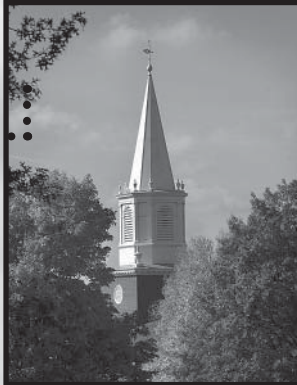


# Bucknell Bison Athletics: Setting the Standard of Excellence

Bucknell takes great pride in its commitment to excellence on and off the playing fields. From Presidents' Cups to Academic All-Americans to graduation rates that are ranked annually in the national top-10, Bucknell is clearly at the head of the class when it comes to upholding the scholar-athlete ideal. ....

Bucknell has captured the Patriot League Presidents' Cup, signifying the league's all-sports champion, 12 times in the 16-year history of the affiliation, including seven straight titles from 1998-2004. Bucknell won the Presidents' Cup in 2005-06 and it was also the ninth straight year, and 12th time overall, that the Bison captured the women's title. In 2005-06, Bucknell won titles in women's soccer, men's basketball, women's swimming & diving and women's cross country, indoor and outdoor track & field, women's rowing and men's golf. ....

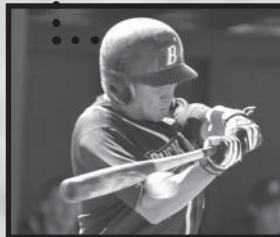


A major element in ensuring Bucknell's commitment to athletics excellence is the Kenneth G. Langone Athletics & Recreation Center, which opened fully in 2003. One of the finest collegiate athletics facilities of its kind, the center includes the 4,000-seat Sojka Pavilion, the Olympic class Kinney Natatorium, the Krebs Family Fitness Center and the Berger Family Weight Room. A new Hall of Fame area, a display of Bucknell's Medal of Honor recipients, a sports medicine suite, modern offices for coaches and staff, and new locker room and classroom space are also included in the facility's layout. ....



Bucknell claimed its 103rd Patriot League Scholar-Athlete of the Year in the spring of 2006. That is more than twice the next-highest total. ..

23 of Bucknell's varsity squads posted team GPAs of 3.0 or better in the spring of 2006, including all 12 spring sports. ....



In addition to the 111 ESPN The Magazine Academic All-Americans produced since 1970, Bucknell has also claimed 229 Academic All-District honorees over the same span, including 16 last year. Bucknell ranks **FOURTH** in the nation (to Nebraska, Notre Dame and Penn State) in total number of ESPN The Magazine All-America selections. ....



Bucknell's men's basketball team made history in 2005, writing national headlines with a stirring 64-63 upset of Kansas at the NCAA Tournament. It was the first NCAA men's basketball win in school and Patriot League history and with a victory over Arkansas in 2006, the team has now posted NCAA Tournament victories in consecutive seasons. The Bison also became the first Patriot League team to receive a national ranking and were 25th in the final ESPN/USA Today Coaches' Poll of the 2005-06 season. ....



Bucknell student-athletes comprised nearly one-fourth of the Patriot League Academic Honor Roll in 2005-06. A total of 330 Bison recorded a GPA of 3.2 or better during their sport's competition season. Among all BU student-athletes, 235 made the Dean's List with GPAs of 3.5 or better in the spring of 2006. ....

Bucknell **LED THE NATION** in graduation rates in the 2003 survey conducted by the NCAA and the U.S. Department of Education. Bucknell graduated 100% of the student-athletes who entered school in 1996. It was the third time Bucknell has led the nation in graduation rates. ....

With a school-record eight Patriot League championships in 2005-06, Bucknell has now earned 59 crowns in 16 years in the league. In addition, Bucknell has had 79 conference players of the year, 71 PL coaches of the year and a whopping 414 individual league champions from sports such as cross country, track & field, swimming & diving, tennis and golf. ....

