VIZIO FIESTA BOWL: The Boise State football team will square off against Arizona of the Pac-12 in the 2014 VIZIO Fiesta Bowl, Dec. 31. The 20th-ranked Broncos and the 10th-ranked Wildcats are slated to kick at 2 p.m. (MT) at University of Phoenix Stadium in Glendale, Ariz.

Boise State, making its third appearance in the Fiesta Bowl in the last nine seasons, went 11-2 this season, capturing the 2014 Sports Authority Mountain West Football Championship. The Broncos received the invitation to the Fiesta Bowl by being the highest-ranked team from the Group of Five.

Arizona went 10-3 in 2014, and fell to Oregon in the Pac-12 Championship Game.

This will be the first meeting all-time between Boise State and Arizona.

BRONCOS IN THE POLLS

CFP POLL: The Broncos checked in at No. 23 in the College Football Playoff Poll Nov. 25, the team's first appearance in the new ranking system. Boise State climbed all the way to No. 20 in the final ranking of the season.

Only three Group of Five schools were ranked in the poll this season, and Boise State was the only team to post a win the week after joining the rankings. The Broncos went 2-0 while ranked in the CFP Top 25.

13 YEARS IN THE RANKINGS: Boise State checked in at No. 25 in both the Associated Press and Amway Coaches Polls, Nov. 23. It was the first time this season the Broncos were ranked.

Boise State has been ranked for at least one week in both the AP and Coaches Polls in each of the last 13 seasons.

The Broncos climbed to No. 21 in each poll following the conclusion of the regular season.

SUCCESS WHEN RANKED: Boise State has an all-time record of 90-11 (.891) when ranked in the top 25 of the AP and/or Coaches Polls. A complete breakdown of every game played while ranked can be found on page 27.

IT'S BEEN A WHILE: For the first time since 2008, Boise State opened a season unranked in both the Associated Press and Amway Coaches Polls.

The Broncos had opened each of the last five seasons ranked in each preseason poll:

- 2009 - 14 (AP) / 16 (Coaches)
- 2010 - 3 (AP) / 5 (Coaches)
- 2011 - 8 (AP) / 6 (Coaches)
- 2012 - 24 (AP) / 22 (Coaches)
- 2013 - 19 (AP) / 19 (Coaches)

Prior to this season's debut polls, the Broncos had been one of only 11 schools to start each of the last five seasons ranked in the Coaches Poll, and one of 12 schools to open each of the last five seasons ranked in the AP Poll.

THE HARSIN ERA: The Broncos are in their first year under head coach Bryan Harsin, a former Bronco quarterback and assistant coach. Harsin led the Broncos to a record of 11-2 this season, which included the school's first outright Mountain West Championship since joining the league in 2011.

Harsin, who was announced as head coach Dec. 11, 2013, is the fourth-youngest head coach in the country. Only PJ Fleck (33, Western Michigan), Matt Campbell (34, Toledo) and Kliff Kingsbury (35, Texas Tech) are younger. Harsin is also one of only 13 head coaches nationally that is currently coaching at his alma mater, and the first such head coach in Boise State history.

For his efforts during his debut season, Harsin was named a finalist for the Paul "Bear" Bryant National Coach of the Year Award, the Eddie Robinson National Coach of the Year Award and the Dodd Trophy, given annually by the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year Foundation.

MW CHAMPIONS: Boise State won the 2014 Sports Authority Mountain West Football Championship, the team's second league title since joining the league in 2011 and the first outright championship since winning the Western Athletic Conference crown in 2009.

The conference championship was Boise State's 10th in the last 12 seasons, and the 18th league title in school history.

AMONG THE GREATEST: Boise State enters the 2014 VIZIO Fiesta Bowl with the third-best all-time winning percentage amongst the Football Bowl Subdivision. The Broncos' all-time record at the four-year level is 407-155-2 (.723). Notre Dame is first (879-310-42; .731) on the all-time list, and Michigan is second (915-327-36; .730).

BOWL GAMES: Boise State is heading to its 13th-consecutive bowl game, tied for the seventh-longest active streak in the nation. The Broncos' appearance in the VIZIO Fiesta Bowl will be its 15th bowl appearance in the last 16 seasons.

17-YEAR WINNING STREAK: At 11-2 this season, Boise State boasts a winning record for the 17th-consecutive year. The Broncos went 5-6 in 1997, the last season without a winning record and one of only five seasons with a losing record in school history.

ESTABLISHING A LEGACY: The Broncos are the winningest football program in the country since 2000, with an overall record of 166-28 (.856). Ohio State (156-36; .813), Oklahoma (161-38; .809), LSU (150-44; .773) and Oregon (146-45; .764) round out the top five.

ANOTHER 10-WIN SEASON: After winning just eight games last season, the Broncos have once again reached the 10-win mark, the eighth time in nine seasons and the 13th time in 16 seasons.

A win over Arizona would be the Broncos' 12th this season. Boise State won 12-or-more games in five of the eight seasons prior to 2014.

BOWL-ELIGIBLE OPPONENTS: The Broncos' road to 11-2 this season was no easy path. When Boise State squares off against Arizona in the VIZIO Fiesta Bowl, it will be the Broncos' 11th game played against a bowl-eligible opponent - tied for the most in the country. Auburn, Arkansas, Georgia Tech and North Carolina each also will have played 11 bowl-eligible teams in 2014.

WINNING STREAKS: The Broncos are in the midst of an eight-game winning streak, tied for the third-longest in the country (Alabama and Oregon). Only Florida State (29) and Ohio State (11) boast longer streaks nationally.

The Broncos will carry a couple winning streaks into the 2015 season, regardless of the outcome at the VIZIO Fiesta Bowl. The team's home winning streak of 14-consecutive games is tied for the third-longest streak in the country (Florida State). Alabama and Baylor have each won 16-consecutive home games. Additionally, the team has won three-straight road games, tied with Alabama for the ninth-longest streak nationally.

