## PLAYERS OF THE WEEK

### OFFENSE:

#### Brett Basanez, Northwestern

#### JR, QB, Arlington Heights, Ill./St. Viator

Basanez shattered three school records in the Wildcats double-overtime loss at TCU, including compiling 548 yards of total offense, the second-highest figure in Big Ten history. The junior quarterback also established NU records with 513 passing yards (fifth in Conference annals) and three TD passes in a half. For the game, he set career-highs with 39 completions, 62 attempts and four touchdown strikes, all of which rank second in the school record books. Basanez' four scoring passes equaled his total from all of last year when he started all 13 games. This is the first weekly honor for the Illinois native.

### DEFENSE:

#### Chad Greenway, Iowa

#### JR, LB, Mt. Vernon, S.D./Mt. Vernon

Greenway racked up a team-high 10 tackles for an Iowa defense that held the Kent State offense to -13 rushing yards and no points in a victory on Saturday. The junior linebacker also recorded two tackles for loss, a pass break-up and the first two interceptions of his career, including a 30-yard touchdown return in the fourth quarter. The 2003 Second Team All-Big Ten selection added a blocked punt in the third quarter, the second of his career. This is Greenway's second weekly accolade, as he was honored on September 22 last year. He was also named the National Defensive Player of the Week by the Walter Camp Football Foundation.

### SPECIAL TEAMS:

#### Rhys Lloyd, Minnesota

#### SR, K/P, Dover, England/RCTC/Eastview

Lloyd equaled the school record by converting all nine of his extra points and placed his only punt inside the 20-yard line in a win over Toledo. The senior kicker/punter also rushed for a pair of first downs on fake punts, including a 21-yard scamper that led to a Gophers touchdown on the opening drive. This is his second weekly award, as he was previously selected on November 10, 2003.

ILL CB **Kelvin Hayden**: Six tackles, forced fumble, two interceptions, including a 23-yard TD, and a PBU in first collegiate game at CB after leading Illinois in receiving last year.  
 IND DT **Jodie Clemons**: Two solo tackles, one sack (-10 yards) and one TFL (-3 yards).  
 MICH S **Ernest Shazor**: Four tackles (three solo) and an interception returned 88 yards for a TD, the longest return for Michigan in 33 years.  
 MSU LB **Ronald Stanley**: Career-high 17 tackles (six solo) and 2.5 TFLs (-4 yards).  
 OSU LB **Bobby Carpenter**: Nine tackles (five solo) against Cincinnati.  
 PSU CB **Anwar Phillips**: Four tackles (two solo) and two interceptions (47 yards).  
 PUR CB **Bernard Pollard**: Five tackles (two solo), sack (-3 yards), forced fumble and first career interception (19 yards).

ILL K **Jason Reda**: One-of-one (35) on field goals and seven-of-seven on PATs to tally 10 points, the most for an Illini true freshman kicker since 1973.  
 MSU P **Brandon Fields**: Seven punts for 322 yards (46.0 avg.) with two inside the 20.  
 OSU KR **Maurice Hall**: Two kickoff returns for 84 yards (42.0 avg.) vs. Cincinnati.  
 WIS K **Mike Allen**: Two-of-three (40, 29) on field goals and four-of-four on PATs.

**Alvarez Joins Century Club**: Wisconsin's Barry Alvarez became just the 10th head coach in Big Ten history and the first in school annals to compile 100 wins at a single school with a 34-6 home triumph over Central Florida on Saturday. Alvarez improves to 100-67-4 in his 15th season in Madison, including a mark of 7-2 in bowl games and three Rose Bowl victories. **Another Attendance Record**: The Big Ten shattered the oldest single-day attendance record in Conference history during the opening week of play, as 650,916 fans attended nine home contests for an average of 72,324 patrons per game. The old nine-game record had stood since October 6, 1980, when 596,916 fans were present at nine home contests (66,324 avg.). The new record included four sellouts last weekend, as Wisconsin attracted a school-record 82,116 fans to the refurbished Camp Randall Stadium and Iowa equaled its program-best with another sellout of 70,397 patrons. The Conference set single-day attendance records three times last season, twice establishing a new high mark for six-game weekends (most recently averaging 86,265 fans on September 27) and setting a new record for a four-game weekend (averaging 83,399 patrons on October 18).

