2005 NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP RECAP

The top-ranked Wisconsin men's cross country team clinched its first NCAA team title since 1988, on Monday, Nov. 21 in Terre Haute, Ind. The Badgers won their fourth NCAA team title with 37 points, breaking a three-year streak of second-place finishes. Also bringing home his second-consecutive individual national title was Badger senior Simon Bairu.

Wisconsin's title marked the 12th national championship for Big Ten men's cross country, four of which belong to the Badgers. Michigan State leads all league teams with five team titles, while Indiana has the remaining three.

Individually, Bairu became just the second Big Ten runner to claim two national titles and the first to ever repeat. Indiana's Bob Kennedy claimed a pair of first-place finishes in 1988 and 1992.

Bairu's teammate, Chris Solinsky, finished third at the NCAA meet, followed closely by the Badgers' Matt Withrow, the Big Ten Freshman of the Year, in ninth.

Bairu and head coach Jerry Schumacher also were recognized by the US Track Coaches Association with National Athlete of the Year and Coach of the Year honors.

Ohio State (406 points) finished 11th, followed by Iowa (495) and Minnesota (514) in 19th and 20th, respectively, and Indiana (617) in 29th.

On the women's side, three Big Ten squads finished in the top 10 for the first time since 1994. Illinois (212) finished fifth, while Michigan (250) was sixth and Minnesota (361) was ninth. Wisconsin (469) placed 20th and Michigan State (671) was 30th.

Cassie Hunt, the 2005 Big Ten Athlete of the Year, placed a conference-best 11th. Three other runners finished in the top 30 in Minnesota's Ladia Albertson-Junka (21st), Michigan's Rebecca Waller (27th) and Minnesota's Emily Brown (29th).

A total of eight male and two female student-athletes earned All-America status for placing the top 25.

Ten conference squads finished the 2005 campaign ranked in their respective polls. National champion Wisconsin finished ranked first in the Men's MONDO Top 30 Poll, followed by No. 12 Ohio State, No. 18 Iowa, No. 23 Minnesota and No. 29 Indiana. On the women's side, Michigan placed third in the FinishLynx Top 30 Poll, while Minnesota (12th), Illinois (14th), Wisconsin (22nd) and Michigan State (30th) round out the conference contingent.

BIG TEN MEN'S CHAMPIONSHIP IN REVIEW

The Wisconsin men's team, led by senior Simon Bairu, added to its dynasty Oct. 30, as the Badgers captured their seventh-straight championship in record fashion, while Bairu claimed his third individual title in as many years. Bairu shaved 14 seconds off his winning time from last year, as he crossed the finish line in an 8,000-meter time of 23:31.73, which was 25 seconds ahead of the pack. That pack was made up of mostly Badgers as they claimed eight of the nine top spots overall, leading to a near-perfect and Big Ten-record score of 16 as well as a conference-best 85-point victory over Ohio State.

The 16-point total is one better than the previous record of 17 set by Michigan State in 1959. The Badgers also bettered their previous Big Ten record for largest winning margin of 81, set last year, when they totaled a margin of 85 at the 2005 event.

Wisconsin junior Chris Solinsky stayed with Bairu for much of the race, but finished at 23:56.38 for second. Right behind him was freshman Matt Withrow at 24:06.58, and a tenth of a second later, fellow freshman Stuart Eagon crossed the line for fourth. The Badgers also placed Antony Ford, Christian Wagner, Time Nelson and Ben Gregory at positions six through ninth.

Indiana's Sean Jefferson broke up the sweep, finishing fifth with a time of 24:13.58.

Leaping four spots from a fifth-place finish in 2004, Ohio State turned up 101 points for second, paced by senior Brian Olinger's 10th-place finish at 24:41.38.

Minnesota finished a mere point behind the Buckeyes at third. Iowa slipped a spot from last year, landing in fourth with 124 points. It was also a narrow distance to fifth with Michigan taking the No. 5 spot with 125 points. Indiana totalled 137 points for sixth, after a runner-up finish in 2004. Michigan State remained steady from their 2004 finish at seventh, Purdue counted 235 points for an eighth-place finish.

Rounding out the team finishes, Penn State solidified the ninth spot with 239 points, while Illinois was not far behind with 241 for 10th.

