdoor Championship in the 100m dash with a time of 10.12 seconds. Frank Goodin has moved into second place on the ULM career rushing touchdown list with 22 after running for 13 last season. If the depth chart holds true to form, redshirt freshman Kolton Browning will start under center for the Warhawks against Arkansas.

The Razorbacks' defense is tied for second in the SEC in scoring defense (3.0) and tied for 11th nationally. The unit ranks fourth in the league in total defense (187.0) and 16th in the nation. Arkansas defensive end Jake Bequette tied for the team lead in sacks with 5.5 last season. He was the team leader in quarterback hurries, totaling eight in 13 games played. In the first game of 2010, Bequette added two more quarterback hurries to lead the team. Anthony Leon recorded four tackles for loss, including two sacks, against Tennessee Tech and led the team with eight total tackles in his debut at LB.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN ARKANSAS HAS THE BALL

In the first season running the 3-3-5 defense under new coordinator Troy Reffett, the Warhawks put together the second best turnaround in the NCAA as a unit. The Warhawks tallied 27 sacks last season, more than doubling their total from the previous year. Darius Prelow finished the season second in the Sun Belt and 26th in the NCAA averaging 1.09 pass break ups per game. The Warhawks received a nice surprise at the start of fall camp when nose tackle Bryan Glenn was granted a sixth year of eligibility.

The Arkansas passing offense (323.0) ranks third in the SEC and 17th nationally. UA's total offense (519.0) ranks fifth in the league and 20th in the NCAA. Ryan Mallett's completion percentage in the season opener against Tennessee Tech of 87.5 ranked as the second-highest single-game total in SEC history (min. 20 att.). It was also the highest by any quarterback in the nation on the opening weekend of college football (as of 9/5). 4Joe Adams touched the ball seven times in the 2010 season opener for an average of 20.7 yards per touch. His 138 receiving yards were tops in the SEC and 10th-highest in the NCAA on the opening weekend (as of 9/5).

SPECIAL TEAMS

ULM had to look to the wide receiver corp to find its punter and deep snapper for 2010. The Warhawks lost both of their projected starters at the positions late due to academics and were forced to scramble to fill the void. Aaron Munoz, who was moved from quarterback to wide receiver in the spring, will handle the punting duties, and Madison Tharp will handle the deep snapping duties. Radi Jabour he has hit 75% of his attempts from 40-49 yards, while he is 50% from 20-39 yards.

Alex Tejada opened the year with four touchdowns, including three straight, against Tennessee Tech. Last year, it took nine games and 54 kickoffs for the Razorbacks to record a touchdown. Tejada set the Arkansas record for PATs in a season last year with 58. Freshman Zach Hocker opened his collegiate career with a perfect 6-for-6 night on PATs vs. Tennessee Tech. His six made point-after-touchdowns were the fourth-most in the SEC over opening weekend.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN LSU HAS THE BALL

QB Jordan Jefferson opened the season by throwing for 151 yards and a pair of TDs in the win over North Carolina, while RB Stevan Ridley rushed for a career-best 81 yards on 19 carries in the opener. WR Russell Shepard scored both on the ground (50-yard run) and through the air (6-yard TD catch) against North Carolina as he finished with 67 rushing yards and two catches for 12 yards.

In his first start, Jay Fullam (R-Fr., safety) shared the team high in tackles (12) with VU defensive leader Chris Marve. Eddie Foster produced career highs in tackles (8) and tackles for loss (3). Sean Richardson added eight total tackles, including 2.5 tackles for loss. Tim Fugger had a career-high 1.5 QB sacks. He also forced a fumble and turnover during one of the sacks.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN VANDERBILT HAS THE BALL

Defensively, LB Kelvin Sheppard led the Tigers with 10 tackles in the opener versus UNC. Patrick Peterson added five tackles, including one for a loss, against the Tar Heels. LSU's rushing defense came up big in the season-opener against North Carolina as the Tigers allowed just 24 yards on the ground. The 24 rushing yards were the fewest by an opponent since Alabama had 20 yards rushing on Nov. 3, 2007. It was also the third-lowest total in a season-opener dating back to 1970.

