NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP PREVIEW

THE MARCH TO MADNESS: Four Big Ten teams were selected to participate in the 2008 NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Championship. Big Ten regular season and tournament champion **Wisconsin, Indiana, Michigan State and Purdue** will all be participating in this year's event.

Wisconsin is the No. 3 seed in the Midwest Regional and will travel to the Omaha, Neb., first/second round site. First up for the Badgers will be No. 14 Cal-State Fullerton with the second round pitting the winner of that game against the winner of No. 6 USC vs. No. 11 Kansas State. The Badgers will be playing in the tournament for the 14th time and making their 10th straight appearance. Wisconsin is 17-12 in its previous trips and has made two Final Four appearances, including winning the 1941 title.

Michigan State is the No. 5 seed in the South Regional and is on the road to the Denver, Colo., first/second round site. The Spartans are slated to play No. 12 Temple first with the victor facing the winner of No. 4 Pitt vs. No. 13 Oral Roberts. MSU is making its 22nd NCAA appearance overall and 11th consecutive. Michigan State has a 41-20 mark in the NCAA Tournament and six Final Four appearances, including the 1979 and 2000 national championships.

Purdue is the No. 6 seed in the West Regional and will be in Washington, D.C., for its first/second round games. The Boilermakers will take on No. 11 Baylor with the winner of that game facing the victor of No. 3 Xavier vs. No. 14 Georgia. Purdue's appearance is the 21st in school history and its second consecutive. The Boilermakers have a 27-20 record in NCAA Tournament games as well as two Final Four appearances.

Indiana is the No. 8 seed in the East Regional and will play at the first/second round site in Raleigh, N.C., The Hoosiers have No. 9 Arkansas as their first-round opponent and the winner goes on to face the winner of No. 1 North Carolina vs. Coppin State/Mt. St. Mary's game. Indiana is making a conference-record 35th appearance in the tournament and its third consecutive trip. In tournament play, the Hoosiers have recorded a 60-29 mark, and have eight Final Four appearances to their credit, including five national titles, the most recent of which came in 1987.

