

2007 CALIFORNIA LACROSSE OUTLOOK

DEPTH, EXPERIENCE BOLSTER BEARS IN 2007

California looks to build on its successes of the past few years with a deep, experienced team that will again challenge for a conference title and a postseason berth. **Jill Malko** enters her ninth year as the head coach of the Golden Bears, who compiled a 4-1 record in the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation last year to earn a share of the MPSF regular-season crown. The Cal team that won that title loses two starters, but Malko brings back the bulk of the team along with a talented group of newcomers that boosts several areas of the team and the defense in particular.

The sophomore class that had such a strong 2005 season is now Cal's senior class and features some of the best players on Malko's team. **Laura Cavallo** and **Liz Reifsnnyder**, Cal's co-leading scorers from a year ago with 51 points each, goalie **Hilary Lynch**, **Jocelyn Paul** and defensive whiz **Kathryn Lindler** hope to end their college careers on a winning note. Lynch and junior teammate **Meghan Bushnell** repeat as team captains; Reifsnnyder is a third captain for the Bears in 2007.

"We're pretty much the same team plus we have some new players who I think will contribute to us significantly," Malko said. "We really have experience and leadership on our side. That will pull through for us. In the long run, in the close games, in the stressful situations, in the games on the road, we've done well. We have a great core of seniors that has really worked hard all their years, and even more so this year, in contributing. I have been very pleased with their efforts."

A balanced Cal team looks to get the season off to a good start, as it plays its first six games of 2007 in the comfortable confines of Memorial Stadium. The road schedule features three teams that reached the 2006 NCAA tournament. Cal plays national semifinalist Notre Dame (April 7 in South Bend, Ind.) and two-time defending champion Northwestern (April 9 in Evanston, Ill.) in back-to-back games and later takes on MPSF champion Stanford (April 21 at Stanford).

The Bears will take on those opponents without graduated starters **Schuyler Sokolow** and **Leanne Zilioli**. The former

stalwarts brought speed, maturity and all-around games to midfield. This year, junior **Danni Zuralow**, who was more of a goalscoring threat in previous years, may be called upon to fill one of those midfield roles.

"Danni's really addressed her defensive game tremendously this fall," Malko said. "She's certainly fast enough. I anticipate her taking more of a midfield role as opposed to just attack. She's done significantly well."

Junior **Brittany Aungier**, back after an injury sidelined her all last season, sophomore **Madeleine Dale**, another strong goalscoring threat, and sophomore **Elizabeth "T" Jahp** are other options to help replace Sokolow and Zilioli.

Jahp certainly caught the coaches' attention in the fall.

"She has improved tremendously," Malko said. "She had a tremendous fall. Without a doubt she's the most improved player on our team. So she's going to see a significant increase in her playing time and may fill that true middle position."

Cal still has plenty of options in the attack, even if Zuralow moves to the middle of the field. Opposing defenses may have paid more attention to Cavallo last year, opening up scoring opportunities for Zuralow to score a career-high 22 goals and 34 points and for Dale to rack up 21 goals and 22 points.

Reifsnnyder is of course another threat to score as is Aungier, who scored

15 goals and collected 10 assists as a freshman in 2005. Talented freshman **Tighe Hutchins** may also see some time in the attack.

Lindler anchors the defense, which includes Bushnell, Paul and **Mary Downs**. Freshmen **DennaFaye Herald** and **Alex Tickner** could earn playing time in this unit, based on their strong play in the fall.

"We have strengths all over, which is nice," Malko added. "We have more depth on our defensive end than we ever have had, so that's a nice feeling. I also feel that our attack is a very strong unit. I can see at any given time we could have up to six or seven attackers who could score, go to goal and make things happen."

Backing up the defense in her final year is Lynch, who is coming off another solid season in 2006. The addition of current sophomore **Morgan Dyson** last year gave the Bears a true backup to Lynch, who had played every minute of the previous two seasons.