**First Trophy Game of 2004**: In a conference with 15 traditional trophy games, the first one on the line in 2004 will be by the Cy-Hawk Trophy as Iowa hosts Iowa State. The Hawkeyes hold an 18-9 advantage in Cy-Hawk games, including a road victory last season.

**Explosive Offenses . . .** : Big Ten offenses were clicking in the first week of play, as seven of the 11 teams produced 40 or more points. That total includes three games with more than 50 points, which equals the number of non-conference games featuring 50 or more points last season. Minnesota led the way with 63 points and 704 yards of total offense against Toledo, both of which rank second in school annals in the modern era (since 1946). Illinois rolled up 52 points against Florida A&M while Purdue scored 51 points in a shutout of Syracuse. Other schools to tally 40 or more points were Indiana, Michigan, Northwestern and Penn State.

**. . . and Stingy Defenses:** In addition to the offensive fireworks, seven Big Ten defenses limited their opponents to 10 points or less. The Boilermakers posted the only shutout while Iowa's defense allowed no offensive points to Kent State, whose only score came on an interception return. Ohio State and Wisconsin held their foes to a pair of field goals while Indiana, Michigan and Penn State gave up a mere 10 points in their wins.

**Something Old, Something New:** Six of the 11 Big Ten teams introduced new quarterbacks in the first week of action in Iowa, Michigan, Michigan State, Minnesota, Ohio State and Wisconsin, as the new signal callers produced five victories and some impressive numbers. Hawkeyes sophomore **Drew Tate**, the program's fifth starting QB in as many years, guided his offense to 39 points in his debut while tossing a pair of touchdown passes. The Wolverines' **Chad Henne** became just the second true freshman to start a Michigan season opener, joining former standout Rick Leach who started the 1975 campaign. Henne connected on two scoring strikes while replacing junior **Matt Gutierrez**, who was slated for his first career start before being held out with a sore arm. The Spartans **Damon Dowdell** stepped in for the departed Jeff Smoker and threw for 270 yards and two touchdowns in a narrow loss at Rutgers. Gophers' sophomore **Bryan Cupito** led his team to touchdowns on the first six drives of his first career start and completed 83 percent of his passes (10-of-12) for 279 yards and a score, as Minnesota racked up 704 yards of total offense, the second highest single-game total in school history. The Buckeyes introduced a pair of sophomore quarterbacks, as **Justin Zwick** recorded his first career start while **Troy Smith** also saw some action, with both players notching their first career touchdown passes. The final fresh face was Badgers' sophomore **John Stocco**, who passed for two scores and rushed for a touchdown in his first career start.

The Conference's five returning starters also performed well under center, as Illinois' **Jon Beutjer** connected on 16-of-18 passes in leading the Illini to 52 points, Indiana's **Matt LoVecchio** guided the Hoosiers to 41 points, Northwestern's **Brett Basanez** set three school records and finished with 548 yards of total offense in a double-overtime defeat at TCU, Penn State's **Zack Mills** became the first player in the **Joe Paterno** era to produce touchdowns rushing, passing and receiving, while Purdue's **Kyle Orton** set a career-high with four touchdown passes in leading his offense to 51 points.

**Big Ten Record Chasers:** Purdue wide receiver **Taylor Stubblefield** continued his march towards the top spot among all Big Ten reception leaders with five catches for 121 yards and two touchdowns in the season-opening victory over Syracuse. The Boilermaker wideout now has 241 career receptions, just 21 behind Illinois' David Williams (262 catches) for second place and 25 behind former teammate John Standeford (266 catches). The man throwing the ball to Stubblefield is senior **Kyle Orton**, who is nearing the top 10 in a number of Big Ten categories including completions (566), attempts (977) and yards (6,534). Wisconsin defensive back **Jim Leonhard** recorded four punt returns for 68 yards against Central Florida to climb into sole possession of seventh place with 972 career yards. That total is just 35 yards shy of former-Badger Nick Davis who holds the school record and ranks sixth in League annals with 1,007 return yards. Leonhard is also tied for eighth in Big Ten history with 18 interceptions. Michigan wide receiver **Braylon Edwards** snagged a pair of touchdown passes to increase his career total to 26 scores, just one shy of a five-way tie for eighth place. Edwards is also nearing the top 10 in receptions (161) and yards (2,303).

