THE GAME

Auburn (3-0, 1-0 SEC) opens SEC road play at LSU (3-0, 0-0 SEC) Saturday, September 21, in a game at Tiger Stadium (92,400) in Baton Rouge, La., televised by ESPN. Kickoff is 6:45 p.m. CT.

FIRST AND 10

- This weekend, Auburn makes its 76th appearance on an ESPN game telecast, the most of any college football program
- Gus Malzahn is 3-0 in his first season as Auburn head coach; he served as Auburn offensive coordinator from 2009-11
- LSU holds a 26-20-1 advantage in the 47 previous meetings between these Tiger teams and has a 15-5-1 lead in all games played in Baton Rouge in a series that began in 1901
- Nick Marshall's 339 yards passing against Mississippi State were the most ever by an Auburn quarterback in his SEC debut and the 16th-best single-game passing effort in Auburn history
- Auburn is one of only six teams that have not been scored on in the fourth quarter this season; the Tigers have allowed only one third-quarter touchdown and three third-quarter field goals
- Punter Steven Clark, a semifinalist for the Senior CLASS Award, has not had a punt returned this season in 13 attempts; opponents' average starting field position after punts is their own 21
- Going 10-for-10 this season, Auburn leads the SEC in red zone scoring percentage, the only SEC team with a perfect mark and one of only 10 teams nationally
- Auburn is 78-36-6 all-time in road openers, and 42-32-6 all-time in SEC road openers; the Tigers have won 16 of their last 17 SEC road openers
- Auburn's defense allows an average of just 187.3 yards in the second half and only 92.3 yards in the fourth quarter
- The Tigers have returned at least one kickoff for a touchdown each of the last six seasons, the third longest streak in America; Tre Mason had a 100-yard return against Washington State

About Gus Malzahn

Gus Malzahn, who served as Auburn's offensive coordinator from 2009-11, is in his first year as Auburn's head coach. He is 3-0 at Auburn and 12-3 overall.

Malzahn, who won the Broyles Award as the nation's top assistant coach in 2010 while helping the Tigers to the BCS National Championship, returned to Auburn after serving as the head coach at Arkansas State in 2012, where he led the program to the Sun Belt Conference title. He was named Auburn's 27th head football coach on December 4, 2012.

Last season at Arkansas State, Malzahn led the Red Wolves to a 9-3 record and 7-1 conference mark. While at Auburn, Malzahn made an immediate impact during his tenure, highlighted by a record-setting offense in 2010 under Heisman Trophy winner Cam Newton. The 2010 Auburn offense set nine school records, including points in a season (577), points per game (41.2), total yards (6,989), total offense (499.2), rushing yards (3,987), rushing touchdowns (41) and passing touchdowns (31). Malzahn's record-setting offense in 2010 led the Southeastern Conference and finished in the top 10 nationally in six statistical categories.

Malzahn's arrival in 2009 and style of offense marked a drastic turnaround from the 2008 season when Auburn struggled offensively. In a two-year period, the Tigers improved from a tie for 110th to seventh in the nation in scoring offense (from 17.3 to 41.2) and from 104th to seventh in total offense.

Prior to Auburn, Malzahn was the offensive coordinator for two seasons at Tulsa (2007-08) and Arkansas (2006). Two of Malzahn's first three collegiate offenses ranked in the top 10 nationally in rushing, including the 2008 Tulsa team and 2006 Arkansas squad. His offenses at Tulsa were also among the nation's finest, ranking first nationally in total offense in 2007 and 2008. He coached Heisman Trophy finalist Darren McFadden at Arkansas, while helping the Razorbacks finish fourth nationally in rushing at 228.5 yards per game.

Malzahn's coaching career began in his home state of Arkansas at the high school level. In 14 seasons as a high school head coach, Malzahn led seven teams to the state championship game and won three titles. In July 2013, he was inducted into the Arkansas High School Sports Hall of Fame.

The Series

Auburn and LSU will meet for the 48th time in series history. LSU holds a 26-20-1 advantage in the 47 previous meetings, and is a 15-5-1 leader in all games played in Baton Rouge.

Seven of the last nine games (and 14 of the last 23) in the Auburn-LSU series have been decided by seven points or less, including last year's 12-10 LSU victory at Auburn. The home team has won 12 of the last 14 matchups in the series.

There have been many memorable games between the teams in the last quarter-century:

2010: Auburn rushed for 440 yards, the fifth best single-game total in school history, in a 24-17 win in 2010. QB Cam Newton rushed for 217 yards and a pair of TDs, while RB Onterio McCalebb's 70-yard run in the fourth quarter was the game-winner.

2008: Jarrett Lee's 18-yard touchdown pass to Brandon LaFell with 1:03 left gave No. 6 LSU a come-from-behind 26-21 win over No. 10 Auburn in Jordan-Hare Stadium. Auburn had taken a 21-20 lead with just 6:40 left when Chris Todd found Robert Dunn for a 15-yard score, before Lee led LSU on the game-winning drive.

2007: Matt Flynn hit Demetrius Byrd with a 22-yard scoring pass with just one second left to lift No. 5 LSU to a 30-24 victory over No. 18 Auburn. Brandon Cox had connected with Rodgeriquis Smith on a 3-yard scoring pass with just 3:21 left to give Auburn a 24-23 lead before Flynn's pass capped a 58-yard game-winning drive.

2006: In a battle between two top-10 teams, Brandon Cox's 1-yard quarterback sneak in the third quarter was the only touchdown in a 7-3 Auburn victory. No. 3 Auburn held off two late scoring chances for No. 6 LSU, as Eric Brock ended one drive by tipping away a fourth-down pass, then tackled Craig Davis on the 4-yard line on the game's final play to preserve the victory.