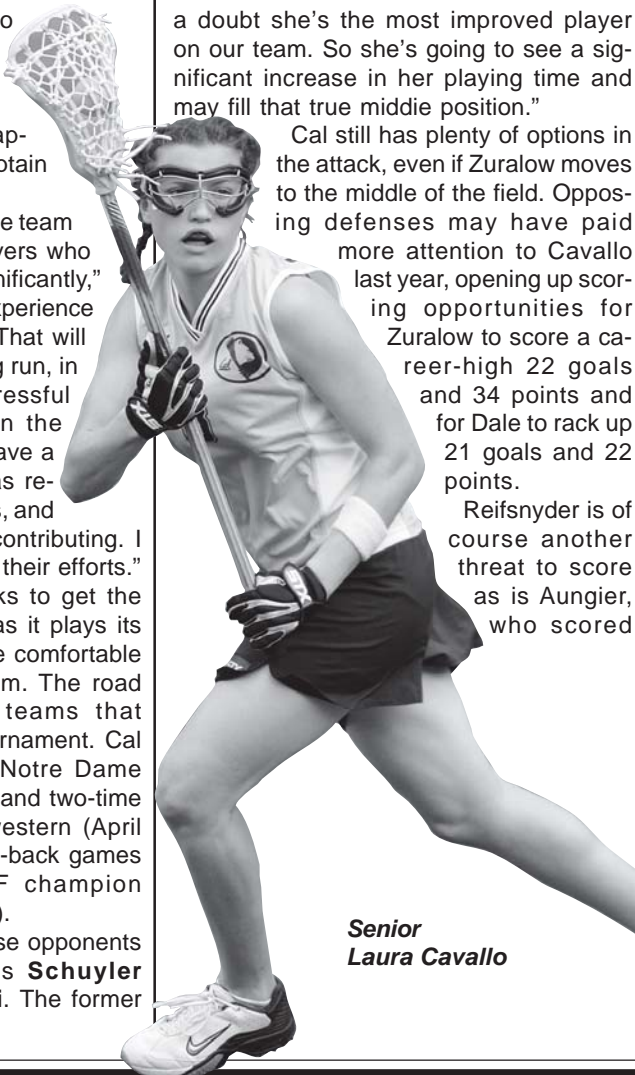
"Hilary had another exceptional fall," Malko said. "What we saw in the fall was Hilary really working and developing a new consistency in her game. What we see from Hilary often is she just makes these great saves and you're not sure how she made them. Now behind that, she's developed the consistency of making the saves she always should make as well. It's fleshing out her game, if you will.

"She's certainly has been the hardest worker on our team. Everything that she accomplishes at game time is due to hard work. It's a pleasure to have her on the field every day."

Lynch should get plenty of work again in 2007, as the MPSF looks to be even stronger than last year, when Stanford became the first team from the West to earn a spot in the NCAA Championship tournament. That historic move can only help other teams in this region, including Cal and Denver.

Malko tabs Denver as one of the conference favorites this year, though the veteran coach sees improvements across the board in the MPSF.

"And it's good," Malko said. "You're only as good as your league, really. How do we stack up against them? What I think we have that other teams might not have is maturity. We have senior leadership and leadership from our juniors. That pays off in crunch-time situations. You really need consistency, intensity and confidence. The seniors have that. They've been there and done that. That's certainly something I think is an advantage for us."

Entering her ninth year at the helm, head coach Jill Malko looks for the Golden Bears to build on their recent success and to help spearhead the growth of lacrosse in the West.

In the sport's first eight years of varsity status, Malko compiled a solid 85-58 overall record. Her 2006 team finished with a share of the MPSF regular-season title. In 2007, Malko and the Bears take another step toward becoming one of the nation's elite programs.

Malko joined the Golden Bears in 1995, taking over the helm of Cal's women's lacrosse club and enjoying immediate success. Between 1996 and 1997, Malko compiled a 30-4 overall record while making repeat visits to the WWLL Championships in each of those years, paving the way for lacrosse to become the 14th women's sport incorporated by California in April of 1998.

Before arriving in Berkeley, Malko helped found Saint Mary's College's first-ever women's lacrosse club in 1989. During her five-year tenure in Moraga, Malko earned her master's degree in athletic administration before deciding Cal, and its opportunity to achieve Division I status, was the place for her.

