**CCHA ESSENTIAL - "Need to know" items from this week in the Central Collegiate Hockey Association.**

**Alaska Fairbanks-** Freshman goalie Wylie Rogers made 39 saves on Saturday in a 1-0 win over Michigan State for his third shutout of the season. That ties the Nanooks' single-season shutout mark established 14 years ago by Todd Henderson.

**Bowling Green-** The Falcons play host to Western Michigan on Feb. 18-19 during "MS Awareness Weekend at BGSU Ice Arena." The team will also hold the annual "Skate with the Falcons" on Sunday evening, starting at 7 o'clock.

**Ferris State-** The Bulldogs, who won twice at Notre Dame last weekend, snapped their longest winless streak (0-6-2) in 13 years with Friday's 4-3 win over the Irish. The team was last winless in eight games (0-4-4) from Nov. 23, 1991 through Jan. 10, 1992.

**Lake Superior-** The Lakers got two goals and an assist from junior forward Nathan Ward in a 3-2 win at Miami on Friday for their first victory in Oxford, Ohio, since March 2, 1996. They went 0-9-1 at Goggin Ice Arena in 10 games between wins.

**Miami-** Junior defenseman Andy Greene led the charge with two goals and three assists as the RedHawks went 6-for-7 on the power play in an 8-3 victory over Lake Superior State on Saturday. They became the 22nd team in NCAA history to score a half-dozen power-play markers in a game. The record of eight is shared by Maine and Alabama-Huntsville.

**Michigan-** Red Berenson picked up the 555th victory of his college career on Saturday when the Wolverines beat Nebraska-Omaha, 6-4. He is now tied with John MacInnes (Michigan Tech) for eighth place on the all-time college coaching wins list.

**Michigan State-** Third-period goals by junior David Booth at 4:36 and freshman Bryan Lerg at 4:41 in Friday's 6-5 overtime loss at Fairbanks set a new MSU record for fastest two goals by two players. The previous record was six seconds, set on Feb. 21, 1987, by Bruce Rendall and Bill Shibicky against Ohio State.

**Nebraska-Omaha-** The Mavericks, swept at home for the first time in seven series, still drew a UNO all-time series record of 19,756 fans over the weekend. Saturday's game against Michigan set a Qwest Center record with 10,415 fans in attendance.

**Northern Michigan-** The Wildcats scored three short-handed and two power-play goals in a win and tie against visiting Western Michigan. Junior forward Andrew Contois has two of their seven 'shorties' this season.

**Notre Dame-** The upcoming two-game set against Michigan represents the 14th and 15th games of the season for the Irish against nationally-ranked teams. They a 1-10-2 through the first 13 games with the lone win coming against No. 1 Boston College in October.

**Ohio State-** The Buckeyes have clinched at least second place in the CCHA with their 19-4-1 record and 39 points. They have not finished as high as second in the final CCHA standings since 1983 and 1984 when they wound up tied for second spot in each of those years.

**Western Michigan-** The Broncos have faced goalies with the four-lowest goals-against averages in the CCHA (NMU's Tuomas Tarkki, MIA's Brandon Crawford-West, OSU's Dave Caruso and MSU's Dominic Vicari) on successive weekends. Up next is Bowling Green's Jordan Sigalet, the All-Conference First-Team netminder from last season.

**CCHA-** Senior goalies Tuomas Tarkki of Northern Michigan and Jordan Sigalet of Bowling Green are the top-two vote getters in preliminary balloting for the Hobey Baker Award. Tarkki has garnered more than 27 thousand votes and Sigalet over 22 thousand votes so far at www.hobeybaker.com. The fans' tally will be considered along with votes from each of the 58 Division I head coaches to determine the 10 finalists for this year's award.

## THIS WEEK'S MATCHUPS

### Thursday & Saturday

#### NORTHERN MICHIGAN VS MICHIGAN TECH (HOME-AND-HOME)

Bragging rights to U.P. supremacy between the CCHA and the WCHA, as well as the Ramada Cup, are on the line as the Wildcats and Huskies complete a four-game regular-season series with a game on Thursday at the Berry Events Center following by a Saturday night rematch at the MacInnes Student Ice Arena. The two teams met in November as they tied in Houghton, 6-6, and the 'Cats won in Marquette, 6-3. The Huskies are 6-3-1 in their past 10 outings in WCHA action while the Wildcats have gone 6-2-2 in CCHA play. Four of the past six games between the two teams have gone into overtime. NMU leads the overall series with a 54-43-9 slate, including a 29-17-3 mark in Marquette.

