BIG TEN PLAYER OF THE WEEK

Alando Tucker, Wisconsin
6-6, F, Jr., Lockport, Ill./Township

Tucker notched game highs of 27 points and 16 rebounds to lead Wisconsin to a come-from-behind, 78-73, upset over No. 12 Ohio State to claim Player of the Week laurels. Tucker scored 17 of his 27 points in the decisive second half when UW outscored OSU, 50-36. The junior forward, who claimed his third double-double of the season, shot 55.6 percent from the field (10-of-18), while also going 7-of-11 from the free throw line. In addition, Tucker notched two assists, a block and a steal in 40 minutes of action as the Badgers won their third straight game and jumped to a second-place tie in the conference standings. He currently leads the Big Ten with 20.9 points per game in league contests and has scored at least 20 points in eight of 12 conference games. The Lockport, Ill., native earns his second Big Ten weekly accolade as he was also honored on Nov. 21, 2005.

Tournament Career

Records: A trio of league players already appear on the career top-10 lists in Big Ten Tournament play. Illinois'



James Augustine currently ranks second in career rebounds with 70 boards, just 26 rebounds away from breaking the record of 95 set by Iowa's Reggie Evans (2001-02). Teammate **Dee Brown** is just one steal away from equaling the career theft record of 21 held by former Illini standout Sergio McClain (1998-01). Brown also appears on the assists all-time list, tying for fifth place with 42. Michigan State's Mateen Cleaves (1998-00) holds the all-time assists mark with 55 assists in seven games. On the blocked shots career laurels, Iowa's **Greg Brunner** is tied for seventh with nine career rejections in tournament play. Indiana's Jeff Newton set the Big Ten Tournament record with 16 career blocked shots in nine games.

BIG TEN NOTES

The Final Stretch: With just two weeks left in the Big Ten regular season, six teams are above .500 in conference play as Iowa leads the league contingent with a 9-4 mark. Illinois, Ohio State and Wisconsin are tied for second with matching 8-4 records. With a victory over Michigan on Saturday, Michigan State (7-5) moved into fifth place, while the Wolverines are just a half game behind the Spartans with a 7-6 mark. Of the top three teams, Iowa wraps up the conference slate with two of three contests at home, while Illinois and Wisconsin play three of their four games on the road. Michigan State has the toughest slate of the top six teams as its remaining opponents boast a .604 winning percentage (29-19), however the Spartans will close out the league slate with three out of their four contests at home.

Six Named to Naismith Midseason Watch List: Six Big Ten standouts - Illinois' **Dee Brown**, Iowa's **Greg Brunner**, Michigan State's **Maurice Ager**, **Shannon Brown** and **Paul Davis** and Wisconsin's **Alando Tucker** - were named midseason candidates for the Naismith Trophy presented by Cingular Wireless. These players will now be eligible for the final ballot in March when four finalists for the award are announced by the Atlanta Tipoff Club's Board of Selectors. The Naismith Trophy winner will be named at the NCAA Final Four in Indianapolis.

15 Big Ten Standouts Earn NABC All-District Accolades: The National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) announced its Division I All-District teams last week as 15 Big Ten student-athletes were recognized for their achievements on the court. Indiana's **Marco Killingsworth** and Ohio State's **Terence Dials** were named to the District 10's first team, while Indiana's **Robert Vaden** and Ohio State's **Je'Kel Foster** earned second-team accolades. Illinois' **James Augustine** and **Dee Brown**, Michigan State's **Maurice Ager** and **Shannon Brown** and Wisconsin's **Alando Tucker** made up the District 11 first team, while Michigan's **Daniel Horton**, Michigan State's **Paul Davis**, Minnesota's **Vincent Grier** and Northwestern's **Vedran Vukusic** picked up second-team accolades. Iowa's **Greg Brunner** was a first-team selection on the District 12 squad, while teammate **Adam Haluska** was named to the second team. All 15 players are now eligible for selection to the NABC All-American Team to be announced at the end of the season.

Horner Becomes Iowa's All-time Assist Leader: Iowa senior **Jeff Horner** became the Hawkeyes' career assist leader in the win over Michigan State last Monday, collecting 15 points and six assists against the Spartans. Horner's pass to Erek Hansen for Iowa's first basket of the second half moved Horner past Andre Woolridge (575, 1995-97) on Iowa's career list. He currently stands eighth on the Big Ten's all-time assist chart with 582, while Illinois' **Dee Brown** is ranked sixth on the league's list with 628 dishes in his four-year career.

Big Ten Rebounding Leaders: As Illinois' **Dee Brown** and Iowa's **Jeff Horner** eye the league's career assist record, other Big Ten standouts are nearing career milestones this season. Illinois' career leading rebounder, **James Augustine**, is only 40 boards away from reaching the 1,000-plateau, while Iowa's **Greg Brunner**, who is the Hawkeyes' career leader in rebounds, has currently tallied 945 all-time boards in his four-year career. Augustine and Brunner are on pace to becoming just the 11th and 12th player, respectively, in Big Ten history to record 1,000 career rebounds. The last Big Ten standout to record more than 1,000 all-time boards was Indiana's Alan Henderson, who concluded his four-year career with 1,091 rebounds to rank fifth on the conference's career list. Ohio State's Jerry Lucas (1959-62) is the Big Ten's rebounding leader with 1,411 boards.

Big Ten's Grand Company: Indiana's **Marshall Strickland** (985) and Minnesota's **Vincent Grier** (988) are less than 25 points away from becoming the next Big Ten standouts to reach the 1,000-point plateau. The league's group of 1,000-point scorers has doubled from the start of the season as 16 standouts are now above that scoring plateau, including three teams with three players. Eight Big Ten seniors began the season on the 1,000-point list in Illinois' **Dee Brown** (1,724), Indiana's **Marco Killingsworth** (1,451), Iowa's **Greg Brunner** (1,420) and **Jeff Horner** (1,396), Michigan's **Daniel Horton** (1,425), Michigan State's **Paul Davis** (1,592), Northwestern's **Vedran Vukusic** (1,510) and Ohio State's **Terence Dials** (1,413). Eight more players joined the list this season in Illinois' **James Augustine** (1,277), Iowa's **Adam Haluska** (1,144), Michigan's **Dion Harris** (1,044), Michigan State's **Maurice Ager** (1,380) and **Shannon Brown** (1,072), Ohio State's **Ron Lewis** (1,153) and **J.J. Sullinger** (1,107) and Wisconsin's **Alando Tucker** (1,393). The Big Ten's "Grand Company" list appears to the right.

Big Ten Homecourt Winning Streaks: Iowa and Michigan State are vying for the league's longest homecourt winning streaks as both boast 15 consecutive wins at home. Iowa is undefeated at Carver-Hawkeye Arena this season with a school-record 15 wins and has broken the arena record with 16 consecutive home victories going back to last season. The Hawkeyes have not lost at home since Illinois defeated Iowa, 76-65, on Feb. 19, 2005. Michigan State currently boasts 14 straight home triumphs at the Breslin Center. The Spartans' last loss was also against the Fighting Illini as Illinois claimed an 81-66 victory on Feb. 1, 2005.

COUNTDOWN TO INDY...

Native Sons Return to Indy: The Big Ten Conference includes at least 17 men's basketball players from the state of Indiana, as six of the 11 schools carry at least one Indiana native on the roster. Indiana leads the conference with seven native sons while Purdue has six in-state products on its 2006 squad. Iowa, Michigan, Michigan State and Northwestern each feature one player from Indiana. The five schools without an Indiana product on the team include Illinois, Minnesota, Ohio State, Penn State and Wisconsin.

Throw Out The Records: History has shown that every team at the Big Ten Tournament will have a shot at leaving town with the title. Last year, Iowa advanced to the semifinals as the No. 7 seed, defeating No. 3 Michigan State before falling to second-seeded Wisconsin. In 2003, Ohio State advanced to the title game despite holding the No. 8 seed. In 2002, Iowa reached the finals as the ninth seed, just one season after becoming the lowest-seeded team to win the Big Ten Tournament, as the sixth-seeded Hawkeyes won four games in four days to earn the league's NCAA automatic berth in 2001. In addition to the magical runs of OSU and Iowa the last four years, the No. 4 seed has advanced to the finals three times. In only the last two years has the No. 1 and the No. 2 seed faced off in the championship final. Last season, No. 1 Illinois defeated second-seeded Wisconsin. In 2004, the No. 2 Badgers defeated the No. 1 seeded Fighting Illini.

Top Tourney Teams: Illinois leads the league in winning percentage and total wins in Big Ten Tournament play with a record of 16-6 (.727) over eight years. That mark includes two tournament crowns, three second-place finishes and a current streak of three straight victories. Iowa boasts the league's second-best winning percentage with a record of 10-7 (.588), including the 2001 title, while Michigan State follows in third place with an 8-6 mark (.571). The Spartans, along with Illinois, are the only two-time winners in the event after MSU claimed the 1999 and 2000 titles. Wisconsin has produced a 9-7 mark with a championship game victory in 2004, the last time the tournament was held in Indianapolis. Every Big Ten team has won at least one tourney game.

