- Dayton has won a school-record 29 consecutive home games. The streak is the fifth-best nationally.
- Chris Johnson's 26 points and 20 rebounds against Duquesne is only the second 20-20 game in the last 35 years at UD (Ryan Perryman had one in 1997-98), and first in the A-10 this season. CJ is only the third Division I player to get at least 25 points and 20 rebounds this season. In his last six games, Johnson is averaging 13.7 points and 11.0 rebounds. In A-10 play, he leads in rebounding (14.7).
- The Flyer bench has outscored its opponents 534-337. The Flyers have 10 players who are averaging 3.5 points or more and 12 or more minutes per game.
- In the last 10 games, UD has out-rebounded its opponents by 9.4 boards per game. Dayton is 11-2 this season when out-rebounding its opponents.
- Chris Wright has 10 career double-doubles and four this season. Of his last 52 FG's, 21 are dunks.
- Chris Wright's 102 dunks ties him with Charles Little for the record for career dunks at Dayton.
- Kurt Huelsman has started all 117 games of his Flyer career. Only two active college players have started every game of their college career and started more games than Huelsman.
- Kurt Huelsman and Chris Wright are the only two Flyers to start every game this season.
- Marcus Johnson scored a season-high 17 points at Xavier.
- London Warren possesses a streak of 52 consecutive games with at least one assist. In the last seven games, he has an assist-to-turnover ratio of 2.8 (36 assists, 13 turnovers).
- Luke Fabrizio leads the A-10 in 3-pt. FG% in conference action (.667, 6-9).
- Dayton opened the year with probably the toughest schedule in the NCAA. Two teams were nationally-ranked and two were receiving votes. UD's four losses are by a total of 20 points (all single-digit margins) to No. 4 Villanova, No. 10 Kansas State, then-No. 19 New Mexico and at Xavier, who have a combined record of 57-10.
- UD has won 16 of its last 19 games and is 3-2 this season in games decided by five points or less.
- Dayton has held nine of its last 10 opponents to 40% or below shooting from the field.
- The Flyers celebrated their 500th win at UD Arena on Dec. 21. The Arena opened in 1969.
- UD's seniors are the only class in school history to go undefeated at home in non-conference play.

DAYTON RETURNS HOME TO PLAY GEORGE WASHINGTON ON WEDNESDAY

The University of Dayton Flyers return to Blackburn Court on Wednesday, when George Washington visits UD Arena. Game time is 7:00 p.m. ET.

It will be carried by WHIO Radio, and is available with live streaming video, live audio, and live stats via GameTracker at www.DaytonFlyers.com.

Dayton is looking to bounce back from a 78-74 loss at Xavier on Saturday. Four Flyers scored in double figures. Marcus Johnson scored a season-high 17 points, Rob Lowery had 13, Chris Wright and Chris Johnson each added 10. Chris Johnson also had 16 rebounds. UD is 13-4 and 2-1 in the Atlantic 10. Dayton has won 11 of its last 13.

ABOUT GEORGE WASHINGTON

The Colonials are 11-5 overall and 1-2 in the Atlantic 10. After winning the conference opener at St. Bonaventure, GW has lost at home 76-69 to Xavier and 65-64 at La Salle. George Washington is led by senior forward Damian Hollis, who is among the A-10 leaders in scoring (11th, 15.7), FG% (9th, .453) and FT% (2nd, .833). He also leads GW in rebounding (5.6) and blocked shots (19).

SERIES STUFF

George Washington leads the all-time series 14-10, but the Flyers have won two of the last three games. UD won the matchup last season (63-61 on Jan. 22 in Washington, DC) and the last meeting at UD Arena (84-69 on Jan. 31, 2007). Every Dayton-GW contest has come in Atlantic 10 action.

TAKE FIVE

Dayton has played its best basketball this season in the final five minutes of regulation, outscoring its opponents 197-147. The Flyers are shooting 53-of-127 (.417) from the floor, 19-of-55 (.345) from beyond the arc, and 72-of-102 at the free throw line (.702). But defensively, UD is limiting opponents to 36-of-104 shooting (.346), 8-of-36 from three (.222) and have forced 34 turnovers in that span.

CRUNCH TIME

A .660 team from the line on the season, Dayton is shooting .794 (50-63) from the line in the last two minutes of the game in 2009-10. Six Flyers are shooting .750 or better, in crunch time. Chris Johnson is 7-of-7 (1.000), followed by Paul Williams (.938, 15-of-16), Rob Lowery (7-of-8), Chris Wright (.833, 5-of-6), Mickey Perry (.750, 6-of-8) and Marcus Johnson (.750, 3-of-4).

TAKING THE NATIONAL STAGE

To start the 2009-10 campaign the Dayton Flyers were nationally ranked in a major poll for the first time since the 1967-68 season. With UD being ranked at some point in each of the last three seasons, it is also the first time in 49 years the Flyers have been ranked in three consecutive seasons. The last time that happened was the 1958-59, 1959-60 and 1960-61 seasons.

THE TOP CHOICE IN THE A-10

With four starters and 10 of its top 11 scorers returning from last year's 27-8 team that advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament, the University of Dayton Flyers were selected as the team to beat in the Atlantic 10 this season in the league's preseason poll.

DAYTON FLYERS MEN'S BASKETBALL GAME NOTES

HEAD COACH BRIAN GREGORY

When the University of Dayton basketball climbed into the national college basketball rankings in December, 2007, it signaled a benchmark for Flyer head basketball coach Brian Gregory. In less than five seasons at the Hilltop, and in his first with all his recruits on the team, Gregory had put together a Top 25-caliber program.



To start the 2009-10 campaign, the Flyers were ranked 21st by the Associated Press, and 22nd in the ESPN/USA Today Coaches Poll. It was the first time since the 1967-68 season Dayton has been ranked in a major poll in the preseason.

Dayton was ranked again during the 2008-09 season en route to a 27-8 record that included a first-round win in the NCAA tournament, Gregory became the first UD coach since Don Donoher to have the Flyers ranked in back-to-back seasons.

While Gregory is focused on the process of building a program the right way, and simply working toward becoming a better team tomorrow than today, the results speak for themselves. Dayton has won 50 games over the last two seasons and is 6-2 against BCS teams in that time. The Flyers' 27 wins in 2008-09 tied for the second-most in school history and UD had the most post-season individual honors in school history.

Since taking over as Dayton's head coach in 2003, Gregory has a record of 125-68, with two NCAA appearances and an NIT quarterfinal berth. He is one of just 25 coaches who have been at their current school at least five years who average at least 20 wins a season.

On May 6, 2009, because of his success, and what is expected in the future, the University extended Gregory's contract to run through the 2017-18 season.

Gregory's 125 wins in his first six seasons trails only legendary coach Don Donoher's 130. And Gregory's .644 winning percentage is second in UD's modern era to only another UD icon, Tom Blackburn, whose winning percentage was .714. Gregory began his tenure at Dayton with a 9-0 record, the second-best start for a new UD coach in the 100 plus year history of varsity basketball at the school. Only Harry Solimano, who won his first 25 games over a three-year span that began in 1911, did better.

DOING IT THE WRIGHT WAY

Junior Chris Wright has shouldered most of the Flyer workload so far this season, leading the team in scoring (13.8 ppg), blocks (17), minutes per game (27.1) and dunks (32), and ranking second in rebounding (7.5rpg), field goal percentage (.545, 84-154). Wright scored 15 points against No. 5/6 Villanova. He came back to record a double-double of 15 points and 10 rebounds versus Kansas State. In the Towson win, Wright scored 20 points and grabbed nine boards. At Miami, Wright scored 14 points. In the Lehigh win he tallied a double-double with 16 points and 10 boards. Wright led UD with 16 points and 12 rebounds over Old Dominion. Wright recorded 15 points and eight rebounds versus Presbyterian and 14 and six in the App St. win. His 19 points in the Boston University win came on 8-of-10 shooting and featured five dunks, one off Sean Finn's school record. He had his tenth career double-double with 16 and 11 in the Duquesne win. At Fordham, he had 12 points (6-of-9 FG), eight rebounds and three blocks. He had 10 points and nine rebounds in just 14 minutes at Xavier.

DAYTON'S WRIGHT NAMED ATLANTIC 10 CO-PLAYER OF THE WEEK

UD's Chris Wright was named Atlantic 10 Co-Player of the Week after his 25-point performance, including 18 in the second half, to lead the Flyers to a 90-80 win over Creighton in the season opener. Wright shared this year's first A-10 Player of the Week award with Duquesne junior Damian Saunders.

UD'S WRIGHT NAMED TO NAISMITH TROPHY PRESEASON WATCH LIST

University of Dayton forward Chris Wright was named to the 2009-2010 Preseason Naismith Trophy watch list. The Naismith Trophy is voted on by coaches, administrators and journalists from around the country and is awarded to the nation's top player.

WRIGHT NAMED TO WOODEN AWARD PRESEASON TOP 50 LIST

UD's Chris Wright was one of the top college basketball players named to the John Wooden Award Preseason Top 50 list. Wright led the University of Dayton to the NCAA tournament and a 27-8 record last season. After missing 19 games with a fractured ankle as a freshman, Wright came back to lead UD in scoring (13.3), rebounding (6.6) free throws made (121), dunks (a school-record 54), double-doubles (6) and SportsCenter Top Ten Plays (3).

THE WRIGHT STUFF

A charismatic player whose work ethic matches his athleticism, it took Chris Wright just eight minutes to become one of the top players in the A-10 Conference. That's all the league action he saw as a freshman before fracturing his ankle in the A-10 opener. Yet he was named to the A-10 All-Rookie Team in 2007-08, and to the Preseason All-Atlantic 10 Second Team in 2008-09.

BEST AGAINST THE BCS

The proud owner of a 43-and-a half inch vertical leap, the high-flying Chris Wright seems to save his best efforts for the best competition. Four of his 10 career double-doubles have come against BCS schools, including 13 points and 13 rebounds last November against No. 15 Marquette to lead UD to the 2008 Chicago Invitational Challenge championship, and a career-high 27 points and 10 rebounds in the Flyer win over West Virginia in the First Round of the 2009 NCAA Tournament. He tallied 15 points and 10 boards against Kansas State in the 2009 Puerto Rico Tip-Off.

CAMP CONFIDENTIAL

Chris Wright has achieved numerous accolades in his first two years at UD. However, the Trotwood native is on a never-ending quest to improve. He made several trips around the nation for individual training and to play against other top collegians as a counselor at summer camps. Wright worked at LeBron James' camp in San Diego and in Cleveland matching up against the superstar in nightly pickup games. Wright also participated in the Vince Carter Skills Academy in Orlando.

WRIGHT EARNS FIRST TEAM, ALL-ATLANTIC 10 PRESEASON SELECTION

Junior forward Chris Wright earned a preseason First Team, All-Atlantic 10 selection after leading the Flyers to a 27-8 overall record last season.

FIGHT FOR YOUR WRIGHT

In his freshman season, Chris Wright earned a spot on the A-10 All-Rookie team even though he logged just eight minutes in conference play. Wright was the fifth Dayton player to be selected to the Atlantic 10 All-Rookie Team. Tony Stanley (1998), Brooks Hall (2000), Keith Waleskowski (2001) and Brian Roberts (2005) are the previous Flyer A-10 Rookies.

ON THE ATTACK

Chris Wright's aggressive approach on offense often puts him on the line. He has made more than twice as many free throws than anyone else on the team. Wright has 62 FTM while Chris Johnson has 31. Wright also leads the team in free throws attempted (86) and at 72.1% is one of four Flyers shooting 70% or better from the line.

WRIGHT TO KNOW

The Dayton Flyers are 53-13 overall, 37-0 at home and 6-4 against ranked opponents with Chris Wright in the lineup during his UD career. In fact, he is undefeated at home (57-0) over his last four years of organized basketball in high school and college.

WRIGHT NAMED NABC FIRST TEAM ALL-DISTRICT

Chris Wright was named First Team All-District by the National Association of Basketball Coaches on March 5, 2009. Wright was the 11th player in UD history and the first Flyer sophomore to be named First Team NABC All-District. Previous first-team selections were Brian Roberts (2008), Tony Stanley (2001), Roosevelt Chapman (1984), Jim Paxson (1979), Don May (1967 & 1968), Henry Finkel (1966), Bill Uhl (1955), Jack Sallee (1954 & 1955), John Horan (1955) and Don Meineke (1952).

THAT FIGURES

Chris Wright has scored in double figures in 24 of his last 28 contests. Wright is 55th on Dayton's all-time scoring list with 854 career points. Norm Grevey is 54th with 875 points.

BETTER MAKE THE WRIGHT DECISION

Chris Wright is not just climbing UD's charts offensively, but defensively as well. Wright has 72 career blocks, good for eighth on the Flyer all-time list. Wright needs five to reach Wes Coffee for seventh.

DUNK TANK

After just 66 games in a Flyer uniform, Chris Wright possesses 102 career dunks, tying him with Charles Little for the UD career record. Over the last 11 games, 21 of Wright's last 52 field goals are dunks. He matched his career high and just missed the UD single-game record with five slams vs. Boston U.

DAYTON FLYERS MEN'S BASKETBALL GAME NOTES

MARVELOUS MARCUS

Senior Marcus Johnson has played through injuries this season, first injuring his wrist while being fouled on a dunk against Villanova (a play that made SportsCenter's Top Ten) and then suffering a sprained left foot/ankle in the Appalachian State win. Johnson opened the year with 13 points against Creighton. Johnson tallied a 14-point performance versus Kansas State in the finale of the 2009 Puerto Rico Tip-Off. Johnson scored 12 points and dished out five assists in the win over Towson. At Miami he came up with a clutch rebound and sank two key free throws with 11 seconds remaining to seal the win. Johnson scored 12 points against Old Dominion and 11 vs. Duquesne. He scored a season-high 17 points at Xavier.

JOHNSON NABS PRESEASON ALL-ATLANTIC 10 SECOND TEAM SELECTION

Earlier this year, senior Marcus Johnson earned a spot on the preseason All-Atlantic 10 Second Team. Last season Johnson was named to the Honorable Mention team and was named the co-winner of the White Allen MVP award.

MORE ON MJ

Marcus Johnson has moved up the charts in UD basketball history, ranking 34th on the all-time scoring list at 1,078 career points. Johnson needs 15 points to reach Richard Montague for 33rd. MJ joined the 1,000 point club at Miami.

SHUTDOWN CORNER

Marcus Johnson guarded the opposition's top scorer in 21 of the last 26 contests of the 2008-09 season. Johnson had the primary defensive responsibility to guard four of the five 2008-09 First Team All-Atlantic 10 selections and West Virginia's Alex Ruoff, a 2008-09 Big East Honorable Mention selection.

DOUBLE TROUBLE

Marcus Johnson, a 6-3 guard from Cleveland, has scored in double figures 49 times in his 115-game career, including 47 in his last 75 games. Johnson reached double figures in scoring 26 times during the 2008-09 season which led the team.

BEING 'KURT' TO THE OPPOSITION

Kurt Huelsman continues to serve as a leader on both ends of the floor. After scoring five points in the season's first three games, Huelsman scored six points in the Towson win and followed it up with seven points and seven rebounds at Miami. Huelsman had three blocks and five boards against No. 21/19 Georgia Tech. He tallied five points and three assists versus Lehigh. Huelsman recorded six points and four boards at George Mason. He had eight points in both the Presbyterian and Appalachian State wins. At Xavier, he had five points and four blocked shots. In his last 11 games, Huelsman is averaging 5.1 points on 23-of-41 shooting (.561). He is third in FG% (.521, 25-48).

THE IRON MAN

Senior Kurt Huelsman has started every game in his UD career. Huelsman possesses the longest active streak of consecutive starts in the Atlantic 10 Conference with 117 games. Nate Green holds the all-time record with 133 games played. Mark Ashman holds the UD record for consecutive starts with 119.

LONG-LASTING FRESHNESS

Kurt Huelsman has started every one of his 117 career games at UD. Only two players, Clemson's Trevor Booker and Oakland's Johnathan Jones, have started every game of his college career and more than Huelsman. Through Jan. 17, Booker has started all of his 120 games for Tigers, while Jones has started in 118. Texas' Damion James is the active career leader with 122, followed by Tulsa's Ben Uzoh and Villanova's Scottie Reynolds with 121, Booker (120), Jones (118), and Texas' Justin Mason and Huelsman (117).

DAYTON'S WARREN A CANDIDATE FOR 2010 COUSY AWARD

University of Dayton senior guard London Warren was selected as one of 73 candidates for the 2010 Bob Cousy Award, an honor that goes annually to the top point guard in college basketball. Warren has quarterbacked the Flyers to a 13-4 record and leads the team in assists (4.1). He is also fifth in the Atlantic 10 Conference in assists per game.

LONDON CALLING

Known as the "Jacksonville Jet," London Warren leads the Flyers in assists (4.1) and steals (19), and ranks second in assist-to-turnover ratio (1.77). He was named to the 2009 Atlantic 10 All-Defensive Team. Warren dished out eight assists and hauled in five boards against Creighton. He added five points, four assists and three rebounds against No. 21/19 Georgia Tech. He recorded five rebounds and three assists against Kansas State. Warren dished out four assists versus Towson. Warren had four points including two clutch free throws to seal the victory at Miami. He dished out five assists versus Lehigh. Warren had three points, three steals and four rebounds at George Mason. Warren recorded five rebounds and four assists versus Old Dominion. He dished out five assists and picked up three steals versus Presbyterian. In the BU win, he had nine assists, two steals and just one turnover. Against Ball State, Warren had seven assists and one turnover. He had six points, four rebounds, eight assists and three turnovers in the Duquesne win. In the last six games, he has a 2.8 A/T ratio (36-13).

SECRETARY OF DEFENSE

Named to the 2009 preseason Atlantic 10 All-Defensive Team, London Warren's defense provides a huge spark for the Flyers. Last season, Warren had at least one steal in 29 out of 34 games, including three against Kansas in the NCAA Tournament. Warren led UD in steals (55) and assists (145). Warren has 142 steals in his Flyer career, good for eighth all-time in UD history, 14 behind David Morris.

THE JACKSONVILLE JET

Last season London Warren's 2.33 assist-to-turnover ratio was tied for fifth-best in the program's history. Speaking of program history, Warren has 367 career assists, putting him 12th on the Dayton's all-time list. Dan Christie is 11th at 369.

RL BACK FROM THE DL

Ten months after surgery to repair a torn patellar tendon in his right knee, Rob Lowery returned by playing eight minutes, scoring eight points on 3-for-3 shooting from the floor, had three assists and a steal against Lehigh. Less than a month after that, he scored a career-high 23 points (8-10 FG, 7-9 three-pointers) in the win over Boston University. Building up to that, Lowery added two points, two rebounds and a steal at George Mason. Lowery added seven points and three assists versus Old Dominion. Lowery chipped in with seven points and four rebounds against Presbyterian. He had seven points, six assists and just one turnover in 22 minutes in the App State win. At Xavier, Lowery had 13 points, eight rebounds, six assists (with no turnovers) and two steals. Sidelined by a knee injury that cost him the final 10 games of his junior season, Lowery averaged 7.5 points, 2.7 rebounds and 3.4 assists per game last season. Dayton is 31-5 all-time with Lowery in the lineup. He is third on the team in scoring (8.3 ppg.).

BIG SHOT ROB

Prior to the injury Lowery made a name for himself as a clutch performer. In the 72-71 win over Fordham last year, Lowery drove the length of the floor for a basket with 5.4 seconds to go. In the win over No. 15 Marquette, Lowery scored 21 points on 9-of-13 shooting from the floor. He tied for the team-high with 13 points and had the steal and dunk that tied the game, the assist on the go-ahead three-pointer and the free throw that made it a two-possession game versus George Mason at home last year.

HEY MICKEY

In his last 13 games, Mickey Perry is averaging 5.9 points and 2.0 assists. Perry matched his career-high of 15 points in two straight games (Presbyterian and Appalachian State), going a combined 11-of-11 at the free throw line in those games. Earlier in the year, Perry had a 10-point effort against No. 5/6 Villanova. He dished out a career-best six assists at Miami.

DIAL IN WITH DEVIN

Junior forward Devin Searcy has been deadly from the field this season for UD. He leads the team in field goal percentage, converting 27-of-46 (.587) from the floor. Against Lehigh, Searcy shot 5-for-5 from the floor and finished with a career-best 13 points. He started off this season shooting 3-of-3 from the field in the win over Creighton. Searcy connected on his only field goal attempt and added four rebounds against No. 21/19 Georgia Tech. He had four points and three rebounds at Miami. Searcy chipped in with six points and three rebounds at George Mason. He added six points against Boston University, with seven and seven in the Ball State win.

CHRIS-CROSSING

Sophomore Chris Johnson is averaging a double-double in league play (15.3 ppg, 14.7 rpg) and leads the A-10 in rebounding in conference competition. He has scored career-highs in two of his last five games. He had 21 points (5-10 3-pt.), with eight rebounds and three steals at New Mexico, and then bettered that with 26 points and a career-high 20 rebounds in the Duquesne win. He was named A-10 co-Player of the Week after his 20-20 game. He leads the team in rebounding (8.0) and FT% (.838, 31-37) and is second in scoring (13.0), 3-pt. FG% (.375, 30-80) and steals (18). He scored in double-figures in the season's first eight games, and after a five-point, six-rebound effort in the ODU win, he suffered a concussion in the first minute of the Presbyterian game. He sat out the App State game, and made an impressive return to action in the Boston U win. He scored 12 points in 16 minutes, going 4-for-4 from the field and 3-for-3 from the line. At Xavier he scored 10 points and grabbed 16 rebounds, including 10 off the offensive glass. He started off the season with an explosive 18-point, 15-rebound performance in the opener against Creighton. Johnson then led all scorers with 19 points on 7-of-13 shooting and added seven boards in the victory over No. 21/19 Georgia Tech. Johnson then tallied 13 points versus No. 5/6 Villanova.

20-20 VISION

There have been just seven 20-20 games turned in by a Dayton player at UD Arena since the Arena opened in 1969. Ken May, George Janky, Tom Crosswhite, J.D. Grigsby, Joe Fisher, Ryan Perryman all did it prior to Chris Johnson, but Johnson's is only the second in the last 35 years. (Grigsby is teammate Chris Wright's uncle). It was the first 20-20 game this season by any Atlantic 10 player. Johnson is also only the third player in Division I to score at least 25 points and grab 20 rebounds this season. Artsiom Parakhouski of Radford and Jamine Peterson of Providence are the other two.

P-DUBYA

Sophomore Paul Williams had his best game of the season in the win over No. 21/19 Georgia Tech. Williams scored seven of his 13 points in the final minute to help UD to the victory. He nearly matched that performance hitting a 3-pointer with 31 seconds, pulling down a defensive rebound and making a final free throw to seal the comeback against Towson. Williams scored 10 points versus Kansas State. Against Presbyterian, Williams snagged a career-best eight rebounds, and followed that up with 10 points and seven rebounds in a start against App State. In his UD career, the Flyers are 15-5 when Williams sinks a three-point shot.

CHARITABLE CONTRIBUTION

Paul Williams is shooting 15-for-16 in the final two minutes of the game at the free throw line this season. In the other 38 minutes of regulation, he is 5-for-9. Williams ranks second on the team in free throw percentage (.800, 20-25).

COOL HAND LUKE

Luke Fabrizius suffered a moderate sprain of the medial collateral ligament in his right knee early in the Old Dominion win, missed five games and returned for seven minutes against Duquesne. At Fordham, he led UD with 13 points (3-3 3-pt. FG) in 10 minutes. Prior to the injury, Fabrizius came alive offensively this season. He netted a season-high of 16 points and career-high of nine rebounds versus No. 5/6 Villanova. Fabrizius netted nine points in the win over Creighton. He came back to hit four 3-pointers en route to 12 points against No. 21/19 Georgia Tech. Fabrizius closed out the 2009 Puerto Rico Tip-Off with two 3-pointers against Kansas State. Averaging 6.8 points per game this season, Fabrizius is shooting better from outside the arc 26-of-53 (.491) than his overall 30-of-69 (.435). In A-10 play, he has made 6-of-9 three-pointers.

BENSON'S BACK

Josh Benson is chipping in at almost every opportunity on the floor. Against Presbyterian he tallied a season-best 10 points with seven rebounds, and then came back with four and a season-high eight rebounds in the App State win. He also scored seven points against BU. With Chris Wright saddled with foul trouble at Xavier, Benson came through with eight points and three assists (six and three in the first half). After playing just 18 minutes in his first five games of the year, he has averaged more than half of that per game (9.9) in the last 10.

WELCOME MATT

With only one scholarship available, University of Dayton men's basketball coach Brian Gregory and his staff landed their third top local product in as many years when Centerville High School star Matt Kavanaugh signed his letter of intent to attend UD and play basketball for the Flyers. Kavanaugh made his first collegiate appearance against No. 21/19 Georgia Tech. He tallied his first collegiate career rebound versus Kansas State. Kavanaugh corralled two offensive rebounds against Lehigh. He scored his first career collegiate point versus Presbyterian, and scored another bucket in the Ball State win.

PARKER TRANSFERS TO DAYTON

In April 2009, guard Josh Parker transferred to the University of Dayton from Drake University. Parker, a 6-0 guard who graduated in 2007 from Thornton High School in suburban Chicago, has already begun classes and will redshirt the 2009-10 season due to NCAA transfer rules. Parker appeared in 33 games last season for Drake. He averaged 10.7 points, 2.0 rebounds and 1.5 rebounds, while shooting .432 (57-132) from 3-point range and .720 (67-93) from the free throw line. He was third on the team in scoring, and led the team in 3-pt. FG%.

GREGORY'S CONTRACT TO RUN THROUGH 2018

University of Dayton Vice President and Director of Athletics Tim Wabler announced in May that the University has extended head men's basketball coach Brian Gregory's contract for an additional five years, and that it will run through the 2017-18 season. Since taking over as UD's head coach in 2003, Gregory has a record of 138-72. His original contract term was five years. He signed a new agreement in 2005 that originally ran through 2013. He is one of just 25 coaches who have been at their current school at least five years. That list includes Syracuse's Jim Boeheim, UConn's Jim Calhoun, Florida's Billy Donovan, Michigan State's Tom Izzo, Duke's Mike Krzyzewski, Louisville's Rick Pitino, KU's Bill Self, Maryland's Gary Williams and UNC's Roy Williams, average at least 20 wins a season. Gregory coached his 200th career game against Lehigh.

GREGORY TOURS WITH USO'S OPERATION HARDWOOD VI

In August, University of Dayton men's basketball head coach Brian Gregory had the opportunity to travel to the Persian Gulf and visit troops as part of the sixth installment of "Operation Hardwood," a USO/Armed Forces Entertainment tour. It was the second straight year Gregory toured the Middle East with the USO.

EARLY SEASON TESTS

The Dayton-Creighton game was the nation's only season-opener that features two teams that received votes in the preseason USA Today/ESPN Top 25 poll. Dayton was ranked 22nd in the preseason poll, while Creighton received seven votes. UD's next game against No. 21/19 Georgia Tech featured the first time during the 2009-10 season two ranked opponents squared off against each other.

SEASON'S GREETINGS

The month of December has been kind for Flyer head coach Brian Gregory. Gregory has never had a losing month of December, going 41-12 (.774) in seven seasons. This year, Dayton went 7-0 in December and UD has won 20 of its last 21, including 11 in a row, dating back to the 2007-08 campaign.

STEAL OF A DEAL

During the 2009-10 season the Flyers are averaging 6.18 steals per game. Last year Dayton's 6.49 steals per game was UD's best average in 17 years and ranked as the fifth-best steal-per-game average in school history. UD opened the 2009-10 season with four swipes against Creighton and had eight against No. 21/19 Georgia Tech. At George Mason, UD posted a season-best 10 steals. The Flyers matched that with 10 at New Mexico. Seven of Xavier's eight turnovers came via steals.

CLOSE SHAVE

Dayton was 11-1 in games decided by five points or less in 2008-09, the best record of close games in the nation. The Flyers were also 19-0 last season when leading with five minutes left in regulation. This season, UD is 3-2 in games decided by five points or less and 10-0 when leading at the five-minute mark.

ARENA ROCK

The Flyers are riding a school-record 29 consecutive home game winning streak. UD's homecourt streak is fifth-best in the nation through games of January 17 and is the best in the Atlantic 10. Dayton is behind Kansas (52), Missouri, Pittsburgh and Siena (30).

HOME SWEET HOME

Over the last four years on Tom Blackburn Court, the Flyers are 57-5. The 57 victories are the eighth-most in the NCAA since the 2006-07 season. Just ahead of UD are Kansas (66), Ohio State (61), Florida and Pittsburgh (60), Syracuse and UNLV (59), and Texas A&M (58). UD has started at home 10-0 for the last three seasons (the Flyers are 9-0 so far in 2009-10). Dayton won its 500th game at UD Arena on December 29 and is 502-181 in 40 seasons at the Arena. The Flyers have a home all-time winning percentage of .781 (758-213).

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

Dayton's 18 victories last season at UD Arena set the program record for home wins and eclipsed the old mark set by the 2002-03 team that went 17-1 and the 1977-78 squad that went 17-3. Only two other Flyer squads, the 1949-50 team at the Fairgrounds Coliseum (16-0) and the 1959-60 squad in the UD Fieldhouse (14-0), ever also went unbeaten at home.

DAYTON SIGNS TOP RECRUITING CLASS OF STATEN, HILL, BERRY, SPEARMAN, & OLIVER

University of Dayton men's basketball coach Brian Gregory and his staff continue to stockpile strong, incoming talent, as another exceptionally talented recruiting class signed National Letters of Intent today to continue their careers at UD. The newest official members of the Flyer family are 6-foot-1 guard Jesse Berry of Lafayette (Ind.) Jefferson High School, 6-foot-6 forward Ralph Hill of Westerville (Ohio) North High School, 6-foot-7 forward Devin Oliver of Kalamazoo (Mich.) Central High School, 6-foot-3 guard Brandon Spearman of Chicago Simeon High School, and 5-foot-11 guard Juwan Staten from Dayton, Ohio who attends powerhouse Oak Hill Academy in Mouth of Wilson, Va. Headlined by Staten, who Rivals.com has ranked the 44th-best player in his class, the 2009-10 signing class is ranked as high as 15th in the country.

BIG ROTATION

The Flyers have 10 players who are averaging three points or more per game and more than 12 minutes per contest this season. During the 2008-09 campaign, UD was one of 15 teams with at least 27 wins, but was the only one with 12 players averaging at least eight minutes per game.

ELITE COMPANY

Dayton coach Brian Gregory became just the fourth coach in Flyer basketball history to record 100 career victories when the Flyers defeated Delaware State on Nov. 18, 2008. Gregory joined Don Donoher, Tom Blackburn and Oliver Purnell as the only Dayton coaches to reach the 100-win plateau. Gregory reached 100 wins faster than any Dayton coach except the two icons of Flyer basketball: Donoher and Blackburn.

THIRD IS THE WORD

Dayton has hit at least one 3-point shot in 30 straight games.

WELCOME TO FLIGHT CLUB

Dayton set a new single-season record for dunks just 19 games into the 2008-09 season. The Flyers' total of 117 was 56 more than the 61 slams performed by the 2003-04 team in 33 games. This season UD has 59 dunks through the first 17 games with Chris Wright (32) leading the way followed by Marcus Johnson (10), Josh Benson (6), Chris Johnson (5), Devin Searcy (4), and London Warren and Kurt Huelsman (1 each). UD's eight dunks in the Boston U win were one off the UD single-game record, as were Wright's five. He is one game up on last year's single-season individual record pace. Wright had 54 in 2008-09.

FILLING UP THE STAT SHEET

Dayton has shown early on that their offense is not a one-man show. Five Flyers, Chris Wright, Luke Fabrizius, Mickey Perry, Rob Lowery, Chris Johnson and Marcus Johnson each have led the team in scoring this season. Wright and Chris Johnson have both led six times, Perry and Fabrizius twice, and Lowery and Marcus Johnson once. In rebounding, Wright has led the team eight times, Chris Johnson seven times and Marcus Johnson, Williams, Benson and Fabrizius once apiece. (Note: scoring and rebounding numbers add up to more than 10 due to games where more than one player tied for the team-high).

EYE 75 ON THE SCOREBOARD

UD is 39-6 under Brian Gregory when scoring at least 75 points and were 7-1 last season. UD is 3-1 this year.

WHAT SOPHOMORE SLUMP?

UD's sophomore class of Chris Johnson, Paul Williams and Luke Fabrizius are enjoying a great start to 2009-10. The trio combined for 36 points, 17 rebounds and shot 13-of-30 (.433) from the floor against Creighton. Versus Georgia Tech, the trio added 44 points, on 13-of-29 shooting from the floor (.448). Against Villanova, Johnson and Fabrizius combined for 29 points with eight three-pointers. Against K-State the trio combined for 32 points.

THE ROUND MOUND OF REBOUND

This season UD is 11-1 when outrebounding the opponent and have a plus-5.8 rebounding margin in the 12 victories this season.

SPARK OFF THE BENCH

With such a deep team, it is no surprise UD's bench was a big part of the team's success. UD non-starters have won the battle of the benches 10 times in 2009-10. UD held a 42-27 advantage in bench scoring against Creighton. The Flyers then outscored No. 21/19 Georgia Tech's bench 47-24. Against No. 5/6 Villanova, UD's bench outscored the Wildcats 39-25. In the K-State contest, UD held a 35-20 bench scoring advantage. Against Presbyterian, UD held a 43-16 bench scoring edge. In the BU win, it was 48-16. At New Mexico, it was 31-7. This year the Flyer bench has outscored opponents 534-337.

QUALITY OF COMPETITION

UD's four losses are to No. 4 Villanova, No. 10 Kansas State, then-No. 19 New Mexico and Xavier, who have a combined record of 57-10. Dayton has quality victories versus Georgia Tech and Old Dominion and road victories against George Mason and Miami.

CONQUERING GOLIATH

The Flyers have proved they can handle the big-name programs. Dayton is 7-4 in the last three years against BCS programs and has won three of its last four games against the Big East.

HEAD OF THE CLASS

UD's seniors, the Class of 2010, have tied the best mark in UD history for wins in their first three seasons on campus. The Flyers' 69 wins from 2007-09 tied the freshman-sophomore-junior wins by the Class of 1955 and the Class of 2005. The 69 wins are also the third-best three-year period, regardless of class year, in school history. Dayton won 79 games between 1949 and 1952, and 75 games between 1953 and 1956. UD's Class of 2010 is also the first class in school history to go undefeated at home against non-conference opponents.

HOT, HOT, HOT

UD has won its last 36 non-conference home games. Included are games against members of the Big East, Conference USA, Mid-American, Colonial Athletic Association and Missouri Valley conferences.

SPECIAL DELIVERY

This year's Dayton Flyer basketball marketing theme is "We're All Flyers," once again signifying the bond between UD and Miami Valley residents. For the second year in a row, head coach Brian Gregory and every UD player hand-delivered season tickets to 20 season ticket-holders around Dayton on Oct. 19.

DAYTON TEAMS' ACADEMIC PROGRESS RATES AMONG THE NCAA'S BEST AGAIN

In April 2009, eight athletics programs at the University of Dayton were honored by the NCAA with Public Recognition Awards for their latest Academic Progress Rate (APR) scores. The Flyer men's basketball team was one of 10 NCAA teams listed (BYU, Duke, Illinois, Kansas, Michigan State, North Carolina, Texas, Villanova and VCU are the others) that posted multi-year APR scores in the top 10 percent of all squads. The APR provides a real-time look at a team's academic success each semester or quarter by tracking the academic progress of each student-athlete.

SOMETIMES IT'S WHO YOU KNOW

Dayton is 271-197 all-time against teams currently in the Atlantic 10 Conference. In 14+ years as an A-10 team, the Flyers are 129-91. UD coach Brian Gregory is 57-42 in A-10 competition.

UD LAUNCHES GODAYTONHOOPS.COM

The University of Dayton Division of Athletics launched a new website, GoDaytonHoops.com, to provide users an inside, in-depth look at the Flyer Men's Basketball program. The first phase includes exclusive videos, interactive roster elements, and an interactive schedule. It also includes key links to social networking sites for Flyer Fans to interact regardless of their location. In January 2010, more features will be added as the Flyers enter into conference play.

FLYER GARDEN PARTY

UD's 74-58 win over Fordham on Jan. 13 was Dayton's first appearance at Madison Square Garden since 1991. UD has a 38-24 all-time record at the Garden. The Flyers' 38 wins at the Garden are tied with Duke for the most victories of any non-New York metropolitan area school.

AND THE CROWD GOES WILD

The eight-millionth UD fan in UD Arena history attended the Presbyterian game. UD's last 160 regular season home games have had attendance of at least 11,000 fans. In the last 14 years, 99% of UD's home games have drawn at least 10,000 (398 of 401), including the last 197 regular season games. The last 16 have drawn at least 12,000, the last four over 13,000.

THE FLYER FAITHFUL

For years, UD has claimed it has had the best fans in the nation. In 2001, The Sporting News conducted an unscientific poll of college basketball coaches, media and SIDs. In the Jan. 8, 2001 issue of the magazine, UD's fans were tabbed as college basketball's best. And they prove it to everyone the Flyers play. In 2007-08 UD had the second-best average home attendance in school history (12,801). UD Arena has 92 sellouts in its 40-year history. UD sold out the opener against Creighton, the Appalachian State game, Boston U and Duquesne game, and has already announced Xavier. The record for sellouts is eight in the Arena's first season 1969-70. The Flyers are currently averaging 13,087 fans a game this season.

UD AMONG THE BEST IN NCAA ATTENDANCE

The University of Dayton finished in the Top 30 in men's basketball attendance for the 14th straight season in 2008-09. The Flyers led the Atlantic 10 in attendance for the 12th straight season. UD averaged more than 2,400 fans a game better than any other team in the conference.

TOURNEY TOWN

The NCAA Division I Tournament made its start at UD Arena for the eighth year in a row as the University of Dayton Arena host the NCAA Opening Round Game in 2009. This year the UD Arena will serve as a regional site for the 2010 NCAA Women's Basketball Championship. UD has hosted the Opening Round game since its inception in its current form in 2002. When the 2010 NCAA Tournament is over, UD Arena will have been an NCAA site in 24 of the last 41 years and will have hosted 87 NCAA Tournament games. It makes UD Arena the most prolific NCAA Tournament venue ahead of Municipal Auditorium in Kansas City (83) and the Huntsman Center in Salt Lake City (81).

NCAA TOURNAMENT RETURNING TO UD ARENA THROUGH 2013

The National Collegiate Athletic Association has announced preliminary round sites for the 2011, 2012 and 2013 NCAA Men's Division I Basketball Championships, and the tournament is returning to the University of Dayton Arena in each of those years. The NCAA First and Second Rounds will come back to Dayton in 2013. In addition, the NCAA Opening Round Game will remain at UD Arena through the 2013 tournament.

DAYTON AMONG TOP 10 IN NCAA GRADUATION SUCCESS RATE

The University of Dayton's 94 percent Graduation Success Rate is second in the Atlantic 10 Conference and ties it for 22nd in the NCAA. In addition, this year's GSR Report shows that UD graduated 100 percent of its student-athletes that participated in women's basketball, men's cross country, women's cross country/track & field, men's golf, women's golf, women's rowing, women's soccer, men's tennis, women's tennis and volleyball. The UD's men's basketball team's GSR was the best in the A-10.

DID YOU KNOW?

UD won more games than any other school in both the 1950s and '60s. UD won 435 games between 1950 and 1969 and ranks among the top teams of the 1950s and 1960s in Division I history. The Flyers' .763 (228-71) winning percentage in the 1950s ranks fifth in the decade. Their .729 (207-77) winning percentage ranks eighth in the 1960s.

RECAPPING THE LAST FIVE GAMES OF 2009-10

XAVIER 78, DAYTON 74

Chris Johnson recorded a double-double with 10 points and 16 rebounds, but it wasn't enough as the University of Dayton Flyers fell to the Xavier Musketeers 78-74.

Chris Wright added 10 points and nine boards as UD dropped to 13-4 overall and 2-1 in the Atlantic 10.

Marcus Johnson led Dayton with 17 and had three steals, while Rob Lowery added 13 points, eight rebounds and six assists as the Flyers lost for only the second time in their previous 13 contests.

In the 150th meeting between the two programs, it was a back-and-forth, physical struggle for the entire contest. The Flyers dominated on the glass holding a 51-31 rebounding edge and hauling in 25 offensive rebounds. Ten of Chris Johnson's 16 boards came on the offensive end.

DAYTON 74, FORDHAM 58

A balanced scoring attack helped the University of Dayton Flyers pick up a 74-58 victory over the Fordham Rams at Madison Square Garden. Luke Fabrizio scored 13 points while Chris Wright added 12 points, eight rebounds and slammed home four alley-oop dunks.

Dayton took control with an 11-0 run that gave it a 52-39 lead. The middle two field goals of the run were dunks by Wright off alley-oop passes from London Warren. Fabrizio closed the run with a 3-pointer.

Defensively, the Flyers were sharp. UD held Fordham without a field goal over the last 10:33. The Rams finished the game shooting 33 percent (17-of-51) from the floor. At the other end Dayton, buoyed by 59 percent shooting in the second half, shot 52 percent (30-of-58) for the game.

DAYTON 78, DUQUESNE 72 (OT)

Chris Johnson had career highs with 26 points and 20 rebounds and Dayton opened its Atlantic 10 conference play with a 78-72 overtime victory over Duquesne. Johnson, carried the Flyers in the second half with 13 points and six in overtime. Dayton took a 70-63 lead on Johnson's put-back dunk with 2:43 left.

Jason Duty had a chance to win the game for Duquesne in regulation when he was fouled while trying to shoot a 3-pointer with 3.5 seconds left. Duty made the first, but missed the next two.

Dayton scored the first seven points of overtime on a three-pointer by Marcus Johnson, a layup by Chris Johnson and a put-back slam by Chris Johnson. The Flyers led by at least five points for the last 3:35 of the overtime.

Chris Wright added 16 points and 11 rebounds for Dayton, and Marcus Johnson had 11 points. Point guard London Warren had eight assists against three turnovers. It was his 50th straight game with at least one assist.

DAYTON 59, BALL STATE 35

Chris Wright scored 10 points and Dayton had its best defensive game of the season in a 59-35 victory over Ball State on Tuesday night. The Flyers held the Cardinals to 27.9 percent shooting (12 of 43) from the field - the lowest percentage by an opponent this season.

Ball State sophomore center Jarrod Jones entered the game averaging 15.1 points per game, but was held to just three points on 1-of-8 shooting.

Kurt Huelsman was Jones' primary defender. The Flyer senior scored five points and grabbed three defensive boards, while limiting Jones, who had double-doubles in his last three contests. UD's Chris Johnson had 10 rebounds, while London Warren had seven assist and one turnover.

NEW MEXICO 68, DAYTON 66

Despite a late surge, the University of Dayton Flyers had their eight-game winning streak snapped in a 68-66 loss to the No. 19/17 New Mexico Lobos in Albuquerque on Jan. 1. Sophomore forward Chris Johnson tallied 21 points to lead the Flyers. Johnson hit five 3-pointers en route to his second consecutive double-figure night.

Chris Wright had led the team with 10 rebounds, four of which were on offense. Wright also had eight points.

The Flyers held a brief 39-36 lead at the 12:58 mark early in the second half when they scored six unanswered points on London Warren's breakaway dunk, Warren's fast-break layup in traffic and a Wright, but the Lobos re-took the lead for good on back-to-back three-pointers by Roman Martinez.

He netted a career-high 15 points on 6-of-11 shooting from the floor and hit all three attempts from beyond the arc against Duquesne in the A-10 Semifinals. Perry made his first career start and scored six points on 2-of-3 shooting from three-point range at Charlotte. He matched his previous career-high of 11 points on 4-of-7 shooting at Rhode Island, and scored 10 points on 3-of-6 shooting to go with two assists in the Troy win. In the NCAA First Round, Perry tallied five points, three rebounds and two steals versus West Virginia. He also tabbed 10 points, three steals, and four rebounds against Kansas in the NCAA Second Round.

2007-08

In 23 games, Perry averaged 2.8 points and 1.4 rebounds per game while shooting .391 from the field. He recorded a career-high 11 points in the Atlantic 10 Conference opening round versus Saint Louis. He followed that up with five points, two rebounds and two assists over No. 10/12 Xavier in the quarterfinals. Perry broke out in a big way with eight points in nine minutes against Rhode Island to open conference play. He enjoyed a memorable UD debut when he knocked down a 3-pointer, grabbed two rebounds and recorded a block in the Flyers win against Coppin State.

2006-07

In seven games at Wisconsin, Perry averaged three minutes, 1.0 points and 0.5 rebounds a game behind a deep backcourt that included all-conference performer Kamron Taylor. Wisconsin was ranked fourth in the nation when Perry came to Dayton.

2005-06

Perry redshirted the 2005-06 season at Wisconsin.

High School

After averaging 20.0 points, 7.1 assists and 5.0 rebounds a game as a senior at Proviso East, Perry was Associated Press Third Team All-Illinois and a member of the Chicago team that played in the 2005 Old Spice Red Zone All-Star Shootout. Proviso East High's basketball products include NBA players Doc Rivers, Michael Finley, Dee Brown, Shannon Brown and Steven Hunter. Perry also played his AAU basketball for Larry Butler's Illinois Warriors, where his teammates included Julian Wright of Kansas, Jon Scheyer of Duke and Justin Dentmon of Washington.

Had nine assists (against one turnover) with three rebounds and two steals in the BU win. Scored seven points (3-of-3 FG) at UNM. Had seven assists against one turnover vs. Ball State. Had eight assists, six points and four rebounds against Duquesne. Scored seven points (3-of-4 FG) at Fordham.

2008-09

In his first year as a starter, London Warren led the Flyers in assists (4.5), assist-to-turnover ratio (2.4) and steals (1.6), and was in the Top 20 in the Atlantic 10 in all three categories. He was named to the 2009 Atlantic 10 All-Defensive Team. The "Jacksonville Jet" has been one of the best defensive players for UD over the last three years, and earned Dayton's Defensive Player of the Year the previous two seasons. Warren led the Flyers with team-highs of nine rebounds and eight assists against Temple. He recorded 11 points, eight assists and three steals without a turnover at Toledo. Warren tallied eight points, five rebounds and five assists against Richmond in the A-10 Quarterfinals. He dished out a career-best 12 assists to go with five rebounds versus Duquesne in the A-10 Semifinals. In the NCAA First Round, he had nine assists to only one turnover against West Virginia. Warren finished the season playing in all 35 games and contributing 145 points total.

2007-08

Warren earned the Flyers' Defensive Player of the Year award after leading the team with 45 steals. In the Atlantic 10, Warren ranked 17th with 1.3 steals per game. Warren tallied career-bests of 13 points and 10 rebounds to go with five assists at Rhode Island. At Richmond he added 11 points and matched that point total the following game against Saint Louis. Warren scored all six of his points in double overtime in UD's win over Akron. At Louisville, Warren snagged a career-high four steals in UD's win and matched that number with four steals, six points and eight rebounds versus Loyola. His lay-up and two free throws with less than a minute remaining gave UD the lead that would not be relinquished over Charlotte. At La Salle, Warren delivered 10 points and seven assists. He had seven points in 10 minutes of action at St. Bonaventure. At Illinois State in the NIT Second Round, Warren had four points, six rebounds, four assists and two steals. He finished the year averaging 4.3 points and 2.9 rebounds per game in 34 contests.

2006-07

After averaging just 7.7 minutes, 0.7 points, 1.2 assists and 1.7 turnovers in the first six league games, Warren averaged 18.1 minutes, 4.2 points, 3.4 assists and just 1.8 turnovers in the last 14 games, and earned starts in the last seven games. He shot .250 (8-of-32) from the floor in the first 19 games, but shot .487 (19-of-39) in the final 14 games. Warren was named the winner of the 2006-07 Chris Daniels Memorial Award, which goes to the most improved player on the UD basketball team. He scored a season-high 10 points at Saint Bonaventure with two assists and no turnovers. He raised his career best to eight assists with (six points and just one turnover) against Charlotte during the A-10 tournament win. Overall, he led UD in steals (0.9) and was second in assists (2.5) in just 14.5 minutes a game.

High School

Warren came to the University of Dayton after an outstanding career at Jacksonville's Raines High School, a powerhouse on the Florida prep scene. Warren was First Team 4A All-Florida as a senior, after averaging 21.0 points, 7.5 assists, 6.0 rebounds and 3.2 steals a game. Raines finished 16-10 and ranked 20th in Florida 4A that season.

Scored a career-high 23 points in 23 minutes, making 7-of-9 three-pointers and adding four assists against Boston University. Had three points and four assists at New Mexico. Scored nine in the Duquesne win. Had nine points and four assists in the Fordham win. Started against Xavier and had 13 points, eight rebounds, six assists (with no turnovers) and two steals.

2008-09

With Rob Lowery in the lineup, UD jumped out to a 23-2 record in 2008-09. The first player off the bench in almost all of those first 25 games, he led UD in scoring five times and averaged 7.5 points a game. He was also second on the team in assists with an average of 3.4 per game (84). In his Flyer debut, Lowery dished out five assists, drilled a 15-foot jumper with 48 seconds to go and swished two free throws with 15 ticks left to seal the decision against Wofford. Scored nine points, had four steals, corralled three rebounds and dished out three assists in a win over Delaware State. Had two points, two rebounds and four assists versus Bethune-Cookman. Added five points, four rebounds and two assists in 13 minutes against Mercer. Recorded three rebounds, two points and two assists against Auburn. Shot 9-of-13 from the floor and finished with 21 points against No. 15 Marquette. He added three points, three rebounds and four assists versus Troy. He had two points and two steals at Akron. Led the Flyers with 15 points on 4-of-11 shooting from the floor and had three steals at Creighton. Had five points and five assists in a win over Coppin State. Finished with seven points, two rebounds and two assists against UNC Greensboro. Dished out one assist versus Marshall. Finished with 13 points, five assists and made a clutch steal and dunk with two minutes to go to help lead UD to a comeback win over George Mason. Shot 5-of-10 from the field to finish with 13 points and three assists against Toledo. Had two points, four rebounds and an assist against Miami. Tallied six points, three rebounds and three assists at UMass. Hit the game-winning shot with 5.4 seconds left and scored a team-high 13 points against Fordham. Sank 6-of-9 shots and finished with a team-high 16 points to go with three assists in the win over Duquesne. Recorded eight points, a season-best eight rebounds and six assists at GW. Scored 15 points and recorded seven assists in the win over St. Bonaventure. Had four assists and three rebounds against Saint Louis. Recorded eight points and seven assists against Saint Joseph's. Had five points, six rebounds and three assists at La Salle. Lowery missed the rest of the season following successful surgery on Feb. 12 to repair a torn patellar tendon in his right knee. The injury was suffered in the game against Xavier a day before on Feb. 11.

2007-08

Lowery averaged 18.2 points, 8.7 assists, 4.2 rebounds and 2.1 steals per game for Cecil Community College. He shot 48 percent from the field (including 40 percent from three-point range) and 78 percent from the free throw line. Cecil went 31-1 in 2007-08, suffering an upset loss in its final game of the year in the NJCAA national tournament.

Lowery was chosen to play in the national junior college all-star game in Phoenix, Ariz., on April 20, 2008 where he scored 19 points (including six three-pointers) and had eight assists.

High School

Lowery is originally from McDonough High School in Forestville, just outside of Washington D.C. After high school, he played one year at Chesapeake Community College before redshirting the 2006-07 season at Cecil.

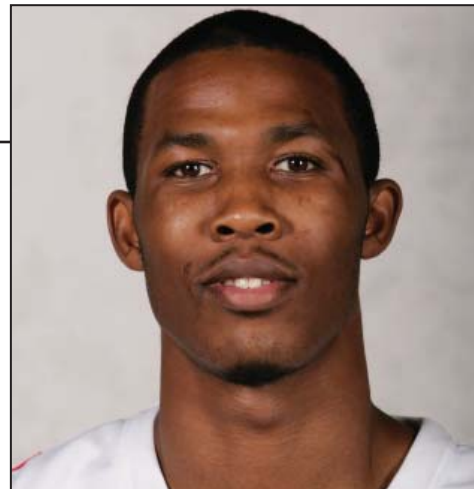

He led the Flyers in FT% (.772, 61-79), was second on the team in rebounding (5.2), and was fifth in scoring (6.3) even though he played just 16.2 minutes a game. Broke out with eight points and five rebounds against Delaware State in 13 minutes. Scored in double-figures for the first time in his Flyer career with 14 points over Bethune-Cookman. Recorded eight points and eight rebounds in a win over Mercer. Had his first career double-double with 12 points and 11 rebounds against No. 15 Marquette. Johnson tallied two points, three rebounds and an assist against Troy. Converted two free throws with three seconds to go making it a two-possession game at Akron. Tallied his second double-double of the season with a team-high 20 points and 12 rebounds versus Coppin State in his first career start. Had 12 points on 5-of-11 shooting to go with eight boards against UNC Greensboro. Tallied nine points, eight rebounds and the go-ahead shot with 1:05 to play in the win over George Mason. Tallied nine points and eight rebounds in the win over Fordham. Had 10 points and nine rebounds at Duquesne. Named the Atlantic 10 Rookie of the Week on Jan. 18 after he averaged 9.5 points and 8.5 rebounds, and shot .545 (6-11) FG and 1.000 (6-6) from the line for the week. Shot 4-of-5 from the floor and 7-of-8 at the free throw line to finish with 17 points and eight rebounds. Hauled in eight rebounds to go with five points and three assists versus Saint Joseph's. Led the Flyers with 13 points and seven rebounds, all coming in the first half, after hitting 4-of-5 shots from the field, both 3-point attempts and all three free throws versus Charlotte. Chipped in with five points and six rebounds in the win over No. 14 Xavier. Snagged a team-high seven rebounds to go with four points at No. 17/18 Xavier. Was just short of a double-double with 10 points and nine boards against Richmond in the A-10 Quarterfinals. In the A-10 Semifinals against Duquesne, Johnson added seven points and three rebounds.

High School

Following a senior year in which Johnson averaged 26.2 points on 63 percent shooting, he was awarded Columbus All-District First Team and Player of the Year honors. Those numbers also earned Johnson a spot on the AP All-Ohio First Team in Division I and caught the attention of ESPN scouts, who ranked him the 39th best small forward in the nation. Rated one of the "10 Most Improved" players in Ohio by Prep Spotlight after his junior year, Johnson averaged 24.4 points, 13.2 rebounds and 2.0 blocks a game last season for Brookhaven. Johnson was an Associated Press Second Team Division I All-Ohio selection (current Flyer Chris Wright was on the first team). He stepped up his game as a junior after a solid sophomore season where he was the only player among the team's top ten players who was not a senior. After he moved into the starting lineup in mid-January, Brookhaven advanced to the OHSAA Sweet Sixteen. A four-year varsity player, he played on teams that were a combined 80-17.

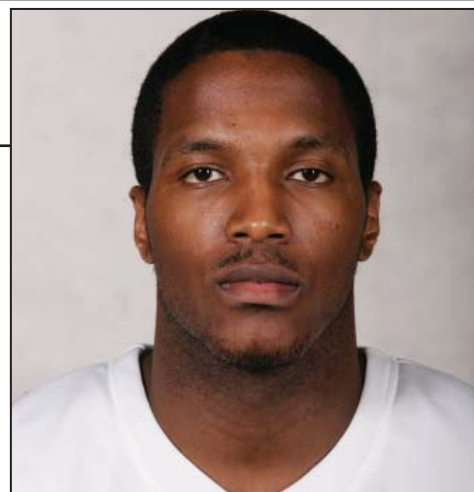

High School

Williams, one of the top prep recruits out of Michigan, will bring a reputation as a clutch shooter and lockdown defender to this year's Flyer backcourt. He is a member of the A-10's Preseason All-Newcomer team. An athletic 6-foot-4 shooting guard from Detroit's Renaissance High School, Williams was one of four finalists for the title of Michigan's "Mr. Basketball" during his senior year. Although Williams finished third in the final vote, he was one of just four finalists, as selected by the Basketball Coaches Association of Michigan. His senior averages of 23.8 points, 6.1 rebounds and 1.3 steals per game give merit to those who rave about his determination, hustle and leadership ability. The left-handed Williams shot 51 percent from the field and 78 percent from the foul line during his senior campaign.

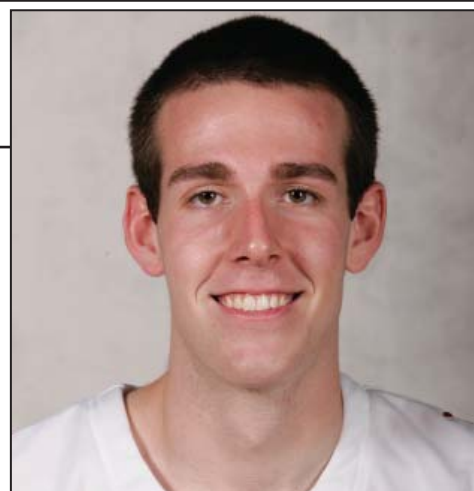

Scored in double figures for the first time in his Flyer career with 10 points versus UNC Greensboro. Played three minutes against Marshall. Sank at three-pointer in the win over George Mason. Played three minutes at George Washington and against St. Bonaventure. Sank a three-pointer and added two rebounds at La Salle. Hit 1-of-2 three point attempts at Charlotte. Played 10 minutes, had a point and a block at No. 17/18 Xavier. Scored a game-high 17 points on 6-of-9 shooting from the field and hit five consecutive three-pointers in the first half against Duquesne. High School

Luke Fabrizius joins the Flyers from Hersey High School in Arlington Heights, Illinois and following Fabrizius to Dayton will be his highly respected inside and outside game. At 6-foot-9, he has shot-blocking ability and the savvy to hold his own with taller players in the paint, but most scouts gush about his range from beyond the arc. One of the best outside shooters in the Midwest and one of the best-shooting players of his size in the country, Fabrizius was a three-time Daily Herald All-Area selection. Although asked by his high school coach to play more of a post role during his senior year - Fabrizius made 16 less three's from his junior to senior seasons - he is a lanky catch-and-shoot forward known more for his 3-point shot than for his ability to bang down low. 2008-09

On March 9, Marcus Johnson earned a spot on the 2009 Atlantic 10 Honorable Mention team and was named the co-winner of the White Allen MVP award. Johnson scored in double figures 26 times in the 2008-09 campaign and averaged 12.1 points per game. He tied for a game-high 17 points on 7-of-11 shooting from the field against Wofford. Johnson tallied 15 of his team-high 16 points in the first half versus Bethune-Cookman. He sank 8-of-8 free throws with six of them in overtime en route to 16 points against Auburn. He posted 21 points and had five rebounds at Toledo. He scored 12 points and added seven rebounds versus Fordham. He led UD with 17 points at George Washington, including six in the final two minutes of play. Marcus recorded a team-high 16 points, four steals and the game-winning dunk with 1.2 seconds left in regulation at La Salle. He recorded 13 points, three rebounds and five assists on 6-of-10 shooting from the floor against No. 14 Xavier. Marcus led UD with 21 points and eight rebounds on 7-of-14 shooting from the floor against Rhode Island, and finished with 14 points, five rebounds and four assists versus Temple. He led all scorers with 19 points at No. 17/18 Xavier. Johnson led UD with 15 points on 6-of-10 shooting against Richmond in the A-10 Quarterfinals.

2007-08

Johnson put together a solid sophomore campaign, averaging 10.1 points and 5.1 rebounds per game. He had a team-high three double-doubles last year, including a 15-point, 11-rebound performance in UD's 80-55 win over then-sixth-ranked Pitt. From his freshman to his sophomore seasons, Johnson improved his FG% from .420 to .478, his 3-pt. FG% from .311 to .386, and his FT% from .593 to .760. The 6-3 guard scored in double figures 17 times. In the A-10 quarterfinals, Johnson netted career-highs of 26 points and 13 free throws against Xavier. Johnson scored 16 points versus Loyola and against Akron recorded 16 points and seven rebounds. In the Rhode Island game, Johnson finished with 14 points, five rebounds and hit a 3-pointer with 58 seconds left. He finished the regular season with a team-high 17 points and seven rebounds over Saint Joseph's. In the month of March, Johnson averaged 12.6 points, 5.6 rebounds and was 39-of-47 at the free throw line. He capped the year by earning the Uhl Family Endowed Scholarship.

2006-07

Johnson played in the season's first 30 games in 2006-07, and only an ankle injury suffered in the Flyers' A-10 tournament win over Charlotte kept him from making all 31 contests. Johnson earned Dayton's top freshman award, the Thomas Luppe Memorial Award, after averaging 6.6 points and 3.7 rebounds a game. Johnson scored in double figures seven times in 2006-07, including 23 points in his first game as a Flyer, the most by a Dayton player in his debut game. He also had 11 at Temple, 13 (and a game-high eight rebounds) at St. Bonaventure and 14 at No. 1 North Carolina. He had his first career double-double (11 points and 10 rebounds) in the Yale win. In the win over Western Carolina, Johnson scored 13 points. Johnson was one of five Flyers who averaged more than six points a game, and one of six with at least three boards a game. He was tied for second on the team in steals (23).

High School

Johnson was a freshman on the varsity team at St. Vincent-St. Mary's when LeBron James led SVSM to the 2003 Division II state championship. After averaging 5.0 points as a rookie, Johnson moved into the starting lineup and helped his team win three more district titles, advancing to the 2004 and 2005 regional finals and the 2006 state semifinals.

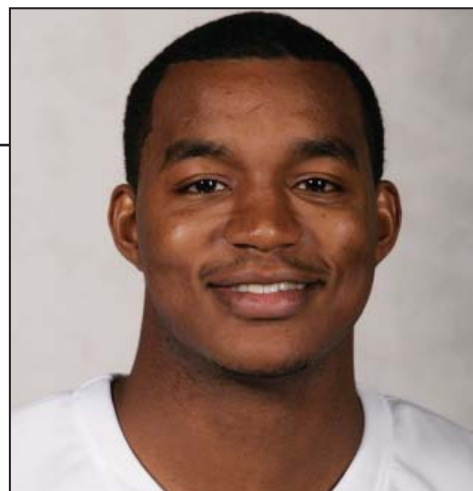

Scored 12 points (6-of-9 FG, four dunks), grabbed eight rebounds and swatted three blocked shots in the win over Fordham at Madison Square Garden. Had 10 points and nine rebounds in just 14 minutes of action at Xavier.

2008-09

Named 2009 Second Team All-Atlantic 10 and co-winner of the White Allen MVP award, Chris Wright led the Flyers to a successful year. Wright is a First Team, NABC All-District, and the MVP of the Chicago Invitational Challenge (after recording three double-doubles). He also earned the Blackburn/McCafferty MVP award the first time Dayton & Xavier met. Wright was team leader in rebounds Chris scored 17 points and hauled in four rebounds in the season opener against Wofford. He recorded a game-high 18 points, seven rebounds and three steals in a win over Delaware State. Wright recorded his first double-double of the season with 16 points and 11 rebounds versus Mercer. He added two more double-doubles with 10 points and 14 rebounds in an overtime win over Auburn, and again with 13 points and 13 rebounds to go with a career-high four assists in a win over No. 15 Marquette. Named the Atlantic 10 co-Player of the Week on November 30, Wright scored 17 of his game-high 19 points in the second half against No. 14 Xavier. He recorded game highs of 17 points and 10 rebounds against Richmond, and scored 17 points on 6-of-10 shooting from the floor at Rhode Island. Chris had 20 points and five rebounds versus Temple. He tallied 10 points, four rebounds and three steals at No. 17/18 Xavier. Wright recorded a double-double with 16 points and 10 rebounds thanks to a career-best eight free throws made versus Marshall. He scored a team-high 19 points to go with nine rebounds, three assists and three blocks versus St. Bonaventure. Chris led all scorers with 16 points and hauled in five rebounds versus Saint Louis. He had his sixth double-double of the year with a career-high 27 points and 10 rebounds versus West Virginia in the NCAA First Round. Chris contributed 10 points, three blocks and nine rebounds in 28 minutes of play against Kansas in the NCAA second round.

2007-08

Wright played in 15 games and led the team in rebounding (5.7), and field goal percentage (.602) and was second in scoring (10.4) and free throw percentage (.804) before breaking his ankle midway through the season. UD was 13-1 before his injury and 9-9 after. After 13 games Wright had four A- 10 Rookie of the Week honors. He first earned the award on Nov. 11 after netting the first double-double in a Flyer freshman debut with 22 points and 13 rebounds against East Tennessee State. Wright earned the honor again on Nov. 25 behind 26 points and 12 rebounds over Toledo. He was the only player A-10 player to have won the award outright four times in 2007-08. After recovering from the fracture, Wright was finally cleared to play in time for the second round of the NIT. He averaged double figures in the tournament. He had nine points, three rebounds and two blocks in 10 minutes of action at Illinois State in the NIT Second Round, and 12 points on 5-of-9 shooting from the field at Ohio State in the quarterfinals.

High School

Wright was the main part of what three respected ranking services - HoopScoop, Rivals.com and Scout.com - call the best group of incoming freshmen in the Atlantic 10 in 2007-08. Ranked as high as the 18th-best prospect in the country, Wright averaged 19.2 points and 12.8 rebounds for Trotwood-Madison High School while earning First Team All-Ohio Division I honors. The Rams were 22-2 and ranked second in the state heading into the OHSAA tournament. Wright was Third Team All-Ohio as a junior after leading Trotwood-Madison to a 22-6 overall record and the state championship game, where they lost to perennial powerhouse and 28-time state champion Canton McKinley. He averaged 17.5 points, 10.1 rebounds, 5.2 assists and 5.2 blocks a game in 2005-06. As a sophomore, he averaged 15.0 points, 9.1 rebounds and 4.2 assists.

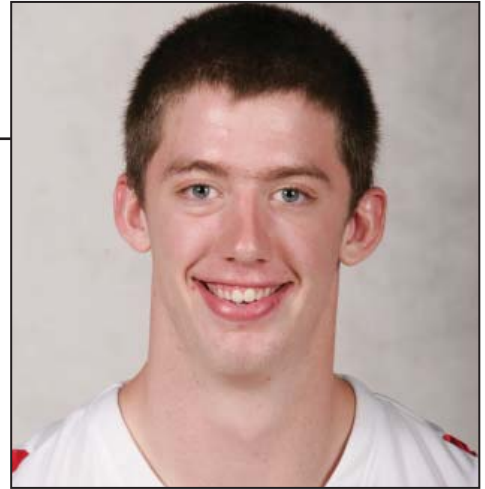

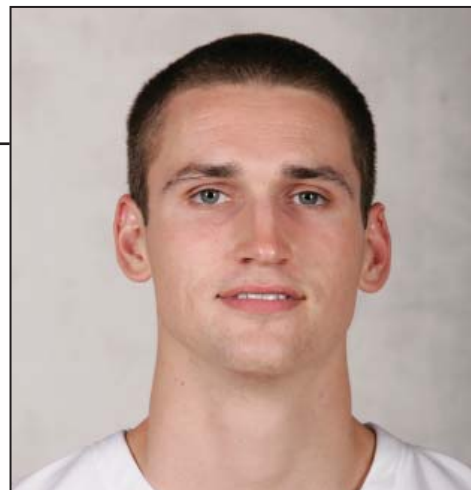

Huelsman had six points, two assists and held Saint Joseph's Ahmad Nivins to 12 points, his lowest scoring output of the season. He recorded five points and five rebounds at Charlotte. Kurt scored eight points and hauled in seven rebounds versus Richmond. At Saint Louis, he recorded four points and seven rebounds, and tallied six points and five rebounds at Rhode Island. He snagged six rebounds versus Richmond in the A-10 Quarterfinals.

2007-08

Huelsman started all 34 games and averaged 5.9 points and 4.0 rebounds per game. He shot .527 from the field and tied for the team lead with 59 offensive rebounds. Huelsman battled against DeJuan Blair, the Big East Conference's Freshman of the Year, by recording 12 points and eight rebounds in UD's win over then No. 6 Pittsburgh. Not to be outdone, he responded with a career-best 18 points against Akron and 10 points on 4-of-5 shooting over Rhode Island. Huelsman scored 14 points on 6-of-9 shooting from the field in the Miami win, came up big again with a team-high seven rebounds and five points in the victory at Louisville and added another career-high with 11 boards over American. At Rhode Island, Huelsman tallied 12 points and six rebounds. Huelsman tallied seven points and five rebounds at GW. Huelsman scored 11 points and limited Bryant Dunston to just one offensive rebound, three under his average in the Fordham win. Huelsman posted 12 points and seven boards against Cleveland State. He capped the season by earning the John L. Macbeth Scholar Athlete Award.

2006-07

Huelsman averaged 3.8 points and 3.5 rebounds, and was second on the team in blocked shots (0.6). He earned UD's Best defender Award for 2006-07. He tied the UD freshman record for blocked shots in a game (and the most in a first game as a Flyer) when he swatted four in the Austin Peay win. Huelsman tied Keith Waleskowski, who had four against George Washington on February 17, 2001 during his redshirt freshman season. Huelsman was the primary defender in holding Pittsburgh's Third Team All-America seven-footer Aaron Gray to just five points. In two games against Gray and North Carolina First Team All-American Tyler Hansbrough, Huelsman had 12 points, seven rebounds, two assists and two blocks.

High School

A four-year varsity starter at St. Henry High School, Huelsman was named First Team Division III All-Ohio and the Northwest Ohio Player of the Year as a senior after averaging 15.9 points, 9.0 rebounds a game. Despite being the only starter back from the 20-3 team from the previous season, Huelsman led

The 6-foot-9 big man is an ESPN Top 150 recruit out of Dunbar High School where he had averages of 18.9 points, 11 rebounds and four blocks per game during his senior year.

After his final season at Dunbar, Benson was named to the AP Ohio Division II First Team and also picked up Southwest District Player of the Year honors. He was rated No. 31 amongst incoming power forwards by ESPN.com while leading Dunbar to its second straight state championship.

He had the luxury of playing for the powerful Dunbar Wolverine program. Dunbar is one of the few schools in Ohio that generally has had an abundance of big men in the program, which meant as a younger player he was challenged by bigger and stronger players in his own program on a daily basis. That situation paid dividends when Benson came through in the 2007 OHSAA Division II championship game. He scored 16 points and was named MVP of the game as Dunbar won its second straight state title.

For the year, he averaged 9.1 points, 6.0 rebounds and 3.0 blocks and was named Third Team All-Ohio.

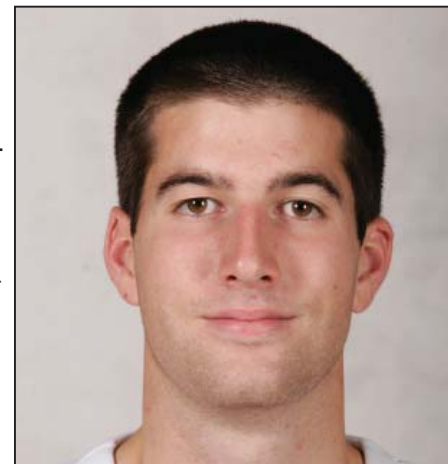