RANKED BRONCOS: The Broncos are currently ranked No. 20 in the College Football Playoff Top 25, and No. 21 in both the Associated Press and Amway Coaches Polls. The Broncos' game against No. 10 Arizona will be the team's 102nd all-time as a ranked team. The Broncos are 90-11 all-time when playing as a ranked team.

The game against the Wildcats will be the 25th played against a ranked opponent in school history, and the 15th played where each team is ranked. Boise State is currently 10-14 against ranked opponents all-time, including a mark of 8-6 when each team is ranked. The Broncos have lost their previous four games against ranked opponents.

AGAINST THE PAC-12: Boise State is 6-3 against schools from the Pac-12 since 2006, not including wins against Utah in both 2006 and 2010. The only losses have come to Washington (2007 and 2013), and Oregon State (2013). The Broncos are 7-12 all-time against the league.

AGAINST THE RESOURCE FIVE: The Broncos are 9-5 against schools from conferences that comprise the Resource Five since the start of the 2006 season. Included was a streak of six-consecutive victories, which was snapped in the 2012 season opener against Michigan State. The Broncos closed the 2012 season with a victory over Washington in the MAACO Bowl Las Vegas, and have since lost three-straight to Resource Five schools. Boise State is 11-21 all-time in such games.

NON-SATURDAY GAMES: Boise State will square off against Arizona in the 2014 VIZIO Fiesta Bowl Wednesday, Dec. 31. Boise State has played 55 non-Saturday games all-time, including six on Wednesdays. The Broncos are 43-12 all-time in non-Saturday games, including a 5-1 mark on Wednesdays.

TURNOVER MARGIN: Boise State concluded the regular season with a turnover margin of 0.54, ranking tied for 30th nationally (Bowling Green). The Broncos ranked tied for 76th nationally

following a seven-turnover performance against Air Force, Sept. 27. Since then, Boise State has gained 17 turnovers and lost just nine - a turnover margin of 1.00. The Broncos are 8-0 during the stretch.

POINTS OFF TURNOVERS: Boise State has scored 128 points off turnovers in 2014, an average of 9.9 per game. The Broncos have scored five defensive touchdowns this season, tied for the sixth-most in the country.

NOVEMBER TO REMEMBER: Boise State was perfect in November for the first time since 2009. The Broncos, 4-0 in November in 2014, lost once during the month each of the last four years. The losses in 2010 and 2011 cost Boise State an opportunity to play in a BCS game, the loss in 2012 cost the Broncos an outright MW Championship and the loss in 2013 prevented Boise State from playing in the inaugural MW Championship Game.

TWICE IN ONE SEASON: For just the second time in school history, Boise State faced an opponent twice in a single season. The Broncos defeated Fresno State 37-27 Oct. 17, and then knocked off the Bulldogs 28-14 in the 2014 Sports Authority Mountain West Football Championship, Dec. 6.

In 1990, Boise State defeated Nevada 30-14 at home (Nov. 10) before falling to the Wolf Pack 59-52 in triple overtime of the NCAA Division I-AA Semifinals. The playoff game was held in Reno, Nev., thus this year was the first time in school history Boise State hosted an opponent twice in the same season.

REDUCED PENALTIES: Through the first eight games of the season, the Broncos were penalized 62 times, or 7.8 per game. The team had at least five penalties in every game through the first eight weeks. But through the team's last five games, the Broncos were penalized just 24 times - an average of 4.8 per game. Included were two performances of three-or-fewer penalties: three against New Mexico (Nov. 8) and two against Wyoming (Nov. 22).

BRONCO NOTES TEAM

THE BLUE: Since opening Albertsons Stadium (formerly Bronco Stadium) in 1970, Boise State is 244-51 at home, a winning percentage of .827. The mark ranks fourth nationally, trailing only Baylor (6-0 at McLane Stadium; 1.000), Georgia Southern (182-33 at Paulson Stadium; .847) and Marshall (142-27 at Joan C. Edwards Stadium; .840).

The Broncos went 7-0 at Albertsons Stadium this season, the most home victories since also going 7-0 in 2009. Boise State was also perfect at home in 2013, going 6-0. The Broncos lost once at home in both 2011 and 2012, but prior to that had put together five-straight perfect seasons at home, and nine-straight perfect regular seasons at home. The only home loss during that time came in the 2005 MPC Computers Bowl against Boston College (27-21).

Boise State has the best home winning percentage in the country since the start of the 2000 season with a record of 92-4 (.958).

MW SUCCESS: Since joining the Mountain West for the 2011 season, Boise State has lost just five league games. Prior to a 28-14 loss to Air Force (Sept. 27) earlier this season, the Broncos' four league losses were by a combined seven points: TCU in 2011 (36-35); San Diego State in 2012 (21-19); Fresno State (41-40) and SDSU (34-31, OT) in 2013.

The Broncos' loss at Air Force was just the 10th league loss since 2000. Boise State is 106-10 in league games during that time - the highest winning percentage in the country (.914).

The Broncos' loss to the Falcons was the team's first to an opponent from the Mountain Division since Nov. 1, 1997 (Utah State). Despite not winning the division last season, Boise State went 5-0 against its counterparts, the only conference losses coming to West Division foes Fresno State and San Diego State.

Boise State is still undefeated against three of its five Mountain Division counterparts, going 18-0 against Colorado State (4-0), New Mexico (6-0) and Wyoming (9-0). Utah

State, the only division opponent to defeat the Broncos prior to this season, has won just four times in the all-time series, and has lost 12-consecutive games to Boise State, which leads the all-time series 15-4. The Broncos are now 2-1 against Air Force.

Additionally, no team in the Mountain West boasts a winning record over Boise State.

DOWN, BUT NOT OUT: The Broncos registered historic comebacks in back-to-back weeks - coming back from down 14 to beat New Mexico (60-49; Nov. 8), and coming back from down 20-0 to beat San Diego State (38-29; Nov. 15). The comeback against the Lobos was the largest deficit overcome en route to a victory since also trailing Oregon State by 14 points, Sept. 7, 2006. The 20-point deficit overcome against the Aztecs is the largest in at least the last 30 years.

