POSTGAME NOTES

Game 10: Northwestern 7, Baylor 0

- An announced crowd of 8,222 Saturday evening marked the largest single-session attendance in Women's College World Series history. The figure bested the previous high of 8,049 set during the 2000 Championship session featuring Oklahoma and UCLA.
- Erin Dyer's two-run single to right field in the top of the first was the Northwestern catcher's first non-home run hit since April 17th. The sophomore had recorded four home runs in the time span.
- Tammy Williams hit a three-run homer in the second inning and now has 16 blasts on the year and 30 in her career. The sophomore shortstop ranks second on the Northwestern single-season homer list and third on the career chart.
- Garland Cooper's homer in the at bat after Williams' roundtripper marked the second time that the pair have gone back-to-back in WCWS history. They did it last year against UCLA on June 4, 2006.
- Cooper's 23 home runs on the year moved her into 19th place in the NCAA single-season home run record book and 18th in NCAA history with her 55 career home runs.
- Northwestern's three homers tied a WCWS single-game record. The Wildcats were also the last team to hit three in a WCWS game when they did it against UCLA on June 4, 2006. UCLA (2000), Arizona (2000) and Oklahoma State (1998) were the other teams to record three home runs in a single WCWS game.
- With the three long balls, the Wildcats tied a school record for postseason homers with nine. Northwestern also hit nine home runs in the 2006 postseason.
- The Wildcats improved to 52-12 on the year while Baylor was eliminated with a final record of 51-16.
- Ashley Monceaux's strikeout was the first for the Baylor leadoff hitter in 54 at bats, a span of 18 games.
- Tonight's contest marked the first game between the two schools since 1984.
- Eileen Canney's shutout was her 10th of the year.
- Canney's win was her 33rd of the season and 97th of her career. She tied the Northwestern single-season and career win marks held by three-time All-American Lisa Ishikawa (1984-'87).
