Clemson vs. Auburn Series

Auburn has a 33-11-2 lead in the series with Clemson. The War Eagles have beaten Clemson 13 consecutive games, as the Clemson Tigers have not gained a victory over Auburn since 1951, a 34-0 win at Clemson. That win gave Clemson five wins in six meetings against Auburn between 1946-51. Clemson defeated Auburn in 1947 by a score of 34-18 as Bobby Gage threw four touchdown passes and gained 374 yards of total offense, both single game records at the time.

Auburn and Clemson first met in 1899 and Auburn came away with a 34-0 win at Auburn. That was just the 14th game in Clemson history. John Heisman coached Auburn in that game. Clemson won three of the next four, including a 16-0 win at Auburn in 1902. Clemson's coach in that game was the legendary John Heisman. So Heisman gained wins for both teams in this series and both games were played at Auburn.

The two schools have met just twice since 1971, and both meetings took place in Atlanta at the Georgia Dome for the Chick-fil-A Bowl. Auburn won both meetings in close games, 21-17 at the 1998 Chick-fil-A bowl (1997 season), and Auburn won on New Year's Eve of 2007 by a 23-20 score in overtime. That is Clemson's only overtime game in a bowl contest.

In that 21-17 Auburn victory in the 1998 Chick-fil-A Bowl, Clemson gained just 146 yards of total offense, 60 rushing and 86 passing. Despite the offensive problems, Clemson had a 17-6 lead entering the fourth period. But, Auburn scored 15 points in the fourth period to gain the victory. Raymond Priester led Clemson with 19-62 rushing, but Nealon Greene completed just 11-26 passes for 86 yards. Clemson had just four first downs in the game, fewest in history for the Tigers in a bowl game.

Terry Bowden was the head coach for Auburn in that game. Two years later his brother Tommy came to Clemson as the head coach.

Auburn won the last regular season game in 1971 by a 35-13 score on Clemson's Homecoming. Heisman Trophy winner Pat Sullivan led the way for the War Eagles. Auburn was ranked fifth in the nation entering that game.

The two teams meet again next year at Clemson in a game that is currently scheduled to be played on September 17.

Chick-fil-A Bowl, Atlanta, GA

Kodi Burns' seven-yard touchdown run in overtime gave #21 Auburn a 23-20 victory over #15 Clemson in the Chick-fil-A Bowl in the Georgia Dome in Atlanta, GA on December 31, 2007.

Clemson scored 10 points early in the fourth quarter to take a 17-10 lead, but Auburn responded with a game-tying drive and converted a fourth down in overtime before earning the walk-off victory.

Auburn debuted its spread offense, as Burns and starter Brandon Cox rotated at quarterback, leading Auburn to 423 yards and 24 first downs. Auburn took advantage of the absence of Clemson senior starting linebackers Nick Watkins and Tramaine Billie along with a Clemson defense that played 23 players, none of which were seniors.

Burns rushed for a team-high 69 yards and a score on 13 carries along with a 22-yard touchdown pass, while Brad Lester added 57

rushing yards. Cox was 25-39 passing for 211 yards as well.

Clemson totaled 12 first downs, 293 yards of offense, and ran only 73 plays against Auburn's 90 plays. Clemson also had nine non-scoring drives of three plays or less. However, Clemson did not commit a turnover and was flagged for just one penalty.

C.J. Spiller led Clemson with 112 yards on eight carries and a touchdown. Spiller, who was named Offensive MVP of the Chick-fil-A-Bowl, also totaled a team-season-high 218 all-purpose yards. James Davis added 72 yards on 23 carries, while Aaron Kelly had four catches for 36 yards.

Spiller put Clemson ahead 7-3 in the first half when he sprinted 83 yards for a score to give Clemson a 7-3 lead early in the second quarter. It was the longest rush by a Clemson player since 1993 and the longest ever in Clemson bowl history. It was also the longest in the history of the Chick-fil-A Bowl. Clemson led 7-3 at the half.

Auburn wasted little time regaining the lead in the third quarter, as it drove 78 yards in 10 plays on its scoring drive. It was capped by Burns' 22-yard touchdown pass to Mario Fannin on third-and-seven. It was the freshman's only completion of the game.

On third-and-four in the third period, Spiller appeared trapped behind the line. However, he bounced outside and turned the corner for a 20-yard run. Harper's quarterback sneak on fourth down gave Clemson a first-and-goal. But Auburn's defense was up to the task and Clemson settled for Buchholz's 22-yard field goal on the first snap of the fourth quarter to tie the score.

Four plays later, Crezdon Butler deflected Cox's pass and wound up with the interception at the Auburn 32. Clemson capitalized on the game's only turnover when Davis scored on a one-yard plunge on fourth-and-goal. Earlier in the drive, Kelly caught a 27-yard pass on third-and-nine.

But Clemson's 17-10 lead was short-lived, as Auburn traversed 70 yards in 11 plays to tie the score. Cox's 18-yard pass to Robert Dunn on third-and-five moved the ball into Clemson territory. Four plays later, Burns rumbled 15 yards to the Clemson one. Ben Tate carried the ball into the endzone on the next play with 8:27 remaining in the game.

Both teams drove into the other team's territory later in the fourth quarter, but neither could get close enough to attempt a go-ahead field goal.

Clemson got the ball first in overtime. On third-and-two, Davis carried just far enough for a first down at the 15. But on third-and-three from the eight, Harper's pass fell incomplete. Buchholz then booted a 25-yard field goal to give Clemson a 20-17 lead.

Facing a third-and-13, Cox connected with Smith for 12 yards. On fourth-and-one, Auburn elected to go for the first down and got it on Cox's quarterback sneak. Three plays later on third-and-three, Burns took the shotgun snap and scampered seven yards for the game-winning touchdown.

Kavell Conner and Chris Clemons, both of whom are now in the NFL, led the Clemson defense with 15 tackles apiece, while Michael Hamlin added 14 tackles, including 10 in the first quarter, and two tackles for loss. Chris Chancellor had four pass breakups as well.