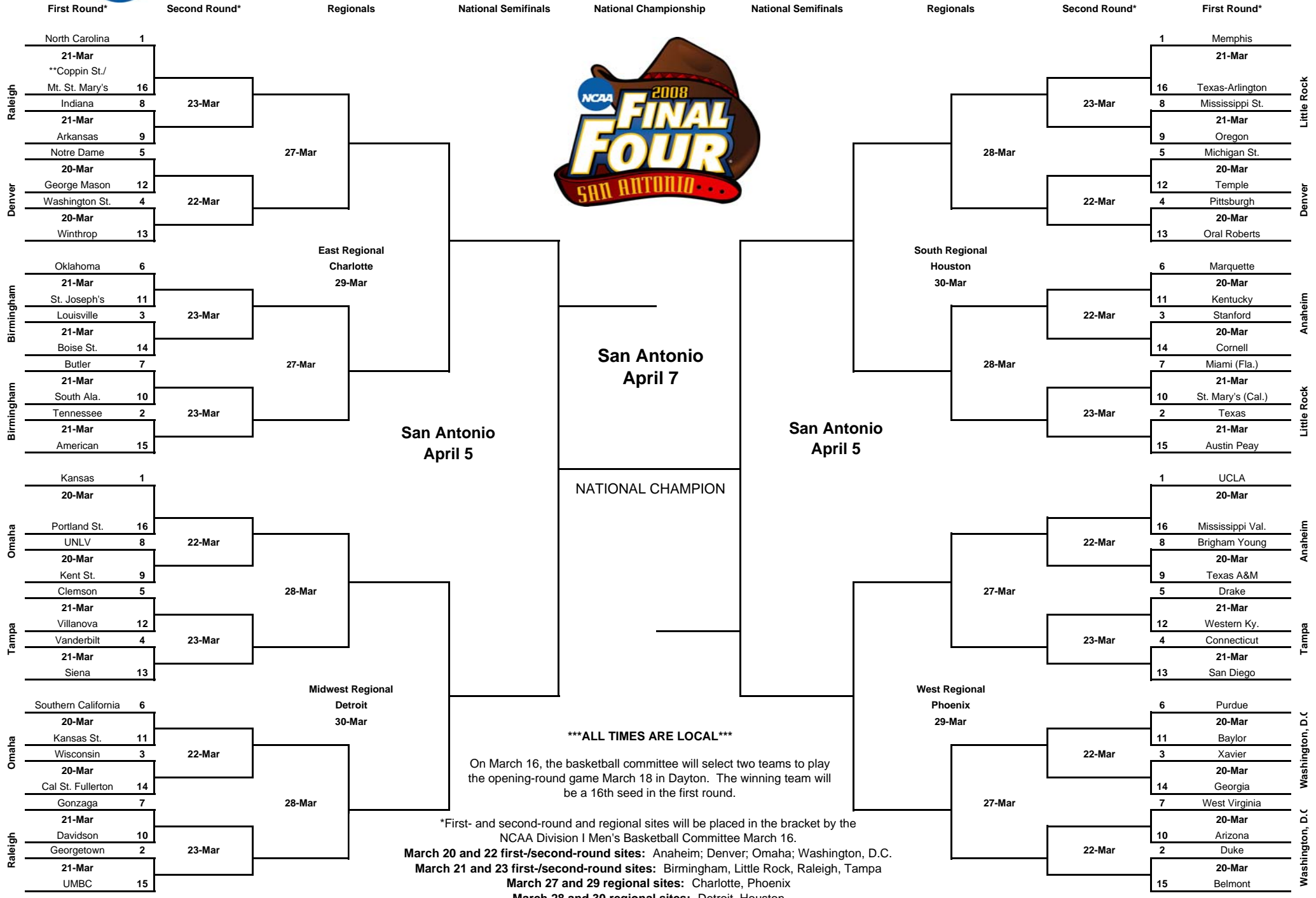

NOTING THE BIG TEN

SEEING RED: Wisconsin followed up its regular season title by winning the second Big Ten tournament title in school history, defeating Michigan, Michigan State and Illinois to take the crown in Indianapolis. Four other teams in Big Ten history have won both the Big Ten regular-season and tournament titles in the same season. Each of those teams has advanced to the Final Four (Michigan State in 1999 and 2000, Illinois in 2005 and Ohio State in 2007).

WISCONSIN CLAIMS BIG TEN TITLE: The Badgers claimed sole possession of the title for the second time in Bo Ryan's tenure and the third title in that seven-year span, sharing the crown in 2002 and winning the title outright in 2003. Wisconsin earns its 17th title in program history, tying Illinois and Ohio State for third in number of conference crowns. Purdue leads all Big Ten teams with 21 conference championships, while Indiana ranks second with 20 titles. After winning the Big Ten Tournament, Wisconsin now has 29 wins, second-most all-time, and 16 conference wins, a school record. Wisconsin's 30 triumphs in 2007 are the school record for overall wins.

LANDRY NAMED MOST OUTSTANDING PLAYER: Wisconsin's Marcus Landry was voted Most Outstanding Player of the 2008 Big Ten Men's Basketball Tournament. In the Badgers' three games during the tournament, Landry led the team in scoring averaging 12 points per game and was second on the squad in grabbing 7.3 rebounds per game. In Wisconsin's quarterfinal win over Michigan, Landry had eight points and seven boards. On Saturday in the 65-63 win against the Michigan State, the Milwaukee, Wis., native nearly had a double-double with his 18 points and nine rebounds. In the championship game, Landry helped stop a streaking Illinois squad by scoring 10 points with six caroms, adding four assists and two blocks. Landry was joined on the All-Tournament team by teammate Michael Flowers, Illinois' Demetri McCamey and Shaun Pruitt and Michigan State's Drew Neitzel.

GORDON CAPTURES SCORING TITLE: With 20.8 points per conference game this season (374 in 18 games), Indiana's Eric Gordon claimed the Big Ten's scoring title in conference only contests. Gordon led the conference for the duration of the season. The last Hoosier to lead the conference in scoring was Bracey Wright in 2005. Gordon becomes the first freshman since Minnesota's Kris Humphries to lead all players in scoring. Gordon was closely followed by teammate D.J. White, who closed out the conference season with 17.8 points per game.

