Clemson vs. Georgia Tech

Clemson (27-14, 11-7 ACC), ranked as high as #17 in the nation, will play host to #19 Georgia Tech (26-15, 13-7 ACC) this weekend in a three-game series at Doug Kingsmore Stadium. Game times are 7:15 PM (Friday), 7:00 PM (Saturday), and 2:00 PM (Sunday). All three games will be broadcast live on the radio by Clemson Tiger Sports Network. All three games will also be shown live via webcast at ACCSelect.com. Live stats will be available at ClemsonTigers.com for the series as well.

The Series

Clemson and Georgia Tech have met 190 times on the diamond, with the Tigers holding a narrow 94-93-3 advantage dating back to the 1902 season. In 2005, Georgia Tech won two of the three games at Doug Kingsmore Stadium. Then in 2006, the two teams met seven times.

The Yellow Jackets claimed the final two games of the 2006 regular-season series in Atlanta after Clemson won game-one. Then in the ACC Tournament at Jacksonville, FL on May 25, Clemson won 3-2 on Ben Hall's walkoff single. Two days later, Georgia Tech stayed alive in the tourney with an 8-7 victory in 10 innings. But hours later, Clemson was victorious 16-11 to advance to the ACC Tournament Championship game.

With the all-time series tied, the two teams met at the 2006 College World Series. Like its meeting in Omaha in 2002, the Tigers defeated the Yellow Jackets, this time by a score of 8-4 after Clemson fell behind 4-0. Clemson scored all eight of its runs in the eighth inning. Andy D'Alessio's three-run homer gave Clemson the lead for good.

The Tigers hold a 39-20-1 lead over the Yellow Jackets all-time in games played at Clemson and a 29-13 advantage at Doug Kingsmore Stadium. The Tigers also hold a 39-33 advantage in games played in the ACC regular season.

Tiger Head Coach Jack Leggett is 28-23 against the Yellow Jackets as Clemson's head coach, including a 13-4 record at Doug Kingsmore Stadium. He was 3-5 against Georgia Tech as Western Carolina's head coach, meaning he is 31-28 against the Yellow Jackets in his career.

The Starting Pitchers

In game-one, Georgia Tech will start sophomore lefthander David Duncan (5-2, 3.03 ERA) on the mound. The New Richmond, OH native has made 11 starts for a total of 74.1 innings pitched. He has allowed 71 hits (.254 opponents' batting average) and 19 walks with 67 strikeouts.

The Tigers will counter with junior lefthander Daniel Moskos (3-3, 2.29 ERA) in game-one on Friday. The Alta Loma, CA native has made 17 relief appearances and three starts for a total of 35.1 innings pitched. He has allowed 33 hits (.260 opponents' batting average) and 16 walks with 46 strikeouts.

2007 Clemson Baseball Notes



Through Leggett's first 13 seasons at Clemson, he had 608 wins. Only three other programs (Florida State, Wichita State, Rice) have more wins over that span from 1994-06. Furthermore, he has led the Tigers to at least 39 wins every year he has been at the helm of the program. Clemson along with Florida State and Wichita State are the only three programs in the nation to win at least 39 games every year since 1994.

Leggett Reaches 1,000 Career Wins

Head Coach Jack Leggett, in his 14th season at Clemson and 28th overall, won his 1,000th game on March 25 in the Tigers' 5-0 victory at Maryland. He has a 1012-563 overall record, including a 635-273 ledger at Clemson. At the age of 53, Leggett became one of the youngest coaches to reach 1,000 career wins. Leggett became the 29th head coach in Division I history to reach the 1,000-win mark. He also became the 10th active head coach at the Division I level to reach 1,000 career wins.

Strikeout-to-Walk Ratio Among Tigers' Best

Clemson has a solid 3.36 ERA through 41 games this season. But the Tigers have been especially good at striking out the opposition without giving them "free passes." The staff has combined for 350 strikeouts against only 130 walks, good for a 2.69 strikeout-to-walk ratio. That is the second-best mark in school history, trailing only the 3.16 figure that the 1996 staff had, which includes future Major Leaguers Kris Benson, Billy Koch, Ken Vining, and Matt White. The 2007 staff's 8.65 strikeouts-per-nine-innings-pitched mark is also the best figure since the 1996 staff's mark of 9.69.

Lefties Lights Out

So far this season, Head Coach Jack Leggett has called upon six different lefthanders, including starter Ryan Hinson along with relievers Daniel Moskos, Matt Zoltak, Chris Fidrych, William Bond, and Alex Martin. Hinson has a 2.03 ERA in 10 starts, Moskos has a 2.29 ERA and six saves in 20 appearances, and Zoltak, Fidrych, Bond, and Martin have combined to allow just 12 runs. Therefore in a combined 117.1 innings pitched, they have allowed only 107 hits and 34 earned runs (2.61 ERA) with 113 strikeouts.

Widmann To Miss Rest of the 2007 Season

Starting shortstop Stan Widmann (Hurst, TX) will miss the rest of the 2007 season due to a neck injury. He had surgery at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, MN on March 27. Widmann, who will remain in a neck brace until late June, hopes to rehab his injury and be back on the field in a Tiger uniform in 2008.

The junior batted .409 in just six games this season. He had one home run and six RBIs along with a perfect 1.000 fielding percentage in 25 chances in the field.

The 2007 season had marked his third straight year as Clemson's starting shortstop. He hit .307 in 67 games as a sophomore on Clemson's 2006 ACC Championship and College World Series team. He was also the Tigers' leading hitter for the eight NCAA Tournament games last year with a .387 batting average.

D'Alessio Likes 'Em Loaded

If you had to use one phrase to describe senior Andy D'Alessio (Naples, FL), it might just be "run-producer." No stat has proved his value in producing runs more than his stats with the bases loaded. He is just 0-for-3 with an RBI with the bases loaded. But in 2006, he was 8-for-11 (.727) with two doubles, two home runs, and 23 RBIs with the bases full. In 2005, he was 6-for-9 with two home runs and 18 RBIs with the bases loaded. Therefore in his career (2004-07), he is 16-for-29 (.552) with four homers and 49 RBIs with the bases full.

D'Alessio Coming of Age at the Plate

Andy D'Alessio would admit that his senior season has not turned out like he had hoped, but recent games have indicated that he is returning to his 2006 form, where he hit 23 homers with a national-best 85 RBIs. Since he missed five games in the beginning of April due to a groin injury and has become healthy again, he has been on a tear. In the last seven games, he is 11-for-27 (.407) with three doubles, three homers, and 10 RBIs. He has a .467 on-base percentage and .852 slugging percentage in the last seven games as well. Thanks to his recent surge, he is hitting .298 with six homers and 26 RBIs in 36 games this season.