REDEMPTION RUN: Boise State went 8-5 last season, its most losses since also having five in 1998. Of the five teams to defeat the Broncos in 2013, three were on the schedule in 2014 - Fresno State, BYU and San Diego State. The Broncos defeated each of the three schools during a four-week span, dropping the Bulldogs (37-27), the Cougars (55-30) and the Aztecs (38-29). Boise State defeated Fresno State a second time in the 2014 Sports Authority Mountain West Football Championship, Dec. 6 (28-14).

BIG-TIME PERFORMANCES: Boise State produced at least one MW Player of the Week in each of the last six games of the regular season (prior to the league championship), the longest streak for the Broncos in at least the last nine years. Included was Jay Ajayi following his five-touchdown performance against Utah State, and three-straight Special Teams Player of the Week honors (the longest streak since 2006): Donte Deayon (Wyoming), Chris Santini (San Diego State) and Dan Goodale (New Mexico). Grant Hedrick was also named Offensive Player of the Week against New Mexico, the first multiple Player of the Week honorees for the Broncos since Dec. 3, 2012 (RB D.J. Harper and LB J.C. Percy). Boise State did not win the defensive award, but had a player named

MW Defensive Player of the Week in each of the two previous games. Deayon earned the nod following Boise State's victory over Fresno State, and stud end Kamalei Correa garnered the honor following the BYU victory.

CONFERENCE OPENERS: With a victory over Colorado State (Sept. 6), Boise State has now won 15-consecutive conference openers since a loss in 1999. The game was the earliest conference opener in school history.

EARLY OPENINGS: The Broncos' 2014 season-opening game against Ole Miss (Aug. 28), was the earliest game played in school history. The Broncos' game against Colorado State (Sept. 6) was the earliest conference game played in school history.

NEW LIDS: Boise State unveiled orange helmets against Ole Miss, believed to be the first such helmet in the Broncos' repertoire since joining the NCAA in 1970. Boise State had at least one set of orange helmets when the school was a junior college, but archives do not show an orange helmet from 1970-2013.

YOUNG SQUAD: Based on the number of underclassmen on the Boise State fall camp roster, the Broncos are one of the 20 youngest teams in the country. Of the Broncos' initial 105 players during fall camp, 67 were either freshmen or sophomores (63.8 percent) – tied for the 19th-highest total in the country.

SHUTOUT STREAK: Boise State has not been shutout in 224-consecutive games, the 12th-longest active streak in the country and the 22nd-longest streak in NCAA history.

The last shutout came on the road against No. 15 Washington State, Sept. 27, 1997 (58-0). The loss to the Cougars is one of only two shutouts the Broncos have suffered since becoming a four-year institution in 1968.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS: The Boise State football team earned a Public Recognition Award from the NCAA for having its most recent multi-year Academic Progress Rate (APR) score rank in the top-10 nationally. Boise State is one of only five schools to receive the award in each of the last four years (Clemson, Duke, Northwestern and Rutgers). The Broncos' single-year APR score of 988 ranked fourth nationally, and had ranked second nationally in each of the last two years. Additionally, Boise State has posted the top APR score in its conference in each of the last seven reports.

EXPLOSIVE PLAYS

The Boise State offense has put together 155 explosive plays during the 2014 season - runs of 12-plus yards and passes of 16-plus.

BRONCO NOTES OFFENSE

RED ZONE SCORING: Boise State has scored in each of its last 44 red zone opportunities, of which 36 have been touchdowns. Following its loss to Air Force (Sept. 27), the Broncos ranked 112th nationally (.708), but have climbed all the way to 15th following the conclusion of the regular season. On the season, Boise State is 61-of-68 (.897) inside the red zone.

PILING UP YARDS: The Broncos rank 14th nationally in total offense, putting up an average of 496.1 yards per game. Of the yardage, 278.2 per game are coming through the air, the 25th-best mark in the country. Boise State ranks 29th in rushing (217.8).

The Broncos gained 676 yards against Colorado State (Sept. 6), 658 yards against New Mexico (Nov. 8) and 637 yards against BYU (Oct. 24) - the fifth-, seventh- and 11th-best marks all-time, respectively.

HITTING ITS STRIDE: The Boise State offense eclipsed 500 total yards just once during the season's first five games, going 3-2. During the team's current eight-game winning streak, the offense has put up 500 yards four times. The Broncos are scoring 47.8 points and averaging 514.5 yards during the winning streak, compared to 27.2 points and 466.6 yards through the first five - an increase of nearly 21 points per game and nearly 50 yards per game.

SCORING MACHINES: The Broncos rank ninth nationally and lead the Mountain West at 39.8 points per game, and are led by two of the five-highest scoring players in the league: running back Jay Ajayi is tied for the national lead at 13.4 points per game (Melvin Gordon, Wisconsin), and kicker Dan Goodale is the league's fifth-highest scorer at 8.2 points per game. He ranks 23rd nationally amongst kickers.

EFFICIENT OFFENSE: The Broncos rank fifth nationally in completion percentage (.688), trailing only USC (.701), Western Michigan (.701), UCLA (.696) and Oregon (.690). Grant Hedrick leads the nation individually (.709).

The Broncos also rank 12th nationally in pass efficiency (155.68), while Hedrick ranks ninth nationally individually (157.8).

Boise State also ranks ninth nationally in scoring (39.8), tied for 12th nationally in first downs (316), 24th nationally in time of possession (31:38) and 31st nationally in third-down conversion percentage (86-of-191; .450).

SCORING OUTPUT: With Bryan Harsin as offensive coordinator (2006-10), Boise State scored 2,733 points - the highest total in the country. The Broncos averaged 41.41 points per game during that time, also the nation's highest mark.

Since 2000, Boise State leads the nation in scoring, averaging 40.21 points per game. Oregon is second at 37.98 points per game.

Last season Boise State finished ranked 19th nationally with a scoring average of 37.5. During Harsin's five years as coordinator, the Broncos' lowest finish was 12th.

