CCHA ESSENTIAL - "Need to know" items from this week in the Central Collegiate Hockey Association.

Alaska Fairbanks- Both the Nanooks and Notre Dame return to conference action this coming week-end when the Irish visit the Carlson Center. UAF leads the all-time series by a 16-14-3 margin, which includes an 11-5-2 mark on their Olympic-sized home ice.

Bowling Green- The Falcons scored their most goals since Nov. 9, 2001 when they beat Wayne State, 7-3, on Thursday. On Saturday, when the Warriors turned the tables and beat them, 9-3, they allowed the most goals since Jan. 27, 2001.

Ferris State- After a weekend tie and loss on the road at Lake Superior State, the Bulldogs have to wait until Dec. 3 at Western Michigan for another shot at getting coach Bob Daniels his 200th career victory. The winningest coach in FSU history sports a 199-236-37 career record.

Lake Superior- The Lakers soared from 10th place into a four-way tie for fifth spot by taking three of four points from Ferris State at Taffy Abel Arena. LSSU has finished 11th or 12th in the CCHA each season since placing third in the 1999-00 season.

Miami- Freshman Ryan Jones assisted on the tying goal and then scored the winner on Saturday as the RedHawks snapped a seven-game losing streak with a 4-1 win over Western Michigan. They were the first points of the Minnesota Wild draft pick's college career.

Michigan- The Wolverines, with 4-2 and 5-4 wins, swept archrival Michigan State in a weekend series for the first time since Feb. 21-22, 1992. Both of those 1992 games were played at Joe Louis Arena in Detroit with Michigan claiming 4-1 and 5-4 decisions.

Michigan State- SR F Jim Slater scored his first goal in seven contests in Thursday's 4-2 loss to Michigan. During his seven-game goal drought, he had tallied just four assists. The Lapeer, Mich., native, who added a goal and an assist in Saturday's 5-4 defeat, led MSU in scoring with 48 points last season. He has 4-7-11 in 12 games this season.

Nebraska-Omaha- Maverick play-by-play announcer Greg Harrington called his 1,000th career hockey game on Friday night against Ohio State. Harrington, a St. Paul, Minn., native, has been calling UNO hockey games, along with color analyst Terry Leahy, since the program's inaugural season in 1997.

Northern Michigan- The Wildcats and Lake Superior State renew their U.P. rivalry for the Father Cappelletti Cup with a home-and-home series this week-end. The traveling trophy was donated in 1991 by Rev. Louis Cappelletti of Marquette, who was also a member of LSSU's Board of Trustees.

Notre Dame- Former Notre Dame hockey All-American Greg Meredith (1976-80) is one of six NCAA Silver Anniversary Award recipients, given to former student-athletes who have distinguished themselves in the 25 years since their college career ended. Meredith, who played in the NHL with Calgary, is currently the managing director for Putnam Lovell NBF Securities and a youth hockey coach. He also formed the Meredith Family Foundation in 1997, which contributes to programs such as the LOGAN Center, which provides services to individuals with intellectual disabilities, the St. Joseph's County Special Olympics, and Camp Millhouse, a summer camp for children with significant intellectual disabilities.

Ohio State- The Buckeyes' leading scorer, freshman Tom Fritsche, scored his first college goal in Saturday's 4-4 tie at Nebraska-Omaha after collecting 15 assists in his first dozen college games.

Western Michigan- The Bellissimo brothers led the Broncos to their first victory at Miami since 1995 on Friday night. Vince, a junior forward, scored shorthanded in overtime, and Daniel, a freshman goalie, blocked 32 shots in the 2-1 decision.

CCHA- Last weekend's series between Ohio State and Nebraska-Omaha was also a matchup between the schools that play out of the two largest venues in college hockey. Value City Arena in Columbus, the site of the 2005 Frozen Four seats 17,500 for hockey while Quest Center Omaha can accommodate 14,700 fans.

