Bears Open Spring Drills

The Baylor football team opens its fifth spring under the direction of head coach Guy Morriss on Tuesday, March 20, at 3:30 p.m. Per NCAA rules, the Bears will hold 15 workouts this spring, culminating with the annual Green & Gold Game, Saturday, April 14, at Floyd Casey Stadium. As was the policy toward the end of the 2006 season, all practices are **closed** to both the media and public.

Baylor returns 42 lettermen, including 11 starters, from last year's team which went 4-8 overall, but won a school-record three (against five losses) Big 12 Conference games. All-told, the Bears return four starters on offense and seven on defense.

"The players have worked very hard in the winter conditioning program, but I believe they are anxious to get on the field and get started," said Morriss. "As we've done in previous years, every job on our depth chart is up for grabs over the next month. I believe we'll have some good competition (for starting jobs) in the coming weeks, which is important for the continued development of our program."

2007 Baylor Spring Storylines

Offensively, the Bears look to replace seven starters from last year's unit which averaged 23.6 points per game, Baylor's highest mark since 1996 (24.2 ppg), and 315.2 yards per contest. In addition to seeking a replacement for 23-game starter Shawn Bell at quarterback, the Bears must replace their top rusher of 2006 in running back Paul Mosley (43.4 ypg), as well as six of their 10 leading receivers from a year ago, including the top two--Dominique Zeigler (54 rec.) and Trent Shelton (53 rec.). Three of the Bears' four returning starters are along the offensive line.

The Baylor defense returns seven starters, but needs to replace both of its starting cornerbacks in C.J. Wilson and Anthony Arline, as well as outside safety Maurice Linguist and nose tackle M.T. Robinson. That foursome combined to start 44 games in 2006, with Linguist (71 tackles) and Wilson (59 tackles), ranking third and fourth, respectively, on the squad in tackles a year ago. Baylor yielded 408.2 yards and 32.6 points per game a year ago. Baylor returns its starting linebacking corps from a year ago as well as three starters along the line.

Two-time Ray Guy Award winner Daniel Sepulveda and honorable mention All-Big 12 place-kicker Ryan Havens completed their eligibility, leaving the spring kicking chores in the hands of junior walk-on Caleb Allen. The Baylor staff signed a punter and place-kicker last month who are both expected to challenge for the starting jobs in 2007. Sepulveda led the nation in punting a year ago with his 46.5-yard average en route to unanimous consensus All-America honors, while Havens made 32-of-33 PATs and 11-of-14 field goals.

Coaching Staff Features Five New Faces

In the off-season, coach **Guy Morriss'** coaching staff underwent an extreme makeover as five new faces were added, and the dean of the Bears' staff, **Larry Hoefer**, was promoted to defensive coordinator.

Kasey Dunn, who spent the past three seasons as running backs coach at the University of Arizona, is Baylor's new special teams coordinator and wide receivers coach. He brings 14 years of coaching experience to Waco, which includes stops at Arizona (2004-06), TCU (2003), Alabama (2003), Washington State (1998-2002), New Mexico (1996-97), Idaho (1993 and 1995) and the University of San Diego (1994).

A standout wide receiver at the University of Idaho from 1987 through 1991, Dunn was a three-time All-American who still holds Vandal school records for career receptions (268) and receiving yards (3,847), while ranking No. 2 in touchdown receptions (25). The 1992 Idaho graduate played with professionally with the CFL's British Columbia Lions (1992) and Edmonton Eskimos (1993), and the NFL's Houston Oilers (1992).

Former University of Houston All-America wide receiver **Jason Phillips** will coach Baylor's inside receivers and serve as recruiting coordinator after helping his alma mater to three bowl games in the last four seasons. He coached the Cougar wide receivers in three of his four seasons and spent one year (2005) as their cornerbacks coach. Prior to his return to Houston, Phillips coached wide receivers at Texas State in 2002 and was an offensive assistant under head coach Dana Dimel at Houston in 2001.

As an All-America athlete at UH, Phillips was on the receiving end of many "Run-n-Shoot" passes from Heisman Trophy winner Andre Ware. Under the leadership of head coach Jack Pardee, Phillips led the nation in receiving in 1987 and 1988, becoming the first NCAA player in 23 years to accomplish such a feat in two consecutive seasons. He played with the NFL's Detroit Lions and Atlanta Falcons, as well as in the CFL.

Morriss also hired University of Houston safeties coach **Clay Jennings**, a graduate of nearby La Vega High School, as Baylor's cornerbacks coach. Jennings has spent the past two seasons (2005 and 2006) as Houston's safeties coach, helping coach Art Briles' program to back-to-back bowl appearances (2005 Fort Worth Bowl and 2006 Liberty Bowl) and the 2006 Conference USA championship. Prior to his two-year stint at Houston, Jennings spent two seasons (2003 and 2004) as the defensive backs coach at the University of Louisiana at Lafayette, where he helped the Ragin' Cajuns to a No. 11 national ranking in pass defense, and two years as secondary coach and recruiting coordinator at Sam Houston State.

A four-year letterwinner as a defensive lineman and special teams standout at the University of North Texas from 1992 through 1995, Jennings also coached the secondary at Southern Arkansas University, Morningside College in Sioux City, Iowa and Morehouse College.

Cornell Jackson, who has spent the past two seasons as running backs coach at the University of New Mexico and has 20 years of collegiate coaching experience under his belt, joined the Baylor staff as running backs coach, Feb. 26. Before his second coaching stint at New Mexico, Jackson spent three seasons (2002-04) at the University of Washington. He coached the Husky running backs in 2004 and had added duties as UW's recruiting coordinator. Jackson coached the Husky safeties in 2003 after instructing the UW inside linebackers during his first season in Seattle.

Jackson also worked as linebackers coach at the University of Houston (2000-01), tutored running backs at Arizona State from 1996-99, outside linebackers at New Mexico (1995), linebackers at Pacific (1992-94) and Utah State (1990-91). He began his coaching career as running backs coach at Butler County (Kan.) Community College in 1987 before moving on to Central Missouri State as a graduate assistant coach from 1988-89. The 1986 Sterling (Kan.) College graduate was a two-time all-conference defensive back (1982 and 1983) at Hinds Junior College in Raymond, Miss.

