



CCHA ESSENTIAL- "Need to know" items from this week in the Central Collegiate Hockey Association.

Alaska Fairbanks- Forward Kelly Czuy, the lone senior on the Nanooks roster, defended his Hardest Shot title with a blast of 99 mph in Saturday's scrimmage and skills competition. Czuy also earned the team's Top Athlete award based on his preseason strength and conditioning results.

Bowling Green- The Falcons non-conference schedule this season features single games against eight different opponents including a regular-season opening homestand against Merrimack and Boston College of Hockey East on Oct. 14-15.

Ferris State- This coming Saturday's exhibition visit by Western Ontario marks the seventh time in the past eight seasons that the Bulldogs have opened the season against a Canadian opponent. They've won six straight including a 9-5 decision over the Mustangs in 2003.

Lake Superior- The Lakers welcome junior forward Dominic Osman back into the lineup this season. He led the team in scoring as a freshman but back problems ended his season after 12 games as a sophomore.

Miami- The RedHawks opened their final season in Goggin Ice Arena with a 4-1 exhibition victory over the University of Windsor. The final regular-season contest at the rink that Miami hockey has called home for the past 30 years is set for Feb. 25 against Bowling Green.

Michigan- The Wolverines had 11 freshmen in their lineup for Sunday's 3-2 exhibition victory over the University of Toronto. Rookie forward Andrew Cogliano, a first-round NHL draft pick of Edmonton, assisted on the game-winning goal by sophomore forward Kevin Porter with one minute left in the third period.

Michigan State- Freshman forward Justin Abdelkader of Muskegon, Mich., who was selected 42nd overall by Detroit in this year's NHL Entry Draft, is the first CCHA player taken by the Red Wings since the selection of Kevin Hilton from the University of Michigan in 1993.

Nebraska-Omaha- Returning forwards Scott Parse, a junior, and Bill Thomas, a sophomore, combined for 38-56-94 last season on a Mavericks team that was the second-highest scoring outfit in the CCHA, and ranked seventh nationally.

Northern Michigan- There's a new face behind the Wildcats bench this season with John Olver taking over for Dave Shyiak, who is the new head coach at Alaska Anchorage of the WCHA. Olver, who has served as a head coach at the minor pro level for the past eight seasons, was a member of the Michigan Wolverines for three seasons in the late 1970's.

Notre Dame- Jeff Jackson, who is the eighth head coach in Irish hockey history, compiled an incredible 24-2 (.937) mark in CCHA playoff competition during the six seasons he served behind the Lake Superior bench from 1990-96.

Ohio State- The Buckeyes have a league-high six players named to the Preseason All-CCHA teams, including first-team selections Rod Pelley, a senior forward, and Dave Caruso, a senior goalie. Sophomore forward Tom Fritsche and senior defenseman Nate Guenin received berths on the second team. Junior defenseman Sean Collins and junior forward Mathieu Beaudoin were honorable mention choices.

Western Michigan- Senior forward Mike Erickson, a third-round choice by his hometown Minnesota Wild in 2002, is the new captain of a Broncos team that welcomes nine freshmen, one of the largest rookies classes in the league this season.

CCHA- Seven of the 12 conference teams go into the new season having to replace the goaltender that played the majority of the minutes last season. The list includes three netminders who had been drafted and turned pro; Jordan Sigalet (Bowling Green and Boston), Al Montoya (Michigan and NY Rangers) and Chris Holt (Nebraska-Omaha and NY Rangers), and two former All-Americans; Mike Brown (Ferris, 2003) and Tuomas Tarkki (Northern Michigan, 2005).

Q&A WITH CCHA COMMISSIONER TOM ANASTOS

Commissioner Tom Anastos is beginning his eighth season with the Central Collegiate Hockey Association. In addition to serving as the president of the Hockey Commissioner's Association and on USA Hockey's board of directors, Anastos spearheaded an NCAA initiative designed to enforce existing rules more strictly and, ultimately, to improve the quality of the college hockey game. CCHA.com spoke with Anastos about the upcoming season and effects of the NCAA's initiative last season.

Question: How would you evaluate the way the rules enforcement initiative worked last season for the CCHA and college hockey as a whole?

Tom Anastos: I thought it went very well. Frankly, almost exactly as I anticipated. We knew there would be lots of pain and anxiety as we suffered through changing the way the game was played, but I give full credit to the coaches, the players, the officials and the NCAA for making the necessary commitment to see such positive results. We knew that everyone, including the fans, would get frustrated during the process. As everyone adjusted, our product just kept getting better and better, and I think it will continue to do so this season.

Q: Is there anything you think the NHL could learn from what happened with last year's rules enforcement in college hockey?

Anastos: Absolutely. They saw first-hand the changes that took place in the game, the overall positive impact it had, and how all of the stakeholders (players, coaches and fans) reacted along the way. They can expect the same to hold true at their level. I've been in constant contact with them, and we've shared all of our feedback. I'm certain they know what they are in for.

Q: What was the process like in getting the NCAA to bring the Frozen Four to Ford Field in 2010?

Anastos: It was a terrific learning experience for me. Something I really enjoyed. Really, the process to secure the 2010 bid started a few years ago when we submitted a Detroit bid in conjunction with Joe Louis Arena and the city of Detroit. The process is very detailed, and I thought the NCAA did a very thorough job. In our case this year, I thought it was really important to actually stage a rink inside Ford Field, and to have Tom Jacobs and Wayne Dean (NCAA representatives) in the building to see it for themselves and get a feel for the building. That's not something easily duplicated at an off-site presentation. We tried to do that for the rest of the committee by creating a virtual tour of the building but there's nothing like sitting there and seeing it for yourself. The other part of the process that was so interesting to me was to see the amount of energy put into the process, from everyone involved, both in our bid, and from the other cities, to the NCAA hockey committee's review of all of them. They have a tough job selecting sites as its my understanding that all of the bids are very sophisticated and very well done. We were really excited to be selected and have great confidence that it will be a special championship event.

Q: What were the reasons behind the switch from the Super 6 to a four-team format for the Championship tournament?

Anastos: We gave the six-team format a real good chance over the past several years, and the fact is, it was very, very difficult to establish a good tournament environment during our quarterfinal games. I didn't see that changing. These are some of the most meaningful games of the season for our student-athletes, and we want to make sure that those games are played in a championship environment. The three-day format was not conducive to fans traveling to follow their teams during those quarterfinal games. Rather, they were waiting to see if they won that game, and if so, they were then coming to town to see them play in the semi's and either finals or third-place game. In our four-team format, fans can plan to travel into town, they can enjoy our CCHA Awards show on Thursday night if they'd like to come in town the night before, and know they are going to see their team play on both Friday and Saturday. We're hopeful that this, as well as some other initiatives that we plan to activate this season, will continue to help make this a very memorable experience for everyone who participates in it.

Q: How do you think the NHL's return will impact college hockey this season?

Anastos: It's only positive. I think it's great that the game's most visible level of hockey is back. Clearly there is going to be some issues for the sport to overcome, but in the long run, we need a strong and vibrant NHL. I also think that if the NHL makes the same commitment to the new rules enforcement standard as we did, and withstands the pressure that will be generated by those who are unhappy with it, the game, at all levels, will make enormous progress in the years ahead. In my opinion, that could potentially do more to benefit the game than any one single thing has in many years. I'm really confident that if people get to see the incredible skills and talent of players, in a physical, yet high-tempo environment, they will have a greater enjoyment and appreciation of the sport.

ALASKA FAIRBANKS



Head Coach: Tavis MacMillan (2nd Season)
2004-05 Overall Record: 17-16-4
2004-05 Conference Record: 11-14-3/8th

"I like the youth of our team. I think it was our strength last year and will continue to be one of our strengths. (This season) is going to be a chance to prove we can take another step in competing in this league." Tavis MacMillan said at Media Day.

After capturing 3rd place in the 2005 CCHA Super Six Tournament, its best postseason finish ever, Alaska Fairbanks looks to improve on that mark with second-year head coach Tavis MacMillan at the helm • The Nanooks 2005-06 roster is rookie laden for the second consecutive year. Last season UAF dressed 11 freshmen, 10 of which return this year as sophomores. This year's Nanook squad will feature 10 freshmen for a total of 20 underclassmen, the most on a CCHA team • The Gold squad defeated the Blue squad, 2-0, in the Nanooks intrasquad scrimmage Saturday evening. SO F Kyle Greentree, who led UAF in scoring as a freshman (12-20-32), had a goal and an assist for the victors • SR F Kelly Czuy, UAF's third-best scorer last season (10-18-28), is the lone senior for the Nanooks. In Saturday's scrimmage and skills competition, Czuy defended his Hardest Shot title with a 99 mph slap shot. He was also the recipient of the Top Athlete Award, based on his preseason strength and conditioning test results • JR D Jordan Hendry, who was a medical red-shirt last season, returned to the ice in Saturday's scrimmage, and also defended his title as the fastest skater • UAF and KFXF Fox Channel 7 Fairbanks have made arrangements to televise an all-time high 19 Nanooks games this season. The "Gene's Chrysler Game of the Week" will showcase 12 of UAF's road games and seven home games, with nine of the games being broadcast nationally through various stations • ESPNU will televise the Nanooks Dec. 9 home game against the MSU Spartans • UAF kicks off its season with an exhibition game against the University of Windsor Oct. 8. The two teams last met Nov. 14-15, 1988 in Fairbanks, when UAF was triumphant on both occasions by margins of 7-2 and 7-3.

MICHIGAN



Head Coach: Red Berenson (22nd season)
2004-05 Overall Record: 31-7-3
2004-05 Conference Record: 23-3-2/1st

"With the initiative that Tom Anastos has pushed in our league, the hockey is much improved at the college level. It's more exciting for the fans and more interesting and more challenging for the players, and I think, overall, we have a better product than two years ago." Red Berenson said at Media Day.

JR F T.J. Hensick factored in on all three of U-M's goals in its 3-2 exhibition win over Toronto on Oct. 2. He assisted on the first and third goals while scoring the middle marker. He drew assists on both of Team Blue's goals in the Blue-White intrasquad scrimmage on Oct. 1, which Team White won 8-2 • The Wolverines open the regular season against Quinnipiac. UM last faced Quinnipiac in October of 2003. Michigan swept the weekend series at Yost Ice Arena by scores of 5-4 and 3-2 • Red Berenson is 2-0-0 against Bobcat head coach Rand Pecknold. Against the ECAC, which Quinnipiac joined in this season, Berenson is 14-7-2 (.652). In 2004-05, Michigan defeated ECAC member St. Lawrence, 5-2, at Yost • Over the last three campaigns the Wolverines are 3-3-0 overall in their first two games of the regular season. In 2004-05, U-M fell to Northeastern in its opener and rebounded with a win over Boston University. In 2003-04, Michigan beat Mercyhurst and a week later lost at Miami. In 2002-03, the Wolverines shut out Niagara before dropping an overtime contest to North Dakota • Against Quinnipiac on October 17, 2003, SR F Brandon Kaleniecki tallied four goals to mark his first career hat trick. His final score was the game winner. That weekend Hensick also earned three assists.

NEBRASKA-OMAHA



Head Coach: Mike Kemp (9th season)
2004-05 Overall Record: 19-16-4
2004-05 Conference Record: 13-11-4/4th

"One of the keys for our team is going to be leadership. We are blessed to have a third-year captain in Mike Lefley, a strong leader who will be key in our locker room to keep everyone on the straight and narrow and their focus in the right direction." Mike Kemp said at Media Day.

2005 CCHA Coach of the Year Mike Kemp embarks on his ninth season behind the Maverick bench. His team returns 22 letterwinners, including All-CCHA preseason first-teamer Scott Parse and Bill Thomas, a second-team selection. Parse and Thomas were linemates on last season's 19-16-4 squad and combined for 38-56-94 • UNO was second in CCHA scoring last season and seventh nationally with eight of its top-10 scorers returning • UNO also returns several valuable members of its defensive corps from a year ago. JR D Dan Knapp (4-17-21) led Nebraska-Omaha blue liners in scoring last season and SO D Joe Grimaldi (4-13-17) will look to build on his rookie season where he was named to the 2005 CCHA All-Rookie team • The Mavericks start camp with three goaltenders in the mix for playing time. SO G Eric Aarnio is the lone returner between the pipes, while freshmen Greg Barrett and Jerad Kaufmann begin their first season with the program • The team will hold a Maverick Open House on Sunday, October 9th at the Qwest Center where the Red and White scrimmage will take place along with Media Day. The Mavs will then begin a busy week starting on Monday, October 10th with an exhibition game against Manitoba before opening the season four days later with the Mutual of Omaha Stampede.

MICHIGAN STATE



Head Coach: Rick Comley (3rd season)
2004-05 Overall Record: 20-17-4
2004-05 Conference Record: 12-13-3/6th

"I think preseason predictions are fine. I think we have a lot of quality teams in this league. I would bet right now that we all will probably be in the 20's in one-goal games this year. There used to be a day in college hockey where you could look at the schedule and plot how your season was going to go, those days are long gone." Rick Comley said at Media Day.

The Spartans open the 2005-06 regular season at the fourth annual Lefty McFadden Invitational, Oct. 8-9. This year's field features the Spartans and Miami, North Dakota and Wayne State • This season marks the 40th anniversary of the Spartans' first national championship in 1966 and the 20th anniversary of the program's 1986 national title • Three Spartans were selected in the 2005 NHL Entry Draft; incoming freshmen Justin Abdelkader, selected in the second round (42nd overall) by the Detroit Red Wings, Tim Crowder, chosen in the fifth round (126th overall) by Pittsburgh and Tim Kennedy picked 181st overall by the Washington Capitals, raise the number of drafted Spartans to eight. NHL teams also own the rights of MSU Colton Fretter (ATL, 2002), Drew Miller (ANA, 2003), Jim McKenzie (OTT, 2004), and David Booth (FLA, 2004) as well as Corey Potter (NYR, 2003) • MSU head coach Rick Comley enters the season, his fourth at MSU and 33rd of his legendary career, in sole possession of sixth place on the all-time coaching wins list in Division I hockey, with 663. He needs just 12 victories to pass former Clarkson and Boston College head coach Len Ceglarski for fifth place all-time, but still has a ways to catch the NCAA's all-time winningest bench boss, Ron Mason, who earned 924 victories in his illustrious career • Miller has been selected to captain the team. Miller, an assistant last season, is the 10th member of his family to don the Green and White. Joining Miller for his season as an assistant captain is SR D Jared Nightingale, along with Potter and Fretter.

BOWLING GREEN



Head Coach: Scott Paluch (3rd season)
2004-05 Overall Record: 16-16-4
2004-05 Conference Record: 13-12-3/5th

"I think for the first time in awhile we return a lot of productive players, guys who have proven themselves in scoring in this league. We have 84 percent of our production returning this year. We also have our two leading scoring offensive defensemen back, Michael Hodgson and Don Morrison." Scott Paluch said at Media Day.

The Falcons will host Windsor on Monday (Oct. 3) to open the exhibition season. On Oct. 8, they will play their annual intrasquad game, before playing host to Merrimack College (Oct. 14) and Boston College (Oct. 15) to open the 2005-06 season • The Falcons are coming off their best season in nearly a decade. BGSU had a fifth-place finish and recorded 13 league victories in 2004-05. As a result, the Brown and Orange hosted a CCHA Playoff series for the first time since 1995 • SO F Alex Foster, SO F Jonathan Matsumoto and SR F Brett Pilkington formed the first trio in seven years to tally 30 or more points in a single-season last year. Matsumoto led the team with 32 points, followed by Foster with 31 and Pilkington with a career-high 30. The last trio to have 30-plus points in a season were Dan Price (53), Adam Edinger (48), and Ryan Murphy (33) in 1998-99 • Matsumoto and Foster became the first Falcon freshmen tandem with 30-or-more points in a season since Greg Parks (42) and Clarke Pineo (30) in 1985-86. Matsumoto had a team-high 32 points (18g, 14a) while Foster had 31 points (8g, 23 a) • Matsumoto also became just the third Falcon to lead BGSU in scoring in his freshman season. The Orleans, Ontario, native tallied a team-high 32 points last season, joining George McPhee (1978-79; 88 pts.) and Gerry Bradbury (1970-71; 52 pts.) as the only other Falcon frosh to lead the team in scoring.

MIAMI



Head Coach: Enrico Blasi (7th Season)
2004-05 Overall Record: 15-18-5
2004-05 Conference Record: 11-13-4/7th

"This year marks a very special year for Miami hockey. It's the last season in the Goggin Ice Arena. There's some mixed emotion, but we have lots of festivities that will go around leading up to our last regular-season game versus Bowling Green. We move into our new building in May across campus and I know everybody is really excited about it around campus and in our community." Enrico Blasi said at Media Day.

After beating Windsor, 4-1, in an exhibition game on Sunday, the RedHawks open the regular season in the Lefty McFadden Invitational in Dayton, Ohio • Miami's first game is against 2005 national runner-up North Dakota on Oct. 8 • The Red and White return 16 letterwinners from last year's squad, including its top three scorers in JR F Matt Christie (15-21-36), JR F Marty Guerin (15-19-34) and SR D Andy Greene (7-27-34) • Greene was a pre-season All-CCHA First Team selection this season after being a second-team all-American and the CCHA's Best Offensive Defenseman last year • Head coach Enrico Blasi enters his seventh season behind the Miami bench and needs just 18 victories to become the school's all-time winningest hockey coach • Two RedHawks were selected in the 2005 NHL Draft • SO F Nathan Davis was selected in the fourth round by the Chicago Blackhawks while FR F Justin Mercier was picked in the sixth round by Colorado • Greene is Miami's captain for the second year in a row • The team's assistant captains are SR F Matt Davis, SR D Stephen Dennis and SO F Ryan Jones.

NOTRE DAME

"I have always looked at Notre Dame as a sleeping giant as far as hockey programs go, and I am hoping to be part of the wake-up call. It has such a great tradition, both as an university and an athletic department so now it's time for the hockey program to take the next step forward." Jeff Jackson said at Media Day.

Notre Dame head coach Jeff Jackson, who returns to the CCHA for the first time since the 1995-96 season with Lake Superior State, welcomed 29 players to the first practice of the season on Saturday, Oct. 1 at 8:30 a.m. The Irish roster includes 20 monogram winners from the 2004-05 team and has six seniors, nine juniors, eight sophomores and six freshmen. In Jackson's six seasons at Lake Superior State (1990-96), his teams were 182-52-25 overall (.751), won two NCAA titles (1992 and 1994), two CCHA regular-season titles and four CCHA playoff championships. His .751 winning percentage is tops among NCAA active coaches with five or more seasons behind the bench • Jackson and his coaching staff, which includes former Providence College head coach Paul Pooley, 13-year Notre Dame assistant Andy Slaggert and new volunteer assistant coach Jim Montgomery will get their first opportunity to see the Irish in action on Saturday, Oct. 8 at 7:05 p.m., in the annual Blue-Gold game at the Joyce Center. Notre Dame's lone preseason game of the year comes on Friday, Oct. 14 when the Irish play host to the University of Waterloo in a 7:35 p.m. contest • Joining the Notre Dame staff as a volunteer assistant coach is former University of Maine standout Montgomery ('93), who retired after 12 seasons of professional hockey, including stints with St. Louis, Montreal, Philadelphia, San Jose and Dallas. As a college player, Montgomery finished his career ranked fourth all-time in the NCAA in assists (198) and points (301) and teamed with Paul Kariya to lead Maine to the 1993 NCAA championship over Jackson's Lakers. In the title game, Montgomery scored three goals in a little over five minutes in the third period to rally the Black Bears from a 4-2 deficit on the way to a 5-4 win. He was named the Frozen Four's MVP that year.

OHIO STATE

The Buckeyes open the 2005-06 season with an exhibition game on Friday against Western Ontario at 7:05 p.m. in Value City Arena. The squad's regular-season begins with a two-game series at 2005 NCAA Frozen Four participant Colorado College Oct. 14-15 • Ohio State is 8-2 all-time against Western Ontario, with the series stretching from 1972-1990. The squads last met Dec. 28, 1990 in the Riverfront Invitational in Cincinnati, a 5-3 UWO victory. OSU's last wins against the school were Jan. 9-10, 1987, a two-game sweep (4-3, 7-0) in Columbus • The Buckeyes return 23-of-26 players and 21-of-24 letterwinners from the 2004-05 squad that went 27-11-4, reached the NCAA tournament and finished second in both the CCHA regular-season standings with a 21-5-2 ledger and in the league tournament • Ohio State returns its top-six scorers, led by SO F Tom Fritsche, who had 45 points and a team-best 34 assists last season. OSU also returns its top goal scorers from a year ago, including JR F Mathieu Beaudoin and SR F Rod Pelley, who led the team with 23 and 22 goals, respectively • The Buckeyes were picked to finish first in the CCHA in both the preseason coaches and media polls. Welch will serve as team captain • Ferris State's freshmen class this season has been ranked 10th best in the nation by *Inside College Hockey*. FR F Dan Riedel was listed seventh among the forwards while FR G Mitch O'Keefe ranked eighth in goaltending. FR D Chris Zarb was 11th on the defensemen's top-15 list • Dave Cencer has been named the Bulldogs' administrative assistant and video coordinator. A native of Big Rapids, Mich., Cencer spent the last two seasons (2003-04 and 2004-05) performing video work for Ferris Hockey on a voluntary basis • 59.3% of Ferris State's 2005-06 roster is comprised of underclassmen -- seven sophomores and nine freshmen.