Eight Current Tigers Played in Last Meeting

Eight current Clemson players competed against Auburn in the 2007 Chick-fil-A Bowl in Atlanta. Only one Tiger still on the team started that game. Current Clemson offensive tackle Chris Hairston made his first career start in that contest.

Seven other Tigers came off the bench in that game. The list includes wide receiver Terrance Ashe, defensive end Kourtnei Brown, defensive tackle Miguel Chavis, wide receiver Xavier Dye, defensive back Byron Maxwell, then linebacker now safety DeAndre McDaniel, and holder Mike Wade.

Parker Returns to Auburn

Clemson quarterback Kyle Parker has already had a big day in Auburn, AL. On June 7, 2010, Parker hit a three-run home run in the first inning of the Tigers 13-7 victory over the Auburn Tigers on the baseball diamond. That win propelled Clemson to the Super Regional of the NCAA Baseball Tournament where the Tigers defeated Alabama. The Tigers eventually advanced to the Final Four of the College World Series.

That home run by Parker was his 20th of the season and it allowed him to become the first athlete in Division I sports history to hit 20 home runs and throw 20 touchdown passes in the same academic year.

That was not all that happened to Parker that day in Auburn, AL. During the seventh inning of that night game, he was drafted in the first round of the Major League Baseball Draft by the Colorado Rockies with the 26th overall selection. He signed a contract with the Rockies in August and will join that organization in February.

This will be Parker's first football game against Auburn. He was 3-12 at the plate with four runs scored and four RBIs in three baseball games against Auburn. All three games took place June 5-7 at Auburn.

The Auburn baseball stadium is across the street from the Auburn football stadium, so Parker will be playing for the Tigers Saturday night just a few hundred yards from the site of his historic home run.

Parker Has Shown Steady Improvement

Clemson quarterback Kyle Parker is off to strong start. His passing efficiency of 192.2 would be first in the ACC and fifth in the nation if he had enough attempts to qualify. So far he is 15-26 for 283 yards and four touchdowns against just one interception. You need to average 15 pass attempts per game to be ranked.

He has the Tigers off to a 2-0 start and is now 11-5 in his career as a starting quarterback, a .688 winning percentage. He will face a top 20 Auburn team on the road this weekend, but does already have a ranked win on the road to his credit as the starting quarterback. Last year he had a career high 326 passing yards in helping the Tigers to a 40-37 overtime win at eighth ranked Miami.

Parker has shown improvement over his career. Over his last eight games (last six last year and first two this year), he is 104-173 (.601) for 1386 yards with 14 touchdown passes and just five interceptions. That computes to a 148.33 passing efficiency rating. He has had an efficiency of at least 163 in six of his last eight games and the Tigers are 6-2 in that eight game period. The only losses in that stretch were at South Carolina and to Georgia Tech in the ACC

Championship game last year.

Parker's passing efficiency for his career is 129.1, sixth best in Clemson history.

Clemson and Auburn Historical Ties

•The first three coaches in Clemson football history were Auburn graduates. Walter Riggs, Clemson's first head coach and later University President, was Clemson's head coach in 1896 and 1899. He was an 1893 Auburn graduate. William Williams, Clemson's head coach in 1897, was an 1896 Auburn graduate, while John Penton, Clemson's head coach in 1898, had graduated from Auburn in the spring of 1898.

•John Heisman was not an Auburn graduate, but he came to Clemson from Auburn. He coached at Auburn from 1895-999 and came to Clemson to coach the 1900-03 era. Heisman was 12-4-2 at Auburn before coming to Clemson. He was 19-3-2 as head coach of the Tigers for those four years. He then left Clemson to become the head coach at Georgia Tech.

In fact, Heisman coached for each school within the first two games of this series. He defeated Clemson for Auburn in 1899 by a 34-0 score, then defeated Auburn as Clemson's head coach by a 16-0 score in 1902.

•Both schools have a main administration building on campus is virtually the same architecture. Clemson's Tillman Hall was modeled after Auburn's Langdon Hall. In fact, noted **Atlanta Constitution** columnist and humorist Lewis Grizzard used to refer to Clemson as "Auburn with a Lake."

•Both Clemson and Auburn were among the top programs in college football in the 1980s. In fact, Clemson won 87 games in the 1980s and Auburn won 86. Clemson had the fifth best winning percentage in college football in that decade with an 87-25-4 record for a .767 mark. Auburn had the 10th best winning percentage with a 86-31-1 record, a .733 winning percentage.

•Bill Oliver was a defensive coordinator at both schools. He served on Clemson's staff under Danny Ford from 1986-89. He then served as Auburn's defensive coordinator against Clemson in the 1998 Chick-fil-A Bowl.

•Both schools had a Bowden serve as head coach of their program. Terry Bowden served as head coach at Auburn from 1993-98 and Tommy Bowden coached Clemson from 1999-08. Both coaches left their respective programs in the middle of their last season in seasons that ended with the number eight.

•Tommy Bowden also served as an assistant coach at Auburn from 1991-96.

Clemson and Auburn Current Ties

•Auburn head Coach Gene Chizik was a graduate assistant at Clemson during the 1988 and 1989 seasons.

•Kevin Steele is Clemson's defensive coordinator. His brother, Jeff Steele is the associate athletic director for facilities and operations at Auburn.

•Auburn baseball coach John Pawlowski is a former Clemson pitcher and Clemson graduate.

•Wayne Bolt, the Director of Football Operations at Clemson was an assistant football coach at Clemson from 1986-89 and coached current Clemson assistant head coach, tackles and tight ends coach Danny Pearman during his junior and senior seasons as a player at Clemson.

Clemson vs. Auburn Battle of Efficient Passing Teams?

Former Clemson Head Coach Danny Ford and former Auburn Head Coach Pat Dye would roll their eyes if they looked at the latest NCAA statistics. Both Clemson (10th) and Auburn (4th) rank in the top 10 in the nation in passing efficiency.

