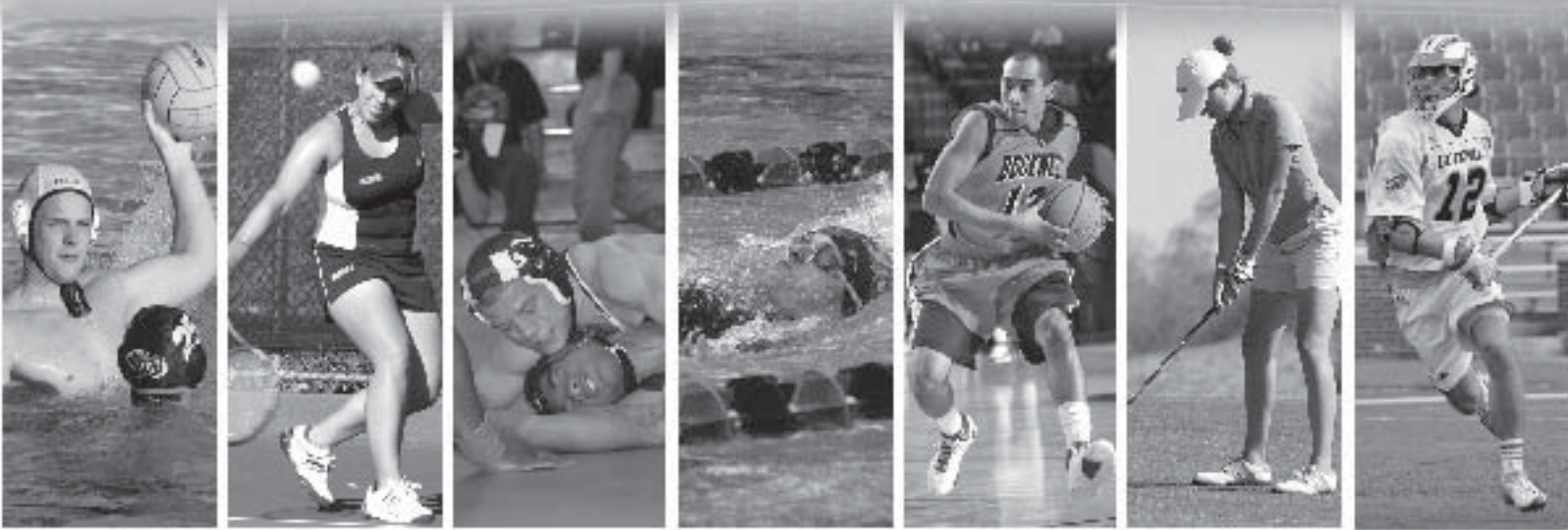

Setting the Standard of Excellence

Bucknell takes great pride in its commitment to excellence on and off the playing fields. From Presidents' Cups to Academic All-Americans to graduation rates that are ranked annually in the national top-10, Bucknell is clearly at the head of the class when it comes to upholding the scholar-athlete ideal.

- According to federal data released in the fall of 2006 by the NCAA and reported on by the Associated Press and The Chronicle of Higher Education, Bucknell's four-year student-athlete graduation rate was highest in the nation among student-athletes who entered college between the 1996-97 and 1990-2000 academic years. Bucknell was one of four institutions to graduate at least 90 percent of its student-athletes who enrolled during that four-year period. Bucknell posted a 93-percent rate, followed by Davidson (90 percent), Duke (90 percent) and Georgetown (90 percent).
- Bucknell has claimed 112 Patriot League Scholar-Athletes of the Year since the league's inception as an all-sports conference in 1990-91. That is more than twice the next-highest total.
- A total of 344 Bison appeared on the Patriot League Academic Honor Roll in 2007-08 after recording a GPA of 3.2 or better during their sport's competition season. Among all BU student-athletes, 244 made the Dean's List with GPAs of 3.5 or better in the spring of 2008.
- 24 of Bucknell's 27 varsity squads posted team GPAs of 3.0 or better in the spring of 2008.
- In addition to the 117 *ESPN the Magazine* Academic All-Americans produced since 1970, Bucknell has also claimed 254 Academic All-District honorees over the same span, including a school-record 20 in 2006-07.

