CCHA ESSENTIAL - "Need to know" items from this week in the Central Collegiate Hockey Association.

Alaska Fairbanks- The Nanooks evened the four-game Governor's Cup series on Saturday with a 6-0 win over Alaska Anchorage. It was their most lopsided win over the Seawolves in an intrastate rivalry that covers 123 games and dates back to 1979.

Bowling Green- Senior goalie Jordan Sigalet, who made 60 saves in a weekend road sweep of Union College, moved ahead of former NHLer Mike Liut and into fifth place on the Falcons' career saves list with 2,244 stops.

Ferris State- The Bulldogs' 7-2 win at Bemidji State on Saturday snapped a 10-game losing streak that started back on Feb. 28 when they dropped a 4-2 home-ice decision to Lake Superior State.

Lake Superior- The Lakers power play has gone 6-for-30 during the first four games of the season and is ranked fifth overall in the CCHA. They managed six power-play markers in their first 11 games of last season.

Miami- The streak is over for sophomore goalie Brandon Crawford-West, who was between the pipes for a 2-1 home-ice loss to Ohio State on Friday. The Pittsburgh draft pick had gone 15-0-2 at Goggin Ice Arena prior to suffering his first loss there.

Michigan- Red Berenson, in his 21st season behind the Wolverines bench, moved into sole possession of 10th place on college hockey's career wins list at 537 victories on Saturday night when Michigan defeated Lake Superior State, 5-2.

Michigan State- Prior to this weekend's sweep at NMU, the last time the Spartans were swept on the road was Nov. 15-16, 2002 when Ohio State took a pair in Columbus, posting 5-2 and 4-1 wins, in Rick Comley's first season as the Spartans' head coach.

Nebraska-Omaha- The Mavericks beat visiting Western Michigan, 4-3 in overtime on Saturday, for their fourth home-ice victory of the season. They won just five games at Qwest Center Omaha all of last season when they posted a 5-11-3 mark at home.

Northern Michigan- The Wildcats beat visiting Michigan State, 3-2 and 4-1 on the weekend, for their first two-game sweep of the Spartans since the 1982-83 season when they took a pair in East Lansing, Mich. Third-year coach Walt Kyle owns a 7-3-0 mark against the man he replaced, MSU's Rick Comley.

Notre Dame- The Irish's win over Boston College marked the second consecutive year that the Irish defeated the Eagles when they were ranked No. 1 in the nation. Friday's win was the eighth time that Notre Dame defeated a top-ranked team in the program's history.

Ohio State- The Buckeyes' 4-0-0 start to conference play marks the first time they've began conference action with four straight wins since the 1983-84 squad roared out of the gate with a 10-0-0 mark. That team finished tied for the second in the CCHA standings with a 21-9-0 record.

Western Michigan- The 'Lawson Lunatics' section will make its debut this Friday when the Broncos play host to clustermate Ohio State. The Lunatics, adorned in special t-shirts and occupying Sections 17 & 19, are an organized student support group for Bronco Hockey.

CCHA- Ferris State defeated Bemidji State of College Hockey America, 7-2, on Saturday in the Commissioners' Cup series debut for the CCHA. The Commissioners' Cup sees each of the six conferences participating in seven designated inter-conference contests. The next test is this coming Friday when Miami faces off at St. Lawrence of the ECACHL.

Pelley (3-2-5) had a goal and two assists in Thursday's 9-3 home-ice win over Miami and then scored both goals, on the power play, in Friday's 2-1 road victory over the RedHawks.

Defenseman

Matt Waddell, OSU So. (Armstrong, B.C.)

Waddell had two goals and an assist in Thursday's 9-3 win over Miami and helped thwart all 20 power-play chances the RedHawks had during the Buckeyes' two-game sweep.

Goaltender

Morgan Cey, ND Sr. (Wilkie, SK)

Cey made a career-high 50 saves, including 28 on 11 Boston College power plays, as the Irish upended the No. 1 ranked Eagles, 3-2.