Both programs ranked among the best in college football during the 1980s behind those coaches thanks to outstanding rushing attacks. Clemson ranked in the top 25 in the nation in rushing every year from 1981 through 1989, including six years in the top 16. Clemson rushed for at least 200 yards per game nine straight years from 1981-89. Auburn ranked in the top 15 in the nation every year between 1982-86, including a third place ranking in 1983 when the Auburn Tigers averaged 294 yards per game.

So far this year, Clemson ranks 10th in the nation in passing efficiency with a 175.23 rating, while Auburn is fourth with a 191.97 rating. Clemson ranks first as a team in the ACC in passing efficiency, while Auburn is second in the SEC. Clemson leads the ACC in touchdown passes with seven.

Cameron Newton is sixth in the nation in passing efficiency with a 186.5 figure. Clemson's Kyle Parker is not ranked because he has not averaged 15 pass attempts per game. But, his 192.2 figure would rank fifth best in the nation.

Both Teams Get to the Quarterback

Another common denominator between Clemson and Auburn takes place on the defensive side of the ball. Both teams are proficient at getting to the quarterback and recording negative plays. Clemson has eight sacks so far this year and the 4.0 per game average is fifth best in the nation. Clemson is also eighth in the country in overall tackles for loss per game with a 9.5 average. Auburn is 10th in the nation in sacks per game by its defense with 3.5 per game. They rank 14th in the nation in tackles for loss per game with 8.5.

Andre Branch has three sacks in the first two games to rank 11th in the nation in that category. He is 14th in tackles for loss per game. Auburn's Antoine Carter is 11th in the nation in sacks with 1.5 per game.

ESPN College Gameday at Clemson vs. Auburn

ESPN College Gameday will be at the Clemson vs. Auburn game this Saturday in Auburn, AL. It will be just the third time Clemson has been involved in a game that is the site of ESPN's morning program.

The first experience took place during the 2006 season when Gameday originated from Clemson the morning of the Clemson vs. Georgia Tech game. Two years later for the season opener against Alabama, Gameday originated from the Georgia Dome. So this will be the third Gameday experience for Clemson, and two of the three will have been non-conference games against teams from the state of Alabama.

Clemson has also been the host site for College Basketball Gameday. That took place last January 23. Clemson became the 16th school to play host to ESPN College Gameday in both football and basketball.

Clemson Special Teams Off to Good Start

Clemson is off to a good start when it comes to special teams. Punter Dawson Zimmerman leads the nation in punting with a 49.78 average. He has averaged at least 46 yards a punt in each his first two games, the top two games of his career.

Everyone wondered who would take over for C.J. Spiller when it came to the return game. Spiller had eight kick returns for touchdowns in his career, including an NCAA record seven on kickoff returns. While he has not taken one to the house, Marcus Gilchrist is sixth in the nation in punt returns with a 23.75 average. He is the main reason Clemson is 17th in the nation as a team in that category. Gilchrist is averaging 29 yards on two kickoff returns, but does not have enough returns to be ranked.

Freshman placekicker Chandler Catanzaro is a perfect 11-11 on extra points and made his only field goal attempt, a 47-yarder against Presbyterian.

Clemson has done a good job as a team when it comes to coverage. Clemson has a 10-yard advantage in average starting field position after kickoffs so far (own 35 compared to 25 for opposition), and it has blocked a punt, leading to a 12.3 yard advantage in terms of net punting.

Tigers Face Top 20 Auburn Team on the Road

Clemson will play Auburn at Auburn, AL this Saturday. The Auburn Tigers are ranked 16th by AP and 15th by **USA Today** and this will be the first time Clemson has played a non-conference team in the opponent's stadium since the 2005 season when the Tigers defeated 19th ranked South Carolina 13-9.

Clemson has a 3-4 record against non-conference top 25 teams

on the road since 1986, but has a lifetime record of 6-28-1 in that situation. The wins took place at 17th ranked Missouri in 1950, at 15th ranked Miami (FL) in the Orange Bowl on January 1, 1951, at 17th ranked Georgia in 1977, at 14th ranked Georgia in 1986, at 16th ranked Florida State in 1989, and the aforementioned South Carolina game of 2005.

Overall, Clemson has 59 all-time wins over Top 25 teams regardless of site.

Largest Crowds to See Clemson Football

While the Clemson at Auburn game was not sold out at the beginning of the week, it is expected to be a sellout by game time. Auburn lists a capacity crowd at 87,451 and if that number is reached it would be the largest crowd to watch Clemson play a football game. The record entering this weekend is a crowd of 86,520 that attended the Clemson at Georgia game on August 31, 2002.

The largest home crowd in Clemson history is 86,092, the attendance for Bowden Bowl I in November of 1999. That was the first meeting of father and son head coaches in Division I history as Florida State's Bobby Bowden faced off against Clemson's Tommy Bowden.

Overall, Clemson has played to a crowd over 85,000 eight times. Five of the eight were played at Clemson Memorial Stadium. It might be a while before that number is reached again as the local fire marshal has stated Clemson can not have a crowd that high in the future.

The most fans to see Clemson win a college football game is 85,187. That was the attendance for Clemson's 16-14 win over South Carolina on Nov. 18, 2000.

Alumni Support Both Schools

Clemson and Auburn are known for the support of their fans. The alumni have a lot to do with that support, and they back that up with their check books. According to research by **US News & World Report**, both schools are in the top 10 in the nation in alumni giving among schools that have a Division I football program.

Auburn has an alumni giving rate of 32 percent, while 28 percent of Clemson alumni give back. Auburn is ranked sixth in that category among Division I schools and Clemson is tied for eighth with ACC rival Georgia Tech.

Chizik Coached at Clemson

Auburn Head Coach Gene Chizik was a graduate assistant coach on Danny Ford's Clemson staffs of 1988 and 1989. The Tigers finished both seasons with a 10-2 record. The 1988 team won the ACC Championship. Both teams finished the season in the final top 12, as the 1988 team beat Oklahoma in the Citrus Bowl and finished 9th in the final AP poll and the 1989 team best West Virginia and finished 12th in the final

AP poll.

Chizik worked with the linebackers as a graduate assistant both years. One of the other graduate assistants on both of those staffs was current Clemson tackles and tight ends coach Danny Pearman.