- With five more Patriot League championships in 2007-08, Bucknell has now earned 70 crowns in 18 years in the league. In addition, Bucknell has had 90 conference players of the year, 78 PL coaches of the year and a whopping 456 individual league champions from sports such as cross country, track & field, swimming & diving, tennis and golf.
- Bucknell has captured the Patriot League Presidents' Cup, signifying the league's all-sports champion, 14 times in the 18-year history of the affiliation, including 10 of the last 11 years. Bucknell claimed the overall, men's and women's Cup standings in 2007-08, when the Bison teams won five Patriot League titles. It was the 11th straight year and the 14th time overall, that the Bison took home the women's title. In 2007-08, Bucknell won Patriot League titles in women's cross country, women's indoor track & field, women's basketball, women's rowing and baseball. Additionally, the women's soccer squad collected its second consecutive regular-season crown.
- Bucknell ranks FIFTH in the nation (to Nebraska, Notre Dame, Penn State and Stanford) in total number of *ESPN The Magazine* All-America selections.
- A major element in ensuring Bucknell's commitment to athletics excellence is the Kenneth G. Langone Athletics & Recreation Center, which opened fully in 2003. One of the finest collegiate athletics facilities of its kind, the center includes the 4,000-seat Sojka Pavilion, the Olympic class Kinney Natatorium, the Krebs Family Fitness Center and the Berger Family Weight Room. A Hall of Fame area, a display of Bucknell's Medal of Honor recipients, a new Academic All-America wall, a sports medicine suite, modern offices for coaches and staff, and locker room and classroom space are also included in the facility's layout.

Bucknell Bison Athletics

A National Model in Promoting the Scholar-Athlete Ideal

Bucknell Athletics is first and foremost a student-centered organization, one that strives to be a national model when it comes to operating by a true scholar-athlete model. At Bucknell, student-athletes' academic programs are their first priority, and providing a competitive Division I athletics program only advances the mission, values and residential learning goals of the university. To that end, the Department of Athletics and Recreation proactively seeks ways to assist student-athletes in their daily academic pursuits. Below are just some of the student-athlete support programs currently in place.

FACULTY ATHLETICS REPRESENTATIVE: The faculty athletics representative (FAR) is a member of the faculty or administrative staff who is designated to represent Bucknell in its relationships with the NCAA and the Patriot League. Bucknell's FAR is Mitch Chernin, Professor of Biology. The FAR can enhance the student-athlete experience by promoting a balance between academics, athletics and the social lives of student-athletes, which affords them opportunities to enjoy the full range of collegiate experiences available to students generally.

SIDELINE COACH PROGRAM: This program is a truly unique initiative in Division I college athletics, and it involves the invitation of a member of the faculty, administration, staff or community by one of Bucknell's 27 varsity teams. The participant has the opportunity to discuss the overall program with the respective coaching staff, including practice preparation and strategy for the upcoming contest. The sideline coach attends a practice session and an actual intercollegiate competition, where he/she is introduced to the team and gains rarely seen insight into the relationships that exist between player-coach and player-player. The purpose of the Sideline Coaches Program is to foster a better understanding by the faculty and administration of the roles played by coaches and athletes in the university's competitive intercollegiate athletic arena.

ACADEMIC ENHANCEMENT CENTER: In the Fall of 2005, the Department of Athletics opened a study/computer lab for student-athletes on the concourse level of Sojka Pavilion. The center is outfitted with computers, a laser printer, four television monitors and a projection unit with computer, VCR and DVD player. Additionally, the study lab can be used as a meeting place for group projects, tutorial area or just a secluded and quiet study space before or after practice.

LAPTOP PROGRAM: The Department of Athletics owns a number of laptop computers that may be signed out by student-athletes for use on away trips.

STUDENT-ATHLETE ADVISORY COMMITTEE (SAAC): Representatives from each varsity team comprise the SAAC, which is designed to enhance the total student-athlete experience by promoting opportunity, protecting student-athlete welfare, and fostering a positive student-athlete image. The Committee is an invaluable resource for promoting communication between athletics administration and student-athletes; promoting communication between athletics and campus-wide administration; providing feedback and insight, as well as soliciting responses into department issues and proposed NCAA legislation; building a sense of community within the athletics program involving all athletics teams; organizing community service projects and efforts; creating a vehicle for student-athlete representation on campus-wide committees; serving as a collective voice of campus student-athletes; and disseminating information to the student-athlete body.

OTHER PROGRAMMING: The Department of Athletics, through the identification of outside speakers and periodic "Brown Bag Luncheons," thrives to enhance the quality of the student-athlete experience as well as to educate student-athletes on a variety of issues that may affect them throughout their collegiate career. Some recent topics of interest have been alcohol, nutrition, body image, hazing, sexuality, diversity, career development, study skills, religious life, media relations and gambling.

