2006 POSTSEASON WNIT

Two Big Ten teams -- **Illinois** and **Indiana** -- were invited to participate in the 2006 Postseason WNIT. The Illini will host Western Illinois on Wednesday, March 15, while Indiana awaits the winner of the Jackson State-Rice game. The Hoosiers will host that game on Saturday, March 18, in Bloomington.

Illinois (15-14) heads to the postseason for the ninth time in the last 10 years with its second straight postseason WNIT bid. The Illini are 2-3 overall in three previous postseason WNIT appearances.

This year the WNIT added eight teams to bring the field to 40 for the first time. The Illinois-WIU game is one of eight preliminary round games that will feed into the round of 32. The eight additional slots were added to reward teams that won their regular season conference title but did not win the conference tournament or get an NCAA at-large bid. Western Illinois is one of the teams that fits those criteria this year.

Indiana (17-13) is making its third appearance at the WNIT and its first since the 2000-01 season. The Hoosiers are 3-2 in WNIT play and earned their highest finish in 1998 after capturing third place.

2006 NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP

Five Big Ten women's basketball teams have been selected to the 2006 NCAA Championship, it was announced Monday night.

Ohio State, the conference's outright regular season and postseason tournament champion, earned one of the four No. 1 seeds, which marks the third straight year a league squad has garnered a top seed. **Purdue** and **Michigan State** were both tabbed a No. 4 seed, followed by No. 8 **Minnesota** and No. 10 **Iowa**.



Allstate Arena in Chicago, Ill. on Saturday. An MSU win would give the Spartans a second-round contest against either No. 5 seed Kentucky (21-8) or No. 12 Chattanooga (27-3) on Monday.

Minnesota (19-9) was tabbed the No. 8 seed in the San Antonio Region and will battle ninth-seeded Washington (18-10) on Saturday in Nashville, Tenn. The Golden Gophers, who have made the NCAA Championship in each of the four years head coach Pam Borton has been in Minneapolis, will make their sixth overall trip to the tournament and look to improve on their 10-5 NCAA record. A win Saturday would give the Gophers a potential Monday rematch against No. 1 seed LSU (27-3) - a team that beat Minnesota earlier this season.

No. 10 seed **Iowa** (17-11) will meet No. 7 BYU (25-5) in Denver, Colo., as a part of the San Antonio Region. The Hawkeyes, who will make their 15th trip to the NCAA Championship, will face either No. 2 seed Oklahoma (29-4) or No. 11 seed Pepperdine (14-16) on Monday, should they defeat BYU in the first round.

In addition to Purdue serving as host for the first and second rounds, Penn State will also welcome tournament action to University Park, Pa. Tickets for both sites, along with more information on this year's NCAA Championship, can be found at ncaasports.com.

For the sixth consecutive season, the Big Ten has sent five or more teams to the NCAA Championship. The conference has sent five teams to the 2001, 2005 and 2006 tournaments and tied the league high of six squads in 2002, 2003 and 2004.

Ohio State (28-2) will battle Oakland (15-15) in the first round of the Albuquerque Region on Sunday. With a win, the Buckeyes would face the winner of No. 8 Boston College (19-11) and No. 9 Notre Dame (18-11). OSU will make its 15th appearance with a 17-14 record in the NCAA Championship and joins Purdue for first and second-round play in West Lafayette, Ind., March 19 and 21.

Purdue (24-6), which finished second in the regular season and fell to Ohio State in the Big Ten Tournament final, will make its 17th NCAA appearance on its home court for the first and second rounds. The Boilermakers were awarded a No. 4 seed and will face 13th-seed Missouri State (17-14) on Sunday. Positioned in the Cleveland Region, Purdue would face the winner of No. 5 UCLA (20-10) and No. 12 Bowling Green (28-2) in second-round play on Tuesday.

In addition to the Boilermakers, **Michigan State** (22-9) will also enter this year's event as a No. 4 seed. Selected to the Bridgeport (Conn.) Region with an opening-round matchup against No. 13 UW-Milwaukee (22-8), the defending national runner-up will take to the court at

BIG TEN NEWS & NOTES

BIG TEN GRABS THREE OF TOP 16 SEEDS

The Big Ten snagged three of the top 16 seeds in this year's NCAA Championship, which is tied for the most by any conference (ACC, Big East, SEC). Ohio State earned a No. 1 seed, followed by No. 4 Michigan State and No. 4 Purdue.

