NO. 15/17 FLORIDA STATE RETURNS HOME FOR MATCH-UP AGAINST MIAMI

No. 15/17 Florida State, which has won seven of its last eight ACC games, plays host to Miami in a match-up between the two ACC schools from the state of Florida and the two teams that have defeated Duke in ACC play on Saturday, February 11 at 1:00 p.m. at the Donald L. Tucker Center in Tallahassee. The Seminoles are in a tie for first place in the ACC (with North Carolina and Duke – both of whom the Seminoles have defeated this season) with a 7-2 mark in ACC play. It marks the latest into a season the Seminoles have been in first place in the ACC standings since the 1993 season when they were in first place (or tied for first place) with North Carolina until Feb. 24 of that season. Florida State enters Saturday's game against Miami with five consecutive wins at home against teams from the state of Florida including one against Miami on Feb. 26, 2011. The Seminoles have also won 23 of their last 31 ACC games (.742 winning percentage) since defeating Boston College on Feb. 14, 2010. Florida State stays home for its next game against Virginia Tech on February 16 at 7:00 p.m. before traveling to play at NC State on Nov. 18. The Seminoles' game against the Hokies is the second between the two teams this season with Florida State taking a 63-59 win in Blacksburg on Jan. 10. The Seminoles game against NC State is its only regular season game against the Wolfpack this season.

SEMINOLES TO RETIRE DEVE FEDOR'S JERSEY

Florida State will retire the jersey of Dave Fedor (1960-62) the 12th all-time leading scorer in school history in a halftime ceremony against Miami on Saturday. Fedor was Florida State's co-captain as both a junior and a senior, scored 1,456 career points and averaged 20.2 points scored per game during his 72-game career. He became the first Florida State player selected in the NBA Draft when he was picked by Philadelphia in 1962. Fedor wore uniform No. 43.

FLORIDA STATE IN FIRST PLACE IN THE ACC STANDINGS

Florida State enters Saturday's game against Miami in a tie for first place in the ACC standings at 7-2 – tied for its best ACC record this deep into an ACC season in school history. The Seminoles were 7-2 in ACC play and in a tie for 1st place in the ACC with North Carolina after a win over Virginia on Feb. 8, 1993. The Seminoles were tied with the Tarheels for first place in the ACC standings in 1993 until falling to Duke on Feb. 24 and finished in second place in the ACC.

LOOK FOR FLORIDA STATE TO...

...Defeat Miami and win its sixth consecutive game against the Hurricanes. It would mark the Seminoles longest winning streak against the Hurricanes since Dec. 6, 1968 through Jan. 8, 1971;

...Defeat Miami and win its eighth game in 10 ACC contests this season. A win would raise the Seminoles' record to 8-2 for the first time since the 1992-93 season when Florida State won 11 of the first 13 games of the season and finished 12-4 and in second place in the ACC standings. The Seminoles have finished in second place in the ACC standings twice – during the 1991-92 and 1992-93 seasons;

...Defeat Miami and win its sixth consecutive home game. The Seminoles are undefeated at home in ACC play (4-0) and defeated Auburn on Jan. 4, 2012 before running off a school-record seven consecutive ACC victories.

Florida State defeated four ranked opponents during the 2010-11 season

Florida State defeated both No. 1 ranked Duke (Jan. 12, 2011) and No. 5 ranked Notre Dame (March 20, 2011) during the 2010-11 season. It marked the first time since the 1996-97 season with victories over No. 5 ranked Maryland (Jan. 29, 1997) and No. 5 ranked Wake Forest (March 1, 1997) and only the second time in school history that Florida State had defeated multiple top five ranked teams in the same season.

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FLORIDA STATE'S WINNING PERCENTAGE IN THE LAST FOUR SEASONS

Florida State is the third winningest program in the ACC in the last four years (since the start of the 2008-09 season) in total games played with 86 wins. The Seminoles averaged 23.3 wins per season with records of 25-10 (2008-09) and 22-10 (2009-10) and 23-11 (2010-11) in the last three seasons.

MOST WINS BY A SENIOR CLASS

Florida State's four-year seniors (Deividus Dulkys, Xavier Gibson and Luke Loucks) on the verge of becoming the winningest senior class in school history. The Seminoles have won 86 games during the careers of Dulkys, Gibson and Loucks – the trio is quickly approaching the number of wins by a recent Seminole senior class (2007-2010) of 88 wins. Florida State's winningest four-year period for wins came from 2008-11 with 89 wins – but contained no four-year seniors.

