CCHA ESSENTIAL - "Need to know" items from this week in the Central Collegiate Hockey Association.

Alaska Fairbanks-The Nanooks saw their six-game home-ice winning streak snapped on Friday by Miami. The loss was followed on Saturday by the RedHawks completing the first sweep by a visiting team at the Carlson Center this season.

Bowling Green- Busy senior goalie Jordan Sigalet, the second star of each game on the weekend as the Falcons swept Western Michigan for the first time since 1996, also organized "MS Awareness Weekend" at BGSU Ice Arena, which raised at least \$8,285.

Ferris State- The Bulldogs posted double-digit win totals at Ewingleben Ice Arena in each of the past three seasons, prior to this one, and were a combined 35-16-3 (.676) during that time. But this season they sport a 4-9-2 mark with three regular-season home games remaining.

Lake Superior- Saturday's 3-3 draw with visiting Nebraska-Omaha saw the Lakers equal the team record for ties in a season with seven. The Lakers have played in a league-leading 11 overtime games this season and own a 2-2-7 mark in contests involving an extra session.

Miami- The RedHawks' power play has connected on 12-of-25 chances for a 48 percent success rate during a current three-game winning streak. Sophomore Marty Guerin has struck three times with a man advantage during the streak while senior Todd Grant and sophomore Matt Christie both have a pair. Five other players have also notched power-play markers.

Michigan- Sophomore T.J. Hensick's first of two goals in Friday's 9-2 win over Notre Dame at Ft. Wayne, Ind., ensured that the Wolverines have a 20-goal scorer for a 21st consecutive season.

Michigan State- Friday's hat trick by rookie Jim McKenzie in a 6-3 home-ice win over Ohio State was the fourth by a Spartan this season. Freshman Bryan Lerg, sophomore Drew Miller and senior Ash Goldie have also recorded three-goal games.

Nebraska-Omaha- Forward Bill Thomas, with two goals and two assists on the weekend in a win and tie on the road against Lake Superior State, broke the UNO single-season rookie point total of 35, which was set by Scott Parse last season. Thomas now has 16-23-39 points and continues to lead the nation in freshman scoring.

Northern Michigan- The Wildcats maintained possession of the Ramada Cup traveling trophy with a 3-3 tie on Thursday at home against Michigan Tech followed by a 5-3 road win over the Huskies of the WCHA on Saturday. The 'Cats, who won the annual challenge with a 2-0-2 record, attracted a new Berry Events Center record crowd of 4,216 fans on Thursday.

Notre Dame- Freshman forward Victor Oreskovich scored his first college goal on Saturday at Yost Ice Arena in a 6-3 loss to Michigan. The Colorado Avalanche's second-round NHL draft choice, 55th overall in 2004, leads the Irish with 76 shots on goal this season.

Ohio State- The Buckeyes, at 20-5-1, have 20 wins in conference play for the first time since going 21-9-0 in 1983-84. OSU has a 78.8 percent winning percentage in league play for the best winning percentage in program history in CCHA action, topping the 71.9 percent mark achieved by the 1983 squad.

Western Michigan- Junior Brent Walton's 44 points are the most by a Bronco since Mike Bishai's 68-point campaign in 2000-01. Walton has a chance to become just the second WMU player in 11 years to record a 50-point season.

CCHA- Bowling Green's Jordan Sigalet has a 13-point lead over Michigan forward T.J. Hensick in his bid to become the fifth straight goalie to be the Perani Cup overall champion. He would join MSU's Ryan Miller (2001), UNO's Dan Ellis (2002), FSU's Mike Brown (2003) and NMU's Craig Kowalski (2004). Perani Cup overall standings can be found on page 4 of this release.

THIS WEEK'S MATCHUPS

Friday & Saturday

MICHIGAN STATE VS BOWLING GREEN (Home-and-Home)

It's the second home-and-home series of the season between the fifth-place Falcons and eighth-place Spartans. MSU leads the overall series, 58-25-8, including a 30-9-3 mark on home ice. BGSU snapped a seven-game losing streak at Munn Ice Arena back on Dec. 3 as senior goalie Jordan Sigalet made 46 shots in a 2-1 victory. The Spartans rebounded for a 6-4 win at BGSU Ice Arena the following night with sophomore Tyler Howells scoring a goal and adding two assists. This time around, the Friday game is in Bowling Green; Saturday's contest, from East Lansing, Mich., will be broadcast live by FSN Detroit as part of the CCHA Game of the Week package. Seven of the last eight match-ups have been decided by two goals or less. Senior forward Jim Slater has registered 6-6-12 in his career against the Falcons.