OFFENSIVE LINE STARTS: Boise State returned just 26 starts along its offensive line entering 2014, tied for the seventh-fewest in the country. Entering 2014, Marcus Henry had started a team-high 12 games, followed by Rees Odhiambo (eight), Travis Averill (three), Steven Baggett (two) and Mario Yakoo (one).

There are currently 17 Broncos on a National Football League roster, and 12 teams have at least one former member of the Boise State football team on its roster. At least one Bronco has been selected in the NFL Draft in each of the last five seasons, and 14 players have been drafted during that time - including six in the first two rounds.

BRONCO NOTES DEFENSE

BUCKLING DOWN: In 181 total drives against the Bronco defense this season, opponents have scored 52 times (.287). However, of those 181 drives, 104 went for less than 20 yards (.575). Additionally, Boise State has forced 70 three-and-outs in 13 games, an average of 5.38 per game and 38.7 percent of drives against the team on the season. The Broncos rank seventh nationally in three-and-outs per game, and 10th nationally in percentage of drives resulting in three-and-outs.

BLOCK PARTY: It took Boise State nine games to register its first blocked kick of the season, the longest stretch to start a season since 2001, when it also took nine games. But the Broncos broke out against New Mexico (Nov. 8), registering the first multiple-block game in more than a year (Sept. 28, 2013; Southern Miss). Beau Martin blocked the Broncos' first field goal since Oct. 12, 2013 (Utah State), and Kamalei Correa recorded the Broncos' first blocked punt in more than three years (Nov. 5, 2011; UNLV). Armand Nance added a blocked field goal against Fresno State, giving Boise State three blocked kicks on the season - tied for 18th nationally.

RUSH DEFENSE: The Bronco defense held each of its first four opponents of the season to less than 100 yards rushing, the longest streak since holding five straight to less than 100 in 2009. The streak is the longest to open a season since also holding four-straight to less than 100 in 2006.

Boise State also held BYU (63; Oct. 24), Wyoming (80; Nov. 22) and Fresno State (70; Dec. 6) to less than 100 yards rushing. The seven opponents that have failed to eclipse 100 yards is the most since holding eight to less than 100 in 2009.

RETURN OF #DBU: Boise State ranks fifth nationally with 20 interceptions. Individually, redshirt junior safety Darian Thompson ranks tied for third nationally (0.6 per game), while junior cornerback Donte Deayon ranks 16th nationally (0.5 per game).

The Broncos are in their first year under the guidance of defensive coordinator

Marcel Yates, who had previously served on the Boise State staff from 2003-11 before becoming co-defensive coordinator at Texas A&M from 2012-13. During Yates' final six seasons with the Broncos, he coached six defensive backs that were selected in the NFL Draft - earning Boise State the moniker DBU.

BIG-PLAY DEFENSE: The Broncos have gained 29 turnovers this season (20 interceptions and nine fumbles), tied for the seventh most in the country. Boise State has scored on turnovers five times, tied for the sixth-most in the country.

Sophomore Tanner Vallejo has three of the team's nine fumble recoveries, ranking tied for eighth nationally, while Darian Thompson and Donte Deayon rank tied for third (0.6 per game) and 16th (0.5 per game) nationally in interceptions, respectively.

Additionally, the Bronco defense is averaging 7.5 tackles-for-loss per game, a mark that ranks 13th nationally. Included are 3.00 sacks per game, tied for 13th nationally.

Boise State has double-digit tackles-for-loss in three games this season, and had eight sacks against Connecticut (Sept. 13), tied for the most since joining the WAC in 2001, and the most since also recording 8.0 against BYU in 2004. The total is also tied for the seventh most in the FBS in 2014.

PASSING YARDS ALLOWED: Through the first three games of the season, Boise State allowed 354.3 passing yards per game. Although the Bronco defense currently ranks 62nd nationally in passing yards allowed (225.0), the team has allowed just 186.2 its last 10 games, climbing all the way up from 123rd. Only 11 schools are allowing fewer than 186.2 yards per game through the air on the season.

CONVERSION %: Opponents are converting just 35.1 percent of third-down attempts against the Bronco defense (71-of-202), the nation's 22nd-best mark. Additionally, teams are converting just 40.0 percent of fourth-down tries (10-of-25), tied for 28th nationally.



HEAD COACH BRYAN HARSIN



In his first year as head coach of the Boise State football team, Bryan Harsin, a former Bronco quarterback and assistant coach, has brought Boise State back to where it rose to national prominence less than a decade ago – the Fiesta Bowl.

Harsin guided the Broncos to a record of 11-2 this season, and helped bring home the team's first outright Mountain West Championship since joining

the league in 2011. It was also the Broncos' first outright league title since 2009, the last time the team made an appearance at the Fiesta Bowl.

The only alumnus to lead the Broncos as head coach in the history of Boise State, Harsin has now won a conference championship as a student-athlete, assistant coach and head coach.

For his efforts during his debut season at his alma mater, Harsin was named a finalist for the 2014 Eddie Robinson Award, given annually to the national coach of the year, as well as the Bear Bryant Award. He was also named a finalist for the Dodd Trophy, given annually by the Bobby Dodd National Coach of the Year Foundation.

In addition to rejoining the national rankings – Boise State ranked 20th nationally in the final College Football Playoff Top 25 – the Broncos' offense has also returned the nation's elite. Boise State concluded the regular season ranked ninth nationally in scoring offense (39.8) and 14th nationally in total offense (496.1).

Harsin was named head coach, Dec. 11, 2013. A graduate of Capital High School in Boise, he played quarterback for the Broncos from 1995-99. Following his graduation from Boise State with a degree in business management, Harsin coached running backs and receivers at Eastern Oregon in 2000.

The former Bronco letterwinner began his coaching career at Boise State as a graduate assistant in 2001, before taking over the tight ends as a full-time assistant coach from 2002-05. When Chris Petersen was hired as head coach in 2006, Harsin assumed the role of offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach.

Harsin was Petersen's offensive coordinator for five of his eight seasons as head coach (2006-10), and was named a finalist for the 2009 Broyles Award, awarded annually to the nation's top assistant coach. Boise State went 61-5 during his tenure as offensive coordinator.