FLORIDA STATE AMONG THE NATIONAL DEFENSIVE LEADERS

Florida State, one of the nation's top defensive teams under head coach Leonard Hamilton, is ranked fifth nationally in field goal percentage defense (.374 – Kentucky is the national leader with a .358 mark), 9th in blocked shots (6.1 bpg – Kentucky leads the nation with a 9.4 bpg mark) and 16th in steals (8.9 spg – East Tennessee State leads the nation with a 10.7 spg average). The Seminoles have led the nation in field goal percentage defense in both of the last two seasons.

FLORIDA STATE AMONG THE CONFERENCE LEADERS

Florida State enters Saturday's game against Miami in a tie for first place in the ACC standings. In ascending to the top of the league standings in the middle of February, the Seminoles have developed into one of the top all-around teams in the ACC as illustrated by their play in the ACC statistics. The Seminoles are ranked first in the ACC statistics (against ACC competition) in three different categories – field goal shooting percentage (.458), 3-point field goal percentage (.397) and steals (8.7 spg). In addition, the Seminoles are ranked second in the ACC in field goal percentage defense (.408). The Seminoles are ranked in the top half of the league in 14 of the 21 statistics tracked by the ACC.

SEMINOLES CONTINUE TO LEAD THE ACC IN STEALS

Florida State enters Saturday's game against Miami as the ACC leader in steals with an 8.7 per game average for the entire season and an identical average of 8.7 steals per game in nine ACC games. Led by Deividus Dulkys' 35 steals and 1.5 steals per game average, the Seminoles have five players with at least 20 steals and eight players with at least 15 steals. The Seminoles have 201 steals in their first 23 games of the season – the 10th straight season under head coach Leonard Hamilton that they have at least 200 steals in a season.

LAST GAME VS. MIAMI

Okaro White and Deividas Dulkys scored 17 points apiece as Florida State held off a furious Miami finish to escape with a 65-59 victory on Feb. 26, 2011 at the Donald L. Tucker Center for its 20th win of the season. White, a freshman starting in place of injured Chris Singleton, knocked down a 10-foot jumper with 31 seconds remaining that gave Florida State a 64-59 lead after Malcolm Grant's 3-point shot 25 seconds earlier moved the Hurricanes to within 62-59. White hit 6 of 11 shots and grabbed seven rebounds while Dulkys connected on 4 of 8 attempts from 3-point range. Grant led Miami with 19 points and 6-foot-10, 300-pound center Reggie Johnson added 17 points and 12 rebounds. Miami shot just 31.7 percent (20 of 63). Miami fought back from a 22-point, first-half deficit. Florida State won for the second time in three games since losing Singleton to a broken right foot - its scoring leader for the season. It marked Florida State's third straight season with at least 20 wins and 10 in ACC play. The Seminoles jumped to a 16-2 lead on their way to a 36-16 halftime cushion and a fifth straight victory over Miami.

By The Numbers**

.479 Senior Deividas Dulkys (17 of 36, .472) and Michael Snaer (18 of 37, .486) are shooting a combined .479 (35 of 73) from the 3-point line in nine ACC games this season. Dulkys and Snaer are the deadliest 3-point shooting duo in the ACC – ahead of Austin Rivers and Andrew Dawkins from Duke who are shooting a combined .386 (32 of 83) from the bonusphere in ACC play.

.667 Senior Jon Kreft is shooting .667 from the field (six of nine) in the last five games. He made three of four field goal attempts in the Seminoles' win over Wake Forest on Jan. 25.

.742 Florida State has won nearly 75 percent of its ACC games since defeating Boston College on Feb. 14, 2010 – the Seminoles are 23-8 since that win over the Eagles in Tallahassee.

.893 Sophomore Okaro White is shooting .893 (25 of 28) from the free throw line since Jan. 4.

.909 Sophomore Ian Miller is shooting .909 (10 of 11) from the free throws line since his career high eight of eight performance in scoring 18 points against Maryland on Jan. 17.

1.000 Junior Michael Snaer was a perfect four of four from the 3-point line in Florida State's win over Wake Forest on Jan. 25

1 Florida State is the only team in the ACC statistics (for ACC games only) to be ranked in the top three in the three shooting categories – field goal percentage (1st, .458), 3-point field goal shooting percentage (1st, .397) and free throw shooting percentage (3rd, .737).

0 Graduate student Luke Locks is expected to play in his 125th consecutive career game – he has never missed playing in a game during his Seminole career.