Hensick (3-1-4, +4) opened the scoring in a 4-2 win at MSU on Thursday, and contributed two goals and an assist to Saturday's 5-4 come-from-behind, home-ice win over the Spartans.

Eric Werner, UM Sr. (Grosse Pointe Woods, MI)

Werner (1-1-2, +2) scored the game-winning goal, shorthanded, in Thursday's win at Michigan State, and assisted on the Wolverines' fourth goal in Saturday's 5-4 home-ice victory.

Goaltender

Chris Holt, UNO So. (South Surrey, BC)

Holt blocked 65-of-69 shots (.942) including 39 on Friday, for Perani Cup first-star honors in his first career shutout as the Mavericks blanked Ohio State, 4-0.

Bill Thomas, UNO F (Pittsburgh, PA)

Thomas (1-4-5, +2), who leads all rookies in the nation in scoring, had 1-2-3 in Friday's 4-0 win over OSU and two more assists in Saturday's 4-4 tie.

Jeff Legue, FSU, SR, F (Cornwall, ON): Legue (3-0-3) scored shorthanded in Friday's 2-2 tie at LSSU and added two more goals in Saturday's 5-4 loss to the Lakers.

Brandon Crawford-West, MIA, SO, G (San Diego, CA): Crawford-West blocked 50-of-53 shots (.943) in a weekend split with Western Michigan and did not allow an even-strength goal.

Daniel Bellissimo, WMU, FR, G (Toronto, ON): Bellissimo stopped 64-of-69 shots (.930) in a weekend split at Miami, including 32 on Friday in the Broncos' first win at Goggin Arena since 1995.

THIS WEEK'S MATCHUPS

Friday & Saturday

MIAMI AT BOWLING GREEN

The Falcons lead the all-time series, 56-24-6, including a 32-7-4 mark on home ice. The RedHawks will be looking to pick up their first points in the prestigious Ohio Cup series after dropping a pair of decisions versus Ohio State in October. Miami is 4-1-1 in the past six meetings with Bowling Green but the RedHawks' last victory at BGSU Ice Arena was over three years ago on Nov. 10, 2001.

NORTHERN MICHIGAN VS LAKE SUPERIOR (HOME-AND-HOME)

NMU leads the all-time series, 42-22-7, including a 17-14-4 edge in Sault Ste. Marie and a 25-8-3 advantage in Marquette. The Wildcats won twice to go with a Lakers' victory and one tie last season. LSSU suffered back-to-back 3-0 losses in December despite outshooting NMU 62-43, but came back with a 5-2 road win and a 2-2 tie at home in February. LSSU totaled only 18 shots on goal in its victory, which included two goals and an assist by sophomore forward Dominic Osman. The Lakers came back from a two-goal deficit to earn the tie, scoring an extra-attacker marker with 30 seconds remaining in regulation time.

NOTRE DAME AT ALASKA FAIRBANKS

Both teams return to conference action with this series as the Irish visit Fairbanks for the first time since Nov. 29-30, 2002. UAF leads the all-time series with a 16-14-3 record. At the Carlson Center, the Nanooks have an 11-5-2 record versus the Irish. Last season, the two teams played twice in South Bend with the Irish winning, 3-2, on Friday and the squads skating to a 2-2 tie on Saturday. In the last 10 meetings between the two schools, the Nanooks have a 4-3-3 edge. Notre Dame's last win in Fairbanks came on Feb. 24, 2001, a 3-1 win. Sophomore goaltender David Brown was 1-0-1 versus UAF last season with a 1.93 GAA and a .945 Spct., while senior Morgan Cey is 0-2-0 lifetime versus UAF with a 6.44 GAA and a .833 Spct. Senior forward Jared Sylvestre leads the Nanooks in career scoring against Notre Dame with 2-2-4.