Prior to moving west, Malko served as an assistant coach at her alma mater, Boston University, from which she graduated with a communications degree in 1985. A starter all four years at BU, Malko captained her squad in her senior year, earning an opportunity to represent the region in the U.S. National Tournament for the next five years. She has since represented the California First Team on eight straight occasions.

As a nationally sought after lacrosse camp coach, Malko has served as the director of Nike Lacrosse Camp for Girls since 1998. Her responsibilities include recruiting participants and staff, developing the curriculum and implementing training programs on two sites at Menlo College and the University of San Diego. In addition, she was responsible for directing the first Golden Bear's summer lacrosse camp here in Berkeley, a tradition that she has continued every year since.

Most recently, Malko served as a selector for the U.S. National Lacrosse Team in

July 2002 - her second such stint in this capacity (summer 2000). She also functioned as co-director for the California Lacrosse Convention in 1999, 2001, 2002 and 2005. Malko currently operates on the Intercollegiate Women's Lacrosse Development Committee and represents college coaches in the NorCal U.S. Lacrosse Chapter. She also coached the 1999 Northern California Team at the U.S. Lacrosse Nationals in Columbus, Ohio, and at the Elite 300 and Saints Elite Lacrosse Camps in Alexandria, Va.

AMY McCLEARY

Amy McCleary joined Cal in the fall of 2005 following the 2005 IFWLA World Cup held in Annapolis, Md., at the Naval Academy, where she served as the associate head coach for the German national team.

McCleary, who worked at James Madison between 2004 and 2005, helped the Dukes win the Colonial Athletic Conference, reach the NCAA Tournament quarterfinals in 2004, and become ranked fifth in the country. Also in 2004, JMU had a Tewarraton Trophy finalist (Gail Decker), CAA Tournament Most Outstanding Player (Jess Beard), and WomensLacrosse.com All-Rookie Team member (Kelly Berger).

In addition, McCleary coached two JMU players who made the 2005 Canadian World Cup team and three JMU players who have earned spots on the U.S. Elite and Developmental Teams.

Since 1996, McCleary has been coaching at the international level for Germany, which made just its second appearance in the world championship of lacrosse in 2005. In addition to developing the national team players, McCleary has conducted clinics throughout Germany to teach the sport of women's lacrosse. She also represents Germany as a delegate at the annual meetings of the IFWLA (International Federation of Women's Lacrosse Association).

McCleary was an assistant coach at the University of Delaware from 1996-2000. With McCleary on staff, Delaware won three consecutive America East Conference championships (1997, 1998, 1999) and, in 2000, the Blue Hens earned their first NCAA Tournament berth since 1984. While McCleary was at Delaware, the Blue Hens climbed the ranks from the top 20, break-

ing into the top 10, and became ranked seventh in the country.

The Baltimore, Md., native was a standout in both field hockey and lacrosse at Washington College in Chestertown, Md. McCleary was a two-time All-American and four-year starter in lacrosse at Washington College, where she also earned two time all-region and Mid-Atlantic Conference honors. She served as team captain and was voted the team's most valuable player as a senior. McCleary also competed on the international scene when she participated in the International Friendship Games in Tokyo, Japan.

McCleary holds a bachelor's degree in business management from Washington College.

Former Princeton star Theresa Sherry joined the Cal coaching staff last August.

In addition to being named All-American in 2002, 2003 and 2004, Sherry was a finalist for the Tewarraton Award as the nation's top women's lacrosse player as a senior in 2004. She helped the Tigers to NCAA championships in both 2002 and 2003 as well as the NCAA semifinals in 2001 and the final in 2004. The Tigers also captured Ivy League Championships in each of her four seasons at the school. A four-time All-Ivy League selection, she was the conference's Player of the Year in 2004.

Sherry was a four-year letterwinner for the Princeton women's soccer team, serving as a team captain and helping the program to three Ivy League Championships.

Sherry earned her bachelor's degree in anthropology from Princeton in 2004. Last year, she served as an assistant coach at Amherst College in Massachusetts while also working as a television commentator for ESPN-U for multiple women's lacrosse matches.

For her career, Sherry scored 197 points (fifth all-time at Princeton), including 161 goals (fourth all-time).