2005: The first overtime game between the two teams was won by LSU, 20-17, when John Vaughn's 39-yard field goal attempt bounced off the left upright. A 30-yard field goal by LSU's Chris Jackson to start the overtime turned out to be the winning points. Jackson forced overtime with a 44-yard field

goal with just 1:40 left, moments after Auburn had taken a 17-14 lead on a 5-yard pass from Brandon Cox to Anthony Mix on fourth down with 4:52 left.

2004: With the threat of Hurricane Ivan looming, members of the Auburn football team spent Wednesday though Friday nights in hotels as the Auburn University campus was closed, but the game went on as scheduled.

The seemingly automatic extra point proved to be a challenge for both teams, but a second chance for Auburn allowed the Tigers to emerge with a 10-9 win in "The Extra Point Game."

LSU missed the PAT after its first-quarter touchdown, but still led 9-3 late in the game. After Courtney Taylor hauled in a 16-yard score with just 1:14 left to tie the score, Auburn missed its extra point. An LSU personal foul gave John Vaughn a second chance, and he delivered the winning point.

1997: Dameyune Craig led Auburn on an 80-yard, 10-play drive in the game's final three minutes to deliver a 31-28 upset of 10th-ranked LSU in "The Comeback." Rusty Williams capped the drive on a 1-yard touchdown plunge with 0:30 remaining. LSU attempted a 65-yard FG on the game's final play, but Quinton Reese blocked it to seal the Auburn win.

1996: "The Night The Barn Burned" will long be remembered on the Plains. As the old Auburn Sports Arena burned just outside Jordan-Hare Stadium, LSU defeated Auburn 19-15. After missing three field goals and an extra point, Auburn cut LSU's lead to 17-15 with 0:38 remaining, but Jon Cooley's two-point pass attempt was picked off by Raion Hill, who returned it the other way for two points.

1995: Wearing the traditional white jerseys at home for the first time in 13 years, LSU stunned fifth-ranked Auburn, 12-6, when Troy Twillie intercepted Patrick Nix's 11-yard pass into the end zone with no time remaining. The 1997 LSU media guide referred to this game under the heading "Bring Back The Magic."

1994: Auburn returned three of its five fourth-quarter interceptions for touchdowns to rally from a two-touchdown deficit and win 30-26. Auburn and LSU fans alike still recall the "Interception Game."

1988: LSU scored with 1:41 remaining to down fourth-ranked Auburn, 7-6. The noise from the Tiger Stadium crowd registered on a campus seismograph, thus earning the contest the title of "Earthquake Game."

In September Games

Auburn holds a 159-51-5 (.750) all-time record in games played during the month of September, and has won 34 of its last 42 September games. Auburn is the last team to defeat LSU in the month of September with a 7-3 win on The Plains in 2006

The Tigers are 96-19-1 (.830) all-time at home in September, and 62-32-4 (.653) in games on the road during that month.

Road Starts

Auburn is now 78-36-6 all-time in road openers and 359-333-39 all-time in all games played away from Auburn. The Tigers have won seven of their last nine road openers.

In SEC Road Openers

Auburn is 42-32-6 all-time in SEC road openers. The Tigers have won 16 of their last 17 SEC road openers dating back through 1996.

SEC Numbers

In SEC action all-time, Auburn holds a 292-230-18 overall record. In SEC games played in Auburn, the Tigers are 119-52-6 all-time. In all SEC games played away from Auburn, the Tigers are 173-179-12 overall.

Tigers Versus Tigers

Auburn's matchup with LSU will mark the 113th time that Auburn has faced another set of Tigers across the line of scrimmage. The Auburn Tigers are 59-48-5 all-time against schools that share the Tiger nickname. Here are the individual breakdowns:

Notes About The Coaching Staff...

Gus Malzahn is the ninth Auburn head coach to begin his career with a 3-0 record. Others were: Terry Bowden (20-0); Mike Donahue (5-0); Gene Chizik (5-0); Billy Watkins (4-0); Ralph "Shug" Jordan (3-0); Tommy Tuberville (3-0); Dave Morey (3-0); and W.S. Kienholz (3-0).

Two Auburn assistant coaches were previously on the LSU coaching staff. Charlie Harbison was LSU's defensive backs coach during the 2001-02 seasons. Dameyune Craig served as an LSU graduate assistant in 2004.

Gus Malzahn has produced nine 1,000-yard rushers in seven seasons as a college head coach/offensive coordinator including at least one in each season.

In eight seasons as a college head coach or coordinator, Malzahn has had a different starting quarterback: Robert Johnson (2006/Arkansas); Paul Smith (2007/Tulsa); David Johnson (2008/Tulsa); Chris Todd (2009/Auburn); Cam Newton (2010/Auburn); Barrett Trotter (2011/Auburn); Ryan Aplin (2012/Arkansas State); Nick Marshall (2013/Auburn).

Coach Malzahn has had nine 1,000-yard rushers, five 1,000-yard receivers and three 3,000-yard passers. Included in the 3,000-yard passers are Paul Smith, who threw for 5,065 yards for Tulsa in 2007 and David Johnson, who threw for 4,059 yards for Tulsa in 2008. Malzahn has had two 1,000-yard rushers in the same season twice, 2006 at Arkansas and 2010 at Auburn. His 2007 Tulsa team had three 1,000-yard receivers.

Rodney Garner and Dameyune Craig are the first pair of former Auburn Football lettermen to be on Auburn's staff at the same time since Kurt Crain and Garner were on the Tiger staff from 1993-95.

