**DUKES AND TRIBE:** This is the first meeting between Duquesne and William & Mary.

**NEC IN THE FCS PLAYOFFS:** This is the sixth season that the Northeast Conference has received an automatic bid to the NCAA FCS Playoffs. The NEC is 1-5 all-time and 1-4 in the opening round with Wagner capturing the lone win with a 31-20 victory over Colgate in 2012. Duquesne is the fifth different team to represent the conference with Sacred Heart being the only team to qualify twice (2013, 2014).

**LAST WEEK FOR DU:** Duquesne improved to 8-3 overall and 5-1 in Northeast Conference play with a 30-20 NEC title-clinching victory over Saint Francis on Senior Day. Rafiq Douglas led the Dukes with 165 yards rushing on 28 carries (5.9 ypc) and three touchdowns. Chris King became the University's all-time leader in career receptions with 163 as he hauled in seven catches for 95 yards. Wayne Capers had four receptions for 104 yards, including a 62-yard scoring grab with 30 seconds remaining in the first half.

**ABOUT WILLIAM & MARY:** The 13th-ranked Tribe are 8-3 and were tri-champs of the Colonial Athletic Association with a 6-2 record. Under the 36th-year direction of Jimmie Laycock, W&M is making its 10th NCAA Playoff appearance and first since 2010. The Tribe are led by seven First Team All-CAA honorees, including Co-Defensive Player of the Year, senior defensive back DeAndre Houston-Carson and Special Teams Player of the Year, sophomore RS/WR DeVonte Dedmon. Last week, William & Mary lost to league champion Richmond, 20-9.

**SCHMITT AN FCS COTY FINALIST:** Head coach Jerry Schmitt was recently named one of 15 finalists for the STATS FCS Coach of the Year award. Schmitt, who has a 96-71 career record as a head coach and a 68-50 mark at Duquesne, has taken a 2014 team that went 6-6 overall and 2-4 in NEC play to the FCS Play-offs for the first time in University history this season. The Dukes had previously tied for the NEC regular season title in 2011 and 2013, but lost the tiebreaker for the play-off bid.

**NATIONALLY RANKED:** Duquesne is listed among the FCS top 20 in several team statistical categories. Among those are being 5th in the nation in red zone defense (.630), 7th in scoring defense (16.3 ppg), 7th in turnover margin (1.00), 11th in red zone offense (.875), 12th in sacks (2.91), and 19th in third down defense (.329). All of these rank first or second in the NEC. Individually, the Dukes have several players ranked among the top 20 nationally as well, including Christian Kuntz who is 3rd in tackles for loss with 2.1 per game and 18th in sacks per game with 0.73. Austin Crimmins is 13th in field goals per game with 1.27 and Rafiq Douglas is 20th in rushing touchdowns with 11.

**CLIMBING THE RECORD BOOKS:** Juniors Austin Crimmins and Dillon Buechel as well as senior Chris King have recently climbed their ways onto Duquesne's all-time career leaders list. Crimmins has sole possession of the top spot in career field goals made with 42. The placekicker was good on a Duquesne single season record 15 as a freshman, had 13 last year and currently has 14 this season as well. He is also second all-time in career points by a kicker with 217 and tied for fourth in career PAT's with 91. Buechel is second all-time in completions with 560 and second in attempts with 964. He is also third in career pass completion percentage at .581, third in yards at 7,042 (just 271 yards out of second) and fifth in career touchdowns with 46 which is one shy of fourth place. With his seven receptions versus Saint Francis, King became Duquesne's all-time leader in career receptions with 163. He is also sixth in career touchdown receptions with 23, needing two more to tie for fifth place.

**SUCCESSIVE STARTS:** Senior nose tackle Zach Zidian is scheduled to make his team-leading 45th consecutive start today. After coming off the bench in his collegiate debut, he has started every game since then. He is followed by senior linebacker Sam Martello with 36 straight starts and junior offensive lineman Larson Graham with 34. Senior offensive lineman Dan Buchholz, senior defensive lineman Dane O'Driscoll and sophomore linebacker Nathan Stone all have 23 consecutive starts, all 12 games last year and the first 11 of this season.