D'Alessio Moving Up Home Run Chart

A year after Kris Harvey totaled 25 home runs in 2005, second-most in the nation, Andy D'Alessio provided the big bat in the Tiger lineup in 2006 with 23 long balls. This season, he has six homers, giving him 48 in his career, seventh-most in Tiger history.

Chalk Had a 50-Game On-Base Streak

Brad Chalk (Greer, SC) ended his sophomore season by reaching base safely in each of the last 27 games. And since he did the same in the first 23 games that he played in 2007, he reached base via a hit, walk, or hit-by-pitch in 50 straight games. That streak came to an end against Miami (FL) on March 30. He hit safely in 45 of those 50 games as well.

Overall this season, the junior is hitting .407 with a .531 on-base percentage. He has walked 29 times, been hit-by-pitch six times, and struck out just 14 times, a trend that has been evident throughout his career. He has walked 104 times, hit-by-pitch 23 times, and struck out only 54 times in 169 career games and 561 at-bats. He is also a .364 career hitter with a .479 on-base percentage.

Hogan Boosting Tiger Lineup

Junior catcher Doug Hogan is in his first year as Clemson's starting catcher in 2007. And he wasted little time making an impact by blasting two solo homers in the Tigers' season-opening 14-0 win over George Mason on February 16. Hogan, who batted #9 in the lineup that game, entered the season with just one career homer, but became the second Tiger in as many years to hit two long balls in the season-opener. Tyler Colvin hit two home runs in the 2006 season-opener against James Madison as well.

Hogan, who hit four homers in the Tigers' first five games of 2007, went 26 straight games without a long ball until April 8 at Virginia Tech. There, he hit a three-run home run in the 10th inning to give Clemson a 5-2 win.

Then against Elon on April 24, he went 2-for-3 with three runs scored, two homers, and five RBIs. One of the two long balls was a grand slam, the first by a Tiger in 2007. Therefore, it was his second multi-homer game of the season.

He is also hitting .319 with a team-tying-high 31 runs scored, eight doubles, two triples, seven homers, and 26 RBIs. Not bad for a player who entered the season just 6-for-46 (.130) with a homer and seven RBIs in 46 career games.

Harbin Pulling Double Duty

Junior middle infielder Taylor Harbin (Travelers Rest, SC) has had to make the move from second base, where he was a preseason first-team All-American, to shortstop due to the loss of regular shortstop Stan Widmann. Harbin's preseason accolades were due in a large part to his defensive prowess. He has done well at the tougher defensive position of shortstop after starting there since game #7 of the season.

Harbin has also been a "doubles' machine" since stepping onto the field for the first time in 2005. He entered the 2007 season with 48 doubles in his first two years, and he has 15 this season, giving him 63 in his three-year career. That mark is tied for fourth-most in school history.

Johnson's Average Up After Moving Down

Freshman outfielder Addison Johnson (Pfafftown, NC) has raised his batting average significantly in recent weeks. He started the season as Clemson's leadoff batter, but is hitting just .132 in 53 at-bats at either the #1 or #2 spot in the order. So when Head Coach Jack Leggett decided to move Johnson down in the order to the #8 spot on March 10, his batting average has increased. At either the #7, #8, or #9 spot this season, he is 27-for-82 (.329). Overall, Johnson is hitting .252 this season.

Boyd Receives Bob Bradley Award

Red-shirt freshman outfielder Wilson Boyd (Hickory, NC) received the 2007 Bob Bradley Award, given to the Tiger MVP of the four-game series against rival South Carolina. In four starts, he was 5-for-14 (.357) with two runs scored, a triple, and four RBIs. He became the first Tiger freshman to win the award, which has been given annually since 2001. Boyd, who is hitting .417 in the month of April, has raised his batting average to .308 on the season.

Bunnell Goes From Club Team to Starter at 2B

In the fall of 2004, the beginning of his sophomore year at Clemson, David Bunnell (Charlotte, NC) tried out for the team as a walk-on but was cut. In the spring of 2005, he played on Clemson's Club team, then he did not play any organized baseball the following school year as a junior.

During the summer of 2006, Tanner Leggett, former Tiger (2003-06) and son of Head Coach Jack Leggett, recommended Bunnell to his father to work Clemson's summer baseball camps. The elder Leggett obliged and Bunnell got to know Clemson's coach.

Due to the loss of catcher Adrian Casanova and several infielders from the 2006 squad, Leggett invited Bunnell to join the team in 2007. Bunnell was slated to be a bullpen catcher and provide depth in the infield for the Tigers, but in January, freshman infielder Graham Stoneburner suffered a season-ending leg injury. So Leggett told Bunnell to continue taking ground balls on his own because he might need him to play in the infield.

After hitting a pinch-hit double in his first career plate appearance in the season-opener against George Mason on February 16, Bunnell did not play in the Tigers' next 10 games. But with no other Tiger solidifying his name at second after Taylor Harbin moved to shortstop to replace an injured Stan Widmann, Bunnell earned his first career start there on March 9 against Memphis. He had a hit and reached base three times in the game. He also hit an early RBI single in the March 11 game and went 3-for-9 with two walks while not committing an error in 15 chances in the series.

Bunnell is currently battling for the starting spot at second base, as he is hitting .220 in 41 at-bats this season. He also has a solid .952 fielding percentage, committing just three errors.

Although he has planned on 2007 being his one and only season with the program, he is still eligible to play in 2008 as a fifth-year senior. With his boisterous cheering section beyond the outfield fence, "D-Bunny" has made a name for himself in a varsity uniform.

Father Sees Son Go Deep, Part II

In 2006, former Tiger Tanner Leggett, son of Head Coach Jack Leggett, hit his only home run as a Tiger against Virginia Tech on April 28. It was a special moment for the elder Leggett, as he is Clemson's third-base coach and got to give his son an extra-long handshake after rounding third base.

Another thrilling moment for a Tiger coach occurred on February 21, 2007 against High Point. Freshman infielder Ben Paulsen, son of Assistant Head Coach Tom Riginos, hit a two-run homer in

Clemson's six-run third inning. It was Paulsen's first hit as a Tiger, and it was key in Clemson's 11-3 win.

Then against Gardner-Webb on March 27, Paulsen had a career day. He went 5-for-5 with a double, homer, four runs scored, and six RBIs in Clemson's 14-2 victory. It was an extra-special occasion for the freshman, because his father was in the third-base coaching box in each of the at-bats. Head Coach Jack Leggett was not at the game, as he was with his ailing father in Vermont. It was the first time ever that Riginos was in the third-base coaching box in a game Paulsen was playing in.

Against #5 South Carolina on April 25 at Doug Kingsmore Stadium, his three-run homer in the seventh gave the Tigers a comfortable 9-3 lead on their way to a 14-5 victory over the Gamecocks. Paulsen is 37-for-124 (.298) with six doubles, four homers, and 17 RBIs in 38 games (31 starts) this season.

Moskos Moving Up Charts

Junior lefthander Daniel Moskos (Alta Loma, CA) entered the 2007 season as one of the most prolific closers in the country after serving in the same role for Team USA during last summer when the club captured the gold medal at the world championships in Cuba. In 21.0 innings pitched, he had an 0.86 ERA and six saves, as he allowed just eight hits and four walks with 35 strikeouts.

He has kept up his impressive stats for the Tigers in 2007. In 17 relief appearances and three starts, he has a 3-3 record, six saves, and 2.29 ERA. The hard-thrower has allowed 33 hits and nine earned runs with 46 strikeouts in 35.1 innings pitched.

Moskos had 10 saves in 2006, which alone placed him 10th all-time in Clemson history in that category. With his six saves this season, he has 16 in his career, tied for fourth-most in school history. He has also made 74 career appearances, 10th-most in Tiger history.

Clyne Had 31.1 Scoreless-Inning Streak

Senior righthander Stephen Clyne (Parkland, FL) pitched 16.0 innings over eight relief appearances this season before finally allowing a run at

Western Carolina on March 20. He has allowed just 22 hits (.210 opponents' batting average) and seven walks with 25 strikeouts while tallying a 4-1 record, 1.27 ERA, and two saves.

Clyne went the last 15.1 innings of 2006 without allowing a run, meaning he had a streak of 31.1 consecutive innings pitched over 16 relief appearances without allowing a run dating back to last season. That mark was just behind the school record of 32.2 consecutive scoreless innings pitched by Scott Berney. Berney, a starter, opened the 2000 season, his first and only as a Tiger, by not allowing a run until there were two outs in his 33rd inning on the mound that year.

Clyne's value to the team had been as a long reliever in the first half of 2007, and he did well in that role in his fifth season in the program. But since Daniel Moskos has moved to the weekend rotation, Clyne has taken over as the team's closer.

Clyne has a 7-2 record, 2.43 ERA, and four saves in 55 career relief appearances (81.1 innings pitched). He has also allowed just two homers and 23 walks with 81 strikeouts, good for a 3.52 strikeout-to-walk ratio. Clyne is the only fifth-year senior on the 2007 team.

Tigers Shake Up Pitching Staff

With the emergence of senior righty Stephen Clyne, who has a 1.27 ERA and .210 opponents' batting average in 28.1 innings pitched, Head Coach Jack Leggett decided to move Daniel Moskos from the closer role to the weekend rotation.

Moskos made his starting debut at Virginia Tech on April 6, as the lefty allowed just one run in 4.0 innings pitched in that outing. Moskos had made 71 relief appearances from 2005-07 prior to his first career start. The owner of 16 career saves had never started on the mound in a Clemson uniform prior to the start in Blacksburg. However, he was used as a starter in the Cape Cod League in the summer of 2005. His ability to throw three or four different pitches for strikes was one reason Leggett opted to move him into the weekend rotation.

Clyne's stellar senior season had a lot to do with the move as well. The Parkland, FL native is throwing harder than ever and has routinely hit the low 90s on the radar gun. This past offseason, Clyne focused on increasing his lower-body strength in the weight room, and he credits that to his higher velocity. He already brought a sharp breaking ball to the mound.

Kopp Arresting Batters

Junior righthander David Kopp (Margate, FL) has a 4-2 record and 3.22 ERA in 11 starts this season. In a team-high 62.1 innings pitched, he has allowed 58 hits (.247 opponents' batting average) and 19 walks with a team-best 50 strikeouts. He is the only Tiger to pitch at least 5.0 innings in every one of his starts this year. In ACC regular-season games, he has been even better. In five conference starts, he is 2-0 with a 2.27 ERA with 36 strikeouts against only eight walks in 31.2 innings pitched.

In his best start of 2007 on April 21, he pitched 7.0 masterful innings against #6 Virginia, a team that entered the week 13th in the nation in batting average. He allowed just two hits, no runs, and two walks with five strikeouts in a no-decision.

D.J. Playing a Different Tune in 2007

Sophomore utility player D.J. Mitchell (Rural Hall, NC) started all 13 postseason contests in right field in 2006 after Travis Storrer went down with an injury, and he performed well, hitting .311 in those 13 games. He has platooned in the outfield with several different Tigers so far this season.

But unlike last year, he has added pitcher to his resumé in 2007. He did not appear on the mound in 2006, but had a successful summer with Thomasville in the Coastal Plain League. There, he had a 2.25 ERA and save in 16.0 innings pitched over nine relief appearances. Mitchell also earned the victory in a starting role in the league championship game.

Mitchell made his Tiger debut on the mound against George Mason on February 16. He pitched 2.0 perfect innings with a strikeout in the Tigers' 14-0 victory over the Patriots. Then against High Point on February 21, he earned his first career win. In 4.0 innings pitched in relief, he allowed one run on three hits with six strikeouts in the Tigers' 11-3 win.

Against #5 South Carolina on April 25 at Doug Kingsmore Stadium, he got the starting nod. In 6.0 innings pitched, he allowed just four hits, one run, and three walks with six strikeouts to record the victory in the Tigers' 14-5 win.

Overall in 2007, Mitchell is 2-0 with a 3.13 ERA in 31.2 innings pitched over eight relief appearances and three starts. He also has 31 strikeouts against only eight walks and is holding opponents to a .218 batting average. He is playing an important role on the 2007 team with the unexpected preseason loss of righties Sean Clark and Graham Stoneburner.

He has also contributed at the plate. He is hitting .230 overall with six sacrifice bunts, seven stolen bases, and 11 walks against only eight strikeouts in 74 at-bats. His ninth-inning single against Georgia on April 4 tied the score, then he came around to score the winning run in Clemson's dramatic 11-10 victory.

Hinson Showing Consistency on the Mound

Sophomore lefthander Ryan Hinson (Rock Hill, SC) has been a weekend starter all season. In 10 starts, he is 4-1 with a 2.03 ERA along with 48 strikeouts against 19 walks in 57.2 innings pitched. He has also yielded just one home run.

He has been perhaps Clemson's most consistent starter in 2007. In each of his 11 career starts, he has allowed two earned runs or less. In 2006, he made 18 relief appearances and one start. In only one of those 19 appearances did he allow more than two earned runs.

In one of his best starts of his career on April 22, he shut down #6 Virginia, a team who entered the game hitting .328. He took a no-hitter against the Cavaliers into the seventh inning and picked up the win in Clemson's 2-1 victory. In 6.1 innings pitched, he allowed just one hit and no runs.

His nemesis in his career has been Georgia Tech. He has made four relief appearances against the Yellow Jackets, allowing eight earned runs in 7.0 innings pitched (10.29 ERA). Therefore in his other 81.1 innings pitched against all other teams, he has allowed just 18 earned runs, good for a 1.99 ERA. Overall in his career, Hinson is 8-1 with a 2.65 ERA in 18 relief appearances and 11 starts.

Farina Mowing Them Down Out of the Bullpen

Junior righthander Alan Farina (Chuluota, FL) is 2-1 with a 3.55 ERA in 38.0 innings pitched over 13 relief appearances and two starts in his first season in the Tiger program. He has also struck out 46 against 18 walks and is holding opponents to a .162 batting average. In ACC regular-season games, he has 32 strikeouts in only 21.1 innings pitched as well, good for a 13.50 strikeouts-per-nine-innings-pitched mark.

He has been a strikeout machine out of the bullpen as well. In his 13 relief appearances, he is 2-1 with a 2.01 ERA in 31.1 innings pitched. The power pitcher has also allowed just 15 hits (.142 opponents' batting average) and 10 walks with 42 strikeouts out of the bullpen. In his last seven outings, he has a 1.45 ERA and .102 opponents' batting average in 18.2 innings pitched as well.

Vaughn Valuable as Middle Reliever

Sophomore righty Matt Vaughn (Summerville, SC) struggled as a freshman, but in 2007, he has become one of the most valuable pitchers out of the bullpen for the Tigers. He is 3-0 with a 2.45 ERA and .245 opponents' batting average in 29.1 innings pitched over eight relief appearances and one start this season. Vaughn has also struck out 29 against only eight walks.

Future ACC Tournament Sites

The 2007 and 2008 ACC Tournaments will be played at The Baseball Grounds of Jacksonville (FL), where the tourney was played in 2005 and 2006. In 2009, the ACC Tournament will be held in Boston, MA at historic Fenway Park.

Tigers Take Two of Three From George Mason

Clemson, ranked #1 in the country, won two of three games over George Mason from February 16-18 at Doug Kingsmore Stadium. Tiger batters combined for a .272 batting average, while Clemson held the Patriots to a .194 batting average and outscored them 20-9. Brad Chalk had five hits and walked three times, while Doug Hogan hit two home runs. Clemson's pitching staff had a 2.67 ERA and struck out 27 batters against eight walks. The starting rotation of P.J. Zocchi, David Kopp, and Ryan Hinson combined to allow just one run in 15.0 innings pitched as well.

In game-one on February 16, Clemson totaled 20 hits on its way to a 14-0 victory over the Patriots. It was the most runs by a Tiger team in a season-opener since 1989. Every Tiger starter had at least one hit, while Chalk, Taylor Harbin, and Hogan had three hits apiece. Hogan added two solo home runs and three RBIs. Clemson's eight-run seventh inning put the game out of reach. Zocchi pitched 6.0 innings, allowing one hit, no runs, and no walks with six strikeouts to earn the victory. George Mason managed just two hits and committed four errors.

In game-two on February 17, Jason Bour hit a three-run homer in the sixth inning to give George Mason the lead for good in its 5-1 victory over the Tigers. After Kopp pitched 5.0 scoreless innings, George Mason scored four runs in the sixth inning off two Tiger relievers. Clemson, who saw its 17-game home winning streak come to an end, totaled just two hits, while it committed three errors and

threw six wild pitches. Lefthander Mike Modica pitched 6.0 innings, allowing one hit and one run to earn the victory. Andy D'Alessio's sacrifice fly in the fourth inning scored Clemson's only run of the game. Brad Chalk's 17-game hitting streak also came to an end, as he was 0-for-2 with two walks.

In game-three on February 18, Clemson rallied from a 4-2 deficit to defeat George Mason 5-4. The Patriots scored three runs in the fifth inning, but Marquez Smith hit a two-out, two-run homer in the seventh inning to tie the score. After getting out of a jam in the top of the eighth inning, the Tigers plated the go-ahead run in the bottom of the eighth when Harbin's sharp grounder to third was booted by Ryan Uphouse, allowing Hogan to score. The Patriots outhit the Tigers 8-6, but George Mason pitchers allowed nine walks. Daniel Moskos pitched the final 1.2 innings without allowing a hit or run to pick up the win. Clemson also stole four bases, but left 11 runners on base.

Tiger Bats Awaken in 11-3 Win Over High Point

Clemson, ranked #2 in the nation, scored six runs in the third inning en route to an 11-3 victory in six innings over High Point at Doug Kingsmore Stadium on February 21. The Tigers trailed 2-0 after the first inning, but a run-scoring single by Taylor Harbin followed by a double by Andy D'Alessio, a triple by Marquez Smith, and a two-run homer by Ben Paulsen, his first hit as a Tiger, highlighted the six-run third inning. Doug Hogan also added a two-run homer in the fifth inning, as Clemson totaled 12 hits in all. D.J. Mitchell pitched 4.0 innings in relief, allowing one run on three hits with six strikeouts to earn the win. The start was delayed over three-and-a-half hours by inclement weather, then the game was called in the bottom of the sixth due to thick fog in the area.

Clemson Sweeps Pacific in Battle of Tigers

Clemson, ranked #2 in the nation, swept Pacific in three games on February 23,24 at Doug Kingsmore Stadium. Clemson outscored Pacific 17-10 and won two one-run games. Clemson hit .321 in the series to Pacific's .271, as Pacific left 33 runners on base. Pacific also scored first in all three games only to see Clemson rally to victory each time. Brad Chalk was 8-for-12 to lead Clemson, while Doug Hogan (7-for-13) and Stan Widmann (4-for-8) also had productive series. Clemson pitchers also combined for a 1.86 ERA and 31 strikeouts in the three games.

In game-one on February 23, Clemson overcame a 3-0 deficit to defeat Pacific 8-3. Clemson scored three runs in the fifth inning to tie the score. A dropped foul ball by Erik Hamren in the fifth inning allowed Taylor Harbin to double in a run and Marquez Smith to single home the tying run. In the sixth inning, Clemson scored five runs, highlighted by Smith's two-run single to cap the scoring. Hogan and Widmann added solo homers, while Chalk was 3-for-3 with two walks, meaning he reached base in all five of his plate appearances. Stephen Clyne pitched 5.1 innings in relief to earn the victory. He allowed just three hits, no runs, and one walk with five strikeouts.

In game-two, which was the first game of a doubleheader on February 24, Addison Johnson

scored the winning run from second base in the 11th inning when shortstop Josh Powers' throw was errant to first base on Brad Chalk's infield single in Clemson's 4-3 victory over Pacific. Clemson matched Pacific's two-run second inning with two runs in the bottom of the second on Widmann's two-run single. Widmann had all three of Clemson's RBIs. Clemson left 12 runners on base, while Pacific stranded 11. Pacific outhit Clemson 12-10, including four hits by Joe Oliveira, but Pacific could not come through with a clutch hit. Daniel Moskos earned the win thanks to 3.0 scoreless innings pitched in relief.

