Briles' Bears Conclude Spring Practice

A new era in Baylor football was ushered in Nov. 28, 2007, when **Art Briles** was introduced as the Bears' 25th head coach. A native Texan who has spent his entire life in the Lone Star state, Briles came to Waco following a highly successful five-year tenure as head coach at the University of Houston where he guided the Cougars to four bowl games and a 34-28 record.

The Bears completed spring workouts April 5 with a controlled scrimmage and Briles was pleased with what his team accomplished during its 15 practices.

"Our spring went well," Briles said. "We had a lot of personnel to look at and a lot of schemes to get in on both sides of the ball. But our guys did a great job. They're a hungry football team, they're an eager football team and we're anxious to get them on the field in the fall. We think we had a real productive spring."

Baylor returns 48 lettermen, including 17 starters from last year's team which went 3-9 overall and 0-8 in the Big 12. All-told, the Bears return nine starters on offense, six on defense as well as their first-team place-kicker and punter.

"Like I've said from Day 1, the first thing we have to do is earn respect," Briles said. "When people talk about Baylor football, it needs to be in a respectful manner. Then we have got to be credible on the field. We've got to put our wares out there on the field, turn them loose, and it needs to be a productive system that's out there. So that's the stages that we're at and that's what we're working on."

Baylor opens its 2008 season Aug. 30 at home against 2007 Meineke Bowl champion Wake Forest.

2008 Baylor Spring Preview

Offensively, the Bears return nine starters from last year's unit which averaged 351.2 yards per game, Baylor's highest mark since 1995 (383.3 ypg). Baylor must replace running back **Brandon Whitaker**, who led the Bears in both rushing (40.7 ypg) and receiving (58-425), as well as offensive guard **Chad Smith**, a two-year starter along the o-line.

Most of the attention during spring practice was focused on the quarterback battle between senior **Kirby Freeman**, a transfer from Miami, Fla., who has one season of eligibility remaining, junior **Blake Szymanski**, a 10-game starter for the Bears a year ago, and true freshman **Robert Griffin**, who graduated from Copperas Cove [Texas] High School in December 2007 and went through spring ball with the Bears. The trio emerged from spring ball sharing the top line on the depth chart and figure to be pushed by incoming junior college transfer **Jeremy Sanders** during fall camp.

"They're all really good. We can win with them," Briles said of the quarterbacks. "I thought all the quarterbacks played really well. I'm proud of the way they led through the spring. All three of those guys are good players, really good players."

Baylor's offensive line, which allowed just 21 sacks last year (the program's fewest since 1995), returns four starters--fifth-year senior **Jason Smith** at right tackle, fifth-year senior **Dan Gay** at left tackle, as well as a pair of juniors who started every game a year ago in center **J.D. Walton** and right guard **James Barnard**. Jason Smith has more career starts (27) than any returning Baylor player on either side of the ball.

"The o-line's got to be a strength for us from an offensive standpoint, because however good they are up front is however good we're going to be offensively," Briles said. "Those guys (Jason Smith, J.D. Walton and Dan Gay) are going to be the heart and soul of our offense, because as they go, we go as an offense. We've got some guys that should be all-conference and maybe even All-Americans in some instances."

At running back, sophomore **Jay Finley** emerged from spring ball No. 1 on the depth chart with fifth-year senior **Jacoby Jones** and senior **Ray Sims**, a converted safety, sharing the No. 2 line. Finley and Jones averaged 17.2 ypg and 27.4 ypg, respectively a year ago, while Sims returns to a position he played in high school.

"I thought Jay (Finley) and Jacoby (Jones) ran extremely tough," Briles said. "And that's what we need. Jacoby was hurt early, so he just came on there at the end. But they both fought hard for yards, protected the ball. So that's a good sign. Ray (Sims) will be in the mix. Ray's a tough guy, too. He's got good feet. We'll be fine there."

The Bears also return eight of their top nine receivers from a year ago, including four of five players who caught at least 30 balls in 2007--**TE Justin Akers** (43-426), **TE Brad Taylor** (35-465), **IR Thomas White** (34-475) and **WR David Gettis** (31-407).

"We had a couple injuries with **Ernest (Smith)** and **Mikail (Baker)**, so those guys didn't get to finish the spring, which hurt them a little bit," Briles said. "They were learning how to play fast. And that's the thing we stressed was playing fast, playing fast. And they're getting that. I thought David Gettis improved tremendously through the spring. I thought he became more polished at the end of spring. And those other guys were productive."

After playing a 4-2-5 defense the past five years, Baylor has switched to a 4-3 look in 2008 with the arrival of new defensive coordinator **Brian Norwood** from Penn State. The Bears return six starters from a year ago, including their top two tacklers in junior **FS Jordan Lake** and junior **LB Joe Pawelek**, who had 120 and 99 tackles, respectively, a year ago.

"I thought their effort and attitude was outstanding," Briles said of the Bears' defenders. "We're still tinkering with a few positions and making sure we've got the right guys in the right spots. But that will take care of itself."

Three of Baylor's returning defensive starters are along the line in senior **DT Vincent Rhodes**, **NT Trey Bryant** and **DE Jason Lamb**, a trio who started every game in 2007. **DE Leon Freeman**, who led the 2007 Bears in tackles for loss with 9.5 stops behind the line, is the odds on favorite to start opposite Lamb.

"We need for all those guys up front to be men," Briles said. "They've just got to man up, because we don't have a lot of depth there. But if I was a player, I'd be happy, because it would mean I'd get to play a lot. So they've got to man up and play and they've got to prepare their bodies and get themselves ready for football-related war. But Jason (Lamb) had a great spring. Jason's a big body that has got quick twitch. Vincent Rhodes needs to be the most dominant d-lineman Baylor's had in the last decade. That's the way he needs to approach his season. Trey Bryant is a guy that could be a difference-maker for us. A big guy that's quick twitch."

Pawelek leads a young but talented linebacking corps that must replace two-year starter **Nick Moore**. Junior **Antonio Jones** and sophomores **Antonio Johnson**, a converted defensive end, **Chris Francis** and **Earl Patin**, a pair of All-Big 12 freshman selections a year ago, help make this one of the squad's deepest positions.

"I think they need to be a force defensively," Briles said of the Baylor linebackers. "I think we've got great depth. It should be the strength of our defense. We're two-deep. I think we've got six guys that can play."

Baylor lost its two starting cornerbacks a year ago, **Josh Bell** and **Alton Widemon**, to graduation. Fifth-year senior **Dwain Crawford** played rover a year ago and ranked No. 8 on the squad in tackles (48) despite missing three games due to injury, but he's moved to cornerback for his final Green & Gold campaign. Sophomore **Krys Buerck**, who made six starts at wide receiver a year ago, moved to corner prior to spring practice and came out No. 1 on the depth chart opposite Crawford.

