THE GAME

Auburn and Oregon meet for the first time with the BCS National Championship on the line. Both teams enter the game with unblemished records and ranked No. 1 or 2 in every poll. The Tigers will be looking for their second national title, having won the 1957 National Championship.

AUBURN'S BOWL HISTORY

This season's bowl appearance marks the 36th time that the Tigers have played in a bowl game, which is the 16th-highest total of any school. Auburn has a 20-13-2 (.600) record in its previous 35 bowl games, and has played in a bowl game in 22 of the last 29 years.

Since the 1974 Gator Bowl, Auburn is 15-6-1 (.705) in bowl games, winning four consecutive from 1974-84 ('74 Gator, '82 Tangerine, '83 Sugar, '84 Liberty) and three straight from 2003-05 ('03 Capital One, '03 Music City, '05 Sugar). The Tigers have also won their last three bowl games, defeating Nebraska, 17-14, in the 2007 AT&T Cotton Bowl Classic, Clemson, 23-20 in overtime, in the 2007 Chick-fil-A Bowl, and Northwestern, 38-35 in overtime, in the 2010 Outback Bowl.

TIGERS' BOWL NOTABLES

Auburn will be playing in its second BCS bowl game since the inception of the BCS in 1998. The Tigers beat Virginia Tech in the 2005 Sugar Bowl ... Auburn is 16th in the NCAA all-time in bowl appearances (36) and 13th all-time in bowl victories (20) ... Among schools with 10 or more previous bowl appearances, Auburn's winning percentage of .600 ranks eighth ... The Tigers are 12-3-2 in bowl games when scoring first ... Auburn is 14-2 in bowl games when scoring 20 or more points ... Auburn has been held to fewer than 20 points in five of its last eight bowl games, but is 3-2 in those five contests ... Auburn has never been shut out in a bowl game ... The Tigers have worn blue jerseys in 13 of their last 16 bowl games, going 7-5-1 in those 13 games.

CHIZIK IN BOWL GAMES

The BCS National Championship Game will be Gene Chizik's second bowl game as a head coach. Last season he became the first Auburn first-year head coach to lead the Tigers to a bowl game, beating Northwestern, 38-35 in overtime, in the Outback Bowl.

As an assistant coach, Chizik was part of six coaching staffs that coached bowl games, posting a perfect 6-0 record in those games (Texas: 2006 Rose; Auburn: 2005 Sugar, 2003 Music City, 2003 Capital One; Clemson: 1989 Gator, 1988 Citrus). His only losing experience in a bowl game was as a player at Florida in 1981 when the Gators lost the Peach Bowl to West Virginia.

ON THIS DATE

Auburn has never before played on Jan. 10. In fact, the Tigers have only played two games at a later date in the academic calendar than the BCS National Championship Game. Auburn's first ever game was played on Feb. 20, 1892 - a 10-0 win over Georgia in Atlanta - and the following year, the Tigers played Alabama in Birmingham on Feb. 22, winning 32-22.

IN JANUARY

Auburn is 10-8-2 (.550) all-time in the month of January, and has won its last two. Auburn defeated Northwestern, 38-35 in overtime, on Jan. 1, 2010 in the Outback Bowl, and earned a 17-14 victory over Nebraska in the 2007 AT&T Cotton Bowl Classic, also on Jan. 1.

AGAINST THE PAC-10

Auburn has only played eight games in its history against schools currently in the Pac-10 Conference, owning a 5-3 record. Auburn's last game against a Pac-10 team was a 40-14 victory over Washington State in the 2006 season opener. The Tigers are 2-1 against Arizona, 1-0 against Oregon State and 1-2 against USC. Two of the games against Pac-10 schools were in bowl games, with Auburn winning both times.

Bowl Notes



OREGON QUICK HITTERS

Oregon will be playing in its second straight BCS Bowl ... The Ducks are the first Pac-10 team to go undefeated in conference play since the league went to a nine-game conference schedule in 2006 ... Oregon has led every game this season heading into the fourth quarter ... The Ducks lead the nation in scoring offense (49.3), rank second in total offense (537.5) and fourth in rushing offense (303.8) ... Heisman Trophy finalist LaMichael James leads the nation in rushing, averaging 152.9 yards per game and has a nation-best 21 rushing touchdowns ... Oregon is seventh nationally in turnover margin at +13, and has intercepted 20 passes ... The Ducks are 14th nationally in scoring defense (18.4) and have the eighth-most tackles for loss (7.5 per game) ... Oregon leads the nation in punt returns, while individually, Cliff Harris ranks second averaging 19.5 yards per return with four touchdowns.