In postseason awards announced Nov. 2, Wisconsin's Bairu became the first Big Ten runner since Michigan's Kevin Sullivan to win three consecutive Athlete of the Year honors. Only Sullivan (1993-95, 97) and Indiana's Bob Kennedy (1988-90, 92) have won the annual award more than Bairu. Wisconsin's Matt Withrow was tabbed Freshman of the Year after finishing third at the Big Ten Championships last Sunday. The Badgers' Jerry Schumacher earned his fifth consecutive Big Ten Coach of the Year award in 2005, which marks his sixth honor in seven seasons. His sixth award ties the conference record for overall honors with former Wisconsin coach Martin Smith (1989-91-92-94-95-96). This marks the first time since Wisconsin in 2003 and the fourth time in Big Ten history (1991-93-03-05) a school has swept all postseason honors.

The conference office also announced honorees from each of the league's 10 cross country squads for the Big Ten Sportsmanship Award. The student-athletes chosen are individuals who have distinguished themselves through sportsmanship and ethical behavior. In addition, the student-athletes must be in good academic standing and have demonstrated good citizenship outside of the sports-competition setting.

Honorees for men's cross country are Illinois' Dan Stock, Indiana's Stephen Haas, Iowa's Adam Roche, Michigan's Rondell Ruff, Michigan State's Nick Oertel, Minnesota's Trent Riter, Ohio State's Matt Penza, Penn State's Chris Nirschel, Purdue's Justin Stadt, Wisconsin's Ben Gregory.

These 10 student-athletes are now candidates for the Big Ten Sportsmanship Award, as the conference office will honor one male and one female student-athlete from each institution at the end of the school year.

BIG TEN WOMEN'S CHAMPIONSHIP IN REVIEW

Despite rainy conditions, the Big Ten Cross Country Championships came down to the final stretch of the 6,000-meter course at the Les Bolstad Golf Course hosted by the University of Minnesota. In the race to the finish, Illinois junior Cassie Hunt broke away from the pack to claim her first individual title with a race time of exactly 21 minutes. Three-time defending Big Ten champion Michigan won its fourth-straight title with three top-10 finishers.

The Wolverines claimed their fourth straight team title, a string that ranks third in championships history for consecutive titles won. Sophomore Alyson Kohlmeier paced the Wolverines, crossing the finish line second with a time of 21:02.74. Kohlmeier, who finished seventh at the 2004 meet, also earned All-Big Ten honors. Sophomore Erin Webster joined her on the All-Big Ten Team with a seventh-place finish at 21:22.04. Nicole Edwards was close behind, finishing eighth at 21:24.79. Wolverine senior Rebecca Walter, who won the individual title in 2003, came back from an early season injury to take 11th place overall with a time of 21:32.79.

While Hunt claimed the individual championship, the Illini took second with 60 points, 18 behind Michigan's total of 42. Also finishing in the top five for the Illini, junior Stephanie Simms crossed the finish line at 21:11.84 for fourth place. Minnesota surged to third in the team standings with three finishers in the top six, including junior Emily Brown in third place at 21:11.74.

Indiana finished fourth with 128 points, climbing one spot from their fifth-place finish in 2004. Michigan State, the co-runner-up in 2004, fell three spots in the team standings to fifth on the heels of three top-30 individual finishers and 145 points. Wisconsin jumped two spots and earned sixth with 146 points, while Iowa double its seventh-place performance from 2004, again earning 170 points.

The eighth-place team was Purdue, which moved up a spot from 2004 with its 180-point showing. Ohio State finished ninth with 257 points, Penn State was 10th at 258 and Northwestern rounded out the standings with 294.

In postseason awards announced Nov. 2, Illinois' Hunt captured both the Athlete of the Championships and of the Year awards. She is the first Illini runner in school history to be tabbed as the season's top runner in the conference. Hunt's teammate, Katie Engel, was selected Freshman of the Year, marking just the second time in school history an Illini harrier earned the award. Hunt was named the league's top newcomer in 2003.

Michigan's Mike McGuire earned his fourth-straight Coach of the Year selection and his seventh overall, which ranks second in the league behind the nine annual awards of former Wisconsin coach Peter Tegen. The Wolverines have now finished in the top two at the championships 13 times in 14 seasons under McGuire's tutelage.

The conference office also announced honorees from each of the league's 11 cross country squads for the Big Ten Sportsmanship Award. The student-athletes chosen are individuals who have distinguished themselves through sportsmanship and ethical behavior. In addition, the student-athletes must be in good academic standing and have demonstrated good citizenship outside of the sports-competition setting.