Lake, a consensus second-team All-Big 12 pick in 2007 missed all of spring practice recovering from off-season shoul-

der surgery, which gave senior **Jake La Mar**, an honorable mention All-Big 12 selection a year ago at rover, an opportunity at safety and he shares the top line on the depth chart with Lake. Junior **Jeremy Williams**, who started four games a year ago at outside safety, is listed No. 1 opposite Lake and La Mar.

"In the secondary, our objective is to rate our top five guys and get them on the field," said Briles. "That's our objective, regardless of position. Safety, corner, nickel back, whatever. Strong safety, free safety. Who's the five best? Let's get them on the field. And that's what we're trying to get to. I think those guys had a good spring."

Sophomore **Derek Epperson**, who averaged 39.1 yards per punt as a true freshman en route to a spot on *The Sporting News'* Big 12 All-Freshman team, returns for his second year as Baylor's punter, while sophomore **Shea Brewster**, who split the Bears' place-kicking chores a year ago as a true freshman, is also back.

"I feel real good about the kicking game," Briles said. "I thought (Shea) Brewster had a great spring and (Derek) Epperson did a great job. And then our snapper, **Carter (Brunelle)**. Those guys performed at the level they have to perform at."

When fall camp opens in August, Briles expects to see a different looking football team.

"I think they'll be entirely different August 1 than they were April 1," he said. "I expect them to be stronger and carry their body weight better, so that they can add weight but good body weight. And then mentally and physically be a machine. They've got to make their body a machine and let their mind control it."

Coaching Staff Features New Faces

Eight of Baylor's nine assistant coaches are new to the program, as linebackers coach **Larry Hoefer** is the lone returnee from the previous staff.

While head coach Art Briles calls his own plays, his offensive staff includes co-coordinators **Randy Clements (line)** and **Philip Montgomery (quarterbacks/running backs)**, both of whom served on Briles' staff at Houston. **Dino Babers** coaches the outside receivers and serves as recruiting coordinator, while **Kendal Briles** directs the inside receivers.

Defensive coordinator **Brian Norwood**, who joined the Baylor staff after spending the past seven years working as an assistant on Hall of Fame coach Joe Paterno's Penn State staff, will lead a staff that includes **Chris Achuff (tackles)**, **Kim McCloud (cornerbacks)**, **Theo Young (ends)** and Hoefer.

Trading Places

Notable position changes that took place during spring ball included the movement of senior **John David Weed** (from quarterback to inside receiver), junior **Mikail Baker** (from wide receiver to inside receiver), sophomore **Krys Buerck** (from wide receiver to cornerback), sophomore **Antonio Johnson** (from defensive end to linebacker), sophomore **V.J. McElroy** (from cornerback to inside receiver), junior **Sam Sledge** (from offensive line to defensive line), redshirt freshman **Matt Singletary** (from defensive end to inside receiver), senior **Ray Sims** (from outside safety to running back), senior **Dwain Crawford** (from rover to cornerback) and redshirt freshman **Elliot Coffey** (from safety to linebacker). Nine of those 10 are listed either first or second on the post-spring depth chart with five players--Weed, Baker, Buerck, Johnson and Crawford--listed No. 1 at their new positions.

Another Tough Schedule On Tap For 2008 Bears

After playing eight of 12 games a year ago against teams that went on to earn bowl invitations, Baylor will face eight bowl teams in 2008, including six of its eight Big 12 opponents. Over the last five seasons, 32 of the Bears' 40 Big 12 Conference games have been against teams that ended their season in a bowl game.

Baylor's 12 2008 opponents combined for a 91-69 (.569) record a year ago and eight received bowl bids--Wake Forest (Meinike champion), UConn (Meinike), Oklahoma (Fiesta), Oklahoma State (Insight champion), Missouri (Cotton champion), Texas (Holiday champion), Texas A&M (Alamo) and Texas Tech (Gator champion). Baylor's eight 2008 Big 12 foes went 64-40 (.615) a year ago and recorded four of the league's five bowl wins.

The Bears open the Art Briles-era with three consecutive home games as Wake Forest (Aug. 30), Northwestern State (Sept. 6) and Washington State (Sept. 13) visit Floyd Casey Stadium before Baylor completes non-conference play with a Sept. 19 game at UConn that will be televised nationally on ESPN2. All-told, Baylor will play seven home games at Floyd Casey Stadium, as it opens Big 12 play with home contests against Oklahoma (Oct. 4) and Iowa State (Oct. 11), followed by home tilts against Missouri (Nov. 1) and Texas A&M (Nov. 15). The Bears' league road games are at Oklahoma State (Oct. 18), Nebraska (Oct. 25), Texas (Nov. 8) and Texas Tech (Nov. 29).

Baylor plays three consecutive home games to open a season for the first time since 1992 and enjoys a seven-game home slate for just the sixth time since Floyd Casey Stadium opened its gates in 1950.

Maximum Protection

Baylor returns four starters from an offensive line which yielded just 21 sacks a year ago (on a school-record 561 pass attempts), the program's fewest since 1995. Three times last year the o-line did not allow a sack in a game and it went consecutive games (at Texas A&M, Colorado) without allowing a sack for the first time since a three-game run late in the 1995 campaign (at Miami, at SMU, Rice).

From 1998 through 2006, Baylor quarterbacks were sacked 328 times in 113 games (2.9 per game), allowing at least 25 sacks each season and a high of 52 sacks in a 12-game 2002 schedule. In 2007, the Bears allowed only 1.8 sacks per game. More impressively, the Bears' quarterbacks were sacked once every 11.3 pass attempts from 1998 through 2006; but in 2007, they were sacked once every 26.7 pass attempts.

A pair of fifth-year senior tackles who began their Baylor careers at different positions, **Jason Smith** and **Dan Gay**, anchor the Bears' line on the left and right side, respectively. Junior center **J.D. Walton** and junior right guard **James Barnard** also return after both started every game a year ago. Gay, Walton and Barnard all started every game along the line a year ago for the Bears, while Smith drew seven starts despite battling a knee injury and has more career starts (27) than any active Baylor player on either side of the ball.

Let's Go To The Lake

Junior free safety **Jordan Lake**, a consensus second-team All-Big 12 performer as a sophomore in 2007, missed all of spring practice while recovering from off-season shoulder surgery, but he's expected to be full-speed when fall camp opens in August and should contend for All-America honors in his final two seasons at Baylor. Lake registered six double-digit tackle games a year ago and finished the season with 120 total tackles, the most by a Baylor player since Maurice Lane's 129 tackles in 2003.