THE KENNETH LANGONE ATHLETICS & RECREATION CENTER

The Bucknell University Department of Athletics and Recreation prides itself on setting the standard of excellence when it comes to success both on the playing fields and in the classroom. With 14 Patriot League Presidents' Cups in 18 years, national leadership in graduation rates, 117 Academic All-Americans in 38 years and 112 Patriot League Scholar-Athletes in 18 years, Bucknell is clearly at the head of the class in terms of upholding the scholar-athlete model.



The addition of the Kenneth G. Langone Athletics and Recreation Center, one of the finest collegiate athletics and recreation venues of its kind, ensures the continuation of that success.

The facility enhances each of Bucknell's 27 varsity programs and greatly expands the scope of its growing intramural and recreational sports offerings. A visually appealing structure located along Moore Avenue on the "downhill" side of campus, the Langone Athletics and Recreation Center was designed to reach out to all members of the campus community, including the student body, varsity student-athletes, faculty, staff and alumni.

Three primary venues lie within the facility: the Arthur D. Kinney Jr. Natatorium, the 4,000-seat Gary A. Sojka Pavilion and the Krebs Family Fitness Center. Other features include a new location for the Bucknell Athletics Hall of Fame, a display of Bucknell's Congressional Medal of Honor recipients, a brand new display highlighting Bucknell's all-time Academic All-Americans, a sports medicine and athletic training suite, classrooms, modern offices for coaches and staff and increased locker room space for varsity and recreational athletes.

The facility is named in honor of Ken Langone, a 1957 Bucknell graduate who, along with his wife Elaine, pledged \$11 million toward the center's construction. Langone was a member of the university Board of Trustees from 1980 to 1996.

One of the special qualities of the Langone Athletics and Recreation Center is the manner in which it supplements the pre-existing facilities. The construction surrounds Gerhard Fieldhouse and historic Davis Gymnasium, which has been restored as a competition venue for the Bison wrestling and volleyball teams, as well as intramural, recreation and other varsity practice activities.

As Bucknell continues to strive toward its mission of setting the standard of excellence in college athletics, the Langone Athletics and Recreation Center becomes the centerpiece in an already impressive cache of athletics facilities that includes the 13,100-seat Christy Mathewson-Memorial Stadium with FieldTurf and 8-lane track surface; the scenic Bucknell Golf Club; Depew Field, the home of the Bison baseball team; the West Fields softball diamond; and Emmitt Field and Graham Field at Holmes Stadium, the new portion of the West Fields project that includes covered grandstand seats, ticket and concession areas, team rooms, a training room and a press box area for soccer, field hockey and women's lacrosse.

2009 Season Preview

Year one of Caline McHenry's tenure as head coach of the Bucknell women's lacrosse program saw strides made in many areas. Most notably, the Bison offense was very effective, reaching double digits 10 times in 14 games while averaging a school-record 12.8 goals per game, up almost three per contest from the previous season. While Carol Donohue shattered the school scoring record with 71 points in just her second year in Orange & Blue, five Bison scored 20 or more goals and eight had at least 10.

That offensive prowess drew headlines on the night of March 28, 2008, when Bucknell earned one of its most impressive wins in the 31-year history of the program. That evening the Bison ventured to Columbus, Ohio and scored a thrilling 18-17 victory over an Ohio State squad that was ranked in the top 20 just a week earlier. Just a year earlier that same Buckeyes team handed Bucknell a 17-4 drubbing at Graham Field.

While the positives were significant, a thorough review of the 2008 campaign reveals much to work on for the coming spring, particularly on defense and in transition. While the Bison scored 181 goals in 14 games last season, they also gave up 181, and now they must replace three-time All-Patriot League defender Lauren Deitrich from a team that finished 6-8.

Above and beyond continuing to implement her tactical plans on the field, McHenry, a former star player herself at Duke, is working on developing a winning culture at Bucknell.

"Looking back, I think we lost some of our focus last year," said McHenry. "This year there is just a completely different feel. We have made great strides off the field, and I really feel that is going to be the foundation for better lacrosse. We had a great fall.

The players are positive and excited and working hard. Everyone wants to improve on last year's record."

Goal No. 1 for McHenry and her team is to regain a spot in the Patriot League Tournament. Bucknell was 5-3 in non-conference games last season but just 1-5 in league play, although one of those losses came in overtime to playoff-bound Lehigh and another was a back-and-forth 14-12 loss to eventual champion Colgate.

"Our biggest hurdle has been winning Patriot League games," McHenry offered. "But this team has set lofty goals. We want to have a winning record both overall and in the league, which would put us back in the tournament and give us a shot at a title."