NORTHERN MICHIGAN AT FERRIS STATE

The Wildcats hit the road to face Ferris State in their final CCHA road series of the season. The 'Cats hold a 38-15-2 all-time series lead over the Bulldogs, including a 14-6-2 record in Big Rapids. The Wildcats and Bulldogs concluded regular-season play last season at Marquette with the home team claiming a pair of close decisions, 3-2 and 2-1. Fourteen of the last 18 meetings have been determined by two goals or less and the Bulldogs are 6-10-1 in such encounters. This will be the first trip to Big Rapids since Jan. 17-18, 2003 for the 'Cats, who won 3-1 on Friday and lost 5-1 in the rematch that year. Senior Jeff Legue has totaled a team-leading 4-1-5 in seven games versus NMU. Senior goalie Mike Brown is 3-4-0 with a 2.42 goals-against average and a .909 saves percentage in seven career appearances. Prior to Saturday's contest, Ferris State will acknowledge its six senior member class of Brown, Legue, forward Derek Nesbitt, defenseman Skip Renauld, forward Carter Thomson and defenseman Matt York.

LAKE SUPERIOR AT WESTERN MICHIGAN

The Lakers, 3-6-1 in their last 10 starts against the Broncos, will try to end a four-game losing streak in Kalamazoo when they face off on Friday. LSSU leads the all-time series against the Broncos, 59-36-11. WMU maintains a 23-22-8 edge at Lawson Arena and the Lakers haven't won there since Feb. 25, 2000. Last season, the Lakers took three of four points in a home series against the Broncos, tying 3-3 on Friday, Jan. 2, and winning 2-1 on Saturday, Jan. 3. Junior forward Nathan Ward and senior forward Bo Cheesman both had a goal and two assists in the series. Senior goaltender Matt Violin stopped 75-of-79 shots on goal (.949) for the weekend. Ninth-place LSSU has a chance to gain ground on sixth-place Miami, which is idle this weekend. The Lakers trail the RedHawks by four points. They also have two games in hand on seventh-place Alaska Fairbanks.

ALASKA FAIRBANKS AT NEBRASKA-OMAHA

The Nanooks, who swept the Mavericks in Fairbanks on Nov. 5-6 by scores of 3-1 and 3-2, conclude regular-season play in Omaha for a second straight year. The Nanooks lead the all-time series with their rivalry partner, 15-4-5. Friday's game will be played in front of a national television audience on CSTV. Senior Dan Hacker leads the Mavericks in career scoring against the Nanooks with 4-1-5 in 14 games. SO G Chris Holt has a 1-5-0 record in six games against UAF with a 3.49 goals-against average and a .899 save percentage.

U.S. UNDER-18 TEAM AT MICHIGAN (EXHIBITION)

U-M is 4-0-0 in the previous meetings with the Ann Arbor-based U-18 team. Twelve NTDP alumni have gone on to letter at Michigan, more than any other school. U-M's list includes Andy Hilbert, Mike Komisarek, Dwight Helminen, Eric Nystrom, Jason Ryznar, Eric Werner, Al Montoya, Mike Brown, T.J. Hensick, Matt Hunwick, Chad Kolarik and Kevin Porter. Four current players on the U.S. NTDP Under-18 team will join the Wolverines for the 2005-06 season. Defensemen Jack Johnson and Mark Mitera and forwards Jason Bailey and Zac MacVoy will wear the maize and blue.

Branded as COLLEGE HOCKEY BREAKAWAY WEEKEND, the coverage consists of live semifinal and championship game telecasts from the CCHA and WCHA tournaments, plus continuous in-game updates from other leagues' post-season events. The weekend's action determines which schools in various regions break away from the pack to earn bids into the NCAA Tournament.

The live games on COLLEGE HOCKEY BREAKAWAY WEEKEND originate from Detroit's Joe Louis Arena, site of the CCHA Super 6, and the Xcel Energy Center in St. Paul, host facility of the WCHA Final Five. Start times among the two tournaments are staggered to allow for wraparound coverage of all semifinal and championship games.