COLLEGE HOCKEY SHOWCASE

MICHIGAN AT WISCONSIN/MINNESOTA

Michigan competes in the 12th annual Showcase when it travels to Minnesota on Friday and Wisconsin on Saturday for an event that involves three of the top four-ranked teams in the nation. Since the tournament was created in 1993, Michigan leads all four teams with a record of 14-7-1 for a .659 winning percentage. Since the first four years of the CHS were played at neutral sites, U-M is visiting Minnesota and Wisconsin for the fourth time. At Mariucci Arena, U-M is 3-0-0 against the Golden Gophers. Overall during the CHS, U-M is 6-5-0 vs. Minnesota. At Wisconsin, the Wolverines are 2-0-1. In all CHS games against the Badgers U-M is 8-2-1. Last year at Yost Ice Arena, Michigan was swept in the CHS for the first time. Wisconsin beat U-M, 3-1, on Nov. 28 and then the Gophers defeated the Maize and Blue 4-2 on Nov. 29. Michigan has played Minnesota 252 times, which is more than any other opponent. The Wolverines trail in the all-time series 114-123-15.

MICHIGAN STATE AT MINNESOTA/WISCONSIN

The Spartans have an all-time record of 12-8-2 (.591) in the College Hockey Showcase. Last year, MSU dropped both of its games in the CHS, falling to Minnesota (5-1) and Wisconsin (2-1 OT) at home.

ALABAMA-HUNTSVILLE AT WESTERN MICHIGAN

It's just the second time that the Broncos and Chargers have faced off in a two-game series. They also met at Lawson Ice Arena in October, 2000 with each team winning one game. The Chargers are coached by Dearborn, Mich., native and former Bowling Green standout Doug Ross, who earned All-CCHA First Team honors in 1975. His son, Jared Ross, is a senior forward who leads the nation in scoring average, at 1.90 points-per-game with 9-10-19 in 10 contests.

THIS WEEK IN CCHA HISTORY



On November 26, 1988, Michigan beat Minnesota 6-0 behind the strong goaltending of Wolverine Steve Shields. The win places Shields alone in the record books with the most wins for a goalie in NCAA history. He displaces former Bowling Green goaltender Gary Kruzich (1983-87) and his 88 wins. Shields goes on to win 111 games during his college career, a record he holds for 10 years. Marty Turco, another Michigan goalie, breaks his record in 1998. In 1988 however, Steve Shields was the all-time leader in NCAA wins "This Week In CCHA History."

After a week off, the Nanooks return to the ice to host the Fighting Irish of Notre Dame. The Nanooks last played at Sault Ste. Marie against the Lake Superior State Lakers, where they rebounded from a 6-2 Friday night loss to score a pair of third-period goals and earn a split with a 2-0 win • UAF and Notre Dame have squared off 33 times since their first meeting in 1985 when the Nanooks defeated the Irish in South Bend, 6-4 • Last year, the Nanooks traveled to ND's Joyce Center and were unable to overcome the Irish, losing the first game 3-2 and settling for a 2-2 tie in the rematch. Both games were played at Joe Louis Arena as U-M won 4-1 and 5-4. SO F T.J. Hensick regained the team scoring lead over the weekend with 3-1-4 to bump his season line to 6-10-16. Hensick had his first two-goal game of the season and his fifth multi-point game of the year with 2-1-3 line on Saturday. Hensick extended his current point streak to four games. He has 4-3-7 over the span. All nine of Michigan's game-winning goals have come from different players. Against the Spartans, SR D Eric Werner had the game-winner on Nov. 18 and SR F Eric Nystrom earned the other GWG on Nov. 20. Twenty-five of the last 26 meetings between U-M and MSU have been decided by two or fewer goals, including five ties. Michigan competes in the 12th annual College Hockey Showcase this coming weekend when it travels to Minnesota (Nov. 26) and Wisconsin (Nov. 27). MSU is 0-6-0 when trailing after 40 minutes of play this season. Before Michigan SO F T.J. Hensick's goal at 13:08 of the first period in Thursday's 4-2 loss, the Spartans had not surrendered a goal in the first stanza in three straight contests. Also on Thursday, the Spartans scored in the second period for the first time since striking three times at Ferris State on Nov. 6, a 5-1 victory for the Spartans.
