BC AND NEVADA MEET IN KRAFT FIGHT HUNGER BOWL

- Boston College and Nevada will meet for the first time when the two programs play in the first Kraft Fight Hunger Bowl January 9, 2011.
- The game will be televised nationally by ESPN.
- Boston College (7-5, 4-4 ACC) finished the regular season by winning its last five games.
- Nevada (12-1, 7-1 WAC) shared the Western Athletic Conference title with Boise State and its only loss came at Hawaii October 16.

BOWL NOTES

- The Eagles finished the regular season 7-5 after closing out the year with five straight wins.
- Boston College has been to bowl games in each of the last 12 seasons which is the seventh-longest streak in the country.
- BC owned the nation's longest winning streak in bowl games (eight) from 2000-07 until it lost in the Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowl in 2008 against Vanderbilt, 16-14.
- The Eagles have lost their last two bowl outings, falling to USC in the Emerald Bowl last year, 24-13, at AT&T Park in San Francisco.
- Last season's Emerald Bowl was the third-most watched bowl game in ESPN history.
- BC is 13-8 all-time in bowl games.

KUECHLY IS CONSENSUS ALL-AMERICAN

- Sophomore LB **Luke Kuechly**, who averages an FBS best 14.25 tackles per game, became Boston College's 11th Consensus First-Team All-American this season.
- Kuechly was named to the FWAA, AFCA, Walter Camp and AP All-America first teams.
- He is the first Consensus First-Team All-American at BC since Jamie Silva in 2007.
- Kuechly, who was the runner-up for the Butkus Award and a finalist for the Bronko Nagurski Trophy, leads the nation in tackles (171) and solo stops (102).
- In addition to Kuechly and Silva, BC's previous Consensus First-Team All-America selections include Luke Urban (1920), Gene Goodreault (1940), Mike Holovak (1942), Doug Flutie and Tony Thurman (1984), Mike Ruth (1985), Pete Mitchell (1994), Mike Cloud (1998) and William Green (2001).

SOMETHING'S GOTTA GIVE

- The Kraft Fight Hunger Bowl will feature the nation's top rushing defense vs. the third-best ground attack in the country.
- Boston College is allowing just 80.17 yards per game on the ground.
- The Eagles have allowed just one 100-yard rusher the last two seasons. Virginia Tech's Ryan Williams reached that number on October 10, 2009.
- BC has allowed the fewest 100-yard rushers in the country since 2005. Only eight players have been able to rack up that many yards in the last five seasons.
- Nevada enters the bowl averaging 305.92 yards per game on the ground.
- RB Vai Taua ranks sixth in the nation, averaging 127.83 yards per game while QB Colin Kaepernick ranks 34th with 91.08 yards per outing.
- The duo has combined for 39 rushing touchdowns this season and holds the NCAA record for the most touchdowns and points scored by teammates in a career.



FRANK SPAZIANI

GREGORY P. BARBER & FAMILY HEAD FOOTBALL COACH SECOND SEASON

Known simply as "Coach Spaz" by his players, friends and fans, Spaziani was named head football coach in January, 2009.

He waited his turn. He got his shot. And if his first season as head coach of the Eagles is any indication, it was well worth the wait.

Never forsaking his modest, hard-working, blue-collar roots, Frank Spaziani served as the loyal soldier for so many years before getting the opportunity to take center stage in 2009. When he was named head football coach at Boston College, the room was filled not only with media, but with family and friends from the Athletics Department who were thrilled to see their humble and dry-witted friend, simply known as "Spaz," be rewarded for a career of loyalty and dedication.

The son of first-generation Italian-Americans Joseph and Regina Spaziani grew up in Clark, N.J., and never forgot his roots. The values of hard work, toughness, dedication, humility, loyalty and honesty he learned as a boy have formed the foundation for his coaching philosophy.

Although some New Englanders may consider Spaziani loyal to a fault – he is, after all, a devout and lifelong New York Yankees fan – few would fault a man for remaining true to his roots, especially when those values keep him grounded in a time of over-inflated salaries and egos in the football coaching world. His seriousness is balanced with a notorious sense of humor – he's been known to crack a joke or two. When asked at the Emerald Bowl press conference for his reaction when he heard the Eagles would be playing USC, he quipped, "The good news was we got the bowl bid; the bad news was that we got Southern Cal. That's like your mother-in-law driving off a cliff in your brand new Cadillac Escalade."

Each Thursday when he meets with beat writers to discuss the upcoming game, he's likely to start the conversation with baseball talk while the soundtrack of the hit Broadway show "Jersey Boys" plays in the background. But he knows when to get serious – and people know when he means business.

This Jersey boy would become the last player recruited to Penn State by a young assistant named Joe Paterno, who went on to become the head coach the next year. Talented in baseball as well, Spaziani was originally recruited as a quarterback but eventually became a defensive end and a team captain before serving as a graduate assistant for Paterno.

"He could be good at anything," Paterno said. "If he had gone into business, he'd be the president of the corporation. He's not afraid to work, and he's not afraid to make decisions."

His first season as head coach at Boston College required more than a few tough decisions. Although he hit the ground running, but there were more than few bumps in the road along the way. Senior linebacker and returning co-captain Mike McLaughlin tore his Achilles' tendon during a routine drill in the spring and was out indefinitely. In May, the entire program was dealt a devastating and sobering blow when its star player, linebacker Mark Herzlich, discovered he had cancer and would be unable to suit up for the 2009 season. The Eagles then lost the only quarterback with any playing experience, leaving the cupboard bare in the team's most important position.

By mid-summer, expectations were low; at the ACC's Operation Football in July, the league's media predicted the Eagles would finish dead last in the Atlantic Division. But a funny thing happened on the way to the cellar – the team overachieved. It finished with an 8-5 record, tied for second in the ACC Atlantic Division, and played in its 11th straight bowl game, giving national power USC all it could handle in the third-most-watched bowl game ever televised on ESPN.

Along the way, milestones were achieved and some young superstars emerged. True freshman linebacker Luke Kuechly was named ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year after coming out of nowhere to lead the league in tackles and averaging more tackles-per-game than any rookie since the NCAA began tracking the stat in 2003. Sophomore running back Montel Harris recorded eight 100-yard games and set the BC sophomore rushing record. Senior wide receiver Rich Gunnell and place-kicker Steve Aponavicius added their names to the record books.

McLaughlin battled to get back onto the playing field, and Dave Shinskie, the 25-year-old true freshman quarterback who came to BC after playing professional baseball, proved to be a consistent starter by season's end. Off the field, Herzlich waged a very public battle against cancer – and won. And the Eagles continued their proud tradition of achieving in the classroom, becoming one of only six FBS programs in the country to receive a Graduation Success Rate score of 90 or better.

"What we accomplished," Spaziani said, "where we started, all the potholes, all the situations, all the things we had to overcome, it was a testament to the kids and they should be very proud of what they did. To start with no quarterbacks who ever played in a game, no linebackers who ever played in a game, new staff, new coaches, new everything, to finish 8-5 is an accomplishment we should be proud of."

The 2010 season will mark Spaziani's 14th year on the BC coaching staff, having spent his first two seasons as the Eagles' running backs coach before serving as defensive coordinator for 10 seasons. Spaziani's reputation as an outstanding coach, in fact, was built upon a decade of producing one of the toughest defenses in college football. In 2008, the Eagles ranked in the top 10 in the nation in seven defensive categories, including interceptions (first, 26); turnovers gained (second, 36); total defense (fifth, 268.14 ypg.); red zone defense (sixth, 72%); first downs allowed (sixth, 14.71 pg.); rushing defense (seventh, 91.2 ypg.), and pass efficiency defense (98.81). The Eagles advanced to the ACC Championship Game for the second consecutive season. In addition, Herzlich was named ACC Defensive Player of the Year.

In 2007 Spaziani's defense ranked second in the nation and led the ACC in rushing defense, allowing just 75.5 yards per game. The BC defense also ranked second in the ACC in red zone defense, keeping opponents from scoring nearly 72 percent of the time. Senior free safety Jamie Silva was a consensus All-America first-team selection and was one of three finalists for the 2007 Jim Thorpe Award, which is given to the nation's top defensive back. Silva was MVP of the 2007 Champs Sports bowl, in which he had two interceptions. Spaziani was part of a staff that led the Eagles to an 11-3 finish, the first BC team to win 11 games since 1940. The 2007 Eagles began the season 8-0 and were ranked No. 2 in the nation in both major polls. The team won the Atlantic Division of the ACC and went on to win an eighth consecutive bowl game, the longest active bowl game winning streak

in America. The Eagles finished 10th in the final AP poll, BC's best finish since the 1984 season.