DYNAMIC DUO: One of the nation's top inside-outside combinations, Eric Gordon and D.J. White finished the regular season ranked one and two in scoring. Gordon and White become the first teammates to accomplish that feat since Michigan's Glen Rice and Gary Grant finished first and second in scoring in 1987-88.

MR. DOUBLE-DOUBLE: Indiana's D.J. White finished the regular season as the Big Ten's rebounding champion, averaging 10.7 caroms per game. White is the first player to average a double-double in scoring and rebounding since Minnesota's Kris Humphries did so during the 2003-04 season.

WHITE TABBED BIG TEN PLAYER OF THE YEAR: Indiana's D.J. White captured the conference's highest honor as he was named the Big Ten Player of the Year in voting by both the coaches (unanimous) and the media. He is the sixth Hoosier to earn the award and the first since Jared Jeffries did so in 2002. In Big Ten games only, White led the conference in rebounding (10.7 rpg) and finished second in scoring (17.8 ppg). The senior forward finished the regular season averaging a double-double, becoming the first player to do so since Minnesota's Kris Humphries in 2004. This year, White moved into 19th place on the school's all-time scoring list with 1,402 points and is 14th all-time at IU with 714 rebounds.

OTHER INDIVIDUAL HONORS: In other individual accolades, Indiana's Eric Gordon was named Freshman of the Year by the coaches and media. Gordon led the conference in scoring all year, averaging 20.8 points in Big Ten games only. The 6-4 guard was joined by four other first-year standouts on the Big Ten All-Freshman Team. The five-man squad included Michigan's Manny Harris, Ohio State's Kosta Koufos and Purdue's Robbie Hummel and E'Twaun Moore. Purdue's Chris Kramer picked up Defensive Player of the Year laurels. Kramer earns his second nod as a member of the All-Defensive Team. Michigan State's Travis Walton and Wisconsin's Michael Flowers were also honored for a second-straight year and are joined by Michigan's Ekpe Udoh and Wisconsin's Joe Krabbenhoft on this year's All-Defensive Team. Wisconsin's Jason Bohannon, who recorded only two starts in 30 games this season, was named the Sixth Man of the Year. The sophomore guard provided a spark off the bench for the Badgers this season, averaging 8.2 points and 2.4 rebounds in all games.

ALL-CONFERENCE TEAM: Eleven of the 18 players named to the 2008 All-Big Ten first-, second- or third-teams have a chance to return to their teams next season. Both All-Big Ten first-team squads included Indiana's Eric Gordon, D.J. White, Purdue's Robbie Hummel and Wisconsin's Brian Butch. Michigan State senior Drew Neitzel was honored by the coaches, while the media named Ohio State's Jamar Butler to the top squad. White was a unanimous selection by both the coaches and media. MSU's Neitzel earned first-team laurels for the second-consecutive year.

BIG TEN CONFERENCE REACHES ATTENDANCE MILESTONES: The Big Ten has once again surpassed the two-million mark in total attendance and the one-million mark in conference games. The conference has welcomed 2,394,349 fans in 185 home contests. This is the 16th season in which the Big Ten has seen more than two million spectators pass through the turnstiles. For the 31st season, attendance at Big Ten contests has eclipsed the one-million mark, as 1,347,040 fans have attended 99 games. The conference is on pace to once again to lead the nation in average attendance.

POSTSEASON NOTES

BIG TEN TOURNAMENT ATTENDANCE SURPASSES ONE-MILLION MARK: After welcoming 969,038 patrons in its first decade, the Big Ten Men's Basketball Tournament broke the one-million barrier in total attendance with a sellout crowd of 18,691 during Friday night's session at Conseco Fieldhouse. Through five sessions of this year's event, the Big Ten has welcomed 80,012 fans to boost the all-time tournament attendance to 1,049,050.

BO KNOWS WINNING: Wisconsin received a No. 3 seed in the Midwest Region and will face 14th-seeded Cal-State Fullerton in the first round of the 2008 NCAA Tournament on Thursday. UW will be making its 10th consecutive appearance in the Big Dance. The No. 3 seed is the second-highest in school history, trailing only last year's No. 2 seed. Wisconsin joins Memphis, North Carolina, Kansas, UCLA and Georgetown as the only schools to earn top-three seeds in each of the last two seasons. The Badgers are one win shy of the school record for victories in a season, set by last year's 30-6 club. The Badgers' 59-10 (.855) record over the last two seasons is the fifth-best in the country.