The Maryland product also has international playing experience as she competed with the United States Developmental Team in 2004 and 2005 and helped the U.S. Under-19 Team to the World Championship in 1999, earning player of the game honors in the championship game.

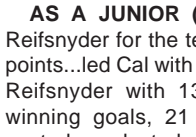

2006 SEASON RECAP

GOLDEN BEARS TAKE SHARE OF MPSF TITLE

California had a strong start to a 2006 season that included a challenging schedule and the Golden Bears' first share of the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation regular-season title. The Golden Bears upset rival and 17th-ranked Stanford, 9-6, in the season opener at home in Memorial Stadium in Berkeley to start a slate of nationally ranked opponents that included 2005 NCAA champion Northwestern, Notre Dame, Cornell and James Madison.

The Bears compiled an 8-11 overall record that included a 4-1 MPSF record, which tied Cal with the Cardinal and Denver for the conference's regular-season crown. Cal head coach **Jill Malko** saw her Bears move higher in the all-time record books and saw departing senior midfielder **Leanne Zilioli** set the all-time mark for the most games played (73) in the blue and gold. Junior midfielder **Laura Cavallo** and attacker **Liz Reifsnnyder** had another strong season, with the two tying for team scoring honors (51 points each). Cavallo led the Bears in goals (38) and draw controls (47), while Reifsnnyder paced Cal in assists (career-high 20).

The latter also garnered conference and national accolades for scoring a hat trick in the upset of Stanford, as she was named the MPSF Player of the Week and the *Inside Lacrosse Magazine* Player of the Week.

The Bears opened with a 2-1 record, after a loss to the Irish and a victory over Ohio State, which marked Cal's third win in three years over the Buckeyes. Malko's Bears went 2-2 over the next four games, which included a loss to 17th-ranked Cornell. A setback against top-ranked Northwestern started a four-game losing streak that Cal snapped with a 19-7 rout of MPSF opponent and East Bay neighbor Saint Mary's in Berkeley. The win over the Gaels was technically a road game for the Bears, who were supposed to play at Saint Mary's Stadium in Moraga. But the Gaels' water-logged field necessitated the move to Memorial Stadium.

Cal wrapped up the regular season and a share of the conference title with wins over UC Davis and Oregon. Cavallo had another strong outing late in the year, earning MPSF Player of the Week honors after a four-goal, two-assist, five-draw control effort against Davis. Next up was the MPSF Championship in Eugene, Ore. There, Cal opened the tournament with its second win over the Aggies in less than two weeks. In a rematch with the Cardinal in the semifinal round, Cal fell to the eventual tournament champion, and later the Bears lost the third-place game to the host Ducks.

Senior defender/midfielder **Schuyler Sokolow**, hampered by injuries much of the season, ended her Cal career with a spot on the MPSF All-Tournament team after her stellar play in Eugene. Other Bears also earned honors in 2006: Cavallo, Reifsnnyder and junior defender **Kathryn Lindler** were named to the All-MPSF Team, while Cavallo earned a spot on the Intercollegiate Women's Lacrosse Coaches Association (IWLCA) All-West/Midwest Second Team.

Reifsnnyder wound up with the fourth-best season in dishing out assists, with 20 total and an average of 1.05 per game, while Cavallo wound up with the fifth-best goalscoring season ever by a Bear, with 38 total and an average of 2.00 per game.

Cavallo also moved up to fourth-place on the all-time scoring chart, with 140 points in 56 games, and nabbed the Cal single-game record for most shots in a game, with 13 against Oregon.

Zilioli, who started all 19 games in her final season, scored 23 goals, seven assists and 30 points to wind up her Cal career as the eighth-leading scorer (117 points) in Bears history. She tied sophomore teammate **Danni Zuralow** for the team lead in free-position goals, with seven. **Madeleine Dale** had an outstanding freshman season, scoring 21 goals and one assist in 18 starts for the Bears. The Alexandria, Va., product also led Cal with three gamewinning goals in her debut season in Berkeley.