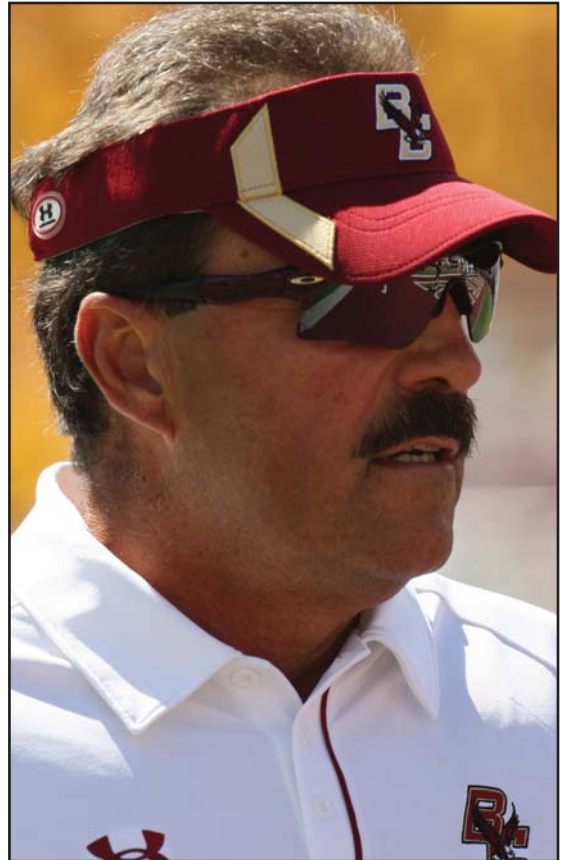
Spaziani was credited with BC's 25-24 win over Navy in the 2006 Meineke Car Care Bowl as he served as Interim Head Coach following the departure of Tom O'Brien. In 2006, Boston College led the ACC with five defensive touchdowns. The Eagles were third in the ACC in scoring defense and Jo-Lonn Dunbar was named National Defensive Player of the Week when he scored two of BC's three defensive touchdowns vs. Maryland. In 2005, BC led the ACC in rushing defense (90.8 ypg.) and red zone defense (25-39, 64.1%) and was third in scoring defense (15.9 ypg.). The 2004 Eagles were ranked in the top 10 nationally in scoring defense, top 20 in rushing defense and top 25 in pass efficiency defense. In 2003 BC was ranked second in the Big East in total defense and rushing defense. During the 2002 season, the Eagle defense was ranked 13th nationally in passing defense, 25th in pass efficiency defense, 23rd in scoring defense and 37th in total defense.

Spaziani joined the BC coaching staff after three seasons with the Calgary Stampeders of the Canadian Football League. During his coaching tenure at Calgary, he served two seasons as the defensive coordinator. Prior to his coaching stint at Calgary, he served as the defensive coordinator for two years with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers. Spaziani spent nine years as a member of the Virginia coaching staff, where he was defensive coordinator for his last five seasons in Charlottesville, after having been defensive backs coach for the first four.

Spaziani has been a member of coaching staffs for teams that have reached 21 bowl games, including the 2009 Emerald Bowl, the 2008 Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowl, the 2007 Champs Sports Bowl, the 2006 Meineke Car Care Bowl, the 2005 MPC Computers Bowl, the 2004 Continental Tire Bowl, the 2003 Diamond Walnut San Francisco Bowl (BC), the 2002 Motor City Bowl (BC), the 2001 Music City Bowl (BC), the 2000 Aloha Bowl (BC), the 1999 Insight.com Bowl (BC), the 1990 Sugar Bowl (Virginia), the 1989 Citrus Bowl (Virginia), the 1987 All-American Bowl (Virginia), the 1984 Peach Bowl (Virginia), the 1981 Liberty Bowl (Navy) and the 1980 Garden State Bowl and 1978 Holiday Bowl (Navy).

Spaziani is a 1969 graduate of Penn State, where he was a star defensive end on the Nittany Lions teams that tied Florida State in the 1967 Gator Bowl and defeated Kansas in the 1969 Orange Bowl. He began his coaching career in 1969 as a graduate assistant to Joe Paterno at Penn State. After three years as an assistant high school coach, he became head coach at Hempstead (N.Y.) High School in 1973, and, a year later, at Raritan (N.J.) High. He joined head coach George Welsh as an offensive assistant at the U.S. Naval Academy in 1975 and went with Welsh from Annapolis to Virginia in 1982.

Frank and his wife, the former Laura Heikel, are the parents of three children, Joseph and twins Avery and Andrew.



COACHING ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- In 2009, the Eagles were picked to finish last in the ACC's Atlantic Division in the preseason. Instead, the team finished with an 8-5 overall record and 5-4 in the ACC, second in the Atlantic Division.
- In 2008, the Eagles ranked in the top 10 in the nation in seven defensive categories, including interceptions (first, 26); turnovers gained (second, 36); total defense (fifth, 268.14 ypg.); red zone defense (sixth, 72%); first downs allowed (sixth, 14.71 pg.); rushing defense (seventh, 91.2 ypg.), and pass efficiency defense (seventh, 98.81).
- In 2007 Spaziani's defense ranked second in the nation and led the ACC in rushing defense, allowing just 75.5 yards per game. The BC defense also ranked second in the ACC in red zone defense.

- In 2004, Boston College's rush defense ranked first in the Big East.
- In 2003, the BC defense ranked second in the Big East in total defense and second in rushing defense.
- In 2002, the BC defense ranked 13th nationally in passing defense, 25th in pass efficiency defense, 23rd in scoring defense and 37th in total defense.
- In 2001, the Boston College defense ranked 12th nationally in passing defense, 10th in pass efficiency defense, 19th in scoring defense and 25th in total defense.
- In 1998, with Spaziani as running backs coach, Boston College's Mike Cloud was a consensus first-team All-America selection and a finalist for the Doak Walker Award.
- Mike Cloud set a BIG EAST and school single-season rushing record with 1,726 yards in 1998.
- As defensive coordinator, led the Winnipeg Blue Bombers to the 1992 and 1993 Grey Cup.
- Led the 1995 Calgary Stampeders to the Grey Cup as defensive coordinator.

TEAM NOTES

THREE EAGLES NAMED TO ALL-ACC TEAM

- Senior LT **Anthony Castonzo**, junior RB **Montel Harris** and sophomore LB **Luke Kuechly** were each named to the 2010 All-ACC first team.
- Senior OG **Thomas Claiborne** received honorable mention accolades.
- Voting is conducted by the Atlantic Coast Conference Sports Media Association.
- Harris, whose 100-yard rushing performances elevated the Eagles from a five-game midseason losing streak to a five-game winning run to end the regular season, was the only player named to the first team on all 61 ballots.
- Castonzo, who tied a Boston College school record with his 53rd consecutive start at Syracuse, has started every game since his true freshman campaign. The biochemistry major, who hopes to conduct cancer research someday, was honored as a National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete at the NFF's awards dinner in New York City.
- Kuechly leads the nation in tackles (171, 14.25 per game) and solo tackles (102, 8.50 per game) and is a part of a Boston College defense that is best in the nation against the run (80.17 ypg.). He has registered 10 or more tackles in 21 consecutive games, the longest active streak in the nation.

CASTONZO WINS SCANLAN AWARD; KUECHLY VOTED TEAM MVP

- Senior LT **Anthony Castonzo** received the Scanlan Award, the highest honor bestowed upon a Boston College football player, at the team's annual Scanlan Awards Banquet December 5.
- The Scanlan Award is presented to the senior football player who excels on the field, in the classroom and in the community.
- Castonzo was named one of the team captains for the 2010 season and anchors the offensive line that has helped RB Montel Harris become the ACC's leading rusher.
- Sophomore LB **Luke Kuechly** was voted the 2010 Most Valuable Player by his teammates. He is the only BC player to record 300 tackles in his first two seasons, doing so in his 23rd game.
- Other award winners included **Alex Albright** (Gridiron Club Award); **Rich Lapham** and **Brad Newman** (Unsung Hero Award); **Mark Herzlich** (Coaches' Award); **James McCluskey** and **Wes Davis** (Paul Cavanagh Award); **DeLeon Gause** (Jay McGillis Scholarship Award); **Billy Flutie** (Special Teams Award); **Dominic Appiah** and **Tahj Kimble** (Scout Team Award).

THE MAGIC NUMBER

- Fifteen seems to be the number that the Boston College offense needs to get to in order to win a bowl game.
- Dating back to 2000, the Eagles are 8-0 in bowl games when they score 15 or more points. Their lone losses in the decade came the last two seasons when they failed to reach that number - a 16-14 loss to Vanderbilt in 2008 and a 24-13 loss to USC last season.
- It is no coincidence that current head coach **Frank Spaziani** began his post as defensive coordinator in the 1999 season.
- The Eagles have allowed an average of 20.9 points per contest in bowl games since 2000.
- BC is 1-3 in bowl games that it does not reach 15 points.

A PROGRAM FIRST

- Boston College experienced its first five-game losing streak since 1998, but rebounded to win the last five outings to become bowl eligible.
- It is the first time in program history that the Eagles have won five in a row after dropping five games in the same season.
- It is also just the fifth time in ACC history that a team won four games in a row after losing four straight.
- The last team to do it was NC State in 2008.

ONE OF THE DECADE'S BEST

- Entering this season, Boston College had gone 88-40 from 2000-09. That is the 16th-best winning percentage in the nation during that span. The Eagles are now 95-45.
- Only Virginia Tech (109-34) and Miami (100-37) have been better since 2000 within the current Atlantic Coast Conference configuration.
- The Eagles have been the best team in the Northeast since 2000. The closest team to BC in winning percentage is Pittsburgh with a 80-54 mark.
- Connecticut is second to the Eagles for a New England team with a 69-62 record.

EAGLES ARE ATLANTIC BEST SINCE 2005

- Boston College holds the third-best conference record in the ACC since it joined the league in 2005 behind Virginia Tech and Georgia Tech of the Coastal Division.
- The Eagles are 30-18 in the conference while the Yellow Jackets are two games better at 32-16.
- Virginia Tech, with a 39-9 ACC mark, has set the standard for the ACC since 2005.
- BC holds a two-game lead over Clemson in the Atlantic Division.
- Boston College's 54 overall wins since 2005 is nine behind Virginia Tech for the most in the ACC since 2005.