He ranked third in the Big 12 (No. 1 among defensive backs) and No. 30 nationally with 10.0 tackles per game a year ago. Lake had a hand in six of the 19 turnovers the Baylor defense created a year ago, as he picked off a pair of passes, recovered two fumbles and forced a pair of fumbles in 12 starts.

Pawelek Looks To Build On Outstanding Underclass Years

After establishing himself as one of the Big 12's top linebackers as a freshman and sophomore, junior **Joe Pawelek** is also a Baylor All-America candidate both in the classroom and on the field. Pawelek earned second-team All-Big 12 honors from several media outlets as a sophomore when he ranked second on the team in tackles with 99 stops. Pawelek also added 8.0 tackles behind the line to rank second on the squad.

With 22 career starts to his credit, Pawelek has the most starts of any returning Baylor defender and the second-most (along with Dan Gay) among any BU returnee. In just two seasons, he's totaled 185 tackles in 24 games and needs just 132 stops to crack the Bears' all-time top 10; 33 assisted stops to reach Baylor's top 10 in that category, too.

Baylor Notepad

Junior QB **Blake Szymanski** established Baylor single-season records for touchdown passes (22), pass attempts (461), completions (264), passing yards (2,844), total-offense attempts (522), total-offense yards (2,942) and touchdowns responsible for (23) in 11 games (10 starts) a year ago ... Baylor had five receivers register at least 30 receptions in the same season for the first time ever and four of those players return in 2008 ... Sixteen different Bears tallied at least one reception a year ago ... Senior IR **Thomas White** led Baylor in scoring with 48 points a year ago, the first time a non-kicker led the Bears in that category since 2002 and the first time a receiver led the club since 2001 ... Baylor averaged 36.7 points in its three wins a year ago and just 12.0 points in its nine setbacks ... On the flip side, the Bears yielded just 21.7 points in their three wins and 42.1 in their setbacks ... Baylor has won 14 of its last 19 games when scoring 24 or more points ... Baylor averaged 351.2 total-offense yards per game a year ago, its highest mark since 1995, and established school season records for passing yards (3,281), completions (309), attempts (561), while ranking No. 2 in both touchdown passes (23) and passing yards per game (273.4) ... Baylor returns six of its top 10 tacklers from a year ago, including three of its top five in junior FS **Jordan Lake** (No. 1, 120), junior LB **Joe Pawelek** (No. 2, 99) and senior FS **Jake La Mar** (No. 5, 67).

Head Coach Art Briles

Art Briles, a native West Texan who resurrected the University of Houston's football program during his five seasons along the Cougars' sideline, was introduced as Baylor University's 25th head football coach Nov. 28, 2007.

"My charge to Director of Athletics Ian McCaw was to locate a championship caliber head football coach who embraced Baylor's Christian mission, and could lead, inspire and win with integrity," said Baylor President Dr. John M. Lilley. "Ian has done an outstanding job and brings forward in Art Briles a person who can begin a new era for Baylor University football."

Briles, who inherited a Houston program that was just two years removed from an 0-11 season and won just eight games from 2000 to 2003, posted a 34-28 record with the Cougars and guided them to four bowl games. He ranks as the program's third-winningest head coach behind College Football Hall of Famer Bill Yeoman (160 wins in 26 seasons from 1962-86) and Clyde Lee (37 victories in seven seasons from 1948-54).

"Art Briles embodies all of the qualities that we seek in our head football coach," said McCaw. "He is a Godly man who believes in the institution's Christian mission and demonstrates great personal character, integrity and commitment to education."

"Coach Briles is regarded as one of the top head coaches and offensive minds in college football as evidenced by Houston's record-setting offense," he added. "He is a relentless recruiter who may have as strong a set of recruiting contacts in the State of Texas as any coach in the country. Finally, he is a genuine and engaging person who will relate well to the Baylor family and generate enthusiasm around our football program."

Briles guided Houston to an 8-4 regular-season record in his final season along the Cougar sideline and a Texas Bowl invitation (he did not coach the Cougars in the bowl game). Coupled with their 10-win 2006 campaign, the Cougars registered consecutive seasons of at least eight victories for the first time since the 1989 (9) and 1990 (10) campaigns. The 2007 Cougars ranked fourth nationally in total offense (501.9 ypg) and made college football history by becoming the first program to produce a 300-yard receiver and a 200-yard rusher in the same game. Houston wide receiver Donnie Avery was taken in the second round of the 2008 NFL Draft marking the second straight year a Cougar was tabbed early in the draft.

In 2006, Briles earned Conference USA and Sportex Division I-A National Coach of the Year honors after guiding the Cougars to a Conference USA title, a Liberty Bowl appearance and the program's first 10-win season since 1990 with a final mark of 10-4.

The Cougars enjoyed the nation's seventh-best turnaround in 2006, a four-game improvement in the win column over their 6-6 mark in 2005. Houston's 2006 C-USA title, just five years removed from a winless 2001 campaign, marked only the fifth time in the past 30 seasons that a I-A program went from winless to conference champions.

One of nine finalists for the 2006 Eddie Robinson National Coach of the Year award, Briles' offense led Conference USA and ranked sixth nationally at 439.9 yards per game. Cougar quarterback Kevin Kolb was Conference USA's consensus 2006 Offensive Player of the Year, as 13 Houston student-athletes earned postseason honors from the media and 12 were honored by the league's coaches. Kolb finished his career ranked third on the NCAA's all-time total-offense chart and fourth in passing passing yards.

Briles' 2005 Cougar team finished 6-6 overall, led Conference USA in total offense and played in the Fort Worth Bowl, while his 2004 squad was 3-8.

His rookie season at UH saw the Cougars make school history; as they finished 7-6 and earned a berth in the 2003 Sheraton Hawai'i Bowl. He became just the second UH head coach to take Houston to a bowl game in his first season at the helm, joining Yeoman, his college coach. Briles' innovative offense produced a 1,000-yard rusher (Anthony Evans), a 1,000-yard receiver (Brandon Middleton) and a 3,000-yard passer (Kolb)—one of only five Division I-A teams to post such outstanding performers.

Briles returned to Houston as head coach from Texas Tech University, where he spent three years (2000-02) as the Red Raiders' running backs coach. The Tech ground game flourished under Briles' direction, increasing its production every year and producing a 2001 first-team All-Big 12 performer in Ricky Williams. The Red Raiders won seven or more games each year Briles was on Mike Leach's staff and went bowling every year.

