# GREAT COACHING STAFF



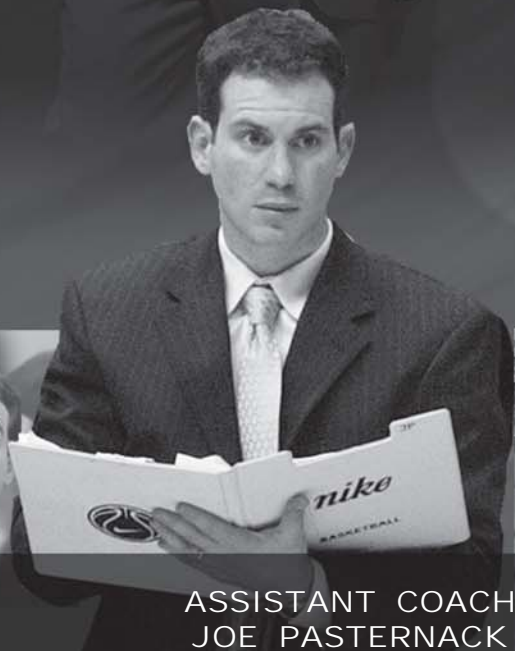
ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH

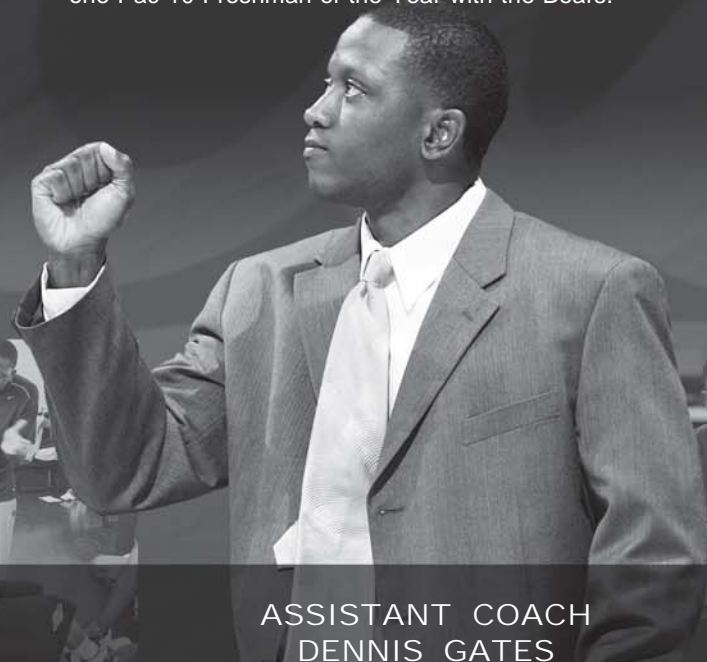
HEAD COACH

JOE PASTERNAK

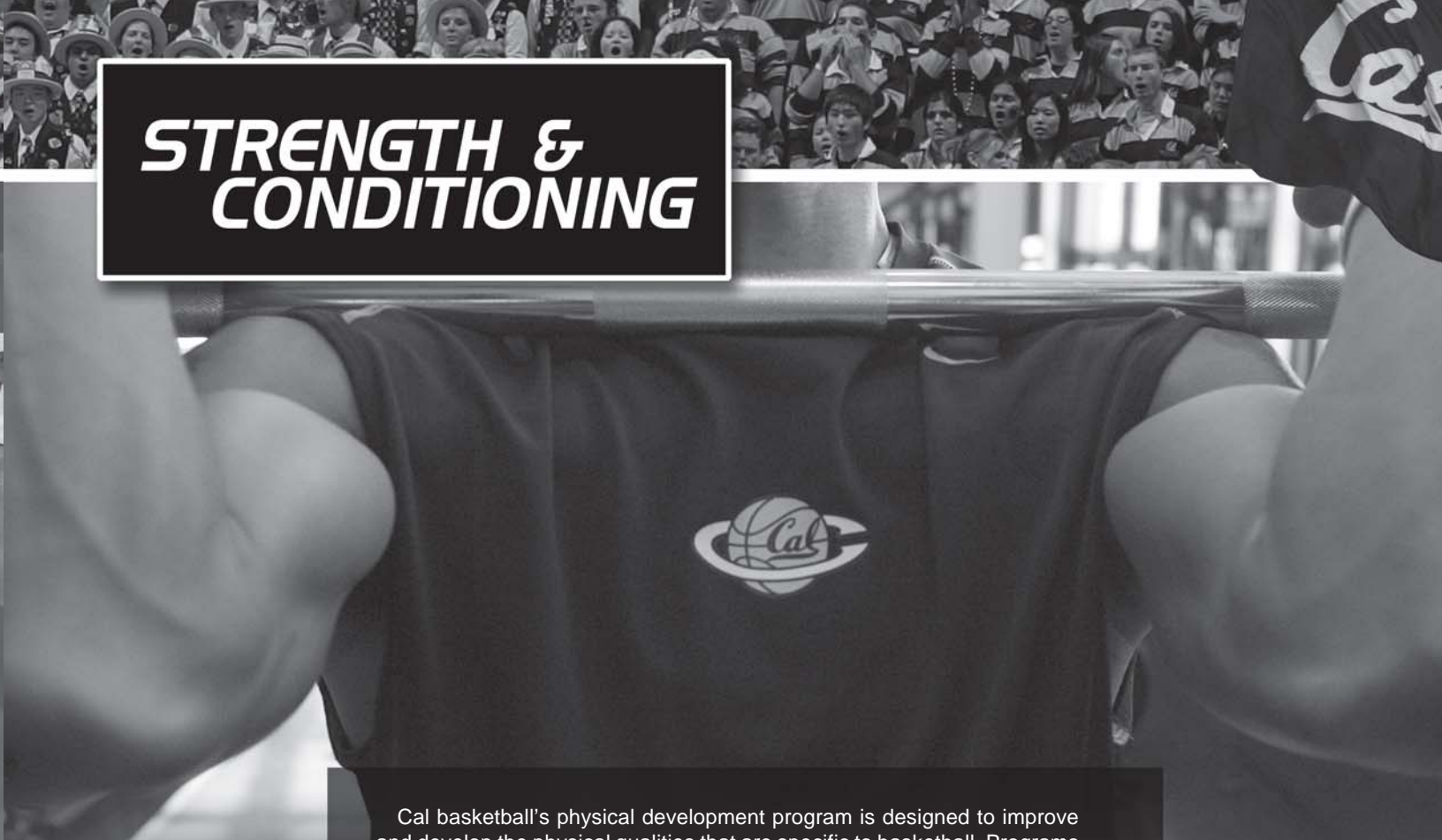
One of the hardest working men in college basketball, Pasternack has been a part of eight NCAA Tournament teams during his 11 seasons in the profession. The overseer of Cal's scouting efforts, he helped the Bears hold opponents to just 64.5 ppg last year – a school record during the 35-second shot clock era.

DENNIS GATES

A first-team Pac-10 All-Academic performer during his playing days for the Bears, Gates helped Cal to three 20-wins seasons from 1999-2002, including the 1999 NIT championship. In addition to his Cal roots, he owns coaching experience from two other college programs and the NBA.

# STRENGTH & CONDITIONING



Cal basketball's physical development program is designed to improve and develop the physical qualities that are specific to basketball. Programs are tailored for each student-athlete, based on position, physical profile and style of play. Training is a year-round process that not only prepares players for the upcoming season, but also provides development throughout their careers at Cal.