Eric Schnupp, who has served as offensive line coach at West Texas A&M the past three seasons, will coach Baylor's tight ends. At Baylor, Schnupp is reunited with Bears' offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach Lee Hays, who joined Morriss' staff in Dec. 2005 after serving in a similar position with the Buffaloes. He spent three seasons as offensive line coach at American Series High School in Miami, Fla., before breaking into the college ranks at WTAMU. A native of Miami, Fla., Schnupp was a three-year letterwinner along the offensive line for his hometown Miami Hurricanes from 1997 through 1999. Following his Hurricane playing career, he spent one season with the NFL's Chicago Enforcers before launching his coaching career.

Hoefer, the only remaining member of Morriss' original staff, was named the Bears' defensive coordinator in late February when Bill Bradley was named secondary coach of the NFL's San Diego Chargers.

Lee Hays returns for his second season as Baylor's offensive coordinator and will also tutor the Baylor signal callers in 2007, while **Gary Kinne** (linebackers) and **Don Wnek** (defensive line) are back for their second and third seasons, respectively, in the Baylor program.

For the second straight year, Morriss will coach the Bears' offensive linemen with help from Schnupp.

Bears Continue To Improve Under Morriss

Introduced as Baylor's 24th head football coach on Dec. 11, 2002, **Guy Morriss** inherited a proud program that had fallen on hard times and produced just 13 victories in the six seasons (1997-2002) prior to his arrival. He and his staff have already posted more wins both overall (15) and in Big 12 play (seven) than the Bears registered in the six previous years (13 overall/three Big 12) before Morriss' Central Texas arrival.

In fact, Morriss has directed Baylor to seven of its 11 all-time Big 12 Conference victories and its only two conference road wins. He owns a 15-31 record in four seasons at Baylor and is 24-45 in six seasons as a head coach overall.

JoePa Looks To Build On Outstanding Rookie Season

Sophomore linebacker **Joe Pawelek** enjoyed one of the finest seasons ever by a Baylor rookie, earning 2006 first-team freshman All-America honors from the Football Writers Association of America and second-team recognition from Rivals.com. The Associated Press' 2006 Big 12 Defensive Newcomer of the Year, Pawelek also garnered conference Defensive Freshman of the Year honors from *The Sporting News*, *Fort Worth Star-Telegram* and *Houston Chronicle* as well as second-team All-Big 12 honors from the league's coaches. He led the Bears in tackles with 86 stops (46 solos) while playing in every game with 10 starts. Pawelek tied for 10th in the Big 12 with 7.17 tackles per game, the highest per-game average of any conference freshman, and finished the season with 4.5 tackles for loss (No. 4 on squad), 2.0 sacks (T-No. 2 on team), one interception, four pass breakups (T-No. 2 on squad) and a team-high nine quarterback hurries.

All Eyes On QB Battle

A year ago, the focus on the offensive side of the ball was on the installation of the Bears new spread attack. This year, though, the attention will be directed at the five-man race to replace 23-game starter **Shawn Bell** as the Bears' starting quarterback. Bell, whose Baylor career was cut short when he went down with a season-ending knee injury late in the Texas A&M game, established virtually every school single-season and career passing record despite not playing more than nine games in any season. He missed the final three games of the 2006 season, but still set school single-season records for passing yards (2,582), attempts (383), completions (241), completion percentage (.629) and touchdowns (19) while directing the Bears to a 4-5 record and a school-record three Big 12 wins.

Sophomore **Blake Szymanski**, who started the final three games of the 2006 season in place of Bell and completed 52.9 percent of his passes on the season, will take the first snap of the spring with the Bears' No. 1 unit. From there, it's game on, as Szymanski will have to fight off Kent State transfer and fifth-year **Michael Machen**, junior walk-on **Ryan Roberts**, a transfer from Midwestern State who sat out the 2006 campaign at Baylor, Tyler Junior College transfer **John David Weed**, a junior, and redshirt freshman **Tyler Beatty** to start the Sept. 1 season-opener at TCU.

"That's the guy that makes everything go," Morriss said of the Bears' quarterback battle. "We don't need a guy that has a huge arm, but he's got to make good decisions and quick decisions and get the ball to the open guy."

Another Tough Schedule On Tap For 2007 Bears

After playing seven of 12 games a year ago against teams that went on to earn bowl invitations, Baylor will face eight bowl teams in 2007, including six of its eight Big 12 opponents. But, that's nothing new for coach **Guy Morriss'** program, as 28 times in his first 46 games (including 25 of 32 Big 12 contests) along the Baylor sideline he's faced an opponent who ended the season in a bowl game.

The Bears' 12 2007 opponents combined for an 85-67 (.559) record a year ago and eight earned bowl bids-TCU (Poinsettia champion), Rice (New Orleans), Texas (Alamo champion), Kansas State (Texas), Texas A&M (Holiday), Texas Tech (Insight champion), Oklahoma (Fiesta) and Oklahoma State (Independence champion). Baylor's eight 2007 Big 12 foes went 60-43 (.583) a year ago and recorded all three of the league's bowl wins.

Six of Baylor's eight losses in 2006 came at the hands of eventual bowl-bound teams while it knocked off Texas Bowl participant Kansas State, 17-3, and bowl-eligible Kansas, 36-35.

Over Morriss' four seasons in Waco, his teams have tackled the nation's 55th- (2003), sixth- (2004), 28th- (2005) and 49th- (2006) most-difficult schedules according to the NCAA.

Football Operations Headed To Campus In 2008

The Baylor University Board of Regents at its February 2007 meeting approved plans to construct the Alwin O. and Dorothy Highers Athletics Complex and the Simpson Athletics and Academic Center, a \$34 million complex that will integrate the Baylor athletics department and football program into the campus environment for the first time in the modern era.

The lead gift for the privately funded project and the largest single gift in Baylor's history is from the estate of Alwin O. Highers Jr. of Alexandria, La. A native Texan and a 1939 Baylor business graduate, Mr. Highers was well known as the owner of Alexandria's Dr Pepper Bottling Co. He also was a dedicated supporter of Baylor athletics and in particular its football program, until his death in 2003. He is survived by his beloved wife, Dorothy, who still resides in Alexandria.

