## Dogs Heading Back to the Road, Idaho Bound

Fresno State returns to the road to begin a two-game WAC road trip at Idaho. The game has been moved to 7:30 p.m. PT to accommodate a national television broadcast on ESPNU. The Dogs are 2-2 on the road this season and have won the last two, at Hawaii and at New Mexico State. Idaho has not lost at home this season (4-0). After a 1-3 start to the season, the Bulldogs have won four straight games and are within one victory of becoming bowl eligible, which would be the 10th time in the last 11 seasons, most in school history.

## About Idaho

Second-year head coach Robb Akey has the Vandals playing well and have been the WAC's most improved team and biggest surprise. At 7-2, Idaho is off to its best start since 1994 and they are getting votes in the Top 25 polls. Nathan Enderle is the WAC's top passing quarterback at more than 267 yards per game and he leads a Vandal attack that ranks 17th nationally. He is 10th in the nation in passing efficiency and has thrown 15 touchdowns. Running back DeMaundre Woolridge leads the WAC with 14 touchdowns and he averages 5.3 yards per carry.

## Against the Vandals

The Bulldogs have won six straight games and lead the series 7-4, which began in 1946. Fresno State has won three of five games played in Moscow and have not lost there since 1963. The Vandals won four in a row in the series from 1956-67. As members of the WAC, Fresno State has won all four meetings by an average margin score of 39-16.5.

## Mathews Dominates NCAA in Rushing, Record Books Assault On

Eight games into the 2009 season, Bulldog running back Ryan Mathews continues to prove he's the nation's most exciting and explosive running back. For the fifth straight week he leads the nation in rushing, and not just barely. Mathews, at 164.5 yards per game, has a commanding lead (nearly 28 more yards per game) over No. 2 Darius Marshall of Marshall (136.0). He has two of the NCAA's top 10 rushing performances this season. He's powering a Fresno State ground game that ranks fifth in the NCAA in rushing yards. He moved into third place on the Bulldog career rushing yardage list (see page three for updated list). The most impressive part is that he's done it against good competition. His career-high 234 rushing yards against No. 5 Boise State was amazing considering he alone has accounted for 30% of the entire rushing yards the Broncos have allowed this season (783) through eight games. He extended his school-record streak of consecutive 100-yard games to eight. He's put up these numbers despite not many fourth quarter carries. In the last four games combined, he's only had 15 carries in the final quarter, and didn't play in the fourth in either the Hawaii or New Mexico State games. He had two carries in the fourth against San Jose State.

## Dogs End Brutal Road Trip Stretch

Not many teams in the nation will undertake the travels of the Fresno State football team. Through the first five games, the Dogs completed a journey that saw them play in four different time zones and log close to 15,000 miles. The journey began on Sept. 12 at Wisconsin, followed by a Friday night clash with preseason WAC favorite Boise State in Fresno on Sept. 18. The Dogs then hit the Eastern Time Zone for a game at No. 10 Cincinnati before an even longer road trip to Hawaii. Fresno State has road trips remaining to Moscow, Idaho, Reno and Champaign, Ill. During the 2009 season, Fresno State will play in five of the six United States time zones and travel over 23,000 miles.

## Head Coach Pat Hill

All of the credit for the resurgence of Bulldog football can be traced to head coach Pat Hill. Hill took over a declining program and within three years won a championship and guided his team to a bowl game. More importantly, Hill infused academic integrity to the program.

In Hill's third season, the Bulldogs earned a share of a WAC title, made their first bowl appearance since 1993 and produced a league-best six first-team All-WAC players. In addition, Fresno State led the WAC in academic scholars with 14 and produced the school's first Academic All-American. That was just a start. Since then, Fresno State's NCAA Academic Progress Rate ranks in the top 10 percent of all Division I FBS public schools and is the 8th-highest of all schools in the west.

Under his direction, Fresno State built a new football practice facility that rivals any NFL franchise. One of the most visible signs of improvement has been in the Duncan Building training room, offices and locker room, which was modified providing all student-athletes with a state of the art complex.

Fresno State's has been in bowl games in nine of the last 10 seasons, one of the most consistent bowl participants in the West. He has done it playing one of the most aggressive non-conference schedules in the nation.

Since coming to Fresno State, Hill has continued his reputation as an outstanding recruiter. His first recruiting class produced four NFL draft choices -- including the No. 1 overall pick David Carr -- and four other players who signed NFL free agent contracts. In all, 23 of Hill's players have been drafted into the NFL.