**ABOUT DUQUESNE:** Last year, DU finished 6-6 overall and finished fifth in the Northeast Conference with a 2-4 record. Duquesne returns 14 position starters from last year's team, seven on offense and seven on defense. This is Duquesne's eighth season as a scholarship-granting football program. With the move to the NEC, Duquesne offered 18 scholarships in February of 2008. That number has increased to 37. Duquesne granted only need-based financial aid for football playing student-athletes as a member of the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference Football League from 1994 through 2007. The NEC competed as a non-scholarship member of the NCAA Football Championship Subdivision until 2006 when the conference adopted an athletics-based aid model. This is the sixth season the NEC regular season champion will be an automatic qualifier for the Division I Football Championship.

**MORE ON DUQUESNE:** The Dukes were predicted to finish second in the seven-team Northeast Conference in 2015 ... senior wide receiver Chris King was named a STATS FCS Pre-season Second Team All-American ... Duquesne had five players named to the NEC Pre-Season All-Conference team in junior defensive back Trenton Coles, senior wide receiver Chris King, senior linebacker Sam Martello, sophomore linebacker Nathan Stone and senior defensive lineman Zach Zidian ... junior quarterback Dillon Buechel, who missed most of the second part of last season due to injury, is looking to rebound to his record-setting freshman year after throwing for 14 touchdown passes in each of the last two seasons.

**NATIONAL EXPOSURE:** Duquesne is slated to play twice on ESPN3 this season. Thanks to the Northeast Conference's television package, Duquesne's game at Bryant on Oct. 17 was aired on the trey as will its season finale on Nov. 21 as the Dukes host Saint Francis at Rooney Field. Neither of these games will be available on NECFrontRow.com.

**CAPTAINS:** Duquesne's captains for the 2015 season are senior OL Dan Buchholz (Malvern Pa./Great Valley), junior QB Dillon Buechel (McKees Rocks, Pa./Montour), senior WR Chris King (Crofton, Md. DeMatha Catholic), junior linebacker Christian Kuntz (Pittsburgh, Pa./Chartiers Valley), senior linebacker Sam Martello (Westlake, Ohio/St. Edward) and senior DL Zach Zidian (Youngstown, Ohio/Boardman).

**FBS INFLUENCE:** Six players who were previously on FBS rosters are on the Duquesne roster in 2015, including four who saw FBS playing time during their careers and were on the Dukes' opening day 2-deep: senior WR Wayne Capers, Jr. (Arizona), junior DB Trenton Coles (Pittsburgh), senior WR Dominique Terrell (Virginia) and senior ILB Armstead Williams (Purdue) had all played in a FBS game prior to coming to Duquesne. Redshirt sophomore Matt Barone OL (Temple) and redshirt sophomore LB Carter Henderson (Penn State) were also previously on FBS rosters.

**QUICK START WHEN IT COUNTS:** Duquesne's football team, which joined the Northeast Conference in 2008, is 7-1 in NEC openers. The Dukes won its initial NEC game at home versus Saint Francis, 21-7 in 2008 before falling at Monmouth in year two, 17-10. Since then, DU has won its last six NEC openers dating back to its 2010, 28-17 win over Albany.

## 2015 DUKES TO WATCH

### QB • DILLON BUECHEL, Jr. (6-4, 196)

Threw for 2015 yards and 14 touchdowns in 2015 despite playing in just parts of 8 games due to injury ... tossed for over 300 yards in 5 of the first 6 games along with all 14 TD's before getting hurt ... put together the top freshman season by a Duquesne quarterback in 2013, setting school records for passes completed (217) and attempted (373) in throwing for the sixth-highest yardage total in school history (2,569) ... completed 58.2 percent of his passes for 14 TDs ... was named second team All-NEC in 2014 ... was one of 20 players named to the initial Jerry Rice Award Watch List ... earned NEC Rookie of the Week three times ... ranked 23rd nationally - and second among freshmen - in passing yards per game (233.5).

### WR • CHRIS KING, Sr. (6-1, 200)

Was named a 2015 STATS FCS Pre-Season Second Team All-American ... also tabbed a 2015 Northeast Conference Pre-Season All-Conference choice ... was first in the NEC and 7th in the nation in 2014 with 102.5 receiving yards per game ... was also second in the conference and 16th nationally in receiving touchdowns with 14 ... finished first in the league and 15th in NCAA FCS in receiving yards with 1,127 ... had the fourth longest touchdown reception in DU history with an 88-yarder at Youngstown State while gaining a season-high 199 yards ... hauled in three TD's at CCSU ... made SportCenter's Top 10 plays for his acrobatic catch in the back of the end zone at Buffalo ... named a Sports Network All-American ... was named CPFA FCS Wide Receiver of the Week after week one ... was named First Team All-NEC.