One of the keys to making that a reality is keeping the ball out of its own net. The Bison were solid on draw controls last season, totaling nine more than their opponents over the course of the year, and forced just under 15 turnovers per game, but they still yielded 10 or more goals in 12 of 14 games.

Despite the loss of Deitrich, who led the Patriot League and ranked among the national leaders with 2.21 takeaways per game, Bucknell should have plenty of experience in the defensive end of the field.

Senior defender Catherine Barry and versatile senior midfielder Bonnie Buechel will both be in their fourth year as starters in 2009, while junior defender Katie Fox, sophomore defensive middle Ashley St. John and sophomore goalie Alyssa DeLorenz are also returning starters.

"Our strength this fall was really in our defense and defensive midfield," said McHenry. "Bonnie and Barry both looked great. They are the veterans of that group, and we have some depth there that we did not have last year.

"Catherine has been tremendous in terms of her leadership," McHenry said of Barry, who is in her second year as a team captain and will anchor the close defense unit. "She has done a fantastic job as a captain, and on the field she is a strong and vocal leader."

Buechel is Bucknell's do-everything player, and another big year from her will be critical to the team's fortunes. A three-time All-Patriot Leaguer, Buechel has registered at least 24 goals and 34 points in each of her first three seasons at Bucknell. Last season she tallied 25 goals and nine assists despite being asked to play more of a defensive role. She is already Bucknell's career leader in draw controls with 117, and her 48 DCs last season ranked ninth in the nation.

"Bonnie had a tremendous fall, and she is an integral part of our midfield both offensively and defensively," said McHenry. "We are asking her to score and to defend the other team's best players. That's quite a load, but she is certainly capable of handling it."

Fox played in all 14 games and started 12 last season, although she missed the fall season while spending the semester studying in South Africa.

"Katie works hard and has a great attitude," said McHenry. "How she comes back from being away in the fall will determine where she fits in, but with her work ethic I'm certain she will be a big part of our defense again this year."

Steady goalkeeping will also be an important factor for the Bison defense. The team had just one goalie on the roster last season, and it was a freshman at that. DeLorenz was solid in that unenviable role, averaging 9.5 saves per game while playing every second in the crease. This season she will have some competition in

newcomer Jenna Wadsworth, who back-stopped Severna Park High School to a couple of Maryland state titles.

"That had to be tough on Alyssa last year," said McHenry. "It was not easy for her to be put in that position, and she handled it very well for a young player. She still has some technical things to work on, but she has a very good fall and the competition from Jenna has been good for her. She has good quickness with both her feet and her hands, and she is vocal in the cage."

Another player to watch on defense is junior Kendall Thibeault, who was named a co-captain along with Barry in the off-season. Thibeault has not played much on game nights yet at the collegiate level, but that will likely change this spring.

"Kendall has really developed into a leader," noted McHenry. "She really handles herself well and will be an integral part of our defense. She has a great stick and has become a presence on the field."

Like Buechel, St. John is a talented two-way player who will be relied upon on both halves of the field. She started all 14 games as a freshman a year ago and was one of the team's top players in the fall.

"Ashley is going to be huge for us in the midfield this season," McHenry said. "She had a tremendous freshman year, when she came in and made an immediate impact. She works hard and has a great attitude, and she has really taken her game to a new level."

Up front at attack and attacking midfield, Bucknell returns much of the firepower that contributed to its record-setting offensive year in 2008. Heading the list is Donohue, who had a monster sophomore season last spring. Donohue

tallied 35 goals and 36 assists for 71 points, smashing school records in assists and points. She ranked in the top five nationally in those two categories and had an absurd 13 points in a win over Wagner late in the year. The question now: what can she do for an encore?

"We just want Carol to keep doing what she did last year," said McHenry. "She is a very humble person who I think was honestly surprised by her success. She a true team player who wants to win games above any personal goals. She has great stick skills and amazing vision. The ball will be in her stick a lot and she will be our offensive engine, but we have others who can score too."

Among those others are Buechel, junior Chelsea Peters and sophomores Julia Braun and Becca Devine. Peters had a 30-goal season as a freshman and followed it up with 17 more last year. Braun was all over the field as a rookie in 2008, stuffing the stat sheet with 22 goals, seven assists, 40 draw controls and 20 ground balls. Devine also came on strong, tallying 10 goals as a freshman, including four in a 15-14 win over Robert Morris.

"Chelsea is hungry and excited after going abroad (to Switzerland) in the fall," McHenry commented. "We expect her to be a major contributor. Julia had a fantastic freshman year, and we are going to rely on her heavily in the midfield. She is one of the most athletic and talented players on the team. With a year under her belt she has a chance to be even better. Becca had a really good fall and became one of our vocal leaders on offense. She is doing a great job leading and directing everyone. You can tell she is playing with confidence."