AUBURN-OREGON COACHING TIES

- ▶ Oregon defensive line coach Jerry Azzinaro served as the defensive coordinator at Duke from 2002-04, while Auburn defensive coordinator Ted Roof was the Blue Devils' head coach. The two also worked together at UMass in 1994.
- ▶ Oregon offensive coordinator Mark Helfrich held that position at Colorado in 2007-08 while Auburn offensive line coach Jeff Grimes coached the Buffaloes' line. The two also worked together in 2000 at Boise State and from 2001-03 at Arizona State.
- ▶ Oregon special teams coordinator/tight ends coach Tom Osborne also coached with Grimes at Arizona State from 2001-03, serving as assistant head coach as well as special teams coordinator/tight ends coach.

ASSISTANTS IN BOWLS

Auburn's post-season appearance will mark at least the fifth bowl appearance as a player or coach for each Auburn assistant coach. Running backs coach Curtis Luper and defensive line coach Tracy Rocker lead the way with 11 bowl games each, while cornerbacks coach Phillip Lolley and defensive coordinator Ted Roof will be going to their 10th bowl. Rocker leads the way in bowl games as a player with four during his stint at Auburn, while Luper played in three.

TIGERS VS. NO. 2-RANKED TEAMS

Auburn has an all-time record of 3-9 against teams ranked No. 2 in the Associated Press poll. The Tigers are 3-2 when they are ranked and playing the No. 2 team, and 0-7 when unranked and playing the No. 2 team. The last time Auburn played a No. 2-ranked team was last year's 26-21 loss to Alabama in Jordan-Hare Stadium. Prior to that, the No. 11 Tigers beat No. 2 Florida, 27-17, in 2006. Auburn's other wins over No. 2-ranked teams are a 30-20 victory over Alabama in 1989 in the first Iron Bowl played in Auburn, and a 17-16 win over the Tide in the 1972 "Punt Bama Punt" game.

IN THE BCS AND POLLS

Auburn is currently ranked No. 1 in the BCS standings, the Associated Press poll and the Harris Interactive poll, and No. 2 in the USA Today poll. The Tigers' tough schedule helped Auburn shine in the computer rankings used by the BCS, as all six computers had Auburn No. 1. Auburn also held the top spot in the initial BCS rankings on Oct. 24, marking the first time Auburn had ever been the BCS No. 1-ranked team since its inception in 1998. The Tigers' No. 1 rank by the Associated Press is a first for Auburn since a two-week period early in the 1985 season.

BEATING THE BEST

Auburn is the only team that beat six teams ranked in the final regular season Associated Press Top 25 poll (No. 8 Arkansas, No. 11 LSU, No. 15 Alabama, No. 19 South Carolina twice, No. 21 Mississippi State). Arkansas, whom Auburn beat on Oct. 16, defeated four currently ranked teams. No other team beat more than three other teams ranked in the final AP top 25.

WINS VS. RANKED TEAMS

Auburn has won five games this season against teams that were nationally ranked at the time of the game, beating then-No. 6 LSU, No. 9 Alabama, No. 12 Arkansas, No. 12 South Carolina and No. 19 South Carolina (SEC Championship Game). It marks the first time Auburn has beaten five ranked teams in the same season since the 2004 team also beat five during a 13-0 season.

AWASH IN AWARDS

Auburn has had a record-setting season in terms of hardware won by individual players and coaches this season. Junior quarterback Cam Newton took home the biggest prize, joining Pat Sullivan (1971) and Bo Jackson (1985) as Auburn's Heisman Trophy winners, and also won the Maxwell Award, Walter Camp Player of the Year Award and the Davey O'Brien Award. Junior defensive tackle Nick Fairley joined his defensive line coach, Tracy Rocker, as Tigers to have won the Lombardi Award. Head coach Gene Chizik was named the Home Depot National Coach of the Year, while offensive coordinator Gus Malzahn won the Broyles Award as the nation's top assistant coach. In addition, Newton, Fairley and senior offensive tackle Lee Ziemba have been named to multiple All-America teams.

SEC CHAMPS

Auburn won its seventh all-time SEC title and second SEC Championship Game with a 56-17 victory over South Carolina Dec. 4. The Tigers last won the SEC in 2004, and also claimed titles in 1957, 1983, 1987, 1988 and 1989. Auburn's victory over Georgia on Nov. 13 clinched the SEC West title for the Tigers, who played in their fourth SEC Championship game (1997, 2000, 2004, 2010). The Tigers have now won or shared the SEC West title seven times since 1997, and won their third outright title this season (2000, 2004, 2010).

