THE GAME

Auburn (5-1, 2-1 SEC) visits Texas A&M (5-1, 2-1 SEC) Saturday, October 19, in a 2:30 p.m. CT SEC game at Kyle Field (83,002) in College Station, Texas.

FIRST AND 10

- This is the first game of 2013 that Auburn will wear its road white jerseys, the longest string since a seven-game stretch in 1981-82; AU has played five home games and a game at LSU
- Gus Malzahn is 5-1 in his first season as Auburn head coach; Malzahn previously served as Auburn offensive coordinator from 2009-11
- The Tigers are ranked 24th in this week's AP poll, their first poll appearance since Nov. 12, 2011
- Although minus-2 in season turnover margin (9 to 11), Auburn has outscored its opponents 35-10 in points off turnovers (5.8 to 1.7 points per game)
- The Tigers lead the SEC in rushing at 287.0 yards per game, ranked seventh nationally
- Auburn, Air Force, Minnesota and Arkansas State are the only teams nationally to have four different 100-yard rushers this season; no other SEC school has more than two
- The Tiger defense holds opponents to 13% of third-down conversions (3-23) in the fourth quarter, best in the SEC; Auburn has allowed only two fourth-quarter scores this year
- Auburn's 16 rushing touchdowns and eight passing touchdowns through six games this season match the Tigers' 2012 totals in both categories
- Defensive end Dee Ford is fourth in the SEC in sacks per game with 0.75 sacks per contest
- Auburn's 712 yards of total offense versus Western Carolina set a school record for total offense and was the ninth-best performance in SEC annals; quarterback Jeremy Johnson was named SEC Freshman of the Week for leading that offensive effort in his first career start
- The Tigers have returned at least one kickoff for a touchdown each of the last six seasons, the third longest streak in America; Tre Mason had a 100-yard return against Washington State

About Gus Malzahn

Gus Malzahn, who served as Auburn's offensive coordinator from 2009-11, is in his first year as Auburn's head coach. He is 5-1 at Auburn and 14-4 overall.

Malzahn, who won the Broyles Award as the nation's top assistant coach in 2010 while helping the Tigers to the BCS National Championship, returned to Auburn after serving as the head coach at Arkansas State in 2012, where he led the program to the Sun Belt Conference title. He was named Auburn's 27th head football coach on December 4, 2012.

Last season at Arkansas State, Malzahn led the Red Wolves to a 9-3 record and 7-1 conference mark. While at Auburn, Malzahn made an immediate impact during his tenure, highlighted by a record-setting offense in 2010 under Heisman Trophy winner Cam Newton. The 2010 Auburn offense set nine school records, including points in a season (577), points per game (41.2), total yards (6,989), total offense (499.2), rushing yards (3,987), rushing touchdowns (41) and passing touchdowns (31). Malzahn's record-setting offense in 2010 led the Southeastern Conference and finished in the top 10 nationally in six statistical categories.

Malzahn's arrival in 2009 and style of offense marked a drastic turnaround from the 2008 season when Auburn struggled offensively. In a two-year period, the Tigers improved from a tie for 110th to seventh in the nation in scoring offense (from 17.3 to 41.2) and from 104th to seventh in total offense.

Prior to Auburn, Malzahn was the offensive coordinator for two seasons at Tulsa (2007-08) and Arkansas (2006). Two of Malzahn's first three collegiate offenses ranked in the top 10 nationally in rushing, including the 2008 Tulsa team and 2006 Arkansas squad. His offenses at Tulsa were also among the nation's finest, ranking first nationally in total offense in 2007 and 2008. He coached Heisman Trophy finalist Darren McFadden at Arkansas, while helping the Razorbacks finish fourth nationally in rushing at 228.5 yards per game.

Malzahn's coaching career began in his home state of Arkansas at the high school level. In 14 seasons as a high school head coach, Malzahn led seven teams to the state championship game and won three titles. In July 2013, he was inducted into the Arkansas High School Sports Hall of Fame.

The Series

The all-time series between Auburn and Texas A&M shows the Aggies with a 3-0 advantage.

The two teams first met in Dallas in 1911, a 16-0 Texas A&M victory, and also played in Dallas at the end of the 1985 season, when the two schools met in the 1986 Cotton Bowl on New Year's Day. Texas A&M was a 36-16 victor in that contest. In the first matchup of the teams as SEC members, Texas A&M was a 63-21 winner last season in Auburn.

Auburn holds a 14-17-1 all-time record against schools from the state of Texas, against Baylor (1-2-1), Hardin Simmons (1-0), Houston (5-1), North Texas (1-0), Rice (0-2), SMU (0-3), Texas (3-5), Texas A&M (0-3), TCU (3-0) and Texas Tech (0-1).

Auburn is 6-11-1 all-time in games played in Texas, including a 2-3 mark in bowl games in the Lone Star State. AU's last game there was a 17-14 win over Nebraska in the 2006 Cotton Bowl in Dallas. The Tigers' last on-campus game in the state of Texas was a 14-10 win at Texas in 1991.

Senior defensive tackle Nosa Eguae, a product of Summit High in Mansfield, is the only player from Texas on Auburn's 2013 roster.

SEC Numbers

In SEC action all-time, Auburn holds a 293-231-18 overall record. In SEC games played in Auburn, the Tigers are 120-51-6 all-time. In all SEC games played away from Auburn, the Tigers are 173-180-12 overall.

Against Ranked Teams

Auburn is now 96-141-6 all-time when facing ranked opponents. Auburn is 42-36-2 at home against ranked teams, 24-60-2 on the road and 30-45-2 against ranked teams on a neutral field.

The Tigers are 75-117-5 all-time when facing SEC opponents that are ranked (33-29-2 at home, 24-54-2 away, 18-34-1 neutral field).

In October Games

Auburn is 300-156-18 (.652) all-time in the month of October, and has won 11 of its last 17 October contests. Auburn's all-time home record in October is 165-33-3 (.827). Away from Auburn, the Tigers are 135-123-15 (.522) during the month of October.

White Jerseys

Because the Tigers' first six games of 2013 were five home contests and a road game at LSU, the Texas A&M game will be the first time Auburn has worn its road white jerseys this season. Auburn wore its blue jerseys for a string of seven games starting with the 1981 Alabama game and then the first six home games to open the 1982 season.

A 1962 rule regulated that the visiting team wore light colors, but Auburn wore white at home as late as 1964. Prior to that, the Tigers often wore white at home in September because of the heat and switched over to blue jerseys in October.

Three of Auburn's next four contests are road games. The last time Auburn played three consecutive SEC games on the road was 1986 (at Vanderbilt, Mississippi State and Florida).

Notes About The Coaching Staff..

Saturday's game with Western Carolina was Gus Malzahn's 100th as a college coach. His teams' overall mark in those games is 76-24.

Two members of the Auburn coaching staff were formerly on the Texas A&M staff. J.B. Grimes was the Aggies' offensive line coach from 1998-2002. Melvin Smith coached the Terxas A&M safeties from 2003-05.

Malzahn has produced nine 1,000-yard rushers in seven seasons as a college head coach/offensive coordinator, at least one in each season. Overall, Malzahn has had nine 1,000-yard rushers, five 1,000-yard receivers and three 3,000-yard passers. Malzahn had two 1,000-yard rushers in the same season twice, 2006 (Arkansas) and 2010 (Auburn). His 2007 Tulsa team had three 1,000-yard receivers.

Rodney Garner and Dameyune Craig are the first pair of former Auburn Football lettermen to be on Auburn's staff at the same time since Kurt Crain and Garner were on the Tiger staff from 1993-95. The last time Garner and Craig were in Auburn uniforms together at Jordan-Hare Stadium prior to this season was the 1995 Iron Bowl, a 31-27 Auburn victory. Craig's last home game as an Auburn quarterback was an Auburn 18-17 Iron Bowl victory in 1997.