### Getting to Bucknell

Bucknell is within a 3-4 hour drive of several major cities, including New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore, and Pittsburgh. Airports are located in Williamsport, 25 miles north of Lewisburg, and in Harrisburg, 65 miles south. The Susquehanna Trailways bus line serves the area.

Bucknell is located on U.S. Route 15, about seven miles south of Interstate 80.

**From the New York metropolitan area**-Take I-80 West to U.S. Route 15 and follow the directions above.

**From Philadelphia**-Take the Northeast Extension of the Pennsylvania Turnpike north to I-80; then I-80 West to U.S. Route 15.

**From Pittsburgh**-Take U.S. Route 22 East to PA Route 45 East. PA Route 45 intersects with U.S. Route 15 in Lewisburg. Take Route 15 South, and turn left at the next light to enter campus.

**From Baltimore**-Take I-83 North and pick up Route 15 North just south of Harrisburg. Bucknell is located approximately 60 miles north of Harrisburg.

**From Connecticut**-Take I-84 East into Pennsylvania, then pick up I-81 South near Scranton. Follow I-81 South to I-80 West, and take I-80 West to U.S. Route 15 South.

Bucknell University, ranked among the top national liberal arts colleges in the nation, is a privately owned, co-educational institution with an undergraduate enrollment of approximately 3,400 students and a faculty of some 270 teachers, of which over 97 percent hold doctoral degrees.

The 100th college chartered in the United States, Bucknell was founded by Philadelphia Baptists in 1846 as the University at Lewisburg. The first class of seven men graduated in 1851 with the first woman receiving her degree in 1885. In 1886, the institution was renamed Bucknell University in honor of William Bucknell, a former trustee and benefactor.

A comprehensive university, Bucknell allows students to choose from many academic options, including 53 majors and 64 minors. In learning from and collaborating with experienced faculty, students have access to state-of-the-art resources within the library, laboratories, computer centers, multi-media rooms, and recreational facilities.

Enrolling at Bucknell allows one to acquire global connections through the International Focus Semester Program, Semester of Studying Abroad Program, and interaction with students and faculty from various countries and continents. Through the University's commitment to diversity, students of all ethnic, racial, geographical, intellectual, and political backgrounds converge on one campus to foster a community of acceptance and exploration in diversity. As members of the Bucknell and Lewisburg communities, students are able to find their own niche while learning the importance of values.

The University's physical plant, located on a 400-acre campus overlooking the Susquehanna River, includes more than 80 buildings. Recent additions include a \$1 million computer center constructed as a wing of Dana Engineering Building; an \$8.2 million addition to the Ellen Clarke Bertrand Library; the \$9.7 million Weis Performing Arts Center; and the \$10.9 million Robert L. Rooke Chemistry Building and adjoining biology building.

In addition, construction of the Sigfried Weis Music Building was completed in the summer of 2001 in time for its doors to open for the fall semester. The new \$7 million music instruction building was one facet of *The Bucknell Campaign*, the most ambitious in Bucknell's 154-year history. A new residence hall facility opened in 2001 and houses 300 students within "neighborhoods" — a contemporary design intended to promote a sense of community. The O'Leary Center for geology and psychology, and the Breakiron Engineering Building both opened with in the last few years.

And finally, the sparkling Kenneth G. Langone Athletics and Recreation Center opened in 2003, providing a state-of-the-art facility for varsity athletes and students, staff and faculty alike.

Bucknell is easily accessible, located on U.S. Route 15 approximately 60 miles north of Harrisburg and 25 miles south of Williamsport. The campus is seven miles south of Interstate 80 on Route 15.



## The Kenneth G. Langone Athletics & Recreation Center

The Bucknell University Department of Athletics and Recreation prides itself on setting the standard of excellence when it comes to success both on the playing fields and in the classroom. With 12 Patriot League Presidents' Cups in 16 years, annual top-10 national rankings in graduation rates, 111 Academic All-Americans in 35 years and 102 Patriot League Scholar-Athletes in 16 years, Bucknell is clearly at the head of the class in terms of upholding the scholar-athlete model.