He has the fourth-most wins of any coach in the history of the Western Athletic Conference, and only two WAC coaches -- BYU's LaVell Edwards and Air Force's Fischer DeBerry -- have taken team to more bowls.

## BCS Wins

Fresno State's 14 wins against schools in BCS conferences since the 2000 season rank second behind Utah for most in the nation. Here are few nuggets about Fresno State vs. the BCS.

- *Fresno State has won four of the last six games against teams from BCS conferences (Kansas State, Georgia Tech, Rutgers and UCLA). The loss were to No. 10 Wisconsin 13-10 in 2008 and a double-overtime loss to the Badgers earlier this season.*
- *After losing the first nine games against BCS schools under Hill, Fresno State is 14-15 in the last 29 games against BCS conference schools. Only five of the those games have been played at Bulldog Stadium.*
- *Fresno State is 4-1 against BCS conference teams in bowl games under Hill.*
- *Of the last 14 losses to BCS Conference foes, 10 of those teams were ranked in the Top 25, three in the Top Five (1. USC, 1. Oklahoma, 5. LSU), one Top 10 (10. Wisconsin).*

## Utah State Recap...

•The Bulldogs conducted a second-half shutout for the second straight game. Through eight games, the Bulldog have allowed just 10 third quarter points, outscoring the opponents 59-10.

•Ryan Mathew's two touchdowns give him 31 career rushing touchdowns and sole possession of second place in Fresno State's history. He now trails Anthony Daigle by four touchdowns. Daigle had 35 from 1991-93.

•Mathews rushed for 185 yards in the game, pushing his NCAA season total to 1,316 yards, for an average of 164.5 yards. Marshall's Darius Marshall, who enter the game trailing Mathews by nearly 26 yards per game, played Sunday. Mathews has 2,788 yards in his career, third-most in Bulldog history. He needs 229 yards for second place of 3,017 yards, held by Michael Pittman (1993-97)

•Receiver Seyi Ajitrotutu had his best game of the season with 7 receptions for 124 yards and an 18-yard touchdown, his third of the season and the eighth of his career. He now has 1,800 yards in his career, 10th most in school history.

•Vince Pascoe's second quarter catch of 23 yards was the longest of his career, and converted a big third down play for the Bulldogs. It set up a Kevin Goessling field goal.

Kevin Goessling's 50-yard field goal in the second quarter was his longest of the season and the second-longest in the WAC this season. He has two 50-plus yard field goals in his career, both against Utah State. Last season he kicked a school record 58-yard field goal to beat Utah State in Logan. Goessling has made 17 of his last 19 attempts with 10 straight. He has hit on 10-of-11 this season.

## Fresno State Honor Roll

### 14 Dogs Earn Academic All-WAC

Fresno State was once again led the WAC with the most Academic All-WAC selections as a record 14 players made the team. Since Hill became head coach, Fresno State has produced a total of 123 Academic All-WAC selections, more than any other program in the WAC. Prior to his arrival, Fresno State had just nine academic All-WAC selections. Here are the 2008 Academic All-WAC student-athletes: Tom Brandstater, Kevin Goessling, Anthony Harding, Bryce Harris, Moses Harris, Zak Hill, Andrew Jackson, Ben Jacobs, Drew Lubinsky, Robert Malone, Darren Newborn, Vince Pascoe, Shawn Plummer, and Bobby Shepard. Twelve of the 14 members of the team are back for the 2009 season.

### Leading the Academic All-WAC Pack

Since the hiring of Hill, the Bulldogs lead the WAC with 123 Academic All-WAC selections. Prior to Hill's hiring, Fresno had just nine academic All-WAC student-athletes. Here's what's happened this decade.

### The WAC Standard for Academic Excellence

Fresno State has produced more Academic All-WAC players (123) in the last 12 years (Pat Hill era) than former WAC charter members Utah, Wyoming, New Mexico and Colorado State did during their membership years (1962-99).

### APR Ranking

Fresno State's Academic Progress Rate (APR) score ranks among the best in the nation. Compared to Division I football programs in the Western U.S., the Dogs have the fourth-highest score among public institutions. ### The Patch

This season 36 Bulldogs will be wearing **Academic Achiever** patches on their jerseys. Student-athletes earn a patch by either posting a 3.0 GPA or higher last year or by setting a new GPA personal record for the year.

## Hill: A Rock of Stability

Pat Hill has the longest coaching tenure of any WAC coach, with six full seasons more at Fresno State than Chris Ault at Nevada. After that, no other current WAC coach has been in his position for more than four consecutive years. Since Hill got his first head coaching job at Fresno State in 1997, there have been 16 head coaching changes among the rest of the WAC schools. Of coaches in the West, none have been at the same school longer. As a comparison, no coach in the Big 12 Conference has been there longer than Hill's been at Fresno State. Three different coaches have been at Stanford in the time Hill's been at Fresno State. Dennis Franchione, a former WAC coaching opponent of Hills', coached at two other schools - Alabama and Texas A&M - and its now out of coaching since the two coaches last met each other on the WAC field in 2000. The same for Dennis Erickson, who held coaching jobs with the San Francisco 49ers, Idaho and Arizona State, since he last coached against the Bulldogs while at Oregon State during the 2002 season.

## Fresno State Facts

### Bulldog Stadium at Jim Sweeney Field

Since taking over Bulldog Stadium in 1980, Fresno State has one of the best home records in college football. One of the most beautiful stadiums in the Western Athletic Conference, Bulldog Stadium underwent a two-phase expansion project in 1991, increasing seating by 10,000 – to a capacity of 41,031 – and adding 22 sky suites. Jim Sweeney was Fresno State's head coach (1976-77, 1980-96) who won eight conference championships, five bowl game titles and guided the Bulldogs to a 143-75-3 record and won 200 games as a college coach, 16th most in NCAA history.

### Academic Gameplan

Since Pat Hill took over the Fresno State program, the Bulldogs have become national leaders in academic success. One of Hill's first tasks was hiring John Baxter as associate head coach. Baxter's trademarked Academic Gameplan is a proven winner across the nation. In the third year of Academic Gameplan, the football program produced a WAC-best 14 scholar-athletes, the school's first Academic All-American and the number of honored athletes at the annual Kiwanis Torch of Excellence dinner grew from four to 33. The team's GPA was raised from 2.12 to 2.77 in three seasons. Academic Gameplan has been featured in many publications, including the Dec. 20, 1999, issue of *Sports Illustrated*. Academic Gameplan is used by Oregon, Washington State, Southern Miss and Notre Dame. Since 1997, the Bulldogs have produced 123 Academic All-WAC performers, more than any team in the league during that period. Fresno State's Academic Progress Rate (APR) of 948 is the 8th-highest among schools in the west. Only Stanford, Cal and USC had better scores among California schools.

### "V" is for Valley

Fresno State prides itself on being the "Valley's team." This pride can be seen in the form of a large green V on the back of the Bulldog helmets as a symbol to the agricultural community of Central Valley of California. The San Joaquin Valley is the world's richest agricultural valley in export dollars.

### The Bulldog Foundation

This volunteer organization raises over \$8 million annually for the Fresno State Athletics Department. The monies raised by the BDF Annual Fund go towards scholarships.

### Fresno State Identification

The official name of the school is California State University, Fresno. For athletics department purposes, the University prefers to be called simply **Fresno State** – never Fresno State University and never shorten to Fresno. For graphics or abbreviations, we ask that you please use **FS** – not FSU, CSUF or Fresno.

Other acceptable abbreviation: Fresno St.

times. In comparison, Nebraska, which is scheduled to play at Bulldog Stadium in a few years, has 68 national television appearances this decade, 50 of those coming on ESPN. BYU, a former WAC member, has made 47 national television appearances this decade, 36 of those on the ESPN networks. The Dogs have a higher APR score, won more games and earned three more bowl appearances than the Cougars this decade. Fresno has grown to the fifth-largest city in California and is the 45th largest television market in the United States. Hill and Bulldog student-athletes have become nationally recognizable figures because of such success and exposure. Magazines, web sites and major media outlets all over America are covering Fresno State on a more regular basis than ever before.

### Three Headed Monster

The Bulldogs' running game will attack opponents with the blazing speed of Lonyae Miller, who has been timed in a sub-4.0 second flying 40-yard dash in a game, the elusiveness and power of Ryan Mathews, and the steady pounding of Anthony Harding. All three have surpassed the 1,000-yard rushing mark for their careers and combined for nearly 6,200 yards (likely will surpass that this week):

### Three Headed Monster II

In addition to three a three-back attack, Fresno State's receiving corp is led by three stellar seniors (Seyi Ajirofutu, Marlon Moore and Chastin West) each of whom have led the Dogs in receiving over the last three seasons. ## Many Happy Returns

Fresno State's special teams have been regarded among the nation's best units. Not only are the Bulldogs exceptional at blocking kicks, but they are also a threat to put points on the board every time they take the field. Since Pat Hill took over in 1997, Fresno State has scored 39 touchdowns on special teams and has racked up three safeties. Below is a breakdown of the Bulldogs' special teams scoring history:

- 20 punt returns for TDs (last: Oct. 24, 2009 by Chastin West vs. New Mexico State)
- 8 kickoff returns for TDs (last: Nov. 1, 2008, by A.J. Jefferson vs. Nevada)
- 11 blocked punts/FGs returned for TDs (last: Oct. 6, 2007 by A.J. Jefferson vs. Nevada)
- 3 team special teams safeties (last: Oct. 4, 2002, vs. Colorado State)

## Fresno State Best at Blocking Kicks

It's no surprise that Fresno State's kick-blocking prowess is the best in the nation over the last eight seasons. The Dogs lead Texas by seven blocked kicks for most in the nation since the 2002 season. Ben Jacobs leads the team with four blocked kicks, while Andrew Jackson has three and Moses Harris two, respectively.

## Fresno State – “Quarterback University”

The Bulldogs currently have three quarterbacks in the NFL and is the only school to have had two quarterbacks taken in the top 10 picks of the NFL draft since 1990. Here are some other QB University Notes (since 1990):

- Three of Pat Hill's two starting quarterbacks are in the NFL (Billy Volek, David Carr, Tom Brandstater). Paul Pinegar, signed a free agent contract with Jacksonville.
- Three of Pat Hill's senior starting quarterbacks were selected first-team All-WAC: Billy Volek in 1999, David Carr in 2001 and Paul Pinegar in 2005.
- Fresno State is one of three schools (Washington State and Tennessee are the others) to have one quarterback taken as the No. 1 overall pick in the NFL Draft and another selected in the top 10.
- Fresno State is one of five schools (Tennessee, Washington State, Oregon and Houston are the others) to have two QB's selected among the top 10 NFL Draft picks.
- Fresno State's Trent Dilfer was the first top 10 drafted quarterback since 1990 to win a Super Bowl.
- There have been 21 quarterbacks taken in the top 10 picks of the NFL Draft since 1990, and Fresno State has produced two of them.
- Of the last five quarterbacks taken as NFL No. 1 overall pick, only Fresno State's David Carr started the first game of his rookie season.
- Fresno State is one of four schools to produce two quarterbacks (Kevin Sweeney and Paul Pinegar) who threw for more than 10,000 career passing yards. Here are the others: Louisiana Tech (Luke McCown & Tim Rattay); Marshall (Bryon Leftwich & Chad Pennington); and USC (Carson Palmer & Matt Leinart).
- Since 1982, a Bulldog quarterback has been selected first-team all-conference nine times: Jeff Tedford, Kevin Sweeney [twice], Mark Barstotti, Trent Dilfer [twice], Billy Volek, David Carr, Paul Pinegar. Of those, five (Tedford, Sweeney, Barsotti, Dilfer and Carr) were the conference offensive players of the year.

## After Blocks in Three Straight Games, Total Reaches 83

The Bulldogs have thrust themselves into the nation's elite in blocking punts and kicks since Pat Hill took over in 1997. With blocks in three games, a field goal by Andrew Jackson vs. Hawaii, a punt by Antyhony Harding against San Jose State, and a FG by Kenny Wiggins, the Dogs have accumulated 83 blocked kicks in the Pat Hill era. That's an average of one block every other game. Here is a breakdown of Fresno State's kick blocking prowess since 1997:

### Hill and the NFL

Pat Hill's experience in the NFL has been a staple of Fresno State's continued success of sending players to the professional ranks. Hill gained fame as one of the top personnel evaluators in the NFL during his five-year tenure with the Cleveland Browns and Baltimore Ravens. Hill's NFL experience is chronicled below:

- Recruited and coached 2002 NFL No. 1 Draft Pick David Carr and 2005 first-round pick Logan Mankins.
- Three of Hill's three senior starting quarterbacks are in the NFL (Carr, **Billy Volek**, San Diego Chargers and **Tom Brandstater**, Denver Broncos).
- In his 12 seasons, he has produced **39** NFL players and 23 NFL draft picks, both figures are best in the WAC.
- 29 former Bulldogs were on NFL rosters in 2009.
- Former Hill assistants with time in the NFL include: Oakland Raiders head coach Lane Kiffin; Cincinnati Bengals assistant Kevin Coyle, Cleveland Browns assistant Cory Undlin, Oakland Raiders assistant Kelly Skipper, Houston Texans assistant coach Jethro Franklin and NY Jets assistant coach Kerry Locklin.

## 'Dog Bones (Team Notes and Trends)

- Fresno State has produced a 1,000-yard rusher in 12 of the last 15 seasons.
- Under Hill, Fresno State is 11-2 in WAC openers. Six of the Bulldogs' last seven conference lid-lifters have come on the road.
- FS has thrown 283 touchdowns and 129 interceptions since Pat Hill became head coach.
- The Bulldogs have not been shutout in the last 168 home games dating back to Oct. 25, 1980, vs. Utah State (14-0).
- FS is 52-15 under Pat Hill when the Bulldogs throw more touchdown passes than their opponents.
- FS is 64-7 under Pat Hill when the Fresno State has less turnovers than their opponents.
- Fresno State is +47 in turnover margin since Pat Hill became head coach.
- Fresno State has produced 16 first-team All-WAC defensive players over the last six seasons.
- The Bulldogs have led the WAC in scoring in four of the last 12 years, including a nation's best 40.5 average in 1992. The 'Dogs averaged 40.2 points per game in 2004, which ranked fifth in the nation in scoring offense.
- FS has produced three quarterbacks (Trent Dilfer, Billy Volek and David Carr) who set NCAA records in the last 10 years. All have been starters in the NFL, Dilfer most recently with the San Francisco 49ers, Volek with the San Diego Chargers and Carr with the New York Giants.
- Three of Pat Hill's four starting quarterbacks (Billy Volek, David Carr and Paul Pinegar) were selected first-team All-WAC by the end of their career and all four (including Tom Brandstater) advanced to the NFL.
- FS has produced two first-team All-WAC punters (Jason Simpson, 2001; Jeff Roberts, 1998) since 1998.
- FS has produced three WAC Defensive Players of the Year since 2001 (Alan Harper 2001, Garrett McIntyre 2005 and Marcus Riley 2007)
- The Bulldogs have dominated the All-WAC kicking awards recently with three first-team all-league picks (Asen Asparuhov, 2001 and 2002; Jeff Hanna, 1999) and one second team All-WAC selection (Brett Visintainer, 2003) since 1999.
- Fresno State is 57-14 in its last 71 games when the starting running back scores a touchdown.
- The Bulldogs are 42-15 in their last 57 games when scoring first. The Bulldogs have won 20 of their last 28 games when scoring first.
- Pat Hill's 97 victories as head coach of Fresno State ranks second all-time in program history. Only Jim Sweeney, 143 wins, has more.
- The Bulldogs have blocked a kick eight of 13 season openers under Pat Hill, including in 2009 vs. UC Davis. The Dogs have 83 in the Pat Hill era.
- The Dogs own 14 wins over schools from BCS conferences this decade, second-most of any non-BCS school.
- 16 of the last 24 Bulldog games have been nationally televised. The Idaho game will be on ESPNU.
- Fresno State is 17-4 in games when Ryan Mathews scores a touchdown, having won 17 of the last 19 (the Boise State loss snapped a 13-win streak).
- Under Hill, Fresno State has produced five of the WAC's Top 10 career sack producers: Garrett McIntyre (23.5), Nick Burley (22), Tyler Clutts (21.5), Alan Harper (18), Bryce McGill (17).
- The Dogs were picked third in the 2009 WAC preseason coaches and media polls.
- The Dogs will travel 23,354 miles in 2009, more than another other mainland school. Fresno State plays in five of six U.S. Time Zones this season. The only time missing is Alaska, which doesn't have any schools with college football programs.
- Fresno State ranks second in the nation in net punting, 41.6 yards per punt. Senior Rbert Malone is averaging 47.7 yards per punt, which would ranks second nationally if he had enough attempts.