Before, during and after games, the studio-based Tournament Desk provides highlights and updates from games in progress at the other conference tournaments taking place that weekend, including Hockey East, ECAC Hockey League and the Atlantic Hockey Association.

COLLEGE HOCKEY BREAKAWAY WEEKEND is a collaborative effort among FSN Detroit (originator of CCHA games), FSN North (WCHA games) and FSN Rocky Mountain (Tournament Desk). Those three regional networks are scheduled to air both days' coverage in its entirety. FSN Detroit viewers will see CCHA games from start to finish; when those games are not in progress, they will see the beginning or conclusion of WCHA contests. The opposite will host true for viewers of FSN North and FSN Rocky Mountain, who will receive WCHA Tournament games in their entirety, supplemented by CCHA coverage.

Other FSN regional networks confirmed to carry portions of the two-day coverage include: FSN Chicago, FSN Ohio, FSN New England, FSN New York and FSN South. More regional networks may be added in the near future. Based on current confirmations, COLLEGE HOCKEY BREAKAWAY WEEKEND will go to approximately 40 million households served by the participating regional sports networks. Additionally, COLLEGE HOCKEY BREAKAWAY WEEKEND is available nationally to DirectTV Sports Pack subscribers and to subscribers of Fox College Sports, which will program all of the CCHA and WCHA games between its Atlantic and Central feeds, respectively. Also joining the COLLEGE HOCKEY BREAKAWAY WEEKEND networks is Leafs TV (Ontario, Canada) and KFXF-TV (FOX Broadcasting affiliate in Fairbanks, Alaska).