The last time Garner and Craig were in Auburn uniforms together at Jordan-Hare Stadium prior to this season was the 1995 Iron Bowl, a 31-27 Auburn victory. Craig's last home game as an Auburn quarterback was an AU 18-17 Iron Bowl victory in 1997.

Of the 31 schools that hired new head coaches for the 2013 season, 11 completely turned over their entire coaching staffs: Auburn, California, Cincinnati, Colorado, Florida International, Georgia State, Kentucky, Purdue, South Florida, Tennessee and Western Kentucky. Six others retained one assistant coach

(Arkansas, Boston College, Idaho, North Carolina State, Southern Miss, Western Michigan), while the other 14 kept two or more former assistants on staff.

30+ Points Equals Victory

Auburn has won 79 consecutive games when scoring 30 or more points. The last time the Tigers lost when registering at least 30 points was a 56-49 four-overtime loss to Georgia in 1996. In its history, Auburn is now 294-4 all-time when scoring at least 30 points.

Against Ranked Teams

Auburn is 97-141-6 all-time when facing ranked opponents. The Tigers are 74-112-5 all-time when facing SEC opponents that are ranked. Auburn's record against ranked LSU squads is 5-15.

Starting 3-0

This is the 48th season Auburn has started 3-0; the last was 2010. In those previous 47 seasons, Auburn has compiled a final record of 349-102-12 (.767).

Of the 47 previous seasons in which Auburn has started 3-0, Auburn has finished the season with a winning record 42 times, a losing record four times and a .500 winning percentage once (5-5 in 1951).

Fantastic Finish

In its 24-20 win over Mississippi State, Auburn scored the game-winning touchdown with just 10 seconds left in the game. The winning play was an 11-yard TD pass to C.J. Uzomah from Nick Marshall, capping off Auburn's 12-play, 88-yard drive that began with just 1:56 remaining.

The last time Auburn scored a game-winning touchdown in the final 30 seconds of regulation in a game was against Utah State in 2011 (Michael Dyer 1-yard touchdown run).

Auburn's 24-20 victory over Mississippi State was the Tigers' first fourth-quarter comeback win in an SEC game since the Tigers won at No. 10 South Carolina 16-13 with 1:38 left on a Barrett Trotter 9-yard touchdown pass to Philip Lutzenkirchen in 2011.

Auburn's last victory over an SEC opponent in the final seconds of the game was a 37-34 win at Kentucky in 2010 on a 24-yard Wes Byrum field goal as time expired.

2013 AUBURN FOOTBALL GAME NOTES

Auburn's last victory over any opponent in the final seconds was the 22-19 victory over Oregon in the 2010 BCS National Championship Game with Wes Byrum's 19-yard field goal as time expired.

Air Marshall

Junior college transfer Nick Marshall, making just his third start as Auburn's quarterback, finished the Mississippi State game 23 for 34 passing for 339 yards through the air. He is the first Auburn quarterback to pass for 300 yards in a game since Cam Newton threw for 335 yards against South Carolina in the 2010 SEC Championship game.

Marshall's 339 passing yards were 16th all-time at Auburn for single-game passing yardage and the ninth-highest passing total against a conference opponent. Marshall's 339 yards passing were also the most ever by an Auburn quarterback in an SEC debut.

On the game-winning drive, Marshall accounted for 84 of the 88 total yards, completing six of his eight passes for 65 yards while rushing three times for 19 yards.

With his 151 yards passing (9-11) in the first quarter, Marshall had already established a new season high; his previous best for a game was 147 yards vs. Arkansas State.

Marshall is the first Auburn QB to throw for more than 200 yards since Barrett Trotter vs. Utah State in 2011, and the first to throw for 200+ yards vs. an SEC opponent since Newton did it against South Carolina in the 2010 SEC championship game.

Marshall's 339 yards were the most passing yards by an AU quarterback since Brandon Cox threw for 242 versus Georgia Tech in 2005. It was just the fifth time since the start of the 2000 season that an Auburn QB has thrown for 339 or more yards; others:

- Ben Leard, 394 v Michigan, 2000
- Daniel Cobb, 381 v La. Tech [OT], 2001
- Jason Campbell, 374 v Tennessee, 2004 [SEC Championship Game]
- Brandon Cox, 343 v Georgia Tech, 2005

Adding 22 yards rushing, Marshall finished with 361 yards total offense. He also had a 37-yard pass reception off a tipped ball he threw and then caught.

Second-Half Defense

Auburn's defense has faced 19 drives in the second half this season, yielding 562 yards on 112 plays but giving up only three field goals and a touchdown. Mississippi State's third-quarter touchdown is the only second-half touchdown Auburn has allowed this season.

The Auburn defense gets even better in the fourth quarter, giving up only 277 yards on 52 plays during nine drives while giving up zero fourth quarter points during the first three games of the season. The Tigers allow 187.3 yards in the second half per game and 92.3 yards in the fourth quarter per game.

As the Mississippi State game progressed, Auburn's defense got better statistically speaking. MSU's total offense by quarter: 1) 13/132; 2) 23/110; 3) 14/104; 4) 18/69.

The Tiger defense kept Mississippi State from converting a third down in the second half; MSU was 0-7. Including a failed third-down conversion attempt at the end of the first half, the State offense was 0-8 after starting the game 5-7 on third down. New Mexico State was 0-for-7 on third down in the first half of Auburn's 42-7 win last year. The last time Auburn held an SEC opponent to 0 first downs for a half was last year at Vanderbilt, where the Commodores were 0-4 on third downs in the second half.