Other returning players to watch include junior midfielder Stephanie Stevens and sophomores Laura Van Schaack, Michelle Milot, Lauren Peyser and Andi King. Of that group Van Schaack saw the most field time last season, playing in nine games with a couple of starts, and she is coming off a very productive off-season.

McHenry says Milot has bounced back well after a tough freshman year spent adapting to the collegiate game. A strong player with good dodging and shooting ability, Milot could be ticketed for more playing time in 2009.

Peyser has made a position shift since last year, moving from defense to offense. Her contributions will likely depend on how quickly she adapts to the offensive system.

Stevens and King have endured injury-plagued careers thus far, but both have shots to contribute this season if healthy.

While careful not to place the team's fortunes on the shoulders of the freshman class, McHenry is pleased with the progress the crop of newcomers made in the fall, and Bison fans can expect to see at least two of the five in significant roles in the spring.

Middies Jenna Lotkowitz and Ryan Gribbon both stood out in fall ball. Lotkowitz tallied 70 goals and 100 points last season at Skaneateles High in upstate New York, and McHenry is quick to laud her speed, stickwork and scoring instincts. A standout for powerful St. Stephen's & St. Agnes School in Virginia, Gribbon is a two-way middle with an energetic and upbeat personality.

Kelly Castafero is working with the attack unit and coming along nicely after a strong career at Conestoga High, the same school that produced Ashley St. John.

Defender Allie Mongan, whose sister Megan is an All-Patriot League swimmer at Bucknell, had a terrific fall and is one of the most athletic players on the team, although she is trying to battle through some injuries as the spring season approaches. Her size and strength should pay off in the near future.

Wadsworth enters the spring as the backup to DeLorenz in the goal, and she has shown steady improvement throughout her short time at Bucknell.

"This team has a lot of potential," McHenry predicted. "We are young on offense and still working to mesh everything together, and our transition defense has been a concern, but I think the chemistry we have developed since the end of last season is going to pay off for us. The progress we have made off the field, as teammates caring for one another, is great to see as a coach."

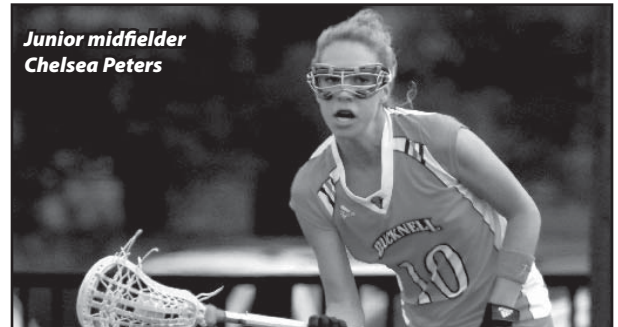

Caline McHenry, a former All-American and Tewaaron Trophy semifinalist at Duke and a two-year member of the U.S. National Team, was named head women's lacrosse coach at

Bucknell on Aug. 22, 2007.

McHenry spent the 2007 season as an assistant coach at Davidson, and in 2006 she served as a graduate assistant coach at Ohio University, where she received a master's degree in recreation and sport science.

In her first season at Bucknell, she helped the Bison become one of the 10 highest-scoring teams in the nation. The team upset an Ohio State squad that had been nationally ranked just a week earlier.

In her collegiate coaching debut, the Bison dismantled Long Island 17-5, and the team scored 10 or more goals 10 times during the season.

"I would like to sincerely thank the athletic department leadership for giving me the opportunity to coach at Bucknell," said McHenry at the time of her hiring. "I am very honored to become part of such a prestigious institution and well-respected athletic program"

"My experience as a student-athlete at Duke and as a coach at Davidson is parallel to Bucknell in terms of the quality student-athletes in the program, I've lived that life myself, and I know what it's like to be at a school that puts a priority on academics. It is important that they are students first."

A native of Reisterstown, Md., and a graduate of prep powerhouse Roland Park Country School in Baltimore, McHenry went on to enjoy a tremendous collegiate career at Duke. She was a four-year letterwinner and a member of the Blue Devils' 2005 Final Four team that finished 17-4 and shattered the school record for wins in a season. As a senior defender on that 2005 team, she also helped lead the squad to its first Atlantic Coast Conference championship, and she earned First Team All-America honors by both Inside Lacrosse and the IWLCA.

