KEN STARR

UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT
GEORGE WASHINGTON, 1968

On June 1, 2010, **Kenneth Winston Starr, J.D.**, became the 14th president of Baylor University. Judge Starr was elected unanimously by the Baylor Board of Regents on Feb. 12, 2010, following a search process that included representatives from all parts of the Baylor family.

Starr has had a distinguished career in academia, the law and public service. Prior to coming to Baylor, he served for six years as the Duane and Kelly Roberts Dean and Professor of Law at Pepperdine, where he taught current constitutional issues and civil procedure. He also is of counsel to the law firm of Kirkland & Ellis LLP, where he was a partner from 1993 to 2004, specializing in appellate work, antitrust, federal courts, federal jurisdiction and constitutional law.

As Solicitor General of the United States from 1989 to 1993, Starr argued 36 cases before the U.S. Supreme Court. He also served as United States Circuit Judge for the District of Columbia Circuit from 1983 to 1989, as law clerk to Chief Justice Warren E. Burger from 1975 to 1977 and as law clerk to Fifth Circuit Judge David W. Dyer from 1973 to 1974. Starr was appointed to serve as Independent Counsel for five investigations, including Whitewater, from 1994 to 1999.

Starr previously taught constitutional law as an adjunct professor at New York University School of Law and was a distinguished visiting professor at George Mason University School of Law and Chapman Law School. After graduating from San Antonio's Sam Houston High School, he earned his B.A. from George Washington University in 1968, his M.A. from Brown University in 1969 and his J.D. degree from Duke University Law School in 1973. He is admitted to practice in California, the District of Columbia, Virginia and the U.S. Supreme Court.

He is the author of more than 25 publications, and his book, *First Among Equals: The Supreme Court in American Life*, published in 2002, was praised by U.S. Circuit Judge David B. Sentelle as "eminently readable and informative...not just the best treatment to-date of the Court after (Chief Justice Earl) Warren, it is likely to have that distinction for a long, long time."

He has received a multitude of honors and awards, including the J. Reuben Clark Law Society 2005 Distinguished Service Award, the 2004 Capital Book Award, the Jefferson Cup award from the FBI, the Edmund Randolph Award for Outstanding Service in the Department of Justice and the Attorney General's Award for Distinguished Service.

Starr was born on July 21, 1946, in Vernon, Texas, and was raised in San Antonio. He and his wife Alice have three children and four grandchildren. The Starrs made their home in Malibu, Calif., from 2004 to 2010, and lived in McLean, Va., from 1978 to 2004. He has volunteered many hours teaching in the inner city and assisting disadvantaged students with summer internships, after-school programs and guidance for financing a college education.



MICHAEL ROGERS

FACULTY ATHLETICS REPRESENTATIVE
TEXAS TECH, 1972

Professor **Michael Rogers** has served as Baylor's Faculty Representative to the Big 12 Conference and the NCAA since 2002 and has been a member of the Baylor Law faculty since 1984.

Rogers earned a bachelor of business administration degree and graduated with honors in 1972 from Texas Tech University, where he was a member of the Beta Gamma Sigma and Phi Kappa Phi honor societies and a varsity scholarship basketball player. He received his J.D. degree from the University of Oklahoma in 1974, where he was an editor of the Oklahoma Law Review and was admitted to membership in the Order of the Coif.

Rogers was in private practice from 1975 to 1984, during which time he was a founding partner of Gaar & Bell (now Gilmore & Bell), a securities transactions law firm with offices in Kansas and Missouri. He is admitted to practice law in Oklahoma, Kansas and Texas.

During his private practice work, Rogers served as lead counsel in dozens of private securities transactions and over 100 public offerings of taxadvantaged securities. While teaching Securities Regulation at Baylor, he has served as consulting counsel in numerous securities lawsuits. In 1984 he joined the Baylor Law faculty, where his subjects include family law, securities regulation and alternative dispute resolution.