The focal point of the Highers Athletics Complex will be the 96,300-square-foot Simpson Athletics and Academic Center, which will be built on University Parks Drive adjacent to Baylor's Mayborn Museum Complex and the university's other athletic facilities that are part of the Julie and Jim Turner Riverfront Athletic Complex on the Brazos River.

A Baylor University graduate and generous supporter of Baylor, Bob R. Simpson is a co-founder, chairman of the board and chief executive officer of XTO Energy Inc. of Fort Worth. His leadership at XTO has been recognized by numerous publications, including *Barron's* ("30 most respected CEOs in the world," March 27, 2006), *Oil & Gas Explorer* ("Executive of the Year," March 2006), *Institutional Investor* ("Best CEOs," January 2006), *BusinessWeek* ("The BusinessWeek Top 50 Performers," April 2006) and *Forbes* ("2,000 Leading Companies in the World," April 17, 2006). He attended Baylor University for his entire collegiate experience, earning a bachelor's degree in accounting and finance, with magna cum laude honors, in 1970 and his MBA in 1971.

The first floor of the Simpson Athletics and Academic Center will include functions that are currently housed at Floyd Casey Stadium, such as a main athletics training room, equipment room, football team locker room, coaches' locker room and weight room. Floor two will hold administrative offices, the football office and meeting rooms, as well as an academic center which will benefit all Baylor student-athletes.

The Highers Athletics Complex will include three football practice fields, two with a natural surface and the other with artificial turf. Construction of the facility will take approximately 18 months, with expected completion by summer 2008.

Baylor Quick Hits

In each of the last three years, coach **Guy Morriss'** Bears have improved their Big 12 win total--going from 1 victory in 2004, to 2 in 2005 and a school-record 3 in 2006 ... The Baylor defense returns eight of its top 10 tacklers from a year ago ... After starting 10 games at FS as a sophomore in 2006, 2007 All-America candidate **Dwain Crawford** moves to Rover as a junior ... Senior running back **Brandon Whitaker** is the Bears' leading returning receiver (30 rec.) and rusher (17.6 ypg) ... Baylor's pre-spring depth chart features 14 seniors, 20 juniors, 20 sophomores and 15 freshmen ... Baylor attracted a Floyd Casey Stadium record 259,559 fans to its seven home games in 2006, an average of 37,080 fans per game, which was a school-record for a seven-game home schedule and the 13th-best mark overall in the stadium's 56-year history ... The Baylor defense has forced 56 turnovers over the last two seasons (32 interceptions and 24 fumble recoveries) ... The Bears are 11-5 in four seasons under Morriss when scoring 24 or more points ... Baylor averaged 33.5 points in its four wins a year ago compared to 18.6 in its eight 2006 losses ... On the flip side, the Bears yielded 19.8 points in its 2006 victories and 39.0 in its setbacks ... Baylor's 2007 non-conference schedule includes first-time foe Buffalo (Sept. 22), as well as former SWC rivals TCU (Sept. 1) and Rice (Sept. 8) and Southland Conference entrant Texas State (Sept. 15).

Head Coach Guy Morriss

Baylor football is in its fifth season under the direction of head coach **Guy Morriss**, who has amassed a 15-31 record with the Bears and a 24-45 career mark in six seasons as a collegiate head coach.

Morriss' resume includes 19 years of experience as a coach at the high school, collegiate and professional levels. He spent 18 years in the National Football League, where he was an All-Pro performer, played in two Super Bowls and coached for three seasons.

A Colorado City, Texas, native and two-time All-Southwest Conference lineman at TCU, Morriss is certainly no stranger to the Lone Star's storied football landscape.

Introduced as Baylor's 24th head football coach on Dec. 11, 2002, Morriss inherited a proud program that had fallen on hard times and produced just 13 victories in the six seasons (1997-2002) prior to his arrival. He and his staff have already posted more overall victories (15) and Big 12 wins (seven) than the Bears registered in the six previous years (13 overall/three Big 12). In fact, Morriss has directed Baylor to seven of its 11 all-time Big 12 Conference victories and its only two league road wins in the league's 11-year history.

The 2006 season saw Baylor win a school-record three Big 12 Conference games and produce the first two-time Ray Guy Award winner ever in Daniel Sepulveda, a consensus 2006 All-American on the field and an *ESPN The Magazine* first-team All-America pick in the classroom for the second consecutive year. Sepulveda was Baylor's first unanimous consensus All-America pick since 1986.

Redshirt linebacker Joe Pawelek earned first-team freshman All-America honors and was named the 2006 Associated Press Big 12 Defensive Newcomer of the Year, the first Bear ever to win an individual Big 12 AP football award. All-told, seven of Baylor's eight 2006 losses were at the hands of bowl-eligible teams. In addition, nine Bears received AT&T All-Big 12 honors from the league's coaches.

In Morriss' first four seasons in Waco, 30 Bears have earned all-conference recognition from the league's coaches and his staff has produced four of the program's six first-team selections, its only (Willie Andrews and Sepulveda) two-time first-team performers and its lone four-time selection in Sepulveda.

In 2005, Morriss guided Baylor to its best overall record in a decade at 5-6 and just missed the school's first bowl invitation since 1994, losing two overtime heartbreakers. His third season in Waco also saw the Bears post multiple Big 12 Conference victories in the same year for the first time ever and end road losing streaks of 24 games overall (with a season-opening victory over SMU) and 37 games in Big 12 play (with its first-ever Big 12 road win at Iowa State).

A school-record 12 Bears earned 2005 SBC All-Big 12 Conference honors with outside safety Willie Andrews earning first-team honors for the second consecutive season. Wide receiver Dominique Zeigler and Sepulveda received second-team honors from the league coaches. Sepulveda also earned 2005 first-team Academic All-America and second-team Associated Press All-America honors, becoming just the third Bear, and first since 1963, to receive academic and athletic All-America status in the same football season.

Playing with the nation's second-youngest team in 2004, Morriss' second year patrolling the Floyd Casey Stadium sidelines saw Baylor post a 3-8 overall record and produce one of the greatest victories in school history, as the unranked Bears knocked off No. 16 Texas A&M, 35-34, in overtime at Waco. That upset win, Baylor's first over the Aggies since 1985, ended both the Bears' 13-game losing and 18-game winless strings to its longtime rival from College Station. The A&M victory also marked BU's first over a nationally ranked opponent since 1998 (and first over a rated league foe since 1995), which snapped a 22-game skid to ranked teams. For the second consecutive year, Baylor signal callers set a school single-season record for completion percentage (.595), despite the fact that three different Bears drew at least one start under center.