Of the 31 schools that hired new head coaches for the 2013 season, 11 completely turned over their entire coaching staffs: Auburn, California, Cincinnati, Colorado, Florida

International, Georgia State, Kentucky, Purdue, South Florida, Tennessee and Western Kentucky. Six others retained one assistant coach (Arkansas, Boston College, Idaho, North Carolina State, Southern Miss, Western Michigan), while the other 14 kept two or more former assistants on staff.

30+ Points Equals Victory

Auburn has won 81 consecutive games when scoring 30 or more points. The last time the Tigers lost when registering at least 30 points was a 56-49 four-overtime loss to Georgia in 1996. In its history, Auburn is now 298-4 all-time when scoring at least 30 points.

In The Red Zone/Offense

Auburn is 20-for-23 scoring in the red zone on the season, for the second-best percentage in the SEC (.870). Auburn has scored 15 touchdowns and five field goals on drives in the red zone this season.

Second-Half Defense

Auburn's defense has faced 40 second-half drives this season, yielding 1,095 yards on 205 plays, but giving up only four field goals and five touchdowns.

The Auburn defense gets even better in the fourth quarter, giving up only 402 yards on 93 plays during 20 drives starting in the fourth quarter and allowing opponents to score only 13 fourth-quarter points during the first six games of the season. The Tigers allow 182.5 yards/game in the second half and 67.0 yards in the fourth quarter per game.

Against LSU, Auburn allowed its first touchdown in the fourth quarter on a 32-yard pass play that was the first play of the fourth stanza. After that, Auburn allowed LSU to gain only two more yards on four ensuing drives.

The Tiger defense kept Mississippi State from converting a third down in the second half; MSU was 0-7. The last time Auburn held an SEC opponent to 0 first downs for a half was last year at Vanderbilt, where the Commodores were 0-4 on second-half third downs.

The Ellis Effect

Including his current stint at Auburn, Ellis Johnson's last three stops as defensive coordinator have all seen the veteran coach bring a major improvement to each team's scoring defense in his first season with the club.

Auburn is the only Southeastern Conference team to record two perfect seasons since 2004, going 13-0 in '04 and 14-0 in 2010. Since the 2004 season, Auburn has won 45 of its 75 SEC games and 47 of its 77 games against SEC schools, including the 2004 (vs. Tennessee) and 2010 (vs. South Carolina) SEC Championship games. This season with the Tigers, Johnson has guided the defense to an improvement of 45 spots in the NCAA scoring defense rankings through 2013's first six games (66th to 21st).

Auburn's defense has allowed 113 points through six games (18.8 ppg), the fewest total points through the first six games of the season since 2008, when Auburn allowed just 62 points (10.3 ppg).

In The Red Zone/Defense

Auburn is tied for second in the SEC in red zone defense, allowing opponents to score 14 of 20 times, for a 70.0 percentage. Opponents have converted 10 touchdowns and four field goals in the red zone.

That percentage is a significant improvement from the Tigers' national ranking over the last five seasons. Auburn currently ranks 15th in NCAA red zone defense; the Tigers' best ranking in the past five seasons has been 72nd in 2010 (0.84).

Fine Line

Auburn is getting excellent production in 2013 from both its offensive and defensive line. The offensive line ranks first in the SEC and fifth nationally in fewest sacks allowed (0.67/gm) and third in the SEC and ninth in the NCAA in fewest TFL allowed (4.0/gm).

That has allowed Auburn to get six 100-yard rushing performances from a combination of four different players. Auburn averages 287.0 rushing yards per game, first in the SEC and seventh nationally.

On the defensive line, 13 players are getting time in the rotation, and 11 of those have contributed to at least one sack this season. Auburn leads the SEC and ranks ninth nationally with 8.2 TFL per game.

As a group, the D-line has 35.0 TFL and 14.0 sacks through six games; last year, the defensive line accounted for 33.5 TFL and 16.0 sacks in 12 games.

National Numbers

Auburn's school record 712 yards of total offense against Western Carolina ranks among the best efforts in the nation this season. Only six different teams nationally have gained more in a game this season:

More From The Western Carolina Game...

- Auburn's 62 points were its most since scoring 65 against Arkansas in 2010. There have been only 24 games this season nationally where a team has scored 60 points or more, and only three of those in the SEC (Auburn vs. Western Carolina, Mississippi State vs. Troy, Texas A&M vs. Sam Houston State).

- Auburn finished with a school-record 712 yards of total offense (511 rush, 201 pass, 65 plays). The previous record was 695 yards against Southwest Louisiana in 1985 (565 rush, 130 pass, 76 plays). That 712 yards of total offense is ninth-best in SEC history.

- Auburn rushed for 511 yards, third-most in school history. The school record of 565 was set against Southwest Louisiana (1985); second was 526 against Furman (1946).

- Auburn's 11.88 yards per carry (43 carries for 511 yards) eclipsed the previous Auburn record (20-plus rushes) of 11.14 against Ball State in 2005 (35 rushes, 390 yards).



- Auburn's nine touchdowns (five rushing, four receiving) came from eight different players. It's the most since seven different players scored against UTC in 2010.

- Auburn threw for 200+ yards just once in 2011 (286 yards vs. Utah State) and twice in 2012 (281 vs. Arkansas and 211 vs. Texas A&M). Auburn has already thrown for 200+ yards in a game three times in 2013 (339 vs. Mississippi State, 224 at LSU, 201 vs. Western Carolina).

- Auburn has had a 100-yard rusher in five of its six games this season, including at least one in each of the last three contests.

- This was the eighth time since 1967 that Auburn scored at least 42 points in the first half and the first time since scoring 48 points against UTC in 2010; this was the seventh time since 1967 that Auburn scored at least 21 points in both quarters of the first half, also the first time since the 2010 UTC game.

- Cameron Artis-Payne (133 yards) and Tre Mason (100 yards) became the first pair of Auburn players to rush for over 100 yards in the same game since Mason (181) and Onterio McCalebb (104) did it against Alabama A&M in 2012.

- Ricardo Louis (46-yd catch), Jay Prosch (8-yd catch) and Tony Stevens (22-yd catch) each recorded their first career touchdown receptions. Johnathan Ford scored his first career TD on a 38-yard run.

- Auburn had 539 yards total offense more than Western Carolina. That is the biggest discrepancy since Auburn had 597 more yards of total offense than Ole Miss in 1985 (Auburn: 606, Ole Miss: 9).

- Auburn held Western Carolina to 173 yards total offense. The last time Auburn held an opponent under 200 yards of total offense was when it held Florida to 194 yards in 2011.

- Auburn held Western Carolina to 66 yards rushing, the lowest rush total by an AU opponent since Alabama A&M (22 yards) in 2012.

Penalties

Auburn has been flagged with only 25 total penalties this season. The Tigers committed nine penalties against Arkansas State, and only 16 in the other five contests combined. Auburn had only one penalty against Mississippi State, a five-yard penalty for illegal formation. The

last time Auburn had only one penalty in a game was in 2008, when Auburn had one five-yard penalty in a 37-20 win over UT Martin.

Auburn is 15th nationally and leads the SEC in fewest penalties per game (4.17). In fewest penalty yards per game, the Tigers are 15th nationally and second in the SEC (35.5 ypg).

Pass Efficiency Defense

Auburn's pass defense is fifth nationally, only allowing a touchdown pass every 56 attempts. The Tigers have allowed just four passing touchdowns this year on 224 pass attempts by their opponents.