STORIED TRADITION: Indiana will make its 35th appearance in the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament--fifth most in tournament history. Only Kentucky (49), North Carolina (40), UCLA (40) and Kansas (37) have made more appearances than the Hoosiers. Indiana enters this year's Tournament as the eighth seed in the East Region where they will face ninth seed Arkansas. The Hoosiers have won five national championships to rank third in the nation behind UCLA (11) and Kentucky (7) and have made eight Final Four appearances.

FAMILIAR SETTING: Michigan State will be making its 11th-straight NCAA appearance, the fifth-longest streak in the nation. Only Arizona (24), Kansas (19), Kentucky (17) and Duke (13) have made more consecutive appearances. The last time the Spartans were tabbed as the fifth seed, they won four games, including triumphs over Duke and Kentucky enroute to the Final Four. This is the fifth time in school history that the Spartans enter the NCAA Tournament as the No. 5 seed.

LUCKY NO. 6: Purdue is making its 21st appearance in the NCAA Tournament. The Boilermakers have a 27-20 record in the tournament. This is the second-consecutive appearance in the NCAA Tournament by the Boilermakers under head coach Matt Painter. Purdue has played in two Final Fours (1969, 1980) and made seven Sweet 16 appearances (1969, 1980, 1988, 1994, 1998, 1999, 2000). The Boilermakers are making their fifth appearance in the NCAA Tournament as a No. 6 seed. Purdue has been a No. 6 seed more than any other seed in its NCAA Tournament history. As a No. 6 seed, the Boilermakers are 8-4. They were the No. 6 seed in 1980, 1985, 1986 and most recently, 2000. Purdue's last appearance as the No. 6 seed was in the 2000 Tournament. That season, Purdue won its first three games before losing to Wisconsin in the West Regional final.

TWO MORE TEAMS DANCING IN MARCH: Minnesota and Ohio State both earned postseason berths to the National Invitation Tournament (NIT). The Buckeyes are the overall No. 1 seed and will host UNC-Asheville on Tuesday in a 7 p.m. EDT contest to air on ESPN2. The Gophers, who won 20 games for the first time since the 2004-05 campaign, will enter the tournament as a No. 4 seed and host No. 5 seed Maryland in a 8:30 p.m. CDT tilt to be broadcast on ESPN. Ohio State is making its 28th postseason appearance overall and eighth trip to the NIT. The Buckeyes are 13-7 in the NIT and claimed the title in 1986. Minnesota is making its 11th postseason NIT appearance and 16th postseason appearance overall. The Gophers claimed the 1993 NIT title and were the runners-up in 1980. Minnesota has an all-time record of 18-10 in the tournament.

MR. MARCH: Michigan State's Tom Izzo is no stranger to coaching basketball in March and has a top resume to prove it. Izzo has coached the Spartans to 11 NCAA appearances and owns a 24-9 record. Of the 64 coaches in this year's NCAA Tournament, Izzo has the third-best winning percentage (.727) only behind Duke's Mike Krzyzewski (.773) and Louisville's Rick Pitino (.744). He is only the second coach in NCAA history to reach four Final Fours in his first 10 years of coaching, joining Ohio State's Fred Taylor who took his Buckeyes to four Final Fours in his first 10 seasons. Izzo is also one of only nine coaches in NCAA Tournament history to advance to three straight Final Fours, which he accomplished from 1999-2001.

BIG TEN RETURNS TO TITLE GAME: For the fourth time in the last eight years, a Big Ten program advanced to the national championship game after Ohio State defeated Georgetown, 67-60, in the semifinal of the 2007 NCAA Tournament. However, the Buckeyes closed out the 2006-07 season with an 84-75 loss to Florida in the national championship game. OSU became the eighth different Big Ten program to compete for the national title. Indiana leads the conference contingent with six national final appearances, followed by Ohio State (5), Michigan (3), Michigan State (2), Illinois (1), Iowa (1), Purdue (1) and Wisconsin (1). OSU was also the third Big Ten school in the last three years to advance to the Final Four. Illinois and Michigan State both competed in the 2005 Final Four and the Fighting Illini advanced to the championship game before falling to North Carolina.