Chizik left Clemson after the 1989 season and became defensive ends coach at Middle Tennessee where he helped that program to an 11-2 record in 1990. He earned his Masters from Clemson in 1991. Pearman went to Alabama for the 1990 season. One of the players on that Alabama team was Dabo Swinney.

Roof Coached and Played Against Clemson

Auburn defensive coordinator Ted Roof has gone against Clemson as an assistant coach, a head coach and a player over his career. A standout linebacker at Georgia Tech from 1982-85, he played against the Tigers in the meetings between the two schools from 1983-85.

Roof coached against Clemson as an assistant coach at Duke from 1990-93 and 2002, and as defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at Georgia Tech from 1998-01. He coached against Clemson as the head coach at Duke in 2003, 2004, 2005 and 2007. He was the interim head coach at Duke in 2003 and that was just his fourth game as a head coach, a game Clemson won 40-7.

In 2004, his first full year at Duke, Roof pulled off an upset when his Blue Devils defeated Clemson, 16-13. Clemson was not ranked, but the Tigers were coming off a 24-17 overtime win over 11th ranked Miami the previous week.

After working at Minnesota and Auburn the last two years, this will be the first time Roof has been on the opposite sidelines since a 31-7 Clemson win against Duke on Nov. 15, 2007. Current Clemson offensive tackles and tight ends coach Danny Pearman was on the Duke sidelines as an assistant coach for the Blue Devils that day.

Dabo vs. Auburn

Clemson Head Coach Dabo Swinney is a 1993 graduate of the University of Alabama, so playing against Auburn is special to the Tigers mentor. He played in three games against Auburn as a student at Alabama, the games of 1990-91 and 1992. Alabama won all three of those games, including by a 17-0 score in 1992, the year Alabama won the National Championship.

As a graduate assistant coach and a full-time assistant at Alabama, the Crimson Tide had a 4-4 record with Swinney on the sidelines against the Auburn Tigers. That includes a 28-17 victory in 1999, the last time Swinney coached in a game at Auburn. So, overall, Swinney is 7-4 as a player and coach against Auburn. This does not count a 1989 loss to Auburn when Swinney was on the Alabama roster as a freshman walk-on, but he did not play in the game.

Clemson Leads ACC in Five Offensive Categories

Clemson leads the ACC in five offensive statistical categories entering this week's play. Clemson leads the ACC in yards per rush (7.2), yards per pass attempt (9.2), yards per play (8.0), touchdown passes (7) and pass efficiency (175.23). Clemson had three different quarterbacks throw touchdown passes in the win over Presbyterian, the first game in school history three different quarterbacks threw scoring passes in the same game. The five touchdown passes were just one off the record of six in a game, set against Central Michigan in 2007.

Tigers vs. Tigers

Both schools have the nickname Tigers. There is a theory that Clemson has that nickname because John Heisman brought that nickname with him from Auburn. More FBS teams have the nickname Tigers than any other nickname. The five schools who have that nickname are Clemson, Auburn, LSU, Missouri and Memphis.

Seven Tigers from Alabama

Clemson has seven players who list a town in Alabama as their hometowns. The list includes two starters, Brandon Maye and Antoine McClain and a third player Brandon Clear, who is listed as a co-starter on the Clemson depth chart.

Maye has had over 100 tackles each of his first two years at Clemson and will play in his first game of this year on Saturday night at Auburn. He had knee surgery the Wednesday before the opener with North Texas and has not played yet this year. He made his first career start as a freshman against Alabama in Atlanta in 2008 and now will make his first appearance as a junior against Auburn.

Antoine McClain is in his second year as a starting offensive guard, while Brandon Clear is a co-starter at wide receiver. He had a 70-yard touchdown reception from Kyle Parker in the season opener against North Texas.

Ranked Wins on the Road

Clemson has 59 wins over Associated Press top 25 teams over the years and 19 of them have taken place on an opponent's home field. The highest ranked team Clemson has beaten on its home field is a victory over an eighth-ranked North Carolina team in Chapel Hill in 1981, Clemson's national championship season, and last year at eighth ranked Miami.

Clemson has a chance to add to the list, as Auburn is ranked 16th by AP and 15th by USA Today.

To document road wins over ranked teams, Clemson has constructed a Graveyard at the entrance to the practice field and a tombstone has been erected for each victory over a ranked team on the road.

Clemson's highest ranked win regardless of site is a win over third-ranked Florida State at Clemson in 2003.

Barnes and Nobles

Two Clemson players scored their first career touchdowns on their first career reception against Presbyterian. We aren't sure a book will be written and sold about the experience, but Clemson running back Daniel Barnes and tight end Kasey Nobles were excited when they crossed the goal line for the first time. Both are seniors. Barnes scored on an 11-yard pass from freshman Tajh Boyd in the second period and Nobles scored on a one-yard pass from Donny McElveen in the fourth period.

Clemson Wins Season Opener

Clemson won its season opener by a 35-10 score over North Texas on September 4. It was an unusual game from a statistical standpoint. Clemson averaged 9.2 yards per play, among the top 10 figures in Clemson history and third best in the nation for the opening weekend of

games, including 9.8 yards per rush, third best average in Clemson history and the best in the nation for the opening weekend. But, North Texas ran 37 more plays and had the ball for nearly 42 minutes in terms of time of possession and gained 462 yards.

Clemson fans wondered who would make the big plays for the Tigers now that C.J. Spiller and Jacoby Ford have moved on to the NFL. But, on the first offensive play, Andre Ellington showed that he was capable with a 60-yard run for a touchdown. Spiller scored 14 seconds into the 2009 season on a kickoff return against Middle Tennessee, and Ellington scored 16 seconds into the season against North Texas and his 60-yard run.

Later in the game, Brandon Clear took a 70-yard touchdown pass from Kyle Parker for a touchdown, his first career touchdown and fourth career reception, and Jamie Harper had a 49-yard run. Clemson had 423 yards of total offense in 46 plays for the 9.2 average.