Only UCF, Miami (Fla.), Florida, and Oregon have a better ratio. Of the four teams with a better ratio than Auburn, only Oregon has had more passes attempted (236) on its defense than Auburn's 224.

Tre Mason On The Carry

Junior Tre Mason continues to make his mark on the Auburn record book. Mason is averaging 85.8 rushing yards per game, sixth best among the SEC rushing leaders. He has rushed for touchdowns in three consecutive games and in 10 of the last 13 games.

In the last 13 games dating back to the Ole Miss game in 2012, Mason has rushed for 1,211 yards and 14 touchdowns on 204 carries for an average of 93.2 yards per game and 5.9 yards per carry.

With 1,678 career rushing yards, he is 22nd on Auburn's career list. He had 100 rushing yards, all in the first half, against Western Carolina (the fifth of his career and second this season); he rushed for 132 yards at LSU.

Mason had two rushing touchdowns of 53 and 20 yards against Western Carolina, the fourth time he has scored two rushing TDs in a game. Mason scored on a 1-yard run vs. Ole Miss, twice against LSU and scored an 11-yard rushing TD against Arkansas State and rushing and return scores against Washington State.

Mason now has 16 career rushing and 18 total touchdowns. He and New Mexico's Carlos Wiggins are the only players in the nation with

a 100-yard rushing game, a rushing touch-down and 100-yard kick return TD this season.

His kickoff return touchdown of 100 yards against Washington State was the second KOR score of his career; his first was a 97-yard return against Utah State in the 2011 season opener. The Tigers have returned 20 kickoffs for touchdowns in program history. Before Mason, Auburn's last KOR for a touchdown was a 100-yard return by Onterio McCalebb at Mississippi State last season. Mason's three returns that day for 141 yards set an Auburn record for best kick return average (47.0).

Now ninth among Auburn career leaders in kickoff return yards, Mason has 955 total, and 2,635 all-purpose yards in his career.

On the final carry of 2012, Mason passed the 1,000-yard rushing mark, finishing with 1,002 yards on 171 carries (the fewest number of carries to 1,000 yards by any SEC rusher last season). He was the first non-quarterback to lead Auburn in total offense for a season since Bo Jackson in 1985.

Mason's 181-yard rushing total against Alabama A&M last season gave him his third 100-yard game. He also had 100-yard efforts with a then-career-high 152 against New Mexico State and 106 yards against Clemson. Mason's 86-yard touchdown run in the first quarter against Alabama A&M was the fourth longest rushing play in Auburn history and the seventh longest play from scrimmage ever.

Mason led Auburn in rushing for the 2012 season season with 1,002 yards on 171 carries, a 5.9-yard per-carry average. Scoring twice against AAMU, his eight touchdowns were also most on the squad; he scored seven of those in the last seven games.

The Ground Game

With 146 yards rushing on nine carries against Washington State, Corey Grant posted his first 100-yard game, the 59th Auburn rusher ever to do so. Grant's 75-yard touch-down run in the second quarter was his first Auburn score and the 24th-longest touchdown run in Auburn history.

Grant made his first career start against Arkansas State, and responded with a 17-yard first quarter touchdown. Grant is averaging 55.2 rushing yards per game.

Cameron Artis-Payne scored his first career touchdown in the fourth quarter of the win over Arkansas State, a 12-yard run that also put him beyond 100 yards on the night, the 60th player in Auburn history to record a 100-yard rushing game. He rushed for 133 yards and a touchdown against Western Carolina. Through six games, the junior college transfer is averaging 64.8 yards per game on the ground.

Last season, Auburn scored only eight offensive touchdowns total in eight SEC games. This season, the Tigers have scored eight offensive touchdowns in just three SEC games. (vs. Mississippi State, LSU and Ole Miss).

Auburn rushed for three touchdowns against both LSU and Ole Miss, and five against Western Carolina. This is the first time Auburn has rushed for at least three TDs in consecutive games since having five rushing TDs vs. Chattanooga and Georgia in 2010. It is the first time Auburn has rushed for at least three TDs in consecutive SEC games since having six vs. Arkansas and three vs. LSU in 2010.

Kickoff Return String

Auburn ranks third in the nation among teams with the longest active streak of kickoff returns for a touchdown in consecutive seasons. The Tigers have had at least one kickoff return for a score in each of the past six seasons, including Tre Mason's 100-yard return against Washington State.

Auburn's KOR touchdowns during that string have come from: Onterio McCalebb (100 vs. Mississippi State, 2012 and 83 vs. Alabama, 2011); Tre Mason (97 vs. Utah State in 2011 and 100 vs. Washington State, 2013); Demond Washington (95 vs. Ole Miss, 2010 and 99 vs. Georgia, 2009); and Tristan Davis (97 vs. Arkansas and 95 vs. UT-Martin, 2008).

When Scoring 20+ Points

Since 2001, Auburn is 106-15 (.876) when scoring 20 or more points in a game. Dating back to the start of the 1993 season, Auburn is 149-22-1 (.869) when scoring 20 or more points in a game.

Interceptors

Robenson Therezie and Joshua Holsey each recorded their first career interception against Washington State. It marked the first time two players recorded their first career picks in the same game since Jake Holland and Jermaine Whitehead did so vs. Florida Atlantic in 2011.

Therezie was the first Auburn player to record two interceptions in a game since Josh Bynes against Arkansas in 2010. Auburn as a team had only two interceptions in the 2012 season. Therezie was selected as SEC Defensive Player of the Week and the Jim Thorpe Award national defensive back of the week.

Therezie scored on a 78-yard interception against Ole Miss, the eighth longest such play in Auburn history. It was the longest interception return for a touchdown by an Auburn player since Walter McFadden in the 2010 Outback Bowl vs. Northwestern. Auburn's last interception for a touchdown was by Trent Fisher vs. Alabama A&M last season, a 60-yard return. It was Therezie's third interception of the season, and the first interception thrown by Ole Miss' Bo Wallace this year. Ryan Smith recorded his first career interception against Ole Miss in the fourth quarter of that win.

Jermaine Whitehead recorded a third-quarter interception at LSU, breaking Zach Mettenberger's string of 77 pass attempts without an interception. It was Auburn's first interception in an SEC game since 2011 vs. Ole Miss (T'Sharvan Bell). It was the second career pick for Whitehead; his first was versus Florida Atlantic in 2011.

Jonathon Mincy recorded his first career interception, and the first interception by an Auburn cornerback since 2011, with a 10-yard pick against Western Carolina.

Air Marshall Well Grounded

Junior college transfer Nick Marshall becomes more comfortable with the Auburn offense every outing. After five games, Marshall has passed for 902 yards and rushed for 288 more, averaging 238.9 yards total offense per game, eighth in the SEC. He did not see action against Western Carolina.

Against Ole Miss, Marshall posted his first 100-yard rushing game, with 140 yards on 14 carries, scoring twice. That's the most rushing yards posted by an SEC quarterback in a game this season and the 12th best rushing performance by an Auburn QB ever. Only six Auburn QBs have rushed for 100 yards in a game: Marshall, Cam Newton, Bobby Hunt, Phil Gargis, Kodi Burns and Jimmy Sidle; Auburn quarterbacks have only rushed for 100 yards in a game 16 times in 121 seasons.

His 28-yard gain in the first quarter was the longest rush of his career, and his 5-yard second-quarter touchdown run was Marshall's first rushing touchdown. His two touchdown runs against Ole Miss were the first pair of rushing scores by an Auburn QB since Kiehl Frazier scored two rushing TDs in the 2011 Chick-fil-A Bowl against Virginia. The last Auburn QB to rush for 100 yards in a game was Cam Newton vs. Georgia in 2010. Marshall becomes the 61st player in Auburn history to have a 100-yard rushing game. This is the first time in Auburn history that Auburn has had four different 100-yard rushers in the same season: others this season were Corey Grant (Washington State); Cameron Artis-Payne (Arkansas State and Western Carolina); and Tre Mason (LSU and Western Carolina).

Only six quarterbacks nationally have rushed for more yards in a game this season: *Taysom Hill (BYU) 259 vs. Texas*, *Daniel Sams (Kansas St) 199 vs. Baylor*, *Jordan Lynch (Northern Ill.) 189 vs. Eastern Ill.*, *Taysom Hill (BYU) 165 vs. Middle Tenn. St.*, *Karson Roberts (Air Force) 161 vs. Nevada*, *Jordan Lynch (Northern Ill.) 159 vs. Idaho*, *Mitch Leidner (Minnesota) 151 vs. San Jose St.*, *Travis Wilson (Utah) 142 vs. Oregon State*, *Nick Marshall (Auburn) 140 vs. Ole Miss*

In just his third start as Auburn's quarterback, Marshall finished the Mississippi State game 23-34 passing for 339 yards, making him the first Auburn quarterback to pass for 300

yards since Cam Newton threw for 335 against South Carolina in the 2010 SEC title game.

Marshall's 339 passing yards were 16th all-time at Auburn for single-game passing yardage and the ninth-highest passing total against a conference opponent. Marshall's 339 yards passing were also the most ever by an Auburn quarterback in an SEC debut.

On the game-winning drive, Marshall accounted for 84 of the 88 total yards, completing six of his eight passes for 65 yards while rushing three times for 19 yards. With his 151 yards passing (9-11) in the first quarter, Marshall had already established a new season high.

Marshall is the first Auburn QB to throw for more than 200 yards since Barrett Trotter vs. Utah State in 2011, and the first to throw for 200+ yards vs. an SEC opponent since Newton did it against South Carolina in the 2010 SEC Championship game.

Marshall's 339 yards were the most passing yards by an Auburn quarterback since Brandon Cox threw for 343 versus Georgia Tech in 2005. It was just the fifth time since the start of the 2000 season that an Auburn QB has thrown for 339 or more yards; the other occasions were:

- Ben Leard, 394 v Michigan, 2000
- Daniel Cobb, 381 v La. Tech [OT], 2001
- Jason Campbell, 374 v Tennessee, 2004 [SEC Championship Game]
- Brandon Cox, 343 v Georgia Tech, 2005

Adding 22 yards rushing, Marshall finished with 361 yards total offense. He also had a 37-yard pass reception off a tipped ball he threw and then caught.

Catching On

Sophomores Ricardo Louis (15) and Sammie Coates (13) and true freshman Marcus Davis (14) are Auburn's top three receivers through the midpoint of the season. The young trio has combined for 42 receptions for 541 yards and three touchdowns. Those totals account for 47% of Auburn's receptions and 48% of its receiving yards this year.

Coates set a career high at LSU with 139 yards receiving on four receptions, his first career 100-yard receiving game and the first for an AU receiver since Emory Blake vs. Georgia in 2012. He is the first Tiger other than Blake to record 100 yards receiving since 2010. Coates' six catches this year of 30+ yards are tied for seventh most of any player nationally.



Introducing Jeremy Johnson

True freshman quarterback Jeremy Johnson saw his first collegiate action making his first start against Western Carolina. In that 62-3 Auburn victory, Johnson was 17-21 passing for 201 yards and four touchdowns against just one interception. He also rushed for 26 yards, earning SEC Freshman of the Week honors.

Johnson's four TD passes were the most by an Auburn quarterback since Clint Moseley threw four against Ole Miss in 2011, and tied him with Stan White (vs. Cal State Fullerton, 1990) for second-most career passes by an Auburn QB in his first career start but the most by a true freshman. Daniel Cobb threw for five touchdowns against Louisiana Tech in his debut in 2001 as a senior.

First-Time Tigers

In the season opener against Washington State, 14 Auburn players saw their first action in a Tiger uniform: Montravius Adams, Will Adams, Mackenro Alexander, Cameron Artis-Payne, Ben Bradley, Elijah Daniel, Marcus Davis, Johnathan Ford, Brandon King, Alex Kozan, Carl Lawson, Robert Leff, Nick Marshall and JaViere Mitchell.

There were eight more Tigers who saw their first Auburn action against Arkansas State: Gage Batten, Shon Coleman, T.J. Davis, Jordan Diamond, Kenny Flowers, Kamryn Melton, Gimel President and Tony Stevens. Patrick Lymon saw his first action at LSU.

Twelve players saw their first collegiate action against Western Carolina: Eric Averett, Shane Callahan, Wirth Campbell, Michael Clifton, Devonte Danzey, Adam Dyas, Khari Harding, Jeremy Johnson, Tyler Nero, Dimitri Reese, Chandler Shakespeare and Mack VanGorder.

Of Auburn's 35 first-time players this season, 10 are true freshmen, 13 are redshirt freshmen and six are junior college transfers.

No Return Policy

Senior punter Steven Clark, a 2011 Ray Guy Award finalist and 2012 semifinalist, continues to excel. He averaged 41.4 yards per punt on five kicks against Ole Miss, with one punt inside the 20 and only one returned. His season average is 43.1 with five of 50+ yards and seven inside the 20. Clark has had only two punts returned during the 2013 campaign on 24 kicks. He did not punt against Western Carolina.

Only five of his 70 punts last season were returned. Clark averaged 39.8 yards per punt in 2012, placing 15 kicks inside the 20. His season long was 54 yards against LSU; he had six punts last year of 50 yards or more.

For his career, Clark has a 40.3 average on 172 career punts, with 55 punts landing inside the 20 and 24 kicks of 50 yards or longer. Only 11.0 percent of his career punts (19-172) have been returned, for an average of just 5.2 yards per return. Clark is now fourth in Auburn career total punts with 172 and seventh in Auburn career punting yards with 6,925.

Parkey For Three

Cody Parkey hit three field goals in the 24-20 Mississippi State win, including a 47-yarder that tied his career long., earning Lou Groza Award Star of the Week honors. Parkey also kicked a career-long 47-yard field goal against Washington State, one of three field goals he made in that 31-24 win.

Parkey has an SEC-leading string of 73 consecutive PAT kicks made; that total ranks him eighth nationally. He has made 17 straight field goals from 45 yards and in, dating back through the 2011 Chick-fil-A Bowl.

Parkey now ranks fourth in Auburn career field goal percentage at .761 (32-42), just behind Scott Etheridge (.791/1992-93), Matt Hawkins (.788/1994-95) and Win Lyle (.763/1987-89).

During his career, 101 of Parkey's 188 kickoffs have gone for touchbacks (.537), including 100 of 153 since the beginning of his sophomore season (.654).

In 2012, Parkey converted on nine straight three-pointers dating back through the 2011 season, before missing on a 49-yarder vs. Arkansas. That tied the third best string of consecutive field goals at Auburn since 1981.

Parkey was 11-14 on field goals last year, and 27-27 last season on PAT kicks. He made four field goals versus Clemson (37-46-27-36 yards), tying a Chick-fil-A Kickoff Classic record and earning him Lou Groza Award star of the week honors. Parkey's game-winner against ULM earned him SEC Special Teams Player of the Week honors.

Drive Time

Auburn has had 12 drives of 75 yards or longer already through six games of the 2013 season, all of them accounting for touchdowns. Last season, Auburn had only 13 drives of that length in 12 games, and only 11 such drives in 2011.