The Vanderbilt offense produced 432 total yards last week— 192 rushing and 240 passing. It matches the Commodores' largest total offense outlet against a BCS-member opponent since 2006. Larry Smith put together one of the finest performances of his career, completing 19 of 33 passes for 240 yards and a TD. Brandon Barden hauled in the longest TD reception of his career, a 36-yarder from Smith late in the third quarter. Jonathan Krause impressed in his first Commodore game. The true freshmen shared the team high with four receptions and had 55 receiving yards, behind only Barden's 63-yard total.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Peterson made his impact felt immediately as LSU's return specialist, setting the school record for return yards with 257 vs. North Carolina. Peterson ranks No. 2 in the nation in punt returns (39.2), No. 3 in all-purpose yards (257.0) and No. 11 in kickoff returns (33.3). He was named SEC Special Teams Player of the Week on Monday.

A blocked field goal early in the fourth quarter by T.J. Greenstone last week was the Commodores' first FG block since Greg Billinger stuffed a South Carolina attempt on Sept. 4, 2008. Ryan Fowler missed his only extra point attempt and was just 1-of-2 in FG tries, hitting from 30 yards and missing from 46 yards. Fowler, who enjoyed a consistent preseason camp, entered the season perfect in PATs (20-of-20) from his SEC All-Freshman campaign in 2009. He also converted his final eight FGs last year.

Kenjon Barner replaced the suspended running back LaMichael James for the 11th-ranked Ducks and ran for a career-high 147 yards and four touchdowns before catching another score as Oregon opened the season with a 72-0 rout of New Mexico on Saturday. Barner was the star with 225 all-purpose yards. His one catch was a 60-yard scoring strike from Thomas in the second quarter. Quarterback Darron Thomas, making his debut as the Oregon starter, completed 13 of 23 passes for 220 yards and two touchdowns.

In his first game playing defense, Austin Johnson collected five tackles, including one in the end zone that gave the Vols their first safety since the UCLA game in 2009. He also had an interception that ended a Skyhawks drive in the third quarter and setup a touchdown for the Big Orange. Seven freshmen played on defense for Tennessee against UT Martin. Nick Reveiz made his return to the playing field against UT Martin for the first time since Sept. 26, 2009. In just 10 games last season, Janzen Jackson native racked up 37 tackles, recorded a sack for an 11-yard loss and had a 29-yard interception return.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN TENNESSEE HAS THE BALL

Led by seniors Spencer Paysinger and Casey Matthews, there may not be a deeper or more experienced position on the team than linebacker. Paysinger, the Ducks' second-leading tackler, has started 19 straight games at weakside linebacker and his 25 career opening assignments are the most by any defensive player and second-most on the team (WR Jeff Maehl, 29). Matthews, a second-team all-conference choice, has 20 consecutive starts at middle linebacker and was one of only three players to surpass 1,000 plays in 2009.

Junior Tauren Poole made his first start and led the charge on the ground for UT, scoring a pair of touchdowns and finishing with a career-high 110 yards on 17 carries. Sophomore David Oku, who mainly served as a return specialist as a freshman, set a new career high in rushing with just one run: a 44-yard breakaway touchdown in the first quarter. Junior Matt Simms made his debut at quarterback last week, completing 14 of 24 passes for 181 yards and 1 touchdown. In his junior slate, Luke Stocker's numbers increased by 16 receptions, 250 yards, and five touchdowns.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Cliff Harris scored on punt returns of 61 and 64 yards last week as Oregon built a 59-0 halftime lead. No Duck has ever had two punt returns for touchdowns in a single game.

Senior placekicker Daniel Lincoln earned starting PK duties and will attempt to cement his mark in the Big Orange record books. With two field goals against Martin, the Ocala, Fla., native lacks just nine more to tie John Becksvort for fifth place in on the all-time Vols leaderboard. Dating back to last season, Rainey has now recorded more than 100 yards in three of his last four games, averaging 144.3 yards in those three games. Nebraska ranked ninth against the run nationally in 2009. Rainey also registered a career-best 36 receiving yards, and his 191 yards from scrimmage were the most in his career at WKU.

Since the 2006 season, with the Wildcats going to a school-record four-straight bowl games, Kentucky is +23 in turnover margin. For the 2010 season, UK is +2 in turnover margin after the Louisville game, to rank tied for first in the SEC and tied for seventh nationally. Only six starters return on the Wildcat defense - ends DeQuin Evans and Taylor Wyndham, tackle Ricky Lumpkin, linebacker Danny Trevathan, cornerback Randall Burden and safety Winston Guy, with Evans and Lumpkin the only seniors.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN KENTUCKY HAS THE BALL

Senior linebacker Thomas Majors was the only Topper to earn first-team, preseason Sun Belt honors, while fellow linebacker Chris Bullard and defensive lineman Kenny Martin were fourth-team picks. In his first game playing on the defensive side of the ball, wide receiver turned defensive back Derrius Brooks collected six tackles and a pass breakup last week.