FINAL FOUR FRENZY: With Ohio State advancing to the 2007 Final Four, the Big Ten has accumulated the most Final Four appearances with 39 (ACC - 38) and ties the ACC and SEC with the second-most national titles (10) in college basketball history. The Pac-10 leads all conferences with 15 titles. Since the inception of the NCAA Tournament in 1939, the Big Ten has recorded the most appearances of any conference in the Big Dance with 184 (ACC, 171) and has the second-most NCAA Tournament victories with 290 (ACC, 323).

LOW SEEDS TURN INTO HIGH WIN TOTALS: Big Ten teams have made a habit of advancing deep into the tournament despite low seeds. In 2005, fifth-seeded Michigan State was the lowest-seeded team to advance to the Final Four. Five years ago, the Spartans were the lowest seed to reach the 2003 Elite Eight after winning three games despite earning a No. 7 seed. Two other conference teams have advanced to the Final Four in the last eight years despite their low seeds, as fifth-seeded Indiana advanced to the 2002 national championship game and eighth-seeded Wisconsin reached the national semifinals in 2000.

THE BIG DANCE CONSTANTS: Michigan State is one of only five schools in the nation that has advanced to the NCAA Tournament in each of the last 11 years, joining Arizona, Duke, Kansas and Kentucky. Wisconsin is only one of eight schools to make 10 straight appearances. The Badgers are joined by Gonzaga and Texas and the five teams listed above.

NINE-YEAR PLAN: Over the last nine NCAA Tournaments (including 2007), the Big Ten ranks second in winning percentage (.633), while finishing third among all conferences in victories (76). See the chart below for the complete NCAA Tournament breakdown for the Big Ten, ACC, Big 12, Big East, Pac-10 and SEC over the last nine seasons.

BIG TEN TOURNAMENT BENEFITS: Since the inception of the Big Ten Tournament in 1998, the conference has sent eight different teams to the Final Four and has won over 60 percent of its NCAA Tournament games, compiling a record of 82-48 in the national event from 1998 through 2007. The conference teams that have won the Big Ten Tournament have combined to post a 23-7 (.767) record in the NCAA Championship.

BREAKING EVEN IN NCAA PLAY: With a record of 9-6 in the 2007 NCAA Tournament, the Big Ten has produced a mark of .500 or better in nine of the last 10 events. Among the six conferences with the most tournament wins over that time span, only the ACC and Big East have posted NCAA records of .500 or better over the last 10 years. The Big East has broken even in two of the last seven years (2002: 6-6, 2001: 5-5) while the ACC's lowest winning percentage occurred with a 5-4 finish in 2003. The Big 12 (2001, 1999, 1998), Pac-10 (2004, 1999) and SEC (2002, 2001) have all been under .500 at least twice in the last 10 seasons.

REQUISITE FOR THE FINAL FOUR?: Twice in the last three years, the Big Ten Tournament Champion has gone on to appear in the championship game of the NCAA Final Four. Illinois captured the 2005 Tournament crown and went on to finish as the national runner up. Last year, Tournament champion Ohio State made a run through the NCAA Tournament and landed in the national championship game, falling to Florida for runner-up honors. Wisconsin is this year's Big Ten Tournament champion and looks to advance through the Midwest Regional for a spot in the Final Four. Prior to the 2005 season, Michigan State was the last Big Ten Tournament champion to appear in the Final Four. The Spartans won the 2000 conference tournament title and went on to win the national title.

BIG TEN SKIPPERS IN THE POSTSEASON: This year's four coaches in the NCAA postseason have plenty of experience under their belts. Wisconsin's **Bo Ryan** has led the Badgers to an NCAA Tournament appearance in each of his seven seasons at the helm in Madison. Under Ryan, Wisconsin is 8-6 in tournament games. As a program, the UW men's basketball team has made 10 consecutive NCAA appearances overall and has been to the big dance in 11 of the last 12 seasons. Purdue makes its second consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance under head coach **Matt Painter**. This is the first time that the Boilermakers have made back-to-back appearances since they made four consecutive tournaments from 1997-2000. In just four years of head coaching experience, Painter has been to the tournament three times. He led Southern Illinois to the dance in 2004 and Purdue in each of the last two seasons. Indiana's **Dan Dakich** will make his first NCAA Tournament appearance as a head coach. Dakich is no stranger to postseason play, having coached under Bob Knight for 12 seasons from 1985-1997. During that time on staff, Indiana compiled a 283-101 (.737) record. Over that span, the Hoosiers won the national title in 1987 and earned a spot in the NCAA Tournament in each of his 12 seasons. Before returning this year, Dakich spent 10 seasons as head coach at Bowling Green. His 2000 squad won the regular season MAC title and played in the NIT. He also guided the Falcons to another NIT appearance in 2002 and was just one of three coaches in school history to post four 18-plus win seasons or more in men's basketball. Michigan State's **Tom Izzo** is the veteran among the group, making 11 NCAA Tournament appearances in his 13-year coaching tenure in East Lansing, while making four Final Four appearances.