Rogers is an experienced mediator and serves on the panel of mediators for the United States District Court Western District of Texas. He continues to serve as a director (Board Chairman, 2000-2001) of the McLennan County Dispute Resolution Center and on the panel of mediators for the United States District Court, Western District of Texas. Rogers formerly served on the panel of arbitrators for the American Arbitration Association.

For more than a decade, Professor Rogers has served as chair of Baylor's Professional Sports Counseling Panel. In that capacity, he has rendered advice to numerous future professional athletes, including Olympic gold medalist Michael Johnson and Super Bowl champion Santana Dotson.

Rogers is the son of the late Bob J. Rogers, who served as head basketball coach at Texas A&M University from 1957 to 1963.

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

LAURENTIAN, 1985

Ian McCaw was named Director of Athletics of Baylor's 19-sport, Big 12 intercollegiate athletics program Sept. 8, 2003. Under McCaw's leadership, the department has achieved extraordinary athletics, academic and administrative success.

Since 2003, Baylor has enjoyed the most competitively successful period in the history of its intercollegiate athletics program. During that time, Baylor has captured two NCAA team championships and 33 Big 12 conference championships. In McCaw's tenure at Baylor, only the University of Texas and Texas A&M have won more conference titles.

This period also includes Baylor's five highest finishes in the NACDA Directors' Cup standings highlighted by its best finish ever in 2004-05 with a ranking of 25th. A school-record 14 teams advanced to post-season competition in 2008-09, 2009-10 and 2010-11.

Baylor played in its first bowl game since 1994 when it advanced to the Texas Bowl in 2010. McCaw was named 2010 Waco Tribune Herald Central Texas Sportsman of the Year. Student-athletes have thrived in the classroom as Baylor led the Big 12 in graduation success rate for three consecutive years and student-athletes recorded their highest cumulative grade point average on record during 2010-11 at 3.10.

While Baylor Athletics enjoyed extraordinary academic and athletic success, the department has made dramatic strides administratively as well.

A five-year strategic plan for intercollegiate athletics, Above and Beyond, was developed and implemented inclusive of department goals and objectives. An outgrowth of this plan was the creation and successful completion of the five-year, \$95 million development campaign Victory with Integrity.

Increased athletics development activity has led to the funding and completion of the Highers Athletics Complex including the Simpson Athletics and Academic Center and Allison Indoor Football Practice Facility; the Grant Teaff and Letterwinners Plazas at Floyd Casey Stadium; the Lt. Jack Whetsel Jr. Basketball Practice Facility; the Willis Family Equestrian Center; Getterman Softball Practice Facility; and, numerous other physical improvements. Since McCaw's arrival, the athletics endowment has grown from \$14 million to more than \$24 million. In each of the last seven years, the Baylor Bear Foundation has posted a new record for annual funds raised highlighted by its best year ever in 2010-11 when more than \$7.6 million was raised.

McCaw is Baylor's 12th athletic director and arrived from the University of Massachusetts, where he spent the previous year as director of athletics. McCaw was responsible for a 23-sport program and helped develop and implement a five-year strategic plan and secure funding for basketball locker room renovations.

McCaw previously served as director of intercollegiate athletics and campus recreation at Northeastern University from 1997-2002. During his five years at Northeastern, where he implemented a five-year strategic plan for Northeastern athletics inclusive of department goals and objectives. Northeastern graduated 65 percent of its student-athletes during McCaw's final year at the Boston institution, 14 points higher than the institutional average. Husky student-athletes also gave back to the community, as each team was required to participate in at least one community service project annually. The success of the Northeastern athletic program on McCaw's watch extended beyond the classroom, as the program captured a school-record six America East conference titles in 2001-2002, and five teams finished among the nation's top 20.

McCaw went to Northeastern from Tulane University, where he served as senior associate athletic director for development and associate athletic director for external affairs from 1992-1997, being named Tulane's co-interim director of athletics in 1996. Prior to his years at Tulane, McCaw worked in a variety of athletic administrative posts at the University of Maine from 1986 to 1992 including sports information, marketing and external affairs.