2 The Seminoles and Duke are the only two teams in the ACC to finish in the top four of the ACC standings AND with double digit ACC wins in each of the last three seasons.

2 Florida State's Leonard Hamilton is the second longest tenured head coach in the ACC – he is in his 10th season in Tallahassee – and is ranked behind only Duke's Mike Krzyzewski in terms of longevity in the ACC.

3 Florida State has won three consecutive game against ranked opponents – then No. 3 North Carolina (Jan. 14), then No. 4 Duke (Jan. 21) and then No. 16 Virginia (Feb. 4).

4 Florida State is looking to play in its school record fourth consecutive NCAA Tournament in 2011-12.

5 Graduate student Luke Loucks has five blocked shots this season – he had six total blocked shots in the first three years of his career.

In continuing an annual tradition that has now reached its 10th consecutive season, Leonard Hamilton and the Florida State men's basketball team have signed a top 25 nationally ranked recruiting class with the addition of four outstanding recruits who will become Seminoles in 2012: Devon Booker (Anchorage, AK./West), Monday Brandon (High Point, N.C./Wesleyan Christian), Robert Gilchrist (London, England/Polk State College) and Aaron Thomas (Cincinnati, Ohio/Brewster Academy).

Florida State's class is ranked as high as No. 17 nationally by Rivals.com and Hamilton is not done yet. With two graduate students and four seniors on the Seminoles' current roster, Hamilton is still looking to add two more players to his already bountiful recruiting class.

"We are very excited about the recruits in our incoming class," said Hamilton.

"Our staff has done another tremendous job of identifying and cultivating four players who we know will have a tremendous impact on our program during their entire careers. We have added everything we were looking for - ball handling skills, shooting ability, size and strong basketball knowledge."

Booker (6-2, 165) was named the 2011 Gatorade Player of the Year in the state of Alaska as he averaged 25.0 points, 8.5 assists, 7.1 rebounds and 3.6 steals per game as a senior at Anchorage West High School. He has graduated from high school and is currently spending a prep season at the Impact Basketball Academy in Las Vegas.

Brandon (6-7, 195) is currently ranked as the 59th best player and the 11th best guard in the nation by Rivals.com. He is a four-star recruit who averaged 19.0 points, 5.0 rebounds and 4.0 assists per game as a junior. Considered a natural for Hamilton's system at Florida State, Brandon can play the one, two or three spots on the floor and is comfortable both handling the ball and playing on the wing.

Gilchrist (6-9, 210) is a junior college transfer from Polk State College in Winter Haven, Fla., who will have two years of eligibility remaining when he joins the Florida State program for the 2012-13 season. Ranked as the 16th best junior college player in the nation, he led Polk to the Sun coast Conference championship in 2011 as he earned all-conference first team honors as a freshman. Gilchrist averaged 9.0 points, 6.9 rebounds and 2.7 blocks per game while shooting .481 from the field as a freshman.

Thomas (6-4, 195) is the No. 56 ranked prospect by Rivals.com and was the No. 13 ranked shooting guard and the No. 71 ranked overall player in the nation as a senior at WI throw High School in Cincinnati. He is considered to be one of the top scorers and most athletic players in the class of 2012. Thomas is one of the top players at Brewster who will have at least four players accept Division I scholarships during the 2011 signing period.

FSU picked up right where it left off late last March with a strong defensive performance in a 79-67 win over Jacksonville. JU didn't score a basket until 14:50 left in the first half and never recovered on the scoreboard despite a late-game rally. FSU -- the nation's leader the last two seasons in defensive field goal percentage -- held Jacksonville to 36.4 percent shooting in the first half but that mark increased to 42.4 percent for the game because of the visitors' 20-10 run after the 'Noles had built their largest lead of the night (22) with 7:49 remaining on the clock. TALLAHASSEE, Fla. - It may have been a bit delayed but the new and improved Bernard James made his highly anticipated debut for the Florida State men's basketball team. After an ankle injury limited him to just one point in the Seminoles' victorious season-opener last Friday, a healthy James' career evening guided FSU to a 73-50 win over in-state foe UCF at the Donald L. Tucker Center. The 'Noles played as a ranked team for the first time this season as they entered both national polls earlier in the day: No. 24 by in the ESPN/USA Today Poll and No. 25 in the Associated Press poll. TALLAHASSEE, Fla. - Playing to a third overtime for the first time in program history, the Seminoles were upset by Princeton, 75-73. Despite scoring just 10 points in the first half, Florida State outscored the Tigers 37-20 in the second to force the first of the three extra periods. The Seminoles were ultimately doomed by a poor performance from the free-throw line as they made just 11 of 22 attempts from the charity stripe. Junior Michael Snaer posted a team-best 20 points and sophomore Ian Miller, who played his first game of the season last week at Florida, added 17 points. Bernard James and Xavier Gibson added nine points in the post. The Seminoles finished the game shooting 42 percent from the field and the Tigers connected on 41 percent of their shots. Despite committing 19 turnovers, Princeton was paced by 25-point efforts by both Douglas Davis and Ian Hummer. After shooting just 4-for-24 in the first half, Florida State battled back in the second half and Gibson's dunk with 46 seconds to go tied the game at 47-47 before Princeton missed a potential game-winning put-back attempt. Tied at 53-53 shortly thereafter with 2.6 seconds left, James missed a free throw on the one-and-one attempt that would have likely given Florida State the win. Down three in the second overtime, Miller hit two free throws to cut Princeton's lead to 60-59 and then made a strong play defensively with the shot clock turned off. Miller's near steal drew a foul and he went to the line where he made just one to tie the score at 60-60. With 24 seconds left, the Seminoles' defense then prevented Princeton from getting off a quality shot to force the record-setting third overtime. Davis' second 3-pointer

in the third overtime gave Princeton a 68-65 lead with 1:11 and then Hummer's dunk in transition pushed FSU's deficit to 70-65. Snaer was then able to hit a clutch 3-pointer to make it a one-possession ballgame but Princeton answered with two free throws and a steal off Luke Loucks' pass to hang on to the victory.

BLACKSBURG, Va. - Florida State received a strong defensive performance and Bernard James put the team on his broad shoulders as the Seminoles earned a 63-59 win at Virginia Tech. By tying his career high with 18 points and setting a new career best with 15 rebounds (nine of which occurred on the offensive glass), James made sure that Florida State picked up its first ACC win of the year and in the process generate some much-needed momentum as college basketball fans across the country prepared to turn their attention to Tallahassee. Michael Snaer added 17 points and five rebounds while Okaro White came off the bench with a double-double effort in scoring 12 points and grabbing 10 rebounds. Bernard James had eight points and nine rebounds and Luke Loucks registered six points and six assists. Loucks and Dulkys also added eight of Florida State's 16 total assists. The Seminoles started the game on a 9-2 run and led by as many as 12 in the first half before taking a 36-28 lead into the break.

DURHAM, N.C. - Michael Snaer's buzzer-beating 3-pointer, led the Florida State men's basketball team to a 76-73 win over No. 4 Duke -- a win that snapped the Blue Devils' 45-game winning streak at Cameron Indoor Stadium. After Duke's Austin Rivers hit a lay-up to tie the game at 73-73 with less than five seconds left on the game clock and with no time-outs to use, Luke Loucks took FSU's inbound pass hastily across mid court where Bernard James' well-placed screen gave him the necessary room to find the game's soon-to-be hero. By beating Duke Florida State capped off what could be considered one of -- if not the -- greatest regular-season weeks in the program's history. Exactly seven days after giving the Tallahassee crowd a reason to rush the court after upsetting then-No. 3 North Carolina, the 'Noles players had a reason to rush the court in Durham following Snaer's big shot. Not only did FSU defeat two top-five teams in a span of one week while also sandwiching a victory over Maryland in between those two games but the Seminoles also moved into a tie for first place in the competitive ACC. It was also Duke's first home loss to an unranked opponent since 2007 when Florida State came into Cameron Indoor and did the same thing. Xavier Gibson's 16 points led Florida State while Bernard James added 12 points and five rebounds. Deividas Dulkys finished with 12 points and Loucks posted eight of his own. The Seminoles held Duke to just 39.7 percent shooting as Rivers scored a game-high 19 points. Andre Dawkins added 14 points and Seth Curry had 12. Ryan Kelly -- one of just three bench players to participate for the Blue Devils -- contributed 10 points.