More From The Mississippi State Game...

- The last time Auburn won a game while giving minus-3 in the turnover margin was a 1991 32-17 win over Georgia Southern.
- Marshall connected with nine different receivers in the game, including himself. Marshall caught a deflected pass of his own and gained 37 yards on the play.
- True freshman Marcus Davis had four receptions for 38 yards on the game-winning drive. He had only two catches total through the first two games.
- Dee Ford, seeing his first action this season, had all six of his tackles in the second half, including five in the fourth quarter, three of those on the Bulldogs' final drive before AU scored. He tied a career high with his six stops.
- Auburn had nine penalties in the season opener with Washington State, and has been flagged for just six penalties in the next two games combined. Auburn had only one penalty against Mississippi State, a five-yard penalty

for illegal formation. The last time Auburn had only one penalty in a game was in 2008, when Auburn had one five-yard penalty in a 37-20 win over UT Martin.

- The 76-yard touchdown pass from Marshall to Quan Bray in the first quarter was a career long for both and is tied for the 19th longest touchdown completion in Auburn history. It was Auburn's longest TD pass play since an 80-yard completion from Cam Newton to Terrell Zachery vs. Chattanooga in 2010. It was the first receiving touchdown of Bray's career.

- The two-point conversion on a pass from Ryan White to Brandon Fulse was Auburn's second two-point conversion of the season; the first was a rush by White vs. Washington State.

- Auburn defeated Mississippi State without scoring a rushing touchdown. The last time Auburn won a game without scoring a rushing TD was in 2011 vs. Florida Atlantic (30-14). The last time Auburn won a SEC game without scoring a rushing TD was in 2010 at Mississippi State (17-14); the last time in an SEC home game was in 2008 vs. Tennessee (14-12).

- Auburn was 3-for-3 scoring in the red zone vs. Mississippi State and is 10-for-10 scoring in the red zone on the season. Auburn has scored six touchdowns and four field goals on drives in the red zone this season.

The Graduates

Five members of the 2013 Auburn squad have already earned bachelor's degrees. Graduating in May were Nosa Eguae (communication), Steven Clark (exercise science) and Chandler Shakespeare (business management). Craig Sanders (human development and family studies) and Ryan Smith (public administration) were August graduates.

Tre Mason On The Carry

Junior Tre Mason continues to make his mark on the Auburn record book. With 1,369 career rushing yards, he is now 30th on Auburn's career list; he moved past William Andrews (1976-78) and Mario Fannin (2007-10) in the win against Mississippi State. Next on the list is Mitzi Jackson (1973-75) with 1,373 yards.

Mason scored in Auburn's first two games this season, with an 11-yard rushing touchdown against Arkansas State and rushing and rushing and return touchdowns against Washington State. Mason now has 13 career touchdowns at Auburn.

His kickoff return touchdown of 100 yards against Washington State was the second KOR score of his career; his first was a 97-yard return against Utah State in the 2011 season opener. The Tigers have returned 20 kickoffs for touchdowns in program history. Before Mason, Auburn's last KOR for a touchdown was a 100-yard return by Onterio McCalebb at Mississippi State last season.

Now 10th among Auburn career leaders in kickoff return yards, Mason has 888 total, and 2,177 all-purpose yards in his career.

On the final carry of 2012, Mason passed the 1,000-yard rushing mark, finishing with 1,002 yards on 171 carries (the fewest number of carries to 1,000 yards by any SEC rusher last season). He was the first non-quarterback to lead Auburn in total offense for a season since Bo Jackson in 1985.

Mason's 181-yard rushing total against Alabama A&M last season gave him his third 100-yard game. He also had 100-yard efforts with a then-career-high 152 against New Mexico State and 106 yards against Clemson. Mason's 86-yard touchdown run in the first quarter against Alabama A&M was the fourth longest rushing play in Auburn history and the seventh longest play from scrimmage ever.

Mason led Auburn in rushing for the 2012 season season with 1,002 yards on 171 carries, a 5.9-yard per-carry average. Scoring twice against AAMU, his eight touchdowns were also most on the squad; he scored seven of those in the last seven games.

The Ground Game

With 146 yards rushing on nine carries against Washington State, Corey Grant posted his first 100-yard game, the 59th Auburn rusher ever to do so. Grant's 75-yard touchdown run in the second quarter was his first Auburn score and the 24th-longest touchdown run in Auburn history. Grant made his first career start against Arkansas State, and responded with a 17-yard first quarter touchdown. He leads the Tigers in rushing and is eighth in the SEC at 76.7 yards per game.

Cameron Artis-Payne scored his first career touchdown in the fourth quarter of the win over Arkansas State, a 12-yard run that also put him beyond 100 yards on the night, the 60th player in Auburn history to record a 100-yard rushing game. Through three games, the junior college transfer is averaging 55.3 yards per game on the ground.



Kickoff Return String

Auburn ranks third in the nation among teams with the longest active streak of kickoff returns for a touchdown in consecutive seasons. The Tigers have had at least one kickoff return for a score in each of the past six seasons, including Tre Mason's 100-yard return against Washington State.

Auburn's KOR touchdowns during that string have come from: Onterio McCalebb (100 vs. Mississippi State, 2012 and 83 vs. Alabama, 2011); Tre Mason (97 vs. Utah State in 2011 and 100 vs. Washington State, 2013); Demond Washington (95 vs. Ole Miss, 2010 and 99 vs. Georgia, 2009); and Tristan Davis (97 vs. Arkansas and 95 vs. UT-Martin, 2008).

