CCHA ESSENTIAL - "Need to know" items from this week in the Central Collegiate Hockey Association.

Alaska Fairbanks- Freshman goalie Wylie Rogers rebounded from being pulled on Friday to earn first-star honors on Saturday with 24 saves and to lead the Nanooks to their first win in 12 games at Northern Michigan, 2-1, and snap the Wildcats' 13-game home-ice unbeaten streak.

Bowling Green- The Falcons posted a 4-2 road win over Ferris State on Saturday to break a nine-game winless streak (0-7-2) against the Bulldogs and a seven-game slide (0-5-2) in Big Rapids.

Ferris State- Senior forward Jeff Legue picked up an assist in Saturday's 4-2 loss to Bowling Green to move into 13th place on the Bulldogs' career points list with 60-81-141 in 143 games. He moved past current LSSU assistant coach Tim Christian, who had 140 points in 148 games between 1991-95.

Lake Superior- The Lakers went 3-for-10 on the power play, suffering back-to-back home losses to Ohio State. Defenseman Ren Fauci's second-period power-play marker in Friday's 3-1 loss was their first with the man advantage in 51 opportunities, dating back to Dec. 9 at Nebraska-Omaha.

Miami- Freshman Nathan Davis scored his fourth shorthanded goal of the season in Saturday's 3-2 loss at Western Michigan. The Rocky River, Ohio, native leads the CCHA in that category and is also tied for the national lead.

Michigan- For the first time in their longstanding rivalry, the Wolverines and Michigan State skated to two ties in one weekend. The only other instance of consecutive ties occurred with a 3-3 draw in the Cold War on Oct. 6, 2001 followed by another tie, 1-1, on Jan. 19, 2002.

Michigan State- Despite battling the flu and practicing only sparingly last week, sophomore goalie Dominic Vicari stopped 82-of-85 shots (.965) in State's come-from-behind ties with arch-rival Michigan last weekend. Vicari has posted a 6-3-3 mark along with a 1.77 goals-against average and a .941 Spt. while starting 12 straight games.

Nebraska-Omaha- The Mavericks, who are 7-2-1 in their past 10 starts, started off the second half of the season with six straight conference road games and went 3-1-2. They gained twice as many road points during the stretch than they did all of last season when they went 1-11-2 away from home in conference play.

Northern Michigan- The Wildcats' 13-game home-ice undefeated streak ended with Saturday's 2-1 loss to Alaska Fairbanks. They swept Ferris State, Michigan State, Nebraska-Omaha and Bowling Green during the streak, posted single wins over Michigan Tech, Lake Superior and UAF while gaining a win and tie against Miami.

Notre Dame- Junior forward Tim Wallace, who hasn't missed a game in his career, extended his Irish "Iron Man" streak to 109 consecutive games played on the weekend. He is five behind the school record set by Evan Nielsen ('03) who played in 114 consecutive games.

Ohio State- The Buckeyes rank in the Top 8 in the nation in six team categories - scoring offense (3.53/8th), scoring defense (2.23/t-8th), scoring margin (+1.30/7th), power play (.230/7th), penalty kill (.874/4th) and winning percentage (.717/t-6th).

Western Michigan- Junior forward Brent Walton became the second Bronco this season to join the Century Club, recording his 100th career point Friday. Walton, who collected three assists on Saturday, has held the CCHA overall scoring lead for 12 weeks and trails Michigan's T.J. Hensick by just three points in the chase for the conference scoring title.

CCHA- It was a good weekend to be on the road in the CCHA. Led by Ohio State's sweep at Lake Superior State, visiting teams compiled a 6-2-3 record in 11 games for a .681 winning percentage. Heading into the weekend, CCHA teams had piled up a 66-35-14 mark at home in conference games for a .635 winning percentage. Saturday's 1-1 tie between Michigan and Michigan State at Joe Louis Arena, which attracted a crowd of 20,066 fans, counted as a neutral-site contest.

THIS WEEK'S MATCHUPS

Friday & Saturday

BOWLING GREEN AT OHIO STATE

The Buckeyes are on a seven-game winning streak against the Falcons, including five in a row at home. Last season, OSU went 4-0 against Bowling Green, posting wins at BGSU Ice Arena on Nov. 29, 2003 and Jan. 31, 2004 before sweeping the Falcons in the first round of the playoffs. Senior captain JB Bittner is OSU's leading scorer against BGSU with 4-6-10 in eight games.

FERRIS STATE AT NOTRE DAME

The Irish swept a Feb. 13-14 home series against the Bulldogs last season by scores of 4-2 and 4-1. The first victory snapped a five-game winless streak (0-3-2) for the Irish against the Bulldogs. A scheduling quirk has 13 of 15 meetings between these teams, including this series, taking place at the Joyce Centre, where the Bulldogs are 5-5-1 in their last 11 trips. Ferris State holds a 31-14-5 all-time series advantage over Notre Dame and is 17-8-3 on the road versus the Fighting Irish. Seniors Jeff Legue, with 5-3-8, and Derek Nesbitt, with 3-4-7, are Ferris State's top points leaders against Notre Dame in seven and eight games, respectively, while senior goalie Mike Brown is 3-3-1 with a 3.26 goals-against average and a .905 save percentage in seven career outings. Sophomore goaltender David Brown was in goal for both Irish wins last season, giving up three goals on 59 shots for a 1.50 goals-against average and a .949 save percentage.

LAKE SUPERIOR AT MIAMI

LSSU will try to snap a six-game losing streak against the RedHawks, and 10-game winless slide at Goggin Ice Arena, when they take to the ice against the RedHawks. LSSU's last victory at Goggin came on Dec. 14, 1996. Their last victory over Miami was 6-3 on Jan. 19, 2002, in Sault Ste. Marie. Last season, Miami swept the Lakers 4-0 and 2-1 in overtime during the first round of the CCHA playoffs, limiting LSSU to just 32 shots on goal in six periods. The RedHawks also swept an October series last season in Sault Ste. Marie, 5-2 and 2-1. LSSU leads the all-time series 49-23-10, but Miami holds a 17-15-6 edge at home.

MICHIGAN AT NEBRASKA-OMAHA

The Wolverines are making the trip to Omaha for a fifth straight season. They lost their first game there on Feb. 2, 2001, but are undefeated in the last seven games, with five victories and two ties, since that time. UNO officials are anticipating record crowds for this weekend's series at the 14,700-seat Qwest Center. Last year, UM came to Omaha and the teams drew 19,214 for the two games, with a record 10,034 on the second night. Michigan leads the all-time series 12-3-2. UNO snapped an 11-game winless streak against the Wolverines in last year's CCHA playoffs with a 3-1 win. Senior forward Eric Nystrom has registered 7-7-14 in 11 career games against UNO. Sophomore forward Scott Parse had 2-2-4 against the Wolverines in five games last season.

MICHIGAN STATE AT ALASKA FAIRBANKS

This weekend will mark a homecoming of sorts for MSU assistant coach Brian Renfrew. The Fairbanks, Alaska, native served as an assistant coach at UAF in 2000-01 and as the volunteer assistant coach in 1999-2000. The Spartans, who lead the overall series, 27-6-0, are making the trip to the Last Frontier for the second straight year. Last year, the Nanooks stole the Spartans' hearts in a 5-4 overtime victory on Feb. 13, but the Spartans took the Valentine's rematch, 3-2. Michigan State sports an 11-3-0 mark against the Nanooks in Fairbanks.

WESTERN MICHIGAN AT NORTHERN MICHIGAN

The past six meetings between these schools have taken place at the Berry Events Center, with the Wildcats holding a 5-1-0 record. Overall, NMU is 33-15-3 against the Broncos, including a 20-6-3 record in Marquette. They faced off at the Berry last February with the 'Cats taking a 3-2 decision on Friday and the Broncos coming back for a 6-2 victory on Saturday.

THIS WEEK IN CCHA HISTORY



On February 7, 1986, Michigan State's Mike Donnelly scored his 38th goal of the season to establish a new CCHA benchmark for goals in a season. Donnelly would score eight more regular-season goals to finish with 46. By season's end, he would also set a new standard for NCAA goals by notching 59, leading the Spartans to a national championship with a 6-5 victory over Harvard University, "This Week in CCHA History."