The 2004 campaign also saw Sepulveda earn the Ray Guy Award as the nation's top collegiate punter and become only the third individual in program history to win a season-ending national college football award, joining Mike Singletary (two-time Davey O'Brien winner) and Thomas Everett (Thorpe Award).

The 2005 NFL Draft saw the Kansas City Chiefs select DE Khari Long in the sixth round, the highest a Bear had been selected since 1999.

Known for his no-nonsense approach and aggressive recruiting, Morriss' Bears finished 3-9 in his rookie season. However, there were enough moments of youthful brilliance along the way to give Baylor's tradition-rich program hope for the future.

After dropping the first two games of the 2003 campaign, Baylor put together a three-game win streak highlighted by a 42-30 victory over two-time Big 12 North division champion Colorado in the Bears' league opener. The win string was BU's longest in some seven seasons and the Colorado triumph allowed Morriss to become just the third Baylor coach since 1950 (and only the sixth ever) to win his conference debut on the Bear sideline.

Morriss' first season also saw the Baylor defense limit then-No. 1 Oklahoma to a then-season-low 56 rushing yards (only national champion LSU held the Sooners to fewer yards on the ground) and register the sixth-highest one-season sack total (29) in school history and its best mark since 1994. The BU offense produced its first 1,000-yard rusher since 1995 in All-Big 12 running back Rashad Armstrong and its quarterbacks completed a then-school-record 56.7 percent of their passes, while the Bears' special team units recorded four scores.

Five Bears earned 2003 all-conference honors and three players participated in season-ending All-Star games, as did Morriss, who served as the head offensive coach for the Gray squad at the 2003 Blue-Gray All-Star Classic.

In addition to the program's improvement on the field, it also continues to make strides in the classroom. Since the fall of 2003, Morriss' Bears have averaged a 2.44 semester grade-point average with a high mark of 2.46 for the fall 2003 semester. An average of 39 football players since Morriss' arrival have been named to the Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll which honors student-athletes for achieving a 3.00 mark or better during each semester.

Off the field, BU players continued to give back to the community by making numerous appearances at local schools and participating in several service projects throughout the area. In 2005, quarterback Shawn Bell became the first Baylor football player named to the AFCA's Good Works Team.

Morriss arrived in Waco from Lexington, Ky., where he spent the previous six seasons helping resurrect the Kentucky football program, the last two as the Wildcats' head coach.

No. 22 TCU 17, BAYLOR 7

TCU scored 17 unanswered second-half points to erase a 7-0 half-time deficit and rally past Baylor in the season opener for both teams. It was the first football meeting between the two former Southwest Conference schools since 1995, the league's final season.

Marcus Jackson's 84-yard TD pass to Aaron Brown with 1:17 remaining in the third quarter gave TCU a 10-7 lead, its first of the game. The Frogs pushed their lead to 17-7 when Jackson connected with Quinton Cunigan from three yards out at the 9:32 mark in the fourth.

Jackson, who spelled senior starter Jeff Ballard at the start of the third quarter, finished 11-of-13 for 148 yards and two TDs. Ballard, who was 7-of-14 for 85 yards and one interception, did not play in the second half after taking a solid hit from Geoff Nelson late in the second quarter.

Baylor grabbed the momentum three plays into the second quarter when C.J. Wilson picked off Ballard's third-and-seven pass and returned it 46 yards to the TCU 20. Four plays later, the Bears grabbed the game's first lead when Shawn Bell hit Mikail Baker in the front right corner of the end zone for a 21-yard TD.

The Bears' next drive was thwarted when a third-and-five conversion to the TCU 12 was called back for holding. The next play resulted in an eight-yard loss, and Baylor was forced to punt.

That was a sign of things to come for the Bears, who twice in the third quarter committed turnovers inside the TCU 20.

TCU quelled Baylor's momentum on the opening kickoff of the second half as Donald Massey raced 69 yards down the right sideline to the Baylor 27. However, the Bears' defense forced the Frogs to settle for a Chris Manfredini 27-yard field goal.

Bell finished 31-of-47 for 286 yards with one touchdown and one interception. He established a Baylor record for completions in a regulation game, breaking a 40-year-old mark and one shy of his overall school record of 32 established in the 2004 double-overtime game against Texas A&M.

Terrance Parks led Baylor receivers with seven catches for 65 yards. Trent Shelton snagged five passes, tying Baylor's all-time record for consecutive games with at least one catch at 34.

NOTES

- Baylor held TCU scoreless in the first half, marking the first time a Bears' team held a Division I-A opponent scoreless through the first two quarters since doing so in a 20-7 victory Aug. 31, 2000, at North Texas.
- The loss marked the first time under head coach Guy Morriss that Baylor led at halftime and did not win. The Bears now are 6-1 in such games.
- The loss also marked just the second time under Morriss that Baylor held an opponent to less than 20 points and lost. The only other such loss was a 13-10 overtime loss at Texas A&M in 2005.
- RB Paul Mosley's third-quarter fumble was his first since the first half of Baylor's 2004 game against Iowa State, snapping a streak of 248 carries without a fumble.
- The attendance of 42,733 was the largest crowd for a season opener since 1973 (46,000 vs. Oklahoma). It was the third-largest crowd for a season opener in school history.
- The attendance also was the third-largest crowd for a non-conference game in school history and the largest since the 1973 Oklahoma game.

BAYLOR 47, NORTHWESTERN STATE 10

In a game marred by penalties, Shawn Bell established a career high with 288 yards passing and tied a school record with four TD passes in a 47-10 Baylor victory.

The game saw 31 total penalties, five shy of the NCAA record. Northwestern State was flagged 20 times, one shy of the NSU school record and three shy of the NCAA record. It was the most penalties ever incurred by a Baylor opponent.

Bell connected on 24-of-41 passes, including nine passes for 158 yards and one touchdown to Trent Shelton. It was the first 100-yard game for Shelton, who recorded his 35th consecutive game with at least one catch. That broke Reggie Newhouse's Baylor record, established over the 2000, 2001 and 2002 seasons.

