

# YEAR IN REVIEW





## Flyers Roll In Opener, 38-9, Over Tiffin

DAYTON -- The University of Dayton football team rolled up 313 yards of total offense, including 229 on the ground, en route to a season-opening 38-9 win over Tiffin University at Welcome Stadium. The Flyers have won four straight openers and 21 of their last 22.

Both UD's leaders on the ground were quarterbacks, as senior starter Brandon Staley gained 45 yards on 10 carries with two touchdowns and redshirt sophomore Kevin Hoyng went for 54 yards on nine rushes. In all, 12

Flyers carried the ball on the night.

Staley put the Flyers up 17-0 on a pair of 1-yard touchdown runs, which bookended a career-long 48-yard field goal by Jason Resch in the closing seconds of the first quarter. The Flyers led 24-7 at the half and racked up 14 points more in the third quarter.

Staley's first TD run capped a 6-play, 13-yard scoring drive with 7:18 to play in the first. Following a Tiffin punt, the Flyers were blessed with excellent field position at the Dragons' 31, but a stalled drive of four plays that gained nothing left Resch facing a long field goal with a slight wind at his back. The senior's kick just cleared the crossbar, improving on his previous career-best of 46 yards, which came against the Dragons last season.

Another Staley 1-yard TD run followed by a 1-yard run to the end zone by Matt Mong stretched the Flyers' advantage to 24-0. Mong's TD capped an 11-play, 52-yard drive with 4:09 to play in the half.

Two big plays, one on offense and one on defense, capped the Flyers' scoring for the night. Hoyng, in his first collegiate action after redshirting as a freshman, slipped through the Dragon defense for a dazzling 29-yard TD run with 12:23 left. Just under three minutes later, freshman safety Brandon Cramer scooped up a loose ball off the turf and ran 67 yards to the touchdown. The fumble was one of three on the night for TU, resulting in 14 UD points. Chris Cowan and Mike Neuberger had the other two.

Defensively, senior DB Doug Jones made a game-high 13 tackles (10 solo), while Chris Dearth was in on 11.

## Wrobleski's Career-Night Leads Dayton Past Morehead, 28-0

DAYTON -- No matter who was throwing the ball, Ryan Wrobleski was catching it. The University of Dayton junior wide receiver caught seven passes for 203 yards and a pair of touchdowns, leading the Flyers to a 28-0 win over Morehead State at Welcome Stadium. The No. 2 Flyers, who have now shutout the No. 7 Eagles for 14 consecutive quarters, racked up 572 yards in total offense and held MSU to just 132.

In all, Wrobleski caught three passes from Staley for 117 yards (including a career-long 71-yard reception in the first quarter) and four from Hoyng for 86. He was both three catches and 20 yards from setting two UD single-game records.

For the second consecutive week, Staley and Hoyng alternated drives for the Flyers' at quarterback. Staley finished the game 8-of-15 for 174 yards and a TD. He also rushed three times for 23 yards. Hoyng was 6-of-13 for 116 yards and was UD's leader on the ground with 9 carries for 69 yards and a TD. The Hoyng touchdown on a 20-yard run finally put the Flyers on the board just 1:48 before the half.

Steve Verhoff accounted for UD's other score on a 25-yard TD run with 4:08 in the third quarter. The senior tailback carried the ball a game-high 11 times for 41 yards.

Defensively, junior linebacker Pat Weale came up big with seven tackles and two for a loss. More importantly, he recovered a fumble on MSU's opening kickoff of the second half, helping give UD momentum to score 14 third-quarter points.

## Underdog Flyers Can't Bite Yale Bulldogs

DAYTON -- Brandon Staley's furious game-tying drive in the final seconds came up just short, as did the University of Dayton football team's bid to upset Yale University. The Flyers fell 24-17 in a thriller before an impressive crowd of 6,178 at Welcome Stadium, after leading the Ivy League powerhouse 14-10 at the half.