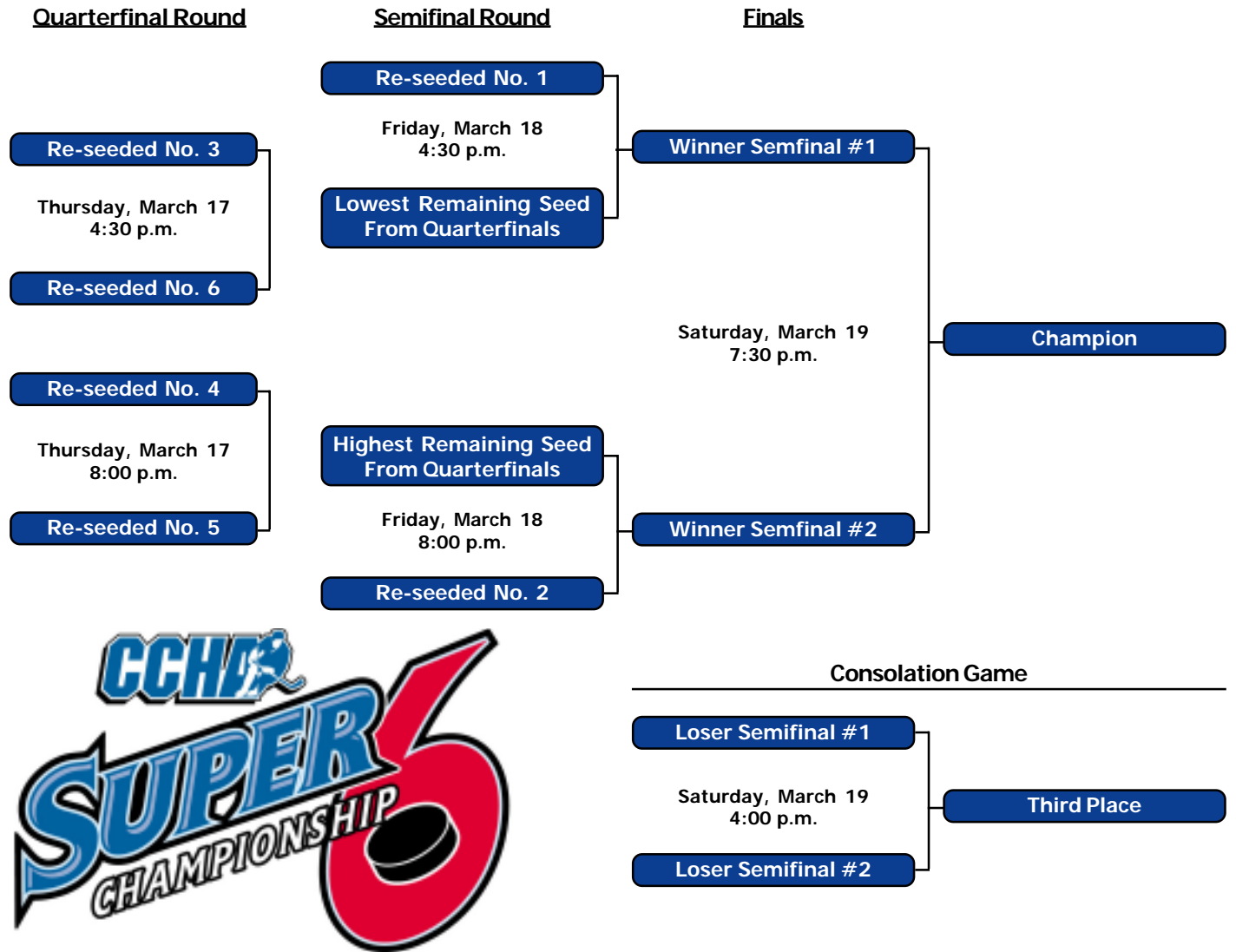

The CCHA Tournament begins with all 12 teams seeded based on the final regular-season standings. The top-six seeds will host a first-round, best-of-three series. The winners of the six first-round series will then advance to Joe Louis Arena for the CCHA Super Six Championship where they will be re-seeded based upon their regular-season finish. The top two remaining seeds will receive quarterfinal-round byes while the No. 3 seed will face the No. 6 seed and the No. 4 seed will take on the No. 5 seed. The lowest seed to advance from the quarterfinals will take on the No. 1 seed in the semifinals, while the No. 2 seed will play the other remaining team. The winners will then advance on to the CCHA Championship Game while the semifinal losers will play a third-place game prior to the championship contest. The winner of the CCHA Tournament will receive the league's automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament and the Ron Mason Cup.

NANOOKS SNAP WILDCATS' HOME WIN STREAK

FARMINGTON HILLS, Mich. - Alaska Fairbanks knocked off Northern Michigan, 2-1, dealing the Wildcats their first home loss of the season. Elsewhere in CCHA action on Saturday night, Ohio State pulled to within one point of first place completing a sweep of LSSU with a 3-2 overtime win, Bowling Green took three points out of Big Rapids, beating Ferris State, 4-2. Western Michigan bounced back to split with Miami, Michigan State scored a late goal to tie up Michigan for the second straight night, and Nebraska-Omaha doubled up Notre Dame, 6-3.

At Marquette, Mich., Alaska Fairbanks bounced back to earn a split with Northern Michigan, backstopped by a 24-save performance from freshman goalie Wylie Rogers. The Nanooks managed just 15 shots, but pulled out a 2-1 road victory with a pair of first period goals by senior forward Jared Vockeroth and junior forward Kelly Czuy. Jamie Milam's power-play tally brought NMU within one 5:21 into the third period, but the Wildcats could not find the equalizer, losing at home for the first time this season.

At Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., sophomore forward Bryce Anderson beat Laker goaltender Jeff Jakaitis just 1:04 into overtime to give Ohio State a 3-2 overtime win at Taffy Abel Arena. On the play, freshman forward Tom Fritsche recorded his team-leading 25th assist of the season. Junior Dave Caruso had to make just 11 saves, improving to 18-5-3 between the pipes for the Buckeyes this season. Eight different players registered points for OSU.