### LB • CHRISTIAN KUNTZ, Jr. (6-1, 220)

Kuntz, who led the nation in tackles for loss (1.8/g.) in 2013 in becoming just the fifth Duquesne player to be named All-American (Third Team) by The Sports Network, suffered an off-the-field knee injury in the spring of 2014 and missed the season ... Kuntz, the first sophomore in school history to earn All-American honors from any affiliate, was the only Duke named First Team All-NEC in 2013 ... the two-time NEC Defensive Player of the Week tied for the team lead with 74 tackles (32 solo) and led the Dukes in tackles for loss (19.5) and sacks (9.0) ... he also tied for a team-high with two fumbles forced.

### NT • ZACH ZIDIAN, Sr. (6-1, 328)

First Team All-NEC pick was the primary reason linebackers ranked first and second in total tackles in 2014 ... was fourth himself in stops with a career-high 61 (31 solo), including seven tackles for a loss of 14 yards, a sack, two pass-breakups and a blocked kick ... had a career-high 10 tackles (6 solo) at Wagner ... also posted 8 stops at St. Francis ... enters his senior season with a team-best streak of 33 consecutive starts ... 2015 Pre-Season All-Conference choice.

## QUICK HITS

**SURPASSING A LEGEND:** In 2013, head coach Jerry Schmitt surpassed the legendary Elmer Layden on Duquesne's all-time coaching victories list. Layden - one of Notre Dame's famed "Four Horsemen" - coached at Duquesne for seven seasons from 1927-33. It was under Layden that the Dukes first became recognized as a national football power. After leading DU to a 10-1-0 record and an appearance in the 1934 Festival of Palms Bowl, Layden left Duquesne to take over head coaching duties at Notre Dame. Duquesne's all-time wins leader is Greg Gattuso, who preceded Schmitt at DU.

Gattuso, who led the Dukes to eight Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference Football League titles and a I-AA Mid-Major National Championship in 2003, is currently the head coach at Albany.

## DU'S EIGHTH SEASON

**IN THE NEC:** Duquesne, a member of the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference Football League from 1994 to 2007, is beginning its eighth season as an associate member of the Northeast Conference Football League. With the move to the NEC, Duquesne offered 18 scholarships beginning in February of 2008. That number currently rests at 36. Duquesne granted only need-based financial aid for football playing student-athletes as a member of the MAAC. The NEC competed as a non-scholarship member of the NCAA Football Championship Subdivision until 2006 when the conference adopted an athletics-based aid model. Duquesne started its program in 1902 and competed at the highest level - winning a pair of New Year's Day Bowl games (1934 Festival of Palms and 1937 Orange) - before disbanding following the 1950 season. DU returned at the Club level prior to the 1969 season and won a National Club Championship in 1973. The Dukes competed at the NCAA Division III level from 1979-92 before moving up to the non-scholarship Football Championship Subdivision in 1993. The NEC Football League, which was established in 1996, includes full-time conference members Bryant University, Central Connecticut State University, Robert Morris University, Sacred Heart University, Saint Francis (Pa.) University and Wagner College along with associate member Duquesne University.

## IN NON-CONFERENCE PLAY:

Duquesne is 29-21 in non-conference games under 11th-year head coach Jerry Schmitt with wins over Dayton (four times), Robert Morris (three times prior to joining the NEC), Bucknell (three), Monmouth (twice) and Fordham (twice). At home, the Dukes are 19-2 in non-league play under Schmitt, while on the road Schmitt's Dukes have fashioned an 8-19 mark. DU snapped a seven-game skid in non-conference road games with a 22-13 win at Dayton on Sept. 3, 2011. The win snapped Dayton's FCS-best win streak at 10. DU went 3-2 in non-conference games in 2013 and finished 4-2 last year.

## DUQUESNE'S NEC PROGRESSION

The 2011 NEC co-champion Dukes were the first to benefit from four classes of scholarship players. Duquesne, which added a second NEC co-title in 2013, offered 18 scholarships in conjunction to its move to the NEC in 2008. DU is currently up to 36 scholarships.