It appeared the Flyers (2-1) were out of chances as a UD drive ended on its own 26-yard line with 1:46 remaining. Following a timeout on fourth-and-two, a costly illegal formation penalty against UD negated what would have been a first-down run of four yards by Steve Verhoff. Brandon Staley's pass on fourth-and-seven went for just three yards, giving Yale (1-0) excellent field position and a chance to run out the clock with 1:46 to go.

But with the benefit of a solid defensive stand and a pair of timeouts, the Flyers forced the Bulldogs into a fourth-and-three at the 19-yard line with 44 seconds remaining. Instead of attempting a 36-yard field goal to ice the victory, Yale handed the ball to Rob Carr, who was tackled in the backfield by John Hoppe and Casey Klaus.

Now with new life and needing to go 78 yards in 40 seconds, Staley marched the

Flyers downfield by air. He completed a 10-yard pass to Verhoff and then three consecutive completions to Ryan Wrobleski of 18, 11 and 24 yards to set up the game's final play. From the 15-yard line with 12 seconds on the clock, Staley took the snap in shotgun formation and was forced to scramble after the pocket collapsed. Trying to make something out of nothing, the ball squirted loose after Staley pitched it and Yale's Fred Jelks pounced on it as time expired.

For the game, Staley was 11-of-18 passing for 158 yards and a touchdown. Kevin Hoyng completed the only pass he threw, before going down with an injury early in the third quarter. Four Flyers racked up double-digit tackles, led by Doug Jones' 12.

## Field Position Key as Flyers Rout Govs, 40-0

CLARKSVILLE, TN -- In business, the old saying goes "Location, location, location." In football, substitute "field position" for "location" and you get the same meaning. And that's a great place to start in describing Saturday's 40-0 win by the University of Dayton over Austin Peay.

APSU was in Dayton territory once the entire game (late in the second half), while Dayton finished 12 of its 14 possessions in Austin Peay's side of the 50. In fact, just five plays were run from scrimmage in Dayton territory in the second half (all by Dayton), and that included the last three of the game when Dayton got the ball on its own 20 to run out the clock. Austin Peay's average field position for the game was its own 22-yard line, while UD's was its own 47.

The Flyers took the opening kickoff and drove 46 yards to set up the first of four Jason Resch field goals to give UD a 3-0 lead. Resch's four field goals tied the UD record for field goals in a single game.

UD out-gained the Govs 253 to 34 on the ground. Nine Flyers carried the ball, and all had ten yards or more. Six had more than 20 yards and three had more than 30. Warner led with 57 yards on 10 rushes.

The Dayton defense had a tremendous day across the board. APSU tailback Chris Fletcher came into the game averaging 102.7 yards a game, but had no room to operate and was held to just nine net yards on 10 carries. UD's secondary allowed Governor quarterbacks to complete consecutive passes on just two occasions.

Linebacker John Hoppe led the Flyers with five hits. Six more Dayton defenders had three tackles--Brian Kelly, Casey Klaus, Chance Walton, Pat Weale, Mike Neuberger and Chris Cowan.

Cowan joined Resch as a special teams hero. He returned a total of seven punts for 114 yards, and in the third quarter he made certain the Flyers would have a short field to work with. He returned back-to-back punts of 30 and 26 yards to the APSU 25 and 38 respectively.

The win over Austin Peay was Dayton 100th as an NCAA Division I-AA team.

## Doug Jones Plays Key Role as UD Rolls Davidson, 45-27

DAYTON -- The University of Dayton defeated Davidson College 45-27 on a windy afternoon at Welcome Stadium. The Flyers scored a pair of touchdowns just a minute and 22 seconds apart late in the first quarter to gain control of the game. Senior safety Doug Jones scored a special teams touchdown, blocked a PAT and led the Dayton defense with eight hits on the day.

UD gained 500 yards in the game (340 on the ground, 160 in the air), while Davidson had 332 (138 rushing, 194 passing). Staley led a balanced Flyer attack with 77 yards rushing, and 94 yards passing. Staley was seven of 13 through the air, and threw his seven completions to six different receivers.

Dayton had three ballcarriers gain 50 yards or more, and seven with at least 20 yards. Eight different Flyers receivers pulled in the ball, led by Ryan Wrobleski's four catches for 84 yards.