ANOTHER "ONE" FOR THE BIG TEN

For the third consecutive season, a Big Ten team earned a No. 1 seed for the NCAA Championship. No. 2/2 Ohio State (28-2) earned its second No. 1 seed in program history in 2006, while Michigan State proved its top seed last year by playing in the national championship final. Penn State was one of four top-seeds in the 2004 tournament. The Buckeyes are the ninth overall top-seed in Big Ten history. Iowa earned the league's first two top-seeds in 1988 and 1992, while Ohio State was No. 1 in 1993 and both Penn State and Purdue were No. 1 seeds in 1994. The Boilermakers staked claim to the top seed in 1999 and captured the conference's lone national championship. Penn State also earned a top seed in 1991, however that was prior to joining the Big Ten.

SIX FOR FIVE

For the sixth consecutive season, the Big Ten has sent five or more teams to the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Championship. The conference sent five teams to the 2001, 2005 and 2006 tournaments and tied the league high of six teams in 2002, 2003 and 2004.

NCAA ACTION SLATED FOR PENN STATE & PURDUE

Penn State's Bryce Jordan Center and Purdue's Mackey Arena will play host to NCAA first- and second-round play this season. The 2006 tournament marks the third year that the NCAA has predetermined its opening-round sites. First and second-round action will begin in University Park, Pa., March 18 and 20, while West Lafayette, Ind., will host conference teams Ohio State and Purdue for the opening rounds, March 19 and 21. This season's Final Four will be hosted by Harvard University and Northeastern University at the TD Banknorth Garden (19,334) in Boston, Mass., April 2 and 4.

BIG TEN RATES AMONG TOURNEY'S BEST

Ohio State, Northwestern and Illinois were three of the 32 teams selected to play in the first NCAA Women's Basketball Tournament in 1982, tipping off what would become the Big Ten's outstanding legacy in the event. Since the championship's inception, the Big Ten has earned 100 invitations to the Big Dance. That ranks as the third-highest total behind the SEC (153) and the ACC (110). Purdue leads the conference field this year with its 17th NCAA appearance overall, followed by Iowa (16th), Ohio State (15th), Michigan State (7th) and Minnesota (6th).

BIG TEN TOURNEY WINS BREED NCAA SUCCESS

Recent history has shown that winning in the Big Ten Tournament breeds success for conference teams in the NCAA Tournament. Since 1995, the teams that have won the Big Ten Women's Tournament have combined to post a 25-10 record in the NCAA Championship. Purdue captured the league's first-ever NCAA women's title in 1999 after winning the Big Ten Tournament as the No. 1 seed. Penn State appeared in the 2000 NCAA Final Four after finishing as the runner-up in that year's Big Ten Tournament, while Purdue made an appearance in the 2001 National Championship game after also finishing

second in that year's conference tournament. With the return of Lindsay Whalen after the 2004 Big Ten Tournament, Minnesota went on to its first Final Four appearance in school history. Top-seeded Michigan State, the 2005 Tournament Champion, finished 5-1 after falling to Baylor in the national championship game.

MOST SUCCESSFUL BACK-TO-BACK NCAAS

For the second straight season, the Big Ten boasted one of its most successful NCAA Tournaments in league history last year. In 2004, the conference earned an all-time best 11 wins in the postseason, while 2005 produced 10 wins. The combined 21 wins the past two years bettered the previous two-year high of 19, set in 2003 (8) and 2004 (11). Prior to the record-breaking success in 2004, the old record for wins stood at 17, which was set in 1993 (8) and 1994 (9).

SUCCESS DOESN'T TAKE LONG

Since 1999, the Big Ten has sent five teams to the Women's Final Four. In four of the five years, the conference representative was led by a coach who had been at the school five years or less. In fact, Michigan State's Joanne P. McCallie, who completed her fifth season at the helm in 2005, ranks fourth on the list of league coaches who sent their teams to the Final Four the quickest. Currently, Ohio State's Jim Foster is in his fourth season with his No. 1 seed Buckeyes. Below is a breakdown of the tenures of the Big Ten coaches that have led their teams to the Final Four since 1999.

FINAL FOUR FAMILIARITY

Big Ten teams have competed in five of the last seven Women's Final Fours and seven overall. Ohio State and Iowa squared off against each other in the league's first Final Four appearance in 1993. The Buckeyes won that tilt before falling to Texas Tech in the national final. Purdue followed up in 1994, advancing to it's first Final Four, where it fell to North Carolina in the semifinals. The third time was the charm for the league, as Purdue defeated Duke, 62-45, to claim the Big Ten's first and only national championship. Penn State made an appearance in 2000, bowing to eventual national champion Connecticut in the semifinals. The Boilermakers made it three in a row for the Big Ten in 2001 when they fought their way to the championship final against Notre Dame. Purdue fell to the Irish, 68-66, in one of the closest finishes in tournament history. The game was one of five NCAA Championship finals to be decided by two points or less. After a two-year hiatus, Minnesota returned the Big Ten to the national semifinals in 2004 and was followed by Michigan State in 2005, which advanced to the championship game.

BIG TEN TO THE WNIT: JUST WIN IT

The Big Ten is set to field two league squads -- Illinois and Indiana -- for the 2006 Postseason WNIT. This marks the second straight season the conference has sent a pair of teams to the WNIT, as Illinois and Iowa were participants last season. The postseason WNIT is an event that the Big Ten has won three times since 1998, most recently in 2001 when Ohio State defeated New Mexico.

OSU EARNS FIRST OUTRIGHT TITLE IN 20 YEARS

In 2006, Ohio State clinched its first outright Big Ten crown since the 1985-86 season. It is the ninth conference championship and fourth outright league title for the Buckeyes. The championship also marked the first time OSU has won back-to-back Big Ten regular season titles since 1985-86 and 1986-87. Ohio State also claimed the Big Ten Tournament earlier this month and its second-ever No. 1 seed in the NCAA Championship. In addition, OSU has a current win-streak to 19 games, one victory shy of the school record of 20, set back during the 1984-85 campaign.

DAVENPORT REPEATS AS BIG TEN SCORING QUEEN

Ohio State's Jessica Davenport closed out the regular season repeating as the Big Ten's scoring leader. The Buckeye center racked up 327 points in 16 conference games for an average of 20.4 points per game. She was 2.5 points better than runner-up Cyndi Valentin of Indiana, who averaged 17.9 per contest. Davenport was just the third Buckeye to win the scoring title and the third to claim two straight as well. Nikita Lowry won the crown in 1987-88 (23.7 ppg) and 1988-89 (18.9), and Katie Smith was the league's top scorer in 1993-94 (22.4) and 1994-95 (21.2). The last player to win back-to-back scoring titles was Penn State's Kelly Mazzante, who earned three straight from 2001-2003.

SKOUBY TOP-SCORING FROSH SINCE '01

Third place in the conference scoring race went to Iowa freshman Megan Skouby (16.8 ppg), which marked the highest finish for a freshman since Penn State's Kelly Mazzante won the scoring title as a newcomer at 19.7 points per game in 2000-01. Last season, Wisconsin freshman Jolene Anderson averaged more points than Skouby at 18.1 points per contest, but was fourth in conference scoring.

OHIO STATE'S FOSTER EARNS WIN NO. 600

With a win on Feb. 20 against Michigan State, Ohio State head coach Jim Foster became the third current coach in the Big Ten to possess 600 career victories. He joined Illinois' Theresa Grentz (651-298, 32 seasons) and Penn State's Rene Portland (678-249, 31 seasons) in the league and is the 12th active coach in the nation to amass 600 career wins. Foster has recorded his 605 career wins at three different stops in 28 seasons as a Division I head coach. Since 1978, Foster has found success at St. Joseph's (248-126, 1978-91), Vanderbilt (256-99, 1991-2002) and Ohio State (101-27, 2002-present).

ILLINOIS' GRENTZ CAPTURES CAREER WIN NO. 650

Illinois head coach Theresa Grentz became the 10th Division I coach to reach 650 wins for her career, following a road win at Michigan on the last day of the regular season. Grentz, in her 32nd season overall and 11th at Illinois, has coached in 949 games and has won 651 (.686) of those contests. Penn State's Rene Portland is already a member of the 650-win club, having won 678 career games.

PAIR OF SPARTANS SETTING SCORING RECORD

In a race to the finish, two Spartan seniors are continuing to battle over the Michigan State scoring record. Liz Shimek currently sits at 1,736 points, while teammate Lindsay Bowen is second all-time at 1,708. Both Spartans have eclipsed the previous record of 1,668, set by Kisha Kelley.

2006 BIG TEN TOURNAMENT PRESENTED BY XBOX LIVE REVIEW

THE ONE GETS IT DONE

The 2006 tournament final marked the first time in the 12-year history of the event that a No. 1 seed defeated a No. 2 seed to take home the championship. The top-seeded Buckeyes defeated No. 2 Purdue, 63-60.

NOTES ON THE NUMBER ONE SEED

Since 1995, the tournament's No. 1 seeds have won the event on just three occasions - Penn State (1995), Purdue (1999) and Ohio State (2006). Over the last 12 tournaments, the top seeds have a combined record of 20-10 (.667). Three of the last five No. 1 seeds, Purdue in 2002, Penn State in 2003 and Ohio State in 2005, dropped out in the semifinals.

BUCKEYES THIRD TEAM TO REPEAT AS TOP SEED

For just the third time in the history of the Big Ten Tournament, a team played in the event as the top seed for a second-straight year. Ohio State, which won the outright conference and tournament title in 2006 and was a co-champion with Michigan State in 2005, earned its second consecutive No. 1 seed. Purdue opened the 2001 and 2002 tournaments as the top seed, while Penn State entered as the No. 1 in 2003 and 2004.

GOOD TO BE NO. 2?

Despite falling in the tournament final in 2006, the No. 2 remains the event's leader in championships. The No. 2 seed won the event in 2004 and 2005 and was a finalist in 2006. In the past 12 years, the second-seed has won the tournament four times, followed by the No. 1 (three wins) and the 3 and 4 seeds, which have won the event twice. Purdue's 1998 squad and Indiana's 2002 team were both the fifth seed when they went on to capture the title as the lowest-seed ever.

HOME IS WHERE THE HEART IS

In the 12 editions of the Big Ten Women's Basketball Tournament, one of the teams from the state of Indiana -- Purdue and Indiana -- has advanced to the championship game on nine occasions, including eight of the last nine years. Three of the last five tournament titles have gone to Indiana teams, as Purdue

won the 2003 and 2004 events, while the Hoosiers were crowned champions in 2002. Purdue was a finalist in 2006 as well. The two programs are a combined 33-18 (.647) in Big Ten Tournament play since 1995 and 30-16 (.652) when the event is held in Indianapolis.

SPEAKING OF EXCITING GAMES...

Tournament games have been highly competitive in recent years. Three games reached overtime in 2002 and 2005, while 17 games in the last five tournaments have been decided by five points or less.

SURPASSING THE 30,000 MARK

The five most recent editions of the women's tournament have posted the highest attendance in the event's history, surpassing the 30,000-patron mark each year. The 2006 tournament attendance of 38,638 and session average of 7,728 were both event records in the 12-year history of the tournament. The previous marks of 37,635 and 7,527 were set in 2004. The single-session record of 9,417, which was set in 2004, still stands.

TOURNEY FINALE BOASTS NATION'S BEST

Over the past three years, the Big Ten Tournament championship final has been fought over by two of the nation's top teams. In 2004, the tournament championship was decided by two teams ranked in the nation's top 10 for the first time in the event's history. Penn State entered the final game ranked fifth in the Associated Press poll and sixth in the ESPN/USA Today coaches' poll, while Purdue was seventh in both polls. In 2005, a pair of top 15 squads battled for the title in No. 8 Michigan State and No. 15 Minnesota. The 2006 final featured No. 2 Ohio State and No. 12 Purdue, which marked the fifth time in 12 years the Big Ten Tournament title was decided by a pair of teams in the nation's top 15.

DOUBLE DIPPING

For the second-straight season and the fourth time overall, a Big Ten team claimed the regular season and tournament championships. Ohio State clinched the outright title in the regular season and won the

2006 Big Ten Tournament trophy, after Michigan State, who shared the regular season title last season with the Buckeyes, won the 2005 event. The other two occasions this instance occurred was with Purdue in 1999 and Penn State in 1995, the first year of the Big Ten Tournament.

TITLE GAME NAILBITERS

Since 2001, the tournament's title game has been decided by six points or less, including three or fewer in 2002, 2003, 2004 and 2006. Indiana claimed its lone tournament title in 2002 with a 75-72 win over Penn State, while Purdue handed Ohio State a 67-65 loss in the 2003 final. In 2004, Purdue defeated Penn State, 59-58, in the closest tournament final in league history, while Michigan State topped Minnesota by six, 55-49, in the 2005 title game. Ohio State won the 2006 event with a 63-60 victory over Purdue. In the 12-year history of the tournament, the title game has been decided by an average of 4.8 points and the winning margin has only reach double figures once, when Purdue defeated Penn State, 59-49, for the 1998 title.

