SPRING FOOTBALL PREVIEW

First-year head coach **Frank Spaziani** and the Eagles defied critics last fall and finished with an 8-5 record and went 5-3 in the ACC Atlantic Division, which put them in second place after being picked to finish last in the preseason.

The spring semester marked the arrival of three new faces in QBs **Josh Bordner** and **Chase Rettig** and LB **Kevin Pierre-Louis**. Bordner and Rettig will get an early start and compete against **Mike Marscovetra** and returning starter **Dave Shinskie** while Pierre-Louis will gain early knowledge from one of the best linebacker corps in the ACC.

The quarterbacks will have plenty of support from the offensive line, which lost just one starter, and RB **Montel Harris** who received All-ACC Second Team honors in the fall. Shinskie and company, despite losing a few seniors to graduation, will have talented receivers to throw to in **Colin Larmond, Jr.**, **Chris Pantale**, **Lars Anderson** and **Clyde Lee**.

The defense lost the services of five fifth-year seniors but will be able to fill the holes. Austin Giles graduated from the defensive line, but senior **Brad Newman** and junior **Kaleb Ramsey** both have experience there. The loss of two-time captain Mike McLaughlin will be softened by the possibility of Herzlich being back and **Jim Noel** spelled Marcellus Bowman last year at strong safety. CB Roderick Rollins is also gone, but sophomores **Donnie Fletcher** and **Isaac Johnson** have significant experience in the secondary.

The spring season could set up one of the best comeback stories in college football. Senior LB **Mark Herzlich**, the 2008 ACC Defensive Player of the Year who was diagnosed with and then overcame Ewing's sarcoma, aims to run out of the tunnel on September 4 with the No. 94 and his signature eye black on. Herzlich will not participate in hitting/contact drills during spring ball.

The 2010 schedule will be an exciting one for Boston College fans. The Eagles will play seven games at home in Alumni Stadium, including visits from Catholic rival Notre Dame and ACC rivals Clemson and Virginia Tech.

FRANK SPAZIANI

GREGORY P. BARBER & FAMILY HEAD FOOTBALL COACH SECOND SEASON

Known simply as “Coach Spaz” by his players, friends and fans, Spaziani was named head football coach in January.

Years at Boston College: 14 • Overall Record: 9-5

He waited his turn. He got his shot. And if his first season as head coach of the Eagles is any indication, it was well worth the wait.

Never forsaking his modest, hard-working, blue-collar roots, Frank Spaziani served as the loyal soldier for so many years before getting the opportunity to take center stage in 2009. When he was named head football coach at Boston College, the room was filled not only with media, but with family and friends from the Athletics Department who were thrilled to see their humble and dry-witted friend, simply known as “Spaz,” be rewarded for a career of loyalty and dedication.

The son of first-generation Italian-Americans Joseph and Regina Spaziani grew up in Clark, N.J., and never forgot his roots. The values of hard work, toughness, dedication, humility, loyalty and honesty he learned as a boy have formed the foundation for his coaching philosophy.

Although some New Englanders may consider Spaziani loyal to a fault – he is, after all, a devout and lifelong New York Yankees fan – few would fault a man for remaining true to his roots, especially when those values keep him grounded in a time of over-inflated salaries and egos in the football coaching world. His seriousness is balanced with a notorious sense of humor – he’s been known to crack a joke or two. When asked at the Emerald Bowl press conference for his reaction when he heard the Eagles would be playing USC, he quipped, “The good news was we got the bowl bid; the bad news was that we got Southern Cal. That’s like your mother-in-law driving off a cliff in your brand new Cadillac Escalade.”

Each Thursday when he meets with beat writers to discuss the upcoming game, he’s likely to start the conversation with baseball talk while the soundtrack of the hit Broadway show “Jersey Boys” plays in the background. But he knows when to get serious – and people know when he means business.

This Jersey boy would become the last player recruited to Penn State by a young assistant named Joe Paterno, who went on to become the head coach the next year. Talented in baseball as well, Spaziani was originally recruited as a quarterback but eventually became a defensive end and a team captain before serving as a graduate assistant for Paterno.

“He could be good at anything,” Paterno said. “If he had gone into business, he’d be the president of the corporation. He’s not afraid to work, and he’s not afraid to make decisions.”

His first season as head coach at Boston College required more than a few tough decisions. Although he hit the ground running, but there were more than a few bumps in the road along the way. Senior linebacker and returning co-captain Mike McLaughlin tore his Achilles’ tendon during a routine drill in the spring and was out indefinitely. In May, the entire program was dealt a devastating and sobering blow when its star player, linebacker Mark Herzlich, discovered he had cancer and would be unable to suit up for the 2009 season. The Eagles then lost the only quarterback with any playing experience, leaving the cupboard bare in the team’s most important position.

By mid-summer, expectations were low; at the ACC’s Operation Football in July, the league’s media predicted the Eagles would finish dead last in the Atlantic Division. But a funny thing happened on the way to the cellar – the team overachieved. It finished with an 8-5 record, tied for second in the ACC Atlantic Division, and played in its 11th straight bowl game, giving national power USC all it could handle in the third-most-watched bowl game ever televised on ESPN.

Along the way, milestones were achieved and some young superstars emerged. True freshman linebacker Luke Kuechly was named ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year after coming out of nowhere to lead the league in tackles and averaging more tackles-per-game than any rookie since the NCAA began tracking the stat in 2003. Sophomore running back Montel Harris recorded eight 100-yard games and set the BC sophomore rushing record. Senior wide receiver Rich Gunnell and place-kicker Steve Aponavicius added their names to the record books.



McLaughlin battled to get back onto the playing field, and Dave Shinskie, the 25-year-old true freshman quarterback who came to BC after playing professional baseball, proved to be a consistent starter by season's end. Off the field, Herzlich waged a very public battle against cancer – and won. And the Eagles continued their proud tradition of achieving in the classroom, becoming one of only six FBS programs in the country to receive a Graduation Success Rate score of 90 or better.

"What we accomplished," Spaziani said, "where we started, all the potholes, all the situations, all the things we had to overcome, it was a testament to the kids and they should be very proud of what they did. To start with no quarterbacks who ever played in a game, no linebackers who ever played in a game, new staff, new coaches, new everything, to finish 8-5 is an accomplishment we should be proud of."

The 2010 season will mark Spaziani's 14th year on the BC coaching staff, having spent his first two seasons as the Eagles' running backs coach before serving as defensive coordinator for 10 seasons. Spaziani's reputation as an outstanding coach, in fact, was built upon a decade of producing one of the toughest defenses in college football. In 2008, the Eagles ranked in the top 10 in the nation in seven defensive categories, including interceptions (first, 26); turnovers gained (second, 36); total defense (fifth, 268.14 ypg.); red zone defense (sixth, 72%); first downs allowed (sixth, 14.71 pg.); rushing defense (seventh, 91.2 ypg.), and pass efficiency defense (98.81). The Eagles advanced to the ACC Championship Game for the second consecutive season. In addition, Herzlich was named ACC Defensive Player of the Year.

In 2007 Spaziani's defense ranked second in the nation and led the ACC in rushing defense, allowing just 75.5 yards per game. The BC defense also ranked second in the ACC in red zone defense, keeping opponents from scoring nearly 72 percent of the time. Senior free safety Jamie Silva was a consensus All-America first-team selection and was one of three finalists for the 2007 Jim Thorpe Award, which is given to the nation's top defensive back. Silva was MVP of the 2007 Champs Sports bowl, in which he had two interceptions. Spaziani was part of a staff that led the Eagles to an 11-3 finish, the first BC team to win 11 games since 1940. The 2007 Eagles began the season 8-0 and were ranked No. 2 in the nation in both major polls. The team won the Atlantic Division of the ACC and went on to win an eighth consecutive bowl game, the longest active bowl game winning streak in America. The Eagles finished 10th in the final AP poll, BC's best finish since the 1984 season.

Spaziani was credited with BC's 25-24 win over Navy in the 2006 Meineke Car Care Bowl as he served as Interim Head Coach following the departure of Tom O'Brien. In 2006, Boston College led the ACC with five defensive touchdowns. The Eagles were third in the ACC in scoring defense and Jo-Lonn Dunbar was named National Defensive Player of the Week when he scored two of BC's three defensive touchdowns vs. Maryland. In 2005, BC led the ACC in rushing defense (90.8 ypg.) and red zone defense (25-39, 64.1%) and were third in scoring defense (15.9 ypg.). The 2004 Eagles were ranked in the top 10 nationally in scoring defense, top 20 in rushing defense and top 25 in pass efficiency defense. In 2003 BC was ranked second in the Big East in total defense and rushing defense. During the 2002 season, the Eagle defense was ranked 13th nationally in passing defense, 25th in pass efficiency defense, 23rd in scoring defense and 37th in total defense.

Spaziani joined the BC coaching staff after three seasons with the Calgary Stampeders of the Canadian Football League. During his coaching tenure at Calgary, he served two seasons as the defensive coordinator. Prior to his coaching stint at Calgary, he served as the defensive coordinator for two years with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers. Spaziani spent nine years as a member of the Virginia coaching staff, where he was defensive coordinator for his last five seasons in Charlottesville, after having been defensive backs coach for the first four.

Spaziani has been a member of coaching staffs for teams that have reached 21 bowl games, including the 2009 Emerald Bowl, the 2008 Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowl, the 2007 Champs Sports Bowl, the 2006 Meineke Car Care Bowl, the 2005 MPC Computers Bowl, the 2004 Continental Tire Bowl, the 2003 Diamond Walnut San Francisco Bowl (BC), the 2002 Motor City Bowl (BC), the 2001 Music City Bowl (BC), the 2000 Aloha Bowl (BC), the 1999 Insight.com Bowl (BC), the 1990 Sugar Bowl (Virginia), the 1989 Citrus Bowl (Virginia), the 1987 All-American Bowl (Virginia), the 1984 Peach Bowl (Virginia), the 1981 Liberty Bowl (Navy) and the 1980 Garden State Bowl and 1978 Holiday Bowl (Navy).

