2008 BIG TEN BASEBALL TOURNAMENT

The bracket for the 2008 Big Ten Baseball Tournament has been set, the conference office announced Saturday evening. The event will take place May 21-24 at the Wilpon Baseball Complex home of Ray Fisher Stadium in Ann Arbor, Mich. Michigan clinched its third consecutive Big Ten Championship and the right to host the tournament with a three-game sweep over Minnesota on May 9-11. The remaining five slots in the bracket were determined on the final weekend of competition.

The Wolverines finished the season strong, taking three of four games from Northwestern to close out the conference slate. In the process, Michigan set a record for wins in a Big Ten season with a 26-5 record in conference play. The previous record of 25 victories was set by Ohio State in 1994 and tied by the Buckeyes in 1999. With the No. 1 seed in the tournament, the Wolverines earn a first-round bye.

Purdue (21-10) earned the No. 2 seed in the bracket and a first-round bye, clinching the spot with a doubleheader sweep over Illinois on Friday. The slot is the highest for the Boilermakers since 2005 when they were also seeded second.

Penn State (17-15) jumped into the No. 3 spot on Friday with a doubleheader sweep over Minnesota. 2008 marks the second consecutive year the Nittany Lions have earned the tournament's No. 3 seed. PSU will face No. 6 Indiana (15-17) in Game 2 of the tournament at 3:35 p.m. ET on Wednesday. The Hoosiers earned the sixth slot with four wins at Michigan State, marking the squad's first Big Ten series sweep since 1999. IU is making its sixth overall tournament appearance and first since 2003.

Opening the 2008 tournament, No. 4 Illinois (16-15) will face No. 5 Ohio State (15-15) on Wednesday at 12:05 p.m. ET. The Fighting Illini are making their fourth consecutive tournament appearance and own their highest seed since 2005 when they claimed the top spot. The tournament berth is the Buckeyes' 12th consecutive, which is the longest such streak in Big Ten history. In 2007, OSU became the first No. 6 seed in history to win the tournament title.

Up to six Big Ten Tournament games will reach a national television audience as the Big Ten Network will televise three games on Friday, two games on Saturday and one game on Sunday if the tournament goes to 11 games. TEAM-BY-TEAM PREVIEWS



Tournament Notes: The 2008 Big Ten Baseball Tournament marks the 28th time the event has been played and the seventh time it has been played under the current format ... Ohio State and Minnesota have more tournament titles than any other school with eight apiece ... The Buckeyes won their eighth title last season, becoming the first No. 6 seed in history to take home the tournament trophy ... Including this year, the University of Michigan has played host to the Big Ten Baseball Tournament a conference-leading 10 times, including each of the three most recent events ... Since the tournament began seeding in 1988, the No. 2 seed has won the event seven times, followed by the No. 1 seed (six times), the No. 3 seed (three times), the No. 4 seed (two times) and the Nos. 5 and 6 seeds (one time each) ... Of this year's participants, four have won at least one tournament title (Ohio State - 8, Michigan - 7, Illinois - 3 and Indiana - 1), while Penn State and Purdue are each looking for their first tournament championship.

No. 1 Michigan: The Wolverines are playing in their sixth consecutive and 22nd overall Big Ten Tournament ... Michigan earned the right to host the event for the third consecutive year after winning its Big Ten-best 35th conference title ... As a team, Michigan led the Big Ten with a 3.46 ERA in conference games, fronted by the trio of Michael Powers (1.93), Big Ten Pitcher of the Year Zach Putnam (2.20) and Chris Fetter (2.42) who ranked first through third, respectively, in the category ... At the plate, Big Ten Player of the Year Nate Recknagel broke Michigan's single-season home runs record, currently with 23, and finished the conference slate tied for the category lead with 10.



No. 2 Purdue: After a one-year hiatus, Purdue returns to the tournament for its 12th overall appearance and fourth in the last five years ... The Boilermakers are seeking their first tournament title and are doing so with their highest seeding since 2005, when they also came in at No. 2 ... Brandon Haveman finished the Big Ten slate ranked first in average, hitting at a .444 clip and making him the second Boilermaker in as many years to take home the conference's batting title ... On the mound, Josh Lindblom emerged as one of the Big Ten's top relievers, finishing the conference season with a Big Ten-best nine saves.