Recognized as a national leader in intercollegiate athletics, McCaw serves as chair of the NCAA Recruiting and Personnel Cabinet. He is a member of the Big 12 television and game management and officiating committees, and Division I-A Athletics Directors Executive Committee. He previously served on the National Association of Collegiate Director's of Athletics Executive Committee.

McCaw earned his master's degree in sport management from Massachusetts in 1987, after receiving a bachelor's degree in sports administration at Laurentian University in Sudbury, Ontario, in 1985. McCaw and his wife, Heather, are members of First Baptist Church of Woodway where he serves as a deacon. They are the parents of four children: Christy, Paul, Callie and Corinne.

**HEAD COACH ■ FOURTH SEASON
SMU, 1998**

Entering her fourth season as the Bears' head coach, former U.S. National Team member Marci Jobson has quickly turned around the Baylor soccer program.

In 2010, Jobson led the Bears to the most overall wins (11) since 1999 and the most conference victories (4) since 2001. Now nationally known for its stifling defense, Jobson's squad tied the program record for most shutouts in a season with 11 and tied the 1997 team for the most home wins in Baylor history with nine.

Off the field, the 2010 team placed a school record six student-athletes on the CoSIDA/ESPN Academic All-District Team, breaking the old mark of three. In addition, the Bears had 12 Academic All-Big 12 members, including 11 on the first team.

Her 2009 campaign was a sign of things to come. After being picked 10th in the Big 12 Preseason poll, the Bears earned the No. 7 seed at the conference tournament. BU wrapped up the season with an 8-6-5 mark, recording the most wins by the program since an eight-win season in 2002. In addition, her squad registered three conference wins, which was the most since 2002, and qualified to the Big 12 Tournament for the first time since 2006. The Bears also set a program record for best goals against average with 0.88 that was only bested by the 2010 team's mark of 0.77.

In just her first season, Jobson quickly established her style of play as the Bears allowed the third fewest goals in program history (22) and finished the season with a 0-0 tie at No. 8 Texas, making it the first result against a ranked team since 2004.

"We are very excited about having Marci lead our soccer program," Baylor Director of Athletics Ian McCaw said. "She is deeply committed to Baylor's mission and will be a great ambassador for Baylor soccer. Marci's professional and U.S. National team experience will afford her great credibility in working with our student-athletes and in the recruiting process."

While splitting time between the U.S. National Team and her Northern Illinois head coaching responsibilities the last three seasons, Jobson led the Huskies to a pair of Mid-American Conference Tournament (MAC) appearances and improved the program's win total each year.

In 2007, her NIU team posted the program's best record since 1998 at 10-5-5 and advanced to the MAC Tournament semifinals for the second consecutive year. A year earlier, her seventh-seeded NIU team (8-11-2) reached the 2006 MAC Tournament championship game for the first time in nearly a decade after upsetting No. 2-seed Ohio in the quarterfinals and No. 6-seed Kent State in the semifinals. Jobson's rookie season (2005) saw the Huskies post a 5-11-2 mark and produce the program's first-ever MAC All-Freshman team selection.

"Our goal is to build a championship women's soccer program at Baylor," Jobson said. "The women's soccer program won Baylor's first Big 12 championship (in 1998) and there is no reason that we can't reach that pinnacle in the future."

A member of the U.S. Women's National Team from 2005 through 2007, Jobson became the second oldest player to earn her first cap on June 26, 2005, against Canada at 29 years, 6 months and 22 days. She first trained with the National Team in 1997 and was a member of the U.S. U-20 National Team Pool in 1999. Jobson played in two games for the U.S. in 2005, 11 in 2006 and four in 2007. One of the first 18 players named to the 2007 U.S. World Cup team, Jobson was the oldest player ever-by four years, to make her first Women's World Cup roster, and she retired following the 2007 event.