An All-ACC selection in both 2002 and 2005, McHenry was selected as a semifinalist for the 2005 Tewaaron Trophy, which is annually bestowed upon the top men's and women's college lacrosse player.

McHenry's outstanding playing career led to a two-year stint with the United States national team, first with the U.S. Developmental Team in 2005-06, then with the US Elite Team in 2006-07.

"I am pleased that Caline McHenry will be leading Bucknell's women's lacrosse program," said Director of Athletics and Recreation John Hardt at the time of her hiring. "We feel that this is a program that can contend for a Patriot League championship in the years to come, and we are eager to expose

our players to Caline's experiences coaching and playing with the best women's lacrosse players in America. Her remarkable pedigree also includes tenures at a number of prominent academic institutions, and her own experiences at Duke and Davidson will translate seamlessly into a Bucknell program that prides itself as an example of the scholar-athlete ideal."

"I am ready for the challenge," McHenry added. "I have been extremely fortunate to be mentored by some of the best coaches in the game, from Kerstin Kimel at Duke, to Alison Valentino at Ohio, to Sue Murphy with the national team, to Betsy Economou at Davidson. These are all superior coaches, and they have all been tremendous role models for me."

McHenry is the 11th head coach in Bucknell women's lacrosse history.

Meghan Keelan, a 2008 graduate of the University of Maryland-Baltimore County and a standout attack at UMBC, joined the Bison women's lacrosse program during the off-season.

"I am excited to welcome Meghan Keelan to the coaching staff and to the Bison women's lacrosse program," said head coach Caline McHenry. "She brings a great deal of leadership from her playing experience at UMBC. I look forward to working with her and for our team to benefit from her positive energy and keen offensive mind."

A four-year member of the Retrievers' women's lacrosse squad and the team captain as a senior, Keelan appeared in 59 career games and was a two-year starter. She has two of the top-10 all-time assist totals in UMBC history, with 21 in 2008 (fifth all-time) and 18 in 2006 (ninth). Her 46 career assists rank 10th in program history.

Keelan earned the team's Unsung Hero Award last spring, and she also served as an undergraduate player-intern. In that role, she taught a lacrosse class to UMBC students, wrote correspondence to alumni, helped plan and run the team's Junior Day, and assisted with the UMBC Elite Overnight Camp.

In addition to the UMBC Elite, Keelan also has camp coaching experience at the UMBC Open, the Elite 300, Mike Faith's Night Camp and the James Madison University Elite. She also coached ROME 2007, where she ran practices and coached the girl's team at various summer tournaments.

A native of Randallstown, Md., and a 2004 graduate of Mount de Sales Academy for Girls, Keelan has been heavily involved in community service. At UMBC she helped organize the Lee National Denim Day to raise funds and awareness for breast cancer. She also volunteered at the Maryland Center for Special Equestrians, a facility aimed toward therapeutic horseback riding for children and young adults suffering from mental and physical handicaps.

In her first season at Bucknell, Caline McHenry's team shattered the school record for goals per game.

CALENDAR

A typical recruiting calendar for a prospective student-athlete interested in women's lacrosse would go something like this:

- ** **Summer of 2009** - make unofficial visits to schools of interest.
- ** **September of 2009** - Head Coach Caline McHenry will be in contact regarding student-athlete's interest and possible visit date. Student-athlete and family should file CSS Financial Aid Profile Form available October 15. See your college guidance counselor for information.
- ** **November 15, 2009** - Deadline for Admissions and Financial Aid for Early Decision I.
- ** **Late December, 2009** - Target date for Admissions letters to go out for Early Decision I candidates.
- ** **January 15, 2010** - Deadline for Admissions and Financial Aid for Regular Decision and Early Decision II.
- ** **Late January, 2010** - Target date for Admissions decision letters to go out for Early Decision II candidates.
- ** **Late March, 2010** - Target date for Admissions decision letters to go out for Regular Decision candidates.
- ** **Mid-April, 2010** - Target date for open house weekend for all accepted applicants.
- ** **May 1, 2010** - Deadline for securing spot in class of 2014 with deposit.

CLEARINGHOUSE

The NCAA mandates that all student-athletes interested in competing at the Division I or II level be certified through the NCAA Initial Eligibility Clearinghouse. Contact high school coaches, athletics director and/or guidance counselor for necessary paperwork.

CONTACTS

As per NCAA by-law 13.02.3, a contact is any face-to-face encounter between a prospect or the prospect's parent or legal guardian and an institutional staff member or athletics representative during which any dialogue occurs in excess of an exchange of a greeting. Any such face-to-face encounter that is prearranged or takes place on the grounds of the prospect's high school, or at the site of organized competition or practice involving the prospect's high school, preparatory school, two-year college, or all-star team is considered a contact, regardless of the conversation that occurs. We are limited to three off-campus contact days per prospective student-athlete.