Game No. 20 -- Florida State 75, Wake Forest 72

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. - Florida State defeated Wake Forest, 75-72, at the Lawrence Joel Veterans Coliseum for its fifth consecutive win -- a streak that is the team's longest since 1993. The Seminoles have now scored at least 75 points in four consecutive games and have defeated Wake Forest in four consecutive times -- a feat that has not occurred since the 1993-94 season. The ACC's reigning player of the Week, Michael Snaer, led the Seminoles in scoring with 18 points. The junior guard was a perfect 4-for-4 from 3-point range and 6-for-9 overall from the field. Snaer's excellence from long range helped FSU shoot 50 percent from 3-point distance and 50.9 percent in total. One game after shooting 67 percent in the second half against Duke, the 'Noles shot 68 percent in the final period against the Demon Deacons. Just like that buzzer-beating victory over the Blue Devils, Xavier Gibson had another strong game. Gibson scored 10 points while adding three rebounds. Bernard James scored seven points and grabbed nine rebounds and Okaro White came off the bench to add 11 points. Florida State coach Leonard Hamilton said earlier in the week that Demon Deacons center Ty Walker presented a unique challenge because of his ability to alter games defensively. But Walker proved to be a non-factor after he left the game late in the first half with what was announced as a concussion. Walker still managed four blocks in his limited time on the floor but FSU scored 40 points in the paint and won the rebounding

battle 32-25. The Demon Deacons were also held to just 34.9 percent shooting. Demon Deacons star Travis McKie -- the ACC's fourth-leading scorer before Wednesday night with a per-game average of 17.2 points -- was limited to just three points. The Seminoles led 29-23 at the half before Wake Forest cut that advantage to just two points early in the second period. But Florida State answered with a 18-2 run and never trailed by less than double digits the rest of the game.

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. - Florida State bounced back from a poor shooting performance in the first half and beat Georgia Tech, 68-55, at the Donald L. Tucker Center to capture its school-record sixth consecutive Atlantic Coast Conference win. By extending their winning streak to six games, the Seminoles remain atop the league standings via tie-breakers. Down 25-24 at the break, Florida State's spark this time was a halftime regrouping. The Seminoles opened the second period with back-to-back Xavier Gibson and Luke Loucks buckets and a Deividas Dulkys 3-pointer. Not too long after that, Okaro White's tomahawk slam gave Florida State a 41-32 lead -- its fifth double-digit advantage in seven ACC games -- and the team never led by less than seven the rest of the evening. Michael Snaer had his own record-setting night as his five made 3-pointers tied his career best. Snaer's 21 points -- 16 of which were posted in the second half -- on 7-for-10 shooting led all scorers. Snaer also had a game-high and career-best five steals as the 'Noles forced 24 turnovers. Bernard James added 13 points and eight rebounds and White connected for 11 points. Loucks had nine points and seven of the 'Noles' 15 assists. Brandon Reed scored 18 points for the Yellow Jackets but Georgia Tech couldn't overcome another terrific second half by the 'Noles. After shooting 67 and 68 percent in the second half of wins at Duke and Wake Forest, respectively, Florida State shot 62 percent against Georgia Tech in the second half.

Leonard Hamilton: The Game Changer

GASTONIA, N.C. — As the ball plunged through the net and Florida State's players sprinted in the direction of shooting guard Michael Snaer, Cameron Indoor Stadium was awash with emotion.

The 9,000 Duke fans in attendance were crushed. Blue Devils point guard Austin Rivers collapsed near the spot where the winning shot landed. Florida State's players and staffers jumped up and down in a wave of elation that carried them from one side of the court to the other.

And there was no telling how many cheers erupted back here in Gastonia, a three-hour ride south on Interstate-85.

This is a town that knows its basketball. Some folks pull for Duke or North Carolina; others live for N.C. State or Wake Forest. But they find common ground when it comes to supporting their home-grown products — from James Worthy, who was practically raised at the Boys Club; to Eric "Sleepy" Floyd, Darrell "Sky" Armstrong and Leonard "Hamp" Hamilton, who honed their skills at the Erwin youth center on Pryor Street.

On this day, of course, it was Hamilton who had the locals' attention.

Powered by brilliant team defense and the grace of Snaer's game-winning 3-pointer, Hamilton's Florida State Seminoles had shocked fourth-ranked Duke that afternoon. They had ended the Blue Devils' streak of 45 consecutive home victories and won in a building that had only seen FSU secure one win in school history.

It clearly was cause for celebration.

But Hamilton never offered so much as a smile. Standing stoic in the midst of chaos, he nodded at his celebrating players, turned 90 degrees to his left and marched forward to shake hands with the defeated Blue Devils.

It was the shot of a season.

It was the snapshot of a lifetime.

Escaping 'the gas house'

A large, pale water tower stands tall above Ozark Avenue, just northeast of downtown Gastonia. In green writing on its side, it reads, "Great place. Great people. Great promise."

It is the typical, generic type of public relations message scripted on billboards and banners in cities and towns across America.

But "promise" is not exactly the image that sticks with people who were raised here 40 or 50 years ago; at least not the ones who grew up in the poor, black neighborhoods.