Kentucky's 466 yards of total offense vs. Louisville marked the most since the Cats gained 488 yards in the 2009 opener vs. Miami-Ohio. Tailback Derrick Locke won the inaugural Howard Schnellenberger Award as most valuable player of the Governor's Cup. Locke rushed 23 times for 104 yards and two touchdowns and also caught three passes for 21 yards. Mike Hartline became the first quarterback in Governor's Cup history to go 3-0 as the starting QB. Hartline completed 17 of 26 passes for 217 yards in leading the Wildcats to victory. Against Louisville, Randall Cobb rushed four times for 80 yards and was 1-for-1 for 19 passing yards in the "WildCobb" formation.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Freshman Willie McNeal made his Hilltopper debut last week, and proceeded to rack up 169 all-purpose yards — including 132 on kickoff returns. He averaged 22 yards per return, with a long of 29. He also rushed for 19 yards and caught an eight-yard pass.

Kentucky kickers Joe Mansour and Ryan Tydlacka were honored on by the College Football Performance Awards for their individual performances in the Louisville game. Mansour, a freshman from LaGrange, Ga., was named the Kickoff Specialist of the Week after kicking off five times against the Cardinals, three of which went for touchbacks. Tydlacka was honorable mention for the Punter Performer of the Week after booting four punts for 199 yards with an average of 49.8 yards per punt. The native of Louisville, Ky., had a career-long punt of 62 yards, pinning the Cardinals within their own 20-yard line once. The 62-yarder was also a Governor Cup record for longest punt.

After positive news from cardiac specialists, Ole Miss' Kentrell Lockett is expected to return to action this week. Damien Jackson tallied a team-high 11 tackles (seven solo) in first collegiate start last week. Jerrell Powe anchors a veteran group on the line that features seniors LaMark Armour, Ted Laurent and Lawon Scott. The group of four seniors has a combined 39 starts among them. The Rebels returns two starting linebackers from last year in Jonathan Cornell and Allen Walker. Johnny Brown leads the secondary. Brown was second on the squad with 10 tackles in the opener and also broke up one pass.

With six catches for 48 yards against Southeastern La., senior wide receiver Casey Robottom increased his string of multiple-catch games to 10. Orleans Darkwa came out of nowhere to produce one of top performances by a true freshman running back in a season opener. Darkwa totaled 75 yards on 19 carries, but more importantly reached the end zone three times, which marked the most touchdowns scored by a true freshman running back in an opener. Ryan Griffin leads the offense as he completed 141-of-222 (.635) passing attempts for 1,382 yards and nine touchdowns and six interceptions last season as a freshman, and he finished with a 123.8 passing efficiency rating.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Replacing All-SEC place-kicker Joshua Shene, who became only the second Rebel all-time to lead the team in scoring all four years, remains a major focal point heading into this season. Bryson Rose scored 12 points and was a perfect 2-for-2 on FGs and 6-for-6 on PATs in the opener. Tyler Campbell finished second in the conference a year ago with a 44.0 punting average and earned SEC All-Freshman honors. Jesse Grandy is expected to get the nod for kickoff returns and punt returns after posting the second-highest kickoff return average in school history a year ago.

Placekicker Cairo Santos connected on a pair of field goals of 29 and 27 yards and was true on all three PATs to finish his first collegiate game with nine points. Santos also handled kickoff duties and averaged 63.8 yards on five kickoffs (319 yards). Santos become the first freshman kicker to score a point in a season opener since Ross Thevenot against Houston in the 2006 opener. Rookie Jonathan Ginsburgh punted six times for 241 yards for a 40.2 average. Ginsburgh's first career punt traveled 47 yards and he placed three attempts inside the opponent's 20-yard line.

SERIES/GAME NOTES

Record: UM, 41-28

This game will mark 70th meeting between Ole Miss and Tulane... It is the Rebels' fourth-most played series behind Mississippi State (106), LSU (98) and Vanderbilt (84)...The Rebels hold a 41-28 advantage in the series and have won the last nine meetings, which is the third-longest winning streak in the series behind a 10-game streak for Ole Miss from 1957-74 and 12-game streak for the Green Wave from 1919-39...The Ole Miss-Tulane series is in the Rebels' longest ongoing series dating back to the school's first year playing football in 1893.