Spaziani is a 1969 graduate of Penn State, where he was a star defensive end on the Nittany Lions teams that tied Florida State in the 1967 Gator Bowl and defeated Kansas in the 1969 Orange Bowl. He began his coaching career in 1969 as a graduate assistant to Joe Paterno at Penn State. After three years as an assistant high school coach, he became head coach at Hempstead (N.Y.) High School in 1973, and, a year later, at Raritan (N.J.) High. He joined head coach George Welsh as an offensive assistant at the U.S. Naval Academy in 1975 and went with Welsh from Annapolis to Virginia in 1982.

Frank and his wife, the former Laura Heikel, are the parents of three children, Joseph and twins Avery and Andrew.

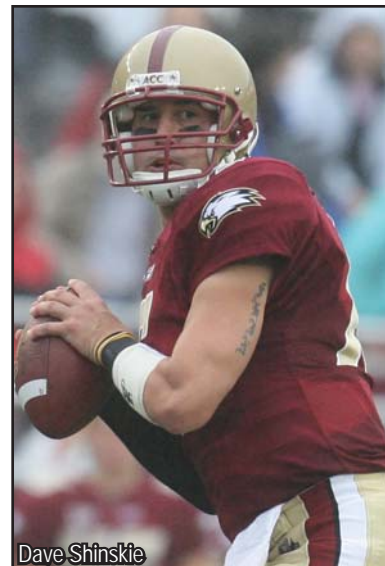

For the first time since Matt Ryan's senior season in 2007, the Eagles will welcome back a starting quarterback. Dave Shinskie, the 25-year-old former baseball player, set freshman records with 2,049 yards and 15 touchdown passes.

He will still have to compete against a few very talented arms behind him. Mike Marscovetra ended the season second on the depth chart and played well in come mop-up time at Virginia Tech, completing 10 of 16 passes for 114 yards and two touchdowns.

Josh Bordner and Chase Rettig also enrolled in the spring semester to get ahead on the system and push for time behind center. Bordner was an all-state player in Maryland who threw for over 2,100 yards as a senior and had 28 total touchdowns (18 passing). Rettig played in the 2010 All-American Under Armour game and was an all-state selection in California who threw for 1,748 yards and 18 scores as a senior.

For the second straight season, BC loses just one starter from the offensive line. This time, it was captain Matt Tennant, who started the last 41 games at center.

The Eagles have options to replace him, however, whether it be Mark Spinney stepping up and taking the job or reshuffling the line to move Thomas Claiborne there. No matter how the line looks in the fall, it will be experienced and explosive.

The O-line is opening holes for Montel Harris, who emerged as one of the best backs in the country last season. Harris had the fourth-most carries in the country (308) and the 10th-most rushing yards (1,457) and he recorded eight 100-yard games. The Eagles also ranked 39th in the country in sacks allowed (1.54).

Chris Pantale started every game at tight end last fall and he caught 25 passes for 223 yards and a touchdown. His passes and yards were third and fourth, respectively, among receivers.

Lars Anderson spent last season as the F-back in a revamped offense, utilized mostly for his blocking. He caught eight passes for 102 yards and a touchdown on the year. Jordon McMichael caught four passes off the bench, including a highlight reel touchdown grab against Wake Forest.

Colin Larmond, Jr. will step into the spotlight as the go-to receiver. Larmond was second on the team with 29 catches, 596 yards, five touchdowns and a 45.8 yards per game average. He had four of BC's five longest receptions of the year.

Other young talent will have to prove themselves between the lines including Clyde Lee and Johnathan Coleman while older players like Billy Flutie and Ryan Lindsey could make an important impact.

Harris was named a SI.com All-America honorable mention and an All-ACC second-team performer after ranking second in the conference and 18th in the nation in rushing.

Rolandan Finch proved himself as an efficient backup before he lost the second half of the season to mono. He carried the ball 28 times on the season for 134 yards.

FB James McCluskey should be completely healthy for his senior season after battling back from a torn Achilles' he suffered last spring.

The Eagles will have to replace two steady performers on the defensive line after Austin Giles and Jim Ramella graduated, but have the pieces to do so. Alex Albright and Brad Newman shared time starting at the left end spot and Newman could play either tackle or replace Ramella at the right end spot.

Kaleb Ramsey has been riddled by injuries in his first two seasons. If he can stay healthy, he would most likely see a lot of time on the line. Max Holloway could also break into the starting lineup in the spring.

Albright, Newman and Damik Scafe will see a bulk of the action, though. Albright had 32 tackles and eight for a loss which was second on the team. Newman led all defensive linemen with 45 tackles and Scafe recorded 35 tackles with 6.5 TFLS and two sacks.

The stars of the defensive side of the ball should be the linebackers. BC lost one of its most consistent performers in captain Mike McLaughlin, but the possible return of Mark Herzlich could soften that blow. Couple that with breakout star Luke Kuechly and another returning starter in Mike Morrissey, and the Eagles could have one of the best units in the country.

Herzlich was diagnosed with Ewing's sarcoma, a rare form of bone cancer, in mid-May. His story touched the country and on ESPN College GameDay October 3, he announced he was cancer-free. Herzlich then had a metal rod inserted into right leg on November 23 to strengthen the bone and he will use spring ball to get back into playing shape while not participating in hitting drills.

Herzlich's absence was filled by the true freshman Kuechly, who came out of nowhere to become one of the best backers in the league. He was the ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year and an All-ACC first-team performer and also garnered numerous All-America honors. Kuechly's 12.15 tackles per game was the highest average by any rookie since the NCAA began tracking tackles in 2003.

Morrissey, a walk-on who gained a scholarship through his hard work in 2008, won the starting spot at the same linebacker slot midway through the season. He finished the year with 37 tackles and seven tackles for a loss.

The first unit of linebackers is stacked, but so is the second. Darius Bagan, Nick Clancy, Alexander DiSanzo, Dominick LeGrande, Will Thompson and Dan Williams have all spent time on the field. They combined for 107 tackles last year.

Gause has been a mainstay at corner since arriving on campus in 2007. He has started 23 games in his career. Fletcher has played in all 27 games since his true freshman campaign in 2008 and Johnson played in 12 games last year after playing a bit with Fletcher in 2008.

DAVE BROCK

Tight Ends

Dave Brock is entering his second season on the BC staff. Brock came to BC after serving two years at Kansas State and has 20 years of coaching experience, including six as an offensive coordinator.

In 2009, Brock helped develop tight ends Chris Pantale and Lars Anderson. Pantale had 25 catches for 223 yards and one touchdown while Anderson had eight catches for 102 yards and a TD. Brock was also instrumental in locating and recruiting quarterback Dave Shinskie, who came to BC after a career in professional baseball. Despite being picked to finish last in the ACC's Atlantic Division in preseason media voting, the 2009 Eagles finished with an 8-5 record, came within one win of playing in a third consecutive ACC Championship Game, and played in a bowl game for a school-record 11th consecutive season.

Brock spent the 2008 season as Kansas State's offensive coordinator and wide receivers coach after coaching the wide-outs in 2007. Kansas State ranked 18th nationally in passing (269.6) and 19th in scoring offense (34.9) under Brock's leadership.

A native of Moorestown, N.J., Brock's 20-year coaching career includes stops at North Carolina, Temple, Hofstra, Salisbury State and Western Connecticut State.

As offensive coordinator at Kansas State, Brock spearheaded a Wildcat offense that produced the 2008 Big 12 Offensive Newcomer of the Year in wide receiver Brandon Banks and Kansas State's most prolific passer in school history in quarterback Josh Freeman. Banks set a Wildcat junior record with 67 receptions and 1,049 yards last season, while Freeman became Kansas State's career leader in passing attempts, completions, yards, touchdowns and total offense in 2008.

In 2007, Brock tutored Kansas State's Jordy Nelson, who was a consensus All-American and Biletnikoff Award finalist, as well as Big 12 Offensive Newcomer of the Year Deon Murphy. Nelson, who became the Wildcats' first-ever offensive consensus All-American, ranked second in the nation in receptions (10.2) and receiving yards per game (133.8) en route to setting 11 Kansas State receiving records.

Kansas State, which set school records for passing yards, completions and attempts in a season, also ranked 20th nationally in passing offense (285.4) and 21st in scoring offense (35.2). The Wildcats finished the season with a 3,000-yard passer, a 1,600-yard receiver and a 1,000-yard rusher for the first time in school history.

Prior to Kansas State, Brock spent two years at North Carolina, where he served as the Tar Heels' assistant head coach/recruiting coordinator and wide receivers coach. While at UNC, he tutored two of the top wide receivers in Carolina history in Jarwarski Pollock and Jesse Holley. In 2005, Pollock became the all-time leading receiver at Carolina with 177 catches and Holley led the team with 47 receptions.

In 2006, Brock coached wide receiver Hakeem Nicks to honorable mention freshman All-America honors by The Sporting News as Nicks set UNC freshman records with 39 receptions for 660 yards and four touchdowns.

Prior to North Carolina, Brock was the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for three seasons at Temple, where he directed a spread offense attack that made the Owls' offense one of the most exciting

in the Big East. In 2004, Temple ranked third in the Big East in rushing, generating 173.0 yards on the ground per game. The Owls passed for 2,428 yards – the fourth-most in program history – and averaged 393.7 total yards per game. Quarterback Walter Washington ending the year ranked 11th nationally in total offense, 21st in scoring and as the nation's leader in rushing touchdowns by a QB. In 2003, the Owls threw for 2,697 yards – second-most in team history – and set school records for passing first downs (135) and total plays (859).