Rookie

Jonathan Matsumoto, BGSU F (Orleans, ON)

Matsumoto (2-2-4, +2) had a goal and two assists in his collegiate debut on Friday as the Falcons won, 5-1, at Union, and scored the lone goal in Saturday's 1-0 victory.

CCHA Notable Performers

Jordan Sigalet, BGSU, SR, G (Surrey, BC): Sigalet blocked 60-of-61 shots (.984) and was the first star each night as the Falcons took two games at Union College, 5-1 and 1-0.

T.J. Hensick, UM, SO, F (Howell, MI): Hensick (1-3-4), who has at least one point in all six games this season, had a goal and two assists in Saturday's 5-2 win over LSSU at Joe Louis Arena.

Scott Parse, UNO, SO, F (Portage, MI): Parse (2-3-5) helped the Mavs get off to the best start in program history with a five-point weekend, including 1-2-3 in Saturday's 4-3 win over WMU.

Jamie Milam, NMU, JR, F (Lake Orion, MI): Milam, a converted defenseman, had an assist in Friday's win over MSU and was Saturday's second star with two goals and an assist in a second win.

Wylie Rogers, UAF, FR, G (Fairbanks, AK): Rogers blocked all 21 shots he faced in his college debut as the Nanooks blanked Alaska Anchorage 6-0 in a Governor's Cup series game.

Carter Thomson, FSU, SR, F (Milden, SK): Thomson (1-2-3) scored in the Bulldogs 5-2 loss at Bemidji State on Friday before getting a goal and an assist in Saturday's 7-2 win.

Wes O'Neill, ND, SO, D (Essex, ON): O'Neill scored a power-play goal and assisted on the shorthanded winner with 15 seconds to play as the Irish downed top-ranked Boston College, 3-2.

Mike Erickson, WMU, JR, F (Eden Prairie, MN): Erickson (2-2-4) had a goal and an assist each night in the Broncos' road losses at Nebraska-Omaha.

Eric Werner, UM, SR, D (Grosse Pointe Woods, MI): Werner (1-2-3) picked up two assists in Thursday's 4-3 road win over LSSU and added his second goal of the season in Saturday's 5-2 victory.

Clayton Lainsbury, NMU, FR, F (Courtney, BC): Lainsbury scored his first two college goals, including a shorthanded gamewinner in Friday's 3-2 decision over Michigan State.

Matt McIlvane, OSU, FR, F (Naperville, IL): McIlvane had a team-high goal and three assists for his first college points in the Buckeyes' 9-3 win over Miami on Thursday.

Bryan Marshall, UNO, FR, F (Livonia, MI): Marshall (1-3-4) collected a goal and an assist in Friday's 7-3 win over WMU, and added two assists in Saturday's 4-3 overtime victory over the Broncos.

Tuomas Tarkki, NMU, SR, G (Rauma, Finland): Tarkki blocked 37-of-38 shots and was named first star in Saturday's 4-1 victory over Michigan State.

Dave Caruso, OSU, JR, G (Roswell, GA): Caruso blocked 59-of-63 shots (.937) in a sweep of Miami and did not allow a power-play goal on 20 RedHawk chances.

T.J. Jindra, ND, SO, F (Faribault, MN): Jindra scored a shorthanded, game-winning goal with 15 seconds left in regulation time to give the Irish a 3-2 win over Boston College.

THIS WEEK'S MATCHUPS

Friday & Saturday

FERRIS VS MICHIGAN (HOME-AND-HOME)

Four of the past five home-and-home encounters between the Bulldogs and Wolverines have resulted in a series split with the home team boasting a 7-2-0 mark in those nine outings. The Wolverines lead the all-time series 9-24-1, including a 29-9-0 mark at Yost Ice Arena. Last season, the Bulldogs won in overtime, 6-5, at home on Friday night, with the Wolverines prevailing, 3-2, in the Ann Arbor rematch. Fourteen of the past 19 meetings have been decided by two goals or less, with Michigan holding an 8-45-1 advantage in those games. FSU senior forward Jeff Legue has a team-high 3-9-12 in seven career games against Michigan.