Meanwhile, C.J. Wilson snagged a pair of first-quarter interceptions, the second of which he returned 52 yards for a TD. One play after Wilson's first pick, Bell connected with Shelton for a 46-yard scoring strike.

Baylor added a pair of Ryan Havens field goals in the second quarter to take a 20-0 halftime lead. Northwestern State scored 10 third-quarter points, but Bell answered with the first of two TD passes to Trey Payne.

The Bears salted the game away with three TD passes in the fourth quarter; the last was Thomas White's second TD catch of the game and Blake Szymanski's first career TD pass.

Bell connected with nine different receivers. Mario Price, who earned his first career start at tailback, caught five passes for 34 yards. Bell became the first Baylor quarterback to toss four TD passes in a non-overtime game since 1966 when Terry Southall accomplished the feat against Syracuse.

NOTES

- Baylor's defense held consecutive opponents scoreless in the first half for the first time since 1995 (Texas Tech and Houston).
- Wilson is the first Baylor player with a multiple-interception game since Samir Al-Amin had two against Southern Illinois in 2001.
- Wilson's interception return for a TD was Baylor's first since Colin Allred's 25-yard return against Oklahoma State last season. It was the first interception return for a TD by a Baylor defensive back since Al-Amin had two against Southern Illinois in 2001.
- WR Trent Shelton's 158 yards receiving were the most by a Baylor player since Reggie Newhouse had 173 yards against Kansas State in 2002.
- QB Shawn Bell was intercepted in consecutive games for the first time in his career.

Loren Langley's 17-yard field goal with nine seconds remaining capped a 14-play, 81-yard drive as Washington State defeated Baylor 17-15 at Seattle.

Baylor trailed 14-9 with less than six minutes to play when the Bears' defense silenced the crowd at Qwest Field. Nick Moore forced a fumble, which Anthony Arline picked up and returned 40 yards for a touchdown. That gave Baylor a 15-14 lead with 5:24 remaining in the game, but the Bears failed on a crucial two-point conversion attempt.

Washington State then converted on two third downs in the game-winning drive. Baylor kept the Cougars out of the end zone, denying WSU on three rushes from the 1. The Cougars fumbled on the first rush, but Washington State recovered.

That set the stage for Langley's game-winning field goal.

Baylor build a 9-0 lead through the first quarter. The Bears got a safety when Washington State's first drive of the game ended with an errant snap on a punt that went through the back of the end zone. It was Baylor's first 2-0 lead since 1980 at Texas Tech.

On the ensuing drive, Baylor marched 59 yards on seven plays for a touchdown. Shawn Bell capped the drive with a 12-yard TD pass to Justin Fenty. It was Fenty's first career reception, and it came on his third career play from scrimmage.

Washington State got on the board with 4:25 remaining in the second quarter when Gary Rogers connected with Jason Hill from 13 yards out. It was the first first-half score allowed by Baylor in the 2006 season.

The Cougars captured the lead on their second possession of the third quarter on a 10-play, 82-yard drive. WSU used a trick play to take the lead as Dwight Tardy connected with quarterback Alex Brink on a halfback pass from 4 yards out.

Bell finished the day with 256 yards on 31-of-48 passing; however, he was intercepted twice for the first time in five games and only the fourth time in his career.

Bell's favorite target was Brandon Whitaker, who established career highs with nine catches for 57 yards. Whitaker had the most receptions by a Baylor running back since 1987 and was one shy of the Baylor record.

NOTES

- Baylor did not allowed a first-quarter score for the fourth straight game.
- Baylor's first-quarter safety on Washington State's errant punt snap was the Bears' first safety since the 2003 season opener against UAB.
- Washington State's second-quarter TD was the first score Baylor has allowed in the first half this season.
- CB Anthony Arline's fourth-quarter fumble recovery returned for a TD was Baylor's 16th under head coach Guy Morriss.
- Baylor's rushing total (minus-10 yards) was its lowest since a school-record low minus-37 yards rushing against Kansas State in 2002.
- Bell has recorded at least 200 yards passing in five consecutive games, the longest such streak since Don Trull's school-record seven-game run during the 1963 season.
- Bell recorded his 10th career 200-yard passing game, joining Trull (12) and Cody Carlson (11) as the only Baylor quarterbacks with at least 10 career 200-yard passing games.

Tony Moore converted a crucial fourth down in overtime and later scored on a 4-yard run to give Army a 27-20 victory over Baylor.

Army had the ball first in the extra period, and facing fourth-and-1 from the 16 called timeout and decided to go for it. Moore appeared to bobble the handoff, but pulled it in and gained 2 yards. He then picked up another first down on a 10-yard screen play — the same play he scored on earlier in the game — right before scoring the winner.

Baylor failed to get a first down on its possession. The game ended on Shawn Bell's incomplete pass on fourth-and-6 from the 21.

Austin Miller kicked a 47-yard field goal with 7:29 left in regulation to put Army ahead 20-17.

Baylor responded by going 73 yards in 14 plays for Ryan Havens' tying 24-yard field goal with 45 seconds left. Bell, who finished 25-of-33 for 241 yards, completed all six of his passes on the drive.

Baylor took a 10-0 lead in the first quarter thanks to a Bell-to-Trent Shelton 7-yard TD pass and a 47-yard Havens field goal.

Army's first three possessions Saturday night ended at the Baylor 19. Miller missed his first two attempts before finally kicking a 36-yarder with 5:23 left in the first half.

The first miss was officially listed as a blocked kick, but Miller's 37-yarder got only a couple of feet off the ground and went into the back of an Army lineman. Miller was wide left on a 36-yard attempt early in the second quarter.

Jeremy Trimble returned a punt 59 yards for a touchdown to tie the game at 10-10 in the third quarter for the Black Knights.

Paul Mosley ran 2 yards for Baylor's first rushing touchdown of the season and a 17-10 lead late in the third quarter.

That 27-yard scoring drive was set up when Army quarterback David Peveto was blindsided on a blitz by safety Maurice Linguist and lost the ball. Vincent Rhodes recovered.

But Army quickly responded as Peveto threw a screen pass to Moore for a 21-yard score to re-tie the score at 17-17.

NOTES

- Bell recorded a TD pass in his sixth consecutive game, tying his career-long streak.
- Bell recorded his sixth consecutive game with at least 200 yards passing, one shy of Baylor's all-time record.

