CCHA ESSENTIAL - "Need to know" items from this week in the Central Collegiate Hockey Association.

Alaska Fairbanks- Three times this season, the Nanooks have been beaten by a CCHA opponent on Friday night only to bounce back and redeem themselves with a Saturday night win. The cycle has repeated itself against Western Michigan, Lake Superior State and Notre Dame.

Bowling Green- The Falcons' 2-1 win over Miami on Saturday means they have reached the seven-win plateau before December for the first time since the 1996-97 season. That also marked the last time that BGSU enjoyed a winning season, finishing with an overall record of 17-16-5.

Ferris State- The Bulldogs, who meet Western Michigan in a home-and-home series this weekend, play eight of their next 10 games on the road. Since the 2003 NCAA Tournament team went 14-4-0 on the road, the Bulldogs have compiled a 5-18-2 mark away from Ewigeleben Ice Arena.

Lake Superior- The Lakers entertain Bemidji State of College Hockey America this weekend in the renewal of a rivalry that dates back more than 30 years. In 1974, the Lakers beat the Beavers, 4-1, in the NAIA national championship game.

Miami- Sophomore goalie Brandon Crawford-West has not allowed more than two goals in a game in his past four starts. The Pittsburgh NHL draft pick owns a 1.70 GAA and .926 Spct. during that stretch, and the RedHawks are 1-2-1.

Michigan- The Wolverines suffered their first College Hockey Showcase road losses at Minnesota and Wisconsin last weekend. Prior to the trip, Michigan had been 3-0-0 at Minnesota and 2-0-1 at Wisconsin in CHS competition.

Michigan State- The Spartans' 4-0 road win over Wisconsin on Friday keeps them perfect at the Kohl Center, which opened in the fall of 1998. Their 5-0-0 record includes four College Hockey Showcase victories over the Badgers and another against Colorado College in the 1999 NCAA Tournament.

Nebraska-Omaha- Freshman forward Bill Thomas, the nation's leading rookie point producer, also tops the Maverick scoring chart with 7-12-19. He has at least one point in 11 of 12 games this season and has produced multiple points in a contest on six occasions.

Northern Michigan- Junior forward Andrew Contois scored three of the Wildcats four goals in a weekend split with Lake Superior State. The Marquette, Mich., native played nine games for the Lakers in the 2001-02 season and scored his lone goal in a Laker jersey against Alaska-Fairbanks.

Notre Dame- The Irish experienced their own version of the movie *Planes, Trains and Automobiles* on Thanksgiving weekend. Because of traffic, weather problems, flights delays and missed connections, it took them 27 hours to get from their campus to Fairbanks, Alaska. Even so, they responded with a 3-2 road win on Friday night.

Ohio State- The Buckeyes put a 10-game winning streak at Value City Arena on the line this weekend when they host Alaska Fairbanks. The Bucks are 5-0-0 at home this season and have outscored the opposition by a whopping 28-11 margin.

Western Michigan- Freshman goalie Daniel Bellissimo, who has started nine straight games, blocked 65-of-67 shots (.970) and held the nation's highest-scoring offense to just two goals, as the Broncos swept Alabama-Huntsville of College Hockey America with 5-1 and 3-1 victories. Bellissimo is now 7-5-1 seven weeks into his college career with a 2.71 GAA and .917 Spct.

CCHA- Two CCHA graduates play prominent roles with the NHL Players' Association. Kevyn Adams, who played at Miami from 1992-1996, is the player representative for the Carolina Hurricanes while Brendan Morrison, the former Michigan standout and 1997 Hobey Baker Award winner, serves in a similar capacity with the Vancouver Canucks.

THIS WEEK'S MATCHUPS

Friday & Saturday

BOWLING GREEN VS MICHIGAN STATE (HOME-AND-HOME)

The series starts at Munn Ice Arena, where the Falcons have dropped seven straight and have not won since a 1-0 shutout victory on Dec. 7, 1997. The Spartans lead the all-time series, 57-24-8, including a 30-8-3 advantage on home ice. Spartan assistant coach Tom Newton was a four-year letterwinner and two-year captain for Bowling Green from 1975-80. He registered 140 points during his career and skated for three CCHA regular-season, two playoff championship teams and two NCAA Tournament squads for then BGSU coach Ron Mason.