MORE ON THE COACHES: Ohio State's **Thad Matta** and Minnesota's **Tubby Smith** lead their respective teams to postseason action this week in the 2008 MasterCard NIT. In his first season at the helm of the Minnesota program, Smith has led the Gophers to their first 20-win season since 2004-05. Minnesota will make its first postseason appearance since the 2005-06 season when it played in that year's NIT. In 17 years of coaching, Smith has now led teams to postseason play in 15 consecutive seasons dating back to 1994 and is 29-13 in those appearances. Smith has guided teams to four NCAA Elite Eight appearances, nine NCAA Sweet Sixteen appearances and captured a national championship at Kentucky in 1998. In eight years as a head coach, Matta has made seven postseason appearances and won 20 games his first year in Columbus when OSU was ineligible for postseason play. Matta has been to the NCAA Tournament six times including last year's run to the NCAA National Championship game and owns a 12-6 record in those games. This will be the third consecutive year that the Buckeyes have participated in postseason play under Matta.

CREAM OF THE CROP: With the addition of **Todd Licklitter** at Iowa, **John Beilein** at Michigan and **Tubby Smith** at Minnesota, the Big Ten coaching contingent boasts five national coach of the year honorees, more than any other conference. The Big Ten's five national coach of the year award winners include Illinois' **Bruce Weber** (2005-various selectors), Iowa's Licklitter (2007-NABC), Michigan State's **Tom Izzo** (2001-NABC, 1999-Basketball Times, 1998-various selectors), Minnesota's Smith (2005-Phelan Award, 2003-various selectors) and Wisconsin's **Bo Ryan** (2007-Rupp Cup). The current crop of Big Ten coaches has won eight national coach of the year awards, which ranks second only to the ACC with 12. The Big Ten tops all conferences with five national coach of the year honorees, fol-

COBLE AMONG FINALISTS FOR V FOUNDATION COMEBACK AWARD:

Northwestern sophomore forward **Kevin Coble** is among the 14 finalists for the eighth-annual V Foundation Comeback Award as announced by The V Foundation for Cancer Research. The award is presented in conjunction with ESPN and the recipient will be announced during ESPN's Final Four/NIT weekend coverage. The annual award is open to men and women collegiate basketball student-athletes in all divisions. It is awarded to an individual or a team who has accomplished a personal triumph in the face of true adversity, be it in health, life or moral dilemma. Student-athletes are nominated by their athletics department representative. The award is presented in memory of Jim Valvano, the late basketball coach and ESPN commentator, whose personal battle with cancer inspired the creation of The V Foundation. This past summer Coble's mother was diagnosed with breast cancer and he, an only child, made the decision to stay home in Arizona to help care for his mother. Coble remained enrolled in three classes (including statistics and Swahili) and kept up his class work long-distance in order to remain eligible to return to the team in January.

PLAYING SMART BASKETBALL: Michigan State's **Drew Neitzel** was named to the 2008 *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-America second-team. Neitzel, who is an interdisciplinary humanities major, becomes the fifth men's basketball player in Michigan State history to earn Academic All-America accolades. He becomes the 47th Big Ten standout to be honored. To be nominated, student-athletes must be a starter or important reserve and carry a cumulative grade point average of 3.20 or higher.