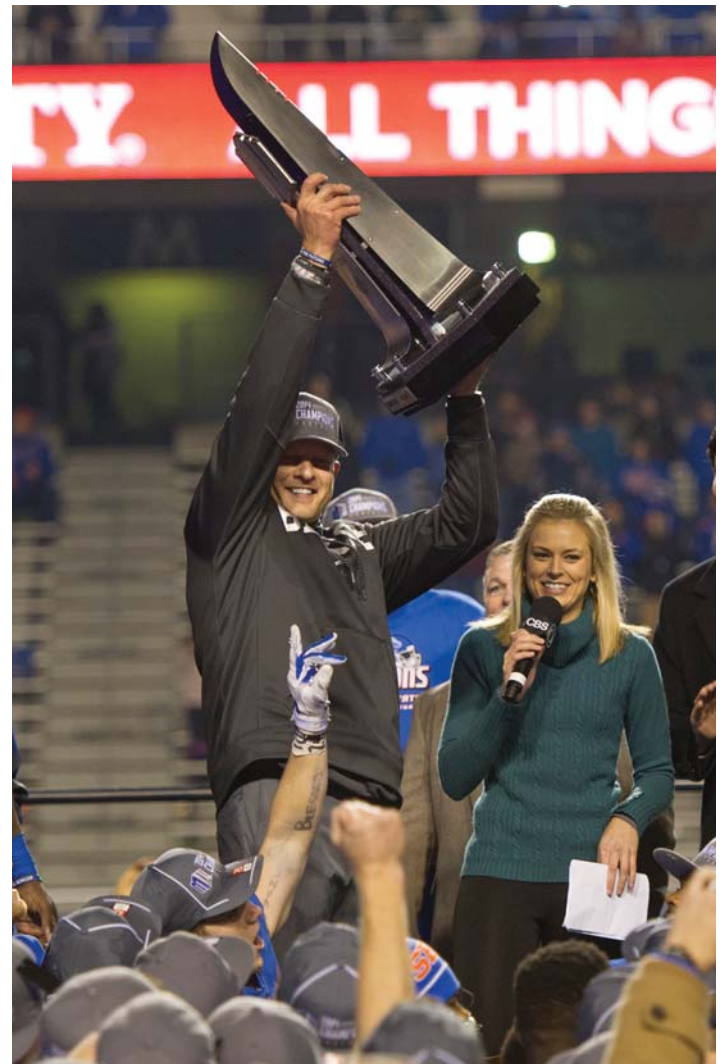
The Broncos are in the midst of the seventh-longest active streak in the nation of consecutive bowl appearances (13), and Harsin has been a part of 10 of them – including each of the team's three Fiesta Bowl appearances.

With Harsin on staff, Boise State has also won nine conference championships.

Following the 2010 season, Harsin went to Texas, where he served as co-offensive coordinator from 2011-12. While with the Longhorns, Harsin helped guide the ascension of an offense that ranked 88th in scoring prior to his arrival, to No. 24 nationally in 2012 (36.1).

Harsin then earned his first head coaching opportunity at Arkansas State in 2013, which claimed a share of the Sun Belt Conference championship and a berth in the GoDaddy.com Bowl that season.

Harsin and his wife Kes have two daughters, Devyn Lynn and Dayn Mykena, and a son, Davis.

BRONCO NOTES INDIVIDUAL

JAY AJAYI

LEAVING EARLY: Boise State redshirt junior running back Jay Ajayi announced Dec. 21 that he would be declaring for the National Football League Draft following the 2014 season. He is the second Bronco in as many years to leave Boise State a year early for the NFL (DeMarcus Lawrence).

ALL-AMERICA ACCOLADES: Ajayi has garnered All-America from a number of outlets this season, earning second-team honors from The Sporting News, FOX Sports and USA Today Sports. He was named to the third team by the Associated Press and Phil Steele, and honorable mention by Sports Illustrated.

FINALIST: Ajayi is one of five finalists for the Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award, given annually to the top offensive player in football with ties to the state of Texas.

Ajayi was also named a semifinalist for the Doak Walker Award, given annually to the nation's best running back.

POW AWARDS: Ajayi was the only three-time Mountain West Offensive Player of the Week in 2014, earning the honor following his performances against Colorado State, Louisiana and Utah State.

ALL-MW: Ajayi was named first-team All-Mountain West in both 2013 and 2014, the only offensive player in the league to garner the accolade in each of the last two seasons. Ajayi was the only offensive member from the 2013 season to return for 2014.

NATIONAL RANKINGS: Ajayi ranks nationally in a number of statistical categories, of which a breakdown can be found below:

- SCORING1st (13.4)
- RUSHING TOUCHDOWNS. 2nd (25)
- ALL PURPOSE. 3rd (171.15)
- RUSHING YARDS. 4th (1,689)
- RUSHING YPG 9th (129.9)
- POINTS RESPONSIBLE FOR 23rd (174.0)

GOING FOR 100: Boise State is 9-0 in 2014 when Jay Ajayi rushes for 100-plus yards. Included was a streak of seven-straight games, the longest such streak in school history. His nine 100-yard games in 2014 ties the Boise State single-season record, set by Ian Johnson in 2006.

He has 16 100-yard games for his career, tied for the fourth-most in school history. Boise State is 14-2 when Ajayi rushes for 100-or-more yards.

JAY TRAIN FOR 1,000: Ajayi rushed for 1,689 yards during the regular season, the second most in school history. He is 25 yards shy of breaking Ian Johnson's single-season rushing record (1,713; 2006).

Ajayi has eclipsed 1,000 yards for a second-straight season. He is the seventh individual in school history to accomplish the feat multiple times during a Bronco career, joining Cedric Minter (1978-80), Rodney Webster (1981 and 1983), Jon Francis (1984-85), Brock Forsey (2001-02), Ian Johnson (2006-07) and Doug Martin (2010-11).

Ajayi's career rushing total of 3,662 ranks fourth all-time at Boise State.