13 WINS IS TIED FOR MOST IN HISTORY

Auburn's 13-0 record marks just the second time the Tigers have won this many games in a season, and only the second season with more than 11 victories. Auburn finished the 2004 season with a 13-0 record. Auburn has also extended its winning streak to 14 games, which is the longest since Auburn won 15 in a row from 2003-04 and the fifth longest winning streak in school history.

CARDIAC KIDS

Auburn has won six games this season by single digits, including four games that were decided by just three points or less. The last time Auburn won three games by three or fewer points in the same season was 1960, when the Tigers won three games by three points and one by two points en route to an 8-2 season.

COMEBACK KIDS

Auburn has trailed in eight of its 13 victories this season and overcame double-digit deficits to beat Clemson, South Carolina, Georgia and Alabama. The Tigers trailed Clemson 17-0 in the second quarter Sept. 18 before winning 27-24 in overtime, trailed the Gamecocks 20-7 in the second period Sept. 25 before rallying for a 35-27 victory, and trailed Georgia 21-7 into the second quarter on Nov. 13 before coming back to win 49-31.

Auburn staged its greatest comeback in the regular season finale against Alabama, rallying from a 24-0 second quarter deficit to win 28-27. It marked the largest deficit overcome in a victory in school history.

This season marks the first time that Auburn has had four wins in the same season while overcoming double digit deficits. There were only two prior known occurrences when Auburn rallied from double digit deficits twice in one season. In 1997, Auburn overcame 11-point deficits to beat both Alabama in the Iron Bowl and Clemson in the Peach Bowl. In 1972, Auburn trailed Georgia Tech by 14 and Alabama by 16 in the 'Punt Bama Punt' game before winning both contests.

The victory over Clemson had marked the first time that Auburn overcame a deficit of at least 17 points to win since Sept. 28, 2002, when the Tigers trailed Syracuse 17-0 at Jordan-Hare Stadium before coming back to win 37-34 in three overtimes. It was just Auburn's fourth 17-point deficit overcome in a victory since 1970.

NO QUIT UNDER CHIZIK

Under Gene Chizik, Auburn is 5-2 when trailing by 10 or more points in a game, with wins this season against Clemson, South Carolina, Georgia and Alabama and a victory over West Virginia last year. Prior to Chizik's arrival, Auburn was 4-44 during a 14-year span from 1995-2008 when trailing by 10 or more points.

NEWTON GOING FOR HISTORY

Cam Newton has a chance to become the 14th player to win the Heisman Trophy and a national championship in the same season. It's happened five times since 1993, including Alabama's Mark Ingram last season, but just once — Pitt's Tony Dorsett in 1976 — in the previous 54 years.

PILING UP THE TOUCHDOWNS

Junior quarterback Cam Newton is one of just three players in NCAA FBS history to run for 20 touchdowns and throw for 20 touchdowns in a single season, joining Florida's Tim Tebow in 2007 and Nevada's Colin Kaepernick this season. Newton has accounted for 49 touchdowns this season, which is the most of anyone in the nation. He has thrown for 28, rushed for 20 and caught one. Of the 119 other Football Bowl Subdivision schools, 91 of them (76.5 percent) have not scored 49 touchdowns this season as a team.

Newton's 49 TDs scored and passed for is nearly double the previous Auburn record of 26 held by Pat Sullivan (1970). It also ranks second best in SEC history. He broke both the Auburn single-season rushing touchdown record and the school single-season passing touchdown record in the same game against Alabama Nov. 26.

MAKING HISTORY

On Nov. 13 against Georgia, Cam Newton became the first player in SEC history to throw for 2,000 yards and rush for 1,000 yards in a season. His achievement had previously been accomplished by just seven quarterbacks in NCAA history entering this season, including just three from BCS conference schools. Michigan's Denard Robinson also joined the club on Nov. 20. Of the eight other quarterbacks to reach the milestone, only Robinson and UAB's Joe Webb last season rushed for more yards than Newton has this season. AIRING IT OUT

Cam Newton leads the nation in passing efficiency with a rating of 188.16, which is ahead of the current NCAA record for passing efficiency in a single season (186.0 by Hawaii's Colt Brennan in 2006). Newton has been particularly effective through the air in his last five games, completing 75-of-108 passes (69.4 percent) for 1225 yards, 15 touchdowns and just one interception for an efficiency rating of 208.70. He currently has his second streak of at least two TD passes in at least five straight games, as earlier this year he became the first quarterback in school history to throw at least two touchdown passes in each of the first five games of a season. He now has an Auburn single-season record 28 touchdown passes this year.