Ten Bears earned spots on the MPSF Academic All-Conference Team, with Sokolow and Zilioli making the grade for the third straight season. Joining them on the conference's academic team were teammates Cavallo, Reifsnnyder, Zuralow, sophomore midfielder **Cristen Andrews**, sophomore defender **Meghan Bushnell**, sophomore defender **Mary Downs**, junior goalie **Hilary Lynch** and senior defender **Erica Verdin**. The latter, a valuable reserve and, in previous years, part-time starter, played in 10 games in her final season at Cal.

ACADEMIC SUPPORT

One of the real success stories for the University of California in recent years is the development and growth of a comprehensive academic support program for its student-athletes - the Athletic Study Center.

In 1984, campus officials and Athletic Department administrators decided that a greater emphasis needed to be placed on helping Cal student-athletes with their academic pursuits. The Athletic Study Center was thus born and charged with developing an academic support program geared to the needs of NCAA Division I student-athletes. It was a significant development for an academically oriented institution such as Cal to recognize the special needs required for a modern student-athlete's success both as an athletic competitor on the field of play and in the classroom.

PROGRAM FOR STUDENT-ATHLETES

The Athletic Study Center, which is housed within the Division of Undergraduate Education, is the tutorial and academic support program for the nearly 1,000 student-athletes at Cal. Centrally located in the Cesar Chavez Student Center, the program provides a spacious and comfortable arboretum for quiet study, separate classrooms for individual and group tutorials, and a computer lab for word processing and required course work.

TUTORIAL PROGRAM

The Tutorial Program promotes and enhances students' academic skills and progress by providing individual tutoring, group workshops, study groups, credit courses and intensive special programs. The Athletic Study Center has between 50-60 tutors on staff per semester to guarantee that students receive the best possible support. Tutorial sessions are also offered at night enabling student-athletes to receive help after practices when they have more time to devote to studying.

ADVISING PROGRAM

The Advising Program offers a broad range of services to meet the unique needs of student-athletes, including assistance in understanding and complying with Uni-

versity, college and NCAA requirements, developing time-management skills and resolving personal issues unique to student-athletes. During the freshman year, advisors typically try to help student-athletes make a successful academic transition from high school, while during the sophomore year, they assist student-athletes in making decisions on appropriate majors and fields of study. For the final two years, advisors take more of an exiting approach, ensuring that proper academic progress is being made towards graduation while referring juniors and seniors to areas on campus that can help with internships, graduate school applications and career planning.

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SPECIAL PROGRAMS

In addition, the Athletic Study Center offers a six-week Summer Bridge adjunct program designed to help ease the transition from high school to college. The primary components for the program include writing and math workshops, an advising workshop, study skills seminars and an evening tutorial program.

Another special program offered is Peer Advising. Peer advisors provide academic and campus life guidance for new intercollegiate athletes. They are selected from junior and senior student-athletes who assist in developing programs to further address the needs of student-athletes.

STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

An integral part of Cal Lacrosse is the strength and conditioning program. The program's philosophy is geared towards helping each student-athlete achieve the highest level of athletic development.

By teaching how all the components of strength and conditioning fit together, student-athletes understand how to maximize force production. This includes enhancement of speed, strength and flexibility, which results in improved power. Motivating, educating and helping to reach maximum athletic development is the primary focus of the Cal program.

The Cal weight room in Memorial Stadium includes eight Olympic platforms, more than 15,000 pounds of Olympic bars and bumper plates, and an array of aerobic and anaerobic equipment. The picturesque facility offers panoramic views of the entire region, including San Francisco and

the Bay. Originally opened in Memorial Stadium in 1983 as part of the Cal Sports 80s facility project, the facility now has expanded to more than 5,000-square feet of space for Cal's football team and other athletic squads.

The training regimen at Cal is a year-round process that emphasizes speed, strength and flexibility. With closely monitored workouts that involve a great deal of individual instruction and attention, student-athletes are taught the correct techniques to increase their ability to perform at their peak during competition.

Cal's program stresses comprehensive training in order to improve both strength

and speed. Flexibility is a key component because it is essential for proper lifting. It also improves the running mechanics needed for acceleration and deceleration, both essential for playing lacrosse.

Athlete workouts are closely monitored by the conditioning staff, who work in collaboration with the entire sports medicine team (doctors, athletic trainers, physical therapists, nutritionists, etc.) to ensure the health and safety of all of the student-athletes.