The year is broken down into training phases that build upon each other and provide optimal progress without the threat of burnout. Each student-athlete's progress is monitored, recorded and assessed daily in order to ensure that goals are achieved. Equally as importantly, the intense training environment creates an atmosphere that develops teamwork and cohesiveness well before the season begins each fall.



# HAAS PAVILION



Inside Haas Pavilion, Cal basketball players have access to some of the finest facilities in the nation. In addition to the 11,877-seat arena, the Bears have a spacious, wood-paneled locker room; a team meeting room that can be used for film study; a player lounge; and a dedicated computer resource area. Other features in the building include state-of-the-art training and weight rooms, a student-athlete computer lab and a Club Room used for receptions, banquets and press conferences.

## HOME COURT ADVANTAGE

Since Haas Pavilion opened in November 1999, the Bears have won more than 75 percent of their home games, posting an 86-27 record on Pete Newell Court. Cal has put together three of the eight longest home winning streaks in school history in Haas, including a 17-game string from Feb. 2, 2002 to Feb. 15, 2003. The Bears were also a combined 30-2 in Berkeley during the 2001-02 and '02-03 campaigns.

Much of the credit for Cal's success can be attributed to the Haas crowds, which have ranked second in the Pac-10 for six of the last seven years. The Bears have averaged more than 10,000 fans per game five times and in 2003-04, set a school record with an average of 10,839 in 15 home games.