Brock served in various roles during seven seasons at Hofstra from 1995 through 2002, including running backs coach (1995), wide receivers coach/recruiting coordinator (1997-99), offensive coordinator (2000-01) and associate head coach (2002).

In 2001, Hofstra posted a 9-3 record and finished the season ranked No. 7 in FCS behind an offense that was second in the nation in total offense (491.0), fourth in passing offense (301.0) and fifth in scoring offense (37.9). In 2000, Hofstra finished the year ranked No. 7 with a 9-4 record and also ranked among the nation's top 20 in scoring offense, passing offense and total offense.

During Brock's last five seasons at Hofstra, the team averaged 35.8 points per game and 446.8 yards of total offense per contest.

Brock played linebacker at Ferrum (Va.) College before earning a bachelor of science degree in political science from Salisbury (Md.) State University. He began his coaching career as an assistant at Salisbury State in 1988, then served as secondary coach/recruiting coordinator at Western Connecticut State from 1991-93. He returned to Salisbury State in 1994 as the secondary coach and recruiting coordinator before joining the coaching staff at Hofstra in 1995.

Brock and his wife, Karen, have three sons - Henry, William, and Richard - and two daughters - Kate and Maggie.



JEFF COMISSIONG

Defensive Line

Defensive Line Coach Jeff Comissiong is beginning his fourth year as a member of the Boston College football staff.

In 2009, Comissiong coached a defensive line that helped the Eagles rank second in the ACC in rushing defense, allowing just 103.2 rushing yards per game. The Eagles also ranked second in the league in red zone defense, third in scoring defense and fourth in total defense. Despite being picked to finish last in the ACC's Atlantic Division in preseason media voting, the 2009 Eagles finished with an 8-5 record, came within one win of playing in a third consecutive ACC Championship Game, and played in a bowl game for a school-record 11th consecutive season.

In 2008, BC's defensive line that was important part of a unit that ranked in the top 10 nationally in seven different categories including interceptions (first, 26), turnovers gained (second, 36), total defense (fifth, 286.14), red zone defense (sixth, .72), rush defense (seventh, 91.2), pass efficiency defense (seventh, 98.81) and first down defense (sixth, 14.71).

In addition, Comissiong developed defensive tackles B.J. Raji and Ron Brace. Raji was named to the Associated Press All-America third team and was selected ninth overall by the Green Bay Packers in the 2009 NFL



Draft. Both players were All-ACC selections and Brace was selected with the 40th overall pick in the second round of the draft by the New England Patriots.

In his first season (2007) on the BC staff, Comissiong coached a line that was part of a defense that ranked second in the nation and led the ACC in rush defense, allowing just 75.5 yards per game. The BC defense also ranked second in the ACC in red zone defense, which allowed opponents to score only 72 percent of the time.

Comissiong was part of a staff that led the Eagles to an 11-3 finish, the first BC team to win 11 games since 1940. The 2007 Eagles began the season 8-0 and were ranked No. 2 in the nation in both major polls. The team won the Atlantic Division of the ACC and went on to win an eighth consecutive bowl game, the longest active bowl game winning streak in America. The Eagles finished 10th in the final AP poll, BC's best finish since the 1984 season.

Comissiong came to Boston College from nearby Harvard University, where he coached in 2006. Before moving to Harvard, Comissiong worked as an assistant at The University of Maine for eight seasons.

Comissiong began his coaching career at Maine in 1996, serving as a defensive line assistant for two seasons. During this stint, Comissiong worked with Boston College Running Backs Coach Ben Sirmans, who was on the Maine staff from 1996 to 1999. From Maine, Comissiong moved on to Bates College, where he coached the defensive line in 1998 and 1999.

Comissiong returned to Maine in 2000, coaching the running backs and then the defensive line. In 2003, Comissiong was also given the duties of recruiting coordinator for the Maine program.

Upon his arrival at Harvard, Comissiong assumed more recruiting duties, overseeing recruitment in New York, New England, and Canada, as well as serving as the program's professional liaison. With Comissiong working with the defensive line, Harvard boasted the stingiest run defense in the Ivy League. The 66.5 YPG allowed was far and away the most impressive mark in the league, as was the 2.0 YPC allowed by the unit.

A four-year letterwinner in football, Comissiong graduated from Maine in 1997. Jeff, and his wife Alison, have two daughters, Jacey and Mya.



MIKE DAWSON
Special Teams

Mike Dawson is entering his second year on the BC staff as special teams coach.

In 2009, Dawson coached place-kicker Steve Aponavicius, who became BC's all-time scoring leader with 290 points. Aponavicius also ranks first all-time in field goal percentage (.734) and extra points made (149) and is second in field goals. The Eagles led the ACC in field goal percentage (.929) and were 39-40 in PAT kicking. Punter Ryan Quigley became an All-ACC honorable mention performer with 11 punts of 50 or more yards. Quigley pinned the opponent inside the 20-yard-line 23 times, which ranked second in the ACC.

Despite being picked to finish last in the ACC's Atlantic Division in preseason media voting, the 2009 Eagles finished with an 8-5 record, came within one win of playing in a third consecutive ACC Championship Game, and played in a bowl game for a school-record 11th consecutive season.

Before coming to BC, Dawson spent three seasons coaching the linebackers at Akron and has a total of 12 years of experience on the sidelines. During his time at Akron, Brion Stokes led the Zips in tackles in 2007, while Kevin Grant was third. Stokes, who ranked among the MAC top 10 in both tackles for loss (14.5) and sacks (5.5), was a second team All-Mid-American Conference pick as he finished his career with 38.5 TFL, second on the Akron all-time list. Grant was a third team All-MAC pick.

Dawson was an assistant at the University of New Hampshire for the previous six years where he served on both sides of the ball, including his final two seasons as defensive coordinator and linebackers coach. He spent his second season at UNH in charge of the offensive line. In 2005, UNH was one of the top-ranked ranked teams in FCS and advanced to the national quarterfinals. Dawson spearheaded one of the top defenses in the country in 2005, as the Wildcats ranked 35th nationally in scoring defense (22.23 ppg) and led the nation in takeaways (45). UNH was also second in the Atlantic 10 in sacks (34) during the 2005 campaign. The Wildcats were co-champions of the A-10 that season for the first time since 1994 and posted a record of 21-5 from 2004-05.

A three-year starter at linebacker and defensive end at the University of Massachusetts, Dawson began his career as a defensive line coach at UMass-Lowell in the spring of 1998. He returned to his alma mater in the spring of 1999 before spending that fall as a graduate assistant at Pittsburgh.

Dawson also gained coaching experience on the defensive side of the ball at the University of Maine from July 1998 through March 1999. He graduated from UMass-Amherst in 1997 with a degree in sports management.

Dawson is married to the former Jodi Walters, who was an all-conference swimmer at UMass-Amherst. The couple has a son, Frankie, born in October of 2007.



RYAN DAY

Wide Receivers

Ryan Day enters his fourth season as the BC wide receivers coach.

In 2009, wide receiver Rich Gunnell broke the BC career receiving yards record against USC in the Emerald Bowl as he finished with 2,459 career yards. He is one of just eight BC players to ever eclipse the 2,000-yard mark. He broke Pete Mitchell's old record and also ranks second in career receptions (181). He ranked seventh in the ACC in receiving yards per game (67.7) and eighth in receptions per game (4.6). Despite being picked to finish last in the ACC's Atlantic Division in preseason media voting, the 2009 Eagles finished with an 8-5 record, came within one win of playing in a third consecutive ACC Championship Game, and played in a bowl game for a school-record 11th consecutive season.

In 2008, Day had two of the most productive wide receivers in the ACC. Brandon Robinson was eighth in the ACC in receiving yards (646) and 10th in yards per game (46.1) and Gunnell was 10th in the conference in receptions per game (3.5) and 11th in receiving yards (551).

Under Day's guidance, Robinson became one of the most prolific receivers in Boston College history. He ranks fourth all-time in receptions with 141 and seventh in yards with 2,023. His two years under Day's guidance, Robinson caught 98 passes for 1,439 yards and eight touchdowns.

2010 SPRING FOOTBALL

In 2007, Day helped develop a receiving corps that caught 390 passes for 4,535 yards and 31 touchdowns as the Eagles amassed 5,924 yards of total offense on the year. The 2007 Eagles began the season 8-0 and were ranked No. 2 in both major polls en route to an 11-3 finish, the most wins for a BC team since 1940. The team played in its first ACC Championship Game and extended the nation's longest active bowl game winning streak to eight games. The Eagles finished 10th in the final AP poll, BC's best finish since the 1984 season.

Prior to joining the Boston College staff, Day spent the 2005 season as offensive graduate assistant at the University of Florida for Urban Meyer. The Gators posted a 9-3 record with Day assisting the offense. Gator wide receiver Chad Jackson was a semifinalist for the Biletnikoff Award, ranking sixth nationally in receptions per game (7.36), while Day was assisting with the offense.

Day arrived in Gainesville after spending the 2003 and 2004 seasons as the offensive graduate assistant at BC. With the Eagles, Day worked with the wide receivers and helped the team to a 9-3 overall record in 2004 and a No. 21 ranking in the final AP and ESPN/USA Today poll after defeating North Carolina, 37-24, in the Continental Tire Bowl. The ranking was the highest for the school since 1993 and senior wide receiver Grant Adams earned All-Big East accolades. In 2003, the Eagles posted an 8-5 overall record and defeated Colorado State, 35-21, in the San Francisco Bowl.

Day was the tight ends coach at his alma mater, the University of New Hampshire, in 2002. A three-year starter at quarterback and team captain as a senior in 2001, Day held four UNH passing records upon graduation, including best passing percentage in a career (59.9, 1997-2001) and touchdown passes in a career (53). His 653 completions rank seventh-best in Atlantic 10 conference history.