During the past 18 seasons, the current total already ranks eighth: 2010 (29); 2004 (24); 2005 (20); 2000 (17); 1994, 2003 (14); 2012 (13); 2013 (12); 2001, 2009, 2011 (11); 1999, 2006, 2007 (10).

Conversion Rate

The Auburn defense turns up the pressure on third down, ranking first in the SEC allowing opponents to convert just 13.04 percent (3-23) of third down attempts in the fourth quarter, and only 20.9 percent (9-43) in the second half. Auburn's three fourth-quarter third-down conversions allowed through six games are fewest in the SEC.

For Starters

Auburn has a total of 43 players with at least one career start for the Tigers. Tops on that list is Nosa Eguae with 35 career starts, eighth best among current SEC players.

Ten players have made their first career start for Auburn this season. Five made their first Auburn start against Washington State: QB Nick Marshall, OG Alex Kozan, DE Craig Sanders, DE LaDarius Owens and Star Robenson Therezie. Against Arkansas State, defensive tackle Ben Bradley and tailback Corey Grant were first-time starters. Marcus Davis made his first start at WR against Ole Miss. QB Jeremy Johnson. WR Ricardo Louis and RB Cameron Artis-Payne were first-time starters against Western Carolina.

Among 2013 SEC programs, Auburn had the most returning career starts (365) on its roster, seventh most nationally entering the season.

Scoring By Quarters

This season in the first quarter, the Tigers have outscored the opposition 67-36. In the second quarter, Auburn is ahead of its opponents 55-31. In the third quarter, Auburn has outscored its opponents 48-33, and the Tigers hold a 36-13 margin in the fourth quarter.

Auburn has scored in 10 straight quarters dating back to the third quarter of the LSU game. The streak is Auburn's second such streak of at least 10 quarters this season. The Tigers started the season by scoring in all 12 quarters the first three games. After being shut out in the first half at LSU, Auburn has scored in the last 10 quarters.

For the season, Auburn has scored in 22 of 24 quarters. Additionally, Auburn has scored a touchdown in 17 of 24 quarters this season.

The Graduates

Five members of the 2013 Auburn squad have already earned bachelor's degrees. Graduating in May were Nosa Eguae (communication), Steven Clark (exercise science) and Chandler Shakespeare (business management). Craig Sanders (human development and family studies) and Ryan Smith (public administration) were August graduates.

Average Per Down

Here's a breakdown for the season of how the 2013 Auburn offense operates on first, second, third and fourth down.

On first down, the Tigers have run a total of 188 plays, gaining 1,328 yards for an average of 7.1 yards per play. On second down, AU has tried 126 plays for 967 yards, an average of 7.7 per play. On third down, the Tigers have run 79 plays, gaining 528 yards for a 6.7 average. Auburn has tried seven fourth-down attempts, gaining 13 yards (1.9-yard average).

Auburn's touchdowns this season have come 12 times on first down (eight rush, four pass), seven times on second down (five rushes and two passes), and five times on third down (three rushes and two passes).

300-Yard SEC Half

Auburn's 333 second-half yards gained at LSU marked the first 300+ half an Auburn offense has posted versus an SEC opponent since gaining 348 yards in the first half of the 2010 SEC Championship against South Carolina. The last time Auburn had a 300-yard half in the SEC regular season was a 344-yard first half against Kentucky in 2010.

Fantastic Finish

In its 24-20 win over Mississippi State, Auburn scored the game-winning touchdown with just 10 seconds left in the game. The winning play was an 11-yard TD pass to C.J. Uzomah from Nick Marshall, capping off Auburn's 12-play, 88-yard drive that began with just 1:56 remaining. The last time Auburn scored a game-winning touchdown in the final 30 seconds of regulation in a game was against Utah State in 2011 (Michael Dyer 1-yard TD run).

Auburn's 24-20 victory over Mississippi State was the Tigers' first fourth-quarter comeback win in an SEC game since the Tigers won at No. 10 South Carolina 16-13 with 1:38 left on a Barrett Trotter 9-yard touchdown pass to Philip Lutzenkirchen in 2011.

Auburn's last victory over an SEC opponent in the final seconds of the game was a 37-34 win at Kentucky in 2010 on a 24-yard Wes Byrum field goal as time expired. Auburn's last victory over any opponent in the final seconds was the 22-19 victory over Oregon in the 2010 BCS National Championship Game with Wes Byrum's 19-yard field goal as time expired.

100-Yard Rusher, 100-Yard Receiver

Tre Mason gained 132 yards rushing against LSU, his first 100-yard outing against an SEC opponent. Sammie Coates, with 139 yards receiving against LSU, posted his first career 100-yard game.

That's the first time an Auburn duo has combined for 100 yards rushing and receiving since last year's season opener with Clemson, when Mason (106 rushing) and Emory Blake (109 receiving) posted those marks. It's the first such duo for Auburn in an SEC game since the 2011 Mississippi State game, when Blake had 108 yards receiving and Michael Dyer totalled 150 yards rushing.

Winningest Programs

Entering the 2013 campaign, Auburn ranked among the 15 winningest BCS college football programs in all-time wins; the Tigers have 719 total victories. Teams that have 700+ all-time wins: Michigan, Texas, Nebraska, Notre Dame, Penn State, Ohio State, Oklahoma, Alabama, Tennessee, Southern Cal, Georgia, LSU, Auburn, West Virginia, Syracuse and Virginia Tech.

Game Captains

Auburn will select game captains for the 2013 season. Cornerback Chris Davis and center Reese Dismukes served as captains against Washington State, Arkansas State, Mississippi State, Ole Miss and Western Carolina. Dismukes and defensive end Dee Ford were game captains at LSU.

On Scholarship

Formerly walk-ons, senior running back Chandler Shakespeare, senior safety Blake Poole and junior receiver Dimitri Reese were put on scholarship for the Fall Semester; classes began August 21.



More Tiger Stripes...

- Auburn was one of only 13 teams nationally not to have at least one senior on its starting offensive line for the opening game. Auburn started juniors Reese Dismukes and Chad Slade, sophomores Patrick Miller and Greg Robinson and redshirt freshman Alex Kozan. Auburn (now 76) and Miami (Fla.) (now 75) were the only two teams to have played more than 70 games on ESPN all-time entering the 2013 season. Auburn and Nebraska are the only two BCS teams to have three undefeated seasons since 1993. Auburn and Florida are the only two SEC teams undefeated against non-BCS teams since 1992. Auburn is currently tied for the longest bowl winning streak with five consecutive bowl victories.

- Auburn, Tennessee, and Florida are the only SEC teams that have never gone six consecutive seasons without playing in the SEC Championship Game.

Home Start

Auburn opened the season with three straight home contests for the 12th time in program history. Other seasons: 2009, 2007, 2005, 1999, 1995, 1993, 1988, 1986, 1982, 1980 and 1920.

Clark Senior CLASS Candidate

Auburn punter Steven Clark is one of 30 NCAA* Football Bowl Subdivision student-athletes who excel both on and off the field selected as candidates for the 2013 Senior CLASS Award* in collegiate football. To be eligible for the award, a student-athlete must be classified as an NCAA Division I FBS senior and have notable achievements in four areas of excellence - community, classroom, character and competition.

An acronym for Celebrating Loyalty and Achievement for Staying in School *, the Senior CLASS Award focuses on the total student-athlete and encourages students to use their platform in athletics to make a positive impact as leaders in their communities.

Of the 30 candidates, 12 have grade point averages of 3.0 or higher. Seven are all-Americans and 12 were all-conference selections in 2012. The Senior CLASS Award winner will be announced during the bowl season in early January. The 30 candidates will be narrowed to 10 finalists midway through the regular season, and those names will be placed on the official ballot distributed through a nationwide voting system to media, coaches and fans.