The addition of the Kenneth G. Langone Athletics and Recreation Center, one of the finest collegiate athletics and recreation facilities of its kind in the nation, will ensure the continuation of that success.

The facility enhances each of Bucknell's 27 varsity athletics programs and greatly expands the scope of its growing intramural and recreational sports offerings. A visually appealing structure located along Moore Avenue on the "downhill" side of campus, the Langone Athletics and Recreation Center was designed to reach out to all members of the campus community, including the student body, varsity student-athletes, faculty, staff and alumni.

Three primary venues lie within the facility: the Arthur D. Kinney Jr. Natatorium, the 4,000-seat Gary A. Sojka Pavilion and the Krebs Family Fitness Center. Other features include a new location for the Bucknell

Athletics Hall of Fame, a display of Bucknell's Congressional Medal of Honor recipients, a sports medicine and athletic training suite, classrooms, modern offices for coaches and staff and increased locker room space for varsity and recreational athletes.

The facility is named in honor of Ken Langone, a 1957 Bucknell graduate who, along with his wife Elaine, pledged \$11 million toward the center's construction. Langone was a member of the university Board of Trustees from 1980 to 1996.

One of the special qualities of the Langone Center is the manner in which it supplements the pre-existing facilities. The brand new construction surrounds Gerhard Fieldhouse and historic Davis Gymnasium, which has been restored as a competition venue for the Bison volleyball and wrestling teams, as well as intramural, recreation and other varsity practice activities.

## The Patriot League

In its second decade of combining academic and athletic excellence, the Patriot League sponsors championships in 23 men and women's sports. Initially started as an NCAA Division I-AA football conference in 1986, the Patriot League became an all-sport

conference in 1990 and includes American, Army, Bucknell, Colgate, Holy Cross, Lafayette, Lehigh and Navy as full members, and Fordham and Georgetown as associate members. These institutions are among the oldest and most prestigious in the nation and their alumni have, and continue to play leadership roles in shaping our country.

Since 1998, the Patriot League has ranked first each year among all Division I conferences awarding athletic aid in the NCAA Graduation Rate Report. In addition, the Patriot League finished first in the new NCAA Academic Progress Report (APR) among all Division I conferences awarding athletic aid (combining with all eight of its full-time member institutions for an average of 984 out of 1,000). The APR is used to measure academic eligibility, retention and graduation of student-athletes.

Patriot League student-athletes and teams continue to enjoy success at the national level, with opening round victories coming in several NCAA Championships, including consecutive wins in men's basketball, a final four appearance in men's lacrosse and a sixth-place finish at the NCAA Cross Country Championship.

The Patriot League's mission is simple, to provide successful competitive athletic experiences while maintaining high academic standards, and to prepare its student-athletes to be leaders in society.

## Athletics Mission Statement

The Department of Athletics and Recreation strives to set the standard of excellence for intercollegiate and intramural programs in higher education, thereby advancing and drawing attention to the mission, core values, and educational goals of Bucknell University.

The Department believes that student-athletes' academic programs must be their first priority. It is therefore committed to maintaining Bucknell's high national ranking for student-athletes' graduation rates and for producing Academic All-Americans, and to continued leadership of the Patriot League in Academic Honor Roll nominations, based on grade-point averages. The coaches' and staff's paramount responsibility is maintaining academic priorities and supporting student-athletes' education, even while providing the rigorous and serious NCAA Division I athletic opportunities Bucknell student-athletes seek.

Further, the Department promotes the personal growth of student-athletes and the general student body by encouraging personal health, development, and balance among intellectual, social, civic, and physical pursuits; by celebrating challenge and competition; and by preparing participants for service and leadership in the world. Coaches and staff direct a rich array of athletic programs and recreational opportunities aimed at increasing student engagement, as well as strengthening character, healthy living, teamwork, sportsmanship, and spirit. In creating shared experiences for students, faculty, and staff, as well as alumni, family, and friends, the Department's programs add substantially to Bucknell's sense of community and foster life-long relationships with Bucknell.