**Big Ten on TV:** For the second straight week, nine of the 11 Big Ten games this weekend will be televised, including three games on ABC and one on NBC. No fewer than 68 Big Ten football games (60 home, eight road) will be televised by ABC Sports, ESPN, ESPN2, ESPN Regional, NBC Sports, and Fox Sports Net this season. Last season, the Conference had more football television exposure than at any time in its history with a total of 80 games televised in the regular-season and post-season, while attendance figures soared above 70,000 per game for the fourth consecutive year.

# 2004 BIG TEN FOOTBALL

**Big Ten Instant Replay:** The Big Ten is using an experimental instant replay system during the 2004 season, as four of the League's eight home games this weekend will utilize the new system. The NCAA Football Rules Committee granted the Big Ten the right to experiment with instant replay on a one-year basis for all televised games at League stadiums in 2004. While all 44 Big Ten games will utilize this system, visiting teams during non-conference contests must approve the usage of instant replay. The four schools that did not grant their approval for use of the system were Arizona State (Sept. 11 at Northwestern), UCLA (Sept. 11 at Illinois), Iowa State (Sept. 11 at Iowa) and San Diego State (Sept. 18 at Michigan). The remaining 13 non-conference opponents consented to the use of instant replay, while the system will be unavailable for the five home games not scheduled to be televised (Florida A&M and Western Michigan at Illinois; Central Michigan at Indiana; Kansas at Northwestern; Ball State at Purdue). **Pre-Season Picks:** Media members attending the Big Ten Conference media days in August selected Michigan to repeat as League champions while Ohio State was dubbed the No. 2 pick and Iowa was tabbed for third place (the Big Ten only releases a top three poll). Also chosen for awards by the media were Purdue quarterback **Kyle Orton** as Offensive Player of the Year and OSU linebacker **A.J. Hawk** as Defensive Player of the Year.

### Big Ten Bowl Bits from 2003:

- For the first time in Big Ten history, the Conference sent eight football programs to postseason play. The Big Ten had sent seven teams to postseason play on five occasions, in 1993, 1996, 1997, 1999 and 2002. Only two other conferences have earned more than seven bowl bids in a single season - the SEC (9 in 2000, 8 in 1998, 1999 and 2001) and the Big 12 (8 in 2001, 2002, and 2003).

- For the 11th straight year and 18th time overall, the Big Ten Conference sent five or more teams to postseason play. It was the 12th time that six or more Big Ten teams participated in bowls and the sixth time for seven teams.

- Big Ten teams have made 85 bowl appearances since the 1990 season. Overall, Big Ten teams have made 206 bowl appearances -- the third-highest total of all Division I-A conferences (SEC 323, Big 12 281).

- Big Ten teams played in front of a total of 509,726 fans in eight bowl games last year, including a sellout in the Rose Bowl, for an average of more than 63,000 patrons per contest.

- In 2004, the Big Ten again has contractual tie-ins with the Rose/BCS, Capital One, Outback, Alamo, Sun, Music City and

Motor City bowls.

- With a 14-12 (.539) mark, the Big Ten played the most games and compiled the most victories against BCS conference opponents last season. The break-down was:

**Wolverines Win 2003 Big Ten Championship:** Michigan added to its Conference-high total of Big Ten crowns as the Wolverines claimed the 2003 title. Michigan now leads all Conference programs with 41 Big Ten Championships, including four in the last seven seasons (1997, 1998, 2000, 2003), as Ohio State ranks second with 29 titles and no other League team boasts half of UM's sum. Wolverines mentor **Lloyd Carr** now has four Conference crowns, more than any other active coach as Wisconsin's **Barry Alvarez** ranks second with three first-place finishes. Michigan is the sixth Big Ten team in the last decade to claim sole possession of the League title, as multiple squads had shared the title in three of the previous five years, including 2002 co-champions Iowa and Ohio State. The last Conference program to end the year alone atop the standings was Illinois in 2001, while the Wolverines' last solo Big Ten crown was in 1997, when the team earned a share of the national title.

**Spreading the Wealth:** In the last decade (1994-2003), eight different teams have won the Big Ten title either outright or as a co-champion: Illinois ('01), Iowa ('02), Michigan ('97, '98, '00, '03), Northwestern ('95, '96, '00), Ohio State ('96, '98, '02), Penn State ('94), Purdue ('00) and Wisconsin ('98, '99). The title has been shared by at least two teams only four times in this span, with a pair of three-team ties in 1998 and 2000.

**Big Ten Championships for Current Coaches:** Eight current League coaches have earned at least one Big Ten crown in their careers, led by Michigan's Lloyd Carr with four titles. The complete list is below:
