Youth is Served in 2006-07

Over the 2006-07 season, Big Ten teams looked upon their underclassmen to step to the stage, as many conference squads lacked seniors on the roster and the invaluable senior leadership on the court. Among the six power conferences (ACC, Big East, Big Ten, Big 12, Pac-10 and SEC), the Big Ten had the nation's lowest percentage of seniors and the highest number of teams with seniors making up less than 10 percent of the roster. Of the 130 Big Ten student-athletes, only 16.9 percent (22 players) were seniors, and a nation-leading four teams -- more than a third of the total number of conference squads -- had less than 10 percent of their rosters made up of seniors. Wisconsin, which competed for the Postseason WNIT Championship, was one of only five major conference teams in the country that did not boast a senior on its roster. In addition to the Badgers, Michigan (7.1%), Iowa (8.3%) and Minnesota (8.3%) all fielded teams in 2006-07 with just one senior, accounting for less than 10 percent of the roster.

Overemphasizing Underclassmen

During the 2006-07 season, the Big Ten was first among the six power conferences (ACC, Big East, Big Ten, Big 12, Pac-10 and SEC) in percentage of underclassmen that made up its teams' rosters. Among the 11 Big Ten squads, 38 freshmen and 38 sophomores totaled 58.5 percent of the 130 players in the conference. That percentage was higher than any other major conference, including the Big 12 (57.3%), Big East (56.5%), ACC (55.1%), SEC (53.6%) and Pac-10 (53.4%).

A Student First

For the fifth consecutive season, Big Ten women's basketball honored at least 35 Academic All-Big Ten standouts. A total of 35 student-athletes were recognized in 2006-07, including third-team Academic All-American Lori Bjork of Illinois. A complete list of honorees can be found on page 10.

Four New Faces to Pace Big Ten Sidelines in 2007-08

Four new head coaches will join the Big Ten in 2007-08, which marks the largest turnover in conference history. The previous high was three in 1984-85 and 2000-01. Illinois' Jollette Law, Michigan's Kevin Borseth, Michigan State's Suzy Merchant and Penn State's Coquese Washington will all enter their first year as a Big Ten coach next season.

Strength and Flexibility of Scheduling

Non-conference play in 2006-07 saw the Big Ten have its best start since the 1998-99 season, as all 11 schools were at or above the .500 mark just prior to Christmas. It was the latest the conference had gone in the season with all 11 teams owning winning percentages of .500 or better since Dec. 27, 1998. Entering the week of Dec. 18-24, the Big Ten was the only major conference to boast all of its member schools at or above a .500 winning percentage. Closing out the season, the Big Ten finished first in Strength of Schedule (.5539), well ahead of the second-place SEC (.5367), according to collegerpi.com. In 2007-08, the Big Ten will lengthen its conference schedule from 16 games to 18, marking just the second conference schedule adjustment made in the past 25 years. The Big Ten schedule was 18 games in length until the 1994-95 season, which marked the first year of the Big Ten Women's Basketball Tournament.

Wisconsin Falls Shy of Second WNIT Championship

Finishing the season with a program-best 23 wins, Wisconsin earned runner-up honors in the 2007 Postseason WNIT after falling in the championship game at Wyoming, 72-56. Despite the loss, the Badgers remain one of the Big Ten's most successful teams in Postseason WNIT play, garnering a title (2000), two runners-up (1999, 2007) and an overall event record of 13-2. Both Janese Banks and Jolene Anderson were named to the 2007 Postseason WNIT All-Tournament Team, and Anderson finished with a tournament-record 129 points in five games. Jenny Lingor of Southwest Missouri State had the previous record with 113 points during the 2005 event.

Big Ten a Participant in Two Largest WNIT Crowds

Two Big Ten teams have contested Postseason WNIT games in front of the event's largest crowds, most recently when Wisconsin fell at Wyoming in the 2007 championship game. The Badgers and Cowgirls battled in front of a program-record 15,462 fans, the second-most for a WNIT game. The record was set in 2001 when Ohio State captured the tournament title at New Mexico in a contest that drew 18,018 fans.

Wisconsin Ties Big Ten Single-Game FT Record in Win

In Wisconsin's 79-72 Postseason WNIT semifinal victory over Western Kentucky, the Badgers shot a perfect 20-of-20 from the free throw line, which tied a Big Ten single-game record. It was the fifth time in conference history a team had been perfect from the line on at least 15 attempts and only the second occasion in which a team had gone 20-of-20 from the line. Penn State made all 20 of its free throws against Texas on Dec. 7, 2003, while the Badgers went 17-of-17 against Arizona 11 months earlier on Jan. 26, 2003. Michigan has twice gone 15-of-15 from the line, once in 1987 and again in 2002.

Big Ten Tourney Wins Breed NCAA Success

Recent history has shown that winning in the Big Ten Tournament breeds success for conference teams in the NCAA Tournament. Since 1995, the teams that have won the Big Ten Women's Tournament have combined to post a 29-12 (.707) record in the NCAA Championship. Purdue captured the conference's first-ever NCAA women's title in 1999 after winning the Big Ten Tournament as the No. 1 seed. Penn State appeared in the 2000 NCAA Final Four after finishing as the runner-up in that year's Big Ten Tournament, while Purdue made an appearance in the 2001 NCAA Championship title game after finishing second in that year's conference tournament. After competing in the 2004 Big Ten Tournament, Minnesota went on to its first Final Four appearance in school history. Michigan State, the 2005 conference tournament champion, entered NCAA play as a No. 1 seed and finished 5-1 after falling to Baylor in the national championship game. Purdue, the 2007 tournament champion, advanced to the Dallas Regional Championship game before concluding NCAA play 3-1.

Purdue Keeps Big Ten "Sweet 16 Streak" Alive

By earning a trip to the Sweet 16, Purdue continued the Big Ten's streak of having at least one conference team advance to regional play in each of the last 23 years. Only twice -- the 1982 and 1984 NCAA Tournaments -- has the Big Ten not sent a team to the Sweet 16. Of the 23 consecutive trips, 14 tournaments have boasted a conference squad in the regional finals, while eight teams have advanced to the Final Four.

Three Big Ten Teams Ranked in Nation's Top 20

Three conference squads finished the season ranked in the top 25 of both the Associated Press and ESPN/USA Today Coaches Polls. The Big Ten was represented by No. 5/18 Ohio State, No. 12/7 Purdue and No. 24/25 Michigan State.

Three Big Ten All-Americans Earn Recognition by AP

Jessica Davenport became the first three-time All-American in Ohio State women's basketball history as she was honored with a spot on the Associated Press' first team on March 28. The only player in Big Ten history to record 2,000 points, 1,000 rebounds and 300 blocked shots in a career, Davenport posted a career total of 384 blocks and ended her Buckeye run as the Big Ten's all-time leader. Her total ranks seventh in NCAA annals. Purdue's Katie Gearlds, who led her Boilermakers to the Elite Eight this season, was named to the third team. In addition to Gearlds, Purdue teammate Lindsay Wisdom-Hylton was named an honorable mention All-American.

Davenport Earns Third Straight USBWA & Kodak Honors

Ohio State's Jessica Davenport was selected to the 2006-07 U.S. Basketball Writers Association All-America Team for the third straight season and was just the 20th player all-time to earn three Women's Basketball Coaches Association/Kodak All-America awards. Davenport joins Katie Smith and Tracey Hall as Ohio State's only multiple All-Americans.

Versyp Named WBCA Region 6 Coach of the Year

Following first-year success in West Lafayette, Purdue head coach Sharon Versyp was recently named the WBCA's 2007 Russell Athletic/WBCA Regional Coach of the Year winner for Region 6. The Boilermaker leader took her squad to the Preseason WNIT Championship title, the Big Ten Tournament crown, advanced to the Elite Eight, and finished with an overall record of 31-6.

Former Illini Coach Grentz Honored by WBCA

On March 7, the WBCA announced Illinois' Theresa Grentz as the winner of the Carol Eckman Award, which is presented annually to an active WBCA coach who exemplifies Eckman's spirit, integrity and character through sportsmanship, commitment to the student-athlete, honesty, ethical behavior, courage and dedication to purpose. The award is named in honor of the late Carol Eckman, the former West Chester State College coach who is considered the "Mother of the Women's Collegiate Basketball Championship". Grentz, the 2001 Women's Basketball Hall of Fame inductee and 1992 U.S. Olympic coach, completed her 33rd season as a collegiate head coach, and 12th at Illinois, where her record stands at 671-311 (.683) overall and 210-156 (.574) with the Illini. She resigned on April 17.

Purdue Becomes Sixth Big Ten Team to Reach 30 Wins

With a 31-6 overall record in 2006-07, Purdue reached the 30-win plateau for the third time in school history and first since the 2000-01 season, when the Boilermakers were national runners-up with a 31-7 record. Purdue was 34-1 in its 1998-99 national championship season. Overall, Purdue's 2006-07 ballclub was just the sixth squad in conference history to eclipse the 30-win mark. In addition to the three occasions the Boilermakers have reached the plateau, Penn State's 1999-00 team finished 30-5, while national runner-up Michigan State (33-4) and Ohio State (30-5) both achieved the feat during the 2004-05 campaign.

Seven Squads Ranked in Top-30 Attendance

In the final unofficial attendance figures compiled by the University of Wisconsin, seven Big Ten teams ranked in the nation's top 30 for average attendance during the regular season. Purdue (7,585 fans per game) and Michigan State (6,737) were Nos. 8-9, while Minnesota (5,942) followed in 12th. Penn State (5,777) and Wisconsin (5,720) ranked 15th and 16th overall and Ohio State (5,001) and Iowa (4,132) were 20th and 27th, respectively.

Perfect Dozen Active Players Reach 1,000-Point Mark

Twelve Big Ten standouts from the 2006-07 season have eclipsed the 1,000-point mark for their respective careers. Wisconsin's Jolene Anderson (1,714) and Janese Banks (1,128) found the list along with three Purdue Boilermakers in Katie Gearlds (1,957), Erin Lawless (1,361) and Lindsay Wisdom-Hylton (1,145). Ohio State's Jessica Davenport finished her impressive career leading all active Big Ten scorers with 2,303 career points. New Kid on the "Block"

In a 64-61 loss to Purdue in the Big Ten Tournament, Michigan State freshman Allyssa DeHaan set a new Big Ten single-season record for blocks. The conference's consensus Freshman of the Year had three blocks in the contest, which gave her a total of 138 for the season. Her total surpassed Michigan's Trish Andrew's record of 136, which had stood since the 1991-92 season. The Spartan newcomer ended her freshman campaign with 145 swats, both a Big Ten single-season and NCAA Division I freshman record. Her total is also the seventh-most rejections in NCAA history.

Ohio State Wins Big Ten Championship No. 10

With a win over Michigan on Feb. 25, Ohio State clinched its third straight and 10th overall Big Ten Championship. The Buckeyes were the first Big Ten team to repeat as outright champions since Penn State was the top team in the conference from 2002-03 to 2003-04. OSU claimed its first back-to-back outright titles since winning three outright championships from 1983-86. The Buckeyes were also the first team to win at least a share of three titles in a row since Iowa won the conference four straight seasons from 1986-87 to 1989-90. OSU shared two of those conference crowns with the Hawkeyes in 1987 (17-1) and 1989 (16-2). Ohio State holds the record by winning five consecutive Big Ten Championships from 1982-83 to 1986-87.

Ohio State's Outright Triple Crown

For the first time in Big Ten history, one school (Ohio State) earned outright conference titles in the sports of football and men's and women's basketball in the same season (2006-07). In 2005-06, the Buckeyes became the first conference school to earn Big Ten titles in all three sports, but shared the football crown.

UW's Anderson Claims Big Ten Scoring Title

With a 26-point effort in the final game of the regular season, Wisconsin's Jolene Anderson ended Ohio State's Jessica Davenport's quest for three-straight conference scoring titles. However, Anderson did so by only one point. The Badger junior finished the 16-game slate with 309 points and a scoring average of 19.31 points per game. Davenport finished the final regular season contest of her career with 25 points against Michigan to bring her total to 308 points, a rate of 19.25 points per game. Anderson is the Badgers' first Big Ten scoring champion.

Brown Earns PSU's First Rebound Crown

For the first time since Penn State began Big Ten play in 1992-93, the Lady Lions boasted a conference rebounding queen. Senior Amanda Brown completed the 16-game schedule as the only Big Ten rebounder in double digits, averaging 10.9 boards per contest. She pulled down 175 rebounds, including 123 on the defensive end during Big Ten play. Her rate was the eighth-best in the conference over the past 25 years and the highest for a Big Ten player since Illinois' Cindy Dallas posted a mark of 11.1 rebounds per game in 2003-04.

OSU's Allen "Stars" as Big Ten's New FG% Champion

Ohio State sophomore Star Allen set a new Big Ten record during the 2006-07 season for field goal percentage in conference games. During the 16 Big Ten games this past season, Allen shot .694 (84-of-121) from the field, which shattered the previous record held by Minnesota's Janel McCarville, who shot .686 (94-of-137) over 16 Big Ten contests in 2002-03. Allen's teammate, Jessica Davenport, had led the conference in the category the previous three years, and a Buckeye has now been the Big Ten's conference leader in 12 of the past 25 seasons.

Purdue's Defense Sets Two Big Ten Records

With a scoring defense of 51.3 points per game over the 16 Big Ten contests, Purdue posted a new conference record, bettering Iowa's mark of 52.3 set in 1987-88. In addition, Purdue broke its own conference mark for field goal percentage defense, holding opponents to .354 (325-of-919) shooting from the field. The Boilermakers' previous Big Ten record was .355 (416-of-1171), set during the 1990-91 campaign.

Hawkeyes Shatter Conference Mark From the Arc

Yet another Big Ten record was shattered this past conference season as Iowa shot .461 (95-of-206) from beyond the three-point line. Northwestern's 1991-92 ballclub previously held the conference's best three-point percentage record of .431 (88-of-204).

Badgers & Hawkeyes End Big Ten Play With a Bang

In the final Big Ten game of the 2006-07 season, Iowa and Wisconsin did not seem to want the conference portion of the schedule to end. In Iowa's 103-93 victory over the Badgers on Feb. 25, the 196 total points became the second-highest combined point total in a Big Ten game. The only time two conference teams scored more points in a Big Ten contest was when Minnesota defeated Purdue, 115-88, on March 10, 1983, accounting for a total of 203. The combined output was also the fourth highest overall total in conference history. Iowa's 103 points was the largest point total by any Big Ten team since Penn State scored 114 against Northwestern on Jan. 2, 2000, and was the first time a conference team has scored over 100 points since Michigan State put up 101 against the Wildcats on Feb. 3, 2005.

Four Big Ten Coaches Resign Their Post on Campus

The 2006-07 season marked the end of four tenures on Big Ten campuses as Illinois' Theresa Grentz, Michigan's Cheryl Burnett, Michigan State's Joanne P. McCallie and Penn State's Rene Portland all resigned their positions.

Burnett announced her decision to retire from coaching on March 6, having just completed her fourth season in Ann Arbor. Over the span of 19 years, Burnett compiled a career record of 354-219. During her four years at Michigan, she was 35-83, including 10-54 in conference play.

On March 22, Portland resigned as head coach of the Lady Lions, after compiling a 606-236 overall record during her tenure. She previously coached at St. Joseph's and Colorado and has a career mark of 693-265 over 31 seasons. Earlier this season Portland became just the ninth women's basketball coach to win 600 games at one school.

Grentz completed her 33rd season as a collegiate head coach last year, and 12th at Illinois, where her record stands at 671-311 (.683) overall and 210-156 (.574) with the Illini. She resigned on April 17.

McCallie, who left one day after Grentz, completed her seventh season at MSU and helped mold the Spartans into one of the nation's top programs. In 2006-07, she led Michigan State to its school-record fifth straight NCAA Tournament appearance and finished with a 149-75 record (.665) in her tenure in East Lansing.

BIG TEN/ACC WOMEN'S BASKETBALL CHALLENGE

The Big Ten and the Atlantic Coast Conference announced May 14 the formation of an annual Big Ten/ACC Challenge for women's basketball, which will span at least four years and will begin in the fall of 2007. The Big Ten/ACC Challenge will match 11 teams from each conference in head-to-head competition traditionally on the first Wednesday, Thursday and Friday after Thanksgiving, following the men's basketball Big Ten/ACC Challenge.

"The Big Ten Conference and its institutions are thrilled for the formation of this great event and the Big Ten/ACC Challenge will provide a wonderful stage on which these two traditionally dominant women's basketball conferences will compete," said Big Ten Commissioner James E. Delany. "The Big Ten and the ACC boast some of the most passionate women's basketball fans in the country and we feel this Challenge will not only strengthen our teams, but our loyal fan base as well."

The inaugural Big Ten/ACC Challenge will feature games outside the traditional timeframe as the first contest of the Challenge will feature Michigan at Miami on Nov. 19. The Big Ten will then host the next two games on Nov. 28, as Wake Forest travels to Northwestern and Iowa hosts Georgia Tech. Three games are slated for Nov. 29, with Michigan State hosting Clemson, Purdue traveling to North Carolina and Illinois heading to NC State. ACC teams will host three of the four Nov. 30 games when Maryland welcomes Ohio State, Virginia Tech hosts Minnesota and Wisconsin travels to Virginia. In addition, Indiana will serve as host to Florida State on Nov. 30. The 2007 Big Ten/ACC Challenge concludes on Dec. 2 with Duke competing at Penn State.

"The Atlantic Coast Conference is pleased to be part of the Big Ten/ACC Challenge for women's basketball," said ACC Commissioner John Swofford. "To be able to showcase our women's basketball teams in premier competition with the Big Ten Conference in a great event like this will create excitement and enthusiasm with our participating teams and their fans."

The Big Ten and ACC conference offices will coordinate the 11-game schedule each season, which may include rematches from year-to-year. In addition, the official title of the Challenge will rotate each year beginning with the Big Ten/ACC Women's Basketball Challenge in 2007. The 2008 event will be referred to as the ACC/Big Ten Women's Basketball Challenge. The name of the annual series will continue to mirror the official title of the men's basketball event.

Game times, as well as television and broadband coverage, will be announced at a later date.

The Big Ten and ACC have long been among the dominant conferences on the women's basketball scene. This past season, North Carolina advanced to the national semifinals giving the ACC back-to-back Final Four appearances for the third time in league history, just as the Big Ten had in 2003-04 and 2004-05. In 2005-06, the ACC became the first conference to send three teams - Duke, Maryland and North Carolina - to the same Final Four, while the Big Ten was represented by both Iowa and Ohio State in the 1993 event. The Big Ten has participated in five of the last nine Final Fours and eight overall, compared to the ACC's 11 trips, including six in the past 11 years.

In most recent comparison, the 2006-07 campaign concluded with collegierpi.com rating the ACC and Big Ten third and fourth, respectively, in the final RPI. In the same report, the Big Ten was ranked first in strength of schedule, followed by the ACC in third. Since the 1999-00 season, the two conferences have squared off in head-to-head competition on 57 occasions, with the ACC holding a 29-28 advantage.

QUICK TURNAROUND

Four Challenge games will serve as a rematch between the two teams from the 2006-07 season. Michigan defeated Miami, 60-55, last year, while Duke earned a 70-42 victory over Penn State prior to conference play. Wisconsin topped Virginia, 84-78, in the WNIT Quarterfinals and North Carolina advanced to the Final Four with an 84-72 win over Purdue.

NEW FACES IN NEW PLACES

The Challenge's finale between Duke and Penn State will feature familiar foes and a few fresh faces as well. The Lady Lions, led by first-year head coach Coquese Washington, will meet a Blue Devil team that recently hired former Michigan State mentor Joanne P. McCallie as its head coach. McCallie will be looking for her first win in State College in seven attempts as an opposing head coach.