FRESH LOOK

- There were a total of 25 players who were either freshmen or sophomores on the two-deep in the September 4 opener.
- Included in that number were 13 freshmen.
- Four freshmen have earned starts this year - WR **Johnathan Coleman**, LB **Kevin Pierre-Louis**, QB **Chase Rettig** and WR **Bobby Swigert**.
- Pierre-Louis, Rettig and Swigert are all true freshmen.
- Coleman has caught nine passes for 185 yards. Pierre-Louis is second on the defense with 26 tackles and 19 solo stops.
- The number had been steady at 23 freshmen and sophomores the next three games before increasing to 24 at NC State.
- That number reached 26 in the two-deep at Florida State.
- A season-high 29 freshmen and sophomores were listed for Clemson and Wake Forest.

PLETHORA OF EXPERIENCE

- The Eagles have two of the most experienced coordinators in college football in offensive coordinator **Gary Tranquill** and defensive coordinator **Bill McGovern**.
- Tranquill has 47 years of both collegiate and professional coaching experience which is the third most in the country behind Penn State's Joe Paterno and Florida Atlantic's Howard Schnellenberger.
- Combine that with McGovern's 24 years as a coach, and the duo's 71 years of combined coaching experience is the third most in the nation. Only Iowa's Norm Parker and Ken O'Keefe (78 years) and Miami's (OH) Morris Watts and Carl "Bull" Reese (81 years) have more experience on the sidelines.
- Tranquill is also the sixth-oldest active coach in the country at 70 years old.

THE ALUMNI ADVANTAGE

- Boston College has called Alumni Stadium home since 1915 and the current version has stood since 1995. Alumni Stadium moved to its current location in 1957.
- The Eagles are 65-31 since 1995 in Chestnut Hill.
- Since joining the Atlantic Coast Conference in 2005, BC is an impressive 33-8 at Alumni Stadium.
- Boston College is also 18-6 in ACC home games.

THAT WAS FAST

- Boston College got on the scoreboard very early at Wake Forest - 32 seconds into the game.
- The Eagles actually won the toss and deferred, but sophomore LB **Luke Kuechly** intercepted a pass on the first play from scrimmage. The offense started on the Wake Forest 35 yard line.
- After a nine-yard completion, junior RB **Montel Harris** broke through for a 26-yard touchdown run with 14:28 on the clock.
- It was the second fastest touchdown that BC has scored since joining the ACC in 2005.
- L.V. Whitworth scored 22 seconds into the game against Ball State on October 1, 2005 with a 14-yard run.

- Boston College has developed a nice pipeline between The Heights and St. Xavier in Cincinnati.
- Senior DE **Alex Albright** and sophomore LB **Luke Kuechly** both graduated from the Cincinnati high school and brought their talents to Chestnut Hill.
- The Eagles have strong ties in the entire state of Ohio as well.
- Sophomore LS **Sean Flaherty**, junior CB **Donnie Fletcher**, redshirt freshman K **Nate Freese**, freshman K **Rob Leonard** and freshman WR **Bobby Swigert** all hail from the Buckeye State.

THE CAPTAINS

- Seniors **Alex Albright**, **Anthony Castonzo**, **Wes Davis** and **James McCluskey** have been elected team captains for the 2010 season.
- Albright had been all over the field this year with 25 tackles (16 solo), an interception, two pass break-ups and a team-best nine tackles for a loss. He missed the last five games with a broken leg.
- Castonzo, regarded as one of the top left tackles in the country this season, is a Walter Camp All-American and an All-ACC first team honoree.
- Davis is fifth on the team with 36 tackles (26 solo) and he picked off a pass against Kent State. He decided to end his season and career after suffering a second neck injury against Maryland.
- McCluskey appeared in eight games at fullback last year after recovering from a torn Achilles' tendon in the spring. He is the Eagles' starting fullback this year.

EAGLES LEAD NATION IN GSR PERFECT SCORES... AGAIN

- Twenty-one Boston College sports teams received a perfect Graduation Success Rate score of 100, according to data released by the NCAA October 27. That figure represents the most teams with a perfect 100 score of any Division I intercollegiate athletics program in the country for the second consecutive year.
- In addition, BC football - with a score of 90 - was one of only six FBS programs in the country to receive a score of 90 or better.
- The 21 Boston College teams that recorded a perfect GSR score of 100 included baseball, fencing, golf, skiing, sailing, swimming and tennis along with women's basketball, cross country/track, rowing, fencing, field hockey, golf, ice hockey, lacrosse, sailing, skiing, soccer, softball, swimming and volleyball.
- The NCAA developed the Graduation Success Rate as part of its academic reform initiative to more accurately assess the academic success of student-athletes. The rate holds institutions accountable for transfer students, unlike the federal graduation rate. The Graduation Success Rate also accounts for midyear enrollees and is calculated for every sport.
- The most recent Division I Graduation Success Rates are based on the four entering freshmen classes from 2000-01 through 2003-04. This year marks the ninth year that Graduation Success Rate data have been collected. The NCAA began collecting GSR data with the entering freshman class of 1995. The latest entering class for which data are available is 2003.

PRO CONNECTIONS

- There are quite a few connections between BC football and some famous athletes.
- Senior WR **Billy Flutie** has the most recognizable name in Eagles football history. Doug, BC's only Heisman Trophy winner, is his uncle.
- Sophomore DE **Max Holloway** has a couple of connections to Boston, despite hailing from Florida. His father, Brian, played 10 seasons in the NFL with the Patriots and Raiders. Also, his maternal grandfather, Johnny McKenzie, played 19 seasons in the NHL, winning two Stanley Cups with the Boston Bruins.
- Senior CB **Chris Fox's** father, Tim, was an All-American at Ohio State under Woody Hayes and played 10 years in the NFL with the Patriots, Chargers and Rams.
- Senior LB **Mike Morrissey's** father played nine seasons in the NFL with Chicago and Green Bay. Jim was a member of the Bears team that won Super Bowl XX following the 1985 NFL season. He was also a member of the "Shuffling Crew" in the video The Super Bowl Shuffle.
- Sophomore WR **Hampton Hughes'** father played for six years with the Dallas Cowboys.

UNDER ARMOUR IS NEW APPAREL SPONSOR

- Under Armour, Inc. became the official outfitter of Boston College Athletics in July, 2010.
- The six-year, multi-million dollar agreement gives Under Armour the right to provide uniforms, apparel and footwear to each of the Eagles' 31 varsity sports, including football, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's ice hockey and field hockey. The department-wide outfitter agreement also includes an annual Under Armour product allowance as well as a rights fee, marketing entitlements, event tickets, and retail licensing rights.
- Under Armour, the originators of performance apparel, has transitioned athletes into moisture-wicking apparel since 1996. Under Armour products are sold worldwide and worn by athletes at all levels, from youth to professional, on playing fields around the globe.

OFFENSIVE NOTES

QB SITUATION SETTLED

- Head Coach **Frank Spaziani** elected to start true freshman **Chase Rettig** against Notre Dame.
- Rettig began to settle in after throwing a 58-yard touchdown pass to fellow true freshman **Bobby Swigert**, but a hard hit ended with an ankle injury and he was forced to leave the game.
- Rettig missed the NC State game but played the entire way at Florida State.
- Rettig has started eight games and is 5-3 in those contests. He is 86-for-161 on the year for 1,117 yards with six touchdowns and seven interceptions.
- Sophomore **Mike Marscovetra**, who was in the mix to start, came off the bench in the Notre Dame game and went 22-for-37 for 193 yards with two interceptions.
- Sophomore **Dave Shinskie** was benched after the Virginia Tech game. He had started the previous 13 games, getting his first start against Wake Forest in 2009. He had an 8-5 record in those starts, including a 5-3 ACC mark.
- He got the call in Rettig's absence at NC State and finished 7-for-24 for 89 yards with a touchdown and two interceptions.

RETTIG BREAKS OUT AT DUKE

- Rettig had one of his most productive games this season as he guided the Eagles to victory at Duke November 13.
- The Sierra Madre, CA product went 12-for-24 while recording career highs with 230 yards and two touchdowns. He did not throw an interception.

126 AWAY

- Junior RB **Montel Harris** became the fourth running back in Boston College history to reach the 3,000-yard mark against Maryland and now he is just 126 yards away from setting the Boston College career rushing record.
- Harris is the first Eagle to eclipse the 3,000-yard plateau in his junior season.
- Derrick Knight, BC's all-time leading rusher, was the last player to gain 3,000 in 2003.
- Troy Stradford previously held the highest mark after three seasons with 2,082 career rushing yards.
- Both Harris and Stradford did not redshirt their freshman years, but Stradford did in 1985 as a senior after only appearing in three games.

MONTEL IS ONE OF THE BEST

- Junior RB **Montel Harris** has emerged as one of the best running backs in the country, as well as one of the toughest.
- Last season, Harris rushed 308 times for 1,457 yards and 14 touchdowns.
- The Jacksonville, FL native ranked second in the ACC and 18th in the country in rushing yards per game. He also had the 10th most net rushing yards in the nation and the fourth most carries.
- He was one of only four players in the nation to carry the ball over 300 times.
- In the season opener, Harris rushed for 115 yards on 19 carries. It was his 14th career and fifth straight 100-yard rushing performance.
- He also rushed for 111 yards against Virginia Tech.
- Harris racked up 191 yards on 26 carries at Florida State. He had 168 yards in the first half.
- Against Maryland, he eclipsed the 3,000 yard mark by rushing for 116 yards and then added 143 more vs. Clemson.
- Harris continued his torrid pace with 183 more yards and three touchdowns at Wake Forest and ran for 109 and a score at Duke.
- Harris scampered for 114 yards and a touchdown before injuring his left knee against Virginia. He was forced to miss the rest of the game and did not play in the regular season finale at Syracuse.
- Harris leads the ACC and is 11th in the country by averaging 113 yards per game.