In game-three, which was the second game of a doubleheader on February 24, Smith's three-run homer in the fifth inning was the difference in Clemson's 5-4 win over Pacific. For the third straight game, Clemson faced an early deficit only to rally to victory. Pacific outhit Clemson 11-10, but it stranded 13 runners on base. Chalk paced Clemson with a 3-for-3 performance, while Hogan added two hits and an RBI. David Kopp did not allow an earned run in 5.0 innings pitched to earn the win, while Matt Vaughn picked up his first career save by pitching 2.0 scoreless innings with three strikeouts.

Tigers Homer Past Winthrop 6-4

Taylor Harbin's two-run homer in the seventh inning proved to be the difference in #2 Clemson's 6-4 victory over Winthrop at Doug Kingsmore Stadium on February 28. The Eagles scored four runs in the fifth inning to take a 4-1 lead. But Andy D'Alessio hit a towering two-run homer in the sixth inning to cut Winthrop's lead to one run. After tying the score on an Eagle error in the seventh, Harbin's long home run later in the frame put the Tigers on top for good. Winthrop outhit the Tigers 10-8, but five of Clemson's hits went for extra bases. Stephen Clyne pitched 3.0 scoreless innings in relief of one-hit ball to earn the win, while Daniel Moskos pitched a perfect ninth inning to record the save.

Gamecocks Take Two From Tigers

South Carolina, ranked #4 in the nation, won both games of a home-and-home series against #2 Clemson on March 3,4. The Gamecocks outscored the Tigers 15-2 and outhit Clemson .167 to .284.

South Carolina hit three home runs on its way to a 12-0 victory over Clemson at Doug Kingsmore Stadium on March 3. The shutout broke Clemson's streak of 165 consecutive home games of scoring at least one run dating back to 2002. Justin Smoak had a game-high three hits and three RBIs, including a two-run homer. Phil Disher and James Darnell each hit three-run homers and totaled four RBIs, while the Tigers had just two hits the entire game. South Carolina also left just three runners on base and had 12 hits in the game. Harris Honeycutt pitched 7.0 innings, allowing two hits, no runs, and four walks with seven strikeouts to record the win.

Trent Kline's run-scoring single in the ninth inning lifted South Carolina to a 3-2 victory over Clemson at Sarge Frye Field on March 4. Clemson tied the score 1-1 on Marquez Smith's run-scoring single in the seventh inning, then took a 2-1 lead on Addison Johnson's RBI single in the eighth inning. With two outs and no one on base, South Carolina rallied for a run in the bottom of the eighth inning on Disher's RBI double. Andy D'Alessio and Smith each

had two hits for the Tigers, who out-hit South Carolina 8-7. Ryan Hinson pitched 6.0 strong innings in a starting role. He allowed only four hits, one run, and one walk with five strikeouts in a no-decision.

Tigers Blank Coastal Carolina 4-0

Four pitchers combined to lead #6 Clemson to a 4-0 shutout victory over #17 Coastal Carolina at Doug Kingsmore Stadium on March 7. Starter P.J. Zocchi picked up the win by pitching 5.1 innings, while Daniel Moskos struck out three of the four batters he faced to record the save. Matt Zoltak and Stephen Clyne combined with Moskos to pitch 3.2 hitless innings in relief. The Tigers did not allow an extra-base hit as well. Ahead 1-0 late in the game, the Tigers scored three runs in the eighth inning, highlighted by Marquez Smith's RBI double down the left-field line. Clemson out-hit the Chanticleers 11-5, including three hits apiece by Smith and Brad Chalk, and two doubles by Taylor Harbin.

Clemson Wins Last Two Against Memphis

Clemson, ranked #6 in the nation, won two of three games over Memphis from March 9-11 at Doug Kingsmore Stadium. Clemson outscored Memphis by a combined score of 19-10 and had its only loss come in 10 innings. Clemson hit .301 to Memphis' .222 and stole nine bases while committing only two errors. Brad Chalk was 5-for-7 with three walks, three hit-by-pitches, and four steals, while Andy D'Alessio was 7-for-12 with a double and two home runs. Clemson's pitchers also had a 3.21 ERA and 28 strikeouts while allowing just four extra-base hits.

In game-one on March 9, Josh Irvin's two-run single in the 10th inning lifted Memphis to a 6-4 victory over Clemson. Memphis took a 4-0 lead in the fifth inning thanks to a two-run homer by Joseph Lieberman. But Clemson rallied with one run in the fifth and two in the seventh. Then with two outs in the ninth inning, D'Alessio hit a towering solo homer to right-center to tie the score. But Irvin's bases-loaded single in the 10th proved to be the difference. Clemson put 17 runners on base, but only scored four runs and stranded 11 on base. Clemson was also 0-for-9 with runners in scoring position. D'Alessio had a game-high three hits. Matt Vaughn pitched 3.1 scoreless innings in relief, allowing one hit and no walks with six strikeouts as well.

In game-two on March 10, Clemson scored five runs in the sixth inning on its way to an 8-2 victory over Memphis. D'Alessio went 3-for-4 with a two-run homer in the first inning. After Memphis tied the score 2-2, Clemson erupted for five runs in the sixth, highlighted by Marquez Smith's two-run homer to left field. Chalk added a two-run single in the frame. Stephen Clyne picked up the win by pitching 3.1 scoreless innings in relief of one-hit ball with four strikeouts. Ryan Hinson allowed just two runs in 5.2 innings pitched with six strikeouts as well. Two Memphis errors led to four unearned runs scored by Clemson.

In game-three on March 11, five pitchers held Memphis to four hits in Clemson's 7-2 victory. Clemson scored two runs in the second inning and two more in the third. After Memphis cut Clemson's lead to 4-2 in the top of the fifth inning, Clemson responded with two runs in the bottom of the fifth inning on a wild pitch and RBI single by Addison

Johnson. Johnson had two hits and a team-high two RBIs, as Clemson had 10 hits overall. Clemson also stole seven bases, including two each by Chalk and Taylor Harbin. Alan Farina allowed just two hits in 4.2 innings pitched in his first career start, while Brock Schnabel picked up his first win as a Tiger by pitching 1.1 scoreless innings in relief.

Clemson Blanks Georgia Southern 3-0

Four pitchers combined to hold Georgia Southern to three hits in #6 Clemson's 3-0 victory at Doug Kingsmore Stadium on March 14. David Kopp earned the win by tossing 5.0 innings of two-hit ball, while Matt Zoltak, Stephen Clyne, and Daniel Moskos combined to pitch the final 4.0 innings to close out the win. Moskos also earned the save with a scoreless ninth inning. The Tigers upped their scoreless innings streak against the Eagles to 44 innings over the last five meetings. Ben Paulsen hit a run-scoring double in the sixth inning, then Doug Hogan's RBI single in the eighth gave the Tigers an insurance run. Clemson had 10 hits as a team as well.