No. 3 Penn State: The Nittany Lions enter the tournament as the No. 3 seed for the second consecutive year after having advanced to the semifinals of last year's event ... Penn State is making its ninth tournament appearance and is in search of its first tournament championship ... One of the top relievers in the nation, first-team All-Big Ten honoree Drew O'Neil recorded 11 saves this season, including seven in conference play, shattering the Penn State career saves record in the process ... O'Neil was named a mid-season candidate for the Stopper of the Year and Roger Clemens awards.



No. 4 Illinois: The Fighting Illini are making their fourth consecutive and 16th overall tournament appearance ... Illinois has three tournament titles to its name, earning trophies in 1989, 1990 and 2000 ... The Orange and Blue own their highest seed since 2005 when the team earned the bracket's top billing ... As a team, Illinois led the conference in batting average during Big Ten play, led by unanimous first-team All-Big Ten selection Kyle Hudson ... Hudson finished first in runs scored and third in on-base percentage during conference play and is one of just two players in history to record 20 or more steals during Big Ten action as he recorded 25 swipes this season.

No. 5 Ohio State: The Buckeyes are making their 12th consecutive trip to the Big Ten Tournament, marking the longest such streak in conference history ... Last season, OSU became the first team to win the tournament as a No. 6 seed, tying them for the most tournament championships in conference history ... Ohio State finished the Big Ten season ranked in the top three in ERA, opponents' batting average and strikeouts ... Two-way player J.B. Shuck was named to the All-Big Ten third team as a pitcher and as an outfielder, owning a .366 average while holding opponents to a .219 clip in conference play.



No. 6 Indiana: The Hoosiers are making their sixth overall tournament appearance and first since 2003 ... IU won the Big Ten Tournament in 1996 ... Indiana is led by unanimous All-Big Ten selection Josh Phegley who finished the conference season ranked first in slugging percentage (.776), RBI (45), total bases (90) and tied for the lead in home runs (10) ... The catcher also finished second in average (.431) and fifth in on-base percentage (.500) ... On the mound, first-team All-Big Ten selection Matt Bashore held conference opponents to a .254 average and struck out 42 while combining for a 5-1 Big Ten record and a 4.27 ERA.

BIG TEN ANNOUNCES ALL-CONFERENCE TEAMS

On the day before the 2008 Big Ten Baseball Tournament, the conference office announced the 2008 All-Big Ten baseball teams and individual award winners. From Big Ten Champion Michigan, senior **Nate Recknagel** was honored as Player of the Year, junior **Zach Putnam** was named Pitcher of the Year and **Rich Maloney** was recognized as Coach of the Year. Rounding out the individual awards, Northwestern pitcher **Eric Jokisch** was named Freshman of the Year. This marks the first time since 2002 and the fourth time overall that the Player, Pitcher and Coach of the Year all hailed from the same institution.

A unanimous selection to the All-Big Ten first team at first base, Recknagel broke Michigan's single-season home runs record earlier this season, currently with a Big Ten-best 23 long balls in the 2008 campaign. In conference play, he recorded 10 dingers, tying him for the Big Ten's lead. He also ranked in the conference's top five in slugging percentage (.676), RBI (34) and total bases (73) during Big Ten games. In overall competition Recknagel led the conference in slugging percentage (.787) and total bases (155) and posted an on-base percentage of .471 with 54 runs scored and 68 RBI.

Putnam, who is also a first-team honoree at designated hitter and a unanimous selection for first-team All-Big Ten pitcher, closed out the conference season ranking second in ERA (2.20) opponents' batting average (.211) strikeouts (46) and wins (6), making him the only pitcher to rank in the top three in each of those categories. The junior recorded a 6-0 record in Big Ten play and was 7-0 overall in 2008. Earlier this season, the right-hander became the first player since 1993 to be named Big Ten Pitcher of the Week and Player of the Week in the same season. On offense, Putnam batted .326 with eight home runs, 24 RBI and a .663 slugging percentage during conference action.