Newton, who has accounted for at least four TDs in eight different games this season, also leads the SEC and ranks 10th nationally in total offense (307.5), ranks sixth in the SEC in all-purpose yards (111.6), has caught two passes for 42 yards and a touchdown and even punted once for 22 yards.

SCOOTIN' NEWTON

Cam Newton leads the SEC and ranks 15th nationally (second among quarterbacks) in rushing, averaging 108.4 yards per game, and is tied for second in the nation with 20 rushing touchdowns. He is the only player in the country with five games of 170+ rushing yards this season.

Newton's numbers were even better in SEC games, as he averaged 135.5 yards per game and had 15 rushing touchdowns - both league bests. He averaged more yards rushing in SEC games

than five other entire SEC teams. Newton is the first player in school history to rush for three or more touchdowns in three consecutive SEC games, and the second player in school history to rush for three or more touchdowns in back-to-back games, joining Joe Cribbs (1979).

It took Newton just eight games to break the SEC's single-season rushing record by a quarterback of 1,006 yards, and he now has 1,409 yards. With one game left, Newton ranks third on Auburn's single-season rushing chart.

Newton, who has 211 more yards rushing than anyone else in the SEC, also has a chance to become the first quarterback to lead the SEC in rushing since Auburn's Jimmy Sidle in 1963.

FIVE OF THE TOP 51 (FORMERLY 50)

Cam Newton has only played one season at Auburn, but amazingly, he owns five of the top 51 rushing performances in the history of a school known for its long line of stellar running backs. He had five of the top 50 until Michael Dyer rushed for 180 yards at Ole Miss, bumping Newton's fifth-best effort down one spot.

In his Auburn debut, Newton posted the second-highest rushing total ever for an Auburn quarterback, gaining 171 yards and two touchdowns against Arkansas State. He topped that against South Carolina, going for 176 yards and three scores, then went for 198 yards and four TDs at Kentucky, tying the school single-game record for rushing touchdowns by a quarterback. He added 188 yards and three TDs against Arkansas before shredding LSU for a career-high 217 yards and two more scores.

Newton is the only player in school history to rush for 170 or more yards in four consecutive Southeastern Conference games, and no one else had done it more than twice in a row. Newton is also only the second player in school history to rush for 170 or more yards five times in a single season, joining Bo Jackson who accomplished the feat in 1985.

DOMINATING VS. THE SEC

Cam Newton has excelled all season, but stepped up his game in SEC games. In eight conference games (four against ranked opponents), he rushed for 1,084 yards (135.5 ypg) and 15 TDs, including 603 yards during a three-game span (Kentucky, Arkansas, LSU). The last time an Auburn player rushed for 600 total yards over three consecutive games was in 1985, when Bo Jackson tallied 658 yards against Ole Miss (240), Florida State (176) and Georgia Tech (242). Newton's 603 yards are the most rushing yards ever by an Auburn player over a three-game span in SEC action. The previous best was Jackson's 570 rushing yards in 1983 against Florida (196), Georgia (118), and Alabama (256).

Newton also completed 68.7 percent of his throws during those eight games, completing 103-of-150 throws for 1,303 yards and 12 touchdowns with just three interceptions.

OFFENSE KEEPS ROLLING

Auburn's offense continues to shine under second-year offensive coordinator Gus Malzahn, as the Tigers rank sixth nationally in scoring offense (42.7) and rushing offense (287.2) and seventh in total offense (497.7). With 555 points, Auburn has smashed the old school single-season record of 433 points set last year, and also broke last year's record of 5,613 total yards, with 6,470 yards so far this season. Auburn is also on pace to break the school single-season records for scoring per game (38.5 - 1995) and total offense per game (485.0 - 1970) and currently has the fourth-best rushing yards per game average in school history (312.5 - 1985).

Auburn has scored at least 50 points in six different games this season, which is the most in one season in school history. The Tigers missed adding a seventh occurrence by one point, scoring 49 vs. Georgia.

In 26 games under Malzahn, Auburn has totaled at least 500 yards of offense 11 times, including seven this season. Prior to Malzahn's arrival, Auburn hadn't had a single 500-yard game since the 2005 Georgia game - a streak of 40 games.