MONTEL AND THE ACC RECORD BOOK

- Harris has already broken one Atlantic Coast Conference record. He became the most prolific running back in conference history through the first three seasons with 3,600 yards.
- He surpassed North Carolina's Amos Lawrence who had 3,273 yards through his junior year.
- Harris has also recorded 21 100-yard games which is tied for third all-time with Florida State's Warrick Dunn. NC State's Ted Brown, the ACC rushing champion, had 27 such games.
- Harris currently ranks 15th on the all-time ACC rushing list. He passed NC State's Tremayne Stephens and Clemson's C.J. Spiller in his last game against Virginia.

HARRIS' HISTORIC GAME VS. NC STATE

- Harris had arguably the best game by a running back in the country last year when he exploded for record after record against NC State on October 17.
- The black belt in karate set new BC single-game records with 264 rushing yards and five TDs.
- It was the fourth-best rushing day in the FBS last season.
- Harris also tied Jahvid Best of California, Mike Bell of Nevada, Robert Turbin of Utah State and Ricky Dobbs of Navy for the most points in a single game with 30.

WILLIAMS CARRIES THE EAGLES AT SYRACUSE

- True freshman RB **Andre Williams** stepped into the starting role at Syracuse November 27 for the injured Montel Harris and the offense didn't skip a beat.
- Williams was the workhorse for the day, carrying the ball a school record 42 times for 185 yards and a touchdown.
- He topped Harris' previous mark of 41 carries against Maryland in 2009. Fred Willis also rushed 41 times against Pittsburgh in 1970.
- Williams' 42 attempts are the fourth most in a game in the FBS entering the bowl season and it is the most carries by a freshman this year.

CASTONZO LOOKS TO FINISH STRONG

- Senior LT **Anthony Castonzo** was touted as one of the best left tackles in the country entering the season. Mel Kiper listed him as the No. 1 offensive tackle in the preseason.
- He has been named a Walter Camp All-American and an All-ACC first team honoree.
- Last season, he played 650 snaps and only gave up one sack.
- Castonzo was graded as the most productive lineman in seven of the 13 games in 2009 and only missed nine assignments on the year.
- In his last two seasons, he has only allowed two sacks.

RHODES SCHOLAR SMART

- Castonzo, who holds a 3.5 GPA in biochemistry, was nominated for a Rhodes Scholarship by Boston College in April.
- The 6-7, 308 pounder hopes to one day find a cure for cancer, using the money he may earn from his football career in the NFL.
- Castonzo was not selected for the interview portion of the application for the scholarship.
- For his all around work, Castonzo is a finalist for the Lowe's Senior CLASS Award.

MORE ACADEMIC HONORS

- Castonzo was named a 2010 National Football Foundation National Scholar-Athlete and finalist for the William V. Campbell Trophy.
- Each finalist will receive an \$18,000 postgraduate scholarship, with the winner of the trophy having theirs expanded to \$25,000.
- Sixteen finalists were named for the Campbell Trophy and they are among the best and brightest in college football. They were selected from across the country, and are recognized for their accomplishments in the classroom, on the field and in the community. This year's class has a 3.65 average GPA and includes 15 Academic All-Conference Athletes, five All-Americans, a member of a national championship team, and five members working on Postgraduate Studies.

THE RECEIVERS

- With the loss of its two starting wide receivers and five overall from last year, the last thing the Eagles needed was a season-ending knee injury to top returner **Colin Larmond, Jr.** in the preseason.
- Larmond, Jr. led BC in average yards per catch (20.6) and was second in touchdowns (5), receptions (29), yards (596) and average per game (45.8).
- He also accounted for the four longest receptions of the season (66, 62, 59, 57) and three of those were touchdowns.
- True freshman **Bobby Swigert** leads the team with 36 catches, 494 yards and four touchdowns.
- Sophomore TE **Chris Pantale** has 27 receptions for 291 yards and a score.
- Senior **Ifeanyi Momah** has made an impact late in the season and has 19 catches for 296 yards with three touchdowns.

SWIGERT'S COMING OUT PARTY

- True freshman WR **Bobby Swigert** had a great day catching the ball against Notre Dame.
- He caught seven passes for 137 yards and a touchdown. That score was the longest offensive scoring play of the season for the Eagles, a 58-yard reception that came near the end of the first quarter.
- Swigert is the first true freshman in Boston College history to rack up 100 receiving yards in a game.
- He is also just the third freshman to do so. Anthony DiCosmo had a pair of 100 yard games in 1996 while Pete Mitchell had one in 1991. They were both redshirted their first year on campus.
- Swigert's seven catches and 137 yards are both BC freshman records. DiCosmo also had seven catches on October 5, 1996 against West Virginia. He accumulated 123 yards in that game.
- Mitchell had six catches for 100 yards against Georgia Tech in 1991.

TRUE TALENT

- Swigert isn't the only true freshman wide receiver to make an impact this year.
- Boston College has had two different true freshmen record 100-yard games.
- **Alex Amidon** is a speedy receiver who broke out at NC State, a game after Swigert had the best performance ever by a BC freshman wide out.
- Amidon caught three passes for 102 yards at NC State, including a 67-yard touchdown reception in the fourth quarter.
- That was the longest offensive touchdown for BC since Rich Gunnell caught a 68-yard scoring pass from Matt Ryan in the Champs Sports Bowl on December 28, 2007.

COLEMAN'S JOURNEY

- Redshirt freshman WR **Johnathan Coleman** didn't have an easy journey to Chestnut Hill.
- He is a beneficiary of the ABC (A Better Chance) Program in the Bronx that moves gifted, under-privileged inner-city children into suburban, affluent high schools.
- His family moved 10 times in the first 10 years of his life and at one point, they survived on chilled lettuce in a sink.
- After qualifying for the ABC program, Coleman attended Radnor (PA) High School while living in Wayne, senior LB Mark Herzlich's hometown.
- Coleman became a basketball standout at Radnor by his junior year, but football coach Tom Ryan saw his potential for the gridiron.
- Coleman played on the team as a senior, the first time he ever played organized football.
- He was a natural and a quick learner, leading the team in receptions (34), yards (489) and touchdowns (7).
- But, he also excelled in the classroom, earning over a 3.0 GPA.

VETERAN O-LINE

- For the second straight year, BC returned four of the five starters from the previous season.
- The opening day line had an average height of 6-6 and they weighed an average of 313 pounds - a total of 1,563 pounds.
- The only other team that large up front in the ACC was Clemson which averages the same numbers.
- Compare that with the starting offensive line for this year's New England Patriots, who have an average height of 6-4 and weight of 304 pounds.
- The Eagles are taller and heavier in four of the five positions compared to the Pats.
- Currently, four of the five starters weigh more than 300 pounds led by senior RG **Thomas Claiborne** at 332. Three of the five linemen are 6-6 or taller with senior RT **Rich Lapham** towering at 6-8.
- BC ranked 39th in the country in sacks allowed (1.54) last season while blocking for RB **Montel Harris**, who had the fourth-most carries in the country (308) and the 10th-most rushing yards (1,457).
- Senior LT **Anthony Castonzo** was named a Walter Camp All-American and an All-ACC first teamer while Claiborne earned All-ACC honorable mention honors.

O-LINE U.

- Boston College has a history of offensive linemen drafted by the NFL.
- Over the past 28 years, a total of 24 Eagles have been drafted from the offensive line.
- Included in that number is five first-round selections with Gosder Cherilus being the most recent draftee - selected 17th overall by the Detroit Lions in 2008.
- He was the third OL to be taken 17th overall in BC history.
- Seventeen of the linemen drafted were chosen in the fifth round or earlier, but Denver's Tom Nalen was drafted in the seventh round and has been selected to five Pro Bowls - the most for a Broncos' offensive lineman in history.
- Former lineman Ron Stone was inducted into the BC Varsity Club Hall of Fame in 2008. He was selected by the Dallas Cowboys in the fourth round of the 1993 NFL Draft and enjoyed a 12-year NFL career, playing in 173 games (142 starts).

NOT THAT LARS ANDERSON!

- Junior TE **Lars Anderson** has quite a popular name in the Boston area nowadays.
- The Boston Red Sox have a first baseman named Lars Anderson who played in 18 games in the Majors last year. He made his MLB debut on September 6.
- There is also a Larz Anderson Park four miles away in Brookline. BC's national champion men's ice hockey team occasionally practices outside at the rink located at the park.
- The Eagles' Anderson has caught 10 passes for 71 yards this year.