**2015 AWARDS:** In addition to the 2015 NEC Pre-season All-Conference accolades listed to the right, senior wide receiver **Chris King** was also named a 2015 STATS FCS Preseason Second Team All-American. The 2014 Sports Network Third Team All-American and NEC First Team All-Conference honoree led the NEC and was 7th in the country in receiving yards per game with 102.5. He also led the Dukes last season with 14 touchdown receptions. Freshman running back **P.J. Fulmore** was named the NEC Rookie of the Week on Sept. 14. He led the Dukes in rushing for a second straight week in a 26-7 victory at Bucknell, carrying the ball 11 times for 87 yards (7.9 ypc) and rushing for four first downs. On Oct. 5, senior running back **Klartel Claridy** was named the NEC Offensive Player of the Week. This accolade came after a career-best 123-yard outing with two first quarter touchdowns in a 27-10 win over CCSU. Following the Oct. 24, 16-7 victory over Robert Morris, the Dukes had two NEC Player of the Week honorees. Sophomore running back **Rafiq Douglas** was named the NEC Offensive Player of the Week. He posted career highs of 32 carries, 172 yards, four receptions and 31 receiving yards in the win. In addition, junior placekicker **Austin Crimmins** was named the NEC Co-Special Teams Player of the Week. He accounted for 10 of DU's 16 points in the win by making field goals of 29, 45 and 44 yards to go with an extra point. He also forced four touchbacks on five kick-offs. On Nov. 2, two more Dukes earned NEC accolades as **Douglas** was once again honored as Offensive POW and senior nose tackle **Zach Zidian** was tabbed Defensive POW. Douglas rushed 24 times for a new career high of 191 yards and scored a career-best three touchdowns. Zidian, who was also named Stats LLC Defensive Player of the Week Honorable Mention, had a career-high 14 tackles (11 solo) as well as a sack of eight yards and a fumble recovery. On Nov. 9, DU made it three straight weeks with two NEC awards as **Dillon Buechel** was named the league's Offensive Player of the Week and **Christian Kuntz** was tabbed the conference Defensive Player of the Week. Buechel was 22-37 for 320 yards with two touchdowns and no interceptions in a 41-14 win at Sacred Heart while Kuntz logged a game-high nine tackles (5 solo) and picked off an SHU screen pass and returned it nine yards for a touchdown. On Nov. 23 **Douglas** received his third NEC Offensive POW award and **Kuntz** tallied his second straight NEC Defensive POW honor. Douglas, who was also tabbed the STATS FCS National Offensive Player of the Week, rushed for 165 yards and three touchdowns in the NEC title clinching 30-20 victory over Saint Francis. Kuntz registered six tackles (5 solo), two sacks and 2.5 tackles for a loss of 17 yards, giving him 23 TFL's for the season, second best in the country.

**NEW KIDS ON THE BLUFF:** In addition to the 17 incoming freshmen, Duquesne added Virginia transfer Dominique Terrell and Penn State transfer Carter Henderson to its roster for the 2015 season. Terrell is a fifth year wide receiver who will also be a part of DU's return game. He played in 37 games for Virginia from 2011-13 before redshirting in 2014. Henderson, a redshirt sophomore linebacker and 2013 graduate of Franklin Regional High School, was on the Penn State roster for two seasons, but did not see any game action.

**NEW FACES ON THE SIDELINE:** Head coach Jerry Schmitt added two new staff members for 2015, both of which have previous ties to the program. Terry Russell ('75), who has been affiliated with Duquesne football for over 30 years as a player, assistant and head coach, returns to the DU sidelines in 2015. Russell, who had been away from the program for six-years prior to re-joining Jerry Schmitt's staff, will coach the running backs this year. Russell, who was an integral part of DU's 1973 Club Championship team, played for the Dukes from 1971-74. He also served as Duquesne's head coach from 1984-87 - taking the reins for Dan McCann who was on a medical leave of absence. This is Russell's 24th season as an assistant at Duquesne. Khiry Carter ('11) makes his collegiate coaching debut as a defensive backs coach for his alma mater. Carter, who played for the Dukes as a defensive back from 2008-2011, brings a wealth of DB experience and knowledge to the Red and Blue in 2015. Carter played in 42 career games for the Dukes, making 27 starts. He accumulated 168 tackles (93 solo) and had three interceptions and nine pass break-ups.

### HOME SWEET HOME

Duquesne is 93-26-0 all time at Rooney Field including winning streaks of 16, 14 and 10 games (twice). Duquesne owns non-conference home wins over Dayton (four times), Bucknell (three times), Lafayette (twice), Albany, VMI, Monmouth, Butler, Morehead State and Fordham among others over the past 15 seasons. DU is 36-11 in non-conference home games (18-2 under Jerry Schmitt) on Rooney Field.

# JERRY SCHMITT \* HEAD COACH \* 11TH YEAR



Jerry Schmitt, who played an important role in the development of the Duquesne football program as an assistant from 1985-87 and again from 1992-99, is in his 11th season as head coach of the Dukes.

The Pittsburgh native, who returned to the DU campus after spending five years as head coach at his alma mater, Westminster College, in New Wilmington, Pa., has overseen the program's move to the Northeast Conference and ensuing adoption of athletics-based aid in February of 2008.

It is a transition that has been an overwhelming success, as over the past five seasons, Schmitt's Dukes have won more overall games (34) and as many conference games (21) as any NEC school. In addition, DU - which has shared two of the past four NEC titles - is one of only two league schools with three winning seasons in the past five years.

Schmitt wasted no time putting his mark on the program by leading the Dukes to three consecutive Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference Football League championships and earning MAAC Coach of the Year two times in his first three seasons as head coach.

In 2011, Schmitt continued Duquesne's transition as a scholarship-granting associate member of the Northeast Conference by guiding the Dukes to a 9-2 record and NEC co-Championship with a 7-1 record.

The 2011 co-title was part of a gradual progression for the Dukes who finished the 2010 season with a 7-4 record and third place league finish with a 5-3 mark.

In 2013, Duquesne once again earned a share of the title - this time tying with Sacred Heart. The 2014 season saw the Dukes finish 6-6 overall.

Under Schmitt, the Dukes have fashioned a 21-15 record in NEC play over the past five seasons after posting a 4-11 mark in their first two years while integrating a scholarship model.

In Schmitt's first season, the Dukes posted a 7-3 record (4-0 in the MAAC) - against the most challenging I-AA mid-major schedule a Duquesne team ever faced - and finished with a No. 3 national ranking in The Sports Network I-AA Mid-Major Top 10. The 2005 Dukes finished ranked No. 1 nationally in I-AA total defense, rushing defense and pass efficiency defense.

In year two, Schmitt again led DU to a 7-3 record (3-1 in the MAAC) and eighth consecutive MAAC championship as the Dukes finished ranked sixth in The Sports Network I-AA Mid-Major Top 10. The 2006 Dukes ranked second nationally in passing offense and 15th in total offense.

In 2007, Duquesne won a share of its ninth consecutive MAAC title in posting a 6-4 overall record. Five years ago the Dukes, in their first season as a scholarship program since the 1950s, went 3-7 in the school's inaugural season in the NEC and followed that with a 3-8 record in 2009.

In 2010, with DU's first scholarship class comprising a good portion of the sophomore and junior classes, the Dukes broke through with their third place NEC finish.

Winning titles at Duquesne is nothing new to Schmitt, who helped the Dukes to their first three MAAC championships in 1995, 1996 & 1999 and the school's first Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) Bowl game in 1996, during his 11 years as an assistant.

The Pittsburgh native, who served under three different head coaches in Terry Russell (1985-87), Dan McCann (1992) and Greg Gattuso (1993-99), was the offensive coordinator for his last seven seasons at DU, during which time the Dukes posted a 53-21 record, won three titles and saw 16 different offensive players named First Team All-MAAC. He was promoted to assistant head coach by Gattuso prior to the 1994 season. Schmitt accepted the head coaching position at Westminster in March of 2000.

While at Westminster, Schmitt posted a 28-21 record in overseeing the Titans' transition from NCAA Division II to the Division III level. He led Westminster to an 8-2 mark including a 5-0 record against teams from the Presidents' Athletic Conference (PAC) in 2000. After a rebuilding campaign in 2001, Westminster continued to make strides under Schmitt's leadership in 2002, as the Titans finished 6-4 overall (4-1 in league play) and placed second in their first season of eligibility for the PAC title. In 2003, Westminster overcame a challenging non-conference schedule against scholarship teams to contend for the conference title in the final week of the season. In 2004, the Titans rallied from an 0-2 start to post wins in five of their last eight games.

Schmitt's offenses set five single-game records and produced four of the seven 1,000-yard rushers in school history. Forty-four of his players earned All-Conference honors in the three years his players were eligible for post-season recognition.

Prior to his first stop at Duquesne, Schmitt established himself at the high school level in western Pennsylvania where he served as head coach at South Fayette High School (1990-91), offensive and defensive line coach at Bethel Park High School (1989), offensive and defensive line coach at Avonworth High School (1988) and offensive and defensive line coach and junior varsity head coach at West Allegheny High School (1983-84).

In addition to his football coaching background, Schmitt served as head girls basketball coach at Beaver Area High School from 1987-99 and has also served as head track & field coach at West Allegheny High School (1984) and Weirton (W.Va.) Madonna High School (1983). Prior to returning to Westminster, Schmitt worked full time as a teacher in the Beaver Area school district from 1987-99.

A 1983 Westminster graduate, Schmitt was a three-year letterman and two-year starter on the offensive line under head coach Joe Fusco, leading the Titans to an undefeated regular season as a senior in 1981.

Schmitt, who graduated from Pittsburgh's Keystone Oaks High School in 1978 and his wife, Paula, who earned her master's degree at Duquesne, reside in Cranberry Township with their son Matthew Jake.

On KCU's next possession, blitzing cornerback Trenton Coles sacked Knights' starter Graham Johnston, forcing a fumble that was scooped up by defensive lineman Dane O'Driscoll and taken 59 yards for a score that made it 14-0.

Rafiq Douglas capped an 81-yard drive with a 3-yard run to make it 21-0 after one quarter.

Austin Crimmins ended an 11-play drive with a 19-yard field goal to make it 24-0 with 10:46 left. DeNardo followed with 1-yard run before Claridy added a 43-yard run that closed out the first half scoring.

Duquesne, which substituted liberally in the second half, got a 24-yard field goal from freshman Cory Griffith in the third quarter and a 40-yard run from DeNardo in the fourth to close out the scoring.

KCU broke up the shutout on a 56-yard TD pass with 9:10 left.

The Dukes, who went 5-of-5 in the red zone, finished with a 27-15 advantage in first downs.

Seven Duquesne players contributed to 8.0 tackles for losses totaling 44 yards. Redshirt junior Christian Kuntz, who missed last season with a knee injury, led the Dukes with 2.0 TFLs. Kuntz led the nation in tackles for loss in his last full season - 2013.

Duquesne scored on its first possession of the game and never looked back in defeating Bucknell, 26-7 for its first win in eight attempts in Lewisburg, Pa. Dillon Buechel threw short touchdown passes to three different receivers and Sam Martello made a career-high 15 tackles (10 solo).

Duquesne got a career-high 123 yards rushing and two touchdowns from senior Klartel Claridy as well as a career-high 83 yards rushing and a score from sophomore Rafiq Douglas in winning its Northeast Conference opener, 27-10 over visiting Central Connecticut State Saturday afternoon on Rooney Field.

The Dukes, who posted 524 yards of total offense, improved to 3-2 (2-1 NEC) in winning its sixth straight NEC opener, improving to 7-1 all-time. CCSU fell to 1-4 (0-1).

After three combined scoreless drives to open the game, the Dukes lit the scoreboard first as Claridy ran it in from two yards out, capping an 11-play, 54-yard drive to give DU a 7-0 lead at the 5:25 mark of the first quarter.

Following a Blue Devils fumble on their next possession, Claridy found paydirt again, this time from the one yard line to give Duquesne a 14-0 advantage with 4:17 left in the first.

CCSU narrowed its deficit to 14-10 at halftime though on a 58-yard touchdown pass from Jacob Dolegala to Courtney Rush near the end of the first quarter and a 19-yard field goal by Ed Groth with 1:44 remaining in the first half.

Duquesne opened the second half scoring as Douglas scored on a four yard rush to make it 21-10 at the 10:32 mark of the third quarter. DU kicker Austin Crimmins scored the final six points of the game on a 30-yard, third quarter field goal and a 23-yard, fourth quarter field goal.

Dillon Buechel threw for a season-high 323 yards on 23-38 passing while Chris King posted his second straight 100-plus yard game with 132 yards on eight catches.

Defensively, Trenton Coles hauled in two interceptions, Christian Kuntz had a sack for a loss of eight yards as well as a fumble recovery and Troy Gethers and Andy Struttman each had forced fumbles. Duquesne (4-2) posted 304 yards of first half offense in jumping to a 23-6 halftime lead and a 53-18 victory over visiting Alderson Broaddus (5-1) Saturday afternoon at Rooney Field for Homecoming. It was DU's fifth straight Homecoming victory.