BIG TEN IN THE WNBA DRAFT

Ohio State's Jessica Davenport and Brandie Hoskins, Penn State's Amanda Brown and Purdue's Katie Gearlds were all selected in the 2007 WNBA Draft on April 4 in Cleveland, Ohio. Davenport and Gearlds both went in the first round while Hoskins and Brown were taken in the third round.

Davenport became the first Buckeye ever selected in the first round of the draft when she was taken No. 2 overall by the San Antonio Silver Stars. Shortly after her name was called, Davenport was traded to the New York Liberty. The three-time All-American is the only player in Big Ten history to accumulate 2,000 points, 1,000 rebounds and 300 blocks in a career.

Taken by the Seattle Storm with the seventh overall pick, Gearlds is the first first-round selection for the Boilermakers since 2004 and is the highest pick ever taken out of the program. The 6-1 guard led the Boilermakers to a 31-6 record and an Elite Eight appearance in 2007 and leaves the school first in the record books with 238 three-pointers and fourth with 1,974 total points.

Also selected by the Storm, Hoskins was drafted in the third round with the 33rd overall pick. The 5-9 guard was a three-time All-Big Ten honoree and is fifth all-time at Ohio State with 471 career assists and 13th with 1,462 points.

Selected in the third round by the Los Angeles Sparks with the 38th overall pick, Brown is the 11th Lady Lion to be taken in the WNBA Draft. The 6-4 forward was a member of the 2007 All-Big Ten first team and broke Penn State's single-season rebounding record with 317 boards. She also set a new school record with a .589 career field goal percentage.

Including this year, the Big Ten has produced multiple first-round picks in the draft four times (2001, 2004, 2005, 2007). Davenport is the second-highest selection to come out of the conference and the highest since Minnesota's Janel McCarville was taken No. 1 overall in 2005. Overall, 57 Big Ten standouts have been taken in the 11-year history of the WNBA Draft.

2007 BIG TEN TOURNAMENT PRESENTED BY XBOX 360 REVIEW

Purdue Earns Conference-Leading Sixth Tourney Crown

With a 64-52 victory over Ohio State, Purdue captured its sixth Big Ten Tournament title in the event's 13-year history, the most of any other school in the conference. The Boilermakers have now claimed the Big Ten Tournament championship in 1998, 1999, 2000, 2003, 2004 and 2007.

Home is Where the Heart is

In the 13 editions of the Big Ten Women's Basketball Tournament, one of the teams from the state of Indiana -- Purdue and Indiana -- has advanced to the championship game on 10 occasions, including nine of the last 10 years. Four of the last six tournament titles have gone to Indiana teams, as Purdue won the 2003, 2004 and 2007 events, while the Hoosiers were crowned champions in 2002. Purdue was a finalist in 2006 as well. The two programs are a combined 37-19 (.661) in Big Ten Tournament play since 1995 and 34-17 (.667) when the event is held in Indianapolis.

Tourney Finale Boasts Nation's Best

Over the past four years, the Big Ten Tournament championship final has been fought over by two of the nation's top teams. The 2007 event paired No. 5/6 Ohio State against No. 15/14 Purdue. It was the sixth time in 13 years the Big Ten Tournament title was decided by a pair of teams in the nation's top 15.

Title Game Nailbiter?

Purdue's 12-point margin of victory (64-52) was only the second time that the Big Ten Tournament championship game has been decided by 10 points or more. The first time was also a Purdue victory, a 59-49 win over Penn State in 1998. The 13-year margin of victory in the title game now stands at 5.2 points. Prior to the 2007 final, the tournament's title game had been decided by six points or less since 2001, including three or fewer in 2002, 2003, 2004 and 2006.

Semifinals the Closest in Tournament History

The 2007 Big Ten Tournament semifinals marked the closest and most competitive two semifinal games in the 13-year history of the event. Purdue defeated Michigan State, 63-61, in the first semifinal and was followed by a 73-71 overtime win by Ohio State over Penn State. The five point margin of victory in the two semifinal games was the lowest-ever combined margin of victory in two Big Ten Tournament semifinal games.