Baylor's defense held a Big 12 opponent out of the end zone for the first time ever and **Shawn Bell** recorded his 12th career 200-yard passing game as the Bears recorded Baylor's first ever win over Kansas State 17-3.

The Bears, who were out-scored 227-48 in the teams' first five meetings, became the first team to hold Kansas State without a touchdown since a 26-3 loss to Syracuse in the 2001 Insight.com Bowl.

Kansas State out-gained Baylor 341-312 on 10 more plays, but two key turnovers thwarted Wildcat scoring opportunities.

On its second possession of the game, Kansas State marched 74 yards in 10 plays to the Baylor 14 where the Wildcats faced a 3rd and 6. Clayton Thomas rushed to the Baylor 10; but **Anthony Arline** forced Thomas to fumble, and **Alton Widemon** pounced on the loose ball.

Widemon again recovered a fumble in the third. Josh Freeman connected with Yamon Figurs down the left sideline on a 2nd and 20 from Kansas State's 20. Figurs got past **James Todd**, who chased down Figurs and forced the fumble at the Baylor 12.

Those were K-State's only two ventures into the Baylor red zone.

Bell finished 25-of-46 for 282 yards and two TDs, tying **Don Trull**'s school record for career 200-yard games. The first scoring strike was a 75-yard toss to **Trent Shelton**, who snagged the pass near midfield and raced down the left sideline for the game's first score. It was the longest pass play of Bell's career and tied for the 20th-longest pass in Baylor history.

Kansas State got a 41-yard Jeff Snodgrass field goal late in the first half as Baylor held its sixth consecutive opponent without a first-quarter score for the first time since the 1990-91 seasons.

Baylor held Kansas State on three plays to open the second half, and **Queito Teasley** returned the ensuing punt 47 yards to the Wildcats' 33. The Bears followed with a seven-play drive that culminated in a Bell-to-Dominique Zeigler 11-yard TD pass.

The Bears added a 22-yard **Ryan Havens** field goal late in the third, capitalizing on the first of **Dwain Crawford**'s two interceptions on the night.

Zeigler finished with eight catches for 73 yards, while Shelton recorded his second 100-yard game of the season (3-107).

- Baylor did not allowed a first-quarter score for the sixth straight game.
- Baylor did not allow a TD in a Big 12 game for the first time ever.
- Baylor held its opponent without a TD for the first time since the 2001 season opener.

Joe Pawelek lept to snag **Bernard Jackson**'s pass at the goal line on third-and-seven, ending the game and giving Baylor a 34-31 victory in triple-overtime.

Baylor's game-winning points came off the foot of **Ryan Havens**, who booted a 22-yard field goal in the first possession of the third overtime. Colorado rushed twice for a total of four yards on the two plays prior to Pawelek's interception.

While Havens' field goal and Pawelek's interception were the deciding plays, the game's biggest play came on a fourth-and-seven at the Colorado 10 in the second overtime. That is when **Shawn Bell** found **Trent Shelton** in the front left corner of the end zone for a TD. Havens' extra point tied the game at 31-31 and sent it to a third extra period.

Pawelek's game-ending interception was Baylor's third pick of the day and the second in which Pawelek played a roll. Early in the second quarter, Pawelek blitzed and got a clean shot on Jackson. The ball popped out of Jackson's hand, and an alert **Corey Ford** jumped to pull it out of the air. That set up Baylor's first score of the day, a 47-yard Havens field goal.

That cut the Colorado lead to 7-3 as the Buffaloes took the game's first possession 80 yards in 11 plays, capped by **Mell Holliday**'s 32-yard scoring run.

Baylor gained its first lead just under the two-minute mark in the second quarter as Bell connected with **Trey Payne** from 17 yards out.

Colorado knotted the score at 10-10 on a **Mason Crosby** field goal late in the third, but Baylor recaptured the lead at the 9:24 mark in the fourth on **Paul Mosley**'s 28-yard TD run. The Buffaloes responded immediately, marching 80 yards in 12 plays to tie the game at 17-17; the drive culminated with a 9-yard **Byron Ellis** TD run with 4:13 remaining. That sent the game to overtime as neither team scored again in regulation.

Mosley, who also had a 1-yard TD run in the first overtime, finished with 85 yards rushing on 20 carries.

Bell was 31-of-44 for 272 yards and two TDs, breaking a Baylor record with his 13th career 200-yard game.

Pawelek led all players with 14 tackles, including 11 solo stops.

NOTES

- This was Baylor's second three-over-time contest. The Bears lost to Missouri 49-42 in 1996.
- This was Baylor's fourth overtime game in its last 14 contests, including its second multiple-overtime game in that stretch.
- Baylor surrendered a first-quarter score for the first time since the 2005 game at Missouri.
- Baylor's fourth-quarter TD was the Bears first fourth-quarter offensive TD against a Division I-A team since the 2005 game at Missouri.

Sixth-ranked Texas overcame a 10-0 first-quarter deficit and turned five Baylor turnovers into 35 points as the Longhorns defeated the Bears 63-31 in the third-highest scoring game in Baylor football history.

Baylor stunned the Royal-Texas Memorial Stadium crowd of 88,966 on its first offensive play. **Shawn Bell** executed a play-action fake perfectly and hit a streaking **Trent Shelton** down the middle of the field for a 67-yard TD pass.

The Bears held Texas to a three-and-out on the ensuing possession and then marched 51 yards in nine plays to the Texas 10. However, Baylor was forced to settle for a 27-yard **Ryan Havens** field goal.

The remainder of the first half belonged to Texas, though, as the Longhorns scored four second-quarter TDs to build a 28-10 lead.

Baylor answered on the opening drive of the second half, driving 80 yards in 10 plays. **Dominique Zeigler** capped the drive with an end-around pass back to Bell for a 17-yard TD. It was the first TD pass of Zeigler's career and the first TD reception of Bell's career.

After two Texas TD drives, Baylor pulled back to within 16 points at 42-24 when **Paul Mosley** split through the middle on a 56-yard TD run to end the third quarter.

Texas put the game away midway through the fourth, scoring three TDs in a 104-second span. The last two TDs came off Baylor turnovers, including the Horns' second defensive score of the game.

Baylor capped the scoring with 13 seconds remaining as Bell connected with **Jacoby Jones** from nine yards out.