FERRIS STATE VS WESTERN MICHIGAN (HOME-AND-HOME)

Western Michigan has a 60-33-6 advantage in the all-time series with FSU; these rivalry partners each won twice at home last season. Ferris State senior forward Derek Nesbitt has a team-high nine career points, including six goals, in 11 career starts against the Broncos while senior goalie Mike Brown sports a 5-3-0 record with a 2.53 GAA and a .905 Spct. in nine appearances versus WMU.

MICHIGAN VS NOTRE DAME (HOME-AND-HOME)

Friday's game at Yost Ice Arena will be televised by FSN Detroit with Saturday's rematch at Notre Dame to be shown on Comcast Local. The Irish have won three straight against Michigan, including a sweep at the Joyce Center on Feb. 27-28 by scores of 4-1 and 5-2. The streak began on Nov. 23, 2002 when Notre Dame beat Michigan 4-3 in Ann Arbor. Prior to that, the last time Notre Dame had won in Ann Arbor was Oct. 22, 1982, a span of 14 regular-season games. The Irish did win a CCHA playoff game at Yost in the 1998 playoffs. In the regular season, Notre Dame is now 1-14-1 in the last 16 meetings and since 1992-93, the Irish are 2-18-1 versus the Wolverines at Yost Arena. Over the last three meetings, the Irish are 1-1-1 when playing in Ann Arbor.

ALASKA FAIRBANKS AT OHIO STATE

The Buckeyes bring a 10-game winning streak at Value City Arena into this series. They are 5-0-0 at home this season and have outscored the opposition 28-11. The Nanooks and OSU share a 15-15-2 overall series record, with the Buckeyes owning an 8-5-1 record in Columbus. UAF senior Jared Sylvestre sports a 3-5-8 chart in seven games against OSU. One of those goals came in a quarterfinal meeting at the 2002 Super Six in Detroit, a game won by the Buckeyes, 6-5, in overtime. Junior forward Dan Knapp has 4-5-9 in his career against the Nanooks.

NEBRASKA-OMAHA AT NORTHERN MICHIGAN

The Wildcats, owners of a six-game winning streak on home ice, play host to a UNO squad that is making its first trip to the Berry Events Center since Jan. 4-5, 2002. The last four meetings between the two teams have been in Omaha. The Mavs lead the all-time series with NMU, 6-5-2, and boast a winning record, 3-2-2, in Marquette. Mavs senior Dan Hacker has a career 1-2-3, with a shorthanded goal, in six games against the Wildcats.

BEMIDJI STATE AT LAKE SUPERIOR

LSSU plays host to Bemidji State in the first encounter with the Beavers since the 2000-01 season, when the Lakers won 4-2 during the first round of the Mariucci Classic in Minneapolis, Minn. LSSU leads the series, 19-15-1. The rivalry with Bemidji State goes back to the early years of Laker hockey. The Lakers' season was ended by BSU three straight years before they posted their first NAIA national championship in 1971-72. The Lakers also won the 1973-74 NAIA title with a 4-1 victory over Bemidji State.

ROBERT MORRIS AT MIAMI

The RedHawks, with a 2-2-0 non-conference record this season, play host to college hockey's newest Division I team. The Colonials of College Hockey America enter the two-game set with a 3-9-1 overall record with all of those victories coming out of conference, including a 4-2 win over Sacred Heart, the top team in Atlantic Hockey, in the third-place game of the Rensselaer/Bank of America Holiday Hockey Tournament.

The Nanooks have split three of their four CCHA series in similar fashion, falling to their opponent on Friday night and redeeming themselves with a victory in Saturday's rematch • UAF learned from a 3-2 loss to Notre Dame on Friday night and an 0-for-9 power-play performance. In Saturday's action, the Nanooks struck for a man-advantage marker in seven attempts and secured a conference win • ND's victory over the Nanooks snapped a five-game home winning streak that included three exhibition games against Grant MacEwan and British Columbia and two conference games against Nebraska-Omaha • The Nanooks kept ND's SR G Morgan Cey winless against UAF in his four-year career on Saturday night with the 3-2 win.