Clemson's defense had six sacks, and 13 total tackles for loss to go with two interceptions. The Tigers allowed 10 points, just the second time in the last 10 years Clemson had allowed 10 points or less in the opening game. Jarvis Jenkins got his senior year off to a good start with three tackles for loss, while Da'Quan Bowers had eight total tackles in the game, six in the first half.

Clemson Has 2-0 Start

Clemson has started the season with a 2-0 record. Winning the first two games of the year is not an easy chore. In fact, the Tigers have just their 12th 2-0 start in the last 39 years (since 1971). Clemson last started at least 2-0 in 2007 when the Tigers got off to a 4-0 start.

Clemson was at least 2-0 just four times in the first decade of the 21st century, including the 8-0 start to the 2000 season that is Clemson's best start since the 1981 National Championship team won all 12 games. Clemson has been at least 3-0 to start a season just six times since 1971.

Clemson's Top Yards/Play Games

Clemson gained 423 yards in 46 attempts in the 35-10 win over North Texas, an average of 9.2 yards per attempt. That was the fifth best yards per play figure on record in Clemson history. The high mark is 11.18 yards per play against Georgia Tech in 1903. The Tigers had 615 yards on 55 plays under Head Coach John Heisman that day.

Clemson averaged 10.66 yards per play against Presbyterian in 1945 and 10.41 against the same Blue Hose in 1947. In 2006, the Tigers gained 9.64 yards per play in a victory over Temple in a game played in Charlotte. Clemson also picked up 9.07 yards per play in a win over Louisiana Tech that same 2006 season.

Clemson had 9.8 yards per rush in the win over North Texas thanks to 246 yards on 25 attempts. Jamie Harper and Andre Ellington each averaged over 10 yards per rush in that game. That per rush figure is third best in school history and the best by any FBS team on the opening weekend of college football. The record is the 11.2 against Georgia Tech in 1903, followed by a 10.3 average against Presbyterian in 1945.

"New Storm" Hits Clemson

During the 2006 season, Clemson running backs James Davis and C.J. Spiller were given the nickname "Thunder and Lightning" by ESPN announcer Todd Blackledge during Clemson's 31-7 victory over Georgia Tech. Davis had 216 yards rushing that night and Spiller had 116 rushing to go with 50 more receiving. It is the only game in Clemson history the Tigers have had a 200-yard rusher and 100-yard rusher in the same game. Both are now in the NFL, Davis with the Cleveland Browns and Spiller, a rookie with the Buffalo Bills.

Clemson has another running back combination this year in Jamie Harper and Andre Ellington. They call themselves "The New Storm" after the "Thunder & Lightning" nickname for Davis and Spiller. Harper and Ellington were freshmen in 2008 when Davis was a senior and Spiller was a junior.

Both played well in backup roles behind Spiller last year, and both had 100-yard games in the opener for 2010. In Clemson's 35-10 win over North Texas, Ellington had 12 carries for 122 yards and two scores, while Harper had 9-101 rushing and a rushing score. Harper also had an eight-yard touchdown reception, giving him a receiving score and a rushing score in the same game.

It marked the first time since the 2007 Maryland game that Clemson had a pair of 100-yard rushers in the same game. That year, Davis had 129 and Spiller had 106 in a win in College Park.

Ellington and Harper had 21 carries for 224 combined rushing yards against North Texas, a 10.7 yards per carry figure. Ellington's first carry of the year was a 60-yard touchdown, a score that came just 16 seconds into the season. Harper had a 49-yard run during the game that led to a Clemson score.

They both played sparingly against Presbyterian, just 14 snaps between them.

Harper and Ellington now have 1,286 combined yards in 209 attempts for their careers, a 6.15 average. Davis and Spiller had 7,428 combined rushing yards in 1359 combined attempts for a 5.47 average.

Zimmerman Has Career Day

Clemson punter Dawson Zimmerman had a career day in the season opener against North Texas. Zimmerman had six punts for 309 yards, a 51.5 average, the fourth best single game punting performance in Clemson history, and the best in 27 years.

He allowed just three punt return yards on those six punts, for a net punting figure of 51.0, an all-time Clemson record. The previous Clemson record for net punting in a game (min 4 attempts) was 46.7 by Dale Hatcher vs. Kentucky on October 3, 1981.

For his performance he was named National Punter of the Week by the College Football Performance Awards.

His day included a 79-yard punt in the second period, a boot that went from the Tigers 17 (line of scrimmage) to the North Texas four-yard-line. That 79 yarder was the second longest in school history. The only punt longer is an 81-yarder by Mitch Tyner against Texas A&M on October 6, 1973.

Punting against teams from the state of Texas must bring out the best in Clemson punters. Last Saturday's game was just the seventh time a team from Texas has played at Clemson, but the top two punts in school history have both come at Death Valley against teams from the Lone Star State.

Zimmerman leads the nation in punting after the second week of play with a 49.8 average. The only English major on the Clemson football team, Zimmerman had punts of 39, 42, 79, 54, 45 and 49 yards. The junior usually hits high punts that are tough to return, which accounts for the fact that he had just four punts of 50 yards or more last year. But he already has two this year and another of 49 yards as you can see by the list. He had 19 punts last year inside the 20 and had two in the opener against North Texas.

He followed up his opening week performance with a strong 46.3 average in the win over Presbyterian.

Clemson Starts New Decade on Good Note

Clemson began a new decade of football on a good note with its 35-10 victory over North Texas on September 4. The Tigers completed the 2000s with a 79-47 record, a .627 winning percentage. Only the 1980s, when Clemson had a .767 winning percentage, was better for the Tigers since the 1950s.

The 1980s stand as Clemson's top decade by far, as the Tigers posted a .767 winning percentage off an 87-25-4 record. That was the fifth best winning percentage in college football for that decade. Clemson won five ACC Championships and a National Championship under Danny Ford, who coached every game in that decade.

Clemson had a .658 winning percentage in the 1950s, all under Frank Howard, and that was the 15th best winning percentage in college football for that decade. Clemson went to five bowl games in that decade and won the ACC title in 1956, 1958 and 1959. Clemson was 9-0-1 in 1950.