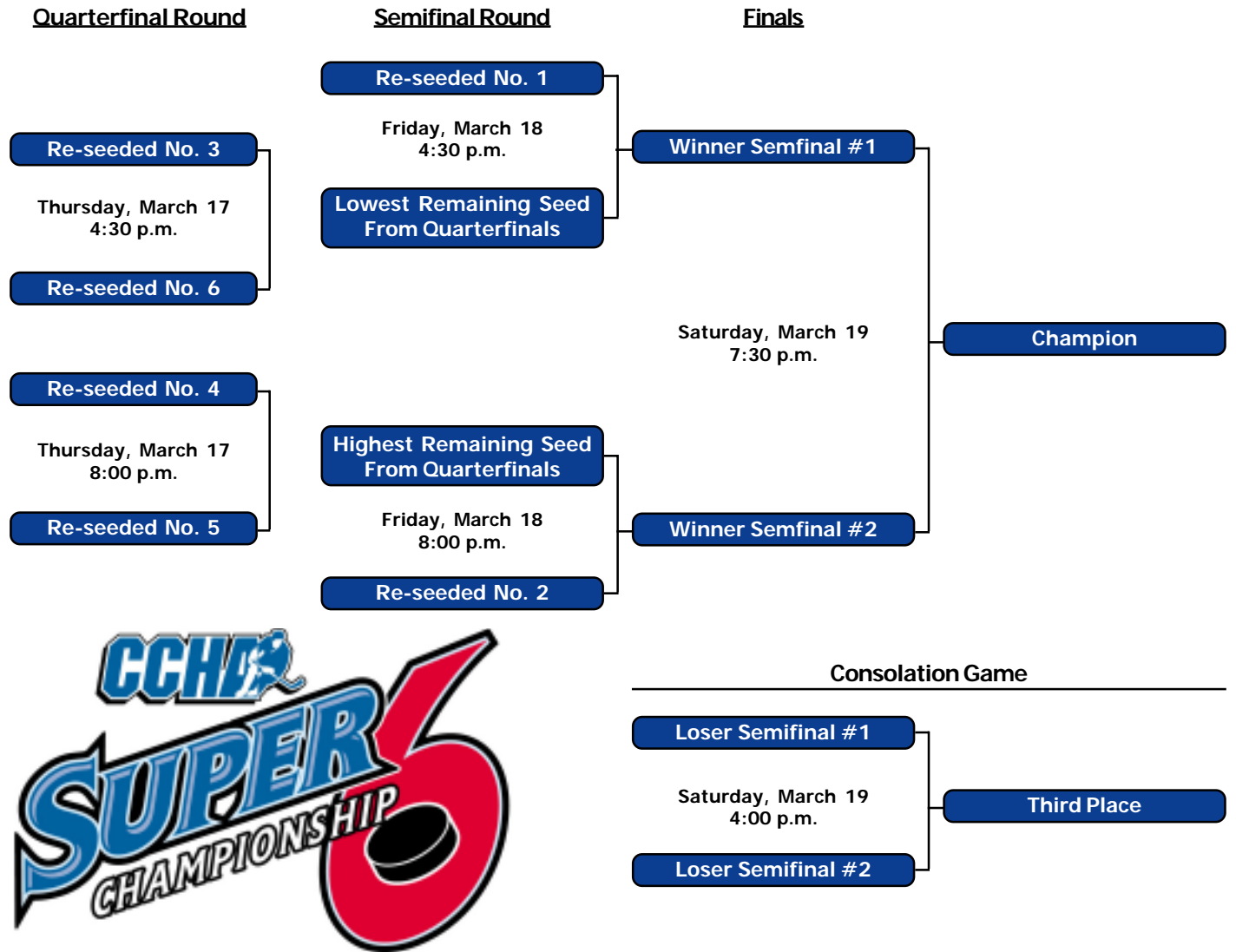

SR F Ash Goldie, SO F Drew Miller and FR F Bryan Lerg have the other hat tricks • The split with Ohio State marked the sixth time this season that State has split its weekend CCHA series. Six of Michigan State's last eight CCHA series have been splits (Bowling Green, Notre Dame, Miami, Western Michigan, Lake Superior State and Ohio State) • With an assist on State's fourth goal Friday, SR F Mike Lalonde reached the century club. The Chetwynd, B.C., native now has 50-50-100 in 148 contests • MSU, which entered Friday's game with Ohio State without a power-play goal in its last 13 attempts, tallied three power-play markers for just the third time this season. In 01-02, John Shouneyia had 50 points and Mike Cammalleri had 44 • Hensick's first of two goals on Feb. 18 was his 20th of the year, ensuring the Wolverines of a 20-goal scorer for the 21st straight season • The Wolverines pumped in 15 goals during their two games against the Fighting Irish to up their season total to 144 over 34 games and reclaim the distinction as the top-scoring offense in the nation with an average of 4.24 goals per contest • Michigan is on a season-best unbeaten streak of seven games (5-0-2). The streak began on Jan. 29 with a win against Northern Michigan, continued through two ties against Michigan State and then spanned sweeps over Nebraska-Omaha and Notre Dame • SR F Eric Nystrom is on a career-best point streak of five games. He has three goals and three assists over the stretch • Michigan will host an exhibition game against the U.S. National Team Development Program Under-18 team for the fifth straight season this coming Saturday, Feb. 26. U-M is 4-0-0 in the previous meetings.

It was Marshall's second game-tying goal with an extra attacker in 12 games. In January, the Livonia, Mich., native scored with 32 seconds remaining in regulation to tie Ferris State in Big Rapids • SO F Alex Nikiforuk had his four-game point streak snapped on Saturday after recording a goal in Friday's 5-2 victory • The Mavericks will look to clinch one of the six home-ice spots for the CCHA Playoffs this weekend when they wrap up conference play with rivalry partner Alaska Fairbanks.

Five of the past eight games have gone into overtime • Thursday's draw was the seventh of the season for the 'Cats, which equals the NMU record for ties in a season set during the 2000-01 season • A new record crowd of 4,216 fans was on hand for Thursday's game at the Berry Events Center. The top three crowds in venue history have been this season • NMU set a new record for penalty minutes in a game on Thursday night with 91 penalty minutes assessed against them. That broke the record of 87 minutes set against Ohio State on Jan. 30, 1981. NMU also set a new mark for most penalty minutes in a series, with 113 penalty minutes against MTU. It broke the old record, also set against the Huskies, of 112 penalty minutes on Nov. 19-20, 1999 • JR D Geoff Waugh and FR D Matt Siddall both had four penalties in the second period against MTU on Thursday which tied a NMU record for most penalties in a period • The Wildcats hit the road to face Ferris State this weekend in Big Rapids for their final CCHA road series of the season • The 'Cats have seven unassisted goals this season • NMU has eight short-handed goals this season as Contois and Bateman lead the way with two each • NMU has scored 39 of its 90 goals (43.3 percent) in the final 20 minutes of the game and has given up 26 of 71 goals against (36.6 percent) in the same time.