Prior to moving into the collegiate coaching ranks at Texas Tech, Briles spent 12 seasons (1988-99) as head coach and athletic director at Stephenville [Texas] High School. His Yellowjacket teams won four state championships, capturing back-to-back crowns in 1993 and 1994 and repeating that feat in 1998 and 1999. In 1998, Stephenville posted a then-national record 8,650 total-offense yards and still holds the third and fourth positions on the all-time national lists. In a remarkable six-year run, his Yellowjacket teams went 90-2-1.

Briles, a former Texas High School Coaches Association president, has spent his entire coaching career in the state of Texas. Following in his father's footsteps, Briles began his coaching career as an assistant at Sundown [Texas] High School in 1979 before moving to Sweetwater [Texas] High School as an assistant from 1980-83. He landed his first head coaching job at Hamlin [Texas] High School (1984-86), where he also served as athletic director.

From Hamlin, Briles went to Georgetown [Texas] High School as head coach and athletic director for two seasons (1986-87) before moving to Stephenville in 1988. While coaching in the high school ranks, Briles developed six Division I quarterbacks and had five signal callers throw for over 3,000 yards in a season.

A former wide receiver at the University of Houston from 1974 to 1977, Briles was a member of the 1976 Cougar squad that captured the Southwest Conference championship in UH's first season in the league. He later played in the 1977 Cotton Bowl against fifth-ranked Maryland, a game the Cougars won 30-21. Briles received a Bachelor of Arts degree from Texas Tech in 1979 and a Masters of Education degree from Abilene Christian in 1984.

A recent inductee into the Big Country Athletic Hall of Fame for his West Texas exploits, Briles and his wife, Jan, have three children: Jancy, a graduate of the University of Houston who now works in the Dallas Cowboys Public Relations office; Kendal, a former Cougar quarterback and wide receiver (2004-05) and University of Houston graduate who serves as an assistant coach on his father's Baylor staff; and Staley, a senior at UH.

Briles will be inducted into the Texas High School Hall of Fame in May 2008.

No. 22 TCU 27, BAYLOR 0

Baylor sustained its first shutout in two seasons and its first in a season opener in nearly two decades as the Bears dropped a 27-0 decision at 22nd-ranked TCU. It marked the second consecutive year in which Baylor lost to a ranked TCU team to open the season.

The Bears were last shutout in a season opener Sept. 1, 1990, a 13-0 loss at seventh-ranked Nebraska. Coincidentally, that was the only other time Baylor has ever played a game on Sept. 1.

Baylor had chances to put points on the board, but a fumble and two special teams miscues helped TCU preserve the shutout. A third special teams misplay setup the Frogs' second touchdown of the day.

After TCU missed a 29-yard field goal attempt on the game's first possession, Baylor faced third-and-10 at the TCU 32. **Blake Szymanski** found **Justin Akers** alone in the center of the field for a 24-yard pass. However, Akers, who appeared to have an unobstructed path to the end zone, fumbled the ball at the TCU 15. While Akers was able to recover the loose ball at the TCU 7, the fumble thwarted what proved to be Baylor's best chance at finding the end zone. Four plays later, **Shea Brewster** missed a 20-yard field goal on his first career attempt and the Bears came away empty after a 14-play, 77-yard drive.

TCU drove to the Baylor 1 on its ensuing possession; however, **Joe Pawelek** forced a fumble on second-and-goal, and **Brandon Stiggers** recovered for the Bears.

Neither team got on the board in the first quarter, but TCU's Justin Watts found the end zone from one yard out on the second quarter's second play.

TCU got a 64-yard Brian Bonner punt return to the Baylor 12 just inside the five-minute mark in the second. Ryan Christian scored around left end on the next play to give the Frogs a 14-0 lead at the half.

Baylor's defense, which held TCU to only 83 yards of offense in the second and third quarters, did not allow a first down in any of the Frogs' first three possessions of the third. However, the Bears' offense could not capitalize. Baylor reached the TCU 16 on its third possession of the quarter, but Brewster's 35-yard field goal attempt came up short.

TCU added a 27-yard Chris Manfredini field goal and a 14-yard Andy Dalton-to-Ervin Dickerson TD pass in the first three minutes of the fourth quarter to put the game away. Manfredini added a 34-yard field goal with 4:50 to play.

Szymanski finished 23-of-47 for 216 yards but was intercepted three times. Baylor recorded 55 passes on the day, one shy of the school record.

Justin Fenty was Szymanski's favorite receiver, catching five passes for 35 yards.

Josh Bell led the Bears defensively with nine tackles and two passes broken up. **Jordan Lake** added eight solo tackles, and **Jason Lamb** had seven tackles and a sack.

NOTES

- The Baylor-TCU series is now tied 49-49-7. This is the most-played series in Baylor football history.
- Baylor has forced at least one turnover in 21 of its last 24 games.
- It was Baylor's first shutout since a 62-0 loss to second-ranked and eventual national champion Texas in 2005. It was Baylor's first shutout on the road since a 41-0 loss at fourth-ranked Texas in 2002.
- It was the first shutout in the Baylor-TCU series since a 24-0 Frogs' victory at Floyd Casey Stadium in 1987.
- Seven Bears made the first starts of their respective careers: OG **James Barnard**, CB **Josh Bell**, DT **Trey Bryant**, OT **Jordan Hearvey**, FS **Jordan Lake**, C **J.D. Walton** and SS **Jeremy Williams**.

Blake Szymanski established several school records, including 412 yards and six touchdowns passing, as Baylor defeated Rice 42-17. It was the first meeting between Baylor and Rice since 1995, the final season of the Southwest Conference.

Szymanski torched the Owls for 280 yards and four touchdowns in the first half as the Bears built a 28-7 halftime lead. It marked the first time in school that a Baylor quarterback tossed four touchdowns in a half. Szymanski had three first-quarter scoring strikes as Baylor recorded three touchdown passes in the first quarter for the first time in school history.

Baylor took the game's opening kickoff and drove 75 yards on nine plays for a touchdown. On third-and-10, Szymanski found **Justin Akers** from 16 yards out. Szymanski and Akers connected again on a 9-yard touchdown pass as the Bears marched 77 yards on 11 plays on their next possession. After Chase Clement put Rice on the board with an 11-yard touchdown run on the Owls' ensuing drive, Szymanski found Brad Taylor for a 24-yard scoring pass with 4:36 remaining in the first quarter.

Rice missed a field goal on its first drive of the second quarter, and the Bears answered with another touchdown drive. This time, Szymanski went to **Brandon Whitaker** from four yards out with 11:00 remaining in the half.

James Casey cut the Baylor lead in half with a 3-yard touchdown run midway through the third quarter, but Baylor quickly answered. Szymanski connected with **Thomas White** for a 20-yard touchdown pass at the 4:07 mark in the third and then found **Ernest Smith** on a 19-yard fade route with 1:12 remaining in the third.