The Department embraces the University's decision to compete at the highest extramural level, in Division I of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA). Division I membership is valuable not only because this level of competition maximally challenges student-athletes, but also because it signals clearly Bucknell's high standards and seriousness of purpose in all extracurricular endeavors and it helps position Bucknell apart from other National Liberal Arts Colleges. Likewise, the competitive success the Department seeks, measured in part by consistent contention for the Patriot League's student-athletes and the University alike, and it brings distinction and national recognition to Bucknell.

A student-centered operation, the Department is committed to providing equitable opportunities to women and men, as well as members of minority and majority groups of all kinds. The Department subscribes to, and complies with, all principles and regulations of the Patriot League, the Eastern College Athletic Conference, and the NCAA.

The Department is proud that so many of today's exemplary Bison scholar-athletes will be tomorrow's outstanding leaders.



## Life After Bucknell

According to a Bucknell Career Development Center survey of the Class of 2005, 95 percent of the respondents were either employed or attending graduate school six months after graduation. Of Bucknell's 854 graduates in that class, 805 (94 percent) responded to the survey. Of that portion of the class, 69 percent were employed, 22 percent were enrolled in graduate school, three percent were both employed and in graduate school part-time, and five percent were still seeking employment.

Of those attending graduate school, 27 percent are pursuing degrees in social sciences and the humanities, 19

percent are in law school, 12 percent are pursuing advanced degrees in engineering and eight percent are pursuing advanced degrees in education.

U.S. News and World Report noted in 1988 that Bucknell ranked among the top 10 private liberal arts colleges in the number of alumni who had received doctorate degrees in the most recent decade surveyed.

The mean salary for the 2005 graduates responding to the survey was \$42,667 and was highest for engineers. The mean salary for a graduate with a bachelor of science degree in engineering was \$50,279, and the mean salary for a graduate with a bachelor of science degree in business administration was \$44,528. Graduates from the College of Arts and Sciences had a mean salary of \$40,510.

Most 2005 graduates (77 percent) were employed in the Northeast, with New York City (18 percent), Pennsylvania (17 percent), New Jersey (15 percent) and Washington, D.C. (14 percent) leading the way. Among the most popular employers of Bucknell graduates were firms such as AmeriCorps, General Electric, JP Morgan Chase, Lockheed Martin, Lord & Taylor and PriceWaterhouseCoopers.

A total of 41 percent of the class respondents secured employment through Bucknell on-campus interviews, Career Development Center leads, networking or offers from former employees.

## Leaders on the Field and in the Classroom

Bucknell placed 115 student-athletes on the 2005 Patriot League Fall Honor Roll, which cites student-athletes with a grade point average of 3.20 or better during the semester coinciding with his/her sport. Bucknell had a league-best 22 student-athletes earn a spot on the Patriot League Women's Soccer Academic Honor Roll:

## Looking Ahead to 2006...

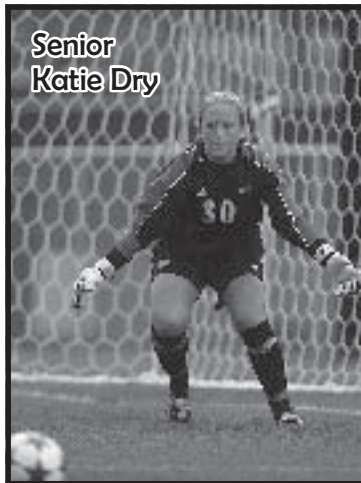
After one of the most successful seasons in program history, the Bucknell women's soccer team will look to raise the bar again for the 2006 season. In addition to capturing the Patriot League title, the 2005 Bison squad posted a record of 11-9-1, the second-highest win total ever for the Orange and Blue. The team also matched a program record with its mid-season five-game winning streak and more than doubled scoring production from the year before.

