BRIAN ROBERTS



Earlier this week Brian Roberts was selected as a First Team All-Atlantic 10 performer. One of the top players in the nation, he's a finalist for four top college basketball awards - Naismith Trophy, Cousy Award, Wooden Award and Lowe's Senior CLASS Award. Roberts also earned a First Team All-District by the National Association of Basketball Coaches. Already having scored 1,887 career points, Roberts ranks in the Top Five in Flyer scoring.

FLYER FACTS...

FLYERS LOOK FOR THEIR FOURTH WIN IN A ROW

In the opening round of the 2008 Atlantic 10 Men's Basketball Championship, the eighth-seeded University of Dayton Flyers take on the No. 9 seed Saint Louis Billikens on Wednesday at noon ET. The game will be carried through WHIO Radio and be available over the Internet with Gametracker, pay-per-view streaming video and a live audio stream from DaytonFlyers.com.

The Flyers, 20-9 overall and 8-8 in the Atlantic 10, enter the tournament with a bit of momentum winning their last three and four of its last six. UD finished tied for seventh with an 8-8 conference record. Senior Brian Roberts leads the Dayton attack with 19.0 points and 3.7 assists per game. However, it's been the Flyer bench that has stepped up during the winning streak out-scoring opponents 52-6 during the three-game win streak. Roberts was named First Team All-Atlantic 10 and Chris Wright to the A-10 All-Rookie Team this week.

Saint Louis has lost three of its last four and finished the regular season 16-14 overall and 7-9 in the A-10. The Billikens average the fewest turnovers per game in the A-10 (12.0) and possess the stingiest defense in the conference allowing 61.5 points per game. In 12 of their 16 wins, the Billikens have held their opponents to fewer than 60 points. Third Team, All-10 selection Kevin Lisch (14.7 points per game) paces the Billiken offense.

SERIES STUFF

UD leads the all-time series 21-18. Dayton won both meetings during the regular season picking up a 68-57 overtime victory on Jan. 12 and winning at home 63-36 on Jan. 30.

DAYTON IN THE ATLANTIC 10 TOURNAMENT

This is UD's 13th season in the Atlantic 10 and in the A-10 Championship. The Flyers have an overall 13-11 record in the tournament, and are 6-3 in the first round. Dayton has won the championship once (2003), placed second once (2004), and tied for third twice (2000 and 2002).

**Fifth Season at UD (95-58, .621)

When the University of Dayton went looking for a new basketball coach, the Flyers were in an enviable position. Unlike programs in need of rebuilding, the University was looking for the coach who would take an already successful program - a ranked team coming off a 24-win season - and raise it to the next level. UD turned to Brian Gregory, one of the rising stars in the coaching profession, to do just that.

And now that the Flyers have Gregory, they want to keep themselves in the enviable position of having him in charge of the Dayton basketball fortunes for a long time. Just two years into his original five-year agreement, the University and head men's basketball coach Brian Gregory worked out to a new contract that will run through the 2012-13 season.

When it was announced, UD Vice-President and Director of Athletics Ted Kissell said "This new contract includes incentives for performance and longevity. It is not just based on what Brian has accomplished in his first two years as our coach, but also for what we believe is to come. Brian Gregory is the right man to move our men's basketball program to a place among the nation's best."

Gregory's 75 wins in his first four seasons trails only the two icons of Dayton Flyer basketball. Don Donoher won a remarkable 96 games in his first four years as a head coach, and Tom Blackburn won 79 in his first four campaigns. Gregory began his tenure at Dayton with a 9-0 record, the second-best start for a new UD coach in the 100+ year history of varsity basketball at the school. Only Harry Solimano, who won his first 25 games over a three-year span that began in 1911, did better.

Dayton was 24-9 in Gregory's first season, winning the EA Sports Maui Invitational (Gregory is the only rookie coach to win the prestigious tournament) at the beginning, and winning the A-10 West at the end. After taking a veteran team to the 2004 NCAA Tournament, Gregory guided one of the youngest teams in the country to an 18-11 record, finishing tied for second in the A-10 West. CBS Sportsline.com and collegeinsider.com chose Gregory as their 2004-05 Atlantic 10 Coach of the Year. After opening his third year 8-3, injuries and a lack of depth limited the Flyers to a 14-17 final record, although it's worth noting five of the wins and 11 of the losses came against post-season teams. Last year, Dayton rebounded to finish 19-12 with nine losses coming on the road against teams that won a combined 74.2% of their home games.

Gregory brought with him to Dayton the knowledge of what it takes to win championships, and a reputation as a top-notch recruiter. On the court, his Flyers won titles in their first two opportunities with the trophies from Maui and the A-10 West division. The first recruiting class Gregory and his staff signed to play for UD was ranked as high as 17th in the nation. He also demonstrated his skills as a bench coach, making savvy move after savvy move in the championship game of the Maui Invitational. Since it was Maui, it would be tempting to say that UD coach Brian Gregory drew up the defense that turned the tide in the Hawai'i game in the sand, but figuratively speaking you wouldn't be far off.

Down eight at halftime, the Flyer coaches refined one of their zone defenses with a secretive walk-through at halftime with the Hawai'i team just a few feet away. Here's Gregory's post-game description: "We thought if they started clicking on offense we might try the zone. But it was close enough for most of the first half, we wanted to save it for the second half, so they couldn't make any adjustments at halftime. We actually did a walk-through of what we wanted to do at halftime. Up where the locker rooms are, there is an open space right outside the locker room door. We put the defense in right there. I told everyone to make sure they were quiet because Hawai'i was just on the other side of the divider they put up between the two teams up there." The strategy and execution it took to win at Maui didn't go unnoticed. ESPN's Jay Bilas made this observation after the tournament: "...Gregory did a great job of preparing his team, and his handling of the second half of the Hawai'i game was outstanding. Gregory's call for a lob play out of a critical timeout was well-conceived and well-executed, worthy of a veteran coach."

Gregory, 40, was named the Flyers' 18th head coach on April 9, 2003 (although he is just the fifth UD coach in the last 59 years). He came to Dayton from Michigan State, where he was associate head coach on Tom Izzo's Spartan staff. While at MSU, he was part of two Final Four teams, including Michigan State's national championship team in 2000. A native of Mount Prospect, Illinois, Gregory brought 13 years of coaching experience to Dayton, with 12 of them coming in the Big Ten. Teams he was with reached the post-season in 12 of his 13 seasons. He began his coaching career in 1990 at Michigan State University on Jud Heathcote's staff until 1995, and then Tom Izzo's staff when Izzo succeeded Heathcote.

In 1996, Gregory followed Stan Joplin when Joplin went from Michigan State to become Toledo's head coach. After one season at Toledo, Gregory returned to the Big Ten by joining Kevin O'Neill's program at Northwestern. Gregory returned to Michigan State for the 1999-2000 season when he joined Tom Izzo's staff in East Lansing. After two seasons serving as an assistant coach, Gregory was elevated to Associate Head Coach for the 2001-02 and 2002-03 seasons. In his last stint at Michigan State, the Spartans went to the NCAA tournament all four seasons, reaching the Final Four in 2000 and 2001, and winning the NCAA national championship in 2000.

In the four years coinciding with Gregory's return to Michigan State, the Spartans had a national championship, two Final Four appearances, three Elite Eight appearances, four NCAA bids, two Big Ten Championships, four players drafted in the first round of the NBA draft, and MSU signed six McDonald's All-Americans.

Gregory graduated from Oakland University in Rochester, Michigan, in 1990 with a Bachelor of Arts in Secondary Education. While at Oakland, he was a three-time all-conference selection, and was named an Academic All-American in 1990. He was inducted into Oakland's Hall of Fame in 1997. Before transferring to Oakland, Gregory spent one year at the United States Naval Academy, and was a teammate of David Robinson on Navy's 1985-86 team that advanced to the NCAA Elite Eight (note: That was not the Navy team that played in the NCAA tournament in UD Arena. Navy beat LSU and lost to Maryland in 1985 at UD Arena.). He also holds a master's degree in Athletic Administration from Michigan State ('92).

Brian and his wife Yvette have two daughters - Isabella, and Elyse.

ROBERTS NAMED A FIRST-TEAM, ALL-ATLANTIC 10 SELECTION

Senior Brian Roberts was named a First Team All-Atlantic 10 selection on March 10. One of the premier players in the country, Roberts is enjoying one of the most acclaimed seasons in Flyer history. A second team all-conference selection in 2005-06 and 2006-07, Roberts is UD's first three-time all-conference performer since Ryan Perryman was third team in 1996, second team in 1997 and first team in 1998.

DAYTON'S ROBERTS NAMED NABC FIRST-TEAM ALL-DISTRICT

On March 4, University of Dayton senior guard Brian Roberts was named First Team All-District by the National Association of Basketball Coaches. Roberts was joined on the NABC District 10 First Team by Notre Dame's Luke Harangody, Indiana's D.J. White and Eric Gordon, and Butler's Mike Green. Roberts is the 10th UD player to be named First Team NABC All-District. Previous first-team selections were Roosevelt Chapman (1984), Tony Stanley (2001), Jim Paxson (1979), Don May (1967 & 1968), Henry Finkel (1966), Bill Uhl (1955), Jack Sallee (1954 & 1955), John Horan (1955) and Don Meineke (1952).

UD'S ROBERTS A FINALIST FOR COUSY AWARD

On Feb. 1, Brian Roberts was selected as one of 16 finalists for the award that goes annually to the top point guard in college basketball. The Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in conjunction with The Hartford Financial Services Group, Inc. announced this year's finalists for the Bob Cousy Award presented by The Hartford. This honor came at the end of a week where Roberts was named to three of the most exclusive lists in college basketball. In addition to being a Cousy finalist, he was also named to the mid-season Top 30 lists for the two awards that go to the nation's top player - the John R. Wooden Award and the Naismith Trophy.

NAISMITH TROPHY LISTS ROBERTS AS ONE OF THE TOP 30 CANDIDATES

The Atlanta Tipoff Club also named Brian Roberts to its midseason Top 30 list for the 2008 Naismith Trophy. This honor comes on the heels of the Toledo native also being named on the mid-season Top 30 for the John R. Wooden Award. Roberts is one of 21 student-athletes named to both lists. The Naismith Top 30 men's list was voted on by the Atlanta Tipoff Club's Board of Selectors, comprised of leading basketball journalists, coaches and administrators from around the country. Roberts is vying to join Marcus Camby (1996) and Jameer Nelson (2004) as the only A-10 Wooden Award winners.

ROBERTS NAMED AMONG THE TOP 10 FOR LOWE'S SENIOR CLASS AWARD

The midseason honors continued for Brian Roberts as one of the Top 10 Finalists for the 2007-08 Lowe's Senior CLASS Award. An acronym for Celebrating Loyalty and Achievement for Staying in School, the Lowe's Senior CLASS Award honors the attributes of senior student-athletes in four areas: classroom, community, character and competition. Roberts, a two-time White Allen Most Valuable Player, is the only Flyer men's basketball player to be named all-conference and academic all-conference in the same season (2006-07).

ROBERTS SELECTED AS THE A-10 PLAYER OF THE WEEK FOR THE THIRD TIME THIS SEASON

University of Dayton senior guard Brian Roberts was named the Atlantic 10 Co-Player of the Week on Feb. 18 for his efforts against Duquesne and Temple. Roberts averaged 22.5 points and four assists while knocking down 8-of-13 attempts from three-point range. The A-10 honored Roberts on Jan. 13 for the second time after averaging 26.5 points and five assists while shooting 15-of-28 from the field and 17-of-19 from the line in wins over No. 22/20 Rhode Island and at Saint Louis. He scored 23 points on 7-of-11 shooting and dished out seven assists in the Flyers' 92-83 win over URI and added 30 points and three assists in the 68-57 overtime win at Saint Louis. Roberts also earned the award on Dec. 30, 2007 after he scored a season-high-tying 31 points to lead the Flyers to an 80-55 victory over the then No. 6 Pittsburgh Panthers.

ROBERTS AMONG THE TOP 30 CANDIDATES FOR THE WOODEN AWARD

Brian Roberts was listed among the top candidates for the John R. Wooden Award, the nation's most coveted college basketball award. Composed of the top 30 players who will compete for this season's player of the year award, the midseason list is based on individual player performance and team records during the first half of the season. Roberts is the only player from the Atlantic 10 on the list.

ESPN THE MAGAZINE RECOGNIZES ROBERTS

In the 2007-08 college basketball preview, *ESPN the Magazine's* Dick Vitale selected Dayton's Brian Roberts as the best player that few have heard about. Roberts has scored in double figures 25 times this season. 52 of his last 58 games and at least 20 points 16 times. Roberts also has a streak of 53 consecutive games with a made three-point field goal.

ROBERTS AMONG THE A-10'S BEST

Brian Roberts is third in the A-10 in points per game (19.0), 2nd in FT% (.877, 103-118), 4th in 3-pt. FG's per game (3.0), 7th in FG% (.479, 181-378), 8th in assists per game (3.7) and 3rd in 3-pt. FG% (.460, 87-189). He is the only A-10 player among the conference leaders in scoring, field goal percentage, 3-point field goal percentage, 3-pointers made, assists, assists-to-turnover ratio (11th, 1.4) and minutes per game (6th, 34.50). Roberts' nine 20-plus point games in A-10 play are the most in the league. Earlier this year Roberts was named to the Preseason First Team All-Atlantic 10 squad.

THE TOLEDO RIFLE

Already having scored 1,887 career points, Brian Roberts ranks in the Top Five in Flyer scoring. He is a virtual lock to be the first UD player to lead the team in scoring three times since Jim Paxson did it in 1978-79. Paxson was also the last Flyer to be named an All-American. Roberts needs 59 points to surpass Paxson on the all-time scoring list four fourth place.

MR. ROBERTS = MR. EFFICIENCY

Over his career, Brian Roberts has demonstrated a knack for two things: scoring his points in short amounts of time, and playing well on the road. He scored at least 10 points in a half 25 times in 2006-07, and has done it 78 times in his career. This season Roberts has tallied double-figures in a half 27 times. His career scoring average away from UD Arena of 16.7 is better than his home average of 14.7.

B-ROB'S BURSTS

Against SMU, Brian Roberts was 10-of-12 from the floor and 3-for-3 from beyond the arc en route to 24 points. In the final 64 seconds at Miami, Roberts netted 12 of his team-high 20 points, and a game-winning 3-pointer in UD's 63-62 victory. At Louisville, Roberts shot 10-of-17 from the field and had no turnovers in 37 minutes of play. Against Loyola Roberts converted all 12 free throws en route to a game-high 20 points. In the Pittsburgh contest, Roberts knocked down 10-of-17 shots, including 5-for-8 from beyond the arc. Roberts scored 23 points and went 7-of-11 from the floor and 6-of-7 at the line in a win over Rhode Island. In the first Saint Louis game he scored seven of his game-high 30 points in overtime. Roberts recorded 19 of his 21 points in the second half against UMass thanks in part to hitting 7-of-8 free throws. Roberts poured in 17 of his team-high 20 points in the second half at Richmond. He scored 18 points on 7-of-8 shooting from the floor and 4-for-4 from three-point range over Saint Louis. At Rhode Island, Roberts scored 13 of his team-high 17 points in the second half. At George Washington, scored a team-high 20 points. Roberts led all scorers with 22 points on 9-of-17 shooting versus Duquesne. He shot 7-of-11 from the floor and 4-of-6 from beyond the arc to finish with 23 points over Temple. Roberts scored a game-high 30 points to go with six assists at La Salle. He led UD with 15 points in the Xavier rematch. Added a team-high 12 points over Fordham. At St. Bonaventure, he hit his first five shots and finished with 24 points on 9-of-14 shooting. Roberts scored 15 points to go with six assists over Saint Joseph's.

BRIAN ROBERTS CLIMBING THE CHARTS

Senior Brian Roberts has quietly created a niche for himself in Dayton Flyer basketball history. His career numbers are already better than most who have worn the Red and Blue. Up to this point, Roberts is poised to step into the All-American Spotlight.

ROBERTS NAMED TWO-TIME ESPN.COM "WEEKLY WATCH" PLAYER OF THE WEEK

Speaking of an award winner, Brian Roberts earned national notice on Dec. 31 when ESPN college basketball analyst Andy Katz named him the national player of the week in his "Weekly Watch" column on ESPN.com. Roberts is the only player in the nation to earn the award twice this season. Roberts first earned the honor on Dec. 10, 2007 after he scored 28 points on 10-of-17 shooting in UD's 70-65 win at Louisville.

LIFE OF BRIAN

In UD's five games this season against ranked competition, Brian Roberts averages 20.4 points, 3.8 assists and 2.0 rebounds per game. He is shooting 33-of-64 from the floor (.516), 14-of-29 (.483) from beyond the arc and 22-of-24 at the free throw line (.917). For his career, he averages 17.0 points (nine games) and 18.5 as a starter (eight starts).

B-ROB B-GOOD

A three-time All-Atlantic 10 selection and UD Most Valuable Player, Brian Roberts is just the sixth Flyer to earn MVP honors in three seasons. Roberts is also the only UD player in the school's top five in career 3-pt. FG% and FT%. His .442 (280-634) from behind the arc is first at UD and his .852 FT% (357-419) is third.

MIDSEASON MARVEL

Sports Illustrated's Seth Davis wrote a midseason award column and named Brian Roberts a Second Team All-American. Davis also categorized Dayton as one of this college basketball season's surprise teams. In six career overtime games Roberts is averaging 24.5 points a game, including 35 points during the 45 minutes of overtime played.

WRIGHT NAMED A-10 ALL-ROOKIE SELECTION

On March 10, freshman Chris Wright earned a spot on the A-10 All-Rookie team. The 6-8 freshman forward from Trotwood, Ohio is the fifth Dayton player to be selected to the Atlantic 10 All-Rookie Team. Tony Stanley (2001), Brooks Hall (2000), Keith Waleskowski (2001) and Brian Roberts (2005) are the previous Flyer A-10 Rookies. Wright's eight minutes of conference action is likely the fewest of any previous A-10 All-Rookie Team selection. But that's not to say he isn't deserving. He played eight minutes in the A-10 opener against Rhode Island before fracturing a bone in his ankle that required surgery on January 14. But before that, he was chosen A-10 Rookie of the Week four times in the first six weeks of the season (the last player to do that was Jameer Nelson).

THE WRIGHT STUFF

The Flyers have certainly missed the presence of Chris Wright. UD was 13-1 before his injury and 7-8 since then. After 13 games Wright had four Atlantic 10 Rookie of the Week honors. He first earned the award on Nov. 11 after netting the first double-double in a Flyer freshman debut with 22 points and 13 rebounds against East Tennessee State. Wright earned the honor again on Nov. 25 behind 26 points and 12 rebounds over Toledo. Wright had a double-double in the first half against High Point and finished the contest with 16 points and 13 boards. On Dec. 16, Wright earned the Rookie of the Week honor for the fourth time this season. He is still the only player A-10 player to have won the award outright four times. Wright leads the team in rebounding (6.0), and FG% (.605, 52-86). Wright is second on the team in scoring (10.4), blocked shots (11) and FT% (.811, 30-37). At the time of his injury, he was the top freshman in the A-10 in scoring, free throw and field goal percentage, blocks and rebounding and had three double-doubles.

LITTLE BIG MAN

At 6-foot-6, 237 pounds, junior Charles Little might be the most inaccurately named player in the country. This season, despite fracturing his big toe in the UMass game, Little is second in offensive rebounds (53), third in rebounding (4.7) and fourth on the team in scoring (8.2). Little has also scored in double-figures in six of his last 12 games. Over his last 16 games Little is shooting 54-of-100 from the floor (.540). In his first game of the year, Little tallied 13 rebounds to go with seven points in the Flyers win over ETSU. His 20 points in the Toledo win almost doubled what he had in the season's first two games. Against High Point, Little dished out a career-high five assists. In the Loyola win he shot 5-of-7 from the floor to finish with 12 points. Little added nine points off the bench in a win over Rhode Island. At Saint Louis Little scored 16 points on 7-of-11 shooting. He added 16 points on 6-of-7 shooting against Charlotte. Little recorded his first double-double of the season with 12 points and 11 rebounds at George Washington. Little then chipped in with nine points, four rebounds and four assists versus Duquesne. He added nine points off the bench at home against Xavier. Little came back to add 11 points and seven boards at Fordham. He tallied nine points and three rebounds over St. Bonaventure. Little had 11 points and six boards over Saint Joseph's. The junior finished last season as the 2007 A-10 Sixth Man of the Year.

CHARLES IN CHARGE

In his last 29 games against Atlantic 10 competition, Little averages 10.8 points and 5.3 rebounds while shooting 139-of-264, (.523) from the floor. Little posted a career-high 28 points against Xavier and hauled in 16 rebounds at Temple last season. This season against the A-10, Little averages 9.3 points and 4.6 rebounds per game while shooting .527 from the field. In UD basketball history, Little is 69th on the all-time scoring list with 693 career points. He needs 17 points to eclipse Shawn Hauthn for 68th all-time.

MARVELOUS MARCUS

Marcus Johnson has quietly put together a solid sophomore campaign averaging 9.4 points and 5.2 rebounds per game. The sophomore guard has scored in double figures 14 times this season and in 12 of his last 19 games. He leads the team with 151 total rebounds, second in rebounding average (5.2) and minutes played (29.7), ranks third on the team free throw percentage at (.760) and steals (18). Against Duquesne, Johnson tallied his team-leading, third double-double of the season with 11 points and 12 rebounds to go with a career-best three blocks. Johnson recorded his third career double-double with 15 points and 13 rebounds against UMass. He added double-double game (15 points, 11 rebounds) in a victory over then No. 6 Pittsburgh.

MORE ON MJ

Marcus Johnson has been at his best from the line in the clutch, making 15-of-19 in the final minute of regulation. He nailed two in the final minute against Louisville and 4-of-4 to seal the win over American. Johnson scored 16 points versus Loyola. Against Akron Johnson filled every stat column by recording 16 points, seven rebounds, three assists, two steals and a blocked shot. In the Rhode Island game, Johnson finished with 14 points and five rebounds. His three-pointer with the shot clock winding down and 58 seconds gave UD a seven-point lead and was the last field goal of the game. At Saint Louis, Johnson recorded five of his game-high eight rebounds in the final minute of regulation and overtime. At Xavier, Johnson led all UD scorers with 12 points. At Richmond, he netted 10 points and four rebounds. Johnson added 10 points and five boards at Rhode Island. He added six points and five rebounds in a win over Charlotte. Johnson dished out a career-best four assists to go with eight points and five rebounds at George Washington. In the Temple win, Johnson had 14 points and three rebounds. Johnson added six points and a team-high seven boards in the Xavier rematch. Johnson was just shy of a double-double with nine points and nine boards at Fordham. He added 13 points and four rebounds at St. Bonaventure. Finished the regular season with a team-high 17 points and seven rebounds over Saint Joseph's.

MARCUS MADNESS

This year in March, Marcus Johnson averages 13.0 points, 6.3 rebounds and is 16-of-16 at the free throw line. Johnson is 10-of-15 from the field and scored in double figures twice.

SNAP INTO A SLIM JIM

Jimmy Binnie, along with classmate Brian Roberts, are the first Brian Gregory players to live the college basketball experience from start to finish - recruiting, verbalizing, signing, playing and, come spring, graduating. This season Binnie ranks second on the team in 3-pt FG % at .376 (35-93) and made 3-pointers. The senior is averaging 6.1 points and 3.9 rebounds per game while shooting 44 percent from the field. Binnie scored 14 points on 5-of-7 shooting from the floor over Akron. Before that he tallied 13 points on 5-of-6 shooting from the floor in a win at Holy Cross. At Saint Louis he knocked down 2-of-3 three-point attempts en route to seven points. When Saint Louis came to UD Arena, he added seven rebounds. At Rhode Island, Binnie recorded 10 points and five rebounds. Binnie added a career-high 15 points and seven rebounds over Charlotte. He chipped in with five points, four rebounds and two steals at GW. He added five points and two assists versus Duquesne. Binnie had seven points and five rebounds over Temple. At La Salle Binnie tallied nine points and six rebounds. Binnie tallied nine points at Fordham. He added four points, four rebounds and two steals at St. Bonaventure. Binnie closed the regular season with 12 points and eight rebounds over Saint Joseph's.

ENTER SANDMAN

Senior Andres Sandoval quickly raised his level of play since being inserted as a starter averaging 8.3 points and 3.4 rebounds per game in 18 starts. At Richmond, Sandoval netted career-bests nine rebounds and two blocks to go with a season-high 17 points. He followed that up with 15 points on 5-of-10 shooting against Saint Louis. Sandoval scored 12 points to go with three assists in the win over Rhode Island. Against Charlotte, Sandoval added four steals to go with 10 points. He added 15 points, seven rebounds and a career-high four steals over Temple. At La Salle, Sandoval shot 8-of-12 from the floor to match his season-high of 17 points. He had six points and four rebounds at home against No. 10/12 Xavier. In the Fordham win, he took two charges and had five rebounds. Sandoval added 13 points, including a 3-pointer with 21 seconds left at St. Bonaventure. Sandoval added 12 points and three steals over Saint Joseph's. One of the most underrated aspects of Sandoval's game has been his defensive effort of late. Sandoval has 19 steals in his last nine games. Sandoval's 27 steals on the season is second on the team with 20 of those in conference play.

THE JACKSONVILLE JET

London Warren (a.k.a. the "Jacksonville Jet," as dubbed by the WHIO Radio team of Larry Hansgen and Bucky Bockhorn), has been one of the best defensive players for UD this season. Warren leads UD with 39 steals, with 38 of them in his last 26 games. In the A-10, Warren ranks 17th with 1.3 steals per game. Warren tallied career-bests 13 points and 10 rebounds to go with five assists at Rhode Island. At Richmond he added 11 points and matched that point total the following game against Saint Louis. Warren scored all six of his points in double overtime in UD's win over Akron. At Louisville, Warren snagged a career-high four steals in UD's win and matched that number with four steals to go with six points and eight rebounds versus Loyola. His layup and two free throws with less than a minute remaining gave UD the lead over Charlotte. Warren had five points, three assists and two steals over Temple. At La Salle, Warren delivered 10 points and seven assists. He had seven points in 10 minutes of action at St. Bonaventure. Warren filled up the stat sheet with five points, three rebounds, three assists, two steals and a blocked shot over Saint Joseph's.

THOMAS THE TRAIN

Freshman Stephen Thomas has appeared in all but seven games this season. Thomas averages 0.7 points and 0.5 rebounds per game. Against Akron, Thomas gave quality minutes off the bench and hit his only field goal attempt. Thomas connected on a three-pointer, added an assist and steal at Xavier. He dished out a career-best two assists versus Charlotte.

BEING "KURT" TO THE OPPOSITION

Sophomore Kurt Huelsman continues to improve as the season rolls along. Huelsman battled against DeJuan Blair, the Big East's three-time Rookie of the Week, by recording 12 points and eight rebounds in UD's win over then No. 6 Pittsburgh. Not to be outdone, he responded with a career-best 18 points against Akron and 10 points on 4-of-5 shooting over Rhode Island. Huelsman scored 14 points on 6-of-9 shooting from the field in the Miami win, came up big again with a team-high seven rebounds and five points in the victory at Louisville and added another career-high with 11 boards over American. At Rhode Island, Huelsman tallied 12 points and six rebounds. Huelsman tallied seven points and five rebounds at GW. Against No. 10/12 Xavier, he finished with six points. Huelsman scored 11 points and limited Bryant Dunston to just one offensive rebound, three under his average in the Fordham win.

HUELSMAN GETS IT DONE

After being held scoreless in his first three games, Kurt Huelsman has 175 points thanks to 56 percent (67-of-120) shooting during that span and scoring in double figures in seven games. Last year Huelsman did not score in double figures in any contest. Through 29 games, he already has career highs in points, rebounds (120), steals (8), minutes (641) and assists (22). Huelsman was the only player to start every game last year for UD and has started all 29 games this season. The 6-10 big man averages 6.0 points and 4.1 rebounds per game. Huelsman has five or more rebounds in 11 games this year and earned UD's Best Defender Award for 2006-07. Against ranked teams, Huelsman averages 7.8 points and 5.0 rebounds per game. UD is 6-1 when Huelsman scores in double figures.

DIAL IN WITH DEVIN

Freshman Devin Searcy averages 1.2 points and 1.4 rebounds this season. He got going on both ends of the floor in UD's win over SMU by hauling in five rebounds (three on the offensive glass) and picked up his first two points as a Flyer. He followed that up with a career-high six points against High Point in 11 minutes of action. In eight minutes of action against then No. 6 Pittsburgh, Searcy tallied three rebounds. At Xavier, Searcy hauled in four defensive rebounds. Against La Salle, Searcy chipped in with three points and three rebounds in nine minutes of action. In the second Xavier contest, Searcy tallied four points and three rebounds. Searcy has eight rebounds and two steals in his last five games.

HEY MICKEY

Redshirt sophomore Mickey Perry broke out in a big way with eight points in nine minutes against Rhode Island to open A-10 play. He enjoyed a memorable UD debut when he knocked down a 3-pointer, grabbed two rebounds and recorded a block in the Flyers win against Coppin State. He added seven points and six boards against UMass. Against Temple he knocked down both three-point shots and finished with six points, one rebound and one assist. Perry had four points, two rebounds and two assists over Xavier. He snagged five rebounds and had two assists over Saint Joseph's. Perry has hit seven of his last 15 field goals in the last six games. In 18 contests this season Perry is shooting 17-of-47 (.362) from the floor and averages 2.6 points. The Flyers are 6-1 this season when Perry knocks down a three-point basket.

ON THE GO WITH THIAGO

After leading all junior college players in blocked shots per game last season, Thiago Cordeiro has started to get comfortable at UD. In his last 19 games, he is averaging 2.2 points and 1.5 rebounds, shooting .577 (15-26) FG and blocked 15 of his season's 16 shots. He had a season-high 11 points against American. The 6-9 big man came off the bench to add seven points and three rebounds at Xavier. Cordeiro added a career-best four blocks to go with four points and six rebounds over Duquesne. Cordeiro is second on the team in FG% (.535, 23-43) and leads in blocked shots (16).

FILLING UP THE STAT SHEET

Dayton has had five different players lead the team in scoring this season – Brian Roberts (22 times), Chris Wright and Marcus Johnson (twice), and Jimmy Binnie, Kurt Huelsman and Charles Little (once each). In rebounding, nine players have taken honors in at least one game – Johnson and Binnie (eight each), Little (six), Wright (five), Huelsman (four), Andres Sandoval (twice), and Thiago Cordeiro, Devin Searcy and London Warren (once). (Note: rebounding numbers add up to more than 29 due to five games where more than one player tied for the team-high).

THE FLIGHT CLUB

Through 29 games in 2007-08, the Flyers have surpassed last season's total with 57 dunks. Charles Little leads the team with 27, followed by Chris Wright (16), Marcus Johnson (9), Andres Sandoval (3), London Warren (1) and Kurt Huelsman (1). Dayton had 55 in 31 games last season. The five dunks by Wright in the SMU game were the second-most by an individual at UD (by one) and the most by a freshman.

THAT'S A CATCH-22

UD has held opponents to 22 points or less in a half six times this season. In 2006-07, UD achieved that mark seven times.

HEAD OF THE A-10 CLASS

UD placed 93 student-athletes on the 2007 Fall Semester A-10 Commissioner's Honor Roll that was announced on Feb. 13. That was the fifth-most in the league, even though the Flyers play fewer A-10 sports than all but one Atlantic 10 school.

UD SIGNS TOP RECRUITING CLASS OF BENSON, FABRIZIUS, JOHNSON AND WILLIAMS

Coach Brian Gregory and his staff landed their fifth strong recruiting class at UD, as the Flyers received National Letters of Intent Nov. 14 from their 2008 incoming freshman class. The newest members of the Flyer family are 6-10 forward Josh Benson of Dayton Dunbar High School, 6-9 forward Luke Fabrizious of John Hersey High School (Arlington Heights, IL), 6-5 guard/forward Chris Johnson of Columbus (OH) Brookhaven High School and 6-3 guard Paul Williams of Detroit Renaissance High School. The 2007-08 signing class is ranked as high as 37th in the country (HoopScoopOnline.com) and features three Street & Smith's High School All-Americans.

EYE 75 ON THE SCOREBOARD

The Flyers are 29-4 under head coach Brian Gregory when they score at least 75 points.

DOING IT WITH DEFENSE

This season the Flyers rank third in the A-10 in scoring defense, allowing 64.4 points per game. UD is 9-2 when holding opponents to 59 points or less this year.

DOUBLE THE FUN

Through 29 games this season Chris Wright, Marcus Johnson, Charles Little and London Warren are the only Flyers to have recorded double-doubles this season. Here are UD's double-double performances during the 2007-08 campaign.

GREGORY NAMED PHELAN MID-SEASON AWARD WINNER BY COLLEGEINSIDER.COM

On Jan. 9, a 20-person panel of college basketball experts selected UD head coach Brian Gregory as the winner of the mid-season Jim Phelan Coach of the Year Award. CollegeInsider.com renamed its mid-season and end-of-the-year coach of the year awards after Phelan, the long-time coach of Mount St. Mary's University, in 2003.

BALANCING ACT

The Flyers have eight players who are averaging four points or more this season. Against Louisville, all nine players who saw the court scored at least a field goal in UD's win. All 11 scholarship players who played in the win at Holy Cross scored at least two points, and all 10 that saw action against High Point grabbed at least two rebounds. In fact, every scholarship player who played has scored in six games this season.

STARTING OFF STRONG

UD's 12-1 non-conference record marked just the fourth time in school history the Flyers reached 10 wins before January 1.

GLASS CLEANERS

The Flyers have out-rebounded their opponent in nine of its last 11 games and in 18 of the last 21 contests. Dayton allows the fewest rebounds in the A-10 (29.3) and have the second best rebounding margin in the conference (+5.4). This is with no Dayton player listed in the Top 20 rebounders in the A-10.

SAILING THE ATLANTIC

The Flyers hold an all-time 256-188 edge over Atlantic 10 conference opponents and have finished .500 or better in eight of the previous nine seasons.

REWARDING RESERVES

The Flyers' reserves have stepped up this season out-scoring the opponent's bench in 17 of 29 games. UD's bench holds a 534-448 edge in scoring this season.

BLOCK PARTY

Although UD is 13th in the A-10 in blocks, UD tied the school record for blocks in a single game with nine against Duquesne. The Flyers have at least one block in the last nine games.

ROAD LESS TRAVELED

Dayton defeated three 2007 NCAA teams on their home courts this season (Louisville, Miami, Holy Cross). The Flyers have already surpassed the number of road games won all of last year and won six road games for the first time since Brian Gregory's first year at UD. Four Flyer scholarship players average more points on the road than at home during the 2007-08 season.

UD A NATIONAL LEADER IN LATEST GSR REPORT

The University of Dayton Division of Athletics maintained its position as one of the top academic achievers in the NCAA in the latest breakdown of the Graduation Success Rate data released in November. UD has an institutional GSR of 95 percent which ranks first among the Atlantic 10 Conference and 16th overall in the nation. The men's basketball team had the second highest GSR in the A-10 at 82 percent. Success in the classroom is nothing new for UD student-athletes. UD has had 27 Academic All-Americans in the last six years. Also, at least one Dayton student-athlete has been named an Academic All-American for 22 straight years.

TOURNEYTOWN

The NCAA Division I Tournament will make its start at UD Arena this season for the seventh year in a row. The NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Committee has announced that the University of Dayton Arena will host the NCAA Opening Round Game in 2008. UD has hosted the game since its inception in its current form in 2002. When the 2008 NCAA Tournament is over, UD Arena will have been an NCAA site in 22 of the last 39 years and will have hosted 77 NCAA Tournament games. That will make UD Arena the third-most prolific NCAA Tournament venue behind Municipal Auditorium in Kansas City (83) and the Huntsman Center in Salt Lake City (81). The Arena will be a First and Second Round site for the 2009 NCAA Men's Basketball Championship, and a Regional site for the 2010 NCAA Women's Basketball Championship.

HOME SWEET HOME

The Flyers' started off the season 10-0 at home for the second consecutive year. Last year UD's 15-2 record at home matched the 4th-best efforts in UD Arena history in home court wins in a season and home court winning percentage in a season (.882). Dayton won its first 14 home games during the 2006-07 season, the second-best streak in UD Arena history (behind only the 15 from December 17, 1984 to March 3, 1985).

SNOW DAY? NO WAY

Despite a blizzard warning and a three area counties under a Level Three snow emergency, approximately 7,000 fans made it to UD Arena for the Senior Day game with Saint Joseph's.

FLYER FAITHFUL

For years, UD has claimed it has had the best fans in the nation. In 2001, The Sporting News conducted an unscientific poll of college basketball coaches, media and SIDs. In the Jan. 8, 2001 issue of the magazine, UD's fans were tabbed as college basketball's best. And they prove it to everyone the Flyers play.

In 2007-08 UD had the second-best average home attendance in school history (12,801). UD Arena has 85 sellouts in its 38-year history and seven so far this year. The record for sellouts is eight held in the Arena's first season 1969-70. UD's last 135 regular season home games have had attendance of at least 11,000 fans. In the last 14 years, 99% of UD's home games have drawn at least 10,000 (373 of 375), including the last 172 regular season games. Also UD finished in the Top 30 in men's basketball attendance for the 10th straight season in 2006-07, according to a report by the NCAA. The Flyers finished 28th in the NCAA in attendance with an average of 12,266 fans a game. Since UD Arena opened in 1969, Dayton has been in the NCAA's top 35 in attendance every season. The Flyers led the Atlantic 10 in attendance for the 11th straight season. UD averaged more than 2,300 fans a game better than any other team in the conference.

DID YOU KNOW?

UD won more games than any other school in both the 1950s and '60s. UD won 435 games between 1950 and 1969 and ranks among the top teams of the 1950s and 1960s in Division I history. The Flyers' .763 (228-71) winning percentage in the 1950s ranks fifth in the decade. Their .729 (207-77) winning percentage ranks eighth in the 1960s.

The Perry File

Phillip "Mickey" Perry joins the Flyers after transferring mid-year last season from the University of Wisconsin. He became eligible nine games into the 2007-08 campaign. A 2005 graduate of Chicago-area power Proviso East High School, Perry redshirted his first season at Wisconsin before playing seven games last year. He will have two-and-a-half years of eligibility left for the Flyers. Not only does Perry bring strong basketball skills to the UD campus, but he also knows what it takes to win on the court, having played for tremendously successful programs in high school, AAU and at the college level.

After averaging 20.0 points, 7.1 assists and 5.0 rebounds a game as a senior at Proviso East, Perry was Associated Press Third Team All-Illinois and a member of the Chicago team that played in the 2005 Old Spice Red Zone All-Star Shootout. Proviso East High's basketball products include NBA players Michael Finley, Dee Brown, Shannon Brown and Steven Hunter. Perry also played his AAU basketball for Larry Butler's Illinois Warriors, where his teammates included Julian Wright of Kansas, Jon Scheyer of Duke and Justin Dentmon of Washington.

In seven games last season, he averaged three minutes, 1.0 points and 0.5 rebounds a game behind a deep backcourt that includes all-conference performer Kamron Taylor. Wisconsin was ranked fourth in the nation when Perry came to Dayton.

The Roberts File

Brian Lloyd Roberts enters his senior season ready to write the final chapter on one of the best careers by any player at the University of Dayton. Already having scored more than 1,500 career points, he is projected to finish in the Top Five in Flyer Scoring. A two-time All-Atlantic 10 selection, Roberts is just the eighth Flyer to earn MVP honors as a sophomore and junior. And he is the only one of those eight to improve all of his numbers across the board - scoring, shooting, minutes, assists, steals, even blocked shots - from his sophomore to his junior year. Roberts led UD in scoring (18.5), assists (2.7), minutes (35.6), 3-pt. FG's per game (2.7), FT% (.899, 133-148) and 3-pt. FG% (.458, 82-179) in 2006-07. He has a more than solid chance to be the first UD player to lead the team in scoring three times since Paxson did it in 1978-79. It just so happens that Paxson was also the last Flyer to be named an All-American. Roberts also ranked third in FT%, third in 3-pt. FG and fourth in 3-pt. FG% on the Flyer single-season charts last season. He shot almost as many free throws (148) in 2006-07 as he did in his first two seasons combined (153). Roberts was the only player listed among the Atlantic 10's top five in scoring (3rd), minutes (2nd), FT% (2nd), 3-pt. FG% (2nd) and 3-pointers per game (5th). He enters the season with the third-highest shooting percentage from three-point range (minimum 1.5 made per game) in A-10 history. Robert's .433 (193-445) is behind Pat Carroll's (SJU) .445 and Richard McCormick's (SBU) .444. One of the greatest shooters in the country, Roberts is already the only UD player in the school's top five in career 3-pt. FG% and FT%.

Not just a strong performer on the court, Roberts is also one of just four Dayton players to be named winner of the White-Allen MVP Award and the John L. Macbeth Memorial Scholar-Athlete Award (top GPA). He is also the only Flyer men's basketball player to be named all-conference and academic all-conference in the same season. Roberts was consistently good as a junior, hitting double figures in 28 of his 31 games. He had a streak of 34 consecutive free throws made during the 2006-07 season. That tied the second-best run in UD history (Bobby Joe Hooper also made 34 during the 1965-66 season) and was just two away from the school record of 36 by Damon Goodwin in 1983-84. As a sophomore, Roberts was named second team all-conference in his first season as a starter. He led UD in scoring (16.0), minutes (33.4), and three-pointers made (68). He was seventh in the A-10 in scoring, and was the only player in the A-10 among the conference's top ten in scoring who was also in the conference's top dozen players in assists, three-pointers, FG%, and 3-pt. FG%. In a season of breakout games, some rise above the others. He just about matched Bluejay All-American Nate Funk shot-for-shot with a career-high 34 points (Funk had a career-high 38) at Creighton. His 24 points led all scorers in UD's win at Cincinnati. He tallied 14 points (although that was almost a third of UD's points) and scored the game-winner with 3.6 seconds left in the 46-44 win against Saint Louis at home. As a freshman, he came off the bench in 28 of the 29 games, and was second on the team in scoring (9.2), FG% (.450, 90-200) and three-pointers (43). He was named to the 2004-05 Atlantic 10 All-Rookie Team, and was the only non-starter on the team. Roberts was also named UD's Most Improved Player after reaching double figures in 11 of the last 17 games of the year.

Roberts was the 2004 Ohio Division I Co-Player of the Year after guiding Toledo St. John's High School to the state championship game. Roberts' 18 points in the finals led all scorers as Hamilton edged St. John's 51-48. Roberts had a 70-11 career record in his three seasons as his team's starting point guard. In addition to reaching the 2004 state finals, TSJ was ranked #5 in 2003 and #1 in the state in 2002. His teams reached the Ohio Elite 8 in 2002, the state final semifinals in 2003, and the title game in 2004.

The Sandoval File

Andres Campbell Sandoval had an up-and-down first season at Dayton after transferring from Santa Fe Community college in Gainesville, Florida. He began the year on a downer, breaking a bone in his foot that required a titanium screw to be placed in it. He was expected to be out 4-6 weeks, but apparently didn't get the memo. He was back on the court exactly 19 days after the surgery to place the screw in the foot.

He bounced back in league action later in the year with performances like a career-high 21 points (previous UD high was nine, and Richmond high was 15) and adding six assists and six rebounds in the win over George Washington. He was big in the Saint Louis win, coming off the bench to score 14 points and grab six rebounds. At Rhode Island, he scored nine points, had five rebounds and four assists off the bench. At Duquesne, he scored seven points (4-4 FT) and tied his college career high with seven assists. He had ten points in the Xavier game in Dayton. For the year, he was third on the team in assists (2.3) and averaged 5.9 points and 2.8 rebounds.

He will begin the 2007-08 season with another "downer," although this one is a positive one. He has dropped 30 pounds in the off-season, and is listed at 6-4, 198 heading into his final college campaign. Sandoval transferred to UD from Santa Fe Community College last season, averaging 5.9 points, 2.8 rebounds and 2.3 assists (third on the team).

He began his college career as a freshman three seasons ago at Atlantic 10 rival Richmond, and left there when Jerry Wainwright went from Richmond to DePaul. But since he had already used his redshirt season during 2003-04 for medical reasons, Sandoval transferred to Santa Fe Community College in Gainesville, Florida. He will use his remaining two years of eligibility at Dayton. At Santa Fe, he played and started in 18 games, averaging 15.4 points, 3.9 assists, 3.2 rebounds and 2.1 steals.

As a freshman at Richmond, he averaged 6.1 points, 3.1 rebounds, 2.4 assists and 1.8 rebounds in 22 games (19 starts). His 37 steals led the Spiders and was sixth in the A-10. Over the last five games of the year, he had three double-digit performances and averaged 10.2 points, 2.6 assists and 4.0 rebounds in that closing run.

He was a three-time All-Massachusetts selection in high school, averaging 27 points a game in two seasons at Marlboro High School, before switching to the Winchendon School, which plays in the highly competitive New England Prep School Athletic Conference.

The Warren File

London Warren (a.k.a. the "Jacksonville Jet," as dubbed by the WHIO Radio team of Larry Hansgen and Bucky Bockhorn) came on in the last 14 games of the 2006-07 season, a time when most freshmen have hit the proverbial wall. A jet-quick guard known for his explosiveness and defensive tenacity, his play down the stretch was clearly better than the first 19 games of the season, but even more dramatic is his reversal from the beginning of the A-10 schedule. After averaging just 7.7 minutes, 0.7 points, 1.2 assists and 1.7 turnovers in the first six league games, Warren has averaged 18.1 minutes, 4.2 points, 3.4 assists and just 1.8 turnovers in the last 14 games, earning earned starts in the last seven games. He shot .250 (8-32) from the floor in the first 19 games, but shot .487 (19-39) in the final 14 games. For obvious reasons, Warren was named the winner of the 2006-07 Chris Daniels Memorial Award, which goes to the most improved player on the UD basketball team. He scored a career-high 10 points at SBU with two assists and no turnovers. He raised his career best to eight assists with (six points and just one turnover) in the Charlotte during the A-10 tournament win. Overall, he led UD in steals (0.9) and was second in assists (2.5) in just 14.5 minutes a game.

Warren came to the University of Dayton after an outstanding career at Jacksonville's Raines High School, a powerhouse on the Florida prep scene. Warren was First Team 4A All-Florida as a senior, after averaging 21.0 points, 7.5 assists, 6.0 rebounds and 3.2 steals a game. Raines finished 16-10 and ranked 20th in Florida 4A last season. As a junior, Warren averaged 14.2 points and 5.2 assists in 14 games. He missed 14 games after breaking his right hand in the third game of the year. Even though he missed half the year, Warren led Raines to the regional finals in 2005 after Raines won back-to-back Florida Class 4A state championships in 2003 and 2004. Like classmates Kurt Huelsman and Marcus Johnson, Warren played on a state high school championship team. In the summer of 2005, his Jacksonville Lee Bulls AAU team reached the final 16 at the AAU national tournament, and Warren averaged 19.0 points, 8.2 assists and 8.0 rebounds for the Bulls.

The Little File

Charles Little might be on of the most inaccurately named player in the country. At 6-foot-6, 237 pounds, he brings a powerful physical preference package to the floor. And with the best measured vertical leap on the team, well off the floor too. In fact, Little's 43-inch vertical makes him President of UD's "Flight Club," which is made up of players with verts of 40 inches or more. Chris Wright is Vice-President at 42 inches, and Marcus Johnson is at 40 inches (rounded up from 39.5). Little, who led Dayton in rebounding (5.2) and FG% (.519, 137-264) and was second in scoring (10.5), was named last year's Atlantic 10 Sixth Man of the Year but finished the year as a starter due to an injury to now-graduated Monty Scott. In Scott's absence, Little averaged 16.9 points and 8.6 rebounds and had the first two double-doubles of his career.

When Scott went down, the Flyers needed someone to step up and be a second scoring option behind Brian Roberts. Little filled the bill. In the last seven games of the year, he scored career-highs in three straight games, had two double-doubles and just missed a third by one point. As UD's top rebounder, Little took home the "Shorty" Sharpenter Memorial Rebounding Trophy. Little averages 5.1 rebounds a game. He closed the regular season with three double-digit rebounding performances in the last five games, including a career-high 16 at Temple. Little's 34 dunks (32 over in the last 23 games of the 2006-07 season) were more than twice as many as anyone else on the team, and more than half of UD's 55 dunks last year. He had his first double-double against the A-10's most intimidating front line that included First Team All-Atlantic 10 selections Rashawn Freeman and Stephane Lasme in the UMass game, tallying then-career highs in points (21) and rebounds (10).

Little began the 2005-06 year with a hamstring injury, but once it healed he showed why he was one of the 2005 finalists for Mr. Basketball in the state of Tennessee. After averaging just 7.9 minutes, 2.7 points and 1.7 rebounds a game in non-conference action, Little all but doubled his production in league play, picking it up to the tune of 18.1 minutes, 6.3 points and 3.1 rebounds in A-10 action.

Because of this, he was named the recipient of UD's Chris Daniels Memorial Most Improved Player Award and the winner of the Thomas M. Luppe Award, which is presented each year to the top freshman on the team. And that improvement did not stop when the season ended. In the off-season, Little had an average strength increase of 54 pounds over his four major lifts (squat, bench, clean & jerk), a 220-pound improvement in total strength. At the same time, he gained 15 pounds of muscle while maintaining 7% body fat, and increasing his vertical leap from 37 to 41 inches. For his freshman season, Little averaged 4.6 points and 2.6 rebounds.

Little came to UD after a spectacular career at Cleveland High School in Cleveland, Tennessee. Little led his team to the Tennessee AAA state quarterfinals and was a finalist for the TSSAA's Mr. Basketball Award (Arizona signee J.P. Prince won the award). A three-time all-state selection, Little averaged 20.6 points and 10.3 rebounds while leading Cleveland to a 26-10 overall record. Included in that season was a school-record 49-point, 26-rebound performance over Red Bank in the regional semifinals.

As a junior, Little averaged 21.2 points, 12.3 rebounds, 3.0 blocks, 3.1 assists and 2.2 steals. As a sophomore, he averaged 18.1 points and 9.2 rebounds, leading his team to a 28-5 record and a ranking as high as third in the state of Tennessee. Little turned heads during the summer of 2004 when he was named to the senior all-star squad at the ABCD Camp in Teaneck, New Jersey, but the UD Flyers knew about him long before that. Little's high school coach, Aaron Green, played at the University of Tennessee when Dayton assistant coach Billy Schmidt was on the staff. After wearing #3 as a freshman, he switched to #15 (his high school number) in 2006-07 with the graduation of Logan White. Little has three older sisters - Mia (30), Summer (28) and Ashley (24).

The Wright File

Christian Wright is the main part of what three respected ranking services - HoopScoop, Rivals.com and Scout.com - call the best group of incoming freshmen in the Atlantic 10. Wright has all the stats and awards to back that up, but that's not the only reason people are talking about his joining the University of Dayton basketball program.

Named the top incoming freshman in the A-10, by most of the experts, Wright's above-the-rim game turned heads during practice sessions for the 2007 Jordan Brand All-America Game last April. And then at Madison Square Garden during the game itself, Wright turned in a 10-point, 10-rebound double-double. Ranked as high as the 18th-best prospect in the country, Wright averaged 19.2 points and 12.8 rebounds for Trotwood-Madison High School while earning First Team All-Ohio Division I honors. The Rams were 22-2 and ranked second in the state heading into the OHSAA tournament. Wright was Third Team All-Ohio as a junior after leading Trotwood-Madison a 22-6 overall record and the state championship game, where they lost to perennial powerhouse and 28-time state champion Canton McKinley. He averaged 17.5 points, 10.1 rebounds, 5.2 assists and 5.2 blocks a game. As a sophomore, he averaged 15.0 points, 9.1 rebounds and 4.2 assists.

The Jordan Brand All-America Game was hardly the first time he drew national attention. At the 2005 Nike Camp his SPARQ (Speed, Power, Agility, Reaction, and Quickness) ranking was second-best in the entire camp. The only player ahead of him was then-North Carolina-bound and current Golden State Warrior Brandon Wright. (One of several categories that Chris Wright had a top effort was his 2.94 second 20-meter dash, which tied him for eighth at the camp. The fastest 20-meter time was turned in by current Flyer teammate Marcus Johnson.) During the summer of 2006, at events such as the Nike Skills Academy, the NBA Players Association Top 100 Camp and the Nike All-America Camp, Wright was singled out in published reports not just for his scoring ability and top-of-the-chart vertical leap, but also for his work ethic and defense. But "above all" (if you'll pardon the pun), observers came back to his dunking ability and his knack of finishing the break. He will be the second member of his family to play at UD. His uncle on his mother's side, J.D. Grigsby, played at UD from 1971 to 1973.

2007-08: Began the season with 11 points over East Tennessee State...added five points and four rebounds at George Mason...picked up eight points on 2-of-4 shooting from the floor and 4-of-6 at the free throw line in a win versus Toledo...recorded seven points, five rebounds, two assists, a steal and a block in a win against SMU...added four points at Miami...tallied seven points and four rebounds over Holy Cross...tallied 12 points and four rebounds in a victory against High Point...added four points at Louisville...bounced back with nine points on 4-of-6 shooting against Coppin State...connected on all four free throw attempts and added four rebounds over American...sank 6-of-6 free throws and scored 16 points in a victory over Loyola...tallied his second career double-double with 15 points and 11 rebounds against then No. 6 Pittsburgh...played a career-high 44 minutes and tallied his third consecutive double-digit point performance with 16 points, seven rebounds, three assists, two steals and one block against Akron...scored in double figures for the fourth-straight game thanks to 14 points against No. 22/20 Rhode Island...hauled in a game-high eight rebounds at Saint Louis...tallied 15 points and 13 rebounds versus UMass...led all UD players with 12 points at Xavier...scored 10 points and added four rebounds versus Richmond...battling flu-like symptoms, Johnson came off the bench and added four points, five rebounds versus Saint Louis...added 10 points and five rebounds at Rhode Island...tallied five points and six rebounds versus Charlotte...matched his career-high with four assists at George Washington to go with eight points and five rebounds...netted his third double-double of the season with 11 points and 12 rebounds to go with a career-best three blocks against Duquesne...had 14 points on 5-of-6 shooting and added two steals versus Temple...hauled in a team-high six rebounds to go with four points and three steals versus La Salle...added a team-best seven rebounds to go with six points versus No. 10/12 Xavier...just shy of a double-double with nine points and nine rebounds against Fordham...added 13 points on 4-of-5 shooting from the floor to go with a team-high four rebounds at St. Bonaventure...hauled in seven rebounds and went 8-for-8 at the free throw line and shot 4-of-6 from the floor en route to a team-high 17 points over Saint Joseph's.

The Johnson File

Marcus Johnson played in the season's first 30 games in 2006-07, and only an ankle injury suffered in the Flyers' A-10 tournament win over Charlotte kept him from making all 31 contests. While classmates Kurt Huelsman and London Warren were named recipients of UD's Top Defender and Most Improved Awards respectively, Dayton's top freshman award, the Thomas Luppe Memorial Award, went to Johnson. Johnson averaged 6.6 points and 3.7 rebounds a game.

An athletic wing with shutdown defender talent, Johnson scored in double figures seven times last season, including 23 points in his first game as a Flyer, the most by a Dayton player in his debut game. He also had 11 at Temple, 13 (and a game-high eight rebounds) at SBU and 14 at North Carolina. He had his first double-double (11 points/10 rebounds) in the Yale win. In the win over Western Carolina, Johnson scored 13 points (5-6 FG) and grabbed six rebounds. Against Western Carolina, he had two assists, a steal and a blocked shot and drew the primary assignment of guarding WCU's leading scorer, Antonio Russell. Russell came into the game averaging 17.9 points and shooting 57% from the field, but finished with five points, and a percentage-killing 1-for-14 from the floor. Johnson was one of five Flyers who averaged over six points a game last year, and one of six with at least three boards a game. He was tied for second on the team in steals (23).

Johnson came to University of Dayton basketball with his name linked to two great basketball names. In high school, he finished his career as Akron St. Vincent-St. Mary's High School's second-leading scorer, behind only LeBron James. While no one is saying that Johnson is the next "LeBron," if you are going to finish second to someone, LeBron James would be one of the first players you might pick. Closer to home, the high-flying Johnson has been described as the most athletic guard to come to Dayton since Johnny Davis, a ten-year NBA vet who is a member of the UD Athletic Hall of Fame and UD's All-Century Team.

Like Huelsman, Johnson is another Flyer with an Ohio state championship on his basketball resume. He was a freshman on the varsity team at St. Vincent-St. Mary's when LeBron James led SVSM to the 2003 Division II state championship. After averaging 5.0 points as a rookie, Johnson moved into the starting lineup and helped win his team three more district titles, advancing to the 2004 and 2005 regional finals and last year's state semifinals. SVSM lost to the eventual state champion in each of those years. After averaging 12.8 points a game as a sophomore, he exploded for a great junior year, averaging 23.5 points and 7.3 rebounds. He was named Third Team Division II All-Ohio. The summer before his senior year, he was named one of the top six shooting guards at the Nike All-American Camp in Indianapolis, and scored 17 points in that event's all-star game. He played for the King James Shooting Stars AAU team that made it to the final four of the Main Event tournament in Las Vegas. As a senior, Johnson sacrificed his numbers for the team, averaging "just" 17.4 points a game, but leading St. Vincent-St. Mary's to the state final four where they lost to eventual state champion Dayton Dunbar High School. Johnson's efforts earned him First Team All-Ohio recognition.

The Binnie File

James Collins Binnie, along with classmate Brian Roberts, are the first Brian Gregory players to live the college basketball experience from start to finish - recruiting, verbalizing, signing, playing and, come spring, graduating. Binnie is also the first repeat winner of the Uhl Family Endowed Scholarship. Former Flyers Bill Uhl, Sr. and Bill Uhl, Jr., have endowed a men's basketball scholarship, to be given to a returning Flyer basketball player. Originally awarded in 2003, it was the first endowed award of this type in the University of Dayton Athletics Division. It is given annually to the UD player who best exemplifies the qualities of good sportsmanship and character, and follows the University's principles of "Learn, Lead and Serve" on and off the court. Previous recipients have been Keith Waleskowski, Mark Jones and Warren Williams.

Binnie started 15 games and played in all 31 games for the Flyers, and averaged 4.3 points, 2.8 rebounds and 1.2 assists in 18.8 minutes played. He saw action at every position except point guard in 2006-07, and overcame a poor shooting start to turn in another solid season. After shooting .241 (7-29) from three-point in non-conference action (including missing his first ten shots), Binnie reversed field to hit .377 (23-61) after the first of the year. In the Richmond game he outscored the Spiders in the first half (9-8). He scored the first six points of the game and finished with a season-high 12 points. In the fifth game of the year, a win against Louisville, he had eight points (two more than he had in the first four games of the year combined). In the Creighton win, he had eight points, three assists and two rebounds in 13 minutes. He matched his career high in rebounding with nine at Saint Louis.

His looks and easy-going manner suggest he'd be comfortable carrying a surfboard. And while that might be true, the last time we looked, there is not a lot of surfing going on in Iowa. His shooting stats - he's a career 34% three-point and 75% free throw shooter - suggest he's one of those pretty boy shooters. But while there's no question about his shooting ability, his strongest suit is his strong "whatever it takes" attitude he brings to the court for the Flyers. He's at his best when he's in the middle of things mixing it up. He does the little things that don't always show up in a box score, whether it be taking a charge, keeping a rebound alive or setting a screen to free up a teammate. As a sophomore, Binnie played in 27 games (with eight starts) and averaged 4.6 points, 3.2 rebounds, 1.1 assists and 19.2 minutes a game. He had 13 games of at least five points. He also had 21 steals, after getting just six as a freshman. As a freshman, Binnie averaged 3.6 points a game for the season in 29 games, but averaged 6.5 points a game over the last four games, shooting .692 (9-13) from the field, .600 (6-10) from three-point range and 1.000 (4-4) from the line. In Binnie's second college game against Coppin State, veteran coach "Fang" Mitchell resorted to a box-and-one on Binnie when he drilled three straight treys in the first half of that game. And Binnie scored a career-high 13 points in just 16 minutes off the bench at eventual A-10 champ GW later in the year.

Binnie came directly to UD after teaming with former Flyer teammate Trent Meacham to lead the Iowa-based Martin Brothers Select team to the 2004 Senior Boys (19-under) AAU national championship in June, 2004. Binnie was named the Most Valuable Player of that tournament, capping an excellent prep career. Binnie was First Team All-Iowa and the Iowa Class 4A Player of the Year after averaging 23.9 points and 8.1 rebounds a game for Johnston High School, leading his team to an 18-6 record. Binnie was the ninth-leading scorer in the state in 2003-04. He finished his career as Johnston's all-time leading scorer and was three-time first team all-conference. Binnie scored a school-record 45 points (regulation game) as a senior against rival Des Moines East. He was a McDonald's All-America nominee. His Johnston team earned the Farm Bureau-IHSA 4A Sportsmanship Award. As a junior, Binnie averaged 19.4 points, 8.6 rebounds and 3.4 assists per game for Johnston, and was Third Team All-Iowa. Binnie has three sisters- Chandra (19), Chelsea (17) and Julia (15) - and one brother Jordan (10).

The Huelsman File

Kurtis Richard Huelsman was the only player to start every game last year for the Flyers. He averaged 3.8 points and 3.5 rebounds, and was second on the team in blocked shots (0.6). He earned UD's Best defender Award for 2006-07. He tied the UD freshman record for blocked shots in a game (and the most in a first game as a Flyer) when he swatted four in the Austin Peay win. Huelsman tied Keith Waleskowski, who had four against George Washington on February 17, 2001 during his redshirt freshman season. Huelsman was the primary defender in holding Pittsburgh's Third Team All-America seven-footer Aaron Gray to just five points. In two games against Gray and North Carolina First Team All-American Tyler Hansbrough, Huelsman had 12 points, seven rebounds, two assists and two blocks.

He was first member of his recruiting class, verbally committing to the Flyers in May of 2005. In May of 2006, Kurt was busy committing himself to an off-season conditioning program, and it paid off to the tune of picking up 20 pounds of muscle between high school and college. A four-year varsity starter at St. Henry High School, Huelsman was named First Team Division III All-Ohio and the Northwest Ohio Player of the Year as a senior after averaging 15.9 points, 9.0 rebounds a game. Despite being the only starter back from the 20-3 team from the previous season, Huelsman led St. Henry back to the regional semifinals.

As a junior, Huelsman averaged 11.2 points, 8.7 rebounds and 3.7 blocked shots while shooting 60% from the field. He was named Honorable Mention All-Ohio in 2005. As a sophomore, he was the MVP of the state tournament, getting a double-double (12 points, 11 rebounds) in St. Henry's championship game win. He averaged 10.3 points, 6.9 rebounds and 4.3 blocked shots.

He comes from an athletic family. All four of his brothers played college football, and his older brother Trent was a non-scholarship All-America tight end for the Flyers in the mid-1990's. Kurt has said if he could not be a college basketball player, he would play football. Kurt has four brothers - Trent (32), Chris (31), Chad (29) and Kevin (23).

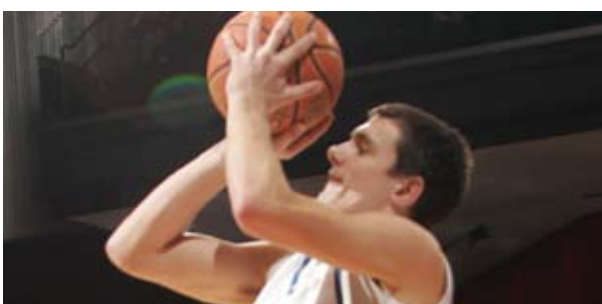