Rice concluded the game's scoring with 2:40 left to play as Clark Fangmeier hit a 44-yard field goal.

Szymanski finished 29-of-46 passing and also rushed for 10 yards on three carries. He was one yard shy of **Tom Muecke's** school record for total yards in game, collecting 422 yards. Szymanski connected with 12 different receivers, led by Whitaker's six receptions. Eight different players had at least two receptions; Taylor led the Bears with 74 yards receiving.

The Bears tallied 521 yards of total offense, the most by a Baylor team since gaining 546 yards against Samford in 2002.

Defensively, the Bears were led by **Jake La Mar's** eight tackles, including two behind the line and one sack. Baylor had four sacks on the night as **Jason Lamb**, **Joe Pawelek** and **Vincent Rhodes** joined La Mar in that category. The Bears finished with 10 tackles for loss. **Alton Widemon** also had an interception.

Blake Szymanski became the second quarterback in school history to record consecutive 300-yard passing games and tossed five touchdown passes as Baylor defeated Texas State 34-27 at Floyd Casey Stadium.

One week after establishing Baylor single-game records with 412 yards and six touchdowns passing against Rice, Szymanski was 31-of-51 for 411 yards and five touchdowns with two interceptions against Texas State. He also torched the Bobcats for 205 yards in the first quarter and 246 yards in the first half; his first-half yardage total was the fifth-best single-half and third-best first-half tally in school history.

Szymanski also joined **Shawn Bell** as the only Baylor quarterbacks to complete 30-plus passes in a single game; Bell accomplished the feat five times, while Szymanski's 31 completions against Texas State tied for the third-best total in school history.

Baylor jumped out to a 14-0 lead thanks to first-quarter touchdown passes from Szymanski to **Keegan Vann** and **Jacoby Jones** of 14 yards and 10 yards, respectively. Texas State got on the board with 10:09 remaining in the second quarter when Bradley George connected with Cameron Luke on a 16-yard scoring pass. The Bears answered with Szymanski's third first-half touchdown pass, this one going to **Krys Buerck** from 11 yards out at the 5:14 mark.

However, Texas State refused to go quietly. Alvin Canady scored on a 1-yard run with 47 seconds remaining, and the Bobcats held Baylor scoreless in the third quarter. Former Bear Andrew Ireland pulled Texas State within four points with a 26-yard field goal at the 2:22 mark of the third.

Baylor did not allow Texas State to get any closer, though, out-scoring the Bobcats 13-10 in the fourth.

Szymanski connected with **Jay Finley** (24 yards) and **Brad Taylor** (23 yards) for scoring strikes, the last of which came with 2:34 remaining in the game. Again, Texas State battled back, getting a 36-yard Ireland field goal with 5:35 remaining and a 26-yard George-to-Core Hickerson touchdown pass with 1:10 remaining. The Bobcats attempted an onside kick, but Baylor recovered and ran out the clock.

Justin Akers led all Baylor receivers with seven catches for 95 yards, both career highs. Buerck had six receptions for 76 yards, and Taylor added five catches for 85 yards to give the Bears a trio of receivers with at least 75 yards each.

Baylor was led defensively by **Dwain Crawford** and **Jordan Lake** with 11 and 10 tackles, respectively. The Bears finished with two sacks, 10 tackles for loss and 16 quarterback hurries.

BAYLOR 34, BUFFALO 21

UB Stadium • Buffalo, N.Y.

Baylor scored 17 unanswered third-quarter points en route to a 34-21 victory at Buffalo in the Bears' final non-Big 12 game of the season. The victory gave Baylor its first three-game winning streak since the 2005 season and its third three-game run in head coach **Guy Morriss'** tenure.

Blake Szymanski accounted for four touchdowns, throwing three and rushing for another. He became the first player in school history to account for four-plus touchdowns in three consecutive games. Szymanski saw his streak of four consecutive 200-yard passing games end, but he still tallied 263 yards of total offense with 172 yards passing and 91 yards rushing. His rushing total was the best by a Baylor quarterback since **Odell James** had 92 yards rushing against Kansas State in 1998. Szymanski also became the first Baylor quarterback to lead the team in rushing since **Aaron Karas** accomplished the feat against Southern Illinois in the 2001 season finale.

Baylor rushed for 229 yards on the night; **Jay Finley** had a career-high 80 yards on 15 carries, and **Brandon Whitaker** added 57 yards on 11 totes. It was Baylor's best rushing total since a 280-yard performance against Samford in 2002. The Bears eclipsed 100 yards rushing for only the second time since the start of the 2006 season (110 at Colorado, 2006) and topped the 200-yard plateau for the first time since the 2005 season opener (215 at SMU).

The Bears built a 10-0 lead thanks to **Shea Brewster's** 43-yard, first-quarter field goal and Szymanski's 4-yard touchdown pass to **Justin Akers** with 11:49 remaining in the second quarter. Buffalo got on the board with 3:13 remaining before halftime on James Starks' 1-yard run.

Baylor owned the third-quarter, though, out-gaining the Bulls 160-45 in the period and earning 10 first downs to Buffalo's one. The Bears marched 85 yards on 11 plays to open the quarter, a drive that was capped by a 9-yard Szymanski-to-**Krys Buerck** touchdown pass. Szymanski found Whitaker from two yards out with 2:30 remaining in the quarter, and Brewster's 39-yard field goal with 31 seconds remaining in the period gave Baylor a 27-7 edge.

Buffalo added two fourth-quarter touchdowns, but Szymanski's 39-yard scoring scamper with 3:09 remaining took the wind out of the Bulls' sails.

Jordan Lake produced four turnovers on the night for the Baylor defense, intercepting two passes and forcing two fumbles; Lake also recovered one of the two fumbles he forced.

Szymanski finished 21-of-45 passing, going 13-of-20 in the second half.

Akers led all receivers with seven snags for 74 yards.

TEXAS A&M 34, BAYLOR 10

Baylor was held to seven first downs and out-gained 552-254 as Texas A&M posted a 34-10 victory over the Bears in the Big 12 opener for both teams.

Texas A&M ran 94 offensive plays, the most against a Baylor team since Oklahoma ran 95 plays in a two-overtime game in 2005 and tied for the fourth-most ever run against the Bears. The Aggies used 65 of those plays on the ground, racking up 352 yards rushing.

Despite being dominated offensively most of the game, Baylor remained within striking distance until midway through the fourth quarter.