In this way, Cal's strength and conditioning program is a vital component linking the "full circle" of a student-athlete's physical development from conditioning through rehabilitation and re-conditioning.

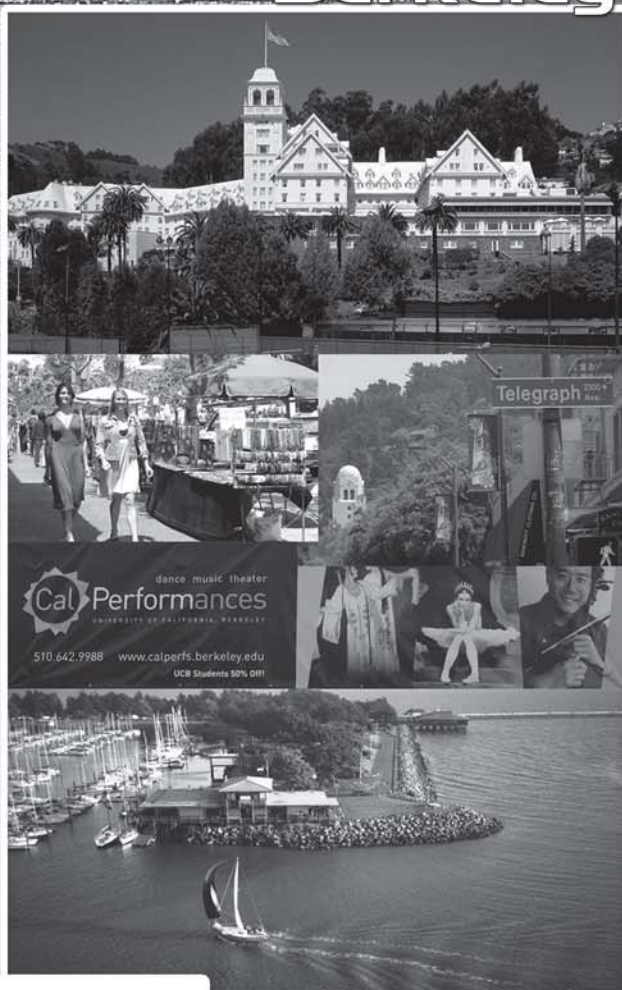
The BAY AREA and BEYOND

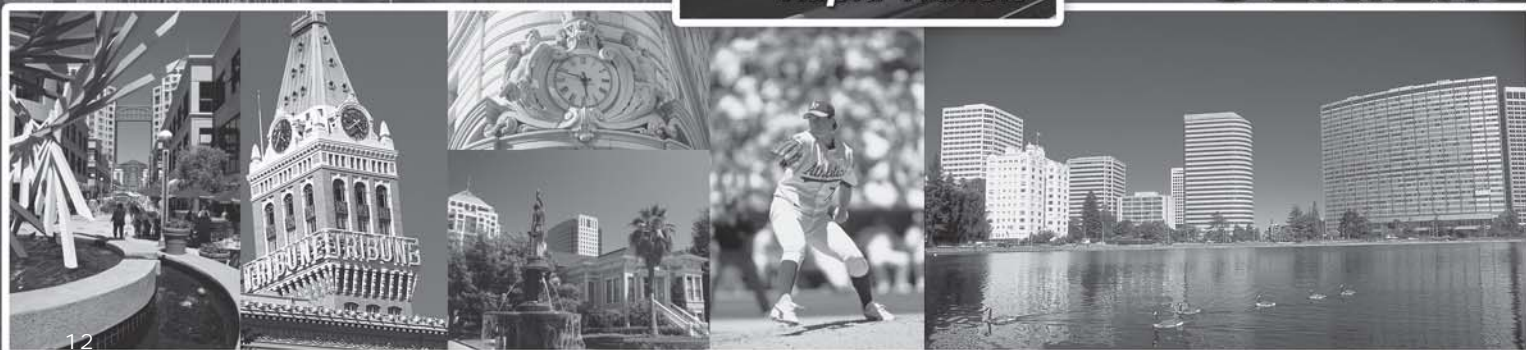