First-Time Tigers

In the season opener against Washington State, 14 Auburn players saw their first action in a Tiger uniform: Montravius Adams, Will Adams, Mackenro Alexander, Cameron Artis-Payne, Ben Bradley, Elijah Daniel, Marcus Davis, Johnathan Ford, Brandon King, Alex Kozan, Carl Lawson, Robert Leff, Nick Marshall and JaViere Mitchell.

There were eight more Tigers who saw their first Auburn action against Arkansas State: Gage Batten, Shon Coleman, T.J. Davis, Jordan Diamond, Kenny Flowers, Kamryn Melton, Gimel President and Tony Stevens. Of the first-time players this season, eight are true freshmen, nine are redshirt freshmen and five are junior college transfers.

No Return Policy

Senior punter Steven Clark, a 2011 Ray Guy Award finalist and 2012 semifinalist, continues to excel. He averaged 48.0 yards per punt on four kicks against Mississippi State, with two punts inside the 20 and none returned. His season average is 43.5 with four of 50+ yards and five inside the 20.

Clark has not had a punt returned yet during the 2013 campaign, a string that covers 30

punts back through the New Mexico State game last season. The opponents' average starting field position after punts this season is their own 21 yardline.

Only five of his 70 punts last season were returned. Clark averaged 39.8 yards per punt in 2012, placing 15 kicks inside the 20. His season long was 54 yards against LSU; he had six punts last year of 50 yards or more.

For his career, Clark has a 40.1 average on 161 career punts, with 53 punts landing inside the 20 and 23 kicks of 50 yards or longer. Only 10.6 percent of his career punts (17-161) have been returned, for an average of just 4.9 yards per return.

Clark is now eighth in Auburn career total punts with 161 and ninth in Auburn career punting yards with 6,457; against Mississippi State, he passed David Beverly (6,290 yards from 1970-72) on the all-time list.

Interceptors

Robenson Therezie and Joshua Holsey each recorded their first career interception against Washington State. It marked the first time two players recorded the first interception of their careers in the same game since Jake Holland and Jermaine Whitehead did so against Florida Atlantic in 2011.

Therezie was the first Auburn player to record two interceptions in a game since Josh Bynes did it against Arkansas in 2010. Auburn as a team had only two interceptions in the 2012 season.

For his efforts, Therezie was selected as SEC Defensive Player of the Week and the Jim Thorpe Award national defensive back of the week.

When Scoring 20+ Points

Since 2001, Auburn is 104-14 (.880) when scoring 20 or more points in a game. Dating back to the start of the 1993 season, Auburn is 147-21-1 (.872) when scoring 20 or more points in a game.

For Starters

Auburn has a total of 39 players with at least one career start for the Tigers. Tops on that list is Nosa Eguae with 33 career starts, eighth best among current SEC players.

Seven players have made their first career start for Auburn this season. Five made their first Auburn start against Washington State: QB Nick Marshall, OG Alex Kozan, DE Craig

Sanders, DE LaDarius Owens and Star Robenson Therezie. Against Arkansas State, defensive tackle Ben Bradley and tailback Corey Grant were first-time starters.

Among 2013 SEC programs, Auburn had the most returning career starts (365) on its roster, seventh most nationally entering the season.

Parkey For Three

Cody Parkey hit three field goals in the 24-20 Mississippi State win, including a 47-yarder that tied his career long., earning Lou Groza Award Star of the Week honors. The senior has been successful on seven consecutive field goals after missing his first attempt this season. Parkey also kicked a career-long 47-yard field goal against Washington State, one of three field goals he made in that 31-24 win.

Parkey has an SEC-leading string of 59 consecutive PAT kicks made; that total ranks him 10th nationally. He has made 16 straight field goals from 45 yards and in, dating back through the 2011 Chick-fil-A Bowl.

Parkey now ranks third in Auburn career field goal percentage at .775 (31-40), just behind Scott Etheridge (.791/1992-93) and Matt Hawkins (.788/1994-95) and just ahead of Win Lyle (.763/1987-89).

During his career, 87 of Parkey's 170 kickoffs have gone for touchbacks (.512), including 86 of 135 since the beginning of his sophomore season (.637). The opponents' average starting field position this season after kickoffs is their own 24 yardline.

In 2012, Parkey converted on nine straight three-pointers dating back through the 2011 season, before missing on a 49-yarder vs. Arkansas. That tied the third best string of consecutive field goals at Auburn since 1981.

Parkey was 11-14 on field goals last year, and 27-27 last season on PAT kicks. He made four field goals versus Clemson (37-46-27-36 yards), tying a Chick-fil-A Kickoff Classic record and earning him Lou Groza Award star of the week honors. Parkey's game-winner against ULM earned him SEC Special Teams Player of the Week honors.

On Scholarship

Formerly walk-ons, senior running back Chandler Shakespeare, senior safety Blake Poole and junior receiver Dimitri Reese were put on scholarship for the Fall Semester; classes began August 21.



Game Captains

Auburn will select game captains for the 2013 season. Cornerback Chris Davis and center Reese Dismukes served as captains against Washington State, Arkansas State and Mississippi State.

Average Per Down

Here's a breakdown of how the 2013 Auburn offense is operating on first, second, third and fourth down.

On first down, the Tigers have run a total of 90 plays, gaining 597 yards for an average of 6.6 yards per play. On second down, AU has tried 58 plays for 355 yards, an average of 6.1 per play. On third down, the Tigers have run 43 plays, gaining 333 yards for a 7.7 average. Auburn has tried only one fourth-down attempts, gaining 20 yards.