### Friday & Saturday

#### WESTERN MICHIGAN AT BOWLING GREEN

This weekend's series pairs two schools with lengthy tenures in the CCHA. Bowling Green hasn't missed a CCHA campaign since becoming a charter member in 1971-72, while Western Michigan is embarking on its 30th CCHA campaign. The Broncos trail only Bowling Green and Lake Superior State in terms of continuous league membership. After 112 meetings, BGSU leads all-time, 63-45-4, in a series that dates to February, 1974. WMU, which has met BGSU more times than any other opponent, sports a 13-5-1 series record over the past six seasons.

#### NEBRASKA-OMAHA AT LAKE SUPERIOR

The Mavericks are playing their final regular-season conference road series while the Lakers are hosting their last regular-season home series. LSSU has split its past two series against the Mavs in Omaha but is looking for its first home victory over UNO since November, 2000. Earlier this season, the Lakers won 5-2 on Dec. 9 at Qwest Center Omaha with junior forward Jon Booras scoring twice. The rematch was on Dec. 11 with freshman defenseman Joe Grimaldi scoring twice and assisting on another goal in a 5-1 win by the home team. UNO leads the all-time series, 7-5-0, thanks in part to a 92.4 percent success rate on the penalty kill (61-of-66). The series is tied, 2-2-0, when playing in Sault Ste. Marie. LSSU is 5-6-3 on home ice this season, while UNO has a road record of 4-8-2. Mavs captain Mike Lefley has 4-2-6 in six career games against the Lakers.

#### MICHIGAN VS NOTRE DAME

It's an unusual home-and-home series that sees Friday's "home" game for the Irish being played at the 10,503-seat Allen County Memorial Coliseum in Ft. Wayne, Ind., and televised by CSTV. Saturday's rematch, an FSN Detroit presentation, is at Yost Ice Arena, where Notre Dame is just 1-15-1 in the last 17 regular-season visits. The lone ND win occurred on Nov. 23, 2002. The Wolverines dominated an Irish team that had played at UAF the week before, by scores of 6-1 in Ann Arbor and 8-0 in Notre Dame, on Dec. 4-5. Senior defenseman Brandon Rogers (2-4-6) and senior forward Milan Gajic (2-4-6) lead U-M against ND in eight career games. Michigan leads the all-time series, 57-41-5. The record includes a 6-1-0 edge on neutral ice and 31-20-3 mark in Ann Arbor.

#### OHIO STATE AT MICHIGAN STATE

The Buckeyes roll into Munn Ice Arena on a six-game winning streak and remain a point behind Michigan for top spot. OSU and MSU each posted a pair of victories in the other team's building last season. The Buckeyes won in East Lansing, posting 5-0 and 4-1 wins Oct. 17-18 for OSU's first sweep in Munn Ice Arena. The Spartans returned the favor Jan. 23-24 with 4-2 and 3-0 wins in Value City Arena. The Buckeyes trail the all-time series with the Spartans, 16-70-7, including 4-38-1 in East Lansing (There is a discrepancy in the records reported by the schools as MSU includes two wins from the 1957-58 season in the series record that OSU does not.). In the last 10 games, the series is tied 4-4-2. JR F Dan Knapp leads OSU with three assists and four points versus the Spartans. SR F JB Bittner and SR F Lee Spector each have two goals against Michigan State.

#### MIAMI AT ALASKA FAIRBANKS

The RedHawks are the seventh and final CCHA team to make the regular-season trek to Alaska during the 2004-05 campaign. Last season the RedHawks swept the Nanooks in a two-game set at Oxford, Ohio, by scores of 7-1 and 5-4 in overtime. Matt Christie was Miami's overtime hero at Goggin Ice Arena. Miami last visited UAF during the 2002-03 season with the Nanooks defeating the RedHawks, 2-1, in the series opener with a 1-1 tie resulting on the second night. The RedHawks lead the all-time series 24-9-3, which includes an 8-6-1 advantage in Fairbanks.