DOMINANT GROUND GAME

Auburn's running game has been dominant this season, as the Tigers easily lead the SEC with their average of 287.2 yards per game - 71.4 yards per game more than second-place Mississippi State. Auburn has three of the top 12 rushers in the SEC, led by junior quarterback Cam Newton, who averages a league-best 108.4 yards per game on the ground. Freshman Michael Dyer is ninth in the SEC averaging 73.1 yards per game, while sophomore Onterio McCalebb (58.7 ypg) is 12th. The Tigers have been so good on the ground that even if you take away Cam Newton's 1,409 rushing yards, Auburn would still have 2,324 yards rushing, and its average of 178.8 yards per game would still rank third in the SEC and 32nd nationally.

Auburn is averaging 6.2 yards per carry, which would be the second-best average over the course of a season in SEC history, trailing only LSU's average of 6.8 in 1945.

The Tigers have a chance to become the closest SEC team since the 1985 Auburn squad to average more than 300 yards rushing per game in a season. The 2007 Arkansas squad came closest in the last 25 years, averaging 286.5 yards per game.

Auburn has rushed for at least 300 yards eight times this season, and 10 times in the past two years. Prior to Gus Malzahn's arrival, Auburn had just four 300-yard rushing games in the previous six seasons combined (76 games).

FEASTING ON SEC DEFENSES

Auburn put up amazing rushing numbers against the tough defenses of the SEC. The Tigers averaged a whopping 296.4 yards per game on the ground in eight SEC games, which led the league by 111.2 yards per game over runner-up Mississippi State (185.2). Auburn outrushed Mississippi State by 889 yards in eight conference games, and more than doubled the rushing output in SEC games of eight teams.

Auburn rushed for 440 yards against an LSU defense that ranked sixth nationally in rushing defense (83.6), marking the most yards rushing by Auburn against an SEC opponent in school history. The Tigers had 334 and 238 yards on the ground in two games against a South Carolina defense that currently ranks ninth nationally against the run. Auburn had 315 yards on the ground against a Georgia defense that entered the game ranked 13th nationally against the rush.

The Tigers put up more than 300 yards rushing against six straight SEC opponents, as Auburn also had 311 yards at Kentucky, 330 yards against Arkansas and 343 against Ole Miss. Auburn had never before rushed for at least 300 yards in even three straight SEC games, let alone six.

BY GROUND OR THROUGH THE AIR

Auburn has proven to be one of the most successful teams in the nation both rushing and passing, as the Tigers rank first in the nation in average yards per pass attempt (10.49) and third in average yards per rush attempt (6.20). No other school ranks in the top five in both categories. Overall, Auburn ranks second nationally in yards per play, averaging 7.50.

THIRD DOWN SUCCESS

Auburn's offensive success this season is due in part to the Tigers' ability to convert on third downs. Auburn is currently ranked third nationally in third-down conversions at 53.1 percent. Auburn has converted on at least half of its third-down attempts in nine of its 13 games, including eight of the last 10. In its last five games, Auburn has converted a whopping 61.7 percent of its third-down conversion attempts (37-of-60).

IN THE RED ZONE

The stats may not show it, but Auburn has been one of the most successful teams in the nation inside the red zone. The Tigers are currently tied for 27th nationally in the red zone, converting 55-of-63 opportunities (87.5 percent). However, four of Auburn's eight missed opportunities were instances in which the Tigers took a knee inside the opponents' red zone to run out the clock at the end of a game. Therefore, when trying to score in the red zone, the Tigers are 55-of-59, and the resulting percentage of 93.2 percent would rank fifth nationally.

BIG PLAYS

The Tigers have run 33 plays already this season that covered at least 35 yards, including 22 that resulted in touchdowns. Seven of the plays, all touchdowns, covered at least 68 yards. Last season, Auburn had 22 plays of at least 35 yards. In 2008, before Gus Malzahn's arrival, the Tigers had just nine plays that covered 35 or more yards all season.

ADAMS CONTINUES CLIMB

Junior Darvin Adams continues to climb up the receiving lists in the Auburn record books, as he ranks seventh in Auburn history in both receptions (111) and receiving yards (1,924). He is just 76 yards away from becoming the fifth player in school history to amass 2,000 career receiving yards. Adams set an SEC Championship Game record with 217 yards receiving against South Carolina - all in the first half - and caught two touchdown passes, including a 51-yard Hail Mary on the final play of the first half. It marked the fourth-highest single-game receiving total in school history. Adams now has eight career 100-yard receiving games, which ranks third in school history.

