BIG TEN. BIG NEWS.

- The Big Ten tips off its 36th season of women's basketball this weekend with all 14 schools in action. Nine Big Ten programs begin their seasons on Friday, with six debuting at home, including Michigan, which will unveil its 2017 WNIT championship banner at Crisler Center prior to its Preseason WNIT opener against George Mason. Indiana, Michigan State, Minnesota and Nebraska get started with home games on Saturday and Wisconsin will open at home on Sunday. The Big Ten Conference season begins Thursday, Dec. 28, with the conference once again featuring a 16-game schedule.
- Seven Big Ten schools are ranked or receiving votes in the preseason Associated Press or *USA Today* polls, led by No. 5 (AP)/No. 8 (*USA Today*) Ohio State. Maryland is also ranked in both polls at No. 15/13, while reigning WNIT champion Michigan is No. 24/23, making its first preseason appearance in the AP poll since 2001. Indiana, Michigan State and Purdue are receiving votes in both polls, while Nebraska earned votes in the *USA Today* poll.
- Three top-10 opponents await Big Ten schools during the opening weekend of the season, with Ohio State playing host to No. 10/9 Stanford Friday live on BTN at historic St. John Arena (in a homecoming for former Buckeye head coach and current Cardinal mentor Tara VanDerveer) and tangling with No. 9/10 Louisville on Sunday on ESPN2 in the Countdown to Columbus at Nationwide Arena, home of the 2018 NCAA Women's Final Four. On Monday, three-time defending Big Ten champion Maryland welcomes No. 4/2 South Carolina to XFINITY Center for a nationally-televised matchup on ESPN2. In addition, Iowa could potentially face No. 16 Missouri on Saturday at the Hawkeye Challenge.
- For the third year in a row, Ohio State's Kelsey Mitchell was chosen as the Preseason Big Ten Player of the Year by the conference coaches and a select media panel. Mitchell is among five of the Big Ten's top 10 scorers from the 2016-17 season who are returning this year. Mitchell tied for first in the Big Ten in scoring at 22.6 points per game, while Michigan's Katelynn Flaherty was third (20.3 ppg.), Penn State's Teniya Page tied for fifth (19.9 ppg.), Minnesota's Carlie Wagner was seventh (19.1 ppg.) and Iowa's Megan Gustafson was 10th (18.5 ppg.).
- With 2,553 points entering this season, Mitchell is the nation's active career scoring leader and is in position to challenge the Big Ten record held by Minnesota's Rachel Banham (3,093 from 2012-16) and the NCAA record held by Washington's Kelsey Plum (3,527 from 2014-17).
- The Big Ten featured some of the nation's highest-scoring teams in 2016-17, with five conference schools among the top 25 and eight among the top 50 in the final NCAA statistical rankings, led by Maryland (2nd - 89.3 ppg.), Ohio State (4th - 85.7 ppg.) and Michigan (18th - 76.9 ppg.).
- Eighteen first-, second-team and honorable mention All-Big Ten honorees from 2016-17 return for the 2017-18 campaign, including six first-team honorees, led by two-time Big Ten Player of the Year Kelsey Mitchell. The other returning first-team all-conference selections are Indiana's Tyra Buss, Iowa's Megan Gustafson, Michigan's Katelynn Flaherty and Hallie Thome, and Penn State's Teniya Page.
- The 2018 NCAA Women's Final Four will be played March 30 and April 1, right in the heart of Big Ten country in Columbus, Ohio, and co-hosted by Ohio State and the Greater Columbus Sports Commission at Nationwide Arena, home of the NHL's Columbus Blue Jackets. This will mark the seventh time the Women's Final Four is held within the Big Ten Conference footprint, with three visits to Indianapolis (2005, 2011, 2016), two others in the state of Ohio (Cincinnati-1997, Cleveland-2007) and the 1995 event in Minneapolis (the last time it was held in a city featuring a Big Ten institution).

The Big Ten leads the nation in total students competing in intercollegiate athletics and participation opportunities, and sponsors more official sports than all conferences except the Ivy League.

BIG TEN. BIG NEWS.