Auburn's touchdowns this season have come four times on first down (three rush, one pass), three times on second down (two rush and one pass), and twice on third down (both pass).

Scoring By Quarters

This season in the first quarter, the Tigers have outscored the opposition 22-10. In the second quarter, Auburn holds a 24-14 advantage. In the third quarter, Auburn leads its opponents 10-9. Auburn has outscored its opponents 13-0 in the fourth quarter thus far this season. Auburn has held its opponents scoreless in three quarters (37.5%) this year.

Home Start

Auburn opened the season with three straight home contests for the 12th time in program history. Other seasons: 2009, 2007, 2005, 1999, 1995, 1993, 1988, 1986, 1982, 1980 and 1920.

- Auburn was one of only 13 teams nationally not to have at least one senior on its starting offensive line for the opening game. Auburn started juniors Reese Dismukes and Chad Slade, sophomores Patrick Miller and Greg Robinson and redshirt freshman Alex Kozan.

- Auburn (76) and Miami (Fla.) (74) were the only two teams to have played more than 70 games on ESPN all-time entering the 2013 season.

- Auburn and Nebraska are the only two BCS teams to have three undefeated seasons since 1993.

- Auburn and Florida are the only two SEC teams undefeated against non-BCS teams since 1992.

- Auburn is currently tied for the longest bowl winning streak with five consecutive bowl victories.

- Auburn, Tennessee, and Florida are the only SEC teams that have never gone six consecutive seasons without playing in the SEC Championship Game.

Clark Senior CLASS Candidate

Auburn punter Steven Clark is one of 30 NCAA® Football Bowl Subdivision student-athletes who excel both on and off the field selected as candidates for the 2013 Senior CLASS Award® in collegiate football. To be eligible for the award, a student-athlete must be classified as an NCAA Division I FBS senior and have notable achievements in four areas of excellence – community, classroom, character and competition.

An acronym for Celebrating Loyalty and Achievement for Staying in School®, the Senior CLASS Award focuses on the total student-athlete and encourages students to use their platform in athletics to make a positive impact as leaders in their communities.

Of the 30 candidates, 12 have grade point averages of 3.0 or higher. Seven are all-Americans and 12 were all-conference selections in 2012. The Senior CLASS Award winner will be announced during the football bowl season in early January.

The 30 candidates will be narrowed to 10 finalists midway through the regular season, and those 10 names will be placed on the official ballot. Ballots will be distributed through a nationwide voting system to media, coaches and fans.

Lindy's All-Newcomer Team

Five Auburn players have been named to Lindy's preseason All-Newcomer football team, the most of any school nationally. Offensive guard Alex Kozan, running back Cameron Artis-Payne, defensive tackle Montravious Adams and defensive end Carl Lawson are on the first team, while quarterback Nick Marshall is on the second team.

Eguae Good Works Team Nominee

Senior Nosa Eguae is one of 150 nominees for the 2013 Allstate AFCA Good Works Team, the most ever in the award's 22-year history. The award recognizes a select group of college football players who have made a commitment to enriching the lives of others while contributing to the greater good of their communities.

Eguae is involved in a number of outreach initiatives, led by his work as a volunteer with the Pine Hills Literacy Project.

Since 1992, the Allstate AFCA Good Works Team® has honored college football players at all levels of the sport for their selfless acts of giving back to the community and off-the-field achievements. Auburn tight end Philip Lutzenkirchen was a member of the 2012 Allstate AFCA Good Works Team.

Jordan-Hare Stadium

Jordan-Hare Stadium, the 11th largest on-campus college football stadium, seats 87,451.

The stadium was dedicated Nov. 30, 1939, with 7,500 seats. Ten years later, 14,000 seats were added, and the stadium was named Cliff Hare Stadium (after a member of Auburn's first

football team and eventual professor and dean of the School of Chemistry), although only 12 home games were played there over that 10-year span. Additional seats were added in 1955, 1960 and 1970. The West upper deck was completed in 1980; the East upper deck and suites were finished for the 1987 season.

The most recent addition to the stadium was the construction of a LED board in 2007; Auburn was the first SEC school to install a high-definition video board display.

The facility was renamed Jordan-Hare Stadium in 1973, recognizing Hall of Fame coach Ralph "Shug" Jordan. The turf at Jordan-Hare Stadium was officially named after Pat Dye, Auburn's Hall of Fame coach and athletics director, prior to the 2005 Iron Bowl.

On game days, Auburn's Pat Dye Field at Jordan-Hare Stadium becomes the sixth-largest city in the state of Alabama; Auburn has averaged 80,000+ fans per game for the last 19 seasons. Since Jordan-Hare Stadium expanded to its current capacity prior to the 2004 season, the Tigers have tallied 28 sold-out games.

The Tigers have won 77.9 percent of their games in Jordan-Hare Stadium since its inception in 1939 and hold an overall record of 291-74-7 there.

The 2013 A-Day spring game at Jordan-Hare Stadium set an Auburn record with 83,401 fans in attendance. It was the largest spring game attendance in America for 2013.

Honoring Champions

Four outstanding Auburn football teams will be honored during 2013 at Jordan-Hare Stadium. Members of each team will be recognized on the field; they will also visit with fans at the Verizon Wireless Autograph Tent located at Plainsman Park two hours prior to kickoff.

The 1963 Auburn squad celebrates its 50th anniversary at the Homecoming game versus Western Carolina October 12. Posting a 9-2 record under Coach Ralph "Shug" Jordan, the '63 Tigers, who finished No. 5 in the national rankings, faced Nebraska in the Orange Bowl.