SCORING MACHINE: Ajayi is tied for the national lead in scoring, averaging 13.4 points per game (Melvin Gordon, Wisconsin). His 25 rushing touchdowns ranks second nationally, and included 20 such scores during the Broncos' eight-game winning streak. He trails the national rushing TD leader by one (Gordon; 26).

His season total is one shy of the school record, set by Brock Forsey in 2002 (26).His 47 career rushing touchdowns ranks third all-time at Boise State. He has 52 career total touchdowns, also the third-most in school history. His 312 total points are the fifth-most in school history.

200-YARD GAMES: Ajayi has posted a pair of 200-yard rushing games this season - 219 against Colorado State and 229 against Utah State - giving him three for his career. He is just the fourth player in school history

with multiple 200-yard rushing games, joining Cedric Minter (4; 1977-80), Ian Johnson (2; 2005-08) and Brock Forsey (2; 1999-2002).

THE BRAHMA BULL: Ajayi entered 2014 averaging 5.96 yards per carry on 331 attempts - the seventh-highest average nationally amongst players with more than 250 career carries. Of Ajayi's 656 career carries, only 53 have resulted in lost yardage - or 8.1 percent of his rushing attempts.

RECEIVING THREAT: Ajayi boasts the second-most receptions (45) and receiving touchdowns (four) on the team, and ranks third in receiving yards (535).

KAMALEI CORREA

ALL-MW: Sophomore STUD end Kamalei Correa was named first-team All-Mountain West this season, the first all-league accolade of his career.

LOST YARDAGE: Correa leads the Broncos with 10.0 sacks in 2014, a mark that leads the MW. His sack average of 0.77 per game also leads the league and ranks tied for 21st nationally.

Correa is averaging 1.3 tackles-for-loss per game, ranking 26th nationally.

POW: Correa was named MW Defensive Player of the Week following the BYU game (Oct. 24). He recorded five tackles, including a career-high 3.5 for-loss and two sacks, against the Cougars.

STEPPING UP: Correa, who played in every game last season as a true freshman but did not start, has started every game this season for the Broncos.

His 17.0 TFLs leads the team, and his 49 tackles (33 solo) lead all Bronco defensive linemen.

FOR COMPARISON'S SAKE: Former Bronco DeMarcus Lawrence was a second-round selection in the National Football League Draft following the 2013 season (No. 34 overall), having left Boise State a

year early. During his sophomore year with the Broncos, Lawrence registered 48 tackles, 13.5 tackles-for-loss and 9.5 sacks in 11 games. Correa, in 13 games, has recorded 49 tackles, 17.0 TFLs and 10.0 sacks.

DONTE DEAYON

ALL-LEAGUE: Junior cornerback Donte Deayon was named second-team All-Mountain West for the second-straight season in 2014.

INTERCEPTION MACHINE: Deayon ranks 16th nationally with an interception average of 0.5 per game. Despite missing two games, his five interceptions on the season ranks tied for 16th nationally.

Deayon boasts 12-career interceptions, tied for the 11th-most in school history. Included were a team-high six in 2013, tied for the seventh-most in the country. His per-game average of 0.5 ranked ninth nationally.

POW: Deayon was named MW Defensive Player of the Week following the game against Fresno State (Oct. 17). He had eight tackles, including his first-career sack, and hauled in an interception against the Bulldogs.

He was also named Special Teams Player of the Week following the Wyoming game (Nov. 22). He returned a punt 75 yards for a touchdown against the Cowboys.

The last Bronco to earn two different player of the week honors in a season was Quinton Jones, who earned WAC Special Teams Player of the Week on Sept. 11, 2006 and the conference's defensive player of the week seven days later (Sept. 18).

PICK SIX: Deayon missed the Broncos' game against Colorado State (Sept. 6) with an injury, then returned in a big way against Connecticut (Sept. 13). In addition to six tackles, Deayon returned an interception 50 yards for a touchdown with 4:00 minutes remaining in the fourth quarter, putting the Broncos up 38-21 and putting the game out of reach.

DAN GOODALE

NATIONAL RANKING: Redshirt senior kicker Dan Goodale is averaging 8.2 points per game, ranking 37th nationally and fifth in the MW. The total ranks 23rd nationally amongst kickers.

HOT STREAK: Before missing one against Wyoming, Goodale had made nine-straight field goal attempts dating back to the Nevada game (Oct. 4), including a 3-for-3 performance against Fresno State, 2-for-2 showings against both BYU and New Mexico, and a 1-for-1 outing against San Diego State.

CAREER SCORING MARKS: Goodale has 169 career PATs, the third-most in school history. Additionally, he surpassed 200 career points against Air Force (Sept. 27), just the 15th individual in school history to score 200 points in his career. His 274 points ranks ninth all-time at Boise State.

ACCURACY: Goodale is 15-for-20 on the year (.750), and 35-of-44 (.796) for his career. He converted 17-of-19 field goal attempts in 2014, ranking 15th nationally in field goal percentage (.895). Included was a streak of 12-straight successful attempts. Entering 2014, Goodale was one of only 13 kickers returning nationally that converted double-digit attempts at a clip of better than 85 percent.

KICKOFF SPECIALIST: Goodale has kicked off 96 times this season, the third-most in the country. He has recorded a national-leading 63 touchbacks, and his touchback percentage of .635 ranks 10th nationally.

GRANT HEDRICK

ALL-LEAGUE: Redshirt senior quarterback Grant Hedrick was named second-team all-league in 2014, the first all-league accolade of his career.

Hedrick was also named Offensive MVP of the 2014 Sports Authority Mountain West Football Championship.

NATIONAL RANKINGS: Hedrick ranks amongst the national leaders in several categories outlined below:

HEDRICK RISING: Since Boise State's loss to Air Force (Sept. 27), redshirt senior quarterback Grant Hedrick has been on a tear. He has completed 151-of-211 passes (.716) for 2,092 yards, 17 touchdowns and just four interceptions. He has also rushed for 399 yards and seven touchdowns, and caught a 9-yard touchdown pass (Fresno State).