Born March 12, 1979, Day is a native of Manchester, NH and is married to Christina. He earned his undergraduate degree in business administration in 2002 before receiving a master's of science in administrative studies at BC in 2004. He was the New Hampshire Gatorade Player of the Year at Manchester Central High School in 1996.

Day and his wife, Christina, have one son, Ryan Jr.



SEAN DEVINE
Offensive Line

Sean Devine enters his second season as the offensive line coach with the Eagles.

In 2009, Devine coached one of the biggest offensive lines in the nation, anchored by center Matt Tennant, who was a Rimington Trophy finalist and All-ACC second-team selection. Offensive tackle Anthony Castonzo was an All-ACC first-team selection and an SI.com All-America honorable mention selection. The Eagle offensive line blocked for running back Montel Harris, who had the fourth-most carries in the country (308) and the 10th-most rushing yards (1,457). The line helped Harris record eight 100-yard games and ranked second in the ACC in sacks against, allowing only 19 in 13 games.

Despite being picked to finish last in the ACC's Atlantic Division in preseason media voting, the 2009 Eagles finished with an 8-5 record, came within one win of playing in a third consecutive ACC Championship Game, and played in a bowl game for a school-record 11th consecutive season.

Prior to coming to BC, Devine spent the previous 13 seasons at New Hampshire and was the offensive coordinator for the last two. In his first seven seasons with the Wildcats, he served as the coach of the defensive line. Before being promoted to offensive coordinator, Devine was the offensive line coach and recruiting coordinator for four seasons.

In his two seasons as offensive coordinator, he led one of the best offenses in the FCS. Last year, UNH ranked eighth nationally in scoring offense (35.62) and passing efficiency (154.81), 19th in total offense (404.23) and 25th in passing offense (243.23).

In Devine's first year as offensive coordinator, his unit averaged 35.8 points and 407.2 yards per contest and was one of the most productive in the nation. Devine mentored one of the top players in the history of FCS football in All-American and Walter Payton Award winning QB Ricky Santos.

In 2006, his offensive line gave up the fewest sacks of any in the Atlantic 10, while also driving the offense to an impressive average of 414 yards per game. In 2005, UNH's line paved the way to 493 yards per contest and 74 touchdowns, both top marks in the Atlantic 10 and second-best in FCS.

Devine also served as the recruiting coordinator for New Hampshire and was responsible for recruiting Northern New Hampshire, Western New York and Western Pennsylvania. Devine had been the defensive line coach at UNH for his first seven seasons.

Devine also coached the defensive line at Colby College from 1994-95. At Colby, he ran the scout team and assisted with strength training and the implementation of the strength program.

A 1994 graduate of Colby College with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Physics, Devine was a four-year starter at outside linebacker. He was captain of the football team in 1993 and was named All-NESCAC and All-ECAC during his senior campaign.

Sean and his wife, Nicole, have a six-year-old daughter, Amelie.



BILL MCGOVERN
Defensive Coordinator/Linebackers

Bill McGovern is entering his 11th season and 14th overall with Boston College. McGovern was promoted to defensive coordinator in 2009 after serving for nine seasons as the Eagles' linebackers coach.

In 2009, faced with the challenge of losing senior linebacker Mike McLaughlin for several games with an Achilles' injury and ACC Defensive Player of the Year Mark Herzlich to cancer treatment, McGovern's defense rose to the occasion. Picked to finish last in the ACC's Atlantic Division in the preseason media poll, the young Eagles overachieved and finished with an 8-5 record and a second-place finish in the division.

The 2009 Eagles ranked second in the ACC in rushing defense, allowing just 103.2 rushing yards per game. The Eagles also ranked second in the league in red zone defense, third in scoring defense and fourth in total defense. True freshman linebacker Luke Kuechly was named ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year after coming out of nowhere to lead the league in tackles and averaging more tackles-per-game than any rookie since the NCAA began tracking the stat in 2003.



In 2008, McGovern coached a linebacking corps that was a key part of a defense that ranked fifth in the country and first in the ACC in total defense, allowing 286.14 yards per game. The BC defense ranked in the top 10 nationally in seven different categories including interceptions (first, 26), turnovers gained (second, 36), total defense (fifth, 286.14), red zone defense (sixth, .72), rush defense (seventh, 91.2), pass efficiency defense (seventh, 98.81) and first downs defense (sixth, 14.71).

McGovern developed Herzlich into one of the top linebackers in the country. In addition to being named ACC Defensive Player of the Year, he was a finalist for the Butkus Award, given annually to the nation's top linebacker. Herzlich was an All-ACC first-team honoree, a three-time conference player of the week, and a quarterfinalist for the Lott Trophy. Herzlich led BC with 81 solo tackles and 110 total stops. He also paced the defense with six interceptions, eight pass break-ups, two forced fumbles, and a pair of fumble recoveries. He was one of only two linebackers in the country to pick off six passes. That number was also the eighth-highest total in the nation (seven were tied with seven). He was one of four linebackers in the country with two interception returns for touchdowns.

In 2007, McGovern oversaw a linebacking corps that included All-ACC second-team selection Jo-Lonn Dunbar and rising stars Herzlich, McLaughlin, Robert Francois and Kevin Akins. Both Dunbar and Herzlich placed within the top 20 of the ACC in total tackles and the BC defense ranked in the top 20 nationally for scoring and total defense. He helped coach a defense that ranked second in the nation and led the ACC in rush defense, allowing just 75.5 yards per game. The BC defense also ranked second in the ACC in red zone defense, keeping opponents from scoring nearly 72 percent of the time.

McGovern was part of a staff that led the Eagles to an 11-3 finish, the first BC team to win 11 games since 1940. The 2007 Eagles began the season 8-0 and were ranked No. 2 in the nation in both major polls. The team won the Atlantic Division of the ACC and went on to win an eighth consecutive bowl game, the longest active bowl game winning streak in America. The Eagles finished 10th in the final AP poll, BC's best finish since the 1984 season.

McGovern came to BC in 2000 after serving as defensive backs coach at Pittsburgh for three seasons. At Pitt, he coached two first-team All-Big East selections (Hank Poteat and Ramon Walker) in 1999. He began his coaching career in 1985 as freshman coach at the University of Pennsylvania. He served as a part-time coach at his alma mater, Holy Cross, from 1986-87 and defensive backs/kickers coach in 1991; defensive backs coach at the University of Massachusetts from 1987-90 and defensive coordinator 1992-93; and defensive backs coach at BC from 1994-96 (and interim defensive coordinator in 1995) before accepting the Pittsburgh position.

McGovern has become known as one of the top recruiters in the Northeast and his linebackers have received numerous ACC and Big East honors. In 2006, in fact, Dunbar was named National Defensive Player of the Week when he scored two of BC's three defensive touchdowns vs. Maryland. Dunbar was also named MVP of the 2006 Meineke Car Care Bowl when he finished with a game-high 14 tackles (10 solos) and a key fumble recovery late in the game that led to a last-second field goal to secure BC's 25-24 win over Navy.

McGovern has coached or recruited notable BC linebackers including Frank Chamberlin, Scott Bradley, Vinny Ciurciu, Josh Ott, Ricky Brown, Ray Henderson and Brian Toal. In 2004, Henderson (two-time Big East Defensive Player of the Week) topped the Big East with .5 interceptions per game (fourth in the nation) and Toal was named Big East Rookie of the Year.

A native of Oradell, N.J., McGovern was a four-year starter at defensive back for Holy Cross before his graduation in 1985. He set a single-season record for interceptions (11) for I-AA and was a consensus first-team All-America (I-AA) selection in 1985. He is a member of the Holy Cross Hall of Fame and has been named to the Bergen County (N.J.) All-Century Team.

McGovern played a key role in recruiting New Jersey linebackers Frank Chamberlin and Gerald Hayes, both of whom went on to play in the NFL.

McGovern has coached in 10 collegiate bowl games, including the 2007 Champs Sports Bowl, the 2006 Meineke Car Care Bowl, the 2005 MPC Computers Bowl, the 2004 Continental Tire Bowl, the 2003 Diamond Walnut San Francisco Bowl, the 2002 Motor City Bowl, the 2001 Music City Bowl, the 2000 Aloha Bowl, the 1994 Aloha Bowl (in his first stint at BC) and the 1997 Liberty Bowl with Pittsburgh.

McGovern lives in Ashland with his wife, Colleen, and daughters Amanda, Delaine and MacKenzie.



MIKE SIRAVO

Recruiting Coordinator, Defensive Backs

Mike Siravo enters his fourth year as the recruiting coordinator and defensive backs coach for the BC football team.

In 2009, Siravo's secondary was a key part of a defense that ranked fourth in the ACC in total defense (327.6 ypg) and third in interceptions (15). In 2008, Siravo coached the secondary that was a key part of a defense that ranked in the top 10 nationally in seven different categories including interceptions (first, 26), turnovers gained (second, 36), total defense (fifth, 286.14), red zone defense (sixth, .72), rush defense (seventh, 91.2), pass efficiency defense (seventh, 98.81) and first downs defense (sixth, 14.71).

Despite being picked to finish last in the ACC's Atlantic Division in preseason media voting, the 2009 Eagles finished with an 8-5 record, came within one win of playing in a third consecutive ACC Championship Game, and played in a bowl game for a school-record 11th consecutive season.

In 2008, Siravo coached the secondary that was a key part of a defense that ranked in the top 10 nationally in seven different categories, including interceptions (first, 26), turnovers gained (second, 36), total defense (fifth, 286.14), red zone defense (sixth, .72), rush defense (seventh, 91.2), pass efficiency defense (seventh, 98.81) and first downs defense (sixth, 14.71). Also in 2008, Siravo helped BC bring in a 29-member recruiting class, the largest entering class in Eagles football history. BC's 26 interceptions that season tied for the most in the country with Florida. In his three seasons guiding the secondary, the Eagles have intercepted 66 passes.