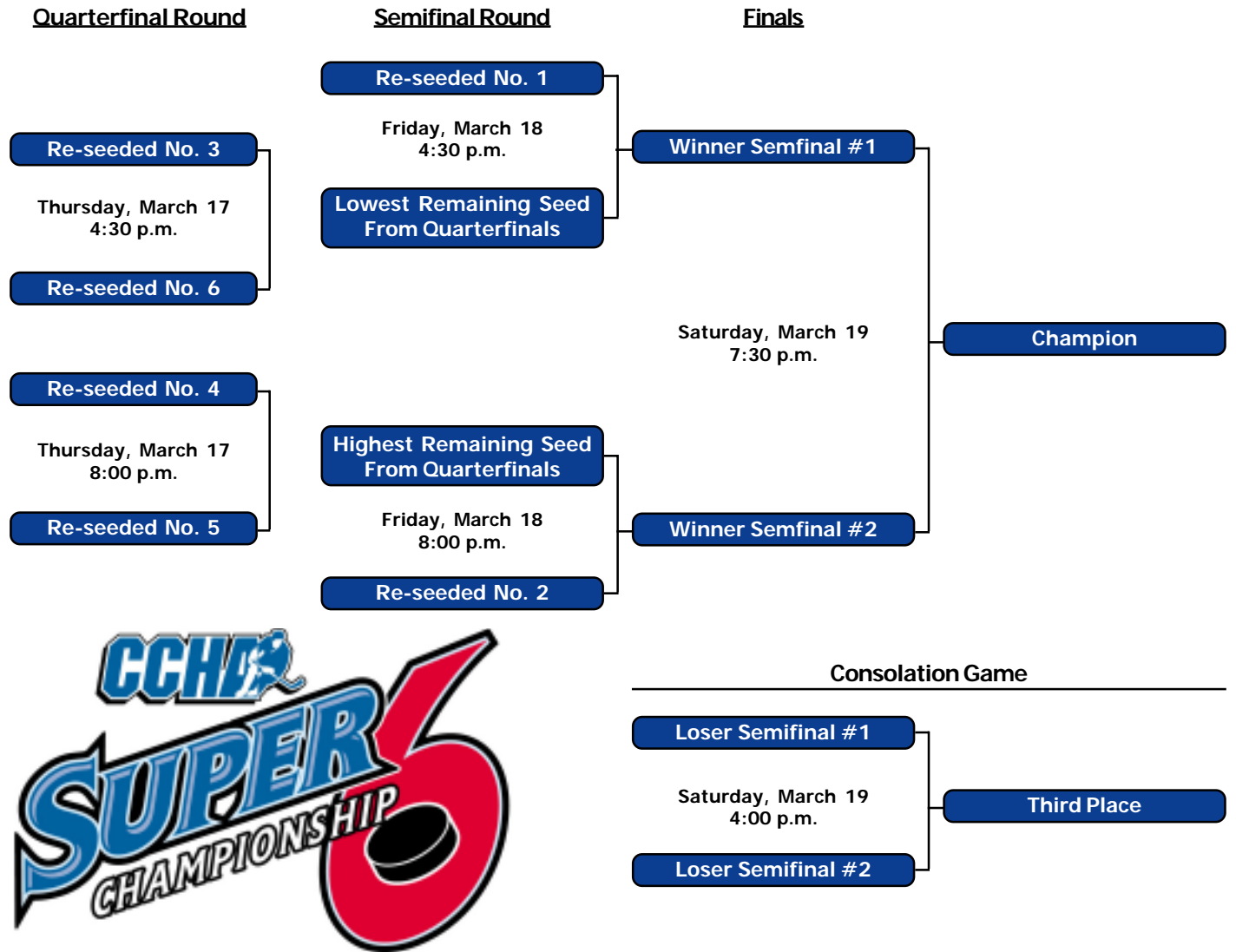

The CCHA Tournament begins with all 12 teams seeded based on the final regular-season standings. The top-six seeds will host a first-round, best-of-three series. The winners of the six first-round series will then advance to Joe Louis Arena for the CCHA Super Six Championship where they will be re-seeded based upon their regular-season finish. The top two remaining seeds will receive quarterfinal-round byes while the No. 3 seed will face the No. 6 seed and the No. 4 seed will take on the No. 5 seed. The lowest seed to advance from the quarterfinals will take on the No. 1 seed in the semifinals, while the No. 2 seed will play the other remaining team. The winners will then advance on to the CCHA Championship Game while the semifinal losers will play a third-place game prior to the championship contest. The winner of the CCHA Tournament will receive the league's automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament and the Ron Mason Cup.