Maloney earns his second consecutive Coach of the Year honor after leading Michigan to a record-breaking season in which his team set a new standard for wins in a Big Ten season with a 26-5 mark. Under Maloney's tutelage, the Wolverines maintained a spot in the national rankings and are currently rated No. 17 by Baseball America. The sixth-year mentor led his squad to its third consecutive Big Ten title and the program's 35th overall. Maloney has guided his team to a Big Ten Tournament appearance in each of his six seasons at the helm and is poised to lead the Maize and Blue to the NCAA Tournament for the fourth straight year.

Jokisch emerged as the ace of Northwestern's staff, combining to post a Big Ten-best seven wins in eight conference starts this season. The left-hander led the Wildcats with a 4.66 ERA and registered two complete games, including a complete-game shutout over conference champion Michigan on May 16. Jokisch's shutout marked the first time the Wolverines had been blanked all season and the first time in 64 games that the squad had not scored a run at home. Jokisch was also voted a member of the All-Big Ten second team as a starting pitcher.

The All-Big Ten first team features four unanimous selections, including Recknagel and Putnam. Illinois outfielder **Kyle Hudson** was a unanimous choice after finishing first in the Big Ten in runs scored (40), second in stolen bases (25) and third in on-base percentage (.522) during conference games. He also ranked in the Big Ten's top 10 in batting average (.407), hits (44) and doubles (9). His 25 swipes make him one of just two players in history to record 20 or more steals in a Big Ten season. Also a unanimous decision, Indiana catcher **Josh Phegley** finished the conference slate first in slugging percentage (.776), RBI (45) and total bases (90) and tied for the lead in home runs (10). He also ranked in the top five in average (.431), on-base percentage (.500), runs scored (38) and hits (50).

Joining Recknagel, Putnam, Hudson and Phegley on the first team are Purdue second baseman **Ben Wolgamot**, Michigan shortstop **Jason Christian**, Minnesota third baseman **Nate Hanson**, Indiana outfielder **Andrew Means**, Minnesota outfielder **Matt Nohelty**, Indiana pitcher **Matt Bashore**, Michigan hurler **Chris Fetter**, Purdue starter **Matt Bischoff** and Penn State reliever **Drew O'Neil**.

The 2008 All-Big Ten teams featured two multiple honorees as Putnam was named a first-team designated hitter and starting pitcher for the second year in a row. In 2007, Putnam became the first player in conference history to be named to the first team at two different positions. Also this year, Ohio State's **J.B. Shuck** was named to the All-Big Ten third team as a starting pitcher and an outfielder.

The Big Ten office also announced honorees from each of the conference's 10 baseball squads for the Big Ten Sportsmanship Award. The student-athletes chosen are individuals who have distinguished themselves through sportsmanship and ethical behavior. In addition, the student-athletes must be in good academic standing and have demonstrated good citizenship outside of the sports-competition setting.

Honorees for baseball are Illinois' Hudson, Indiana's Means, Iowa's **Caleb Curry**, Michigan's **Leif Mahler**, Michigan State's **Mark Sorensen**, Minnesota's **Tom Steidl**, Northwestern's **Jake Goebbert**, Ohio State's **Dan DeLucia**, Penn State's **Brian Ernst** and Purdue's **Ryne White**.

These 10 student-athletes are now candidates for the Big Ten Sportsmanship Award, as the conference office will honor one male and one female student-athlete from each institution at the end of the school year.

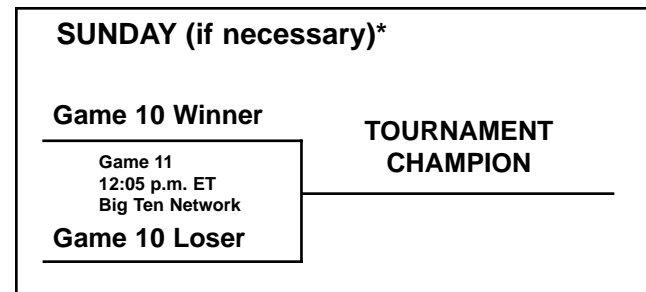