"Congratulations on hiring Marci, I think she will do a great job for Baylor University," said Greg Ryan, the U.S. Women's National Team head coach from 2005-2007 who recruited Jobson as a collegian at Wisconsin and coached her at SMU. "She is a great person and a great recruiter, which is the first thing you have to be as a college coach.

"People like Marci," Ryan added. "She was the glue that helped keep our U.S. National Team together. She is hard working both as a coach and player. She did a great job at Northern Illinois along with Paul, her husband, and given time at Baylor, she will improve the program through her coaching and recruiting abilities."

The St. Charles, Ill., native played three seasons with the Atlanta Beat in the WUSA, then returned to the W-League in 2004 to play for the Charlotte Eagles and the Atlanta Silverbacks. Jobson also spent one season (1999) playing for Turbine Potsdam in the German Women's Bundesliga. A member of the gold-medal winning North team and an all-tournament selection at the 1995 U.S. Olympic Festival, Jobson captained the Chicago Cobras of the W-League for four seasons while leading the league in scoring once and helping the Cobras claim the 2000 league crown.

"Marci has the innate ability to make people laugh," said Jobson's U.S. National teammate Abby Wambach. "She has this gift to be able to find a connection with every single player and that is a rare quality to have.

"I think taking the job at Baylor is just another step in her progression to be a great coach," Wambach added. "Marci sees the game so well and is able to communicate that to others. All-in-all, she is just a good human and I know she will do a great job."

The four-time all-state performer at St. Charles (Ill.) High School led the Saints to a pair of state championships (1992 and 1994) and a third-place finish in 1993. Named to the National Soccer Coaches of Association of America prep All-America team, Jobson was a four-time all-conference selection who also earned all-area, all-academic and all-state honors during a standout prep career. In 2005, she was inducted into the St. Charles (East) High School Hall of Fame and received the school's Jobie Harrison Lifetime Achievement Award.

Following a standout prep career, Jobson attended the University of Wisconsin, where she earned 1994 All-Freshman honors from Soccer America and Soccer News as well as first-team All-Big Ten recognition. She was a second-team All-Central Region performer as a rookie when she helped the Badgers to a 16-6 overall record, a share of the Big Ten regular-season title, the league's postseason crown and an NCAA Tournament berth.

As a sophomore in 1995, Jobson earned Soccer News All-Midwest, All-Sophomore and Elite 11 Midfielder accolades and was a first-team All-West Region honoree as a member of the Badgers' NCAA Tournament team which finished second in the Big Ten in both the regular season and the postseason.

The two-time All-Big Ten honoree ranked second nationally in points both years. As a freshman, Jobson totaled 16 points on five goals and six assists before coming back with a 20-point campaign (five goals and a team-high 10 assists) the following season.

After two seasons at Wisconsin, Jobson transferred to SMU (after Ryan left the Badger program to coach the Mustangs.) She was a two-time NSCAA All-Central Region and Western Athletic Conference Mountain Division Player of the Year at SMU. Jobson helped SMU advance to the second round of the 1997 NCAA Tournament as a senior when the Mustangs finished 17-5-1.

She started all 44 games of her two-year Mustang career as a midfielder and totaled 51 points on 21 goals and nine assists. In four seasons of collegiate competition, Jobson totaled 87 points with 31 goals and 25 assists.

Jobson launched her coaching career as an assistant to Ryan at SMU and then worked alongside Bret Hall in the Chicago Soccer club program. Hall, an assistant on the U.S. National Team, worked as a volunteer assistant coach at NIU in 2006.

The 1998 SMU graduate (bachelor of arts in sociology) married Paul Jobson in August 2004. Paul is currently the Associate Head Coach in the Baylor program. They have one son, Miller, who was born on May 2, 2009. She is youngest of eight children, all of whom have names that start with the letter "M"—Marci, Maggie, Marty, Mindy, Mary, Mike, Monica and Mark.