CORRESPONDENCE

It's important that the prospective student-athlete get in touch with Head Coach Caline McHenry as soon as possible. A simple letter of inquiry or email to cam055@bucknell.edu into the lacrosse program will initiate the recruiting process. In the spring of your junior year is the most appropriate time to contact Coach McHenry.

EARLY DECISION

Students who are absolutely, 100% confident Bucknell is their top college choice are encouraged to apply during the Early Decision process. Advantages are that you'll have an Admissions decision prior to Christmas and all students accepted during the early decision process are guaranteed financial aid for which they qualify.

EVALUATIONS

As per NCAA by-law 13.02.6.1, an evaluation is any off-campus activity designed to assess the academic qualifications or athletic ability of a prospect, including any visit to a prospect's educational institution (during which no contact occurs) or the observation of a prospect participating in any practice



or competition at any site. We are limited in our number of evaluations per prospective student-athlete.

FINANCIAL AID

Bucknell University does not offer athletic scholarships in the sport of women's lacrosse. All financial aid is awarded on the basis of need. Prospective student-athletes should complete the CSS "Profile Form" in the early Fall.

INTERVIEWS

Head Coach Caline McHenry strongly encourages all prospective student-athletes to arrange for an on-campus interview with the Admissions Office. If it is not possible to interview on campus, alumni interviews are highly recommended. All interviews should be arranged through the Admissions Office by calling (570) 577-1101.

TELEPHONE CALLS

As per NCAA by-law 13.1.3.1, institutional staff members may not telephone a prospect (or the prospect's relatives or legal guardians) prior to July 1 following the prospect's completion of the junior year in high school. However, the prospect can call the lacrosse office at any time. After July 1, institutional staff members may telephone a prospect once per week (measured Sunday through Saturday). The once-per-week limit applies to the entire institution.

VISITS, Official

According to NCAA by-law 13.7.1.2, a prospect may not make more than five expense-paid visits to NCAA member institutions, regardless of the number of sports in which the prospect is involved. An institution may not provide an expense-paid visit to a prospect who has not presented the institution with a high school (or college) academic transcript and a score from a PSAT, an SAT, a PACTPlus, or an ACT test taken on a national testing date under national testing conditions. The official visit may not exceed 48 hours. Coach McHenry encourages these visits take place from September 1 to February 15.

VISITS, Unofficial

According to NCAA by-law 13.8.1, a prospect may visit an institution's campus at the prospect's own expense an unlimited number of times and may make an unofficial visit before the prospect's senior year in high school.

In its second decade of combining academic and athletic excellence, the Patriot League sponsors championships in 23 men and women's sports. Initially started as an NCAA Division I-AA football conference in 1986, the Patriot League became an all-sport conference in 1990 and includes American, Army, Bucknell, Colgate, Holy Cross, Lafayette, Lehigh and Navy as full members, and Fordham and Georgetown as associate members. These institutions are among the oldest and most prestigious in the nation and their alumni have, and continue to play leadership roles in shaping our country.

Since 1998, the Patriot League has ranked first each year among all Division I conferences awarding athletic aid in the NCAA Graduation Rate Report. In addition, the Patriot League finished first in the new NCAA Academic Progress Report (APR) among all Division I conferences awarding athletic aid (combining with all eight of its full-time member institutions for an average of 984 out of 1,000). The APR is used to measure academic eligibility, retention and graduation of student-athletes.

Patriot League student-athletes and teams continue to enjoy success at the national level, with opening round victories coming in several NCAA Championships, including consecutive wins in men's basketball, a final four appearance in men's lacrosse and a sixth-place finish at the NCAA Cross Country Championship.

The Patriot League's mission is simple, to provide successful competitive athletic experiences while maintaining high academic standards, and to prepare its student-athletes to be leaders in society.

It is therefore committed to maintaining Bucknell's high national ranking for student-athletes' graduation rates and for producing Academic All-Americans, and to continued leadership of the Patriot League in Academic Honor Roll nominations, based on grade-point averages. The coaches' and staff's paramount responsibility is maintaining academic priorities and supporting student-athletes' education, even while providing the rigorous and serious NCAA Division I athletic opportunities Bucknell student-athletes seek.