With all this in mind, Ben Landis feels confident that Bucknell can continue its success in his second season as the head coach of the Bison.

"Coming off of a championship run last year, I think our returning players begin 2006 with a level of self-respect and confidence that is unmatched from previous years," said Landis. "The core of last year's team is back as we return seven of our top eight scorers from 2005, our leader in our captain, Shannon Curd, a very athletic and intelligent group of players, and overall a team that understands me and how and why we do the things we do. We've improved greatly in my short time here but the core of how we do things from training to travel to education and match preparation are on a level where we have high expectations of ourselves to play to our abilities and reach new levels of success this fall."

Bucknell's top two scorers in 2005 managed to etch their names into the Bison record books among the all-time season leaders and began to climb up the career lists as well. Senior Jennifer Margolis, who earned all-league first team and *Soccer Buzz* Mid-Atlantic Region third team honors last year, led the Orange and Blue in goals and points during the 2005 campaign. Her 29 points rank fifth on the season all-time list, while her 13 goals rank fourth. Margolis is also sixth on the Bucknell career lists for points (52) and goals (21), while ranking eighth in career assists (10). Junior Krista Lee Gentile finished second on the squad in points and goals last season while tying for the team lead in assists on her way to her second All-Patriot League selection. Gentile ranks seventh in the Bison record books in season points (28), ninth in season goals (11), seventh in season assists (6), ninth in career points (43), and eighth in career goals (18). Her classmate, Leslie Schulze, also had six assists last year to match Gentile for the team lead and rank seventh on the all-time season leaders list.

After graduating 10 seniors last year, the Bison will welcome 10 newcomers to the squad for 2006. "The seven incoming freshmen coupled with the three upperclassmen who are new to our team are collectively and individually a great addition to our group," Landis com-

mented. "This is a large group of newcomers who bring speed, athleticism, technical and tactical abilities to play at a high level. Many of them have had terrific experiences with their club and ODP teams playing and winning in very competitive environments. Those experiences will have prepared them well to make an impact here."

In contrast from Bucknell's schedule in 2005 where the balance of the team's home matches took place in September, the Bison open with matches against Temple and Central Arkansas on Aug. 25 and 27 at the Temple Tournament and will be on the road until Sunday, Sept. 17, when the Orange and Blue will play host to Robert Morris in an afternoon contest. Almost two weeks later on Sept. 30,

the squad will begin Patriot League play under the lights at the Varsity Soccer Field against Colgate

Saint Francis (Pa.), Robert Morris, Marist and Cornell were all non-league opponents for the Bison in 2005 and return to the schedule for 2006. Bucknell also welcomes Penn State back to its slate after not facing the Nittany Lions during the 2005 regular season but meeting them in the NCAA Tournament last fall.

Also in a departure from 2005, a campaign in which the Bison played exclusively in the Northeast, the squad will venture to Colorado this year during the first weekend of September to take on Air Force and Colorado College.

"Last year, I had no impact on our schedule, it was already set, and although balanced between the number of home and away games, it was difficult in many stretches," said Landis. "Having the ability to set this year's schedule I wanted to increase the level of our competition, play in some attractive tournaments and difficult surroundings to best prepare us for play in November, and set us up to be most successful at home and in league play. I think we have done that with the schedule and now must

go out and achieve what we are capable of. We've also added Princeton to our schedule, a Final Four team in 2004. We have reduced the number of mid-week games and will play six matches at home, all on weekends, where we can best showcase our abilities on the best playing surface in the league and do so in front of our fans, families, and recruits who we'll bring to campus for visits. As for league play, it is going to be a very competitive and close battle in the league this year so to have four of our seven matches at home, including Colgate, American, Army, and Holy Cross, that is going to be very important for us to earn maximum points at home."