The 1983 Tigers, Auburn's first SEC champions since 1957, will celebrate their 30th anniversary at the Florida Atlantic game. Posting an 11-1 record, 6-0 in SEC play, the '83 Auburn squad defeated Michigan 9-7 in the Sugar Bowl to finish No. 3 in most of the national polls.

The 1993 Tigers posted an undefeated 11-0 record and finished with a No. 4 national ranking; they were honored at the Washington State game. The 1988 Tigers, co-champions of the SEC and No. 7 in the nation, were honored vs. Arkansas State.

2014 Auburn Schedule

The 2014 Auburn football schedule will feature seven home games and five road games, featuring SEC home contests against Arkansas, LSU, South Carolina and Texas A&M. Auburn's non-conference home games are against San Jose State, Louisiana Tech and Samford.

Auburn will open the 2014 season at Jordan-Hare Stadium against Arkansas on Aug. 30, the Tigers' first SEC season opener since a 46-13 win over Ole Miss in 1995. The dates for the A-Day and Homecoming in 2014 will be announced at a later date.

In the game, Auburn and Louisville will battle for The Old Leather Helmet Trophy, one of college football's newest rivalry-style icons.

LAST MEETING WITH LSU

Auburn's defense held LSU to a season-low 351 total yards and only three points in the final three quarters but fell to the visitors from Baton Rouge, 12-10, on Saturday night before 86,721 fans at Jordan-Hare Stadium.

Auburn (1-3, 0-2 SEC) got an outstanding performance from its defense, forcing a pair of LSU turnovers, but could not get a crucial stop late in the fourth quarter with enough time left to have a final scoring chance as LSU's final drive ate up most of the final four minutes.

LSU (4-0, 1-0 SEC) had a chance to extend its lead with less than a minute to play, but Drew Alleman's 34-yard field goal attempt sailed wide right. Auburn had one final possession with 37 seconds left, starting from their own 20, but could only manage 17 yards with no timeouts remaining, and Kiehl Frazier's final desperation heave with no time left was intercepted to end the game.

LSU appeared to be driving for the end zone on their first possession, but Mettenberger fumbled the snap at the Auburn 2-yard-line, where it was recovered by Jeffery Whitaker to end the LSU threat. It was just the second fumble lost by LSU so far this season.

But LSU would find its way onto the scoreboard on Auburn's next play from scrimmage, taking a 2-0 lead on a safety when Tre Mason was tackled in the end zone by Sam Montgomery. It was the first safety scored against Auburn since the Tigers' 3-2 victory over Mississippi State in 2008.

LSU would then take advantage of the good field position after the safety, driving 59 yards in nine plays and taking a 9-0 lead on a one-yard touchdown run by Michael Ford with 4:18 to play in the first quarter.

After taking over deep in LSU territory when Corey Lemonier sacked Mettenberger and forced a fumble that was recovered by Angelo Blackson, Tre Mason went around left end for 26 yards to the LSU 4-yard-line. On the next play, McCalebb walked into the end zone for Auburn's first touchdown of

the night, cutting the deficit to 9-7 as time expired in the opening period.

Following a 42-yard, nine-play drive that ate up more than five minutes of the second quarter, Cody Parkey's 40-yard field goal gave Auburn a 10-9 lead with 1:21 to play in the half.

LSU went back on top midway through the third quarter after an Auburn special teams miscue gave LSU new life at midfield. A 30-yard Drew Alleman field goal capped a seven-play, 35-yard scoring drive and gave LSU a 12-10 lead - the eventual winning margin - at the 5:26 mark.

With the clock winding down in the fourth quarter and Auburn needing yet another stop to have one final possession, LSU converted a key 3rd-and-5 play as Mettenberger connected with Spencer Ware for a 33-yard gain into Auburn territory, effectively ending Auburn's hopes of a comeback.

GAME 1

Auburn opened the Gus Malzahn era with a 31-24 win over Washington State at Jordan-Hare Stadium.

The two teams played a see-saw first half, which saw five lead changes and 46 total points before Auburn pulled out the victory.

Auburn rushed for 295 yards on 46 carries, led by Corey Grant's 146, which included a 75-yard touchdown run in the second quarter which helped give Auburn a lead it would hold onto for the rest of the game.

Nick Marshall finished 10-for-19 for 99 yards. Sammie Coates (44 yards) and Quan Bray (28 yards) each had three catches.

Auburn's defense collected three interceptions on the night, two by Robenson Therezie, including one in the end zone as Washington State was driving late in the fourth quarter for a tying score.

Washington State struck first, taking a 7-0 lead on a Jeremiah Laufasa 4-yard run, capping a 12-play, 75-yard drive.

Auburn took its first lead of the game when Ryan White's two-point conversion run made it 8-7 following a Tre Mason 8-yard scoring run. The touchdown the 10th of Mason's career while the successful two-point conversion was Auburn's first since Lee Guess caught a Carl Stewart pass at Alabama in 2006.

Washington State took a 14-8 lead with 8:02 left in the first half on a Connor Halliday 7-yard touchdown pass to Bobby Ratliff, capping off a nine-play, 67-yard drive. The lead was short-lived, however, as Mason returned the ensuing kickoff 100 yards for the game-tying score. A successful Cody Parkey extra-point put Auburn ahead, 15-14.

Mason's 100-yard kick return tied for the second-longest in school history and marks the sixth consecutive season in which Auburn has returned at least one kickoff for a touchdown, tied for the third-longest active streak in the nation.

Washington State wasted little time answering Mason's return, going 75 yards in just 1:28 to reclaim the lead, 21-15, with 6:18 left in the half.