QB SUCCESS IN THE NFL

- Boston College is one of two collegiate programs in the country that have three former quarterbacks as starters in the NFL along with USC.
- Matt Ryan is in his third season with the Atlanta Falcons after being drafted third overall in the 2008 draft. He is 300-for-475 for 3,147 yards with 22 TDs and eight interceptions so far in 2010.
- Matt Hasselbeck was a sixth-round pick of Green Bay in 1998 but has found a home in Seattle, leading the Seahawks to the Super Bowl in 2005. He is a three-time Pro Bowl selection. He is 253-for-423 for 2,906 yards, 12 TDs and 15 interceptions.
- Brian St. Pierre earned his first career NFL start for Carolina against Baltimore November 21. He went 13-for-28 with 173 yards, a touchdown and two interceptions. St. Pierre served as a backup quarterback for three different teams from 2003-09.
- USC also has three former QBs starting in the league. They are Carson Palmer of Cincinnati, Matt Cassel of Kansas City and the Jets' Mark Sanchez.
- Michigan (New England's Tom Brady, Miami's Chad Henne) and Purdue (New Orleans' Drew Brees, Denver's Kyle Orton) are the other programs that had two starting quarterbacks in the NFL on opening day.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

THE CONSTANT

- Head Coach **Frank Spaziani** built and led a powerful defense in his time as defensive coordinator from 1999-2008.
- The Eagles have finished each of the last six seasons in the top 20 nationally in scoring defense.
- Only three other teams have accomplished that feat: Virginia Tech, Ohio State and Penn State.
- BC has allowed 1,631 points in 90 games over the last seven years. That is an average of 18.1 points per game.
- The Eagles enter the bowl season ranked 19th in the country in scoring defense, allowing 19.50 points per game.

DEFENSE BUCKLING DOWN

- The Boston College defense became even stingier in the final five weeks of the regular season.
- The Eagles allowed just three offensive touchdowns in the last five games.
- The streak extends to the fourth quarter of the Maryland game, so the defense has allowed three offensive touchdowns in 21 quarters.
- The defense is allowing just 2.1 points a quarter since the final quarter of the Terps game.

NO RUSH

- The Boston College defense held Kent State to just four yards rushing September 11 as Eugene Jarvis was held out of the game due to an injury.
- It was the fewest rushing yards allowed by the Eagles since November 29, 2008 when Maryland actually lost six yards in the game.
- Duke also managed just four yards rushing on 24 attempts.
- BC is allowing just 80.17 yards on the ground per game which leads the country.
- The Eagles' defense has only allowed 100 yards rushing four times this season with Florida State being the last and gaining the most with 141 yards on the ground.

100 IS HARD TO COME BY

- The Eagles' defense has stifled the run throughout the years, allowing just eight 100-yard rushers since 2005. That number is the best in the country.
- Ryan Williams was the last player to run for 100 against BC when the Hokie did it last season.
- Virginia Tech's Tyrod Taylor and Darren Evans did it in separate games in 2008.
- Paul Johnson's triple option offense has accounted for a pair. Jonathan Dwyer reached the mark in 2008 for Georgia Tech while Navy's Shun White did it in 2006.

DEFENSE FORCING TURNOVERS

- Boston College ranks fourth in the country in turnovers gained with 30 entering the bowl game.
- Hawaii leads the nation with 36 turnovers gained while Oregon (35) is second and Toledo (33) is third. The Eagles are tied for fourth with seven other teams.
- BC ranks fifth in the country with 19 interceptions and the Eagles have also recovered 11 fumbles which ranks 29th in the country.
- As a result, Boston College is 24th in the nation with a +7 turnover margin.
- The BC offense has been intercepted 17 times and lost six fumbles.

FIFTH-YEAR SENIORITIS

- The Eagles' senior class has been banged up this year.
- DE **Alex Albright** went down on the third play of the Maryland game and broke his right fibula.
- FS **Wes Davis** took a shot to the neck late in the third quarter of that game and was taken to St. Elizabeth's hospital for further evaluation. A CT scan and an MRI showed no fracture and he decided to end his career. This was his second neck injury as he had neck surgery in 2007.
- Both Albright and Davis serve as team captains.
- CB **DeLeon Gause** injured his right knee with less than a minute left in the third quarter vs. the Terps. Tests revealed some cartilage damage and he underwent surgery November 3.
- Senior DE **Brad Newman** was questionable for three games and missed each start with an injured leg. He got back in the starting lineup against Virginia.
- LG **Nathan Richman** dinged up his shoulder and did not play in the last three games.
- WR **Billy Flutie**, who has done a bit of everything for the Eagles, and has missed time with a hamstring injury. He is the Eagles' holder.

SUPERMAN RETURNS

- Sophomore LB **Luke Kuechly** stepped up in a huge way last year as a true freshman when Mark Herzlich was sidelined with Ewing's sarcoma.
- He ended up starting 12 games and was named ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year and All-ACC first team.
- Kuechly also earned a couple of All-America accolades, as he was named to the FWAAs and *Sporting News* Freshman All-America teams and the *SI.com* All-America second team.
- The Cincinnati product earned ACC Player of the Week honors three times.
- Here is a list of the impressive numbers he put together in 2009:
 - Ranked second in the country in total tackles (158) and solo stops (87)
 - Had the most tackles by a BC defender since 1993
 - His 12.15 tackles per game was the highest average by any rookie since the NCAA began tracking tackles in 2003
 - Recorded 10 or more tackles in the final nine games
 - Led the Eagles in tackles in 12 of 13 games
 - Led BC in total tackles, solo tackles, assisted stops (71), tackles for a loss (13.0) and pass break ups (4)
 - Earned Defensive Player of the Game honors against USC in the Emerald Bowl with 16 tackles
- Kuechly was named to the *Sporting News* Preseason All-America first team and to *Lindy's* preseason All-America second team.
- A few nicknames that the team bestowed upon him during the season were Boy Wonder, Superman and Clark Kent - because of his glasses and studious look off the field.

MORE 10-TACKLE GAMES

- Kuechly has picked up right where he left off as he has 10 or more tackles in all 12 games this season.
- Against Weber State, the linebacker had a game-best 11 tackles, with a half tackle for a loss and a fumble recovery.
- He then added 10 more tackles against Kent State and had a career high 3.5 tackles for a loss.
- Against Virginia Tech, Kuechly had 11 tackles by halftime and finished the day with 16.
- The Cincinnati, OH product had a whopping 20 tackles at NC State and then topped that with 21 at Duke.
- Kuechly has recorded 21 straight games with 10 or more tackles. He now has 22 such games in his career.
- Kuechly leads the country in consecutive games with 10 or more tackles.
- Following his monster 2009 season, Kuechly is currently the active NCAA leader in tackles (13.2) and solo stops per game (7.6).

KUECHLY'S 20-TACKLE GAMES

- Kuechly is the only player in the country with a pair of 20-tackle games this season.
- He is the first player to accomplish that feat since San Jose State's Matthew Castelo did it in 2006.
- He posted 20 tackles at NC State then set a new career high with 21 at Duke.
- The 21-tackle game is tied for the best this season in the FBS.
- Kuechly had 13 solo tackles against the Wolfpack which is the eighth-most in a game this season.
- His 21 tackles is the seventh-best game in BC history while his 20-tackle game is ninth.
- Kuechly has recorded the the most tackles in a game for an Eagle since Frank Chamberlain had 25 against Syracuse in 1999.

KUECHLY LEADS THE NATION

- Kuechly leads the country in tackles with 171. Washington's Mason Foster is in second with 151 stops.
- Kuechly is also the leader in solo tackles with 102 while Foster has 97.

BOY WONDER AT IT AGAIN

- Kuechly's name was called so much in the press box at Duke that the media gasped in amazement by the end of the game.
- He was everywhere. He finished with a career-high 21 tackles while breaking up two passes. He also forced a fumble and then recovered another one on the next series.
- He was named the ACC Defensive Lineman of the Week for his performance.
- Kuechly is the only player in the country this season to have a pair of 20-tackle games. He had 20 at NC State October 9.
- He is the first player to accomplish that feat since San Jose State's Matthew Castelo did it in 2006.
- Those 21 tackles are tied for the most in the FBS this season with Notre Dame's Manti Te'o, Memphis' Jamon Hughes and Marshall's Mario Harvey.
- Kuechly has racked up 171 tackles so far in 2010 which leads the country and is the single season record at Boston College.
- His 329 career stops ranks ninth all-time at Boston College.

KUECHLY AND THE RECORDS

- Sophomore LB **Luke Kuechly**, who averages an FBS best 14.25 tackles per game, broke the Boston College single season record for tackles with 171.
- Tom McManus was the previous record holder with 165 tackles in 1991.
- His 329 career stops ranks ninth all-time at Boston College. Stephen Boyd is the career record holder at The Heights with 524 tackles.
- Kuechly currently has the most tackles per game in a season in the ACC since NC State's Levar Fisher averaged 14.8 a game in 2000.
- By NCAA standards, Lawrence Flugence of Texas Tech holds the single season record for tackles with 193.
- The 15.6 per game tackle record is held by West Virginia's Rich Sherrod.

KUECHLY NAMED BRONKO NAGURSKI AND BUTKUS FINALIST

- The FWAA and Charlotte Touchdown Club announced that Kuechly was one of five finalists for the 2010 Bronko Nagurski Trophy.
- Clemson DE Da'Quan Bowers won the award.
- Finalists for the 26th annual collegiate Butkus Award honoring the nation's top linebackers were announced November 23 by the Butkus Foundation.
- Finalists were selected by a panel of 51 coaches, scouts and journalists supervised by Hub Arkush of Pro Football Weekly.
- Texas A&M's Von Miller was awarded the trophy.
- Kuechly, who leads the country with 171 tackles and 102 solo stops, was the only sophomore on both lists.