Hedrick's pass efficiency rating during the stretch is 177.64, and he has averaged 261.5 yards passing per game. He has accounted for multiple touchdowns in each game, including 18 in the last five games combined. Hedrick was responsible for six touchdowns against New Mexico (four passing and two rushing), just the second such performance by a Bronco in the last 11 seasons. He has the only other six-touchdown game during that time last season against Colorado State.

Hedrick threw four touchdown passes in back-to-back games against BYU and New Mexico, the first Bronco to do it since Kellen Moore had five and four against Toledo (Sept. 16) and Tulsa (Sept. 24) during the 2011 season, respectively.

STEPPING UP: Hedrick threw for a career-high 410 yards and four touchdowns against BYU (Oct. 24), one of four performances of the season with more than 300 yards. He has six 300-yard performances during his career, tied for the fifth-most in school history.



BRONCO NOTES INDIVIDUAL

RUN THREAT: Hedrick rushed for 131 yards against New Mexico (Nov. 8), the most by a quarterback in school history. It was his second-career 100-yard rushing performance and the third by a Bronco signal caller in the last 15 years.

Hedrick ranks second on the team in both rushing (563) and rushing touchdowns (eight). His rushing TD total ranks 14th nationally amongst quarterbacks, and are the most by a Bronco signal caller since Jared Zabransky rushed for 11 TDs in 2005.

His yardage total is the most by a Boise State quarterback in a single season since at least the 1972 season.

He was also the team's second leading rusher last season, picking up 277 yards on 68 carries. He added six touchdowns.

SIX FOR SIX, TWICE: In just his second-career start (Colorado State; Nov. 2, 2013), Hedrick accounted for each of Boise State's six touchdowns, leading the Broncos to a 42-30 victory. Hedrick threw five touchdown passes, tied for the second-most in school history, and added a rushing score. His six touchdowns were the most by a Bronco quarterback since Ryan Diniwddie also accounted for six against Nevada, Nov. 29, 2003.

Hedrick also had six touchdowns against New Mexico (Nov. 8, 2014), throwing for four and rushing for two.

300 AND 100: Hedrick threw for 367 yards and rushed for 131 against New Mexico (Nov. 8), the first 300/100 performance by a Bronco since Boise State joined the Football Bowl Subdivision in 1996.

His 498 yards of total offense against the Lobos are the fourth-most by a Bronco in a single game in school history.

MARCUS HENRY

ALL-MW: Redshirt junior center Marcus Henry was named first-team All-Mountain West in 2014, his first all-league accolade. Henry made the move to center this season

after starting 12 games in 2013 at right guard.

JEREMY IOANE

#10ANE STRONG: Redshirt senior safety Jeremy Ioane was diagnosed with IgA nephropathy after a kidney biopsy in the summer of 2012. The disease occurs when abnormal deposits of the protein IgA collect in the filtering units of the kidneys. Ioane will require a transplant, and he has been playing through the condition since being diagnosed.

Jeremy Ioane's medical bills to this point have been covered by his family's insurance and Boise State student insurance. When he graduates in December, he will lose the university coverage. He does not qualify for the NCAA's catastrophic medical coverage because he doesn't have a football injury.

Boise State has helped the family establish a website for those who wish to help with his future medical expenses: www.youcaring.com/medical-fundraiser/jeremy-ioane-medical-fund/269398.

As of Dec. 20, the fund had raised more than \$50,000.

SEASON-OPENING STARTS: Ioane, who started the first three games of 2014, has started each of the last four season openers for Boise State, the only member of the Boise State defense to start each of the last four season openers.

OPENING PICKS: Ioane recorded the Broncos' first interception of the season on the first play of the second drive by Ole Miss in the season opener. It was his fourth career interception, and his first since Dec. 22, 2012, against Washington in the MAACO Bowl Las Vegas.

After not recording a single interception all of last season, Ioane had one in each of the first two games.

BEAU MARTIN

ALL-MW: Redshirt senior defensive tackle Beau Martin was named honorable

mention All-Mountain West in 2014, the first all-league accolade of his Boise State career.

AMONG THE LEADERS: Martin boasts a career-high 11.0 tackles-for-loss - the third-most on the team. His 4.5 sacks rank second on the team in 2014.

INCREASED ROLE: Martin spent the last two seasons backing up Demarcus Lawrence, a second-round selection in the 2014 National Football League Draft (Dallas Cowboys). He started one game in both the 2012 and 2013 seasons, and has started every game for the Broncos thus far in 2014.

MATT MILLER

OUT WITH INJURY: Redshirt senior wide receiver Matt Miller had surgery on a ligament in his left ankle Oct. 13, and is expected to miss the remainder of the 2014 season. The following notes were where Miller stood heading into the Nevada game (Oct. 4), the first missed game of his career:

NATIONAL RANKINGS: Redshirt senior wide receiver Matt Miller ranks 16th nationally through the first five weeks of the season in receiving yards (461) and is 30th nationally in receiving yards per game (92.2), ranking first and second in the MW, respectively.

RECORD WATCH: Miller has already broken the Broncos' career receptions record this season, passing Austin Pettis (229; 2007-10) on the all-time list. Miller entered the season with 216 receptions, then caught 14 through the first two games of the season to pass Pettis.

He is currently just 15 yards away from breaking the all-time receiving yards mark at Boise State, currently held by Titus Young (3,063; 2007-10).

NATION'S LONGEST STREAK: Miller has caught at least one pass in each of his 44 career games, the longest streak in the country. Wyoming's Dominic Rufran holds the nation's second-longest streak at 42 games.

SEASON-OPENING STARTS: Miller has started each of the last four season openers for Boise State, the only member of the Boise State offense to start each of the last four season openers.

MORE RETURNING STATS: Matt Miller caught a school record 88 passes last season, the fifth-most receptions by an FBS player returning for the 2014 season.

LAST YEAR'S RANKINGS: Miller ranked amongst the national leaders in a number of statistical categories at the conclusion of the 2013 season: 12 touchdowns were tied for 10th-most nationally; 88 catches were 16th; 6.8 receptions per game ranked 21st; 1,140 receiving yards ranked 23rd; 87.7 yards per game ranked 27th.

