

## HISTORICAL GEMS ON CAMPUS

**Zehler Hall (#19)** was built in 1865 and named for Brother Maximin Zehler, S.M., UD's first official president.

**Liberty Hall (#21)**, built in 1866 to serve as a faculty residence, was given its name in the patriotic fervor of World War I.

The **Chapel of the Immaculate Conception (#23)** was consecrated in 1869. Wooden pegs hold its ceiling beams in place. Until electricity came to campus in 1898, it was heated by a wood-burning stove and lit by oil lamps.

**St. Mary's Hall (#24)**, when constructed in 1870, was the tallest and largest building in the city of Dayton. People came from miles away to see the structure referred to as "Zehler's Folly."

**St. Joseph Hall (#20)** was constructed in 1884 on the site of the old convent, which burned down the previous year. Over the years, the building has served as home for the School of Engineering and several academic departments, and as a residence hall for athletes. In December 1987, St. Joe's was damaged by fire, but reopened in the fall of 1989 after a \$6.75 million renovation.

The **Marianist Heritage Center (#25)** was originally constructed in 1903 to serve as a men's shower and latrine.

**Chaminade Hall (#26)**, built in 1904, is named for Father William Joseph Chaminade, founder of the Society of Mary (Marianists).



### Alumni Hall (1924) #17

Marianist community residence; also houses the Center for International Programs, Institute for Pastoral Initiatives, the Marianist vocation ministry office, the honors and scholars programs, the prelaw program and the Women's Center

### Alumni House (1989) #42

Office of Alumni Relations

### William S. Anderson Center (1986) #35

General student PC laboratories and the departments of computer science and management information systems; a gift to UD from the NCR Corporation

### ArtStreet (2004) #44

An innovative learning-living arts center, combining student housing with art galleries, a radio station and ArtStreet Café

### Baujan Recreational Sports Field (1925) #6

Site of UD's first football stadium, now used for intercollegiate soccer

### Bomback Family Learning Center (1987) #40

An early childhood education learning demonstration school, the center enrolls children ranging in age from six weeks to six years from families at UD, NCR and the surrounding community

### Caldwell Street Center (1954) #43

Acquired from NCR in 1982; home to UD offices of career services, internships, cooperative education and the University of Dayton Research Institute (UDRI)

### The Campus South (1969) #46

Ten-story apartment building for sophomores

### Central Mall (2003) #28

Green space for recreation

### Chaminade Hall (1904) #26

School of Education and Allied Professions

### Chapel of the Immaculate Conception (1868) #23

Renovated in 1969, UD's most cherished landmark

### College Park Center (1955) #41

Formerly part of NCR and acquired in 2005; houses central receiving, Dayton Early College Academy, doctor of physical therapy program, environmental health and safety/risk management office, facilities management administrative offices and ground shops, university campus planning office, public safety and parking, School of Education and Allied Professions graduate classes, and UD Printing and Design

### Albert Emanuel Hall (1928) #2

Houses the University archives, the offices of admission, enrollment management, registrar, registration, scholarships and financial aid, and student employment

### Founders Hall (1954) #16

Residence hall for first-year students

### Thomas J. Frericks Athletic and Convocation Center (1950) #3

Originally named the Fieldhouse, renovated and renamed in 1990; includes the departments of health and sport science and athletics, as well as administrative offices and the wellness program; home to the Flyer volleyball team

### Garden Apartments (1978, '79, '81) #39

Sophomore and upperclass student apartments with several campus locations

### Gosiger Hall (1967) #14

Health center and infirmary, counseling center, residential services office and diverse student populations office

### Joseph E. Keller Hall (1997) #38

UD's state-of-the-art School of Law

### John F. Kennedy Memorial Student Union (1964) #27

Center of activity for meetings, dining, special events and entertainment; includes The Hangar, a games and recreation area, and The Galley, a snack shop, both renovated in 2004; a gift shop is located on the first floor; often called KU

### Eugene W. Kettering Engineering and Research Laboratories (1969) #8

School of Engineering and UDRI; interior and exterior renovations began in spring 2005; generally called Kettering Labs

### Virginia W. Kettering Residence Hall (1987) #13

Residence facility housing sophomores in mostly four-person suites; includes a food court, generally called VWK

### Lawnview Apartments (2000) #47

Apartment building that houses 165 juniors and seniors in mostly four-person apartments, complete with fully furnished kitchens and built-in computer workstations

### Liberty Hall (1866) #21

Office of Campus Ministry

### Marianist Hall (2004) #10

Residence facility for 400 first- and second-year students, including the UD Bookstore, UD Post Office, Day Air Credit Union, worship space and learning center; also includes The Emporium, a grocery and convenience store with a full-service deli

### Marianist Heritage Center (1903) #25

In use as the UD Post Office until 2004, plans are underway to transform this facility into a center that will showcase the University's Marianist heritage and its contemporary accomplishments as a Catholic leader in national higher education

### Marycrest Complex (1962) #30

Residence hall with a food court; renovations of the south wing completed in summer of 2006

### McGinnis Center (1926) #45

Student center for residents of the campus neighborhood

### Mechanical Engineering Building (1948) #29

Houses the University's physical plant and contains darkrooms, labs, equipment and offices for the photography program of the visual arts department

### Miriam Hall (1965) #34

Houses the School of Business Administration, including the Davis Center for Portfolio Management and The Blend Express, a student-operated coffee shop

### Music/Theatre Building (1978) #7

Offices, classrooms, music library, studio theatre, dance studio, rehearsal rooms, prop and costume warehouse, and the departments of music and theatre

### O'Reilly Hall (1952) #15

Administrative offices of the College of Arts and Sciences and home to the military science program

### Jesse Philips Humanities Center (1993) #18

Houses the departments of philosophy, American and religious studies, history, languages and English; features computer and language labs and a 180-seat recital hall

### Physical Activities Center (1975) #5

Formerly a recreational facility; currently houses the athletic department; often called the PAC

### Powerhouse (1998) #22

Houses the offices of the Campus OneCard and dining services

### RecPlex (2006) #11

Opened in January 2006, consists of classrooms, climbing wall, juice bar, locker rooms, multi-activity courts, natatorium, offices, student lounge, track and weight room

### Reichard Hall (1962) #4

Home of the UD bands, with two rehearsal halls and several practice rooms and offices

### Rike Center for Fine Arts (1874) #36

Two-story art gallery, classrooms, labs, studios and offices for the visual arts department

### Roesch Library (1971) #37

Houses the University library and Marian library; home to the Ryan C. Harris Learning Teaching Center and The Blend, a student-operated coffee shop

### Rudy's Fly-Buy (1990) #9

Student-operated convenience store

### St. Joseph Hall (1884; rededicated 1989) #20

Houses the departments of communication; political science; psychology; and sociology, anthropology and social work; the criminal justice studies program; and the Fitz Center for Leadership in Community

### St. Mary's Hall (1870) #24

A National Historic Monument, home to the University's administrative offices, including the bursar

### Science Center (2003) #32

This facility connects Sherman and Wohleben Halls and provides 55,000 square feet for classrooms and laboratories

### Sherman Hall (1960) #33

Renovations in 2003 provided additional space for laboratories, classrooms and offices for the departments of physics, mathematics and biology

### Stuart Complex (1964) #12

Residence hall for first-year students including Stuart's Landing, a student-operated convenience store

### Time Warner Cable Stadium (2004) #51

Part of the Arenas Sports Complex and home to UD's baseball team; facility features a press box, covered seating behind home plate, concessions, restrooms and indoor hitting/pitching cages

### UD Softball Stadium (2005) #52

Home to UD women's softball team; stadium features dugouts, batting cages, bullpens and state-of-the-art natural grass playing surface

### University of Dayton Arena (1969) #48

Home of UD Flyer basketball and the Donohoe Basketball Center; renovations to the Arena's interior in 2002 included the addition of loge seating and new suites

### Visitor Parking Information Center (1997) #1

University of Dayton public safety and parking employee directs visitors to parking and buildings on campus

### Jerry Von Mohr Practice Football Field (2005) #50

Utilized by the UD Flyer football team

### Welcome Stadium (1947) #49

Owned by the Dayton Board of Education; the home of UD Flyer football

### Wohleben Hall (1958) #31

Renovations in 2003 provided additional space for laboratories, classrooms and offices for the departments of chemistry and geology, and the premedical programs office

### Zehler Hall (1865) #19

Formerly home to the Center for International Programs and UD Printing and Design; houses programs of social sciences