In 2007, Boston College picked off 25 passes, which was one off the national lead. Paul Anderson accounted for six of those interceptions, which was the eighth-highest total in the country (seven were tied for the most with seven). That season, the Eagle defense finished fourth in the ACC in pass defense efficiency and finished third in the league in total defense. Senior free safety Jamie Silva was a consensus All-America first-team selection and was one of three finalists for the 2007 Jim Thorpe Award, which is given to the nation's top defensive back. Silva was MVP of the 2007 Champs Sports bowl, in which he had two interceptions. Siravo also oversaw the emergence of freshman defensive back DeLeon Gause, who earned ACC Player of the Week accolades. Cornerback DeJuan Tribble was named to the All-ACC second team.

2010 SPRING FOOTBALL

Siravo was part of a BC staff that led the team to an 8-0 start and a No. 2 national ranking. The 2007 Eagles eventually finished 11-3, becoming the first BC team to win 11 games since 1940. The team played in the ACC Championship Game for the first time ever, won an eighth consecutive bowl game (longest active streak in college football), and finished the season ranked 10th in the nation, the team's best final poll finish since 1984.

Siravo came to Boston College from Temple University, where he served as recruiting coordinator and linebackers coach last season. At Temple, he was one of four coaches on that staff (Al Golden, Ryan Day, Bob Bicknell) with Boston College ties and heads to BC with seven years of collegiate coaching experience.

Prior to his experience at Temple, Siravo spent the three seasons as linebackers coach and recruiting coordinator at Columbia University. Siravo developed a strong national recruiting system under head coach Bob Shoop. He also helped linebacker Chuck Britton earn All-Ivy honors in 2004.

A former linebacker at Boston College, Siravo joined the Eagles as a walk-on in 1995 and later earned a scholarship. A two-year letterwinner, he played under head coaches Dan Henning and Tom O'Brien. Siravo also excelled off the field, earning Big East All-Academic team honors as a senior.

Siravo remained in Chestnut Hill upon graduation and began his coaching career as a graduate assistant for recruiting in 1998. The Eagles' February 1999 recruiting class was rated the best in school history, ranking 15th nationally according to expert Tom Lemming and featuring future NFL players William Green, Augie Hoffmann, Keith Leavitt and Derrick Knight. Siravo spent the 1999 and 2000 campaigns as Boston College's defensive graduate assistant, working with the secondary and linebackers. The Eagles made two postseason bowl appearances, the 1999 Insight.com Bowl and the 2000 Aloha Bowl.

Born March 9, 1976, Siravo is a native of Pawtucket, R.I. and earned his undergraduate degree in history from Boston College in 1998. He received a master's of science in administrative studies of business from BC in 2000. He is married to the former Alison Cahill, who graduated from BC in 1999 and BC Law School in 2002. Mike and Alison welcomed their first child, William Thomas, during the 2009 season.



BEN SIRMANS

Running Backs

Ben Sirmans returns to the Boston College sideline for his fourth season as running backs coach.

In 2009, Sirmans coached Montel Harris, who recorded eight 100-yard games, the fifth-most in a single season at BC. Harris eclipsed the 2,000-yard mark in his career and ranks 10th in that category. He set the BC sophomore rushing records in yards and attempts and finished the season with five straight 100-yard games. Harris finished second in the ACC in rushing, averaging 112.1 yards per game. Despite being picked to finish last in the ACC's Atlantic Division in preseason media voting, the 2009 Eagles finished with an 8-5 record, came within one win of playing in a third consecutive ACC Championship Game, and played in a bowl game for a school-record 11th consecutive season.

In 2008, Sirmans mentored the second-most prolific true freshman running back tandem in the country in Josh Haden and Harris. The duo combined for 106 yards per game, which was the second-best true freshman total in the country. Harris, who was not offered a scholarship until two weeks

before signing day, exploded onto the scene and became the most productive true freshman tailback ever at BC. He had rookie records with five 100-yard rushing games and a total of 900 yards on the year. Harris finished fifth in the ACC in rushing and third in the ACC in all-purpose yards with 1,479.

In 2007, Sirmans helped running back Andre Callender set a BC single-season record for receptions (76), earning him All-ACC second-team honors. Callender led the ACC in yards from scrimmage (rushing, receiving) and set a single-season ACC record for most pass receptions by a running back.

The 2007 Eagles began the season 8-0 and ranked No. 2 in the country en route to finishing 11-3, the first BC team to win 11 games since 1940. The team played in its first ACC Championship Game and won an eighth consecutive bowl game. The Eagles finished 10th in the final AP poll, BC's best final ranking since 1984.

Sirmans brought 10 years of experience as a coach to the BC program when he joined the BC staff in 2007. He began his college coaching career in 1996 at his alma mater, the University of Maine. From 1996 through 1999, Sirmans worked as running backs coach and recruiting coordinator at Maine. In 1996 and 1997, Sirmans worked with Boston College Defensive Line Coach Jeff Comissiong, who was then an assistant at Maine.

In 2000, Sirmans moved on to Kent State. He coached the running backs for five years, first under current New England Patriots Defensive Coordinator Dean Pees (2000-03), and then under Doug Martin (2004). With Sirmans' assistance, the Kent State offense was notably productive. In 2001 and 2002, the Golden Eagles rolled up 215 yards per game along the ground, finishing 13th and 15th nationally in rushing production those two seasons. In 2004, Kent State scored 30.5 points per game, the second-highest mark in school history.

In 2005, Sirmans joined the staff at Michigan State as running backs coach. That season, the Spartans finished 20th in the nation, rushing for 201.8 yards per game. In 2006, Sirmans coached special teams as well as the running backs.

In his playing days, Sirmans was a running back at Maine under current Iowa Head Coach Kirk Ferentz. His senior year, Sirmans ran for 1,214 yards, earning All-Conference and All-New England honors. He graduated from Maine in 1993 with a degree in physical education, health, and recreation.

A native of East Orange, N.J., Sirmans is married to the former Tia Thompson.





GARY TRANQUILL

Offensive Coordinator

Gary Tranquill is beginning his second season as Boston College's offensive coordinator. He has more than 47 years of college and professional coaching experience.

In 2009, Tranquill had to overcome more obstacles than perhaps any coach in the country. He was coaxed out of retirement by Coach Frank Spaziani, who calls him "one of the best coaches in the country. I have coached with him and against him, and I like coaching with him better. He is the epitome of a teacher. He can coach players, and he can coach coaches. He does it all." When Tranquill took over in the spring, he was faced with the task of finding a starting quarterback among four players who had virtually no experience at all. Further, he faced an offensive line that had four different coaches in three years.

Things went from bad to worse when Dominique Davis – the only quarterback with any experience – was forced to transfer for academic reasons. Tranquill and his staff found and recruited 25-year-old true freshman Dave Shinskie, who had been playing minor league baseball for nearly seven years. Although the offense started slowly at the beginning of the season, Shinskie eventually won the full-time job as the starting signal caller, the offensive line gelled into a solid, cohesive unit, and several individuals excelled. Tranquill is one of the main reasons the Eagles, who were picked to finish last in the ACC's Atlantic Division in the league's preseason media voting, and were predicted to finish 2-10 by one heralded ESPN prognosticator, finished 8-5 and played in a bowl game for the 11th consecutive seasons.

Sophomore running back Montel Harris broke William Green's BC sophomore rushing record and reeled off eight consecutive 100-yard games. Harris earned numerous honors for his performances, including Walter Camp National Offensive Player of the Week, College Football Performance Awards National Player of the Week and ACC Offensive Back of the Week. Senior wide receiver Rich Gunnell broke Pete Mitchell's records to become BC's all-time receiving leader, and place-kicker Steve Aponavicius became BC's all-time scoring leader.

Before coming to BC, Tranquill was most recently the quarterbacks coach of the Rhein Fire in NFL Europe for the 2007 season.

Tranquill's experience as an offensive coordinator spans 14 seasons at five different schools and he was also the head coach at Navy for five years from 1982-86. He has worked with some of the best quarterbacks to come through the Atlantic Coast Conference during his stint at Virginia, including Scott Secules, Shawn Moore and Matt Blundin.

Before his time with the Rhein Fire, Tranquill was the offensive coordinator of the University of North Carolina from 2001-05. In his five years at Carolina, he coached Darian Durant and Ronald Curry, who set numerous passing records at UNC. Durant finished his career with 51 school records, including every major career passing mark. He finished first in career pass attempts, completions, touchdowns, career completion percentage, passing yards and total offense.

Tranquill had his second stint at the University of Virginia as offensive coordinator under George Welsh from 1999-00. He was the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for Nick Saban's Michigan State Spartans from 1995-98. Michigan State averaged 161.5 yards rushing, 220.9 yards passing and 27.6 points per game during his tenure. The Spartans averaged almost 30 points per game in each of his last three seasons there, its top scoring averages of the decade.

During the 1994 season, Tranquill was the offensive coordinator for Frank

Beamer at Virginia Tech. Before his stint with the Hokies, he coached the quarterbacks for the Cleveland Browns under Bill Belichick from 1991-93. In his first season with Cleveland, Bernie Kosar was one of the top quarterbacks in the league.

As Virginia's quarterbacks coach from 1987-90, he helped develop some of the top passers in conference history, including Secules and Moore. Moore was a first-team All-American, the ACC Player of the Year in 1990 and finished fourth in the Heisman Trophy balloting that season.