- Next season, the Big Ten will return to an 18-game conference schedule, following approval by the Big Ten Administrators Council in October. Under the new format, schools will play five opponents twice and eight teams once (four home, four away) each season. The model will also emphasize in-state rivalries and competition between regional opponents. Big Ten women's basketball programs played 18 regular-season conference games for the first 12 seasons of Big Ten play (1982-83 through 1993-94) and returned to that format from 2007-08 to 2009-10 and again in 2014-15 and 2015-16.
- Big Ten programs produced 61 Academic All-Big Ten selections in 2016-17, the 10th consecutive season at least 45 women's basketball students received the award. That list includes returning Academic All-Americans Amanda Cahill of Indiana and Carlie Wagner of Minnesota, plus Academic All-District honoree Kristen Confroy of Maryland.
- Big Ten schools will be featured on national television at least 63 times during the 2017-18 season. BTN will televise at least 54 games and ESPN networks will carry nine contests. In addition, for the fourth consecutive year, every Big Ten women's basketball conference game, including 112 regular-season and 13 tournament games, will be produced and distributed by BTN, BTN Plus or an ESPN network.
- In 2016-17, the Big Ten tied a conference record for postseason wins and registered the second-highest postseason winning percentage in conference history, as the eight participating Big Ten schools combined to go 19-7 (.731) during NCAA Tournament and Women's National Invitation Tournament (WNIT) play, culminating with Michigan winning the WNIT title.
- Michigan's 2017 WNIT championship was the eighth postseason women's basketball title won by a current Big Ten school. The Wolverines were the fifth Big Ten school to raise the WNIT championship trophy, joining Penn State (1998), Wisconsin (2000), Ohio State (2001) and Rutgers (2014).
- Maryland and Ohio State advanced to the 2017 NCAA Sweet Sixteen, the fifth time in six years and 28th time in the 36-year history of the NCAA Tournament the Big Ten sent multiple schools to the Sweet Sixteen. Maryland made its 13th trip to the Sweet Sixteen and fifth in six years, while Ohio State reached its second consecutive Sweet Sixteen and 11th overall.
- Eleven Big Ten teams ranked among the top 50 in the nation for total attendance in 2016-17, including six in the top 20. Michigan State (No. 8) and Purdue (No. 9) were among the top 10, while Maryland (11th), Ohio State (13th), Nebraska (17th) and Iowa (19th) were among the top 20.

Bankers Life Fieldhouse in Indianapolis, home of the NBA's Indiana Pacers and WNBA's Indiana Fever, will once again play host to this year's tournament, marking the 21st time the event will be played in the Circle City.

General public tickets will be available at the Bankers Life Fieldhouse box office, Ticketmaster.com or charge by phone at 800-745-3000.

All-session tickets are available for \$55 when purchased before Jan. 31. After Jan. 31, all-session tickets are \$75. Fans wishing to purchase all-session tickets within their university's fan block for their respective team's games are encouraged to contact their school's ticket office. Seating for all sessions will again be general admission, so fans may watch the action from the best available seats in Bankers Life Fieldhouse.

Maryland is the three-time defending Big Ten Tournament champion, winning the 2017 title with a 74-64 victory over Purdue.

PREMIER ACADEMIC INSTITUTIONS

The Big Ten Academic Alliance is an academic consortium of all 14 Big Ten universities, which is widely considered to be the model for effective and voluntary collaboration among top research universities.

Every Big Ten Academic Alliance institution ranks among the top 78 universities in the nation according to the 2014 Academic Ranking of World Universities, including six in the top 25.

The Big Ten leads all conferences with more than 1,700 Academic All-Americans, including 47 honorees during the 2016-17 academic year.

Big Ten Academic Alliance schools annually conduct \$10 billion in funded research, \$5 billion more than any other conference.

A HISTORY OF ATHLETIC SUCCESS

Big Ten schools have won at least seven national championships in seven of the last nine academic years and at least five in each of the last 20 years.

In the last four full academic years, current Big Ten institutions have claimed 28 team national championships in 15 different sports.

Over the last 11 full academic years, current Big Ten institutions have won 82 team national titles in 23 different sports.

BROAD-BASED PROGRAMMING

The Big Ten will administer over \$200 million in direct financial support to more than 9,500 students competing in intercollegiate athletics for more than 11,000 participation opportunities on 350 teams in 42 different sports.

The Big Ten sponsors 28 official conference sports, 14 for men and 14 for women, including the addition of men's ice hockey and men's and women's lacrosse the last three years.

Almost 1,400 Big Ten competitors have participated in the Olympics, winning more than 600 medals, including nearly 300 gold. Became the first conference to voluntarily adopt male and female participation goals after launching its Gender Equity Action Plan in 1992.

Implemented the first collegiate football system of instant replay in 2004, which the NCAA approved for use among all conferences in 2006.

Launched the Big Ten Network (BTN) in 2007, the first national conference-owned television network.

Began partnering with the Ivy League to study the effects of head injuries in sports in 2012.

Accepted Johns Hopkins University as the conference's first sport affiliate members in men's and women's lacrosse in 2013 and 2015, respectively.

EXTENSIVE TELEVISION EXPOSURE

Through the Big Ten's current media agreements with BTN, ABC/ESPN, CBS and FOX, nearly 1,400 Big Ten events are produced and distributed nationally and globally on an annual basis.

BTN is in more than 60 million homes across the United States and Canada. BTN2Go is BTN's digital extension, delivering live and on-demand programming to computers, smartphones and tablets. BTN Plus within BTN2Go streams hundreds of additional events each season.

COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT
