Roger Brown never played a varsity game for the Flyers, but his impact on the program is not forgotten. In 1960-61, the Flyer freshman team caught the attention of the entire UD community by regularly pounding the opposition. Brown didn't play varsity at UD and was banned by the NBA for having 'associated' with New York City gamblers, but no illegal act was ever charged. The ABA ended the injustice in 1967, allowing Brown to play for the Indiana Pacers. Many claim that if Brown had played and Bill Chmielewski had stayed in school, UD would have won two national titles.



Bucky Bockhorn was one of 20 Flyer all-time greats named to UD's All-Century Team in 2004. He went on to a seven-year NBA career before a knee injury cut it short.

Johnny Davis declared hardship after his junior season at UD and the next season claimed an NBA World Championship with the Portland Trail Blazers. That was a good thing for the Flyer opposition. In his final home game he scored 35 against Florida State. After scoring 16 in the first half, then-Seminole Coach Hugh Durham went to work. "We made some halftime adjustments on him," said Durham. "And held him to 19 in the second half." After his playing career, Davis began coaching and was even the head coach for the Philadelphia 76ers in Allen Iverson's rookie season. He was also the head coach of the Orlando Magic.



Jim Paxson had a great professional career with Portland and Boston. The former General Manager and Vice President of Basketball Operations for the Cleveland Cavaliers, he was the first Portland Trail Blazer to score 10,000 career points and was recently inducted into the Oregon Sports Hall of Fame. The Blazers had made him the 14th pick of the 1979 NBA Draft.

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ALL-AMERICA FLYERS



Alphonse Schumacher 1912, 1913

The Helms Foundation brought life to the early age of basketball in 1957, when they commissioned a panel to reward All-Americans dating back to 1905. Schumacher led the Flyers to a 24-0 mark in the span of 1911-13 and was named to the ten-player squads in each season.

Don Meineke 1951, 1952

Meineke was among the nation's standouts as the game took a dramatic rise in popularity in the early 1950s. In his senior campaign, Meineke averaged 21.1 points and 11.8 rebounds while shooting 44 percent from the field and 79 percent from the line and was picked second-team All-America by Helms, Look Magazine and the Associated Press. As a junior Monk was picked third-team All-America by Helms and Converse.

John Horan 1955

The Vertical Hyphen was third-team All-America by Converse and the United Press International as a senior after averaging 18.4 points and 13.3 boards for the 25-4 Flyers, which wound up losing the NIT title game to Duquesne. Horan remains UD's all-time top rebounder and graduated as the number-two scorer behind only Meineke. He is now ninth on that list.

Bill Uhl 1956

The Greenfield Goliath came up huge during his entire career. The 7-footer averaged 18.4 points and 14.7 boards in 1956 as the Flyers soared to #2 in the nation, behind only San Francisco and the amazing Bill Russell. Uhl was picked to Look Magazine's first team while joining the second teams of AP, UPI, Collier's, INS and NEA.

Bill Chmielewski 1962

In his only season of college ball, Chmielewski led the Flyers to their first National Invitation Tournament title and was picked as the Most Valuable Player of the tournament. With averages of 15.4 points and 11.4 rebounds, he was named second-team All-America by Converse.

Garry Roggenburk 1962

One of the truly great athletes in Flyer history, Roggenburk was a consistent scorer and a prolific rebounder as well as being the best baseball pitcher in school history. After UD gave Tom Blackburn his long awaited NIT Trophy in 1962, Roggenburk was honored with third-team All-America status by the Helms Foundation.

Henry Finkel 1966

Ten years after Uhl graduated, the Flyers had another 7-foot All-American. Henry Finkel had led the Flyers to the NCAA Tournament as both a junior and a senior, but both times UD lost to the nation's top ranked team. As a junior, Cazzie Russell's Michigan Wolverines downed the Flyers. As a senior, Finkel's Flyers lost to #1 Kentucky, which would lose a historic game to Texas Western (now UTEP). With sophomore Don May sharing the workload in 1966, Finkel's numbers (22.7 points, 12.1 rebounds) were actually career lows, but the Helms Foundation understood his impact.

Don May 1967, 1968

Don May led the Flyers to a rarity -- the championship games of both major college tournaments. The two-time USBWA All-American nearly singlehandedly landed UD in the NCAA title game by making 13 straight field goals in the national semifinal against North Carolina. UD lost to UCLA in the title game. The next year, the Flyers won the National Invitation Tournament as May averaged 23.4 points and 15.0 rebounds.

Jim Paxson 1979

A late-season shoulder injury which cost him the better part of five games stopped Jim Paxson from being UD's all-time leading scorer, but his senior year averages of 23.2 points, 5.7 assists and 52.6 field-goal percentage made the USBWA name him an All-American. Paxson, a marketing major, also made First-Team Academic All-America, as voted by CoSIDA.



Don Meineke did more to establish Dayton as a national power than any other player - scoring 1,866 career points and leading the Flyers to NIT success. In 1953, he became the NBA's first Rookie of the Year



Mike Kanieski was a two-time first-team CoSIDA Academic All-American. The marketing major averaged 16.9 points in 1981 and 18.4 the following year.



INTERNATIONAL FLYERS

Jim Paxson, Sr.

1955 Pan America Games in Mexico City

Paxson played in all five games as the USA entry won the gold medal at the Pan Am Games, the championship of the Americas. While a standout player and a future NBAer himself, Paxson may be better remembered for being the father of two NBA greats -- former all-pro Jim (a UD grad himself) and multiple-world champion John.

Johnny Davis

1975 Pan America Games in Mexico City

Davis was one of five players to average double figures in scoring as the USA entry won the Gold medal. A sure bet to become the first 2,000-point Flyer, Davis opted for the NBA after his junior season and left Don May's record for Roosevelt Chapman. Quite a consolation, Davis claimed an NBA World Championship with the Portland Trail Blazers in what would have been his senior year.

Mike Sylvester

1980 Olympic Games in Moscow

Sylvester was the lone American to win a medal in the boycotted Games as he represented Italy, which won a silver medal. Sylvester, who had attended Moeller High School in Cincinnati, held dual citizenship in the United States and Italy. Playing professionally in Italy at the time, he actually supported the boycott. "As a U.S. citizen, my duty was to boycott. As an Italian citizen, my duty was to play. So what was the answer? I was for the boycott. I was with old Jimmy (Carter) morally, but if I didn't play, they might never have allowed me to play here (Italy) again."



Mike Sylvester, who scored 36 points as UD nearly upset UCLA in the 1974 NCAA Tournament, is the only Flyer to win an Olympic Medal as a player...and he didn't do it with Team U.S.A.



Ed Young was a small center on the 1984 team that advanced to the NCAA West Regional Finals. Young met up with Patrick Ewing in the West Regional Final at Pauley Pavilion before joining Donoher on the gold-medal winning U.S. entry at the Jones Cup in Taiwan.

Don Donoher

1984 Olympic Games in Los Angeles

In 1986, Donoher was the head coach of the gold medal-winning U.S. team at the R. Williams Jones Cup in Taiwan. That team was paced by Duke's Danny Ferry and Cal's Kevin Johnson. It wasn't Mick's first international experience. In 1984 he was an assistant coach to Bobby Knight as the United States won the gold medal at the Los Angeles Olympics. That team, led by Michael Jordan, Patrick Ewing and Chris Mullin, went 8-0 and won by an average margin of 32 points. The assistant coaches along with Donoher were George Raveling and C.M. Newton.

Ed Young

1986 Jones Cup in Taiwan

Young won the gold playing for Coach Donoher at the Jones Cup in 1986. "I imagine when his playing days are over," Donoher said in the 1986-87 UD media guide. "Ed will look back upon the Jones Cup as one of his best basketball-related experiences. He had a chance to represent his country, got a glimpse of life in the Far East, got to play with some fine young guys from other universities and he also won a gold medal."

Oliver Purnell

1999 World University Games in Palma de Mallorca, Spain

2001 Goodwill Games in Brisbane, Australia

2004 Olympic Games in Athens, Greece

Purnell is the most experienced Flyer in international ball. Over the summer of 1999 he took USA Basketball to the World University Games and brought home the gold with the likes of Kenyon Martin and Michael Redd. He was an assistant on the 1996 gold medal-winning Men's 22 and Under World Championship Qualifying Team in San Juan, Puerto Rico. In 1995 Purnell was an assistant on the gold-medal winning World University Games team in Fukuoka, Japan. In 2001, he was the assistant to Flip Saunders at the Goodwill Games in Brisbane, Australia, striking gold yet again. In the 2004 Olympics in Athens, Greece, he earned a bronze medal with USA Basketball as an assistant to Larry Brown.

Thomas J. Frericks, who became a member of the UD Athletics Hall of Fame in 1976, left an indelible impression on the Flyer Athletics program. No mention of University of Dayton tournament appearances would be complete without acknowledging the contributions of Mr. Frericks, who served as UD's director of athletics from 1964 to 1992.

Not only should he be considered for the University's involvement in tournaments, but for his contributions to the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Championship.

Mr. Frericks was an innovator who helped guide UD Athletics from a time when collegiate athletic departments were low-budget operations to the multi-million dollar budgets of the 1990s. Through all the changes, one thing remained constant, because of Frericks' dedication, UD became known for integrity and credibility.

Highlights of his tenure included UD's second-place finish in the 1967 NCAA Men's Basketball Championship, and the construction in 1969 of the \$4.5 million University of Dayton Arena, which has now hosted 65 NCAA Tournament Games (62 men, three women).

As a member of the Men's Basketball Committee, Frericks was an integral part of developing the tournament to the great American sporting event, "March Madness," it is today. He was on the five-member team from the Basketball Committee that negotiated the seven-year, \$1 billion television contract with CBS Sports. Mr. Frericks was slated to be the Chair of the Basketball Committee starting in 1992, but he lost his battle with cancer on Jan. 31, 1992, before presiding over any championship.

Fifteen days prior to his passing, the University had rededicated the University of Dayton Fieldhouse as the Thomas J. Frericks Athletic and Convocation Center. It serves as a constant reminder, fittingly, in a building where he attended classes, practiced and played as a young man and transformed UD athletic fortunes as athletic director.

UD'S ALL-CENTURY TEAM



The University of Dayton celebrated its 100th anniversary season of men's basketball in 2003-04, and the focal point of the season-long celebration was February 4—the 100th anniversary date of UD's first varsity game. On February 4, 1904, UD, then known as St. Mary's Institute, defeated the Dayton Intermediates 14-2. One hundred years to the day, the Flyers hosted the Richmond Spiders and in conjunction with that game, the University unveiled its All-Century Team. The 20-man team spans all 100 years of Dayton Basketball.

ARLEN "BUCKY" BOCKHORN

A 6-4 swingman from Campbell Hill, Illinois, Bockhorn played from 1955-58 on Flyer teams that were a combined 69-17, won the 1955 University of Kentucky Invitational Tournament and played in three NIT's. As a senior, he was co-captain on a 25-4 team that reached the NIT finals. A versatile player, Bockhorn scored 941 points, grabbed 708 rebounds and always drew the toughest defensive assignment, regardless of whether that player was a forward or guard. Bockhorn, who averaged double figures all three seasons at UD, went on to a successful NBA career.

ROOSEVELT CHAPMAN

UD's all-time leading scorer with 2,233 points, Chapman utilized amazing body control and incredible hang time to score most of his points inside, even though he was listed at 6-4. The Brooklyn native appears near the top of nearly every statistical category including most rebounds (8th, 956), assists (11th, 338) and blocked shots (2nd, 124). He capped his career by leading UD in a remarkable NCAA run, scoring a 1984 tournament-best 105 points in four games, including 41 vs. Wayman Tisdale and his seventh-ranked Oklahoma Sooners in the second round.

BILL CHMIELEWSKI

Chmielewski was named the Most Valuable Player of the 1962 National Invitational Tournament, as the Flyers gave head coach Tom Blackburn his first NIT title in six trips to the championship game. The 6-10 Detroit native averaged 15.4 points and 9.3 rebounds during UD's 24-6 season in 1961-62. He was a Second Team All-America pick by Converse. Chmielewski left school after that season, and after pursuing a pro basketball career settled in the Dayton area. He still plays basketball in Master's division events.

ANTHONY CORBITT

One of the most consistently productive scorers in UD history, Anthony Corbett's 1,760 points stand eighth on the UD All-Time Scoring List. Despite standing 6-6, Corbett was deadly effective low-post scorer, shooting over 50% and averaging in double figures in all four of his seasons at Dayton. In addition to his eighth-place standing in career scoring for the Flyers, Corbett is 11th in rebounding (814), and sixth in FG% (.534, 725-1358). Corbett closed his career in the place every player wants to be—the NCAA tournament. In 1989-90, UD won the MCC championship and advanced to the NCAA second round where they lost to Arkansas by two.

JOHNNY DAVIS

Davis had the greatest impact any Flyer freshman has ever had, joining a team whose nucleus had gone 13-13 the two seasons before, and helping propel the Flyers to a 20-9 record, a berth in the 1974 NCAA tournament, and eventually a toe-to-toe triple overtime loss to defending national champion UCLA. And linking Davis and "propulsion" is appropriate, as Davis was a unique combination of quickness and jumping ability. UD's MVP as a sophomore and junior, Davis scored 1,562 career points. His 19.3 point scoring average is fifth at Dayton. He joined the NBA after his junior season and was a member of the Portland Trailblazers world championship team. He is now head coach of the Orlando Magic.

HENRY FINKEL

The third-leading scorer in UD history with 1,968 points, Finkel's teams were 60-23 in his three seasons, and reached the NCAA Sweet Sixteen twice. He was named MVP or co-MVP in all three of his years for the Flyers. The 6-11 center from Union City, New Jersey still holds the UD records for most points scored in a season (733 in 1964-65) and highest scoring average in a season (25.3 in 1964-65) and career (23.7). His career field goal percentage of .619 (772-1248) is the third-best for the Flyers, and the best for any player with more than 500 field goals made.

BOBBY JOE HOOPER

A 6-0 guard from Lees Creek, Ohio, Hooper was a starter from his first varsity game, and was a leader on teams that reached the NCAA Sweet Sixteen his sophomore season, the NCAA championship game his junior season, and the 1968 NIT championship his senior year. Hooper scored 1,059 career points, which is currently 34th on UD's all-time scoring list. One of the best shooters in Dayton basketball, Hooper established school records (since surpassed) in consecutive free throws (34) and career field goal percentage (.835, 223-267). He was named to the 1967 NCAA All-Mideast Regional Team, and the 1968 All-NIT team.

JOHN HORAN

A four-year starter and four-year double-figure scorer, Horan was a key player in the years UD cemented itself as a nationally-recognized team in the years between 1951 and 1955. The 6-8 center/forward from Rochester, Minnesota is Dayton's career record holder in rebounding with 1,341. He also scored 1,757 points (ninth at UD). Teams he played for were a combined 94-29. He played in the NCAA once and the NIT three times.

NEGELE KNIGHT

Of all the great players in Flyer basketball history, Negele Knight is known for his work at the end of games as much as anyone. Over his career, Knight won or tied the game on UD's last possession an amazing 12 times. He began his career as a starting point guard in 1985-86, missed the next season due to injuries and then overcame more injuries to average double figures the next two seasons. As a senior, Knight averaged 22.8 points and 6.8 assists for the season, and 29.3 points and 7.9 assists during an 11-game, season-ending winning streak. All in all, Knight holds ten school records, has UD's second-best mark in five more categories and the third-best mark in 12 others. The Detroit native is #1 in career assists (663) and seventh in career scoring (1,806 points).

DON MAY

A Dayton native who grew up just a morning newspaper's throw from UD's campus (he delivered newspapers as a youngster to UD's dorms) May has the distinction of being a hometown hero who stayed in his hometown. One of the best high school players the Dayton area has ever produced, May stayed in his hometown to play for the Flyers. A two-time USBWA All-American, May practically put UD in the 1967 NCAA championship game when he made a record 13-straight field goals in UD's semifinal win over North Carolina. Not just a dead-eye shooter, the 6-4 May was also a fabulous rebounder. He averaged 23.4 points and 16.7 rebounds as a junior, and 22.7 and 15.0 as a senior. He is second in both Flyer career scoring (1,980) and rebounding (1,301).

DON "MONK" MEINEKE

It's no coincidence that the University of Dayton's first 20-win season (in 1949-50), it's first NIT appearance and the school's only season with appearances in both the NIT and NCAA tournaments came with Meineke in the pivot. UD's first 1,000 point scorer, and still the fifth-leading scorer in school history (1,866). The 6-7 Dayton native led the nation in FG% (.512, 240-469) as a junior, and was named Third-Team All-America by the Helms Foundation and Converse. As a senior, he was named Second Team All-America by the Helms Foundation, Look Magazine and the Associated Press.

JIM PAXSON

A three-time White-Allen MVP, Paxson's senior numbers of 23.2 points, 5.7 assists and 4.2 rebounds earned him First Team All-America honors from the USBWA. And the Kettering native's 3.40 GPA translated into his being named a CoSIDA Academic All-American as well. The former Vice-President and General Manager of the Cleveland Cavaliers, Paxson has been a finalist for the CoSIDA Academic All-America Hall of Fame class. A four-year starter, Paxson is fourth on UD's all-time scoring list (1,945 points). Even though he was the focal point of UD's scoring during his career, he is also fourth in career assists (515) and third in career steals (168).

RYAN PERRYMAN

Perryman led the nation in rebounding (12.5), and more importantly, he led the University of Dayton back into the post season as a senior in 1997-98. Perryman took the Flyers to the 1998 NIT, breaking an eight-year post-season drought on the Hilltop. That was the longest drought in the modern era (post-1950) of Dayton basketball. Since then, the Flyers have reached the post-season five of the last six seasons. The 6-7 Oak Park, Michigan native is currently 15th in career scoring (1,524) at UD, fourth in rebounding (1,156) and fourth in FG% (.546, 534-978). He is the Atlantic 10 career rebounding average record holder (10.7). Only Jim Paxson Jr., Roosevelt Chapman and Perryman are three-time outright White-Allen MVP winners.

GARRY ROGGENBURK

A 6-6 forward from Cleveland, Roggenburk still holds UD's single-game rebounding mark, with 32 against Miami in just his third college game. Fast-forward to the end of his college career, when he was the leading scorer (16.0) and second-leading rebounder (9.3) on UD's first NIT championship team in 1962. He is one of six Flyers to score 1,000 points and grab 1,000 rebounds in his career. His 1,398 career points are currently 19th all-time at UD and his 1,027 rebounds are sixth.

JACK SALLEE

A mainstay on UD's nationally-ranked teams from 1951-55, Sallee's 1,610 career points put him 13th in Flyer career scoring. When he graduated, he was second behind Monk Meineke. The 6-2 guard from Springfield, Ohio led UD in scoring (19.0) as a sophomore, but adjusted his game upon the arrival of seven-foot center Bill Uhl, and averaged 15.2 as a junior and 15.0 as a senior. He played in 122 games for the Flyers, a record that stood for 47 years.

DONALD SMITH

The greatest long-range shooter in UD history, Smith scored 1,655 points, mostly from three-point range, for UD. Only problem was, there was no three-point line when he played from 1971-74. But if you think this claim is hype, consider this: when he practiced free throws, he practiced them from the top of the circle (where today's three point line is). It must have worked. Smith is the career FT% leader at Dayton (.886, 281-317). His .910 (111-122) mark as a junior led the nation. The 6-0 guard from Dayton also holds UD's single-game scoring record of 52 points at Loyola during his junior season, but his coach, Don Donoher, rates that as his second-most impressive effort, citing a 44-point, 20-25 FG game at Xavier earlier that year.

TONY STANLEY

An athletic jump shooter from Philadelphia, Stanley ended his career three seasons ago with 1,835 points, the sixth-best total at Dayton. He also stands first in career three-pointers (291), and second in both career steals (174) and games played (125). Stanley averaged 13.1 points a game as a freshman, 15.0 as a sophomore, 14.7 points as a junior and 15.9 points as a senior. He is the youngest member of the All-Century Team.

MIKE SYLVESTER

Sylvester was the star of what would have been one of the biggest upsets in NCAA tournament history when he scored 36 points in UD's triple-overtime loss in the 1974 NCAA tournament to defending champion UCLA. Sylvester scored 1,248 career points in his Dayton career, capped by a senior season that saw him average 17.1 points, 6.7 rebounds and shoot .502 (203-404) from the field and .833 (90-108) from the line. The Cincinnati native is also the only Flyer to earn a medal playing in the Olympics. He was part of Italy's bronze-medal-winning team at the 1980 Games (Former UD coach Don Donoher was an assistant coach for the United States' 1984 gold-medal-winning team).

BILL UHL

A First Team All-America selection by Look Magazine as a senior, Uhl dominated the paint from 1953-56, and lifted UD to its highest-ever national ranking. UD was ranked second in the nation for 11 weeks during the 1955-56 season, behind only the Bill Russell-led San Francisco Dons. Uhl, a seven-footer from Greenfield, Ohio, was one of the most consistently excellent players to ever wear the Red and Blue. He averaged 18.4, 18.6 and 18.4 points in his three seasons at UD. His teams were a combined 75-15, with one appearance in the NIT quarterfinals, and two trips to the NIT finals.

ED YOUNG

As the shooter of "The Shot"—the buzzer-beater against third-ranked DePaul on February 18, 1984—Ed Young's place in UD basketball history will always be secure. But while one moment in time may have placed him in UD basketball history, his productive career has now put him on the UD All-Century Team. Young was part of UD's 1984 team that advanced to the NCAA West Regional finals, but the Flyers didn't take off that season until coach Don Donoher moved Young, a starter at forward, to center. Giving away inches and pounds to just about every opponent, Young averaged 13.4 points and 6.6 rebounds that season, as the Flyers finished 21-11. Injuries followed him the rest of his career (he missed the entire 1984-85 season), but he was effective enough to finish his career with 1,253 points. The Upper Sandusky, Ohio native is now 23rd in career scoring for the Flyers.