Paul Jobson is a National "A" licensed coach beginning his fourth season as Baylor's associate head coach, with his wife and head coach, Marci Jobson. Among his duties are serving as the program's day-to-day administrator, planning and structuring practices and organizing summer camps.

The work of the Jobsons at Baylor is just part of their special partnership. Beyond being husband and wife, Paul and Marci have worked together with the Atlanta Beat of the WUSA and with various youth soccer programs throughout the state of Georgia.

"He's produced results while coaching young women at many levels. With his business experience, office organization and passion for the game, we make a great team," head coach Marci Jobson said.

During his time at Baylor, he has helped guide the Bears to some of their best seasons in recent memory. In 2010, Jobson assisted in turning BU into an 11-win team, the most victories since 1999. In addition, the defense has put up school records for goals-against average in each of the last two seasons.

The Conyers, Ga., native was a three-year letterman at Presbyterian College in South Carolina and was a member of the squad which made the school's first NCAA Division II championship appearance. The Blue Hose compiled a 17-3-1 ledger that included the South Atlantic Conference regular season and postseason tourney championships.

Jobson helped Presbyterian to a 15-4-3 mark and regular season and conference tournament titles during the 1996 campaign. The following season, he was part of a team that notched 11 victories before opting to begin his coaching career as a senior.

During his senior season at PC, Jobson served as a student assistant coach while finishing his bachelor's degree in accountancy in 1999. Upon graduation, Jobson moved into a role as assistant men's soccer coach and assistant sports information director at Presbyterian until he left to work for his family's business a year later.

In 2002, Jobson resumed his work in soccer when he took a position with the Atlanta Beat of the WUSA (women's professional soccer league). In his role with the team, Jobson was able to work in many different facets of the soccer world, including promotion, youth soccer development and game day operations. Jobson's duties with the Beat ranged from serving as an account executive to being program director for youth player development, co-producer of the Atlanta Beat Road Show, and manager of the ajjobs.com kickback zone. There he also met his future bride, Marci Miller, who was playing for the team.

Throughout his soccer experiences, Jobson turned sports administration duties into his specialty, routinely taking on the tasks of fund-raising, budgets and camps.

A graduate of Salem High School, Jobson has also served as the Soccer Director and Program Supervisor for the Snellville (Ga.) Parks and Recreation Department as well as the Athletic Coordinator for Recreation and Select Soccer for the Alpharetta (Ga.) Recreation and Parks Department.

In 2005, Jobson served as the junior varsity soccer coach at Milton High School in Alpharetta, Ga., where he guided one of the best JV programs in the state of Georgia. Jobson also served as the Executive Director of the Atlanta Youth Soccer Association. In 2005, Jobson earned his USSF National 'B' license.

Prior to Baylor, Jobson was on the Northern Illinois staff as an assistant coach from 2005-06 and was named associate head coach for the 2007 season. During his tenure, Jobson helped lead NIU from five wins his first season to 10 wins in 2007.

He is married to Marci Jobson and they have one son, Miller, born on May 2, 2009.

Chuck Codd is in his fourth season with the Baylor soccer program after following Marci Jobson to Waco from Northern Illinois where he was a volunteer assistant coach. Among other duties, Codd is in charge of goalkeepers and defenders.

"He comes with great experience both as a player and coach, having been an assistant with us and at Northwestern, and the director of coaching for the Chicago Sockers girls' program," head coach Marci Jobson said. "Not only does he know talent, but he is also great at developing the talent he already is working with. Chuck has a magnetic personality and his players love to play for him."

In his three seasons at Baylor, Codd has helped the Bears into one of the best defensive squads in the Big 12. The Bears have posted back-to-back seasons in which they have broken the program's goals-against average. In 2010, BU surrendered the fewest goals (16) in Baylor history. He also guided Courtney Seelhorst to eight solo shutouts on the year, tying her with Dawn Greathouse for second in most solo shutouts in a season. In addition, her 0.812 GAA on the year ranks her second all-time for goals-against average in a season at BU.