Ohio State has a bye week after splitting a two-game series at Michigan State. The Buckeyes saw their season-high six-game winning streak end on Friday with a 6-3 loss before rebounding for a 5-1 victory Saturday • The Buckeyes will complete the regular season with a home-and-home series against Miami on March 4-5 • The Buckeyes are 6-1-1 following a loss this season. In CCHA play, the Bucks have earned less than two points in a series just once when they lost and tied at UNO on Nov. 18-19. The Buckeyes have eight two-game CCHA series sweeps along with four splits and the 0-1-1 weekend at UNO • In OSU's 5-1 win over Michigan State, the Buckeyes got points from 11 players, including five goal scorers • The Buckeyes now have 20 wins in conference play this season, the first time the squad has reached the 20-win mark in CCHA play since the 1984 squad went 21-9. OSU has a program-best 78.8 percent winning percentage in league play and has clinched the best winning percentage in program history in CCHA action, topping the 71.9 percent of the 1983 team • Ohio State was 2-for-7 on the power play Friday, marking the first time in 17 games this season the Buckeyes lost when scoring multiple power-play goals • MSU had 42 shots on Friday, the first time an opponent had over 40 shots since Michigan had 46 on Nov. 15, 2003 in Columbus. Saturday, MSU had just 15 shots on goal, the fifth time this season OSU has held an opponent under 20 shots this season.

The three goals the Irish netted in Saturday's 6-3 loss at Yost Arena doubled their total from the first three games this year • FR F Victor Oreskovich, who leads the Irish with 76 shots on goal, scored his first college goal on Saturday • The nine goals given up by the Irish in Friday's game at Ft. Wayne were the most that Notre Dame has given up in a game since Jan. 23, 2001 in a 9-0 road loss to Michigan • The eight goals surrendered in the 9-2 loss by SR G Morgan Cey are the most that he's ever given up. His previous high of seven came in the second game of his collegiate career, Oct. 12, 2001, when he lost a 7-4 decision to Union College • SR F Cory McLean has 1-3-4 during a three-game point streak and has points in five of his last six games, with 2-4-6. He leads the Irish in scoring with five goals and a career-high 15 assists for 20 points on the year • JR F Matt Amado scored in each game against Michigan • Friday's contest was the first college game at Ft. Wayne's Allen County War Memorial Coliseum and drew a crowd of 7,948 • Notre Dame has now lost five games in a row and is winless in its last 15 games (0-13-2). The winless skid is the second longest in the program's history. From Nov. 5, 1988 to Jan. 2, 1989, the Irish went winless in 16 games (0-14-2) • After scoring just 12 goals during 11 games in the month of January, the Irish have scored three goals in three of the last four games and 14 goals in six games during the month of February • In the Michigan series, JR F Tim Wallace extended his "Iron Man" streak to 113 consecutive games played. He is just one behind the school record held by Evan Nielsen ('03) who played in 114 consecutive games.

A candidate for CCHA All-Rookie Team honors, Bellissimo leads the league with 839 saves • JR G Eric Marvin, who tended goal in Saturday's 5-2 road loss to the Falcons, was making his first start since a 4-3 overtime loss at UNO on Oct. 23 • WMU's offense has dropped from third (3.35) to eighth (2.93) in league scoring over the past five weeks. FARMINGTON HILLS, Mich.—Bowling Green, Michigan and Miami posted weekend sweeps with wins over Western Michigan, 5-2, and Notre Dame, 6-3, and Alaska Fairbanks, 5-4. Elsewhere in the CCHA, Ohio State kept pace with the Wolverines, picking up a 5-1 win at Michigan State and UNO stormed back with a pair of third period goals to tie up the Lakers, 3-3. In non-conference action, Northern Michigan beat Michigan Tech for the second time this year to lock up the Ramada Cup.

At Bowling Green, Ohio, sophomore forward James Unger scored twice and added an assist, leading the Falcons to a series sweep over visiting Western Michigan on Saturday night. Freshman Jonathan Matsumoto chipped in with a goal and an assist, while senior Ryan Minnabarriet added a pair of helpers in BG's 5-2 victory. Senior netminder Jordan Sigalet made eight saves in each period, 24 for the game, to pick up his second win of the weekend. Freshman forward Jeff Pierce and junior forward Brent Walton scored for the Broncos.

At Ann Arbor, Mich., forward Jeff Tambellini led the Wolverines to a 6-3 win and a sweep of Notre Dame with a four-point night. The senior from Port Moody, British Columbia, picked up a pair of goals to go along with two assists.