With the Bears trailing 20-3, **Blake Szymanski** connected with **David Gettis** on a 69-yard post route that gave Baylor a first-and-goal at the Aggies' 3. **Jay Finley** plowed his way into the end zone on the next play, pulling the Bears to within 10 points with 13:44 remaining in the game.

Baylor's defense forced Texas A&M into a three-and-out on the Aggies' ensuing possession; however, the Bears were unable to get any closer, managing just 66 yards on 12 plays over the remainder of the game.

Texas A&M pulled away down the stretch, getting touchdown runs of two yards and five yards from Stephen McGee (5:39) and Jerrod Johnson (1:42), respectively.

Matt Szymanski put Texas A&M on the board first, connecting on a 28-yard field goal with 4:14 to play in the first quarter. Baylor answered with a 46-yard **Caleb Allen** field goal on the opening period's final play.

The Aggies regained the lead with 2:08 remaining before halftime when McGee connected with Mike Goodson on a 58-yard touchdown pass.

Javorski Lane pushed the Aggies' lead to 17-3 with a 1-yard touchdown run at the 10:45 mark in the third, and Matt Szymanski, who also missed three field goals on the day, added a 23-yard field goal with 7:36 remaining in the third.

Blake Szymanski finished the game 12-of-35 for 194 yards and an interception for the Bears; he connected with eight different receivers, but no Bear had more than two catches on the day.

McGee was 16-of-28 for 200 yards with one interception for the Aggies; he also rushed 17 times for 110 yards. Lane finished with 123 yards on 24 carries.

Jordan Lake tallied 18 tackles on the day, including 11 solo stops and one stop behind the line. **Brandon Stiggers** (13) and **Joe Pawelek** (12) gave the Bears three players with at least 10 tackles. Showing the disparity in the time of possession and total offensive plays (Baylor ran just 52 plays in 16:42), the Bears top eight tacklers had more stops than any Aggie defender.

Blake Szymanski's third 400-yard passing effort of the season was not enough to lead Baylor to victory as the Bears fell to Colorado 43-23 at Floyd Casey Stadium.

Baylor out-gained Colorado 465-450, but much of the Bears' offense came in the second half when the game was nearly out of reach. Szymanski finished 36-of-60 for 410 yards and a touchdown with two interceptions, establishing Baylor single-game records for completions and attempts.

Colorado became only the second team in 29 games to score a touchdown against Baylor's defense on its first drive of the game, marching 82 yards on seven plays. The drive was keyed by a 27-yard pass on third-and-seven that followed a Colorado delay of game and a timeout on the game's third play from scrimmage. Cody Hawkins' 26-yard touchdown pass to Dusty Sprague capped the drive.

The Buffaloes got a 41-yard Kevin Eberhart field goal late in the first. Colorado pushed its lead to 17-0 with 11:43 remaining in the second quarter when Hawkins connected with Demetrius Sumler from seven yards out.

Baylor finally got on the board with at the 7:29 mark of the second on **Shea Brewster's** 26-yard field goal. After a Sumler 3-yard touchdown run pushed Colorado's lead to 24-3, **Brandon Whitaker** found the end zone on a 2-yard run with 4:04 remaining before the half but the Bears missed the extra point. Two late Eberhart field goals pushed the Buffs' lead to 30-9, including a 54-yarder at the gun.

Colorado got a 42-yard Eberhart field goal early in the third and another Sumler 2-yard touchdown run with 6:08 remaining in the period to build a commanding 40-9 lead.

Szymanski connected with **Justin Akers** for an 18-yard touchdown pass late in the third, and **Jay Finley** added a 4-yard touchdown run with 5:04 remaining in the game. Eberhart's fifth field goal of the night — a 30-yarder — was sandwiched between the two Baylor scores.

Whitaker finished the night with 11 receptions for 166 yards, both career highs and both single-game Baylor records for a non-receiver. His receptions total tied for the fifth-best single-game total in school history and was one shy of the overall Baylor record, while his yardage total tied for the eighth-best performance all-time at Baylor.

David Gettis added eight catches for 99 yards, both career highs. Gettis, who also had 126 yards on seven kickoff returns, turned in the best single-game all-purpose yardage total since **Jerod Douglas's** school-record, 257-yard performance at Oklahoma in 1997.

Baylor's offensive line did not allow a sack for the second consecutive game.

- Colorado's 54-yard field goal to end the first half was the longest against Baylor since SMU's John Stewart made a 55-yarder in 1993 and was the first 50-plus-yard field goal against Baylor since Texas' Kris Stockton made a 50-yarder in 1999.

Baylor committed five turnovers and managed only 10 first downs as the Bears dropped a 58-10 decision at No. 20 Kansas. It was the Bears' seventh consecutive Big 12 loss.

Kansas scored 24 points off Baylor's five turnovers. The Jayhawks also capitalized on several Baylor special teams' mistakes.

Baylor held Kansas to one first down total on the Jayhawks' first two possessions, forcing punts both times. However, **Joe Bennett** muffed the second punt and Kansas recovered at the Bears' 36. Seven plays later, Scott Webb's 27-yard field goal gave Kansas a 3-0 lead.

The Bears answered on their next possession, marching 50 yards on 11 plays for a 25-yard **Caleb Allen** field goal.

Kansas responded quickly, though, as Marcus Herford returned the ensuing kickoff 88 yards for a touchdown. That started a stretch of 38 unanswered points by the Jayhawks, including two touchdowns in a 47-second span late in the second quarter.

The Jayhawks led 31-3 at halftime and pushed their lead to 41-3 before Baylor finally found the end zone. Following Webb's second of three field goals on the day, **David Gettis** had a 97-yard kickoff return for a touchdown with 1:49 remaining in the third quarter. It was the seventh-longest kickoff return in school history and Gettis' first career return touchdown.

However, that was not enough to spark the Bears, who saw Kansas add a Webb field goal, a Kerry Meier touchdown run and an Angus Quigley touchdown run in the fourth quarter.

Baylor was held to season lows in total offense (202 yards) and passing yards (154). The Bears had more return yardage (208) than total offense.

Blake Szymanski, one of three quarterbacks to play for the Bears, finished 18-of-33 for 119 yards, the lowest passing yardage total of his career in a start; he also was intercepted three times.

Brandon Whitaker accounted for nearly half Baylor's offensive total on the day, rushing 12 times for 54 yards and catching seven passes for 45 yards.

Joe Pawelek paced Baylor's defense with 13 tackles, one shy of his career high. The Bears tallied four sacks on the day.

- The home team has won all six Baylor-Kansas meetings as Big 12 opponents.

Baylor had the ball and trailed by only seven points midway through the fourth quarter; however, two late Texas touchdowns, including Marcus Griffin's 91-yard interception return, allowed the 19th-ranked Longhorns to pull away from the Bears for a 31-10 victory.