ENDING ON A HIGH NOTE: Miller set career bests with 11 catches for 206 yards en route to Bronco Most Valuable Player honors at the 2013 Sheraton Hawai'i Bowl. Included was an 85-yard touchdown catch, the longest play in the bowl's history and the longest reception by a MW player in a bowl game since the league's inception.

100-YARD GAMES: Miller has eight career 100-yard receiving games, tied for the fifth most in school history. The school record is 13, set by Ryan Ikebe from 1993-96.

REES ODHIAMBO

ALL-MW: Redshirt junior left tackle Rees Odhiambo garnered the first all-league accolade of his career in 2014, earning second-team All-Mountain West honors.

Odhiambo made the move to left tackle this season after starting eight games at right tackle in 2013.

JAKE ROH

ALL-MW: Redshirt freshman tight end Jake Roh hauled in 33 catches for 399 yards and two touchdowns this season, earning honorable mention All-Mountain West honors.

RECEIVING TOTALS: Roh led all Bronco tight ends in both receptions and yards, and tight for the group lead in touchdowns.

The reception total is also the highest by a Bronco tight end since Jeb Putzier caught 44 passes as a senior in 2001. Putzier was a sixth-round selection in the National Football league Draft by the Denver Broncos.

THOMAS SPERBECK

BREAKOUT RECEIVER: Sophomore wide receiver Thomas Sperbeck is averaging a team-best 87.8 receiving yards through the last six games (527 total), including 100-yard performances against BYU (148) and New Mexico (164). The back-to-back 100-yard games are the first by a Bronco since Matt Miller did it in the final two games of the 2013 season.

Sperbeck, who did not have a catch prior to Matt Miller's injury, leads the Broncos with 678 receiving yards, and ranks third in both receptions (39) and receiving touchdowns (three; tied).

DARIAN THOMPSON

ACCOLADES: Redshirt junior safety Darian Thompson garnered the first all-league accolades of his career in 2014, being named first-team All-MW.

Thompson was also named CBSSports.com All-America Second Team.

INTERCEPTION MACHINE: Redshirt junior safety Darian Thompson boasts a team-high seven interceptions this season, ties for the third-most in the country. His per-game average of 0.6 also ranks tied for third nationally.

Thompson's career total is now 14, tied for the sixth-most in school history.

TANNER VALLEJO

ACCOLADES: Sophomore linebacker Tanner Vallejo was named second-team All-MW in 2014, the first all-league honor of his career.

He was also named Defensive MVP of the 2014 Sports Authority Mountain West Football Championship.

RECOVERING FUMBLES: Vallejo ranks tied for eighth nationally with three fumble recoveries this season.

TACKLING MACHINE: Vallejo has started every game for the Broncos this season. He leads the team with 86 tackles (54 solo) and is second on the team with 15.0 tackles-for-loss.

TOUCHDOWNS: Vallejo picked up a fumble and returned it 31 yards for a touchdown on Connecticut's opening drive, Sept. 13. It was the first fumble recovery for a touchdown by a Bronco since Demarcus Lawrence accomplished the feat against Hawai'i, Nov. 10, 2012.

Vallejo added an interception return for a touchdown against Fresno State in the league championship game. The interception was the first of his career, and the touchdown gave him two defensive scores this season. He is the first Bronco with multiple defensive scores in the same year since Shea McClellin accomplished the feat in 2010.

He is one of only 18 players in the FBS with multiple defensive touchdowns this season.



BRONCO NOTES INDIVIDUAL

SHANE WILLIAMS-RHODES

ALL-MW: Boise State junior wide receiver Shane Williams-Rhodes was named honorable mention All-Mountain West at wide receiver for a second-straight season in 2014.

NATIONAL RANKINGS: Williams-Rhodes hauled in a career-high 14 receptions in the season opener against Ole Miss, the highest reception total in the country during the first week of the season and tied for the third-most catches in a single game in school history. The catch total was the highest by a Bronco since Tim Gilligan caught a school-record 16 passes against Louisiana Tech in 2003. The total is also tied for the 12th-most in an FBS game this season.

He has a team-high 68 catches through nine games, ranking fourth in the MW in receptions per game (5.2). His reception total is also the ninth-most in a single season all-time at Boise State.

Williams-Rhodes also leads the team with seven touchdown catches. The total is tied for the second-most in the MW. His 585 receiving yards ranks second on the team.

DOUBLE-DIGIT CATCHES: Williams-Rhodes had three games last season with at least 10 receptions, the most by a Bronco since Rodney Smith did it four times in 1997. Williams-Rhodes, who caught 14 passes in the season opener against Ole Miss, now has four such games.

COULD HAVE HAD IT?: Junior wide receiver Shane Williams-Rhodes had a team-high 77 receptions through 11 games last season before missing the final two games with an injury. His teammate - Matt Miller - broke the single-season reception record, catching 20 passes in the final two games. Williams-Rhodes' per-game average of 7.0 receptions led the team, ranked fifth in the Mountain West and was 17th nationally. The total was also the third most by an underclassman nationally.

Albertsons Stadium - and Lyle Smith Field - is the home of Boise State football and the annual Famous Idaho Potato Bowl.

Smith is the undisputed father of Bronco football, who from 1946-67 built one of the top junior college programs in the country. When he retired from his head coaching position to become the athletic director, Smith had a record of 156-6-6 (.846).

Completed during the summer of 1970 at a cost of \$2.2 million, what was originally known as Bronco Stadium had a seating capacity of 14,500. Since that time the stadium has expanded four times to its current capacity of 36,387.

Boise State established a first in 1986 by installing the first blue AstroTurf in the country. The second blue AstroTurf field was installed in 1995, with the third prior to the 2002 season.

The first Blue FieldTurf surface was installed in 2008. A second Blue FieldTurf field was installed prior to the 2010 season, making a total of five different blue fields at the stadium.

Boise State's was the first collegiate stadium to have the entire field produced in a special color.