Clemson entered this new decade with an overall mark of 641-437-45 for a .591 winning percentage for its overall history. Clemson has had just one losing decade, the 1920s, when the program had a .468 winning percentage. It is interesting to note that Clemson had the same win total in the 1930s and 1940s (51).

Parker Moves Up Touchdown Pass Chart

Kyle Parker has started and played in just 16 football games in his Clemson career, but he already has 24 touchdown passes, tied for sixth in Clemson history. He threw two in the opener against North Texas and added two more against Presbyterian, giving him 24 for his career. He moved ahead of all-time Clemson great Steve Fuller with the two TDs against Presbyterian, and is now tied with Bobby Gage and Tommy Kendrick for sixth place with 24.

Parker can throw 20 touchdown passes this year, the same total he had in 2009, he would move into fourth place on the all-time TD pass list.

Parker got off to a good start against North Texas, as he completed 9-17 passes for 170 yards and two scores with one interception. His passing efficiency for the game was 164.0, ahead of his career figure of 124.4 entering the game. He then was 6-9 for 114 yards and two scores against Presbyterian for a 246 passing efficiency. His 192 passing efficiency for the season is first in the ACC, but he does not have enough attempts to qualify for the national stats.

Parker has also moved up to 12th place in school history in career passing yards with 2810. He is also first in school history in touchdowns per game with 24 in his 16 games for a 1.5 figure. Cullen Harper is second at 1.35 per game.

Swinney Now 15-8 at Clemson

Clemson Head Coach Dabo Swinney is 15-8 in his career as the head coach of the Tigers for a .652 winning percentage. He is in his second full season after taking over for Tommy Bowden in October of 2008.

It is interesting to note that his 15-8 record is the exact same record Tommy Bowden had after 23 games of his Clemson career. The best 23-game record by a Clemson coach belongs to Ken Hatfield, who had a 19-3-1 record for his first 23 games at Clemson. Frank Howard was 15-6-2 and Danny Ford was 14-9.

Swinney has a 9-3 record in ACC result season games so far in his career, 3-1 in the 2008 season and 6-2 last year when he took the Tigers to the ACC Atlantic Division title. Bowden was also 9-3 in his first 12 ACC games. Clemson opens ACC play October 2 against Miami (FL).

Clemson Has 10 Straight Winning seasons

Clemson clinched its 10th-straight winning season with the victory over Virginia on November 21, 2009. The Tigers have had a winning season every year since 2000. Clemson's last non-winning season was in 1999, when the Tigers were 6-6 in Tommy Bowden's first year, but did play in the Peach Bowl.

Entering 2010, 14 different schools have had a winning season at least 10 years in a row. In addition to Clemson, those schools are Boise State, Boston College, Florida, Florida State, Georgia, Georgia Tech, Louisiana State, Ohio State, Oklahoma, Southern Mississippi, Texas, Texas Tech, and Virginia Tech.

Clemson to Play Difficult Schedule in 2010

Clemson was not ranked in the top 25 of the preseason USA Today Coaches poll, but the poll did give an indication to the difficult nature of Clemson's 2010 schedule.

Clemson will play #13 Miami (FL), #17 Georgia Tech, #18 North Carolina, #20 Florida State and #23 Auburn this year, one of just nine schools nationally to have at least five games against USA Today preseason top 25 teams on their schedule. Miami (FL), LSU and Mississippi State will all play six top 25 teams according to the USA Today poll, while Clemson, Duke, Virginia, Alabama, South Carolina and Tennessee all play five.

Clemson has three of those five games on the road and joins Miami (FL), LSU and Mississippi State as schools from the above list with three road games against ranked schools.

Clemson must play three preseason top 25 teams in a succession and four out of five at midseason. Dabo Swinney's team plays at #23 Auburn on September 18, at home against #13 Miami (FL) on October 2 (after an open date), and at #18 North Carolina on October 9. After a game against Maryland, the Tigers face #17 Georgia Tech at home on October 23.

If Clemson plays three consecutive games against top 25 opponents this year it would be the first time since 2001 when Clemson played Florida State (14), Maryland (13) and South Carolina (22) in consecutive games near the end of the season.

This year's schedule could be among the toughest in school history in terms of playing ranked opponents. The Tigers have played five top 25 teams on the date of the game just three seasons in school history.

Clemson had five games against top 25 teams in 1988, 1999 and 2005.

Last year Clemson played four games against top 25 teams, but all four of those teams were ranked in the top 15 at the time of the game. It was just the second time Clemson played four games against top 15 teams in the same year. The 1999 season was the other time that has happened.

Being left out of the preseason poll is not always a bad indicator for the Tigers, especially in recent years. Four times in the last 10 years (2003, 2005, 2007 and 2009) Clemson has been ranked in the final top 25 after not being ranked in the preseason poll. Only Boise State has had more final top 25 rankings without a preseason top 25 in the last 10 years. The Broncos have done that five times, while Clemson, Boston College and Oregon State have all done it four times apiece.

Parker Returns to Tigers Football Team

It has been a busy summer, a busy year, for that matter for Clemson student-athlete Kyle Parker. He helped Clemson to the ACC Championship game for the first time in the fall when he started at quarterback in all 14 games during the 2009 season. He then helped the Tigers baseball team to the Final Four of the College World Series in the spring and summer.

In June, while playing in the NCAA Tournament for the Tigers at Auburn, he was drafted in the first round of the Major League Draft by the Colorado Rockies. On July 20, he announced he would return to Clemson to play football, even if he signed with the Rockies. Then on August 16, he signed a contract with the Rockies during the middle of the August fall practice for the Clemson football team. He expects to join the Rockies at Spring training in March and that this will be his final year of college football.

Below are his accomplishments while at Clemson divided into various categories:

Top Dual Sports Accomplishments

- First student-athlete in Division I sports history to throw 20 touchdown passes and hit 20 home runs in the same academic year.

- First student-athlete to play on an ACC Atlantic Division football and baseball championship team in the same academic year.