MAXED OUT

- Sophomore DE **Max Holloway** had his coming out party at Duke November 13.
- He posted career highs with 11 tackles, six solo stops, 4.5 TFLs and two sacks. He also forced a fumble and broke up a pass.
- That pass breakup came when the Eagles needed it most. Winning 21-16 with under a minute to play, Duke had a fourth and goal from the four yard line.
- Sean Renfree dropped back and passed towards the left, but Holloway elevated and batted it down.
- Holloway had the most tackles by a BC defensive lineman since Nick Larkin had 13 in a double overtime win against Clemson September 9, 2006.
- In the last four games, Holloway has 21 tackles with four sacks and eight tackles for a loss.
- He ranks 42nd in the country with 1.18 tackles for a loss per game.

OUTFOXED

- Senior CB **Chris Fox** made the first start of his career against Clemson in place of the injured **DeLeon Gause**.
- Fox, who has been a special teams player and Gause's backup, stepped up in a big way.
- The local product out of Hull, MA had five tackles, three solo tackles and three pass break ups. Two of those break ups were at the goal line.
- Entering the game, Fox had three tackles and a pair of break ups on the year.
- Two of those tackles and both pass breakups came the weekend before against Maryland after Gause left late in the third quarter.
- Fox added his first career interception at Wake Forest and then established career highs against Duke with seven tackles and four solo stops.
- He topped those numbers against Virginia, racking up nine tackles and his first tackle for a loss.
- Entering the season, Fox had two career tackles and no pass breakups.

IT'S ALBRIGHT

- Senior DE **Alex Albright** has been riddled with injuries during his career, and the injury bug bit again when he broke his fibula against Maryland.
- The Cincinnati, OH native had been the best down lineman for BC this year, leading the defensive line with 25 tackles and 16 solo stops. He also had a team-high nine tackles for a loss, 4.5 sacks and two pass breakups.
- He also picked off a pass that he returned 22 yards against Kent State.
- Late in the 2007 season, Albright broke his left forearm and had to miss the rest of the year - he earned All-ACC honorable mention honors.
- Then in 2008, he had to undergo neck surgery to fuse vertebrae in his neck. He played in the first two games before missing the rest of the season.
- Albright began his road back last year and started in seven games.

FUMBLES FOR LeGRANDE

- Junior SS **Dominick LeGrande** has recovered three fumbles on the season which is tied for sixth in the nation.
- He recovered two against Kent State and added another one against Notre Dame.

FLETCHER MAKING NOISE

- Junior CB **Donnie Fletcher** has quietly become an important part of the BC secondary.
- The Cleveland, OH native had an interception in five of six games ranging from October 2 to November 6.
- Fletcher's five picks this season are tied for the 11th-most in the country. It is also the third most in the conference.

NOEL, NOEL

- Sophomore DB **Jim Noel** made his first start of the season at Florida State in **Dominick LeGrande's** absence.
- He made it worthwhile by racking up 10 tackles (seven solo), picking off two passes and breaking up another.
- Both of his interceptions came in the third quarter. Noel picked off a pass on the first play from scrimmage in the second half to set up a field goal, cutting the BC deficit to 14-9.
- Later in the quarter, he returned an interception 43 yards for a touchdown to pull the Eagles within a point, 17-16.
- Noel has stayed in the starting role and has 34 tackles (26 solo) and four interceptions which is second on the team.

THE LINEBACKERS

- Backing up the defensive line is one of the best linebacker units in the country.
- Senior **Mark Herzlich** was an All-American in 2008, sophomore **Luke Kuechly** was one of the top tacklers in the nation last season, and true freshman **Kevin Pierre-Louis** has made a splash after earning a spot on the first team.
- Kuechly, Pierre-Louis and Herzlich rank 1-2-3, respectively, on the team in tackles. Kuechly leads BC and the nation with 171 tackles and 102 solo stops while having 10.5 tackles for a loss. Pierre-Louis is second with 86 tackles and 55 solo while Herzlich has 60 tackles (47 solo) and four INTs.

THE RETURN OF 94

- September 4 was a day that the entire Boston College community had circled for a long time.
- Senior LB **Mark Herzlich**, an All-American and the 2008 ACC Defensive Player of the Year, returned to the sideline in his BC uniform.
- Herzlich battled Ewing's sarcoma, a rare form of bone cancer, and won. After he fought off the disease, he had surgery to place a titanium rod in the center of his left femur to give it more support.
- While on the mend, the Wayne, Pa., native reached out. He has helped raise more than \$200,000 for cancer research while helping others cope with their life-altering diagnoses.
- During his year on the sideline, he was recognized by various outlets for his persistence and dedication to helping others. He received the Disney Spirit Award, an honorary Lott Trophy and the ACC Commissioner's Cup.
- It was only the second time an honorary Lott Trophy was handed out. The first was to the family of Pat Tillman. The Commissioner's Cup is awarded at the discretion of the Commissioner and it was the first time it was awarded to a student-athlete.

WHERE HE LEFT OFF

- It was 87 weeks (612 days) since No. 94 played a game. Here is what Herzlich accomplished in 2008.
 - First Team All-American by *Rivals.com* and *Scouts.com*
 - AP Third Team All-American and honorable mention by *Pro Football Weekly* and *SI.com*
 - ACC Defensive Player of the Year
 - Finalist for the Butkus Award, presented annually to the nation's top linebacker
 - Quarterfinalist for the Lott Trophy
 - Three-time ACC Player of the Week
 - His six interceptions were the eighth most in the country and the most by a LB
 - Returned two picks for touchdowns which was tied for best in the country
 - His 5.79 solo tackles per game ranked 11th in the nation
 - Led the team with 110 tackles and 81 stops, six interceptions, eight pass break-ups, two forced fumbles, and two fumble recoveries

HERZLICH THIS YEAR

- Herzlich led the Eagles onto the field against Weber State and did what he always does - ran over to the Superfan student section and rallied them.
- He then took the field for the first play, reclaiming his starting role at the same linebacker spot.
- Herzlich played 31 snaps and had five tackles against the Wildcats, including three solo stops.
- The Wayne, PA native was on the field for 35 plays against Kent State September 11 and made four tackles.
- Herzlich was back to full-time action beginning in the Virginia Tech game. He was on the field for 59 of the Hokies' 61 plays and had seven tackles and an interception.
- Herzlich is third on the team with 60 tackles (47 solo) and second with four interceptions while having 3.5 tackles for a loss.

HERZLICH EARNS ACC'S BRIAN PICCOLO AWARD

- Herzlich was named a recipient of the 2010 Brian Piccolo Award, handed out by Atlantic Coast Conference Commissioner John Swofford.
- He shared the honor with NC State's Nate Irving.
- The Piccolo Award has been given annually since 1972 in memory of the late Brian Piccolo to the "most courageous" football player in the ACC. Piccolo was the ACC Athlete of the Year in 1965 and played for the Chicago Bears before his career was cut short when he was stricken with cancer. His courageous fight against that disease was an inspiration to the Bears and the entire football community.
- Herzlich was sidelined for the 2009 season while he fought off Ewing's sarcoma, a rare form of bone cancer in his leg.
- Irving also came back after sitting out the previous year. He suffered a compound fracture of the tibia, a broken rib, a punctured lung and a separated shoulder in a single car accident.

AND IS FINALIST FOR RUDY AWARD

- Herzlich was also named one of three finalists for the Fourth Annual College Football Rudy Awards, announced by the Rudy Foundation.
- The award honors student-athletes who demonstrate exemplary character, courage, contribution and commitment as members of their collegiate football teams. The two other finalists are Nebraska's Alex Henery and NC State's Michael Lemon.
- The three finalists will be honored and the overall winner announced during the Priority Payment Systems Awards Ceremony, to be held in conjunction with the American Football Coaches Association Convention on January 11, 2011, at the Hilton Anatole Hotel, in Dallas, Texas. Rudy Ruettiger will personally present each individual with a classic finalist award and an academic scholarship will be made in his name to the general scholarship fund of his college or university. The overall winner will be presented with the bronze Rudy Award trophy and top scholarship.

EXPERIENCED CORNERS

- The Eagles have a plethora of experience at the cornerback position.
- Senior **DeLeon Gause** and junior **Donnie Fletcher** have both spent a lot of time blanketing opposing receivers.
- Gause had started 28 games in his career prior to his injury and has 137 tackles (105 solo), eight pass break ups and a three interceptions.
- He returned an interception 66 yards for a touchdown against Weber State to increase BC's lead to 38-13.
- Fletcher has seen action in all 39 games since his arrival on campus and has 138 tackles (99 solo) to go with nine interceptions and four pass break ups.

NO FLY ZONE

- The Boston College secondary has been one of the best programs when it comes to interceptions since 2000.
- Last year, BC picked off 15 passes which ranked 28th in the country.
- In 2008, the Eagles led the country in interceptions with 26, tied with national champion Florida.
- In 2007, BC ranked second in the country with 25 interceptions, which was one behind Cincinnati.
- In 2006, the Eagles were tied for third nationally with 21 takeaways in the air. Western Michigan led the country that season with 24.
- Since 2000, Boston College has ranked in the top 25 in interceptions seven times.