"Gastonia was just a tough area, especially when you talk about socioeconomics," said Larry Reid, a lifelong friend of Hamilton's who now serves as an assistant principal at Warrington Middle School in Pensacola. "When we came through, Gastonia was in the textile center of the world, and most of our relatives worked in the cotton mills. Many of the people around us didn't have the basic necessities. They might have a radio or a black-and-white TV that you could use a clothes hanger to bring in one or two stations. But not much more than that. Even a bicycle was hard to come by."

In many of the homes, there was no indoor plumbing. Leonard Hamilton and his siblings had to boil water on a stove and pour it into a tin tub if they wanted a warm bath.

To put food on the table, families often had to be resourceful.

"Everybody had a hustle," said Willie Hamilton, one of Leonard's three younger brothers.

For some, it was hunting rabbits and selling them on the street for food. For others, it was selling moonshine.

Back then, Gastonia had a brutal reputation. It was known to many as "The Gas House," in reference to the exceedingly high crime rate and the number of residents who ended up on Death Row. So the Hamilton kids, and many of their friends, turned to athletics as a safe, productive outlet.

Leonard, the oldest of the bunch, was a phenom. By the time he reached middle school, he and Reid were strong enough to play with the grown men on the basketball courts next to the youth center at Erwin Park. Reid was known for his outside shot, while "Hamp" was more of a slasher.

"Leonard was a tremendous athlete with a lot of elevation," Reid said. "He could really jump. And he had great speed and quickness. I was a better jump-shooter, but I definitely was not the athlete that he was. He also was a very good ball handler."

The rugged appearance of the Erwin Park court — one long slab of concrete, split down the middle by a tennis net and surrounded by a 12-foot, chain-link fence — was symbolic of the style of play.

With half-court games of 4-on-4 taking place on either side of the court, and dozens of other young men waiting their turn, the contests felt like high-stakes affairs. The first team to reach 15 was allowed to stay and play again, while the losers had to either hope to be picked up by someone else or wait up to two hours for another chance.

"That was a tough brand of basketball," Reid said. "You could really get hurt out there. You didn't take the ball to the basket without getting hit. They would try to take your head off if you went to the basket. And there wasn't a lot of whining or crying about fouls. What was considered a foul was getting knocked down or getting a black eye. But it made us tough."

By the time Hamilton, Reid and their friends reached high school, they were not only competing with the older players, they were crushing them.

"Hamp could jump like (former N.C. State star) David Thompson," childhood friend Bobby Murray said. "Remember how David Thompson had that vertical jump? Leonard had the same thing. He could stand under the basket and just jump and dunk it backwards. He was something to see."

"We seldom lost," Reid said. "We just dominated. And we also would go to other towns and play. When the boys rolled in from 'The Gas House,' we usually dominated them, too."

They were so good that they sometimes created problems for themselves. Like the time they went to a YMCA in a neighboring county and won games by such a large margin that they were asked to not come back. And the day when a neighborhood bully felt as if Hamilton had embarrassed him with his play.

"We were whipping some older guys; they were like three or four years out of high school," Reid recalled. "And one of the biggest bullies in town — he was like 6-4 or 6-5 — he took a swing at Leonard, and Leonard swung one time. Leonard hit this guy and knocked him out. We had never seen anything like that. Usually, when guys would fight, you would end up pulling them apart. But this guy got knocked on his back."

"He knocked the guy out. I mean out," agreed Floyd Love, another member of Hamilton's circle. "The guy's friends carried him out, and he ended up coming back in with three or four guys and a knife, and they tried to cut Leonard. That was about as bad as it ever got."

Changing the culture

"Big John" Hamilton didn't make it out of the ninth grade. His wife, Bennie Ruth, dropped out in the seventh to go work as a sharecropper. But their oldest son, Leonard, knew from an early age that wasn't an option.

Even though they lived in the heart of Dixie, where in the mid-1960s schools still were segregated and blacks weren't allowed to eat in many restaurants, Leonard's parents saw a brighter future for their children.

"My father made it clear we were going to get our education," said Hamilton, who had four younger siblings. "He told us we weren't going to get anywhere in life without an education. That was paramount in every discussion that we had."

They had to not only get an education, but also work harder and be better prepared than their classmates.

"He never allowed us to make any excuses," Hamilton said. "We couldn't come to him and complain about not being treated fairly, or someone having an advantage. He would not allow that to be part of the conversation. So there was nothing else to think about, other than, 'You need to get the job done' and that there were absolutely no excuses for failure."