- Played on two top 20 teams in the same academic year. The Clemson football team finished 24th in the final AP poll and the Clemson baseball team finished fourth in the final USA Today Coaches Poll and the Collegiate Baseball poll.

- Only ACC athlete to currently rank in the top 10 of his school's career list in career touchdown passes (24, 6th) and home runs (46, 8th).

Top Football Accomplishments

- Tied for first in the nation in wins by a freshman quarterback in 2009 with Matt Barkley of Southern California.

- Only freshman quarterback nationally to take his team to a conference championship game in 2009.

- Parker's nine wins as a freshman quarterback were four more than any other Clemson freshman in history.

- Established Clemson freshman records for touchdown passes (20), passing yards (2526), and completions (205).

- Led Clemson to victory at 8th ranked Miami (FL) tied for highest ranked team Clemson has defeated on the road.

- Threw 20 touchdown passes in 2009, fourth most in a season in Clemson history.

- Set Clemson record for consecutive games with a touchdown pass with seven during the 2009 season.

- Threw seven total touchdown passes in wins over Miami (FL) and Florida State. It marked first time ever Clemson had beaten those two teams in the same year.

Top Baseball Accomplishments

- First-round draft choice and the 26th overall selection of the 2010 MLB Draft by the Colorado Rockies

- Ranked 8th in Clemson history in total home runs with 46, just 13 short of the career mark (which he will not break because he has signed a professional baseball contract).

- Hit 20 home runs in 2010, most on Clemson's College World Series Team and 10th most in a season in Clemson history.

- Hit three home runs in one game as a freshman at Wake Forest in 2008 to tie the Clemson single game record.

- Scored 85 runs in 2010, fifth most in the nation.

- First-team All-ACC in 2008 and 2010. He made the 2008 team in the Spring of 2008 in what should have been his senior year of high school.

- First-team All-American Ping Baseball, second-team by Baseball America, second-team by NCBWA, and third team ABCA.

- Hit 25 home runs in his first 103 games, the fewest games needed to reach 25 home runs in Clemson history.

- Four-team ACC Player of the Week over his career. Only Kris Benson and Khalil Greene had more.

Four Returning Starters in Clemson Offensive Line

One of the strengths of the Clemson football team in 2010 should be the offensive line. The Tigers return starters Chris Hairston and Landon Walker at guards, Dalton Freeman at center and Antoine McClain at guard. The only lost starter from last year is Thomas Austin, who is currently with the Minnesota Vikings. And that does not include returning all-purpose lineman Mason Cloy, who has 17 starts in his career and has more career knockdown blocks than any other active Tiger (107).

Clemson has had a good record in years it has had at least four starters returning in the offensive line. Since 1972, Clemson has averaged almost nine wins per year when it has at least four returning starters in the offensive line and the winning percentage in those seasons is .731

Ellington Averaged 7.22 Yards per Rush

While C.J. Spiller had perhaps the best individual season in Clemson football history in 2009, there may be a more than a capable replacement for the Tigers top rusher next season. Andre Ellington gained 491 yards on 68 carries last year as a freshman and the 7.22 average is just behind the 7.27 figure Spiller had when he was a freshman in 2006. As you can see by the chart below, Spiller's is second best in Clemson history for a season and Ellington is third given a minimum of 400 yards rushing.

The Clemson single season record is nearly 60 years old. Billy Hair had a 7.39 average on 71 attempts on Clemson's undefeated 1950 team.

Ellington got off to a great start in the opener with 12 rushes for 122 yards, a 10.2 average.

Parker and McDaniel Named to Watch Lists

Clemson quarterback Kyle Parker and safety DeAndre McDaniel were both named to preseason watch lists for national awards in August. Parker was named to the preseason Watch List for the Maxwell Award, while McDaniel was named to the watch list for the Bednarik Award.

The Maxwell Award has been presented to the outstanding collegiate football player in America since 1937 and is named in honor of sportswriter Robert W. "Tiny" Maxwell. The Chuck Bednarik Award has been presented to the nation's top defensive player since 1995. Mr. Bednarik is a member of both the College Football Hall of Fame in 1969 and the NFL Hall of Fame in 1967.

Parker quarterbacked Clemson to a 9-5 record last year, including a 6-2 record in the ACC, good enough for the Atlantic Division title. Clemson finished 24th in the final AP poll and gained a bowl victory over Kentucky. Parker established Clemson freshman records for touchdown passes (20), passing yards (2526), completions (205) and touchdown/interception ratio (20/12).

Parker also helped the Clemson baseball team to the College World Series last year by hitting 20 home runs and hitting .344. He scored 85 runs, fifth highest total in the nation. He became the first athlete in Division I sports history to hit 20 home runs and throw 20 touchdown passes in the same academic year. His touchdown pass total ranked fourth best in Clemson history for a season and his home run total ranked ninth best in school history.

McDaniel finished third in the nation in interceptions last year with eight, a total that tied a Clemson record. He also had 102 tackles and was the only player in the nation in eight interceptions and at least 100 tackles last year. He helped the Clemson defense rank fifth in the nation in interceptions last year with 21.

Parker was one of 10 ACC players on the Maxwell Award Watch list and McDaniel was one of 11 ACC players on the preseason Bednarik Award Watch List.

Three Clemson Players Named Preseason All-ACC

McDaniel Receives More Votes Than Any other Player

Clemson seniors DeAndre McDaniel, Jarvis Jenkins and Chris Hairston have all been named first-team preseason All-ACC by the media covering the ACC Football Kickoff in Greensboro, NC in July.

McDaniel had 48 votes on the 52 ballots that were cast, more than any other player, offense or defense. The senior from Tallahassee, FL, had eight interceptions and 102 tackles last year, the only player in the nation with at least eight interceptions and 100 tackles. He was first-team

All-American as a junior by the Football Writers Association and a first-team All-ACC performer at safety.

Jenkins will join McDaniel on Clemson's defense this year. The native of Clemson was an honorable mention All-ACC pick last year when he had 69 tackles, more than any other Clemson defensive lineman. He was fifth on the team in tackles overall and his 11 tackles for loss ranked second behind Ricky Sapp.