Caleb Allen's 35-yard field goal cut Texas' lead to 17-10 with 12:21 remaining in the game. After forcing Texas into a three-and-out, Baylor regained possession at its own 29 with 10:08 to play. However, Texas' Deon Beasley intercepted **Michael Machen's** third-and-two pass at the Bears' 43. Five plays later, the Longhorns scored on Vondrell McGee's 4-yard run.

Baylor again began driving and had a first-and-10 at the Texas 27 with just under six minutes to play. Griffin thwarted the Bears' comeback hopes, though, stepping in front of Machen's pass and returning it down the right sideline for a touchdown.

Machen, making his first start as a Bear, finished 25-of-44 for 231 yards with three interceptions and one touchdown. **John David Weed** spelled Machen after Griffin's interception return for a touchdown; Weed was 7-of-12 for 53 yards and was intercepted in the Texas end zone by Griffin with eight seconds remaining in the game.

Texas took the game's first lead on Ryan Bailey's 46-yard field goal at the 3:31 mark in the first quarter. The Horns had a chance to push their lead to 10-0 midway through the second quarter, but Baylor's defense made an impressive goal-line stand.

After Colt McCoy missed an open receiver in the end zone on third-and-goal from the 1, Texas went for it on fourth down. However, **Brandon Stiggers** got into the UT backfield, disrupted a pitch, picked up the loose ball and returned it 60 yards to the Texas 32. A personal foul face mask penalty on McCoy gave the Bears possession at the Texas 17. On the next play, Machen connected with **Thomas White** on an inside screen; White raced past four Texas defenders and into the end zone to give Baylor a 7-3 lead.

Texas answered quickly, driving 66 yards on five plays for a touchdown on its ensuing possession. The drive was capped by McCoy's 27-yard pass to Nate Jones. The Longhorns never trailed again, getting a 3-yard Chris Ogbonnaya touchdown run late in the third quarter to build a 17-7 lead.

Baylor was held to eight yards rushing on 18 attempts; the Bears lost eight yards on a sack and another 24 yards due to an errant snap late in the game.

Jordan Lake and **Joe Pawelek** led Baylor with 11 tackles each; Pawelek forced a fumble and had an interception. Stiggers finished with eight tackles, including two for loss, and had an interception to go along with his fumble force/recovery. **Leon Freeman** had career highs with three tackles for loss and two sacks.

Seven turnovers, five sacks, nine penalties and special teams' mistakes led to Baylor's 51-13 loss at Kansas State as the Bears saw their Big 12 Conference losing streak extend to eight games.

Despite several miscues, Baylor trailed by only 10 points at halftime. **Blake Szymanski**, the Bears' third quarterback of the day, connected with **Thomas White** on a 52-yard touchdown pass with 2:34 remaining in the second quarter. However, **Caleb Allen** missed the ensuing extra point, and Kansas State's lead remained 16-6.

Kansas State put the game away in the third quarter, though. The Wildcats scored three touchdowns in the period, including two in a span of 40 seconds. All three scores in the third quarter were touchdown passes from Josh Freeman, who also had two rushing scores on the day.

Szymanski and White hooked up for a scoring strike again early in the fourth quarter, this time from 37 yards out. However, Kansas State answered with a Freeman 1-yard touchdown run, and Jordy Nelson added a 92-yard punt return for a touchdown with 31 seconds to play in the game.

Freeman finished the game 22-of-33 for 247 yards passing; he added 19 yards on 10 rushes. Two Kansas State receivers had 100-yard efforts: Nelson had eight catches for 105 yards, while Daniel Gonzalez caught seven passes for 104 yards and a touchdown. Leon Patton paced the Kansas State ground game with 113 yards on 17 totes.

Szymanski, who connected on each of his first seven pass attempts, finished 15-of-21 for 213 yards and an interception. Starter **Michael Machen** was 5-of-14 for 92 yards and two interceptions. **John David Weed** played one series and rushed the ball on all three plays, gaining four yards before the Bears were forced to punt.

White tallied four catches for 118 yards, a career high. It was his first career 100-yard receiving game and Baylor's first by a non-back since **Dominique Zeigler's** 180-yard effort against Texas A&M in 2006. White also recorded the second multiple-touchdown game of his career; he also had two touchdown receptions against Northwestern State in 2006.

The Bears were paced defensively by **Jordan Lake** and **Joe Pawelek**, who had 13 and 12 tackles, respectively.

Baylor missed a pair of golden opportunities on the game's first drive as linebacker **Nick Moore** dropped interceptions on back-to-back plays. The Bears still forced Kansas State to punt on that drive.

The Wildcats cracked the scoreboard with 7:14 remaining in the first quarter on a Freeman 1-yard touchdown run. Brooks Rossman connected on one first-quarter field goal and two second-quarter field goals as Kansas State built a 16-0 lead.

TEXAS TECH 38, BAYLOR 7

Floyd Casey Stadium • Waco, Texas
Nov. 3, 2007 • Attendance: 39,015

Texas Tech built a 17-0 halftime lead and then pulled away with 21 unanswered third-quarter points in a 38-7 victory over Baylor at Floyd Casey Stadium. It was Texas Tech's 12th consecutive victory over Baylor in the all-time series.

After forcing Texas Tech into a three-and-out on the game's opening possession, Baylor drove 46 yards on 14 plays to the Red Raiders' 12. However, on third-and-10, Texas Tech defensive end Brandon Williams sacked Baylor quarterback **Blake Szymanski** and forced a fumble, which was recovered by Williams. Four plays and 40 seconds later, Tech found the end zone on a 37-yard Graham Harrell-to-Eric Morris touchdown pass.

Aaron Crawford added a 3-yard touchdown run with 65 seconds remaining in the first quarter. It was the first of four touchdowns on the day for Crawford, who found the end zone twice rushing and twice receiving.

That proved to be all the offense Tech would need as the Bears did not have another legitimate scoring opportunity until late in the fourth quarter. Szymanski connected with **Brandon Whitaker** for a 7-yard touchdown pass on fourth-and-goal with 49 seconds remaining in the game. That snapped a 10-quarter, 170-minute, 32-second scoreless streak for Baylor against Texas Tech at Floyd Casey Stadium. In fact, it was Baylor's first offensive score against the Red Raiders in Waco since **Rashad Armstrong's** 54-yard touchdown run on the second play from scrimmage in the 2003 game, a span of 178 minutes, 30 seconds.

Texas Tech finished with 563 yards of total offense and held Baylor to 282 yards. The Red Raiders averaged 7.4 yards per play, compared to 3.4 yards per play for the Bears.