"Leonard always had a goal in life — to move from where he was into a better situation," said David Moore Sr., one of Hamilton's teachers at the old all-black Highland High School. "His personality was to focus on what he wanted to do. He wasn't the kind just to hang out."

There was no time for that. Between juggling his sports and academics, and helping to care for his siblings while his parents worked, Hamilton refused to waste a waking moment.

On many occasions, when a crowded house of eight people made studying too difficult, he would grab his textbooks, head outside and create a makeshift library out of a broken-down car.

"I was the kind that needed peace and quiet to study, and I just couldn't concentrate inside," Hamilton said. "So I would grab that big flashlight and head out to the car."

As the star point guard on Highland's basketball team and the quarterback of its football team, Hamilton figured his best chance to attend college would be earning an athletic scholarship. And since very few big-time colleges in the South were offering basketball scholarships to blacks, Hamilton originally accepted an offer to play football at Livingstone College in Salisbury, N.C.

Then when that didn't work out — he missed the start of preseason practice with a skin virus — Hamilton decided his best choice would be to join the military.

It wasn't until the local two-year school, Gaston College, hired a sharp young coach from Florida named Peter Brooks did his life begin heading toward its final destination. Brooks arrived in 1966 to start a basketball program from scratch, and he immediately heard chatter about Hamilton, the hot-shot guard from Highland.

Hamilton wasn't interested at first. Part of his attraction to the military was the opportunity to leave Gastonia and seek out new opportunities; so staying at home for two more years wasn't exactly appealing. But after listening to Brooks' sales pitch, Hamilton reconsidered.

It turned out to be a blessing for everyone involved. Hamilton would go on to become a star at Gaston College for two years and then play his final two seasons at Tennessee-Martin, where he again was the first black to break the color barrier.

But the prize all along — the one that would not only please his parents but also inspire his siblings — was the bachelor's degree he received following his senior year at UT-Martin, and then later his master's degree from Austin Peay.

"I wanted my mother and father to be proud of me, but the most important thing was I realized I had to try to change the culture of my brothers' and sister's goals," Hamilton said. "Because we didn't have a lot of those types of role models in our community."

In much the same fashion that his father urged him, Hamilton pushed his siblings. His greatest fear was they would be swept up by the harsh realities of "The Gas House." So he would help them with homework, watch them closely on the streets, and make sure they didn't get mixed in with kids who weren't on the same track.

"He always called it, 'The bad crowd,'" Hamilton's mother, Bennie Ruth, said. "He used to tell his brothers and sister, 'If you stay away from the bad crowd, you'll be all right.' And I would say, 'Now, how can you tell who is the bad crowd?'"

"He said, 'You can tell. You can tell the good from the bad.' And Leonard has always been good in my eyesight. Leonard never gave me a minute of trouble."

Though she now is 97 years of age and well-cared for in a Gastonia nursing home, Bennie Ruth Hamilton's smile still lights up when the subject turns to Leonard. She doesn't follow his games as closely as she used to, but she remembers clearly how proud she and "Big John" were when Leonard earned his degree — and how he went to great lengths to make sure his siblings followed the same path.

While he was serving as a graduate assistant coach at Austin Peay in Clarksburg, Tenn., Hamilton even went so far as to ask his parents if he could take little brother Willie, who was entering his senior year of high school, to live with him.

"He was kind of a father figure because he was about six years older," Willie said. "So I went out there and graduated from Clarksburg High. He helped me out quite a bit. At home, if I had an algebra problem or a geometry problem, there was no one that could help me. But Leonard had already graduated with his bachelor's and was working on his master's, so I listened to everything he had to say."

Within a few years, Willie would become the second of the Hamilton siblings to earn his degree. He went on to a successful basketball career at Western Carolina, graduated with his bachelor's and went on to a white-collar career. Then Hamilton adopted another younger brother, Barry, and sister, Pamela, and provided the same opportunities for them.

The further he soared, the further they soared.

"He wanted us to be able to take advantage of the things he was experiencing," said Willie, who recently retired after 35 years with the same company. "It was no disrespect to my parents. He wasn't trying to run the house. It was just a knowledge thing."

And as "Big John," who passed away in 1999, figured, that "knowledge thing" was contagious.

Both of Willie's sons have now graduated from college, including one with honors from the University of Miami. Leonard and wife Claudette's two children have earned college degrees as well. In fact, there are college graduates sprinkled throughout the family.