Tranquill got his start as a defensive coach for his alma mater, Wittenberg University, from 1962-69. He became Ball State's defensive coordinator in 1970 before heading to Bowling Green State to be the defensive coordinator for two years (1971-72). From 1973-76, he coached the quarterbacks and receivers at Navy under George Welsh. Tranquill was named the secondary coach for two seasons (1977-78) under legendary coach Woody Hayes at Ohio State. At West Virginia (1979-81) he spent one season as the defensive coordinator and two seasons as the offensive coordinator. In 1982, Tranquill succeeded his former boss, George Welsh, to become head coach at Navy and coached there for five years.

Tranquill is a 1962 graduate of Wittenberg, where he lettered four years in football and baseball. He was later inducted into Wittenberg's Athletic Hall of Fame in 1986.

Montel Harris scored on a 48-yard run on Boston College's first play from scrimmage, and the Eagles ran away from Northeastern for a 54-0 victory.

Harris ran for 104 yards and three touchdowns - two rushing, one receiving - in the first half. Justin Tuggle and David Shinskie failed to settle the BC quarterback competition: Both had their way with the Football Championship Subdivision Huskies. Tuggle was 3 of 5 for 56 yards, and Shinskie was 7 for 10 for 110 yards.

Billy Flutie, the nephew of BC Heisman Trophy winner Doug Flutie, had his first career touchdown catch, and the Eagles outgained Northeastern in total offense 441-131.

Northeastern quarterback Alex Dulski left with an unspecified injury after a 2-yard run in the second quarter. Matt Carroll replaced him and went 4 of 8 for 28 yards.

It was the second career victory for new BC coach Frank Spaziani, the longtime assistant who was promoted when Jeff Jagodzinski was fired after trolling for NFL jobs. Spaziani was the interim coach for a 2006 bowl game after Tom O'Brien defected to North Carolina State.

Spaziani led the team onto the field from the tunnel. Then, he turned over the yellow towel he traditionally drapes over his shoulders to linebacker Mark Herzlich, the Atlantic Coast Conference defensive player of the year who is sitting out this year after being diagnosed with a rare form of cancer.

The crosstown rivals are familiar foes in February, when they play in the Beanpot with Boston University and Harvard for the area's college hockey bragging rights. What's been a bit of a mismatch on the ice - BC has won 14 Beanpots to four for Northeastern - has been a farce in the football season: BC is now 5-0 against Northeastern, winning by a combined score of 163-30.

After the Huskies' first possession went 3 yards, Ron Conway's punt took a BC bounce and rolled back to the Northeastern 48 before it was finally downed. Harris took the handoff from Tuggle and went left, breaking a couple of tackles near the line before heading to the end zone.

Rich Gunnell returned Northeastern's next punt for 56 yards to the Huskies' 29; five plays later Josh Haden ran it in from the 7 to make it 14-0. After another three-and-out, Shinskie took BC downfield before Harris scored from 4 yards out and it was 21-0 at the end of the first quarter.

The next two BC possessions were the best of the day for the Northeastern defense, which forced BC to punt and kick a field goal. But then Tuggle hit Colin Larmond Jr. for 42 yards to set up another TD, a 6-yard pass to Harris that made it 38-0.

Northeastern started the second half at its own 2 and gave up a safety when Alexander DiSanzo tackled John Griffin in the end zone. It was BC's first safety since 2006.

Backups played much of the way from there.

Boston College quarterbacks Justin Tuggle and Dave Shinskie each threw a first-quarter touchdown to lead the Eagles to a 34-7 win over Kent State.

Tuggle and Shinskie rotated at quarterback in their audition for the starting job. Tuggle finished 6 of 12 for 150 yards. Shinskie was 9-for-16 for 73 yards with one interception.

The Eagles (2-0) posted their second straight lopsided victory after a 54-0 win against Northeastern last week.

Tuggle threw a 6-yard touchdown to Rich Gunnell to give Boston College a 31-0 lead in the third quarter. Gunnell, who finished with six catches for 114 yards, also caught a 21-yard score from Shinskie in the opening quarter.

Kent State backup quarterback Spencer Keith connected with Jon Simpson for a 4-yard score with 2:15 left in the game. The Golden Flashes' (1-1) score spoiled the Eagles' bid for consecutive season-opening shutouts for the first time since 1933.

BC coach Frank Spaziani, a longtime assistant, improved to 3-0. He replaced Jeff Jagodzinski, who was fired after interviewing for an NFL job following last season.

Steve Aponavicius had a pair of field goals.

Kent State running back Eugene Jarvis, who posted his 17th career 100-yard game in last week's win over Coastal Carolina, was held to 17 yards on 10 carries.

The Eagles didn't allow Kent State to cross midfield until early in the fourth quarter, holding the Golden Flashes to until 100 total yards until late in the game.

Kent State finished with 179 total yards; BC gained 336, with 223 coming through the air.

Playing two consecutive series each in BC's first four possessions, Tuggle and Shinskie led the Eagles to a 14-0 lead after one quarter in front of a half-filled, rain-soaked stadium.

Montel Harris' 1-yard TD run made it 21-0 early in the second. The score came one play after Tuggle hit Gunnell with a 44-yard pass down the right sideline.

Aponavicius' 24-yard field capped a 10-play, 24-yard drive to make it 24-0. Shinskie was running the offense during that possession.

Tuggle hit Gunnell with a 6-yard TD pass, capping the Eagles' first possession early in the third quarter. Aponavicius nailed a 33-yard field goal to make it 34-0 midway into the quarter.

Spaziani's first career win came when he coached the Eagles at the 2006 Meineke Car Care Bowl after Tom O'Brien bolted for North Carolina State.

C.J. Spiller had a 77-yard return score, kicker Richard Jackson added a school-record tying six field goals and Clemson's defense bottled up the Eagles in a game that took nearly five hours to finish because of two rain delays.

Spiller, who finished with 219 all-purpose yards, didn't return after the second stoppage. Athletic spokesman Tim Bourret said Spiller hurt his foot, but the injury was not considered serious.

Boston College (2-1, 0-1 Atlantic Coast Conference) ended with 55 yards.

The teams have played tight, dramatic football since the Eagles joined the league in 2005. Two of their four contests were settled in overtime, another put BC in its first ACC title game while last year's Clemson victory started interim coach Dabo Swinney on the path to the permanent job.

This time, the Tigers (2-1, 1-1) ended any drama early.

Spiller broke through the Eagles and cruised to a punt return TD, a first for the Clemson senior. It was the fifth way Spiller has accounted for a score with the Tigers after collecting touchdowns via rush, catch, kickoff return and, last year against Virginia, throwing on a halfback pass.

Spiller has 15 touchdowns of 50 or more yards in his career.

The Tigers' defense took over from there, holding the Eagles to just one first down--and that came by penalty--in the first 43 minutes.

After crisp wins against Northeastern (54-0) and Kent State (34-7) its first two weeks, the Eagles could get little through Clemson's defense.

Montel Harris, the ACC's third-leading rusher at more than 90 yards a game coming in, managed 4 yards on seven first-half carries.

Boston College juggled starting quarterbacks Justin Tuggle and David Shinskie without much effect. When the Eagles jogged off the field at halftime, they had minus 2 yards of offense.

Without comeback king Matt Ryan to lead them, the Eagles had little hope of a rally.

Ryan stung the Tigers on BC's past two visits to Death Valley. He led the Eagles to a 16-13 OT victory in 2005 for the school's first league win since joining the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Two years ago, Ryan threw a 43-yard TD pass to Rich Gunnell late in the game for a 20-17 win that denied Clemson a berth in the ACC title game.

About the only break the Eagles got this trip was when officials halted the game in the third because of lightning near Memorial Stadium.

Boston College got its only points once the game resumed, a 13-yard pass from Tuggle to Justin Jarvis. The Eagles were offsideds on the following onsides kick try.

Officials stopped the game a second time moments later.

The teams returned to a few thousand poncho-clad fans out of the 77,000 who showed up at lunchtime to watch.

Montel Harris broke free up the middle for a 42-yard touchdown run with 4:07 left - his second score of the game - and Boston College recovered after blowing an 18-point lead to beat Florida State 28-21.

Harris finished with a career-high 179 yards on 25 carries for the Eagles (4-1, 2-1 Atlantic Coast Conference). After Boston College stopped the Seminoles (2-3, 0-2) on fourth down with 2:16 left, Harris broke loose for a 39-yard run but then fumbled on the next play.

Boston College's Anthony Castonzo recovered, and Dave Shinskie was able to run out the clock.

Shinskie, a 25-year-old freshman in just his second week as the full-time starter, completed 12 of 21 passes for 203 yards and two touchdowns. Colin Larmond Jr. had five catches for 98 yards.

The Seminoles trailed 21-3 late in the second quarter before Chris Ponder led them to a pair of second-half touchdowns, tying the score 21-all when wide receiver Bert Reed hit Caz Piurowski for the 2-point conversion with 11 minutes left. Jeff Smith fumbled the ensuing kickoff and JaJuan Harley recovered at the Boston College 29, but Dustin Hopkins' 37-yard field goal attempt was wide right.

Taking over at the 20 with 7:02 left, Shinskie bounced back after a hard takedown that injured his left shoulder and survived a sure interception that was dropped by cornerback Greg Reid. A pass interference on a third-and-10 gave the Eagles the ball on the 42, and Harris charged through the line, bounced off one tackler and outraced the secondary.

Ponder took the Seminoles to the Eagles' 27 before overthrowing an open Reed on third-and-10, and then missing on fourth down with a pass that was too short to matter. Ponder, who entered the game as the ACC passing leader, finished 29-for-42 for 345 yards. Richard Goodman caught seven passes for 107 yards, and Reed caught nine for 105 yards.

It was an emotional victory for the Eagles on a day when they were honoring linebacker Mark Herzlich, who is taking the year off for treatment after being diagnosed with Ewing's sarcoma.

Boston College seemed to respond.