Tigers Sweep Duke to Open ACC Schedule

Clemson, ranked #6 in the nation, swept Duke by a combined score of 22-12 in three games from March 16-18 at Doug Kingsmore Stadium. The Tigers hit .297 to Duke's .214 in the series, including a team-best 6-for-11 (.545) by Addison Johnson. Brad Chalk was also 5-for-10 (.500) with four walks. Daniel Moskos recorded two saves, while the Tigers had a 3.00 team ERA and 26 strikeouts.

In game-one on March 16, Clemson jumped out to a 6-0 lead and held on for a 6-4 victory over Duke in the Tigers' ACC opener. Clemson scored two runs in the third inning, then Taylor Harbin's three-run homer in the fifth inning put the Tigers ahead 5-0. Duke scored three unearned runs in the eighth inning after the first two batters were retired, then put the tying run on first base in the ninth before Moskos shut the door to earn the save. Starter P.J. Zocchi pitched 7.0 scoreless innings of three-hit ball with eight strikeouts to record the win. The Blue Devils out-hit the Tigers 8-6, but Clemson turned two crucial double plays in the game.

In game-two on March 17, Clemson totaled 12 hits, including seven for extra bases, in its 7-2 win over Duke. The Tigers scored four runs on five hits in the first inning, capped by Marquez Smith's two-run homer. Johnson led off the fourth with his first career home run, then a two-out, two-run single by Andy D'Alessio gave Clemson a 7-0 lead. Every Tiger starter had at least one hit, including two hits and three RBIs by D'Alessio. Ryan Hinson earned the win by allowing two runs on five hits in 6.1 innings pitched, while D.J. Mitchell pitched 2.2 scoreless innings in relief with four strikeouts to close out the game. Both teams were errorless as well.

In game-three on March 18, five Tiger relievers combined to pitch 7.0 scoreless innings in Clemson's 9-6 victory over Duke. Matt Vaughn earned his first career win by pitching 4.0 scoreless innings, while Moskos pitched a perfect ninth inning to record the save. The Blue Devils scored four runs in the first inning, but the Tigers answered with four runs in the bottom of the first, capped by J.D. Burgess' two-out, two-run single. Burgess, who was starting for an



injured Harbin, tallied the first three RBIs of his career. Duke scored two more runs in the third inning, then Clemson regained the lead in the bottom of the third with three runs, including the go-ahead run on David Bunnell's two-out, run-scoring single. All nine Tiger starters scored a run, while only four of Clemson's nine runs were earned thanks to two costly Blue Devil errors.

Western Carolina Tops Clemson 6-3

Western Carolina scored five runs in the sixth inning to defeat #6 Clemson 6-3 at Hennon Stadium on March 20. D.J. Mitchell's first career homer, a two-run shot in the third inning, gave Clemson a 2-0 lead. With the Tigers leading 3-1, the Catamounts scored five runs on four hits in the sixth inning, highlighted by former Tiger John Ingram's go-ahead, run-scoring single to right field. All six of the Catamount runs came in the fifth and sixth innings, while they were retired in order in the other six innings. Clemson did not have a leadoff batter reach base all game and left seven runners on base to the Catamounts' two, as Western Carolina plated six of its nine baserunners in the game. Stephen Clyne's consecutive-scoreless-inning streak also came to an end at 31.1 innings, just shy of the school record of 32.2.

Terrapins Take Two of Three From Tigers

Maryland won two of three games at Shipley Field from March 23-25 despite Clemson outscoring the Terrapins by a combined score of 9-8 in the series. Clemson hit .238 in the series, including a team-best 4-for-11 performance by Andy D'Alessio. Clemson's pitching staff had a 2.13 ERA and struck out 30 against nine walks in the series. The Tigers also allowed just two extra-base hits, both doubles.

In game-one, Chad Durakis' walkoff double in the ninth inning gave Maryland a 4-3 victory over Clemson on March 23. Durakis' two-bagger was the only extra-base hit of the game, as Maryland outhit Clemson 11-8. The Tigers had scored three runs in the ninth inning, highlighted by Alex Burg's two-run single up the middle, to tie the score. Terrapin starter Casey Baron pitched 8.0 superb innings, allowing four hits, no runs, and one walk with seven strikeouts, but did not factor in the decision. Clemson reliever Alan Farina struck out eight in 4.0 innings pitched, as four Tiger pitchers combined for 15 strikeouts.

In game-two, Maryland scored four runs in the fifth inning en route to a 4-1 win over Clemson on March 24. After scoring a run in the fifth, A.J. Casario hit a potential inning-ending, double-play grounder, but David Bunnell could not field the ball. The Terrapins, who had seven hits (all singles), made Clemson pay with three more runs in the frame. The Tigers, who had four hits, scored a run in the eighth on a double off the top of the fence in left field by Taylor Harbin, but the Tigers were 0-for-5 with runners in scoring position in the game. Ryan Hinson suffered his first career loss despite pitching 6.2 effective innings.

In game-three, Head Coach Jack Leggett picked up career win #1,000 in Clemson's 5-0 victory over Maryland on March 25. Leggett became the 29th coach in NCAA Division I history to reach the 1,000-win mark. David Kopp pitched 7.0 innings,

allowing six hits, no runs, and no walks with five strikes to earn the win. Three Tiger pitchers combined to face just three batters over the minimum. Clemson scored three runs in the second inning and two more in the sixth inning. The Tigers had 12 hits and 19 baserunners, but stranded 12 on base. Five different Tigers had two hits apiece, while the Terrapins committed four errors.

Tigers Erupt in 14-2 Win Over Gardner-Webb

Ben Paulsen went 5-for-5 with a homer and six RBIs in #11 Clemson's 14-2 victory over Gardner-Webb at Doug Kingsmore Stadium on March 27. Paulsen became the first Tiger to total more than three hits and three RBIs in a game in 2007, as he hit a three-run homer in the third inning, and added a double and four runs scored. The Tigers had 21 hits in all, including hits by 12 different players and all nine starters. Taylor Harbin added three hits and two RBIs. Matt Vaughn pitched 5.0 effective innings in a starting role to record the win, while four relievers combined to pitch the final 4.0 innings to close out the game. Head Coach Jack Leggett was not at the game, as he was with his ailing father in Vermont.

Tigers Blast Western Carolina 15-6

Behind 16 hits, #11 Clemson defeated Western Carolina 15-6 at Doug Kingsmore Stadium on March 28. The Tigers scored in six straight innings beginning with the second frame. Ten different Tigers had at least one hit, while 12 different Tigers scored at least one run. Taylor Harbin had three hits and three RBIs, while Doug Hogan went 3-for-4 with a double and three runs scored. Ben Paulsen added a two-run home run and three RBIs, and Marquez Smith tallied three RBIs as well. Matt Zoltak earned his first career win, as he pitched 1.2 scoreless innings in relief. The Catamounts committed four errors, which led to seven unearned runs allowed by their pitchers.