Eguae Good Works Team Nominee

Senior Nosa Eguae is one of 150 nominees for the 2013 Allstate AFCA Good Works Team, the most ever in the award's 22-year history. The award recognizes a select group of college football players who have made a commitment to enriching the lives of others while contributing to the greater good of their communities.

Eguae is involved in a number of outreach initiatives, led by his work as a volunteer with the Pine Hills Literacy Project.

Since 1992, the Allstate AFCA Good Works Team* has honored college football players at all levels of the sport for their selfless acts of giving back to the community and off-the-field achievements. Auburn tight end Philip Lutzenkirchen was a member of the 2012 Allstate AFCA Good Works Team.

Clark NFF Campbell Trophy Semifinalist

Senior punter Steven Clark is among a record field of 170 semifinalists for the National Football Foundation's Campbell Trophy and postgraduate scholarships. Clark graduated in May with a 3.55 GPA in exercise science with a minor in psychology and is currently enrolled in biomechanics graduate studies.

Selected as the best and brightest from the college gridiron, the nominees comprise the list of semifinalists for the 2013 William V. Campbell Trophy, endowed by HealthSouth, which recognizes an individual as the absolute best scholar-athlete in the nation. The 170 semifinalists represent the most ever since 2006 when the NFF increased the nomination standards to require a minimum cumulative 3.2 GPA.

The NFF Awards Committee will select up to 16 recipients, and the results will be announced October 31. Each recipient will receive an \$18,000 postgraduate scholarship, and will vie as finalists for the 2013 William V. Campbell Trophy. Each member of the 2013 National

Scholar-Athlete Class will travel to New York City to be honored Dec. 10 during the 56th NFF Annual Awards Dinner at the Waldorf-Astoria. One member of the class will also be announced live at the event as the winner of the William V. Campbell Trophy.

Jordan-Hare Stadium

Jordan-Hare Stadium, the 11th largest on-campus college football stadium, seats 87,451.

The stadium was dedicated Nov. 30, 1939, with 7,500 seats. Ten years later, 14,000 seats were added, and the stadium was named Cliff Hare Stadium (after a member of Auburn's first football team and eventual professor and dean of the School of Chemistry), although only 12 home games were played there over that 10-year span. Additional seats were added in 1955, 1960 and 1970. The West upper deck was completed in 1980; the East upper deck and suites were finished for the 1987 season.

The most recent addition to the stadium was the construction of a LED board in 2007; Auburn was the first SEC school to install a high-definition video board display.

The facility was renamed Jordan-Hare Stadium in 1973, recognizing Hall of Fame coach Ralph "Shug" Jordan. The turf at Jordan-Hare Stadium was officially named after Pat Dye, Auburn's Hall of Fame coach and athletics director, prior to the 2005 Iron Bowl.

On game days, Auburn's Pat Dye Field at Jordan-Hare Stadium becomes the sixth-largest city in the state of Alabama; Auburn has averaged 80,000+ fans per game for the last 19 seasons. Since Jordan-Hare Stadium expanded to its current capacity prior to the 2004 season, the Tigers have tallied 28 sold-out games.

The Tigers have won 79.5 percent of their games in Jordan-Hare Stadium since its inception in 1939 and hold an overall record of 293-74-7 there. Auburn is averaging 84,967 fans per game through five home games this season.

The 2013 A-Day spring game at Jordan-Hare Stadium set an Auburn record with 83,401 fans in attendance. It was the largest spring game attendance in America for 2013.



Honoring Champions

Four outstanding Auburn football teams will be honored during 2013 at Jordan-Hare Stadium. Members of each team will be recognized on the field; they will also visit with fans at the Verizon Wireless Autograph Tent located at Plainsman Park two hours prior to kickoff.

The 1983 Tigers, Auburn's first SEC champions since 1957, will celebrate their 30th anniversary at the Florida Atlantic game. Posting an 11-1 record, 6-0 in SEC play, the '83 Auburn squad defeated Michigan 9-7 in the Sugar Bowl to finish No. 3 in most of the national polls.

The 1993 Tigers posted an undefeated 11-0 record and finished with a No. 4 national ranking; they were honored at the Washington State game. The 1988 Tigers, co-champions of the SEC and No. 7 in the nation, were honored vs. Arkansas State. The 1963 Auburn squad celebrated its 50th anniversary at the Homecoming game versus Western Carolina. Under Coach Ralph "Shug" Jordan, the '63 Tigers finished 9-2 and No. 5 in the national rankings and faced Nebraska in the Orange Bowl.

Frank Sanders 2013 SEC Legend

Auburn's Frank Sanders has been chosen as one of 14 former Southeastern Conference players to be named to the 2013 SEC Football Legends Class.

A four-year letterwinner (1991-94) at wide receiver for Auburn, Sanders was named first-team All-America by the Associated Press, FWAA and Scripps his senior season after leading the SEC in receiving yards per game (910) and breaking Auburn's single-season record for receptions (58).

A consensus all-SEC selection as a senior, the Fort Lauderdale, Fla., native finished his Auburn career second in total receptions with 121, receiving yardage with 1,998 and receiving touchdowns with 15.

Sanders had a nine-year NFL career from 1995-2003, including eight with the Arizona Cardinals from 1995-2002 and one with the Baltimore Ravens (2003). He had 507 receptions for 6,749 yards and 24 touchdowns during his professional career. His most prolific season came in 1998 when he led the NFC in receptions with 89 for 1,145 yards and three TD.

Sanders and the rest of the class will be honored at the 2013 SEC Football "Weekend of Champions" December 6-7 in Atlanta. The annual SEC Legends Dinner presented by AT&T will be December 6 at the Hyatt Regency, and the group will also be recognized prior to the SEC Football Championship Game at the Georgia Dome on December 7.

2014 Auburn Schedule

The 2014 Auburn football schedule will feature seven home games and five road games, featuring SEC home contests against Arkansas, LSU, South Carolina and Texas A&M. Auburn's non-conference home games are against San Jose State, Louisiana Tech and Samford.

Auburn will open the 2014 season at Jordan-Hare Stadium against Arkansas on Aug. 30, the Tigers' first SEC season opener since a 46-13 win over Ole Miss in 1995. Auburn will host A-Day on Saturday, April 19.

Brooks was the star running back for the Warner Robins High School football team leading them to both the state and national championships in 1976. He went on to play at Auburn University from 1977-80, and then in the NFL, including eight seasons with the Cincinnati Bengals. Brooks finished his high school, college, and professional careers as his team's career leader in all-purpose yards, and he continues to hold that record with the Bengals. A four time Pro Bowler, Brooks appeared in Super Bowl XXIII for the AFC Champion Bengals in 1989.

The 2014 Georgia Sports Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony will be held at the Macon City Auditorium on Saturday, February 22. For information on sponsorships and tickets, contact the Hall of Fame offices at 478-752-1585.

2015 Chick-fil-A Kickoff

The Auburn University Tigers will meet the University of Louisville Cardinals in the Chick-fil-A Kickoff Game to open the 2015 college football season. The game is scheduled for Saturday, September 5, 2015.

LAST MEETING WITH TEXAS A&M

True freshman quarterback Jonathan Wallace connected on touchdown passes to C.J. Uzomah and Emory Blake and threw for 122 yards but it wasn't enough to overcome No. 21/22 Texas A&M's 672 yards of total offense as the Auburn football team fell to 1-7, 0-6 SEC with a 63-21 loss on Saturday night at Jordan-Hare Stadium in Auburn.