DYER SETS FRESHMAN RUSHING RECORD

True freshman Michael Dyer has established a new Auburn record for yards rushing by a freshman, rushing for 950 yards this season to break Bo Jackson's record of 829 set in 1982. His average of 73.1 yards per game ranks sixth nationally among freshmen.

Dyer had his third 100-yard rushing performance of the season and second in a row by rushing for a career-high 180 yards at Ole Miss Oct. 30. His rushing total was the third best ever by an Auburn freshman and most ever by an AU freshman against an SEC opponent.

McCALEBB ON RECORD PACE

Sophomore Onterio McCalebb is 12th in the SEC in rushing, averaging 58.7 yards per game, but he has done it while averaging just 6.8 rushes per game. McCalebb is averaging a whopping 8.57 yards per carry, which is better than everyone but one rusher ranked in the top 100 in the nation, and more than a full yard per carry ahead of the next-highest average. The Auburn single-season record with a minimum of 80 carries is 8.44 yards per carry by Tommy Lorino in 1956. McCalebb also had at least one rushing touchdown in five straight games prior to the Alabama game, including three straight games in which he had a TD run of at least 49 yards.

PASSING FANCY

Auburn currently leads the nation in passing efficiency with a rating of 186.86, thanks largely to two key factors. First, the Tigers are the only team in the country to average a touchdown pass on more than 10 percent of their attempts, and are far over that mark (11.11). Second, the Tigers are also the only team in the nation to average more than 10 yards per pass attempt, averaging 10.49.

Individually, Cam Newton leads the country with a rating of 188.16, thanks largely to his nation-leading touchdown percentage of 11.38 (second is Kellen Moore of Boise State at 9.57) and his average of 10.52 yards per pass attempt, which also leads the country.

EXPERIENCED O-LINE PAVES THE WAY

Auburn has one of the most experienced if not one of the best offensive lines in the country, with four senior starters who have combined to make 161 career starts. Senior All-American Lee Ziemba has started all 51 games at tackle since arriving as a true freshman, while All-SEC center Ryan Pugh has made 45 starts since his true freshman season. Guards Mike Berry (34 starts) and Byron Isom (31 starts) round out the experienced group. Auburn's offensive line was ranked as the fifth-best offensive line unit in the country by *Phil Steele's* and *Lindy's* in their preseason publications.

SECOND HALF DEFENSE

Auburn's defense has stepped up in the second half of games this season, and in particular in the fourth quarter. The Tigers have surrendered just 117 points in the second half and overtime this year (9.0 ppg), including just 48 in the fourth quarter and overtime, after giving up 201 in the first half. Auburn opponents have converted on 48.9 percent (44-of-90) of third down plays in the first half, but just 24.4 percent (19-of-78) after intermission. In addition, Auburn has surrendered only 18.3 percent of its total yardage allowed during the fourth quarter of its games this season. West Virginia is the only bowl team that has allowed a smaller percentage of its yardage in the fourth quarter.

Auburn forced turnovers on all four of South Carolina's fourth-quarter possessions Sept. 25 and three straight fourth-quarter drives by Arkansas Oct. 16. Against Alabama Nov. 26, Auburn held the Tide to just 67 yards and 0-of-8 on third downs in the second half.

FAIRLEY DOMINANT

Lombardi Award winner Nick Fairley has emerged as a force at defensive tackle for Auburn, leading the SEC in tackles for loss with 21.0, which is tied for fourth most in the nation, and ranking second in the league in sacks with 10.5. He has had at least four games with at least 2.5 tackles for loss this season.

Fairley was named SEC Defensive Player of the Year following a season in which he was named the SEC Defensive Player or Defensive Lineman of the Week five times, making him the first Auburn defensive player ever to earn five weekly SEC awards in one season.

Fairley's 21.0 tackles for loss are the most by an Auburn player since tackles for loss began being charted in 1981.

SEC SUCCESS

Since the 2004 season, Auburn has won 39 of its 56 Southeastern Conference games and 41 of its 58 games against SEC schools, including the 2004 and 2010 SEC Championship games. Auburn's success against conference schools dates back beyond 2004, however, as since the start of the 2000 season, the Tigers have the third best record among the 12 league schools in regular season conference games, just one game behind LSU for second. STOPPING THE RUN

Auburn's defense has shown drastic improvement against the run this season. After allowing 156.1 yards per game last season, Auburn ranks second in the SEC and 11th nationally this season, allowing just 111.7 yards rushing per game. One key has been limiting big plays, as the Tigers have allowed only two running plays of more than 30 yards all season. Auburn had held nine of its 12 opponents to 117 or fewer yards rushing, including five under 100.