## BEN LANDIS • HEAD COACH



**BUCKNELL '96 • SECOND SEASON**  
**CAREER RECORD: 27-21-7 • AT BU: 11-9-1**

In 2005, his first season as head coach of the Bison, Ben Landis guided Bucknell to its second Patriot League championship, one of many successes the Orange and Blue achieved under his direction last fall. The squad finished 2005 with a 4-3-0 record in league matches for the program's best mark since winning the Patriot League title in 2001 with a 12-7-0 (4-3-0 PL) record. Landis' inaugural season was also the third time in program history the Bison finished with over 10 wins. The squad more than doubled scoring production from the year before, as well.

Since Landis arrived at Bucknell, the team's RPI ranking has risen over 100 points. In 2004, the Orange and Blue finished with an RPI of 203 out of 304 teams in Division I women's soccer, while in 2005, the Bison rose to 102 out of 308 teams.

The third head coach in the 15-year history of the women's soccer program, Landis, a 1996 graduate of Bucknell and a former assistant coach of the Bison, started his coaching career at Bucknell as a student assistant coach under Toby Lovecchio in 1994 and 1995. He continued as an assistant the following fall after graduating with a bachelor of science degree in mathematics with a minor in education.

The Breinigsville, Pa., native returned to his alma mater after two seasons as the women's soccer head coach at Dartmouth. At the helm of the program, Landis led the Big Green to a 16-12-6 record. In 2003, Dartmouth won the Ivy League with a 9-6-2 record and earned a berth in the NCAA Tournament. It finished the season ranked third in the Northeast Region by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA).

Prior to taking over as head coach, Landis was an assistant at Dartmouth for three seasons. The Big Green qualified for the NCAA Tournament each year and finished the 2001 campaign ranked 13th in the country. They also finished 16th nationally in 2000 and advanced to the third round of the NCAA Tournament in both 2000 and 2001.

Before his five-year stint at Dartmouth, and after leaving Bucknell, Landis served as an assistant coach at Lehigh University for three seasons while obtaining his master's degree in business administration.

In addition to his duties as frontman for the Bucknell women's soccer team, Landis currently serves as camp director for the Bison Soccer Camp for Girls.

A member of the NSCAA since 1996, Landis worked as a marketing intern with the New England Revolution of Major League Soccer in 1997.

Landis lives in Lewisburg with his wife, Lisa, and their twin three-year-old daughters, Gabriella and Isabella.

## JENNIFER MEDINA • ASSISTANT COACH



**CALIFORNIA '01 • SECOND SEASON**

A veteran of the Northern California soccer landscape, Jennifer Medina is a 2001 graduate of California who both played and coached at her alma mater, where she was a member of the Golden Bears' women's soccer team from 1997-2000. She played in 11 games and drew three starts as a freshman, collecting the team's coach's award, but suffered an injury and saw action in just 14 matches her final three years.

Prior to arriving at Cal, Medina was the most valuable player on her club team that won the 1994 national youth championship. She was also a member of the U16 and U17 United States National Teams. Following her college career, Medina played indoor soccer with the United States Futsal Federation (USFF) from 2000-04 and captained her squad to back-to-back national titles in 2002 and 2003. A three-year USFF player representative, she was also a two-time most valuable player and had the opportunity to play international matches against Canada and Australia.

Medina broke into the coaching ranks in 2001 when she served her first of two stints as an assistant coach at Cal. She returned to the Golden Bears' sideline in 2004 and helped guide them to an 11-6-3 record and an NCAA Tournament berth.

In between her two forays on the Cal sideline, Medina served as both an assistant and head coach for a host of soccer teams. She was the full-time head coach for the Juventus U15G team in Redwood City, Calif., along with both the ACC Mavericks U10G and U16G squads in Berkeley, Calif. Medina was honored with the Coaches Award in 2003-04 for her work with the U16G team, a group she has coached since 2000. For the last two falls Medina also was an assistant coach for the Piedmont High School varsity men's soccer team.

Since 1997 Medina has been heavily involved in First Touch Soccer Camps, which she founded, and now serves as director. The organization runs soccer camps throughout the year around the San Francisco Bay Area. Along with instructing, Medina manages a team of coaches and edits the organization's website.