Jones' team-high eight tackles included four solo hits. End Scott Wintering, middle guard Trent Warren and cornerback Casey Klaus all added five tackles. Wintering also had a sack and batted down a pass at the line.

## Big First Half Lifts UD Over Valpo, 38-7

VALPARAISO -- The University of Dayton Flyers used a dominant performance in the first half to propel them to a 38-7 win at Valparaiso. UD led 31-0 at halftime, and out-gained the Crusaders 230 to 23 in the first half in the Pioneer Football League North Division opener for both teams.

The game matched up Dayton, this year's pre-season PFL North favorite, against the defending PFL champion Crusaders. They sparred early in the game, exchanging punts the first two times they had the ball, then the Flyers forced a break. Jack O'Dell punted 36 yards to the VU nine, where Bill Groetsema forced a fumble and Scott Wintering fell on it. Three plays later Marques Warner ran it in from the four.

After another Valpo three-and-out, UD needed just a pass interference penalty and a 32-yard run by Ryan Wroblewski (along with Jason Resch's second PAT of the day) to lead 14-0. Dayton had 82 yards in total offense in the first period, while holding Valparaiso to a negative two yards. Resch opened the second quarter scoring with a 45-yard field goal (matching his career best), and then Warner and Wroblewski each ran for another TD to build the Flyer lead to 31-0 at halftime. Dayton had 218 yards in the first half, while holding the Crusaders to minus four yards.

The Dayton defense was led by senior defensive tackle Chris Dearth. The senior co-captain returned to action after suffering a serious knee injury in the Yale game. The two-week layoff didn't affect his production, as Dearth led UD with six tackles, forced two fumbles, was credited with one QB sack, knocked down a pass at the line and also had three QB pressures. The Flyers came up with four turnovers in the game. The Crusaders were held to just 47 yards rushing, and their QBs completed just nine of 26 passes.

## UD Wins on the Road at Robert Morris, 29-12

CORAPOLIS, PA -- The University of Dayton Flyer football team extended three streaks en route to their 29-12 win at Robert Morris. UD scored for the 318th straight game, won its 12th straight road game, and biggest of all, the win assured the Flyers of their 28th straight winning season. That is the longest such streak in Division I. Only Florida State's similar streak matches UD.

The game looked to be a contest between a great rushing defense (RMU came into the game fourth in NCAA I-AA, allowing 71.5 yards a game) and a great rushing offense (UD was fifth in I-AA, averaging 261.8). In the end, the Flyers won that tug-of-war by gaining 203 yards. In fact, Dayton gained more rushing yards in one drive (76 yards in its second TD drive) than the Colonials allowed per game (71.5) coming into the day.

Jones led the Dayton defense across the board. The senior safety was UD's co-leader in tackles (seven, with corner Casey Klaus), blocked the punt, returned the interception for a touchdown and batted down two more passes. He also had a sack and two quarterback pressures on blitzes.

Offensively, tailback Steve Verhoff was the game's leading ground gainer with 79 yards on 22 carries. He scored Dayton's first TD from eight yards out. Fullback Matt Marshall had 60 yards on just eight carries, including a 17-yard TD. Flyer quarterbacks Brandon Staley and Kevin Hoyng combined to go six-for-twelve for 78 yards, with three of the completions going to wideout Ryan Wroblewski for 55 yards.

## UD Pounds Butler, 49-10

DAYTON -- The University of Dayton football team recovered from a rocky first-quarter start to rout Butler University, 49-10, in a Pioneer Football League game at Welcome Stadium. Dayton wideout Ryan Wroblewski caught six passes for 118 yards and a touchdown while 14 different Flyers racked up 345 yards on the ground.

On the day, Dayton gained 345 yards rushing on 64 carries while holding Butler to just 52 on 36 attempts. The Flyers owned a 492-154 edge in total offense, holding Butler to 3.0 yards per play.

Steve Verhoff finished with 84 yards rushing on 16 carries, most coming in the first two drives for the Flyers. Staley finished with 48 while Mong added 49. Godsey (38), Hoyng (37) and Watson (34) also finished above 30-yards for UD.