LAKE SUPERIOR AT BOWLING GREEN

The Falcons lead the all-time series 66-53-7, including a 38-18-4 advantage at home and 4-3-4 mark in the past 10 meetings. Last season's four-game series resulted in a home-ice win and tie for each squad, including a pair of 0-0 ties. Saturday's game is a 2:35 p.m. start.

NEBRASKA-OMAHA AT MICHIGAN STATE

The Mavericks trail the all-time series with the Spartans 4-11-0. Michigan State has scored 19 straight goals, winning the last four games between the teams in East Lansing. They include shutouts on Jan. 18, 2003 (7-0), Feb. 20, 2004 (3-0) and Feb. 21, 2004 (5-0). Nebraska-Omaha's last victory over the Spartans came on October 27, 2001. The last Maverick victory at Munn Ice Arena occurred on October 20, 2000. SO F Micah Sanford is the only player on the Maverick roster who has recorded a point against Michigan State, an even-strength goal on January 17, 2003.

NORTHERN MICHIGAN AT NOTRE DAME

The Irish and Wildcats have met 30 times in the all-time series with Northern Michigan holding a 16-10-4 edge, including an 8-7-2 record in 17 games at the Joyce Center. The two teams met four times last season with each team sweeping the series on home ice. In late November, the Irish won 5-1 and 4-2 at the Joyce Center, while Northern won in Marquette, 4-3 in overtime and 1-0. NMU's last win at Notre Dame was on Jan. 12, 2002, a 4-0 shutout by Craig Kowalski. Junior forward Mike Walsh (1-4-5 in six games) and senior forward Cory McLean (1-4-5 in 11 games) are Notre Dame's top two returning scorers versus the Wildcats. Sophomore goalie David Brown was 2-1-0 last year versus NMU with a 1.33 goals-against average and a .943 save percentage.

OHIO STATE AT WESTERN MICHIGAN

This marks the Buckeyes' third straight series against a cluster opponent to open the season. So far, OSU is 4-0-0 after going 4-8-0 last season against clustermates Miami, Michigan and Michigan State. Ohio State trails the all-time series with the Broncos, 52-57-8, and trails in games played in Kalamazoo, 22-29-4. In the last 10, however, OSU is 7-3-0 against the Broncos and 8-2-1 in its last 11 games in Kalamazoo. OSU had a six-game winning streak against WMU stopped in the first meeting last season, as the Broncos posted a 4-1 win. OSU rebounded for a 5-1 win the next night. SR F JB Bittner leads the Buckeyes with 2-3-5 against Western Michigan.

MIAMI AT ST. LAWRENCE

Miami and St. Lawrence are meeting for the eighth and ninth times since the series started in 1994. The RedHawks own a 5-2-0 lead in the series, including a 1-1-0 mark in Appleton Arena. Former Miami head coach and current Sr. Associate A.D. Steve Cady is a St. Lawrence grad. If Miami is known as college football's Cradle of Coaches developing Bo Schembechler and Ara Parseghian, St. Lawrence is college hockey's version, having produced Ron Mason, Bill Wilkinson, Mike Keenan, Jacques Martin and Cady.

BRITISH COLUMBIA AT ALASKA FAIRBANKS

The Nanooks welcome the University of British Columbia Thunderbirds for a two-game set this weekend. The contests are considered exhibition games by the NCAA and results do not count in official NCAA statistics. The Nanooks have faced off against UBC three times previously and hold a 1-1-1 record. The T-Birds won 11-3 at UAF on March 23, 1980 but the Nanooks exacted revenge, 3-1, at UBC on Dec. 29 of that year. The teams skated to a tie in their last encounter, which occurred on Dec. 30, 1988. UAF is the only American college team that UBC will face this year, stepping out of their Canadian conference play to join in the exhibition series. Former UAF Nanook Casey Bartzten will return to the Carlson Center in a Thunderbird jersey this weekend. He played in 34 games as a freshman in the 1999-00 season for the Nanooks, recording a 3-7-10 line. Bartzten is in his fifth year with UBC.