The Nanooks made history with their first-ever sweep of Michigan State thanks to a 6-5 overtime victory Friday and a 1-0 shutout on Saturday • UAF has posted three conference sweeps on the season with the first coming against Nebraska-Omaha on Nov. 5-6, and the second against Ferris State on Jan. 21 -22. It is also the second sweep in the last four conference series • FR G Wylie Rogers's third shutout of the season on Saturday tied a 14-year old single-season shutout record that was set by Todd Henderson during the 1990-91 season. After allowing five goals on 36 shots on Friday, Rogers stopped all 39 Spartan shots the next night for 70 saves on the weekend and a .933 Spt. • SO F Curtis Fraser fired four goals on Friday, which is the most by a Nanook skater this season, and the most since Pat Hallett scored four times in a 5-4 win at LSSU on Dec. 5, 1998. Two of Fraser's four goals came on the power play and seven of his team-leading 12 goals are power-play markers • SR F Jared Sylvestre notched a goal in each game against the Spartans, including the lone tally on Saturday • The Nanooks got their first overtime win of the season on FR F Ryan McLeod's goal at 2:56 of the extra session on Friday. It was their first overtime win since topping the Spartans, 5-4, on Feb. 13 of last year • The Nanooks are 1-0-3 in overtime games this season • Three UAF forwards have reached the 20-point plateau this season. The streak was FSU's longest since the 1991-92 season when the Bulldogs went winless in eight encounters (0-4-4) from Nov. 23 through Jan. 10 • SR F Jeff Legue owns a seven-game point streak during which he's produced 4-5-9 • SO F Matt Verdone tallied his team leading third game-winning goal of the season in Friday's 4-3 victory at Notre Dame, scoring shorthanded with 53 seconds left in regulation time. Verdone's 7-8-15 in 32 games this campaign is a career high, bettering the 1-5-6 he recorded in 27 games as a freshman • JR F Greg Rallo has notched a point in five of his last six contests, registering 3-2-5. In the nine games prior to that he had 1-1-2 • Ferris State, which is idle this coming weekend, will play three of its final four regular-season outings at home starting with Northern Michigan on Feb. 25-26 and the regular-season-finale versus Western Michigan on March 4 • Legue, with 7-4-11, and SR F Derek Nesbitt, with 5-6-11, each has a team-leading 11 career points against Notre Dame in nine and 10 contests, respectively. The Buckeyes have not finished as high as second in the final CCHA standings since back-to-back years in 1983 and 1984 when they ended each year tied for second. OSU's 19 league wins are the most since the 1997-98 team went 19-10-1 and finished third in the league • The wins over BGSU also clinched the 2005 Ohio Cup for the Buckeyes, as they are 3-0 in cup play. The Falcons end the year with a 1-2-1 ledger and Miami stands at 0-2-1. The OSU at Miami game on March 4 officially closes out the Ohio Cup competition for the year. OSU last won the Ohio Cup in 2003 • The attendance of 11,570 Saturday was the third highest in Value City Arena this season, behind only the 14,777 for Michigan on Jan. 21 and the 12,391 against the Wolverines on Jan. 22. Over 20,000 fans watched OSU and BGSU play on weekend, after 9,638 were in attendance on Friday • JR G Dave Caruso's 20 wins on the season rank tied for fourth all-time in OSU history for goalie wins in a season (with Mike Betz in 2002 and 2003, and Jeff Maund in 1999). He is tied for second in the country in goalie wins and ranks seventh in winning percentage. Caruso's 34 career wins rank ninth in program history.

The Irish are just 1-10-2 in the first 13 games with the lone win coming against No. 1 Boston College back in October • So far this season, the Irish have appeared on television a total of eight times. They are 2-4-2 in those games. On CSTV, the Irish have a 1-1-0 record; on FSN Detroit, the Irish are 0-1-0 and on Comcast Local, Notre Dame is 1-2-1 • After being mired in a 2-for-34 slump since Jan. 18 on the power play, the Irish were 4-for-14 (28.6%) in the weekend series versus Ferris State. Two of those power-play goals resulted from five-on-three chances. The Irish have scored two power-play goals in a game just four times this season • When SO D Noah Babin scored the first goal of the game in Saturday's 4-2 loss to Ferris State, it marked the first time that Notre Dame had scored the first goal in a game since Jan. 14th versus Ohio State, a span of 10 games. On the year, the Irish have scored first just 12 times and are 4-5-3 in those games. Notre Dame's last win came on Jan. 2, a 2-1 win over Rensselaer • The defensive pairing of SO D Wes O'Neill (0-3-3) and Babin (2-1-2) accounted for six points on the weekend for the Irish with two goals and four assists.

Moore did not register a point in 23 games during injury-plagued freshman and sophomore campaigns • SR F Pat Dwyer is three points shy of joining the Century Club for career scoring • WMU has faced the league's top four netminders — Northern Michigan's Tuomas Tarkki (No. 1, 1.88 GAA), Miami's Brandon Crawford-West (No. 4, 2.46), Ohio State's Dave Caruso (No. 2, 2.11) and Michigan State's Dominic Vicari (No 3, 2.21) — in successive weeks. Up next is Bowling Green senior Jordan Sigalet, the league's All-Conference First-Team netminder last year • The Broncos are 5-0-1 when holding opponents to two or fewer goals and 6-15-1 when allowing three or more goals • WMU has surrendered short-handed goals in five straight contests, including a pair Saturday at NMU.