Purdue's Versyp Joins First-Timer Club

Sharon Versyp, in her first season at Purdue, became the latest of four coaches to win the Big Ten Tournament championship in their first year at the institution. The two coaches at Purdue prior to Versyp also accomplished the feat in Carolyn Peck (1998) and Kristy Curry (2000). Lisa Bluder of Iowa was the third, in 2001.

Gearlds Joins List of Most Outstanding Players

In 2007, Purdue's Katie Gearlds became the third Purdue player to earn Big Ten Tournament Most Outstanding Player Honors. Stephanie White was the first in 1999 and Shereka Wright won twice, in 2003 and 2004. Additionally, Gearlds was named to the All-Tournament Team for the third time in her career (also in 2004 and 2006).

Ohio State's Davenport Sets New Tourney Records

Jessica Davenport is now the Big Ten Tournament record holder in both free throws made and free throws attempted in a single tournament. She made 26 from the free throw line to move past former Buckeye Katie Smith, who tallied 25 in 1995. Davenport also attempted 37 throughout the tournament, passing Purdue's Shereka Wright, who attempted 32 in 2003.

An Impressive Halves of Shooting in Same Game

In Ohio State's 73-71 overtime win over Penn State in the semifinals, the Buckeyes shot .608 (31-of-51) from the field in the game, setting a new Big Ten Tournament record for a single contest. The previous record was also held by the Buckeyes, who shot .600 (27-of-45) from the field against Michigan State in 2003. Meanwhile, the Lady Lions matched a tourney record for shooting in the game as well, as Penn State shot a blistering .704 (19-of-27) in the second half. That percentage matched Ohio State's first-half mark of .704 (19-of-27) from its firstround game against Michigan State in 1998.

Thirty Something?

In Ohio State's overtime win over Penn State in the semifinals, Jessica Davenport scored a season-high 32 points for the Buckeyes, which tied for the fifth-best single game total in Big Ten Tournament history. The game also marked her second-straight 30-point performance as she recorded 30 points against Indiana in the quarterfinals. It was only the second back-to-back 30-point output in Big Ten Tournament history, as Penn State's Kelly Mazzante (30, 34) was the first to accomplish the feat in 2002.

Brown's Boards Way Into Record Book

Amanda Brown pulled down a Big Ten Tournament single game record 18 rebounds for Penn State in the Lady Lions' 61-49 quarterfinal win over Illinois. The previous record had been set by Indiana's Angela Hawkins in a double-overtime loss to Wisconsin in 2003.

Davenport Sets New Tournament Free Throw Marks

Ohio State's Jessica Davenport set several records at the free throw line at the 2007 Big Ten Tournament. She made a total 26 from the line to move past former Buckeye Katie Smith, who tallied 25 in 1995. Davenport also attempted 37 throughout the tournament, passing Purdue's Shereka Wright, who attempted 32 in 2003. In addition, Davenport went 14-of-17 from the free throw line against Indiana, setting new tournament marks in both free throws made and free throws attempted. The previous record for makes and attempts were 13 and 14, respectively, with both set by Lindsay Whalen of Minnesota in the first round of the 2001 Big Ten Tournament against Indiana.

OSU First to Grab Three-Straight No. 1 Seeds

For the first time in the 13-year history of the Big Ten Tournament, a team earned the top seed for the thirdstraight year. Ohio State, which won the outright conference title the past two seasons and shared the championship with Michigan State in 2004-05, earned its third consecutive No. 1 seed in 2007.

Illinois head coach Theresa Grentz and Penn State mentor Rene Portland were former teammates at Immaculata back in the mid-70s. Today, they are together again as the most tenured head coaches in the Big Ten. The 2006-07 season marks the 27th season at PSU for Portland, while Grentz enters her 12th year with the Illini. In fact, those combined 39 years on a conference campus are three more than the total of the remaining nine Big Ten coaches' tenures. The landscape of conference mentors has taken on a fairly fresh look since the 1999-00 season. Excluding Grentz and Portland, nine of the 11 conference coaches have spent six years or less at their respective schools. Seven coaches have spent less than four years on their respective Big Ten campuses.