Both of Wallace's touchdown tosses covered 27 yards and both came in the third quarter after Auburn went down 49-7 at the half. Auburn's lone score in the first half was a Tre Mason one-yard run on Auburn's first possession of the second quarter, Mason's fifth scoring run in the last four contests.

Wallace finished the night 6-for-9 from the pocket and also ran for 71 yards on 13 attempts while Mason rushed 12 times for 80 yards and his fifth touchdown of the season.

Texas A&M (6-2, 3-2 SEC) quarterback Johnny Manziel threw for 260 yards on 16-for-23 passing with two touchdowns and also ran for 90 yards and three touchdowns on nine carries.

GAME 1

Auburn opened the Gus Malzahn era with a 31-24 win over Washington State at Jordan-Hare Stadium.

The two teams played a see-saw first half, which saw five lead changes and 46 total points before Auburn pulled out the victory.

Auburn rushed for 295 yards on 46 carries, led by Corey Grant's 146, which included a 75-yard touchdown run in the second quarter which helped give Auburn a lead it would hold onto for the rest of the game.

Nick Marshall finished 10-for-19 for 99 yards. Sammie Coates (44 yards) and Quan Bray (28 yards) each had three catches.

Auburn's defense collected three interceptions on the night, two by Robenson Therezie, including one in the end zone as Washington State was driving late in the fourth quarter for a tying score.

Washington State struck first, taking a 7-0 lead on a Jeremiah Laufasa 4-yard run, capping a 12-play, 75-yard drive.

Auburn took its first lead of the game when Ryan White's two-point conversion run made it 8-7 following a Tre Mason 8-yard scoring run. The touchdown the 10th of Mason's career while the successful two-point conversion was Auburn's first since Lee Guess caught a Carl Stewart pass at Alabama in 2006.

Washington State took a 14-8 lead with 8:02 left in the first half on a Connor Halliday 7-yard touchdown pass to Bobby Ratliff, capping off a nine-play, 67-yard drive. The lead was short-lived, however, as Mason returned the ensuing kickoff 100 yards for the game-tying score. A successful Cody Parkey extra-point put Auburn ahead, 15-14.

Mason's 100-yard kick return tied for the second-longest in school history and marks the sixth consecutive season in which Auburn has returned at least one kickoff for a touchdown, tied for the third-longest active streak in the nation.

Washington State wasted little time answering Mason's return, going 75 yards in just 1:28 to reclaim the lead, 21-15, with 6:18 left in the half.

GAME 2

Nick Marshall threw for 147 yards and two touchdowns and tailbacks Tre Mason, Corey Grant and Cameron Artis-Payne each scored a rushing touchdown as Auburn (2-0) cruised to a 38-9 win over Arkansas State (1-1) at Jordan-Hare Stadium. Artis-Payne, finishing the night with 102 yards on 19 carries, led an Auburn rushing attack that finished with 301 yards on the ground.

Marshall finished the night 10-for-17, connecting with seven different receivers, as Auburn led from start to finish.

Mason finished the game with 99 yards on 14 carries, including an 11-yard touchdown in the third quarter that put Auburn up 28-9, while Artis-Payne's 12-yard touchdown run came in the fourth quarter and was the final score of the game.

Marshall's first career touchdown pass landed in the hands of Marcus Davis for an 18-yard score to put Auburn up a touchdown just 3:23 into the game. The catch was the first of the season for Davis.

After a Brian Davis field goal cut the lead to 7-3, Grant rushed 17 yards around right end to cap an 8-play, 85-yard drive to put Auburn ahead, 14-3. The touchdown marked the second straight week that Grant carried a touchdown in, marking the first Auburn player since Oterio McCalebb in 2009 to score in each of the first two Auburn games of a season. Mason would later join Grant in the accomplishment.

Marshall found Sammie Coates just 2:20 before halftime for a 68-yard touchdown strike that extended Auburn's lead to 21-3. The catch was the longest of Coates' career.

Davis hit a 21- and a 42-yard field goal in the third quarter for Arkansas State, cutting the margin to 12 at 21-9 before Mason's third touchdown of the season gave Auburn a 28-9 lead with just 1:14 left in the third quarter.

Cody Parkey's 35-yard field goal with 8:46 left in the game extended the lead to 31-9. It capped off an 11-play, 62-yard drive that lasted 5:12, its longest of the game by both time and number of plays.

Chris Davis finished with a career-high 10 tackles for Auburn, including seven solo, 1.5 sacks, two pass break ups and one forced fumble.

GAME 3

Nick Marshall hit C.J. Uzomah for a 11-yard touchdown pass with just 10 seconds left in the game as Auburn rallied to defeat Mississippi State, 24-20, at Jordan-Hare Stadium. Marshall finished the night with 339 yards passing and two touchdowns as Auburn moved to 3-0 (1-0 SEC) on the season.

Facing a 3rd-down and 10 on the Mississippi State 25-yard line, Marshall rushed over left end for 11 yards and a key first down to keep Auburn's final drive alive. Two plays later, Marshall connected with Uzomah, who finished with three catches for 48 yards, for the game-winner. Auburn's drive had started on its own 12-yard line with just 1:56 on the clock.

Marshall, who finished 23-34 with two touchdown and two interceptions, had the first 300-yard passing game by an Auburn quarterback since Cam Newton threw for 335-yards in the 2010 SEC Championships Game against South Carolina.

Marshall connected with nine different receivers in the game, with Quan Bray leading the team in yards with 80, while Marcus Davis led the team in receptions with six, totaling 43 yards.

Mississippi State (1-2, 0-1 SEC) had taken its first lead of the game, 20-14, when Dak Prescott scored his second rushing touchdown of the game, a 2-yard scamper just 2:22 into the third quarter.

Cody Parkey's 47-yard field goal, which tied a career long, cut the lead to 20-17 with 9:53 left in the third quarter.

A Parkey 40-yard field goal and a Bray 76 yard touchdown reception helped Auburn jump out to an early 11-0 lead. Instead of kicking the extra point following Bray's catch from Marshall, Auburn successfully went for the 2-point conversion for the second time this season. Bray's reception was the first touchdown catch of his career while the 76-yard connection tied for the 19th-longest in Auburn history and was the longest since Newton hit Terrell Zachery for an 80-yard touchdown against Chattanooga in 2010.

GAME 4

In the first loss of the Gus Malzahn era, LSU's Jeremy Hill rushed for a career-high 184 yards and three touchdowns as No. 6 LSU defeated Auburn 35-21 on a rainy Saturday night in Tiger Stadium.

Playing in inclement conditions throughout the night, both teams were forced into a ground game with Auburn (3-1, 1-1 SEC) totaling 213 rushing yards to LSU's 228. Auburn out-rushed LSU 140-74 after halftime.

The Mason led the way on the ground for Auburn with 132 yards on 26 carries and two touchdowns. He was the third different 100-yard rusher for Auburn in 2013 joining teammates Corey Grant and Cameron Artis-Payne.

The performance was his first 100-yard game since Alabama A&M in 2011 and the fourth of his career. It was his first 100-yard rushing game against an SEC opponent in his career.

Auburn opened the second half with an interception by safety Jermaine Whitehead of LSU quarterback Zach Mettenberger. The pick was the first of the season by Whitehead and his first since 2011.

The Tigers followed up the interception with a two-yard touchdown run by Mason. Mason later added another two-yard touchdown late in the fourth quarter to post his fourth career game with two rushing touchdowns.

The score capped a 10-play, 94-yard drive that included a 52-yard throw from Nick Marshall to Sammie Coates – the longest play surrendered by the LSU defense in 2013. Marshall completed 17-of-33 passes for 224 yards with two interceptions. He also rushed for 46 yards on 14 carries.