BEHIND ENEMY LINES

Auburn's defense has been able to get into the opposition's backfield all season, as the Tigers are 26th nationally in tackles for loss, averaging 6.77 per game. Individually, Nick Fairley leads the league with 21.0 tackles for loss including 10.5 sacks, while Antoine Carter has 10.0 tackles for loss and Zach Clayton has 7.0. Twenty-one different players have recorded tackles for losses this season for Auburn, including 14 players with at least two.

BYNES LEADS LINEBACKERS

Senior Josh Bynes led Auburn in tackles last season with 104, and is leading again this season with 71 tackles, including 5.5 tackles for loss. He has also recorded three interceptions, giving him seven for his career, four pass break-ups and eight quarterback hurries. Two of his interceptions came in the fourth quarter vs. Arkansas, and both led to TDs, sealing the win. Bynes has started the last 34 consecutive games at linebacker for the Tigers.

BYRUM BREAKING RECORDS

Senior Wes Byrum became Auburn's all-time leading scorer Oct. 23 against LSU, and now has 355 career points, which ranks fifth in SEC history. Byrum, who set a school single-season record for points by a kicker last season with 99, broke the record again with 115 points already this season while passing John Vaughn (2003-06) for the top spot on Auburn's career points scored list.

Byrum had a field goal attempt blocked in the fourth quarter at Mississippi State, snapping a streak of nine consecutive made field goal attempts dating back to last season, and had another streak of eight straight snapped against LSU. He has made 30 of his last 36 field goal attempts after hitting just 11-of-19 in 2008. He scored 17 points on three field goals and eight PATs vs. Arkansas Oct. 16, which was the most points by an Auburn kicker since Jaret Holmes had 17 against UAB in 1996.

SPECIAL TEAMS IMPROVEMENTS

In addition to Wes Byrum, a number of other players are excelling on special teams. Senior Demond Washington ranks sixth in the SEC averaging 25.0 yards per kickoff return,

and has set an Auburn single-season record for kickoff return yardage with 1,025, including a 95-yard TD at Ole Miss. He had 176 kickoff return yards at Ole Miss, which is third most in a game in school history and most in the SEC this season. Also, sophomore Onerio McCaleb returned a kickoff 99 yards against Arkansas, and freshman Demetrucce McNeal has a team-high 15 tackles on special teams.

In addition, senior Mike Blanc blocked a PAT against Arkansas State and freshman Antonio Goodwin blocked a punt against Arkansas.

THE LONG AND SHORT OF IT

Of Auburn's 84 scoring drives in regulation this season, 34 have taken less than two minutes off the clock, while 17 have taken more than four minutes. Twenty-eight used just four plays or fewer, while 24 others have used nine plays or more. Auburn has had four scoring drives of 90 yards or more this season.

Auburn held the ball for the final 7:22 of the game against Kentucky, driving 86 yards on 19 plays before Wes Byrum kicked a game-winning 24-yard field goal as time expired. The 19-play drive tied for the second longest in school history, just missing the school record of 20 plays set at West Virginia in 2008.

700 WINS

Auburn's win over Georgia on Nov. 13 made Auburn the 13th Football Bowl Subdivision team to reach 700 all-time victories. The Tigers, who are now 702-400-47 (.631) all-time, are the fifth SEC team to reach the 700-win milestone. Ironically, Auburn's very first win also came against Georgia - a 10-0 win in 1892 in Atlanta.

HEISMAN HISTORY

With Cam Newton winning Auburn's third Heisman Trophy, only four schools have now won more Heismans than Auburn. Notre Dame, Ohio State and USC have won seven each, while Oklahoma has won five. Florida is the only other SEC school with as many Heismans as Auburn.

CHIZIK ERA IN SECOND YEAR

Head coach Gene Chizik is in his second year at the helm of the Auburn program, after recording the second-most wins by a first-year coach in Auburn history last season. He also became the first Auburn head coach to take his team to a bowl game in his initial season, leading the Tigers to a 38-35 overtime victory over Northwestern in the Outback Bowl. Chizik also became just the third coach in Auburn history to win his first five games as head coach, and became just the third SEC coach since the league expanded in 1992 to start 5-0.

STAFF REMAINS INTACT

Auburn achieved a rare feat by keeping its entire coaching staff from last season, making Auburn the only school in the SEC to return its head coach and every full-time assistant coach. The last time Auburn returned its entire coaching staff was when the 2006 staff returned intact in 2007.