FR G Wylie Rogers made his collegiate debut for the Nanooks Saturday night, turning away 21 shots and keeping the Seawolves scoreless through three periods of play. Rogers is the first Nanook to record a shutout in his college debut • Six different Nanooks scored in Saturday night's victory in Anchorage. Half of those markers came from UAF's freshman class as F's Troy Newton, Aaron Lee and Ryan McLeod notched their first collegiate goals • Despite losing on Friday night to UAA, the Nanooks outshot the Seawolves 38-20. UAF's top offensive line (FR Kyle Greentree, SO Curtis Fraser and JR Kelly Czuy) accounted for 19 of the Nanooks' shots on goal • The Nanooks improved their special teams production, getting a pair of power-play goals in Saturday's contest (2-for-7) and killing off all four of the Seawolves chances. He added a power-play goal in Saturday's loss • JR F Colton Fretter has scored three goals in the past four games • SR F Kevin Estrada tallied his first goal of the season in Friday's 3-2 loss • The Spartans are second in the CCHA in penalty minutes per game, averaging 17.0 per game. Only six teams in the country average less penalty minutes than the Spartans. Comparatively, the national leader (Ohio State) is averaging 33.67 penalty minutes per game • State's penalty kill, which had stopped nine straight attempts heading into Saturday's game at NMU, allowed two first-period power-play markers as the Wildcats finished 3-for-8 with the man advantage • MSU hosts Nebraska-Omaha for a pair of games this weekend. State holds an 11-4 edge in the all-time series, including four straight wins. Hensick upped his season-long scoring streak to six games with a goal and three assists on the weekend. His line during the span is 2-7-9. The six-game scoring stretch sets a career high. He had a five-game scoring stretch last season from Jan. 24-Feb. 7, 2004, in which he tallied 2-8-10 • JR G Al Montoya notched his seventh and eighth career wins against the Lakers (8-0-0). LSSU remains the only CCHA team that has not beaten or tied Montoya in his career • The Wolverines head into a home-and-home set with Ferris State for the sixth consecutive season. U-M has swept the weekend series just one time during the span on Nov. 30, 2001 at FSU and at home on Dec. 1, 2001 • Montoya has had more trouble with the Bulldogs than any other CCHA team. Montoya's goals-against average vs. FSU is 3.77 in five career games. His overall save percentage sits at .861. At Ewigleben Ice Arena, he is 0-2-0 with a 4.91 GAA and a .861 save percentage.

Parse has tallied at least one point in each of the Mavericks' first four games and leads UNO in scoring with 2-7-9 • SR F Dan Hacker, JR F Mike Lefley and FR F Bill Thomas will also bring four-game point streaks with them to Michigan State for the Mavs upcoming road series • SO G Chris Holt is off to a 4-0-0 conference start with a 2.48 goals-against average and a .895 Spt. As a freshman, Holt went 1-3-0 in his first four starts with a 3.87 goals-against average and a .887 Spt. • The four wins at the Qwest Center this season are just one win shy of UNO's total number of wins from last season, when the team had a 5-11-3 record at home • Saturday's win was the first in overtime for the Mavs since they topped Massachusetts in an extra session on Oct. 27, 2002.

The nine tallies were OSU's most in conference play since scoring 10 goals against Illinois Chicago on Dec. 14, 1991 • Ohio State scored twice shorthanded on Thursday, the first time the team had two shorthanded scores in a game since Dave Steckel scored twice on Nov. 29, 2003 at Bowling Green • JR F Rod Pelley ended the series with Miami with 3-2-5. He had a 1-2-3 line Thursday and two power-play goals Friday. Pelley has posted 4-4-8 in his last three games against Miami. This season, Pelley has 5-3-8 totals in his last five games. Pelley is first in the CCHA with five power-play goals, his total from his first two college seasons.