During his one season at Northern Illinois, Codd helped NIU to post the program's best record since 1998 at 10-5-5 and advanced to the MAC Tournament semifinals for the second consecutive year.

Prior to Northern Illinois, Codd served as the girls' team director for the Chicago Sockers club team based in Palatine. Prior to that role, he was an assistant coach at Northwestern for four seasons, working one year with the men's program and the final three with the women's team.

As a professional soccer player, Codd won three national championships with the Chicago Stingers/Sockers outdoor team from 1997-2000. Prior to his outdoor stint, Codd spent seven seasons playing for the Chicago Power, Cincinnati Silverbacks and Buffalo Blizzard of the NPSL.

Codd's experience includes being a coach for the Celtics club in St. Charles, Ill., for three years and one year at St. Charles High School. In addition, he spent two years coaching with the Tophat girls' club in Atlanta.

A native of Torrance, Calif., Codd is a graduate of North Carolina State University with a degree in history.

Codd is married to Charmaine Hooper, a former member of the Canadian National Team who was regarded as one of the world's top women's soccer players. The couple has a daughter, Charlie.

2010 REVIEW

The 2010 squad finished with the most overall wins (11) since 1999 and the most conference victories (4) since 2001. The Bears, now nationally known for their stifling defense, tied the program record for most shutouts in a season with 11 and tied the 1997 team for the most home wins in Baylor history with nine.

Baylor opened the season with three straight wins for the first time since 2003. Sophomore Hanna Gilmore was rewarded for her stellar performance in the first two games, recording two goals and an assist and being named Big 12 Offensive Player of the Week for the second time in her career. She became the first player to win a conference award more than once since Megan Sherrell did so in 2007.

Following the team's first loss of the year at Arizona State, the Bears went unbeaten in five straight games. They compiled a 4-0-1 record and outscored their opponents 16-0 during that stretch with five consecutive shutouts.

In conference play, Baylor reeled off back-to-back conference wins for the first time since 2007, defeating Nebraska (2-1) and No. 22 Colorado (1-0, 2OT). The win over Colorado was the first over a ranked team since a 2-1 victory over No. 22 Texas on Sept. 26, 2005. The pair of wins, which earned BU votes in the Top 25 for the first time since 2001, garnered junior goalkeeper, Courtney Seelhorst the Big 12 Defensive Player of the Week award for the first time in her career after making 12 saves in the two games. In addition, she was named one of *CollegeSoccer360.com's* Primetime Performers of the Week.

The Bears picked up another Big 12 win on Oct. 17, defeating Kansas 1-0 in Lawrence, Kan. Gilmore slotted a penalty-kick goal in double overtime for the victory, her second PK success in as many games.

Baylor's final game of the season found itself toe-to-toe with Texas Tech in Waco, as the Bears came away with a 1-0 win over the Red Raiders. The win gave the Bears the "Battle of the Brand" for the first time, as the two teams have vied for the cup each year since 2006.

In addition to the success on the field, the Bears were very successful in the classroom as well. Twelve members of the Baylor soccer team were named to the Academic All-Big 12 team, as the 12 student-athletes and 11 first-team members were the second-most by any school. The Bears featured two of the conference's five perfect 4.00 GPAs, as Bethany Johnston (Biochemistry) and Dana Larsen (Biochemistry) were named to the first team for the second and first time, respectively. The team also placed a school-record six student-athletes on the CoSIDA/ESPN Academic All-District Team. Lucy Quintana and Dana Larsen were named to the first team, while Brittany Hunemuller earned second-team honors and Courtney Seelhorst, Bethany Johnston and Lisa Sliwinski were selected to the third team. The six student-athletes, who each earned this honor for the first time in their careers, surpassed the previous program high of three which was set in 2002 and led all Big 12 schools.

Individually on the field, Courtney Seelhorst recorded eight solo shutouts on the year, tying her with Dawn Greathouse for second most solo shutouts in a season. In addition, her 0.812 GAA on the year ranks her second all-time for goals-against average in a season at BU.