Harrell was 37-of-46 for 433 yards and three touchdowns. Crawford had 10 receptions for 82 yards, as well as 44 yards on nine carries.

Szymanski was 25-of-41 for 191 yards with one interception. **Thomas White** was Szymanski's favorite target; White caught seven passes for 58 yards. **Jacoby Jones** tallied 119 all-purpose yards in his first career start; he rushed 21 times for 83 yards and caught six passes for 36 yards.

Alex Trlica's 23-yard field goal two seconds before halftime gave Texas Tech a 17-0 lead at the break. After Baylor gained one first down on the opening possession of the second half, Texas Tech's Danny Amendola returned the Bears punt to the Baylor 17. The Red Raiders scored on the next play as Harrell connect with Crawford, who added another touchdown reception and a touchdown run in the third period.

Baylor held Tech scoreless in the fourth quarter, snapping a streak of eight consecutive quarters in which the Red Raiders had scored against the Bears.

NOTES

- Baylor was held scoreless in the first half for the first time since the season opener at TCU. The Bears were held scoreless in the first half at home for the first time since Texas in 2005.
- Baylor's fourth-quarter touchdown broke a streak of 10 consecutive scoreless quarters at home against Texas Tech. The Bears' last score against the Red Raiders was in the first quarter of the 2003 meeting.
- Three Bears made their first career starts: RB **Jacoby Jones**, ROV **Jake La Mar** and FS **Marlon Price**.
- LB **Nick Moore** saw his consecutive games started streak end at 19 games.
- P **Derek Epperson's** 63-yard, first-quarter punt was the first 60-plus-yard punt of his career.

No. 4 OKLAHOMA 52, BAYLOR 21

Two redzone turnovers and an Oklahoma kickoff return for a touchdown proved fatal for Baylor in a 52-21 loss to the fourth-ranked Sooners.

After the teams traded punts on their first possessions, Baylor drove to the Oklahoma 3 thanks to **Brandon Whitaker's** 57-yard run. However, **Blake Szymanski** was intercepted in the end zone on the next play, thwarting Baylor's first scoring chance of the game.

The Bears again forced the Sooners to punt and responded with a five-play, 65-yard scoring drive. Whitaker's 46-yard touchdown run capped the drive.

Baylor's lead was short-lived, though, as Oklahoma marched 72 yards on seven plays and scored in 2:28. DeMarco Murray's first of three touchdown runs ended the drive, this one from 25 yards out.

After the Bears went three-and-out on their ensuing possession, Oklahoma quickly took the lead. Sam Bradford connected with Malcolm Kelly for a 51-yard touchdown pass on the Sooners' first play from scrimmage.

Oklahoma pushed its lead to 21-7 with 10:24 remaining in the second quarter. Baylor got back in the game with a 75-yard Szymanski-to-**Thomas White** touchdown pass with 60 seconds to play in the quarter. However, the Sooners again answered quickly as Murray returned the ensuing kickoff 91 yards for a touchdown.

The Sooners scored on the first drive of the second half, but Baylor had a chance to answer. The Bears had second-and-goal at the Oklahoma seven; however, a false start cost Baylor five yards, and Szymanski was intercepted on the next play.

Bradford recorded his third touchdown pass of the game on the ensuing drive, giving Oklahoma a 42-14 lead.

Szymanski again connected with White for a touchdown pass late in the third quarter, this time from 42 yards out. That was the end of the scoring for Baylor, though.

Oklahoma added a 27-yard Garrett Hartley field goal and a Murray 21-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter.

Whitaker finished with 149 yards rushing on 15 carries, the second 100-yard rushing game of his career. It was Baylor's first 100-yard rushing effort since the 2005 Texas A&M game and the Bears' best rushing performance since **Rashad Armstrong's** 166-yard tally against Colorado in 2003. Whitaker's rushing total was Baylor's best ever against Oklahoma. He also had 10 receptions for 68 yards, finishing with 217 all-purpose yards.

Szymanski was 25-of-42 for 280 yards with two touchdowns and two interceptions. During the game, he established Baylor single-season records for total yards, passing yards and passing touchdowns.

OKLAHOMA STATE 45, BAYLOR 14

Floyd Casey Stadium • Waco, Texas

Baylor's 2007 season came to an end with a 45-14 loss to Oklahoma State at Floyd Casey Stadium. It was the Bears' 12th consecutive loss in Big 12 play as Baylor finished the season winless in conference play for the first time since 2001.

Oklahoma State tallied 545 yards offense on 72 plays, averaging 7.6 yards per play. The Cowboys got 343 yards on the ground and had two 100-yard rushers.

OSU did not take long to seize the game's first lead. After facing the Bears into a three-and-out on the game's first possession, the Cowboys gained possession of the ball at the Baylor 41. Two plays later, Seth Newton caught a 30-yard touchdown pass from Zac Robinson. Oklahoma State never relinquished the lead.

Robinson pushed the Cowboys' lead to 14-0 on an 18-yard touchdown run early in the second quarter. Baylor cut the OSU lead in half with 9:17 remaining in the second when **Blake Szymanski** connected with **Thomas White** on a 6-yard touchdown pass. However, the Cowboys answered with a 24-yard Robinson-to-Tommy Devereaux touchdown pass just 71 seconds later. Robinson added a 4-yard touchdown run with 2:46 remaining before halftime.

Szymanski and White connected again 24 seconds before halftime, this time from 28-yards out. It marked White's third multiple-touchdown reception game of the season, becoming the first Bear to accomplish that feat since **Melvin Bonner** in 1992.

The second half belonged to Oklahoma State, though. The Cowboys added a 27-yard Dan Bailey filed goal and a 4-yard Dantrelle Savage touchdown run in the third quarter. Savage found the end zone again with 9:59 to play, this time from two yards out.

Szymanski finished 29-of-40 for 226 yards, two touchdowns and two interceptions. White had a career-high nine receptions for 68 yards. **Brandon Whitaker** produced 131 all-purpose yards, gaining 79 yards on 11 carries and 59 yards on nine receptions. It marked the third game of the season in which Whitaker caught at least nine passes and the fourth such game of his career, both tying **Gerald McNeil's** school records.

Robinson paced the Oklahoma State offense, going 16-of-21 for 202 yards passing and two touchdowns; he also had 144 yards on 17 carries with two rushing touchdowns. Savage added 109 yards on 16 carries.

- WR **Thomas White** moved into second place on Baylor's single-season touchdown receptions list with eight.
- RB **Brandon Whitaker** moved into fifth place on Baylor's single-season receptions list with 58. He also became the first running back in school history with at least 50 receptions in a season.