Bell finished 25-of-47 for 303 yards, two TDs and one interception. It was the first 300-yard game of Bell's career and the first by a Baylor quarterback since **Aaron Karas'** 359-yard day against Kansas in 2002.

Shelton notched his third 100-yard game of the season, snagging six passes for 114 yards and a score. **Thomas White** established career highs with six receptions for 95 yards. **Shelton** and **White** were two of 11 different Baylor players to record at least one reception in the game.

Baylor was held to 27 yards rushing, 56 of which came on **Mosley's** TD run. Baylor lost 40 yards rushing on five sacks.

NOTES

- Bell became the 10th Baylor quarterback to record a 300-yard passing game. His 303-yard total tied for the 13th-largest single-game total in school history.
- Baylor was shut out in the second quarter for the fifth consecutive meeting with Texas. In those five games, the Longhorns have out-scored the Bears 110-0 in the second quarter.
- Bell's second TD pass was the 32nd of his career, tying **Cody Carlson's** school record.

BAYLOR 36, KANSAS 35

Shawn Bell's 10-yard TD pass to **Dominique Zeigler** with 68 seconds remaining capped the third-largest comeback in Baylor history as the Bears rallied from 18 points down in the fourth quarter for a 36-35 Homecoming victory.

The comeback tied Baylor's 1936 21-18 victory at Texas as the program's biggest fourth-quarter comeback as the Bears scored 19 points in the game's final 9:22 to stun the Jayhawks.

The game-winning TD pass was Bell's fifth of the day, breaking a Baylor single-game record which he already shared with three others. Bell also established Baylor single-season and career TD pass records during the game.

Baylor's chances to snap an eight-game Homecoming losing streak looked slim when **Anthony Webb** intercepted Bell with 12:40 remaining in the fourth. The Bears got the ball back at the 10:38 mark, but Bell missed on a first-down pass attempt.

From that point on, though, Bell was 13-of-17 for 222 yards and three TDs, the first of which was a 42-yard strike to **Trent Shelton** on third-and-12.

Baylor got the ball back at the 5:33 mark and quickly marched 84 yards on four plays, culminating in a 4-yard Bell-to-Mosley TD pass. The key play in the drive was a swing pass to Zeigler that resulted in a 60-yard gain to the Kansas 4. The Bears scored on the next play, but the two-point attempt failed leaving the deficit at 35-30.

After forcing Kansas into a three-and-out, the Bears regained possession with 2:43 remaining. Baylor's game-winning drive covered 58 yards in nine plays. The key play on the drive was Zeigler's diving catch falling out of bounds at the Kansas 10 on third-and-10. Baylor scored on the next play.

Dwain Crawford intercepted **Adam Barmann's** fourth-and-22 pass on the game's final play. It marked the second time in three weeks that Baylor ended a game with an interception.

Bell finished 33-of-55 for 394 yards, establishing Baylor records for completions and yards in a game. It marked the fifth time in Bell's career and second time this season that Baylor trailed or was tied in the fourth quarter and Bell led the Bears to victory.

Zeigler finished with seven catches for 122 yards, while **Shelton** snagged six receptions for 104 yards and two scores.

- Bell became the first Bear ever with consecutive 300-yard passing games.
- Baylor won three Big 12 games in a season for the first time ever, sweeping its three North division opponents.
- Baylor had two 100-yard receivers for the first time since 1998.
- WR **Trent Shelton** recorded a TD reception for the fifth consecutive game, the first player in school history to accomplish the feat.
- P **Daniel Sepulveda** established a Baylor record for career punts (254), passing **Ron Stowe's** previous mark.
- QB **Shawn Bell** established Baylor single-season (18) and career (37) marks for TD passes.
- Baylor scored 30-plus points in its third consecutive game for the first time since 1991. It was the first time ever against three straight conference opponents.

Mike Goodson rumbled 64 yards on a third-and-four with 2:15 remaining to seal 22nd-ranked Texas A&M's 31-21 victory over the Bears in front of a stadium-record crowd of 51,385.

The Bears suffered more than just the loss of the game as senior quarterback **Shawn Bell** sustained a career-ending knee injury during the fourth quarter.

Texas A&M snapped a 21-21 tie on Layne Neumann's 22-yard field goal with 6:32 remaining. Baylor managed one first down on its ensuing possession, but the Bears were forced to punt the ball away with 4:14 to play.

The Aggies picked up one first down and then essentially put the game away with Bennett's TD run.

Baylor had one final chance as **Dominique Zeigler** tried to connect with a wide open **Trent Shelton** on a flanker pass; however, the ball just tipped off Shelton's hands and landed incomplete. Bell's replacement, redshirt freshman **Blake Szymanski**, was intercepted four plays later to end Baylor's chances.

Bell finished the game 14-of-20 for 260 yards and one TD. He ended his career as the owner of 21 school records, including every major career and season passing record save career passing yardage, in which he finished second (329 yards shy of J.J. Joe's mark).

Zeigler caught five passes for 180 yards and a TD; he had 166 yards on four snags in the first half.

Texas A&M took the game's first lead on a 3-yard Martellus Bennett TD reception from Stephen McGee with 8:13 remaining in the first quarter; however, the Aggies missed the extra point.

Baylor answered 78 seconds later on a 79-yard Bell-to-Zeigler TD pass.

After a 2-yard Jorvorskie Lane TD run early in the second quarter, **Brandon Whitaker** found the end zone from 3 yards out at the 9:27 mark.

The Aggies recaptured the lead on the first half's final score with 7:12 remaining before the break. On third-and-five, McGee connected with Bennett, who bounced off a would-be tackler and raced 75 yards for a TD.

Baylor pulled even again at 21-21 on the first possession of the third quarter. **Paul Mosley** capped an 11-play, 80-yard drive with a 1-yard TD run at the 10:19 mark.

NOTES

- It was the fourth standing room only crowd (50,000-plus) in Floyd Casey Stadium history, all against Texas A&M.
- Baylor did not allow a third-quarter score for the second consecutive game and the third time on the season.
- WR **Trent Shelton** maintained his school-record 42-game streak with at least one reception thanks to a six-yard snag in the fourth quarter. However, he snapped his streak of five consecutive games with at least one TD reception.
- CB **Braelon Davis** blocked a 22-yard Texas A&M field goal early in the fourth quarter. It was Davis' second career blocked kick (punt vs. North Texas, 2004).