DAVIS ENDS CAREER

- Senior FS **Wes Davis** has been a mainstay in the Eagles secondary for the last three seasons, earning 31 starts.
- He ended the season with 36 tackles and 29 solo stops. He is also one of six players to have an interception this year.
- Davis decided to end his career at The Heights after his second neck injury that he suffered against Maryland.
- He was taken off the field on a cart and transferred to St. Elizabeth's for further evaluation. An MRI and a CT scan showed no fracture, but with a surgery on his neck in 2007, Davis did not want to risk further injury.
- Davis is one of the most quotable guys on the team. Here is what he said about BC stepping into the spotlight this year: "I think we're right on that cusp, we're right behind that veil of greatness, which is right where we want to be. When you get in front of it, you start to take all the praises. No one praises Boston College, but we're coming. We're right behind that veil. And when we pull it back, we'll be running full speed, and it's going to be hard to deal with it."
- He also discussed about the defensive backs' attitude towards turnovers: "One of the things we're doing in (preseason) practice is that if the DBs don't get two turnovers we have to do 100 up-downs. We call that extrinsic motivation, but eventually it has to be intrinsic - it has to come from within. We will make a point of getting the ball back, because it's a necessity."

PIERRE-LOUIS CLIMBS EARNS STARTING SPOT

- LB **Kevin Pierre-Louis** was one of 13 freshmen on the depth chart on the opening weekend and the only one to start. He has gotten the nod at the will linebacker spot and is second on the team with 86 tackles (55 solo).
- He was named the 2009-10 Gatorade Connecticut Football Player of the Year, playing middle linebacker and fullback for King Low Heywood Thomas.
- Pierre-Louis recorded 159 tackles (101 solo) in nine games as a senior and registered three interceptions (returning two for touchdowns). On offense, he rushed for 914 yards and 13 touchdowns on 77 carries.
- Pierre-Louis enrolled early at BC instead of making a trip to Haiti to visit relatives.
- He has relatives from Haiti on both sides of his family. His father's side is from Léogâne, an hour west of Port-au-Prince, and escaped the worst of the devastating earthquake on January 12.
- His mother's side of the family lives in Port-au-Prince proper. Aunts and uncles own a sugar-cane plantation, two ice factories and a series of apartment buildings rented out to other families.
- His family reluctantly left after being told to and a couple of hours later, the building they were in collapsed.

QUIGLEY QUIETLY ONE OF THE BEST

- Junior P **Ryan Quigley** was one of the most consistent punters in the ACC last year.
- Quigley punted a BC record 77 times for 3,145 yards. His 40.8 per punt average ranked fifth in the conference.
- His punts and total yardage numbers both ranked seventh nationally.
- The North Myrtle Beach, SC product tied for the ACC lead in punts inside the 20-yard line (23) and was third in punts of 50+ yards (11).
- This season, Quigley and the Eagles are third in the conference and 22nd in the country in net punting average at 38.51 yards.
- He has booted 12 punts over 50 yards, including a career high 71-yarder against Weber State. He has also dropped 25 kicks inside the 20-yard line.

FREESE-ING THE KICKING GAME

- Redshirt freshman K **Nate Freese** has been impressive in his first season kicking
- Freese is 23-for-24 on PATs and is 20-for-23 on field goals.
- He nailed a 49-yarder against Notre Dame which was the longest for BC since Sandro Sciortino split the uprights on a 49-yarder vs. Virginia Tech in 2002.
- He is second in the ACC and is tied for eighth in the country in field goals per game with 1.67.
- Freese is one of three kickers in the country who has hit four field goals in two separate games.

ALREADY IN THE RECORD BOOK

- Despite playing in just six games in his young career, Freese is writing his name in the BC record books.
- He is the first BC kicker to connect on four field goals in a game twice in the same season.
- In fact, only Brian Lowe hit four field goals twice in his career but the games came three years apart in 1986 and then 1989.
- Freese's 20 field goals made are the second most in a single season at Boston College.

Herzlich, who missed part of summer camp with a stress fracture of his right foot, played a part-time role in the game, getting five tackles as he worked his way back into shape.

Dave Shinskie returned after being taken out in the first half and threw a pair of third-quarter touchdown passes, and Boston College took advantage of five Kent State turnovers to win 26-13.

The Eagles led 6-3 when Shinskie threw a 23-yard strike through traffic to Bobby Swigert. After Kent State returner Dri Archer fumbled a punt at his own 31-yard line, Shinskie threw across the field into the front corner of the end zone and Clyde Lee brought it down to give the Eagles a 20-6 lead.

Kent State had two fumbles and three interceptions and ran for 4 net yards with starting running back and punt returner Eugene Jarvis out with a groin injury. Without him, Archer fumbled two punt returns - losing one - and Leneric Muldrow fumbled away another.

Archer scored Kent State's only touchdown on a 32-yard screen pass with 2:27 left in the game.

Spencer Keith, who had three touchdowns last week in his first game back since sustaining a season-ending shoulder injury against Temple last year, was 23-for-36 for 201 yards and two interceptions. Receiver Sam Kirkland threw the other interception on an option play.

Shinskie was pulled early in the second quarter after going three-, three-, and four-and-out on consecutive drives. Mike Marscovetra failed to get a first down on his first series, and on his second he threw an interception on the first play to set up the Golden Flashes' first field goal.

Shinskie returned and led BC on an 11-play, 74-yard drive to set up a 22-yard field goal as time expired in the first half. On the opening drive of the second half, the Eagles went 77 yards on 12 plays to score when Shinskie connected with Swigert to make it 13-3.

On the two drives combined, Shinskie was 10-for-12 and 98 yards. But Roosevelt Nix forced him to fumble on BC's next possession to set up another Kent State field goal. The BC offense sputtered again, but Archer fumbled away the punt and Shinskie hit Lee on the first play for a 31-yard score.

Montel Harris ran 29 times for 80 yards for Boston College.

Jim Noel intercepted Keith with a nice grab on the sideline that was first ruled an incompleton and overturned after the replay. Alex Albright had his first career interception, and Wes Davis also picked off a pass for the Eagles.

Dayne Crist threw for two first-quarter touchdowns and ran for another as Notre Dame built a 21-point lead and coasted to a 31-13 victory over Boston College.

Crist completed 24 of 44 passes for 203 yards. Armando Allen ran for 90 yards and a touchdown on 19 carries as the Irish gave coach Brian Kelly his first road victory.

Chase Rettig started with three straight three-and-outs and trailed 21-0 before connecting on a 58-yard touchdown pass to Bobby Swigert with 19 seconds left in the first quarter. But on BC's first possession of the second, Rettig was blindsided in the pocket as he released the ball; he limped toward the sideline before hopping the last few steps off the field.

Mike Marscovetra played in his absence and finished 22 of 37 for 193 yards, throwing interceptions on back-to-back drives in the fourth quarter that killed any chance BC had of a comeback.

Rettig was 5 of 10 for 72 yards, most of it on the TD pass to Swigert.

Notre Dame started the game with a 63-yard kickoff return and then got a 30-yard run from Allen to help set up Crist's 7-yard run for the corner of the end zone. The Irish needed only 1 minute, 48 seconds and just one second down to travel 50 yards in four plays.

The second drive stalled, and the third was a more methodical march to the BC 2 yard-line before Crist hit Kyle Rudolph for a 2-yard TD. After BC's third three-and-out, Notre Dame went 72 yards for another touchdown. Crist connected with Michael Floyd for 35 yards to set up a 20-yarder to Theo Riddick that made it 21-0 with 2:19 still to play in the first.

Rettig followed with his only success of the night on the TD pass to Swigert. BC took advantage of a pair of Irish fumbles to add a pair of field goals by Nate Freese - including a 49-yarder - that cut it to 21-13 before Notre Dame added a field goal that made it an 11-point game at the half.

Russell Wilson threw for 328 yards and three touchdowns to help North Carolina State beat Boston College 44-17, giving Tom O'Brien his first win against his former program.

Owen Spencer, Darrell Davis and Jarvis Williams had TD catches for the Wolfpack (5-1, 2-1 Atlantic Coast Conference), who dominated the Eagles (2-3, 0-2) the entire way. D.J. Green recovered a blocked punt in the end zone for a first-quarter touchdown, while C.J. Wilson returned an interception for a score in the third.

Wilson threw two interceptions, one coming when a ball deflected off the hands of tight end George Bryan and the other when he overthrew a pass downfield to an open receiver. But the rest of the time, he looked sharp against the Eagles, completing 38 of 51 passes while also running for 45 yards.

After Green's TD recovery, Wilson pump-faked then threw a perfect pass over the middle to Spencer for a 23-yard touchdown that made it 17-3 early in the second quarter. Two possessions later, Wilson found Davis for a 5-yard score on the left side to push that margin to 24-3 midway through the quarter.

Wilson found Williams for a 6-yard score early in the fourth, with the receiver pushing through a tackle and stretching the ball over the pylon to make it 41-10 with 13 1/2 minutes left.

Boston College had no such offensive success. With freshman Chase Rettig out with an ankle injury, coach Frank Spaziani went with Dave Shinskie as the starting quarterback. Shinskie completed just 7 of 24 passes for 89 yards with two interceptions. The last was a overthrown ball that landed right in Wilson's hands for an easy TD return, prompting Spaziani to pull Shinskie for sophomore Mike Marscovetra.

Marscovetra hit Alex Amidon for a 67-yard touchdown with about 6 minutes left.

No. 16 Florida State needed just a little bit of trickery to overcome its own mistakes and avoid being upset by Boston College.

Bert Reed's 42-yard touchdown run on a reverse lifted the Seminoles to a 24-19 win as they survived four turnovers by quarterback Christian Ponder to win their fifth straight.