Winningest Coaches: Only five coaches boast winning percentages of .600 or better in Big Ten Tournament play, and three will be returning to Consecro Fieldhouse in 2006. After advancing to the last two championship finals and claiming the 2005 Big Ten Tournament title, Illinois' **Bruce Weber** leads all coaches in winning percentage with a record of 5-1 (.833). Former Fighting Illini coach Bill Self follows in second place with a .714 winning percentage, while Iowa's **Steve Alford**, who boasts a 10-5 record (.667) is tied for third in winning percentage with former Illini coach Lon Kruger (6-3; .667). Wisconsin's **Bo Ryan** follows in fifth place with a 5-3 mark (.625). Alford leads all coaches with 10 triumphs, while Michigan State's **Tom Izzo** has tallied eight victories and two titles in eight events.

Tournament Success: Since the inception of the Big Ten Tournament in 1998, the conference has sent eight teams to the Final Four and has won over 65 percent of its NCAA Tournament games. The league has compiled a record of 76-40 in the national event over the past eight seasons, which is tied with the ACC for the most NCAA Tournament wins over that time span. The Big East follows in second with 67 triumphs, while the Big 12 ranks third with 61 wins.

All-Tournament Selections: Four conference standouts return after earning All-Tournament honors in past Big Ten Tournaments. Last year, Illinois' **James Augustine**, who was named Most Outstanding Player, was joined by Minnesota's **Vincent Grier** and Wisconsin's **Alando Tucker** on the 2005 Big Ten All-Tournament team. Illinois' **Dee Brown** also claimed All-Tourney laurels in 2004. Illinois leads the league with six All-Tournament selections, including two-time honoree Brian Cook (2000-03), while Ohio State follows with six honorees. Every conference squad has placed at least one student-athlete on the All-Tournament team.

Media Advisory: *The credential application deadline is Friday, Feb. 24.*

Credential Information: The 2006 Big Ten Men's Basketball Tournament credential website is now online and available for media use. Please contact the Big Ten Communications office for access information to the website. **The deadline to apply for credentials is Friday, Feb. 24.** After you have read and accepted the credential criteria and policies, the following web page will ask you to "Please select the Big Ten university you usually cover. If you do not cover a specific Big Ten school on a regular basis, select 'Other Media.'" **If your media agency normally covers a Big Ten team,** you must select that university when applying for credentials on the website. Upon filling out and submitting your credential application, you will receive an automated confirmation that your form has been received by that school's men's basketball SID. After the SID reviews your application, you will receive an acceptance or denial email. If you receive an acceptance email, your name will be added to that school's media list and **pending final approval of the Big Ten Conference,** will be approved for credentials. You do not need to contact the Big Ten Communications office to verify your credential approval. By February 24, you will receive additional tournament media information via email from the Big Ten Communications Department. The SIDs will also have a limited number of parking credentials to distribute in advance to their media outlets. **If your media agency does not normally cover a conference team,** just click on the "Media Type" drop-down box and

select "Other Media" at the bottom of the list and follow the instructions noted above. If you discover that you need to make changes to your application after you submit it, please contact the men's basketball SID at the school you cover. Also if you cannot apply online, please contact our office to apply for credentials.



Big Ten Tournament Tickets on Sale: All-session tickets for the 2006 Big Ten Men's Basketball Tournament, along with single-session tickets, went on sale to the general public on Wednesday, Nov. 23. All-session and single-session tickets for the men's tournament, which includes 10 games over four days, are available at the Consecro Fieldhouse box office, Ticketmaster outlets, www.ticketmaster.com or by calling Ticketmaster at (317) 239-5151 (in central Indiana). The cost for men's tournament all-session tickets will be either \$125 or \$225 depending on seat location, while the single-session tickets range from \$25 to \$75 based on seat location and session. Orders are limited to 12 all-session tickets or 12 single-session tickets for each session.

- Nov. 21** **Marco Killingsworth, IND:** Tallied career highs in points (28), rebounds (13), assists (6) and blocked shots (4); Shot 12-of-18 from the floor and earned his first double-double as a Hoosier in 33 minutes of action.
- Alando Tucker, WIS:** Led the Badgers to a pair of victories after averaging 24 points and 9.0 rebounds per game at the Paradise Jam Tournament; Established a tournament record with a career-high 38 points in a 95-89 double-overtime victory over Eastern Kentucky.
- Nov. 28** **Paul Davis, MSU:** Averaged a double-double with 22.5 points and 12.3 rebounds in four games to lead MSU to a 3-1 record; Tallied 30 points on 12-of-17 shooting against IPFW, finishing just two points shy of his career best, while adding 14 rebounds for his fourth double-double of the season.