Illinois head coach **Theresa Grentz** and Penn State mentor **Rene Portland** were former teammates at Immaculata back in the mid-70s. In fact, those combined 37 years on a conference campus are two more than the total of the remaining nine league coaches' tenures. Excluding Grentz and Portland, nine of the 11 conference coaches have spent seven years or less at their respective schools. Six coaches have spent less than four years on their respective Big Ten campuses.

2006 BIG TEN POSTSEASON HONORS

PARK RIDGE, Ill. - The Big Ten women's basketball coaches and a 22-member media panel selected Ohio State junior center Jessica Davenport as the conference's Player of the Year for the second-straight season on Feb. 28. She was the fourth league standout to ever repeat as the Big Ten's top player, joining Northwestern's Anucha Brown (1984, 1985), Ohio State's Tracey Hall (1986, 1987), Purdue's Katie Douglas (2000, 2001) and Penn State's Kelly Mazzante (2003, 2004). Buckeye senior Kim Wilburn and mentor Jim Foster were also named Defensive Player and Coach of the Year, respectively. Iowa's Megan Skouby was tabbed Freshman of the Year, while the coaches named Purdue's Cherrille George as Sixth Player of the Year.

Davenport earned her second consecutive league scoring title after posting an average of 20.4 points per game. She also led the league in field-goal percentage (.662) and blocked shots (3.50 bpg), while averaging second in rebounding (8.2 rpg). In addition, the four-time 2005-06 Big Ten Player of the Week selection helped lead the Buckeyes to a 15-1 record in league play and their first outright conference championship since the 1985-86 season. It was the ninth Big Ten title and fourth outright league title for Ohio State, and marked the first time it won back-to-back regular season trophies since 1986 and 1987.

Wilburn, the first Buckeye to earn Defensive Player of the Year honors, was fourth in conference play with 2.25 steals per game, but holds a significant lead in the category for all games at 3.15 per contest. The school record holder in steals, Wilburn is second all-time in Big Ten career steals at 356. She enters NCAA play 16 swipes shy of the conference record.

Foster earned his second straight Coach of the Year honor as he shared the award with Michigan State's Joanne P. McCallie last season. The Buckeyes' coach recently became the Big Ten's third and the nation's 12th-active coach to possess 600 career victories. He enters NCAA play with 605 career wins at three different stops in 28 seasons as a Division I head coach. He is already approaching 100 wins in Columbus, with a 101-27 record at Ohio State since 2002.

Skouby became the third Hawkeye to earn Big Ten Freshman of the Year honors, joining Franthea Price (1987) and Tiffany Gooden (1995). The 6-6 center was also the sixth Big Ten post-player to earn the award since 1983 and the first since Davenport in 2004. Skouby was honored by both the coaches and the media after finishing fourth in scoring with 16.8 points per game in conference play. She ranked fourth with 1.69 blocks per game, sixth with a field-goal percentage of .523, and placed near the top 15 in rebounding with 5.8 boards per game. In all games this year, she ranks fourth in the league with a .554 field goal percentage.

George, who did not record a single start in 27 regular-season games, earned the Big Ten's first-ever Sixth Player of the Year award. The junior transfer averaged 4.3 points, 2.2 steals and 1.5 assists per game, while providing a spark off the bench for the Boilermakers, who placed second in the conference at 13-3. Earlier this year, she swiped 10 steals against South Carolina, which is the second-best single-game total in the country this year.

In addition to individual honors, three All-Big Ten teams were selected by the media and coaches, while the league mentors also named a five-person All-Freshman and All-Defensive Team as well. Davenport was the lone unanimous first-team All-Big Ten selection, while Indiana's Cyndi Valentin, Iowa's Crystal Smith, Michigan State's Liz Shimek and Purdue's Katie Gearlds were named to the first team by both the coaches and media.

The conference office also announced honorees from each of the league's 11 women's basketball squads for the Big Ten Sportsmanship Award. The student-athletes chosen were individuals who distinguished themselves through sportsmanship and ethical behavior. In addition, the student-athletes must be in good academic standing and have demonstrated good citizenship outside of the sports-competition setting. Honorees for women's basketball are Illinois' Maggie Acuna, Indiana's Valentin, Iowa's Krista VandeVenter, Michigan's Krista Clement, Michigan State's Shimek, Minnesota's Shannon Schonrock, Northwestern's Kristin Cartwright, Ohio State's Davenport, Penn State's Amanda Brown, Purdue's Aya Traore and Wisconsin's Janese Banks. These 11 student-athletes are now candidates for the Big Ten Sportsmanship Award, as the conference office will honor one male and one female student-athlete from each institution at the end of the school year.