The Eagles led 7-3 on Harris' 3-yard touchdown run when Alex Albright sacked Ponder for a 10-yard loss on fourth-and-goal from the 1-yard line. Boston College then pulled away to take a 21-3 lead before a late first-half field goal cut it to 21-6.

Harris also ran for a 3-yard touchdown in the first quarter, spinning free of tacklers and into the end zone to make it 7-3. It was still close when Ponder ran for 5 yards on a fourth-and-1 from the Boston College 35 on the first play of the second quarter. He hit Taiwan Easterling for 27 yards and an offside put it on the 1, before Luke Kuechly stopped Lonnie Pryor on three straight runs.

That left the Seminoles facing a fourth-and-goal from the 1, and Ponder scrambled to the right before he was pulled down by Albright. The Eagles, starting from their 11 instead of their own 1, threw the ball, and on third-and-9 Shinskie hit Larmond Jr. for 62 yards.

Harris ran seven straight times before Rich Gunnell caught a 3-yard touchdown pass to make it 14-3.

Tyrod Taylor, Ryan Williams and No. 5 Virginia Tech's swarming defense made sure the Hokies' regular season losing streak against Boston College ended.

Taylor threw two early touchdown passes, Williams ran for 159 yards and a TD and the Hokies rolled 48-14 against the Eagles on Saturday.

The victory ended a three-game regular season skid by Virginia Tech (5-1, 3-0 Atlantic Coast Conference) against Boston College (4-2, 2-2).

The first pass quarterback David Shinskie threw that was caught was pulled in by Virginia Tech's Rashad Carmichael, and the cornerback returned in 22 yards for a TD that made it 31-0.

Boston College's initial first down came in the third quarter, and Shinskie's first completion came a few plays later, followed quickly by a false start penalty and a sack for a loss of 9 yards.

Williams, the ACC's top rusher, got the Hokies off quickly, carrying on five straight plays for 46 yards on the opening drive, leading to Matt Waldron's 31-yard field goal.

Taylor took over next time, hitting Williams with a 23-yard pass over the middle on third-and-8. Three plays later, on third-and-19, Taylor scrambled behind the line, broke an ankle tackle, then found Danny Coale wide open in the end zone.

Williams set up the next score with a 31-yard run and scored on the next play, and after Boston College benched its whole offense for one series, leading to another punt, the Hokies took over at the Eagles 41. Taylor hit Jarrett Boykin in the end zone on the next play.

It was 24-0 after just over 18 minutes and the Hokies didn't let up.

The Eagles scored with 10:55 left when Michael Marscovetra hit Colin Larmond Jr. with a 48-yard TD pass against backup defenders.

Virginia Tech scored again when Ju-Ju Clayton hit Marcus Davis for an 80-yard touchdown pass on the next play. David Wilson added a 1-yard dive for the Hokies' final touchdown, and Marscovetra hit Lars Anderson on a short TD pass with 33 seconds to go.

Boston College's Montel Harris set two school records with 264 yards rushing and five touchdowns to lead the Eagles to a 52-20 win over North Carolina State.

Ten players previously had four touchdown runs for Boston College, the last was Darnell Campbell in 1993.

Harris set the yardage record with a 9-yarder early in the final quarter, surpassing the previous mark of 253, set by Phil Bennett in 1972. He had one more run before leaving for good.

The Eagles (5-2, 3-2 Atlantic Coast Conference) improved to 5-0 at home this season. NC State (3-4, 2-3) dropped its third straight game following conference losses to Wake Forest and Duke.

BC, which led 24-13 at halftime, broke it open by taking the ball on the first possession of the second half and marching 72 yards in 11 plays, with Harris capping it with a 10-yard TD run.

Harris had 46-yard run to push him over 200 yards and set up his own score, a 1-yarder two plays later, making it 38-13. He added a 29-yard TD run late in the third quarter, improving it to 45-13.

BC quarterback Dave Shinskie threw a 59-yard scoring pass to Colin Larmond Jr. in the first quarter and finished 13 of 25 for 187 yards with two TD passes.

NC State QB Russell Wilson had a 1-yard scoring run and was 23 of 40 for 243 yards with one TD.

The Wolfpack were allowing just 62.8 yards per game on the ground entering the game, but Harris wiped that out on one run early in the game.

On its second series, Boston College went to the "Wildcat" formation and Harris busted through the line and down the right sideline for a 70-yard gain, moving the ball to the 2. He scored on the next play, making it 7-0.

The Eagles used the "Wildcat" with Harris at QB a number of times in the third quarter.

NC State tied it 7-7 on Wilson's 1-yard TD plunge.

BC answered right back when Shinskie hit Larmond Jr. to make it 14-7. Larmond Jr. leaped over cornerback Rashard Smith near the 13-yard line to catch the slightly under-thrown ball before heading to the end zone.

NC State's Josh Czajkowski had field goals of 25 and 32 yards to cut to 14-13.

The Eagles made it 21-13 on Harris' 12-yard TD run late in the second.

BC's Steve Aponavicius kicked a 37-yard field goal as time expired in the first half.

Golden Tate caught 11 passes for 128 yards and two touchdowns to lead Notre Dame to a 20-16 victory over Boston College, ending a six-game losing streak to the Eagles.

Notre Dame (5-2) came up with three interceptions in the second half, the final one with 98 seconds left. The last five games the Fighting Irish had played were decided in the final minute.

The Eagles (4-3) repeatedly burned the Notre Dame defense as Dave Shinskie threw for a season-high 279 yards and a touchdown, but the Irish came up with big plays, including two interceptions by Kyle McCarthy. BC had five turnovers, while the Irish had none.

Jimmy Clausen was 26 of 39 passing for 246 yards for Notre Dame.

It appeared for a while the 25-year-old Shinskie would become the third freshman quarterback to beat the Irish this season, joining Michigan's Tate Forcier and USC's Matt Barkley. While the BC running game struggled again on the road, finishing with 70 yards on 29 carries, Shinskie repeatedly found open receivers. BC looked much better than the team that came into the game with the nation's 106th ranked passing offense, averaging 171 yards a game.

Notre Dame coaches talked during the week about the need for the Irish to cut down on the number of big plays they had been giving up, especially against the pass. Shinskie threw 10 passes of 20 or more yards and had a 15-yard run.

BC had a chance to take control after scoring on its first possession of the first half to take a 16-13 lead, but the Irish defense came up big at key times. First the Irish forced a fumble by Montel Harris at their 1 on BC's second possession of the second half. It was the second lost fumble by Harris, who came into the game with a streak of 356 touches without a fumble.

Then on BC's next possession, McCarthy intercepted a pass by Shinskie at the Notre Dame 23.

McCarthy came up with another interception at the Notre Dame 26 with 4:23 left, that could have sealed the win. But the Irish offense went three-and-out and BC got the ball back at its own 32. On fourth-and-16, Shinskie completed a 28-yard pass to Rich Gunnell, who had 10 catches for 179 yards. On the next play, McCarthy was called for pass interference on a pass to Justin Jarvis.

Two plays later, Irish linebacker Brian Smith made the final interception.

The BC defense contributed as well, tallying a safety in the first quarter and stopping the Irish on a fourth-and-goal from the 1 line early in the fourth quarter.

Boston College took the lead when Shinskie threw a 7-yard TD pass to Gunnell with 4:40 left in the second quarter. The Eagles had been outscored 53-0 at Clemson and at Virginia Tech in the first three quarters.

Former walk-on kicker Steve Aponavicius became Boston College's all-time scoring leader in the Eagles' 31-10 win over Central Michigan.

Montel Harris finished with 136 yards rushing on 27 carries and two 3-yard scoring runs for the Eagles (6-3), who improved to 6-0 at home. BC snapped the Chippewas' (7-2) seven-game winning streak - their best since consecutive seasons with eight-game streaks from 1979-1980.

Aponavicius had an 18-yard field goal and four extra points, giving him 267 total points to surpass place-kicker Brian Lowe's (1986-89) mark of 262.

Dave Shinskie was 18-for-28 passing for 262 yards and a touchdown for the Eagles, who became bowl-eligible for 10th consecutive season.

Central Michigan quarterback Dan LeFevour, who entered fifth in the nation in completion percentage, was 20 of 34 for 152 yards and one interception.

Chippewas backup QB Ryan Radcliff had an 11-yard scoring run in the final minute.

BC linebacker Luke Kuechly had a 28-yard interception return for a score.

The Eagles took the ball on the initial possession of the second half with a stiff breeze at their backs and went 74 yards in seven plays, with Shinskie hitting Rich Gunnell down the middle for a 41-yard scoring strike to make it 14-3. For the first time since a very successful day two weeks ago when Harris ran for school-records 264 yards and five TDs - with a good chunk coming from the Wildcat formation - the Eagles lined up with Harris at QB a couple of times.

After holding Central Michigan to its first three-and-out of the game, the Eagles went in for another score. Shinskie hit Gunnell with a 21-yard toss down the right sideline on the first play.

One play later, Harris caught a short pass and turned it into a 36-yard gain. Three plays later, he scored up the middle.

Aponavicius, a former walk-on, kicked the extra point from the hold of Billy Flutie, nephew of 1984 Heisman Trophy winner Doug Flutie, for the record.

When the next drive stalled at the 1, Aponavicius kicked his field goal, making it 24-3 late in the third quarter.

BC, which had gained just two first downs midway into the second quarter, marched 80 yards in 11 plays to take a 7-3 halftime edge on Harris' 3-yard scoring run in the closing minute of the second quarter. Shinskie was 5 for 6 on the drive for 57 yards.

The Chippewas had taken a 3-0 lead when Andrew Aguila's 34-yard field capped a 13-play, 60-yard drive. LeFevour ran and threw for a combined 57 yards during the possession.

It was the third meeting between the schools, with BC winning all of them.