Artis-Payne added a 12-yard touchdown late in the fourth quarter. He finished with 41 yards on seven carries.

Coates finished with a career-best 139 yards on four receptions to become Auburn's first 100-yard receiver of the season. Ricardo Louis had a career-high five catches.

Auburn raced out to a 17-point first half lead and then held off an Ole Miss second-half rally as Auburn defeated the No. 24 Rebels, 30-22, on Saturday night at Jordan-Hare Stadium. Quarterback Nick Marshall finished with 140 yards rushing as Auburn moved to 4-1, 2-1 SEC on the season.

Auburn's defense played a key role in the win, sacking the Ole Miss (3-2, 1-2 SEC) quarterbacks six times and also intercepting two passes. Robenson Therezie had one of the two picks for the Auburn defense, returning a Bo Wallace second-quarter pass 78 yards for a touchdown and a 13-3 Auburn lead late in the first quarter.

The six sacks by the Auburn defense were the most for an Auburn defensive unit since it registered 11 quarterback sacks against Alabama in 2005.

Auburn jumped out to a 20-3 lead on the back of touchdown runs from Tre Mason and Marshall and Therezie's pick-six. Mason's 1-yard rush capped off a six-play, 80-yard drive early on Auburn's first drive to put it up 6-0 while Marshall pushed the lead to 20-3 with a 5-yard touchdown run with 5:17 left in the first half to cap an 8-play, 80-yard drive.

Ole Miss scored on a pair of first half field goals. Andrew Ritter hit on a 42-yard field goal in the first quarter and then a 44-yarder with 41 seconds left in the half to make it 20-6 in Auburn's favor at the half.

Ritter connected on a 22-yard field goal early in the third quarter to cut it 20-9 only to have Marshall answer with his second rushing touchdown of the game, a 5-yard run as Auburn went up 27-9 with 6:35 left in the third quarter.

Ole Miss wouldn't go away quietly as Wallace hit Donte Moncrief for a 49-yard touchdown pass with 5:55 to go in the third and a 13-yard touchdown pass with 8:29 to go in the fourth to make it 27-22.

The two teams traded turnovers in the fourth quarter following the second Wallace to Moncrief connection. Auburn's Cameron Artis-Payne had the ball stripped for a fumble following an 18-yard run to give Ole Miss the ball at its own 40-yard line but Ole Miss gave it back just three plays later when Ryan Smith intercepted a Wallace pass in the flat.

After a 3-and-out by the Auburn offense, Auburn punter Steven Clark pinned Ole Miss at its own 1-yard line with a 39-yard kick. Ole Miss would

also go 3-and-out, punting it back to Auburn, with the kick covering just 30 yards. Cody Parkey would connect on a 23-yard field goal to make it an 8-point game, 30-22, and then the Auburn defense held strong, sacking Wallace on third- and fourth-down before kneeling on the ball to end the game.

Marshall's 140-yard rushing effort marked the fourth time this season Auburn has had a 100-yard rusher, with Marshall being the fourth different runner to hit the century mark. Corey Grant (Washington State), Artis-Payne (Arkansas State) and Mason (LSU) have also had 100-yard rushing nights, marking the first time Auburn has had four different 100-yard single-game rushers in a season.

Jeremy Johnson threw for four touchdowns and completed 17-of-21 passes in his first career start as Auburn (5-1) cruised to a 62-3 win over Western Carolina (1-6). Auburn accounted for a school-record 712 yards of total offense on the day, which included 511 yards rushing, the third-most rushing total in school history.

Johnson and Auburn jumped out to a 42-3 halftime lead while holding the ball for 12:29 seconds, scoring on six of its seven first-half possessions. The true freshman finished with 201 yards passing, 183 of it in the first half, hitting eight different receivers while also carrying it for 26 yards on three carries.

Tre Mason finished with 100 yards rushing, his second 100-yard rushing game of the season and the fifth of his career. He scored on a 20-yard run on Auburn's first possession of the game and later scored on a 53-yard run that put Auburn up 35-3 with 7:46 left in the first half to give him seven rushing touchdowns this season.

Cameron Artis-Payne also topped 100 yards on the ground, carrying it seven times for 133 yards. His 25-yard touchdown run up the middle midway through the third quarter extended Auburn's lead to 56-3.

Corey Grant carried it five times for 83 yards, scoring on a 51-yard run that put Auburn up 28-3 with 13:54 left in the second quarter. Johnathan Ford (2 carries, 45 yards) also had a rushing touchdown, scoring on a 38-yard run up the middle just 10 seconds into the final quarter, while Chandler Shakespeare finished with 61 yards on 10 carries, all of it coming in the fourth quarter.

Auburn's rushing total was its most since it ran for 526 yards against Furman in 1946 while the school record is 565 yards rushing against Southwest Louisiana in 1985.

Johnson hit Jay Prosch for an 8-yard score on Auburn's second possession of the game, the first career passing and receiving touchdown for the duo. On Auburn's next possession Johnson hit Ricardo Louis for a 46-yard touchdown strike to extend the Auburn lead to 21-3.

Jordan-Hare Stadium is Auburn's showcase football stadium, which seats 87,451 with 70 luxury suites located between the lower level and upper deck on the East side.

The stadium was dedicated Nov. 30, 1939, with 7,500 seats. Ten years later, 14,000 more seats were added, and the stadium was named Cliff Hare Stadium (after a member of Auburn's first football team and eventual professor and dean of the School of Chemistry), although only 12 home games were played there over that 10-year span. Additional seats were added in 1955, 1960 and 1970. The West upper deck was completed in 1980; the East upper deck and suites were finished for the 1987 season. The most recent addition to the stadium was the construction of a 30-foot by 74-foot Daktronics LED board in 2007, coming at a cost of \$2.9 million. Auburn was the first school in the SEC to install a high-definition video board display.

The facility was renamed Jordan-Hare Stadium in 1973, recognizing Hall of Fame coach Ralph "Shug"

Jordan. The turf at Jordan-Hare Stadium was officially named after Pat Dye, Auburn's Hall of Fame coach and athletics director, prior to the 2005 Iron Bowl. The Tigers posted a 99-39-4 record in 12 seasons under Dye from 1981-92, and won four SEC championships. Auburn's home games are now played at Pat Dye Field at Jordan-Hare Stadium.

On game days, Auburn's Pat Dye Field at Jordan-Hare Stadium becomes the sixth-largest city in the state of Alabama as Auburn has averaged at least 80,000 fans per game for the last 20 seasons. Since Jordan-Hare Stadium expanded to its current capacity prior to the 2004 season, the Tigers have tallied 28 sell-out games.

Pat Dye Field at Jordan-Hare Stadium is the nation's 10th-largest on-campus stadium with a capacity of 87,451. It is the sixth-largest in the SEC.

The Tigers have won 78.3 percent of their games in Jordan-Hare Stadium since its inception in 1939 and hold an overall record of 293-74-7 there.

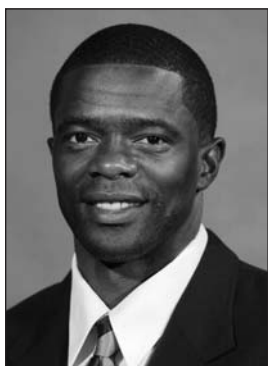

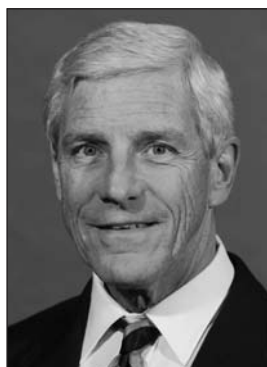