GAME 2

Nick Marshall threw for 147 yards and two touchdowns and tailbacks Tre Mason, Corey Grant and Cameron Artis-Payne each scored a rushing touchdown as Auburn (2-0) cruised to a 38-9 win over Arkansas State (1-1) at Jordan-Hare Stadium. Artis-Payne, finishing the night with 102 yards on 19 carries, led an Auburn rushing attack that finished with 301 yards on the ground.

Marshall finished the night 10-for-17, connecting with seven different receivers, as Auburn led from start to finish.

Mason finished the game with 99 yards on 14 carries, including an 11-yard touchdown in the third quarter that put Auburn up 28-9, while Artis-Payne's 12-yard touchdown run came in the fourth quarter and was the final score of the game.

Marshall's first career touchdown pass landed in the hands of Marcus Davis for an 18-yard score to put Auburn up a touchdown just 3:23 into the game. The catch was the first of the season for Davis.

After a Brian Davis field goal cut the lead to 7-3, Grant rushed 17 yards around right end to cap an 8-play, 85-yard drive to put Auburn ahead, 14-3. The touchdown marked the second straight week that Grant carried a touchdown in, marking the first Auburn player since Oterio McCalebb in 2009 to score in each of the first two Auburn games of a season. Mason would later join Grant in the accomplishment.

Marshall found Sammie Coates just 2:20 before halftime for a 68-yard touchdown strike that extended Auburn's lead to 21-3. The catch was the longest of Coates' career.

Davis hit a 21- and a 42-yard field goal in the third quarter for Arkansas State, cutting the margin to 12 at 21-9 before Mason's third touchdown of the season gave Auburn a 28-9 lead with just 1:14 left in the third quarter.

Cody Parkey's 35-yard field goal with 8:46 left in the game extended the lead to 31-9. It capped off an 11-play, 62-yard drive that lasted 5:12, its longest of the game by both time and number of plays.

Nick Marshall hit C.J. Uzomah for a 11-yard touchdown pass with just 10 seconds left in the game as Auburn rallied to defeat Mississippi State, 24-20, at Jordan-Hare Stadium. Marshall finished the night with 339 yards passing and two touchdowns as Auburn moved to 3-0 (1-0 SEC) on the season.

Facing a 3rd-down and 10 on the Mississippi State 25-yard line, Marshall rushed over left end for 11 yards and a key first down to keep Auburn's final drive alive. Two plays later, Marshall connected with Uzomah, who finished with three catches for 48 yards, for the game-winner. Auburn's drive had started on its own 12-yard line with just 1:56 on the clock.

Marshall, who finished 23-34 with two touchdown and two interceptions, had the first 300-yard passing game by an Auburn quarterback since Cam Newton threw for 335-yards in the 2010 SEC Championships Game against South Carolina.

Marshall connected with nine different receivers in the game, with Quan Bray leading the team in yards with 80, while Marcus Davis led the team in receptions with six, totaling 43 yards.

Mississippi State (1-2, 0-1 SEC) had taken its first lead of the game, 20-14, when Dak Prescott scored his second rushing touchdown of the game, a 2-yard scamper just 2:22 into the third quarter.

Cody Parkey's 47-yard field goal, which tied a career long, cut the lead to 20-17 with 9:53 left in the third quarter.

A Parkey 40-yard field goal and a Bray 76 yard touchdown reception helped Auburn jump out to an early 11-0 lead. Instead of kicking the extra point following Bray's catch from Marshall, Auburn successfully went for the 2-point conversion for the second time this season. Bray's reception was the first touchdown catch of his career while the 76-yard connection tied for the 19th-longest in Auburn history and was the longest since Newton hit Terrell Zachery for an 80-yard touchdown against Chattanooga in 2010.

Jordan-Hare Stadium is Auburn's showcase football stadium, which seats 87,451 with 70 luxury suites located between the lower level and upper deck on the East side.

The stadium was dedicated Nov. 30, 1939, with 7,500 seats. Ten years later, 14,000 more seats were added, and the stadium was named Cliff Hare Stadium (after a member of Auburn's first football team and eventual professor and dean of the School of Chemistry), although only 12 home games were played there over that 10-year span. Additional seats were added in 1955, 1960 and 1970. The West upper deck was completed in 1980; the East upper deck and suites were finished for the 1987 season. The most recent addition to the stadium was the construction of a 30-foot by 74-foot Daktronics LED board in 2007, coming at a cost of \$2.9 million. Auburn was the first school in the SEC to install a high-definition video board display.

The facility was renamed Jordan-Hare Stadium in 1973, recognizing Hall of Fame coach Ralph "Shug"

Jordan. The turf at Jordan-Hare Stadium was officially named after Pat Dye, Auburn's Hall of Fame coach and athletics director, prior to the 2005 Iron Bowl. The Tigers posted a 99-39-4 record in 12 seasons under Dye from 1981-92, and won four SEC championships. Auburn's home games are now played at Pat Dye Field at Jordan-Hare Stadium.

On game days, Auburn's Pat Dye Field at Jordan-Hare Stadium becomes the sixth-largest city in the state of Alabama as Auburn has averaged at least 80,000 fans per game for the last 20 seasons. Since Jordan-Hare Stadium expanded to its current capacity prior to the 2004 season, the Tigers have tallied 28 sell-out games.

Pat Dye Field at Jordan-Hare Stadium is the nation's 10th-largest on-campus stadium with a capacity of 87,451. It is the sixth-largest in the SEC.

The Tigers have won 78.2 percent of their games in Jordan-Hare Stadium since its inception in 1939 and hold an overall record of 291-74-7 there.




