CCHA ESSENTIAL - "Need to know" items from this week in the Central Collegiate Hockey Association.

Alaska Fairbanks- The Nanooks open the season this Friday at the University of Minnesota and head coach Don Lucia, who manned the UAF bench from 1987-93. The three members of the current Fairbanks coaching staff, including head coach Tavis MacMillan, all played under Lucia during the 1992-93 season.

Bowling Green- Senior defenseman Don Morrison will wear the 'C' for the Falcons this season. He is also the first player to have the letter all to himself since the 1987-88 campaign when current head coach Scott Paluch was the team's lone captain.

Ferris State- Junior defenseman Jeremy Scherlinck, who has 1-22-23 in 78 career outings, returns to the Bulldogs lineup this season. He missed all of last season with a back problem.

Lake Superior- Sophomore defenseman Derek A. Smith enjoyed a six-point weekend for the Lakers in a pair of exhibition games. He had two goals and two assists in Friday's 5-1 win over York University before adding a pair of helpers in Saturday's 4-3 loss to the U.S. NTDP U-18 Team.

Miami- Freshman goalie Jeff Zatkoff earned his first collegiate win in shutout fashion Sunday, making 19 saves in a 4-0 win against Wayne State at the fourth annual Lefty McFadden Invitational.

Michigan- Junior defenseman Matt Hunwick recorded the second hat trick of his career on Saturday in a 5-3 victory over Quinnipiac. He also added two assists for the first five-point game by a Wolverine since Mike Comrie recorded 1-4-5 against Ohio State on Nov. 5, 1999.

Michigan State- The Spartans, who beat Wayne State, 5-1, and blanked North Dakota, 3-0, at the Lefty McFadden Tournament in Dayton, Ohio, have won their first two regular-season games for the first time since the 1997-98 campaign.

Nebraska-Omaha- The Mavericks look to defend their Mutual of Omaha Maverick Stampede title this weekend. UNO captured its first Stampede title in five years with a 4-1 win over Connecticut and a 4-3 victory against Merrimack last season.

Northern Michigan- Senior forward Dirk Southern scored 31 seconds into Friday's 4-3 win over the U.S. NTDP U-18 Team and, on Saturday, senior forward Andrew Contois scored 21 seconds into a 9-2 victory over York.

Notre Dame- The Irish will be the final CCHA team to get an exhibition test when they play host to Canadian opponent Waterloo this coming Friday, Oct. 14.

Ohio State- The Buckeyes No. 3 (tie) ranking in the *USA Today/USA Hockey Magazine* preseason poll is the highest since the rating system debuted in 1995-96. They had ascended to the No. 6 slot at various times during the 2002-03, 2003-04 and 2004-05 seasons.

Western Michigan- Former Bronco defenseman Derek Schooley brings the Robert Morris Colonials to Lawson Ice Arena this coming Friday for the first of two non-conference tests that Jim Culhane's squad will get before opening CCHA play at home against preseason favorite Ohio State on Oct. 28-29.

CCHA- Three former CCHA skaters made their NHL debut on Oct. 5 in Detroit's 5-1 win over St. Louis. Red Wings defenseman Brett Lebda (Notre Dame) scored in that game, Blues defenseman Andy Roach (Ferris State) got his first NHL goal the next night in a 4-3 loss in the rematch while Blues forward Jeff Hoggan (Nebraska-Omaha) recorded his first NHL marker in Saturday's 7-6 loss to San Jose.

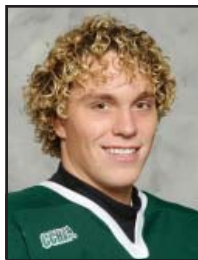

ALASKA FAIRBANKS AT MINNESOTA

The Nanooks open the regular season on the road against WCHA powerhouse Minnesota and coach Don Lucia, who manned the UAF bench from 1987-93 and mentored UAF's current head coach Tavis MacMillan, and assistants Wade Klippenstein, and Dallas Ferguson during the 1992-93 season. The schools have met just twice previously with the Golden Gophers posting a 4-0 shutout win at the Nissan Jeep Classic in Anchorage on Dec. 20, 1986, and a 4-3 victory in Minneapolis on Jan. 3, 1989. KFXF Fox Channel 7 Fairbanks and FSN North will show both games live.

COLGATE AT LAKE SUPERIOR

The Lakers are 0-3-0 in the all-time series against the Red Raiders, including a pair of one-goal losses, 3-2 and 2-1 (overtime), during a trip to Hamilton, N.Y., last Oct. 15-16.

OHIO STATE AT COLORADO COLLEGE

Ohio State opens the regular season with a two-game series at Colorado College, a 2005 NCAA Frozen Four participant. The teams have met twice before. The Tigers recorded an 8-0 home-ice win on Feb. 9, 1968. Last season in the Ohio Hockey Classic at Nationwide Arena in Columbus Dec. 30, JR D Sean Collins scored with less than five minutes remaining to lift Ohio State to a 2-all tie. The Tigers won the inaugural tournament title with a 3-2 win in the shootout.

ST. CLOUD AT NORTHERN MICHIGAN

These two teams are meeting to start the regular season for a second straight year. Last season, on Oct. 15-16 at St. Cloud, Minn., the Huskies took the opener, 2-1, with the 'Cats prevailing, 4-2, in the Saturday night rematch.

MAVERICK STAMPEDE

Nebraska-Omaha looks to capture its second consecutive Mutual of Omaha Maverick Stampede title this weekend, Oct. 14-15, at Qwest Center Omaha. Last year, UNO captured its first Maverick Stampede title in five years with a 4-3 victory over Merrimack on Sunday night. The tournament field includes Army of Atlantic Hockey, No. 9 New Hampshire of Hockey East and CCHA teams Ferris State and host Nebraska-Omaha. FSU will face off against New Hampshire in the first game on Saturday, Oct. 14 at 5 p.m., followed by Nebraska-Omaha vs. Army at 8 p.m. The Bulldogs are 15-14-2 all-time in regular-season tournament outings. FSU head coach Bob Daniels sports an 11-7-0 record in tourney play.

BOSTON COLLEGE AT MICHIGAN

The Wolverines are 8-6-0 all-time versus Boston College. However, U-M has lost its last four games and six of the last seven to the Eagles dating back to 1988. The only win for U-M during the span came on April 4, 1998 when Michigan beat B.C. in overtime for the the national title. In December of 2000 and 2003, Boston College beat U-M in the Great Lakes Invitational. The Eagles knocked the Wolverines out of the NCAA Tournament in 2001 and 2004.

MERRIMACK AT BOWLING GREEN

The Falcons are 2-1-0 in regular-season openers under head coach Scott Paluch, including a 5-1 win at Union College last season.

WESTERN ONTARIO AT MICHIGAN STATE

The Mustangs of Western Ontario enter Friday evening's contest at Munn Ice Arena with a 2-3-0 record in exhibition play. Recently, the Mustangs knocked off CCHA member Ferris State, 4-3, at Ewingleben Ice Arena, in Big Rapids. Western goaltender Brad Topping made 49 stops in that game.

Jerry York, the winningest coach in Falcons history with a 342-248-31 record from 1979-94, returns to face the school he led to the 1984 national championship.

THIS WEEK IN CCHA HISTORY

Three years ago this week, on October 12, 2002, after successful coaching stints with Lake Superior State and Northern Michigan, Michigan State head coach Rick Comley posts his first win behind the Spartan bench in a 2-1 victory over Colgate at the Maverick Stampede tournament in Omaha, Nebraska. After starting his collegiate coaching career by replacing Ron Mason at Lake Superior, Comley brings 597 career victories to East Lansing, in replacing the CCHA Playoff Championship trophy namesake for the second time in his career, three years ago.

JR D and team captain Jordan Hendry was back in the Nanooks lineup on Saturday night for an exhibition game against Windsor for the first time since sustaining a season-ending knee injury on Oct. 23, 2004, during the first game of the 2004-05 Governor's Cup series. Hendry scored at 14:08 of the second period and was on the ice for two-of-four other UAF markers • The Nanooks beat the visiting Lancers, 5-2, at the Carlson Center. Four skaters had multi-point games, while seven more registered a point. All three UAF captains, Hendry, JR F Curtis Fraser and JR F Lucas Burnett had a point as well as three rookies, FR D Tyler Eckford, FR F Kyle Jones and FR F Adam Naglich • All three UAF goalies SO Wylie Rogers, and FR Chad Johnson and FR Brandon Cross, backstopped a period against Windsor.