Hairston was a second-team All-ACC selection as an offensive tackle last year when he helped create holes for Clemson's highest scoring team in history on a total points basis (436). He started 12 of the 14 games last year and Clemson had a 9-3 record in those games. The native of Winston-Salem, NC had seven knockdown blocks and an 85 percent grade in Clemson's 40-37 overtime win at Miami last year. He has started in each of Clemson's last three bowl games.

Napier Youngest Coordinator in the ACC

Clemson offensive coordinator Billy Napier is the youngest coordinator in the ACC and the youngest coordinator in Clemson football history. Napier was born on July 21, 1979, which makes him 31-years-old as we start the 2010 season. He started in the coordinator position last year, so he was just 30 when he took over the job. The previous youngest coordinator in Clemson history was Whitey Jordan, who was Frank Howard's offensive coordinator in 1968 at the age of 32. Jordan retired to Clemson and still comes to Clemson's practice daily as an official.

Napier is the youngest coordinator on either side of the ball in the ACC by six years. The second youngest is Florida State offensive coordinator James Coley, who was born on April 14, 1973. Kurt Roper at Duke, Bill Lazor at Virginia and James Franklin at Maryland are all 38 as we start the season 39.

Clemson Head Coach Dabo Swinney is also the youngest head coach in the ACC. Swinney will turn 41 on November 20, 2010, the day Clemson plays at Wake Forest in the final ACC regular season game for the Tigers. The second youngest coach in the ACC is Randy Shannon at Miami (FL). He is 44. The two young coaches will meet in Miami on October 2 at Clemson.

On other note of interest is that Florida State's Jimbo Fisher and Virginia's Mike London both have the same birthday, October 9. They are five years apart, but Fisher is still the third youngest coach in the ACC and London is fourth.

Cloy Nominated for All-State AFCA Good Works Team

Clemson offensive line standout Mason Cloy has been nominated for the 2010 AFCA Good Works Team. Cloy is one of 112 nominees from all levels of college football who are looking to make the 22-man team. The team honors college football players who give back to their community.

If he makes the team, which will be announced in September, it would give Clemson a selection for the second straight year. Last year, current Tiger receiver Xavier Dye was chosen. Robert Carswell and Nick Eason are two former Tigers who were chosen during their Clemson careers.

Cloy, a red-shirt junior from Columbia and Spring Valley High School, has been active in community service since he first came to Clemson in 2007. He has been a part of Relay for Life, has visited patients in Greenville Memorial Hospital, visited a children's home in Central, and made a presentation at an orphanage in Anderson, SC. He is a member of the FCA Leadership team known as Athlete Ministry, and went on an FCA mission trip to New Orleans two years ago. He has also served as a mentor to a middle school child in the area.

Cloy was an academic All-ACC selection in 2009, who is pursuing a double major in parks protected area management, and sociology with an emphasis in criminal justice. In June, Cloy began laying the groundwork to become an Army infantryman by taking part in a comprehensive program at Fort Knox, KY.

Cloy finished third on the Clemson team in knockdown blocks last year with 52 and he has 105 in the last two years. He started five of the 14 games on Clemson's Atlantic Division Championship team. He suffered a broken leg in the ACC Championship game, but will be back on the field when the team opens fall practice on August 3.

How Many Freshman Will Play?

Clemson Schedule Notes

•Clemson will face seven 2009 bowl teams, including four on the road on its 2010 football schedule. The schedule includes Clemson's first regular season game with Auburn since 1971 and the Tigers first trip to North Carolina since 2002.

•All 12 games on the schedule will be played on Saturdays. It will be the first time since 2001 that Clemson has played all of its games on Saturdays. All game times will be announced at a later date. All special home game designations will be announced at a later date.

•Clemson will have an open date on September 25, then play eight consecutive conference games between October 2 and November 20. It is the first time Clemson has played eight consecutive ACC games since the 2003 season, **but the first time in school history Clemson has played eight ACC games over an eight-week period.**

•Clemson opens its ACC schedule on October 2 when Miami (FL) comes to Clemson. **It is the latest start to the ACC schedule for Clem-**

son since 1982 when Clemson played its first league game on October 9 at Virginia. Clemson and Miami have met as ACC foes three times and all three have been decided in overtime, including Clemson's 40-37 victory in Miami last year. In fact the road team has won each of the last three meetings in at least one overtime.

•Clemson will have its first ACC road game at North Carolina on October 9. It will be just the second meeting between the two schools since 2003 and Clemson's first trip to Chapel Hill since 2002. Clemson has won each of the last three meetings and five of the last six dating to 1999.

•Clemson has a two-game home stand on October 16 and October 23 against the only two ACC teams to beat the Tigers last year. Maryland will be the foe at Death Valley on October 16 and Georgia Tech will come to Clemson on October 23. The Yellow Jackets beat Clemson twice last year, 30-27 in the regular season in Atlanta and 39-34 in the ACC Championship game in Tampa.

•It will be the fourth game against Georgia Tech within the first 35 games of Dabo Swinney's Clemson coaching career.

•The Tigers will travel to Boston College on October 30 for the annual battle for the O'Rourke-McFadden Trophy. Clemson has defeated the Eagles each of the last two years. The 2008 win in Boston was Dabo Swinney's first victory as Clemson head coach.

•Clemson will play its final ACC home game against NC State on November 6. Clemson has beaten NC State six consecutive years, Clemson's longest winning streak in history over the Wolfpack.

•The Tigers must play their last two ACC games on the road, at Florida State on November 13, then at Wake Forest on November 20. Clemson has beaten the Seminoles five of the last seven years, but just once at Tallahassee since 1989. The Tigers have won eight of the last 11 games over Wake Forest, but the Demon Deacons have won three of the last four in Winston-Salem.

•Clemson concludes the regular season on November 27, the Saturday after Thanksgiving, when South Carolina travels to Clemson. Clemson has won six of the last eight over the Gamecocks, but South Carolina won last year's meeting in Columbia. Clemson has won five of the last six in the series played at Clemson.