DU made it 28-0 with 11:13 left in the first half as Rafiq Douglas ran it in from 13 yards out, capping a six-play, 88-yard drive.

Sacred Heart got on the scoreboard at the 6:12 mark of the second quarter as R.J. Noel hit Andrew O'Neill from 15 yards out to make it Duquesne 28, Sacred Heart 7.

After being perfect on four point after touchdown attempts, kicker Austin Crimmins connected on a 32-yard field goal with 2:17 on the clock to end the first half scoring.

Sacred Heart opened the second half by driving 71 yards to the Duquesne three yard line, but the DU defense once again held its ground in the red zone, forcing the Pioneers to turn it over on downs.

King finished the day with nine catches for 111 yards and a score while Capers had six grabs for a career-high 144 yards. Douglas led the Dukes on the ground with 17 rushes for 82 yards and a touchdown.

The Duquesne football team (8-3, 5-1) won its first ever outright Northeast Conference title and earned the league's automatic bid to the NCAA FCS Championship with a 30-20 win over visiting Saint Francis Saturday on Rooney Field. It will be Duquesne's first trip to the play-offs.

The Dukes trailed visiting Saint Francis 14-0 early in the game, but scored the final 16 points of the first half and outscored the Red Flash, 14-6 in the second half.

The Dukes will find out their Nov. 28 opponent Sunday morning as the NCAA releases the bracket at 11:00 am on ESPNU.

Rafiq Douglas rushed for 153 yards and three touchdowns to pace the Duquesne offense. It was his second three touchdown performance in the past three games, giving him 11 scores on the season. He was assisted by receivers Wayne Capers (4-104-1 TD) and Chris King (7-95-0).

Defensively, Abner Roberts led the Dukes with eight tackles (6 solo), an interception with a 19 yard return and a pass break-up. Christian Kuntz added six tackles (5 solo), including two sacks for a loss of 13 yards and 2.5 tackles for a loss of 17 yards, giving him 23 TFL's for the season. Josh Jordan and Xavier Nelson also intercepted passes.

After forcing Duquesne to punt on the game's opening possession, Saint Francis scored first as Zack Drayer hit Daniel Adams with a 24-yard pass and a 7-0 lead less than four minutes into the game.

The Red Flash made it 14-0 with 3:12 remaining in the first quarter as Drayer hit Terrell Smith from 14 yards out.

Rafiq Douglas put the Dukes on the board with 14:01 ticking in the second quarter as he ran it in from the two yard line, making it Saint Francis 14, Duquesne 7.

The DU defense prevented SFU from making it a two touchdown lead again as Josh Jordan intercepted a pass in the end zone with 10:02 to go in the half.

The Red and Blue then cut the deficit to 14-10 with an Austin Crimmins 25-yard field with 1:54 left in the half. On the ensuing SFU possession, DU forced a punt while using two timeouts to get the ball back with 39 seconds remaining in the half.

Quarterback Dillon Buechel then went deep to Wayne Capers for a 62-yard touchdown strike with 30 seconds left, giving DU a 16-14 halftime lead after a missed point after attempt.

In the third quarter, the Dukes picked up where they left off in the first half, keeping the Red Flash off the scoreboard and extending their lead to 23-14 as Douglas found paydirt again, this time from three yards out to make it 23-14 with 45 seconds remaining in the third quarter. The 16-play, 98 yard drive was highlighted by a 44 yard pass from Buechel to King on third and 20 from their own 26.

Duquesne opened the fourth quarter scoring as well as Douglas scored his third touchdown of the game, running it in from the six yard line to make it 30-14 with 10:53 remaining in the game.

Saint Francis answered quickly though, as Drayer ran it in from the one-yard line to make the score 30-20. The play was set up by a 53-yard pass from Drayer to Adams to the Duquesne one yard line. Armstead Williams sacked Drayer on the two-point conversion attempt to keep the score, Duquesne 30, Saint Francis 20 with 10:02 to go in the game.

The final five drives of the game for both teams were fruitless as Duquesne punted it away with 6:32 left, Roberts intercepted a Drayer pass with 6:13 remaining, Luke Weiss recovered a Duquesne fumble with 3:45 to go and Nelson picked off a Drayer pass with 1:35 remaining before Buechel took three consecutive knees to seal the victory.