Hurricanes Take Two From Tigers

Miami (FL) won the first and last games of a three-game series against #11 Clemson at Doug Kingsmore Stadium from March 30 to April 1. The Hurricanes outhit the Tigers 18-13 and outhit Clemson .276 to .268. Marquez Smith hit a team-best .444 with four walks. Clemson's pitchers had a 5.00 ERA and struck out 29 batters.

In game-one on March 30, Miami scored 10 unanswered runs to come away with a 10-3 victory over Clemson. The Tigers took a 3-0 lead in the third inning, but the Hurricanes responded with four runs in the fourth inning, highlighted by Dennis Raben's three-run homer. Miami added three runs in the seventh inning on Yonder Alonso's three-run long ball, then Alonso hit a solo homer in the ninth inning. The loss snapped Clemson's 21-game home ACC winning streak and seven-game winning streak over Miami. P.J. Zocchi suffered his first loss in 11 career decisions. Brad Chalk's 50-game streak of reaching base also came to an end.

In game-two on March 31, three Tiger pitchers limited Miami to only three hits in Clemson's 4-1 victory. Starter Ryan Hinson earned the win by pitching 6.0 innings, allowing three hits, one run, and two walks with six strikeouts. Stephen Clyne pitched

2.0 hitless and scoreless innings, while Daniel Moskos pitched a perfect ninth inning to record the save. All three of Miami's hits came consecutively in the fifth inning when the Hurricanes scored their only run of the game. Clemson scored three runs in the third inning, aided by a Hurricane error. The Tigers tacked on another run in the fifth inning thanks in part to another error. Chalk had a game-high three hits, as Clemson totaled seven hits in the game.

In game-three on April 1, Miami rallied after an 89-minute rain delay to defeat Clemson 7-6. With the Hurricanes ahead 4-2, the Tigers tied the score in the fifth inning when Addison Johnson hit a run-scoring double and came around to score on a passed ball. The Tigers took the lead the following inning on Ben Paulsen's RBI double to left field. But pinch-hitter Gus Menedez's two-out, bloop single in the seventh inning plated two runs and gave Miami the lead for good. Johnson led the Tigers with three hits and two RBIs. A throwing error by David Kopp on a potential double play led to three unearned runs for the Hurricanes in the fifth inning. Each team totaled three double plays as well.

Tigers Take Two Close Games From Georgia

Clemson, ranked #16 in the country, won both games of a midweek, home-and-home series against Georgia on April 3,4. The Tigers outhit the Bulldogs 15-12 despite being outhit .307 to .279. Addison Johnson was 5-for-7 with three RBIs in the two games.

Alan Farina pitched 3.1 scoreless innings in relief to lead Clemson to a 4-2 win at Georgia on April 3. With Clemson up a run in the fifth inning, Farina shut down Georgia, as he allowed just one hit and no walks with three strikeouts to pick up his first win as a Tiger. Stephen Clyne pitched a scoreless ninth inning to record his first save since 2005. Taylor Harbin's two-run double in the fifth inning gave Clemson the lead for good, as he added another double later in the game. Brad Chalk and Johnson also had two hits apiece. The Tigers did not commit an error, and Clemson only allowed six Bulldog hits and no walks in the contest.

Johnson's two-out, walkoff double in the ninth inning lifted Clemson to an 11-10 win over Georgia at Doug Kingsmore Stadium on April 4. The Tigers trailed by a run in the ninth inning before Wilson Boyd hit a one-out triple. D.J. Mitchell singled home Boyd to tie the score, stole second, and scored on Johnson's double to left field, his third hit of the contest. Georgia outhit Clemson 17-11 and hit four home runs. The Bulldogs scored three runs apiece in the fifth, sixth, and seventh innings, but Clemson responded with runs in each of those innings, including a four-run seventh inning that was highlighted by Boyd's three-run triple. Clyne, the eighth pitcher of the night for Clemson, earned the win after retiring the only batter he faced.

Tigers Sweep Hokies in Chilly Blacksburg

Clemson, ranked #16 in the nation, swept Virginia Tech in chilly and windy Blacksburg, VA by a combined score of 19-10 from April 6-8, as the Tigers won all three games by three runs. The Tigers outhit the Hokies .286 to .262 and hit 11 extra-base hits, including four homers. D.J. Mitchell was 5-for-10, while Marquez Smith went 4-for-11 with two hom-



ers. Clemson, who committed only two errors in the series, had a 2.55 ERA and 24 strikeouts against only seven walks.

In game-one, Smith hit a two-run homer to lead Clemson to a 6-3 win at Virginia Tech in a game that started on April 6 and ended on April 7 due to snow. Neither team could break through with big hits, as Clemson left 12 runners on base and Virginia Tech stranded 11. Mitchell had three hits, including two doubles. The Hokies totaled 13 hits, but they were all singles. Matt Vaughn pitched 5.0 innings to earn the win in relief of Daniel Moskos, who allowed one run in 4.0 innings pitched in his first career start. The Tigers, who totaled five sacrifice bunts and three steals, did not commit an error in 44 chances as well.

In game-two, David Kopp pitched 7.0 solid innings in Clemson's 8-5 victory at Virginia Tech on April 7. Kopp earned the win, as he allowed two runs on five hits with six strikeouts. The Tigers took control with four runs in the first two innings, highlighted by Mitchell's run-scoring single in the second inning. Clemson added three insurance runs in the eighth inning thanks in part to Wilson Boyd's two-run single through the left side. Taylor Harbin had two hits, including a solo home run, and Mitchell added two hits and two runs scored. Both teams had 10 hits as well.

In game-three, Doug Hogan blasted a three-run homer in the 10th inning to lead Clemson to a 5-2 win at Virginia Tech on April 8. Smith hit a solo home run in the first inning, but the Hokies scored single runs in the first and third innings to take the lead. Clemson tied the score in the seventh inning on Harbin's sacrifice fly. Smith led off the 10th inning with an infield single, then Ben Paulsen singled through the right side on a hit-and-run. Hogan followed with a towering three-run homer to left field, his first long ball in 27 games. Alan Farina pitched 4.1 hitless and scoreless innings in relief with seven strikeouts to earn the victory, while Stephen Clyne picked up the save.

Tigers Take Two of Three at Wake Forest

Clemson, ranked #14 in the nation, won two of three games at Wake Forest from April 13-15, as the Tigers won the first and last games of the series. Clemson did not commit an error in the series, while Tiger pitchers combined for 30 strikeouts against only four walks. Brad Chalk was 5-for-6, Wilson Boyd was 5-for-9, and Ben Paulsen was 5-for-10 to lead the Tigers, who out-hit Wake Forest .291 to .277 in the series.