Boston College took a 19-17 lead early in the fourth quarter on Nate Freese's fourth field goal of the game. That followed a Ponder fumble at the Eagles' 44.

Montel Harris rushed for 191 yards and safety Jim Noel had two of three BC interceptions, including one he returned 43 yards for a third quarter touchdown that pulled the Eagles to within 17-16.

But the Eagles' offense couldn't get into the end zone, and the Seminoles took advantage.

Boston College freshman Chase Rettig completed 9 of 24 passes for 95 yards in his second career start.

Ponder completed 19 of 31 passes for 170 yards and a pair of touchdowns--3 yards to fullback Lonnie Pryor and 10 yards to tight end Beau Reliford.

But his mistakes kept Boston College in the game.

The heavily favored Seminoles couldn't shake the pesky Eagles all day, holding their largest leads - 14-6 at halftime and 17-9 in the third quarter after a 26-yard Dustin Hopkins field goal.

Boston College closed to within 14-9 a minute into the second half on Freese's third field goal of the game. That score was set up by Noel's first interception of a Ponder pass, which he returned 20 yards to the Florida State 13.

Florida State's defense which came into the game leading the nation in sacks with 26 added four more Saturday, including two by sophomore defensive end Brandon Jenkins who now has seven on the season.

Ponder and Easterling teamed up on a pair of 23-yard pass plays that keyed a 96-yard drive culminated by Ponder's 10-yard scoring throw to Reliford that gave the Seminoles a 14-6 lead with 1:03 left in the second quarter.

Until that final drive late in the half, Florida State had managed only 51 yards offense and only 20 running the ball. The Seminoles came into the game averaging 223.5 yards rushing a game.

Maryland safety Antwine Perez had two interceptions and a fumble recovery, and Danny O'Brien threw for three touchdowns to lead the Terrapins to a 24-21 victory over Boston College.

BC lost three defensive starters to injuries, including one that appeared to be serious. Safety Wes Davis remained on the turf for about 10 minutes before being strapped to a backboard and wheeled to a waiting ambulance; the school said he had "full movement" but was taken to a hospital for observation.

O'Brien completed 27 of 40 passes for 182 yards, hitting Torrey Smith, Ronnie Tyler and Kerry Boykins on touchdown passes for Maryland (5-2, 2-1 Atlantic Coast Conference).

Montel Harris ran 27 times for 116 yards and two touchdowns for BC (2-5, 0-4) to surpass 3,000 yards in his career.

Chase Rettig completed 18 of 22 passes for a touchdown. One of the interceptions was tipped and several other passes were dropped, including one on fourth down in the final minutes with the Eagles needing a field goal to tie the game.

Maryland led 24-7 on three short touchdown passes and a 26-yard field goal before BC perked up.

Rettig hit Ifeanyi Moma for a 23-yard pass to the Maryland 7, and Harris ran it three times for the score that made it 24-14 with 11:20 to play. After BC forced a punt, Rettig threw a long pass to Moma that was high and off his fingertips, only to be caught by BC's Bobby Swigert for a gain of 63 yards.

Swigert was pushed out at the 6, and a roughing the passer penalty moved it to the 3. Harris ran it in from there to make it 24-21 with 7:10 left.

The Eagles had two more chances with the ball, but Shakim Phillips dropped a slant pass on fourth-and-3 and Harris was stopped inches short of the first down on BC's final possession to allow the Terps to run out the clock.

Davis' knees were up while he was being worked on, and he was moving his arm as he was taken from the field; the school said he had a neck injury but noted that he has "full movement." Defensive lineman Alex Albright left the game with an ankle in the first quarter, and cornerback DeLeon Gause hurt his right knee.

Harris is the fourth player in BC history--and the first junior--to reach the 3,000 yard milestone.

Harris ran 36 times for 142 yards for the Eagles. Rettig completed 9 of 16 passes for 136 yards after throwing an interception for a score on the third play of the game.

Clemson running back Andre Ellington, who ran for a career-best 166 yards in last week's win over Georgia Tech, was held to 42 yards on 14 attempts. Kyle Parker was 21 for 39 for 176 with two interceptions, both in the final quarter.

BC responded on the ensuing drive, going 70 yards in nine plays before being stopped inside the 5 three times. Freese kicked a 21-yard field goal to make it 7-3. The big play of the drive was a 40-yard pass from Rettig to Ifeanyi Momah, who leaped in front corner back Marcus Gilchrist at the 2-yard line.

The Tigers followed by going 64 yards in nine plays, taking a 10-3 lead on Calanzaro's 31-yard field goal.

Chase Rettig threw two third-quarter touchdown passes and Boston College made a late defensive stand to defeat Duke 21-16.

Rettig completed 12 of 24 passes for 230 yards for the Eagles (5-5, 3-4), who won their third consecutive game.

Duke (3-7, 1-5) drove to the Boston College 4-yard line on its final drive, coming up short in its bid for a second last-minute comeback win in as many weeks. Sean Renfree's fourth-down pass was batted down by defensive end Max Holloway with 46 seconds left.

Montel Harris rushed for 109 yards and a touchdown for Boston College.

Duke's August Campbell returned a Harris fumble 95 yards for a touchdown to trim Boston College's lead to 21-16 early in the fourth quarter.

Leading 21-9, Boston College was on the verge of taking a commanding lead when Duke's defense responded. Harris fumbled on third and 4 from the Duke 9 after a hit by Walt Canty, and Campbell scooped up the loose ball.

He raced toward the left sideline, skipping out of diving tackle attempt by Rettig before outrunning offensive tackle Emmett Cleary to the end zone for the longest fumble return in school history.

Rettig passed for 95 yards in the third quarter, tossing a 38-yard touchdown pass to Bobby Swigert on Boston College's first possession of the half. After a fumble by Duke's Conner Vernon, Rettig connected with Ifeanyi Momah for a 4-yard touchdown on a fade route.

The Eagles led 7-6 at halftime, scoring just once on three trips inside the Duke 25. Harris lost a fumble on the first of those opportunities, but he responded with a 15-yard touchdown run up the middle midway through the second quarter.

The Blue Devils, who netted a minus-8 rushing yards on 17 attempts in the first half, got field goals of 29 yards and 40 yards from Will Snyderwine before halftime.

EAGLES IN THE HALL OF FAME

PRO FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME

ART DONOVAN: First Colt to enter Pro Football Hall of Fame...began NFL career as 26-year-old rookie in 1950...vital part of Baltimore's climb to powerhouse status in 1950s...All-NFL 1954-58...played in five Pro Bowls...played at Boston College after World War II Marines service from 1946-49.

ERNIE STAUTNER: No. 2 overall draft pick in 1950...anchored strong Pittsburgh defense for 14 years...known for excellent mobility, burning desire, extreme ruggedness and unusual durability...All-NFL 1955, 1956, 1958 and 1959...played in nine Pro Bowls, winning Best Lineman Award in 1957...recovered 23 opponents' fumbles, scored three safeties in career...played at BC 1946-49.

COLLEGE FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME

FRANK CAVANAUGH: Led BC to a 48-14-5 record as the head coach from 1919-26...led the Eagles to an undefeated 8-0 record in 1920 and then a to a 6-0-2 mark in his last season in 1926...his career record in 24 years was 145-48-17, a .731 percentage...he joined the Army in World War I and advanced to the rank of major.

GIL DOBIE: Finished his coaching career at BC, leading the Eagles to a 16-6-5 record from 1936-38...in all, he coached 33 years and had 14 undefeated seasons...his career record of 180-45-15 gave him a winning percentage of .781.

DOUG FLUTIE: BC's only Heisman Trophy winner...posted a 30-11-1 overall record as the starting QB from 1981-84...led the Eagles to three bowl games, the school's first in 40 years...named the MVP of the Tangerine Bowl as a sophomore and the Liberty Bowl as a junior...threw for a record 3,454 passing yards as a senior.

CHET GLADCHUK: Star center for BC's 11-0 team in 1940...the Eagles finished the season with a 19-13 Sugar Bowl victory over Tennessee...that year, the Associated Press selected him as a first-team All-America...played for the New York Giants in 1941 and 1946-47...was an officer in the Navy from 1942-46.

GENE GOODREULT: Outstanding as a pass-catcher and play-making blocker on offense and as a play-blaster, destructive tackler on defense...in 1940, Goodreult was a consensus All-America on the Eagles undefeated 11-0 team.

MIKE HOLOVAK: As a senior, ranked second in the nation in rushing and received consensus All-America honors...turned in an outstanding performance in the 1942 Orange Bowl where he set records for touchdowns (3) and average yards per carry (15.0 yards/carry)...averaged 5.27 yards per carry during his career.

GEORGE KERR: Frank Leahy hailed the Boston native as the greatest scholar-athlete he ever coached...he captained the unbeaten Eagles his senior year in 1940...helped to post a 26-3-2 record in three seasons, and he is a member of the All-Time Sugar Bowl team.

FRANK LEAHY: Coached BC in 1939-40 and led it to a 20-2 record, including a perfect 11-0 in 1940...finished the 1939 season with a loss in the Cotton Bowl to Clemson and finished ranked No. 11 in the country...defeated Tennessee in the Sugar Bowl in 1940, ending No. 5 in the nation.

CHARLIE O'ROURKE: Played at BC from 1938-40, leading the Eagles to a 26-3-2 record...proclaimed as the greatest player in school history while still playing...one of the most clever tailbacks ever seen...named an All-American in 1940.