RYAN AND PAINTER NOMINATED FOR HENRY IBA AWARD

Two Big Ten Coaches have been named to the nominee list for the 2008 Henry Iba Award presented by the USBWA. Wisconsin's **Bo Ryan** has been nominated as well as Purdue's **Matt Painter**. The Henry Iba Award has been presented since 1959. It is named for the legendary Oklahoma State coach. The finalist will be announced during the Men's Final Four in San Antonio. Five Big Ten coaches collected the Henry Iba Award nine times since its inception--Ohio State's Fred Taylor (1961, 1962), Indiana's Bob Knight (1975, 1976, 1989), Purdue's Gene Keady (1984, 1996), Ohio State's Randy Ayers (1991) and Michigan State's **Tom Izzo** (1998).

MORE TV COVERAGE THAN EVER

For the first time in Big Ten history, every men's basketball home game was televised by CBS Sports, an ESPN platform or the Big Ten Network. The unprecedented television exposure for the 2007-08 Big Ten men's basketball season featured increased coverage from long-time partners CBS Sports and ESPN. The Big Ten's latest media agreements resulted in 17 games appearing on CBS Sports, including the semifinal and championship games of the 2008 Big Ten Men's Basketball Tournament to be played from March 13-16 in Indianapolis, Ind.



The conference's new 10-year national rights contract with ESPN meant that between 53 and 56 home games appeared on an ESPN platform, with the majority of contests broadcast by ESPN or ESPN2. The total number of games on an ESPN network increased to as many as 83 contests when including non-conference away or neutral-site matchups. The new agreement also doubled the amount of mid-week games featured during intraconference play, as ESPN or ESPN2 aired a weekly contest on both Tuesday and Thursday. An ESPN platform also showed games on Saturday and Sunday, along with first-round and quarterfinal matchups of the Big Ten Men's Basketball Tournament.



The Big Ten Network distributed at least 135 Big Ten men's basketball games during the 2007-08 season. The Big Ten Network schedule began with every exhibition contest and all home non-conference games not appearing on CBS Sports or an ESPN network. Once Big Ten play rolled around, the network schedule featured a double-header every Wednesday night along with games on Tuesday or Thursday nights and a robust package of games on the weekends, including double-, triple- and quadruple-headers. All intraconference games were distributed on a national basis, which meant the end of the split-regional or local broadcasts seen in the past. The Big Ten Network also televised first-round and quarterfinal contests during the Big Ten Men's Basketball Tournament.

The Big Ten's "Greatest Games" to Air on Big Ten Network: Throughout the winter, basketball fans had the opportunity to re-live 36 epic match-ups on the Big Ten Network series, "THE BIG TEN'S GREATEST GAMES." The series highlighted some of the best moments in the rich histories of all 11 Big Ten basketball programs. Series producers interviewed many legendary players and coaches from those games along with those who were on hand to cover the event. Their insight and memories were integrated into each episode. 2008 BIG TEN TOURNAMENT REVIEW

The 2008 Big Ten Men's Basketball Tournament was one of the most competitive in the history of the event. Seven of the 10 games were decided by a margin of seven points or less, with four of those being settled by four points or less. The first day began with No. 9 **Michigan** winning over No. 8 **Iowa**, 55-47. The final two games were also thrilling and competitive with No. 10 **Illinois** beating No. 7 **Penn State**, 64-63, and No. 6 **Minnesota** coming back from a 16-point deficit to knock off No. 11 **Northwestern**, 55-52.

Quarterfinal action began with top-seeded **Wisconsin** taking down the Wolverines, 51-34. In the second game on Friday, No. 4 **Michigan State** was triumphant over No. 5 **Ohio State**, 67-60. Illinois held No. 2 **Purdue** without a field goal in its overtime stanza for a 74-67 win to move the semifinals. Friday's action was capped off with one of the most exciting finishes in the Big Ten this year, as Minnesota's **Blake Hoffarber** knocked down a game-winning shot at the buzzer after receiving a full court pass with 1.5 seconds remaining to beat No. 3 **Indiana**, 59-58.

The semifinals were also very competitive as Wisconsin rallied from a 12-point deficit in the second half to upend the Spartans, 65-63. The Fighting Illini made tournament history with their 54-50 win over the Golden Gophers to become the first No. 10 seed ever to play in the championship game. However, the Badgers proved to be too much for Illinois in the end, as Wisconsin won the tournament finale, 61-48, marking the first time that the program has won both Big Ten regular season and tournament championships in the same year.