The 2001 Bucknell women's soccer team defeated American and Navy on its way to winning the Patriot League Championship and earning a berth in the NCAA Tournament. The third-seeded Bison downed the top-seeded Mids 2-1 in overtime to claim its first-ever Patriot League title. Lauren Schwarz scored the game-winning goal on a penalty kick 3:07 into overtime. Bucknell fell to seventh-ranked Penn State 3-1 in the first round of the NCAA Tournament.



In 2005, the Bucknell women's soccer team upset Lehigh and Army to become the first No. 4 seed in Patriot League history to win the postseason tournament. The Bison downed the Black Knights by a 3-1 margin in the championship game after advancing past No. 1 seed Lehigh in the semifinal round with a thrilling 6-5 decision in penalty kicks after playing to a 1-1 draw with the Mountain Hawks. Shannon Curd was named Patriot League Tournament MVP.

The Bison finished the season with a 12-7-0 record and were led in scoring by Savannah Rennels, who tallied 12 goals and one assist. She and Lindsay Slomer were named to the All-Patriot League First Team. Tara Utchel landed a spot on the all-league second team, while freshman Ashley Dincher garnered Patriot League Co-Rookie of the Year honors. Chrissy Findlay was named Coach of the Year.

Bucknell faced Penn State in the first round of the NCAA Tournament and fell by the score of 6-0. The Bison ended 2005 with a record of 11-9-1, 4-3-0 in the Patriot League. Jennifer Margolis led the team in scoring with 13 goals and three assists for 29 points. Margolis represented the Orange and Blue on the All-Patriot League First Team while Krista Lee Gentile was named to the all-league second team.

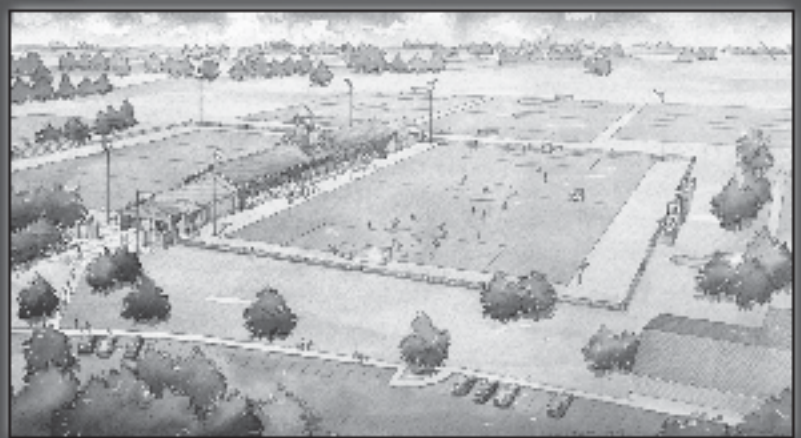


# Varsity Soccer Field

The second phase of the West Fields Project was officially completed with the dedication of Bucknell's brand new soccer pitch on Friday, Sept. 16, 2005.

In a ceremony prior to the women's contest against Marist, President Mitchell thanked Dick '67 and Judy Emmitt for their extremely generous lead gift and invited them to join Judge Susan Crawford, Chair of the Bucknell University Board of Trustees, to cut the ribbon and officially declare Bucknell's Varsity Soccer Field ready for play. Director of Athletics and Recreation John Hardt, men's soccer coach Brendan Nash and women's soccer coach Ben Landis were also present for the ceremony.

The new soccer facility includes an all bluegrass pitch, an in-ground automatic irrigation system, an under-ground drainage system, in-ground soccer goals, sports lights and new paved parking. Phase III construction is slated for completion in November 2006.

**The Plan for Bucknell** was unanimously approved by the Board of Trustees on April 29, 2006, having previously been approved by the students and faculty. We have begun implementing it and are determined to make it a reality over the next decade.