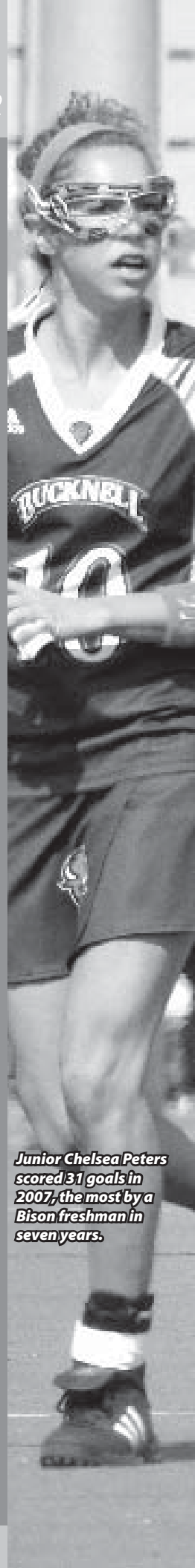
Further, the Department promotes the personal growth of student-athletes and the general student body by encouraging personal health, development, and balance among intellectual, social, civic, and physical pursuits; by celebrating challenge and competition; and by preparing participants for service and leadership in the world. Coaches and staff direct a rich array of athletic programs and recreational opportunities aimed at increasing student engagement, as well as strengthening character, healthy living, teamwork, sportsmanship, and spirit. The Department embraces the University's decision to compete at the highest extramural level, in Division I of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA). Division I membership is valuable not only because this level of competition maximally challenges student-athletes, but also because it signals clearly Bucknell's high standards and seriousness of purpose in all extracurricular endeavors and it helps position Bucknell apart from other National Liberal Arts Colleges. Likewise, the competitive success the Department seeks, measured in part by consistent contention for the Patriot League Presidents' Cup, reflects positively upon Bucknell's student-athletes and the University alike, and it brings distinction and national recognition to Bucknell.

A student-centered operation, the Department is committed to providing equitable opportunities to women and men, as well as members of minority and majority groups of all kinds. The Department subscribes to, and complies with, all principles and regulations of the Patriot League, the Eastern College Athletic Conference, and the NCAA.

The department is proud that so many of today's exemplary Bison scholar-athletes will be tomorrow's outstanding leaders.

BUCKNELL ATHLETICS HALL OF FAME

The Bucknell Athletics Hall of Fame was established in 1979 to recognize the very best in the history of Bucknell Athletics. The Hall of Fame now numbers 205 all-time Bison greats. Seven members of the Hall played for the women's lacrosse team.



Tricia Way '94

Way was the first woman athlete in Bucknell history to earn all-conference honors five times. She was a three-time All-Patriot League selection in women's lacrosse and a two-time honoree in field hockey. She co-captained the 1993 field hockey team and was a two-year captain in lacrosse. As a midfielder in field hockey, she registered five goals and three assists and was the Patriot League Scholar-Athlete in 1992. Entered Hall of Fame with the Class of 2006.



Margaret Philleo Ricci '79

Ricci was one of Bucknell's top woman athletes of her era, competing in field hockey, basketball and lacrosse. She played four years of lacrosse and as a junior was named to the All-Central Pennsylvania second team. Entered Hall of Fame with the Class of 2002.



Pam Heller Shassian '78

Shassian was one of the pioneers of the women's varsity lacrosse program at Bucknell and served as the team's co-captain her senior year. In addition, she played field hockey and basketball for the Bison. Entered Hall of Fame with the Class of 2000.



Sue Gray Behringer '84

One of the most prolific scorers in Bucknell women's lacrosse history, Behringer graduated with eight school records, including most career goals (127). She was named All-East Coast Conference, and was invited to try out for the U.S. Women's Lacrosse Association national team. She captained both the women's lacrosse and field hockey teams while at Bucknell. Entered Hall of Fame with the Class of 1996.



Kathy Kline Grove '80

A four-year starter in field hockey and member of the women's lacrosse team, Grove was a 1980 nominee for the Broderick Award, which honors the outstanding female collegiate athlete in the country. She still ranks second in Bucknell field hockey history with 46 career goals and 103 career points. Entered Hall of Fame with the Class of 1994.



Barbara Castens-Seidell '79

A co-captain of the basketball and field hockey teams and one of the first two women elected to the Hall of Fame, Castens-Seidell was also a member of the women's lacrosse team at Bucknell. Entered Hall of Fame with the Class of 1985.



Karin Wegener Knisely '79

One of the first two women elected to the Hall of Fame, Knisely was Bucknell's first three-sport (field hockey, basketball and lacrosse) captain in 40 years. She set scoring records in field hockey and lacrosse. Entered Hall of Fame with the Class of 1985.