Both UD's regular quarterbacks, Hoyng and Staley, were four-of-five passing with a touchdown. Staley totaled 88 yards through the air while Hoyng passed for 59.

## Drake Upsets Dayton on Senior Day, 13-6

DAYTON -- No. 1-ranked Dayton came up just two yards short on Senior Day as the Flyers lost to visiting Drake, 13-6 in front of 5,138 fans at windy Welcome Stadium. After Drake dominated the first half, Dayton made an inspired effort at a comeback setting up the game-ending drive that ended two yards short of tying the game.

With the victory, Drake clinched the Pioneer Football League North Division Championship and a berth in the PFL Championship Game on Nov. 20 at Morehead State.

Drake won the game in the trenches as the Bulldogs out gained the Flyers 197 to 134. The visitors were also efficient on third and fourth down as Drake was 6-of-16 on third-down conversions and 2-of-3 on fourth down conversions.

The Flyers were led offensively by Staley as the junior quarterback completed 8-of-17 passes for 124 yards to go along with a team-high 36 yards rushing. His counterpart, sophomore Kevin Hoyng matched Staley with 36 yards rushing, but was just 1-of-7 passing for 10 yards. Classmate Jack O'Dell contributed on both offense and special teams with two receptions for 40 yards and 10 punts for 326 yards, including a 54 yard kick.

Defensively, senior safety Doug Jones had a big day for the Flyer defense with 10 tackles and an interception. Jones was followed by junior linebackers Pat Weale with nine tackles and John Hoppe with eight stops.

Center Robby Schwab was honored at halftime as the 2004 winner of the Lt. Andy Zulli Award, a character-driven award that is among the most prestigious in the program.

## San Diego Beats Dayton In Final Minute

SAN DIEGO -- In a game worthy of one that would decide a championship, the University of Dayton Flyers fell in the 2004 season finale to the University of San Diego Toreros 38-35 in San Diego. UD finished the season 7-3 overall and 2-2 in the Pioneer Football League North. San Diego improves to 6-4, and 3-1 in the PFL with one game remaining. The win lifted the Toreros into second place in the PFL, while Dayton finished third.

The Flyers' three losses were all by a touchdown or less, and all were decided in the red zone in the game's final minute.

UD did not hold a lead until the 9:18 mark in the fourth quarter, when Casey Klaus picked up a fumble and returned it 79 yards and put the Flyers up 35-31. The Dayton defense forced its only three-and-out of the day, giving the ball back to UD with 8:03 left. The Flyers took 5:21 off the clock, but turned the ball over on downs at the USD 29-yard line with 2:42 left in the game.

The Toreros drove 71 yards on seven plays for the game-winning score by running back Evan Harney on and fourth-and-goal from the one-yard line. Harney had scored earlier in the game by jumping over the pile, and this time the Flyers were ready. Linebacker John Hoppe got to Harney at the top of his jump, but when Harney came back down, he landed on both feet and was able to twist and just get into the end zone with 35 seconds left.

Jack O'Dell gave the Flyers a chance with a 51-yard kickoff return, and Brandon Staley moved the chains with an 11-yard pass to Ryan Wroblewski. But after stopping the clock by spiking it,

Staley's pass under a heavy rush was picked off with 12 seconds left.

The two teams combined for 953 yards, and that does not include the 79-yard fumble return by Klaus. USD had 520 yards and averaged 6.2 yards per play, while Dayton had 433, and averaged 6.7 yards a play.

Individually, the star on the UD side of the ball was senior safety Doug Jones. Jones had a career-high 19 tackles, forced three fumbles (including the one resulting in the go-ahead fourth-quarter TD), had two tackles in the backfield and broke up two passes. Quarterback Kevin Hoyng completed his first ten passes and was 12-of-15 for the game. He had 193 yards, one touchdown and threw one interception.

Wroblewski had six receptions for 119 yards and a TD. O'Dell had four catches for 65 yards, and he also punted five times for a 43.0 yard average, and returned six kickoffs for 170 yards.