TEXAS TECH 55, BAYLOR 21

Texas Tech outscored Baylor 48-7 in the game's final 38 minutes, overcoming an early 14-7 deficit for a 55-21 victory over the Bears at Jones AT&T Stadium.

Graham Harrell torched the Baylor secondary for 483 yards and four TDs on 35-of-52 passing. Three of his TD strikes went to Joel Filani, who finished with 212 yards on eight receptions.

As a team, Texas Tech tallied 682 yards of total offense. Meanwhile, Baylor managed just 217 yards, its lowest single-game output in more than a year.

Tech marched 80 yards on 10 plays on the game's first possession; the Raiders capped the drive with a 20-yard Harrell-to-Edward Britton TD pass.

Baylor answered with 4:24 remaining in the first quarter. **Blake Szymanski**, who was making his first career start in place of the injured **Shawn Bell**, connected with **Trent Shelton** for a 56-yard TD strike.

A **James Todd** interception set up Baylor's next score as he picked off a Harrell pass at the Tech 28 and returned it to the Red Raiders' 3.

One play later, Szymanski dropped back to pass and then sprinted into the end zone off right tackle.

However, that was the only lead the Bears would enjoy as Tech scored the next five TDs to take a commanding 42-14 lead by midway through the third quarter.

Baylor finally snapped the Tech 35-0 run on another Szymanski 3-yard TD run late in the third quarter.

Szymanski finished the game 16-of-30 for 197 yards with one TD and one interception. He also had 25 yards rushing on 22 rushes, six of which were sacks.

Thomas White led the Bears in receiving with five snags for 46 yards.

Joe Pawelek led Baylor defensively with nine tackles, including one sack.

Keith Toston rushed for 92 yards and two touchdowns and Oklahoma State capitalized on six Baylor turnovers for a 66-24 win.

Bobby Reid hit tight end Brandon Pettigrew for two first-half touchdowns as the Cowboys built a 38-3 halftime lead on the strength of 28 second-quarter points.

Blake Szymanski passed for 262 yards and two touchdowns for the Bears, but he was intercepted three times and lost a fumble. The loss eliminated Baylor from bowl consideration.

The Cowboys took control early, scoring 49 unanswered points to take a 52-3 lead early in the third quarter. Five Oklahoma State touchdowns came after Baylor turnovers.

Oklahoma State led 38-3 at halftime. On the second play of the second half, defensive tackle Darnell Smith returned an interception 28 yards for a touchdown. Five plays later, free safety Donovan Woods returned Dominique Zeigler's fumble 57 yards for another touchdown for the Cowboys.

Reid started the rout, hitting Pettigrew over the middle on a 9-yard touchdown pass in the first quarter that put the Cowboys ahead 10-3. The play came after Oklahoma State's Paschal Smith recovered Trent Shelton's fumbled punt return.

Toston's touchdown runs of 27 and 8 yards put the Cowboys ahead 31-3 in the second quarter. After Martel Van Zant intercepted Szymanski at the Baylor 42, Reid again hit Pettigrew, this time for a 13-yard score.

Dantrell Savage rushed for 116 yards and a touchdown on 13 carries for the Cowboys — all in the first half. Reid finished 9-of-10 passing for 88 yards before being replaced by Zac Robinson in the second half.

Szymanski led Baylor on three second-half scoring drives, connecting for touchdowns with Trey Payne from 8 yards and David Gettis from 11 yards.

Paul Mosley finished with 62 yards on eight carries and a touchdown to lead the Baylor rushing attack.

- Baylor's six turnovers were the most by a Baylor team since the Bears committed six turnovers at UAB in the 2004 season opener.

No. 16 OKLAHOMA 36, BAYLOR 10

No. 16 Oklahoma scored 23 third-quarter points to pull away from Baylor en route to a 36-10 victory at Floyd Casey Stadium.

Reggie Smith returned one of his two interceptions 42 yards for a TD and set up another score with his other, and third-string tailback Chris Brown ran 24 times for 169 yards and a score.

Oklahoma overcame five turnovers, including fumbles by Smith and Brown that led to Baylor's only scores.

Malcolm Kelly fumbled at the end of a 57-yard gain while the sophomore was running down the sideline toward the end zone in the first quarter. That was one of three turnovers by the Sooners in the first half, when their only two touchdowns came only 69 seconds apart.

The next catch for Kelly was his 21-yard TD on the opening possession after halftime as Oklahoma scored 23 points in less than 10 minutes. Kelly finished with five catches for 115 yards, a week after he tied the school record with 11 catches.

After Alonzo Dotson sacked Blake Szymanski for a safety, Juaquin Iglesias returned the ensuing free kick 88 yards for a TD to make it 36-3 with 5:30 left in the third quarter.

Brown had a 35-yard run on the play before Kelly's touchdown, and had a 27-yard gain on the Sooners' first scoring drive.

Paul Thompson threw a 10-yard touchdown pass to Joe Jon Finley with 5:23 left in the first quarter, on the drive that Kelly had two third-down catches. After a 15-yard grab for one first down, Kelly was cutting across the middle on another third down when he reached back to make a one-handed grab of a pass thrown behind him.

Baylor then had only two plays before Smith's interception return made it 13-0.

Smith also set up Baylor's only offense score on the ensuing possession, when he botched a punt that was recovered by Braelon Davis at the Oklahoma 24. Ryan Havens kicked a 38-yard field goal.

Davis also recovered the fumble by Kelly, when he dropped the ball at the Baylor 10 trying to fend off another defender, and returned a fumble by Brown in the fourth quarter 56 yards for a touchdown.

Szymanski was 22-of-45 for 188 yards and the two interceptions. He was sacked five times.

NOTES

- Baylor surrendered a safety for the first time since the 2004 Texas game (blocked punt).
- CB Braelon Davis' fumble return for a touchdown was Baylor's 17th non-offensive score in 46 games under Morriss.
- Oklahoma held Baylor to 140 total yards, the fewest yards for Baylor since playing Oklahoma in 2004 when Baylor tallied 197 total yards.
- P Daniel Sepulveda extended his NCAA record for career punts of 50-plus yards; he finished his career with 94 punts of 50-plus yards.