STARTS STREAKS

Senior Lee Ziemba has set new school records for most starts and most consecutive starts, having started all 51 games over the past four seasons since arriving at Auburn as a true freshman in 2007. He broke Will Herring's school records of 49 career starts and consecutive starts.

One other senior has a streak that dates back to his freshman season, as Ryan Pugh has made 41 straight starts. Senior Josh Bynes is next with 34 consecutive starts and senior Mike Berry has made 31 straight starts.

IRON MEN

Of Auburn's 24 seniors, 13 have seen time in at least 40 games during their careers. Mario Fannin leads the group with 53 games played, including three in 2006 before redshirting and 50 games over the past four seasons, while Michael Goggans and Lee Ziemba have played in all 51 games since 2007. Mike Blanc and Wes Byrum are next with 50 games played each, followed by Zac Etheridge and Craig Stevens (49), Ryan Pugh (46), Kodi Burns and Antoine Carter (45), Mike Berry (44), Josh Bynes (43) and Zach Clayton (40).

YOUNG GUNS GET FIRST ACTION

Auburn has played 16 true freshmen this season. Twelve played in the season opener, which was tied for second behind Florida (15) for the most true freshmen played by any team in the country in the opener. Auburn has won 65 consecutive games when scoring 30 or more points. The last time the Tigers lost when registering at least 30 points was a 56-49, four overtime loss to Georgia in 1996. In its history, Auburn is now 284-4 all-time when scoring at least 30 points.

WHEN SCORING 20+ POINTS

Since the 2000 season, Auburn is 91-11 (.892) when scoring 20 or more points in a game. Dating back to the start of the 1993 season, Auburn is 134-18-1 (.879) when scoring 20 or more points in a game.

JORDAN-HARE STADIUM

Auburn finished this season with an 8-0 record at home, marking just the second time in school history Auburn won eight home games in one season (1988). The Tigers have had 11 straight winning seasons at Jordan-Hare Stadium, posting a mark of 64-15 (.810) at home since the 2000 season. The Tigers are 278-69-7 (.795) all-time at Jordan-Hare Stadium.

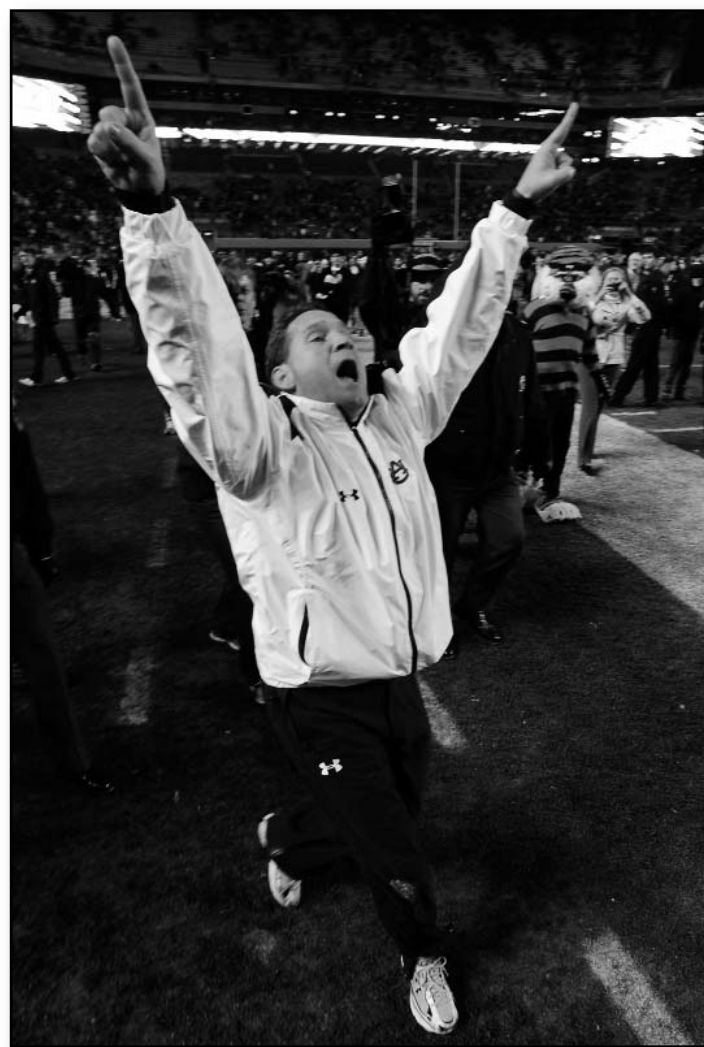