In game-one, Daniel Moskos pitched 6.0 strong innings and five Tigers combined for 12 hits in Clemson's 6-2 victory at Wake Forest on April 13. Moskos struck out seven and allowed just one run to earn the win. D.J. Mitchell pitched 2.0 hitless and scoreless innings of relief to close out the game. Boyd and Chalk each had three hits, while Taylor Harbin added two hits and three RBIs. Addison Johnson went 2-for-3 with a triple and two runs scored as well. The Tigers' three-run sixth inning proved to be the difference. Clemson did not commit an error and held Wake Forest to 1-for-13 with runners on base.

In game-two, Brett Linnenkohl's walkoff single in the ninth inning gave Wake Forest a 6-5 win over

Clemson at Hooks Stadium on April 14. The loss snapped the Tigers' 17-game winning streak in the series. Tyler Smith walked to lead off the ninth, went to second on a balk, and scored two batters later on Linnenkohl's single over the head of Johnson in left field. After the Demon Deacons scored three runs in the fifth inning after the first two batters of frame were retired, Clemson scored four runs in the sixth on two-run doubles by both Doug Hogan and Mitchell. But Evan Ocheltree's solo homer in the bottom of the sixth tied the score. Mitchell and Chalk led Clemson with two hits apiece, while Linnenkohl had three of Wake Forest's 10 hits.

In game-three, Clemson escaped with a 5-4 victory at Wake Forest on April 15. The Demon Deacons scored two runs in the ninth inning and had the potential tying run on second base with one out before the game was eventually called due to heavy rain. The two teams waited 90 minutes until the game was finally called, and there was also a 69-minute weather delay at the end of the fourth inning. Ryan Hinson pitched 7.0 strong innings, allowing two runs on nine hits with eight strikeouts against no walks to earn the win. Andy D'Alessio went 3-for-4 with two doubles and three RBIs as well.

Gamecocks Clip Tigers 4-2 in Columbia

Four Gamecocks hit solo home runs to lead #4 South Carolina to a 4-2 victory over #13 Clemson at Sarge Frye Field on April 18. After hitting a solo homer in the first, the Gamecocks added three more solo homers in the third inning to take a 4-0 lead. Andy D'Alessio's RBI groundout in the fourth inning put the Tigers on the scoreboard, but both teams were scoreless until the ninth inning. D'Alessio's two-out, solo homer in the ninth cut South Carolina's lead to two runs, but the Tigers could get no closer. Each team had six hits and did not commit an error. Matt Vaughn pitched 4.2 solid innings in relief, allowing just one run on three hits.

Virginia Takes Two of Three at Clemson

Virginia, ranked #6 in the nation, won two of three games over #13 Clemson at Doug Kingsmore Stadium from April 20-22. Virginia, who totaled 13 steals, outscored the Tigers 9-5, but Clemson out-hit the Cavaliers .209 to .202 in the series. The Tigers were just 4-for-36 (.111) with runners on base and 2-for-19 (.105) with runners in scoring position in the series as well. Andy D'Alessio was 4-for-10 with a homer and three RBIs to lead Clemson. The Tigers had a 1.33 ERA, allowing just 20 hits and four earned runs with 28 strikeouts in 27.0 innings pitched. The three Tiger starting pitchers combined to allow just one earned run in 17.0 innings pitched as well.

In game-one on April 20, Jacob Thompson limited Clemson to three runs on six hits in 8.0 innings pitched to lead Virginia to a 5-3 win at Doug Kingsmore Stadium. Thompson allowed just one walk with six strikeouts to improve to 9-0 on the season. Only one of the five runs allowed by three Tiger pitchers were unearned, as Virginia scored three unearned runs in the fourth inning. Clemson pitchers fanned 14 Cavaliers as well. D'Alessio's two-run homer in the sixth inning cut Virginia's lead to a run. The Tigers had the potential tying run on sec-

ond base in the ninth inning before Alex Lee struck out to end the game. Virginia out-hit the Tigers 11-7 and left 13 runners on base. The Cavaliers also stole nine bases in nine attempts.

In game-two on April 21, three Cavaliers combined on a four-hit shutout, as Virginia blanked Clemson 3-0 at Doug Kingsmore Stadium. Matt Packer, Michael Schwimer, and Casey Lambert combined to allow four hits and six walks, but stranded all 11 Tiger baserunners to notch the shutout. Clemson had the bases loaded in the ninth inning before D.J. Mitchell struck out to end the game. Virginia scored an unearned run in the eighth inning and two insurance runs in the ninth. Taylor Harbin had a team-high two hits and a double, but Clemson was 0-for-10 with runners on base and did not have a leadoff batter reach base in an inning. Starter David Kopp pitched 7.0 scoreless innings of two-hit ball with five strikeouts.

In game-three on April 22, Ryan Hinson pitched 6.1 scoreless innings of one-hit ball to lead Clemson to a 2-1 win over Virginia at Doug Kingsmore Stadium. Hinson, who took a no-hitter into the seventh inning, allowed one hit with five strikeouts to earn the win. Alan Farina pitched the final 2.2 innings, allowing one run on two hits to pick up his first save as a Tiger. Clemson scored a run in the first on D'Alessio's run-scoring single. After Brandon Guyer robbed D'Alessio of extra bases and started a double play with a diving catch in left field in the eighth, Marquez Smith blasted a two-out, solo homer to up Clemson's lead to 2-0. Virginia scored a run in the ninth before Brandon Marsh grounded into a game-ending double play. Clemson out-hit Virginia 8-3, while the Cavaliers stranded 10 runners on base.

Elon Outlasts Tigers 13-12 in Slugfest

Elon used 12 hits and nine walks to defeat #17 Clemson 13-12 at Doug Kingsmore Stadium on April 24. After the Phoenix scored four runs in the top of the second, Clemson scored six runs in the bottom of the second, highlighted by Doug Hogan's grand slam, to take a 7-4 lead. But Elon chipped away and eventually took a 13-8 lead. Back-to-back homers by Andy D'Alessio and Hogan, his second of the game, in the seventh inning along with a two-out, two-run single by Alex Burg in the eighth inning brought Clemson to within a run, but the Tigers could get no closer. Hogan totaled a game-high five RBIs, while Wilson Boyd added three hits. Clemson out-hit Elon 13-12, but committed a costly error in the fifth inning that led to four unearned runs.

Tigers Pound Gamecocks 14-5 in Series-Finale

A seven-run seventh inning and 16 hits highlighted #17 Clemson's 14-5 victory over #5 South Carolina at Doug Kingsmore Stadium on April 25 in the last of four regular-season matchups between the two rivals. Ben Paulsen's three-run homer in the fifth inning put the Tigers ahead 9-3, and they never looked back. Wilson Boyd, who received the Bob Bradley Award for being Clemson's MVP in the four-game series, was 2-for-4 with a triple and four RBIs. Taylor Harbin added three hits and three RBIs. All 10 Tigers who played in the field scored at least one run and nine had at least one hit. Starter D.J. Mitchell pitched 6.0 innings to earn the win, as he allowed just one run on four hits with six strikeouts.