Dave Shinskie's 1-yard sneak on fourth down gave Boston College the lead and the Eagles handed Virginia its fourth straight loss, 14-10.

The Eagles (7-3, 4-2 Atlantic Coast Conference) kept their hopes alive to win the ACC's Atlantic Division thanks to a 70-yard fourth-quarter drive that included two fourth-down conversions.

Boston College remains a half-game behind Clemson in the division race with two league games remaining. The Tigers have one league game remaining, at Virginia next week, and would clinch the title - and a berth in the ACC title game against Georgia Tech - with a victory.

Virginia (3-7, 2-4) had taken its first lead of the game on Robert Randolph's 38-yard field goal on the last play of the third quarter, but couldn't muster one more big drive.

Shinskie, the 25-year-old freshman who spent six years in the minor leagues as a pitcher before returning to football, showed the poise of a seasoned player on the winning drive.

Facing a first-and-25 from his own 49 after back-to-back penalties, he hit Colin Larmond Jr. for 11 yards and Chris Pantale for 12, setting up a third-and-2. When Virginia stopped Montel Harris for a yard, the Eagles went for it on fourth down, and Harris gained 3 yards.

Shinskie later tried to connect with Rich Gunnell in the end zone, but Chris Cook was called for pass interference on the play, moving the ball to the Cavaliers 7. Three Harris runs later, it was fourth down again, and this time the 6-foot-4 quarterback kept it himself and pushed it in.

Nearly eight minutes remained, but after Virginia was forced to punt, the Eagles took over at their 14 and ran the clock down almost to the 2-minute mark before giving it back.

Jameel Sewell then drove Virginia to the Eagles 12 with 26 seconds left, but they faced fourth-and-1 with no timeouts left. Sewell tried to run it, but was stopped just short.

Earlier, Virginia looked like it might end its losing skid, and in exciting fashion as Chris Cook intercepted a Shinskie pass and returned it 58 yards for the tying touchdown.

The Cavaliers stopped the Eagles, then drove 60 yards to Randolph's field goal.

The Eagles led 7-0 at halftime and could have been up by more. Shinskie led them to the Cavaliers 5 on their opening drive, then threw an interception in the end zone.

Virginia won the field position battle early on, starting drives at its 45 and the Eagles 45, but never threatened until Sewell drove them to the Eagles 32 late in the second quarter. But on a second-and-10 play, he scrambled, ignored the room to run in front of him and threw toward the end zone, where Roderick Rollins intercepted, preserving the halftime lead.

Cam Thomas and Kendric Burney each had defensive touchdowns as North Carolina scored three times in a span of 2 minutes, 19 seconds to open a 21-point lead and hold on to beat Boston College 31-13.

North Carolina (8-3, 4-3 Atlantic Coast Conference) forced six turnovers totaled to win its fourth consecutive game.

Deunta Williams had three interceptions, returning one 39 yards to the BC 6 inch-line with 4:42 left in the game. Ryan Houston ran it in from there for his second touchdown of the game to make it 28-13.

Boston College (7-4, 4-3) had an outside shot at winning the ACC division title, but that disappeared with a flurry of first-quarter turnovers by quarterback Dave Shinskie that helped spot the Tar Heels to a 21-0 lead. The Eagles would have needed to win their last two games and hope Clemson lost to Virginia, which is in last place in the ACC Coastal Division.

Shinskie fumbled away one ball that Thomas returned 20 yards for a touchdown and then, two plays later, threw an interception that Burney ran in from 30 yards out. Shinskie had four interceptions in all; he also fumbled twice more when BC recovered, and another interception was negated by a pass interference call.

Mike Marscovetra relieved him late in the fourth quarter; his first pass was picked off by Melvin Williams.

T.J. Yates threw three interceptions of his own, including one in the end zone when Carolina was still sitting on a 21-13 lead. But Roderick Rollins, who had been called for a late hit that moved the Tar Heels in position to score, outjumped the receiver and kept BC in the game.

Three plays later, Deunta Williams grabbed his third interception of the game.

Montel Harris ran 23 times for 132 yards for BC, becoming the 16th back in school history to reach the 2,000 yard plateau. Rich Gunnell caught six passes for 60 yards and the Eagles' only touchdown and left-footed walk-on Steve Aponavicius, playing his last home game in the stadium where he was discovered, made two field goals to remain perfect for the season.

With bowl scouts in the press box and Boston College looking for just its second perfect home season since 1985, the Eagles couldn't hold onto the ball.

Houston ran for 1 yard to make it 7-0, and the Eagles ran just two plays before Shinskie fumbled when was hit from behind by E.J. Wilson. Thomas, a defensive tackle, picked the bouncing ball up and rumbled the last 20 yards, fighting off Harris near the goal line and scoring his first career touchdown to make it 14-0.

After BC got the ball back, Shinskie ran just one play before Burney cut in front of the receiver and took the interception 30 yards for another TD. It was his third career interception return for a touchdown, a school record.

It was 21-0 before BC got its first, first down, with 5 minutes left in the first quarter. But the Eagles trailed just 21-13 at the half, converting three Carolina turnovers into a pair of field goals and then a 2-yard pass to Gunnell with 1:13 left in the second quarter.

Montel Harris ran for 142 yards, Dave Shinskie threw a 66-yard touchdown pass, and Boston College beat Maryland 19-17 to seal the Terrapins' first 10-loss season.

Steve Aponavicius kicked four field goals for Boston College (8-4, 5-3 Atlantic Coast Conference). But the standout senior was wide right on a 31-yarder, ruining what had been a perfect season. Aponavicius made 37 straight conversions and was 12-for-12 on field goal tries before the third-quarter miss.

He did, however, secure the victory with a 42-yard field goal with 3:59 left -- the Eagles' only points of the second half.

Maryland used a 28-yard touchdown pass from Jamarr Robinson to Torrey Smith to close the lead to 19-17 with 1:34 to go, but Boston College recovered the onside kick.

Harris carried 41 times in his seventh 100-yard game of the year. Next up for the Eagles: An invitation to a bowl game for the 11th consecutive season.

The Terrapins (2-10, 1-7) finished with seven straight losses and a school-record 10 defeats. The skid has raised questions about the job security of coach Ralph Friedgen, who has two years left on a contract that pays him \$2 million annually.

Maryland was penalized eight times for 65 yards and managed only 61 yards rushing.

Aponavicius kicked three field goals in the first half, including two in the final 4 minutes, to help Boston College take a 16-10 lead.

Starting at quarterback for Maryland after being sidelined for two weeks with a knee injury, senior Chris Turner began his final college game by directing a 66-yard drive that produced a field goal.

But Turner was roughed up on the next two possessions, failed to get a first down and was replaced by Robinson. Turner did, however, play most of the second half and finished 11 for 17 for 101 yards.

The Eagles gained 119 yards in the first quarter in going up 10-3. After Shinskie and Colin Larmond hooked up on a third-and-17 for a 66-yard touchdown-- BC's longest pass play of the season--Aponavicius kicked a field goal on BC's next drive.

Maryland pulled even behind Robinson, who went 4 for 4 for 50 yards in a march that ended with a 3-yard TD run by Da'Rel Scott.

Southern California ended a disappointing season with a bowl win that the Trojans hope will vault them into a more successful 2010.

Matt Barkley threw touchdown passes to Stanley Havili on Southern California's first two possessions and added a touchdown run in the fourth quarter to help the Trojans beat Boston College 24-13 in the Emerald Bowl on Saturday night.

The victory was far from impressive but it did put a positive ending on the worst season at USC (9-4) since Pete Carroll's first back in 2001. The Trojans lost three of their final five regular-season games to fall out of the national rankings for the first time since that year.

That left USC in an unfamiliar bowl setting after making it to the Bowl Championship Series the past seven years, including four straight Rose Bowl bids. But the Trojans made the most of it, handing Boston College (8-5) its second straight bowl loss after an eight-year bowl winning streak.

Damian Williams caught 12 passes for 189 yards in what could be his final game for the Trojans, grabbing long passes to set up Havili's second score and Barkley's 1-yard sneak that gave USC a 24-13 lead with 11:53 remaining. Williams will decide in the next few days whether to skip his senior season to enter the NFL draft.

The Eagles stayed close with the Trojans for most of the game before Dave Shinskie threw an interception to Shareece Wright early in the fourth quarter. On the next play, Barkley connected on a 48-yard pass to Williams, who made a leaping grab between three defenders. Barkley scored on the next play.

The Trojans won despite playing without leading rusher Joe McKnight, who was not cleared to play as the school investigates whether he violated rules by using an SUV that doesn't belong to him. McKnight is USC's first 1,000-yard rusher since 2005, with 1,014 yards on 6.2 yards per carry and eight touchdowns.

USC struggled on the ground without McKnight but was able to move the ball consistently through the air as Barkley often found receivers on slant patterns. Barkley was 27 of 37 for 350 yards in the second 300-yard game of his freshman season. He also threw two interceptions that allowed Boston College to stay close until the fourth quarter.

The Trojans got a fast start by scoring touchdowns on their two possessions with passes from Barkley to Havili to go up 14-0. But USC didn't score again in the half, with Barkley throwing an interception deep in BC territory to end one potential scoring drive.

The Eagles got right back into the game with a 7-yard run by Montel Harris. Steve Aponavicius hit the upright on the extra point attempt, ending a streak of 81 straight makes since late in the 2007 season.

BC got help from a big mistake by USC to get another score late in the half. Michael Morgan was called for pass interference on a third-and-21 toss to Chris Pantale that went only 2 yards. But the infraction gave the Eagles an automatic first down and Shinskie connected with Rich Gunnell on a 61-yard TD pass on the next play to make it 14-13.

Gunnell finished with six catches for 130 yards, breaking Pete Mitchell's school record for yards receiving with 2,659 in his career.