"Leonard pretty much started it," Willie said. "He was the first one in the family to earn a degree. When we were coming up, your choices were to either get drafted or go work in the cotton mills. He didn't want that. He wanted something better."

'The big picture'

It took about two days of preseason practice before Peter Brooks realized Leonard Hamilton would be one of his key players. And it was soon after that he knew he had a potential star.

"He reminded me of Oscar Robertson," Brooks said, referring to the former college All-American and NBA All-Star. "He had the same kind of shot. Leonard was that kind of player."

Hamilton wasn't just quick; he was intelligent. He wasn't simply skilled; he was tough. In Brooks' mind, Hamilton had "the perfect body" for athletics. And on top of all that, he was an excellent teammate who refused to be out-worked.

"He dominated," Brooks said. "I don't care if we were playing North Carolina, Wake Forest or whoever."

Though Gaston College was a two-year school, Brooks was able to schedule the freshman teams from many of the top programs in the South; they played Duke, North Carolina, Clemson, Wake Forest, Louisville and others.

And Hamilton, indeed, was often the best player on the court. In one game, against Montreat-Anderson, he and backcourt mate Jim Turpin each scored more than 50 points in a 150-87 victory. Turpin finished with 53; Hamilton had 54

"Even though he was a guard, almost all of his baskets were layups or dunks," said old friend Larry Reid, who watched that game from the stands. "A lot of times they would just grab a rebound, get the ball to Leonard and he would zip up and down the court and dunk."

Everything about Hamilton impressed his new teammates. While some of them came from humble backgrounds, they had no idea what poverty was until they visited his house.

Just the fact that he made it to class each day was an accomplishment. Living four miles away from school, with no means of transportation, the team's best player would either bum a ride from a friend or coach or, most often, walk up to the highway and hitch.

"And he'd always be one of the first ones at practice," Brooks said. "He'd be dressed; he'd be out there shooting. It was obvious that, 'Hey, this guy wants to play.' He stood out from the beginning."

As one of the first black college athletes in the South, however, Hamilton stood out for other reasons.

When the team would go off to play road games, there were restaurants that wouldn't feed him, movie theaters that wouldn't allow him to sit with his white teammates (which would cause the whole squad to leave), and there were even some physical altercations.

"There were some rough places," said Robert Marziano, one of Hamilton's white teammates. "They cut off the water at our hotels. People would say things ... shameful things. One night, Coach made Leonard go back into the dressing room before the game was over because he was worried about him. But Leonard didn't want to go. He wanted to stay with his team."

Hamilton finally went to the back to let things cool down, but even that didn't help. While he was in the locker room, some students came out of the stands and attacked his teammates and even injured Coach Brooks.

But that was the exception. In most instances, when the assaults were just verbal, the young man who once shocked his friends by knocking out a bully with one punch usually played the role of peacemaker. "There were times that Leonard had to cool me down," Brooks said. "Some of the garbage we got ... Leonard would say, 'Hey, we've got more important things than to honor what they're saying or doing.' We just put that out of our minds. He was an inspiration; he really was."

Looking back on it now, Hamilton gives much of the credit to his parents and to the other families in the neighborhood. Even when times were tough economically, and their children didn't have access to the same opportunities as many white kids, the adults Hamilton knew never preached hatred.

"I always felt like you had to stay focused on the big picture," Hamilton said. "People were not that way because they chose to be that way. They were that way because of the climate and the times. It's what they had been taught. So to try to change some of those stereotypical attitudes, you had to try to be above it. I wasn't intimidated by any of it. I wasn't afraid of any of it."

"But I felt we were there to play basketball, get our education and move on."

His many blessings

One day before his Florida State men's basketball team would take on a Virginia squad that was ranked in the top 20 of both major polls, Leonard Hamilton sat in his corner office on the third floor of FSU's Basketball Training Center and laughed as he listened to the question.

It was one he had heard so many times before.

Why does a man who has been named national coach of the year two times, who as a young assistant coach helped Kentucky win a national championship and has a well-deserved reputation for being one of the top recruiters and defensive coaches in the game, always seem to find himself at programs like this?

When he left Kentucky in 1986, it was to take over a struggling Oklahoma State. After turning that program around in four years, he was lured to an even worse situation at Miami. And after taking the Hurricanes from worst to first in the Big East during his tenure there, followed by a brief stop in the NBA, he made his way to Tallahassee in 2002.

FSU had reached the NCAA Tournament just once in the previous eight seasons, and Hamilton knew it would be a struggle. But that, he said, was precisely why it was appealing.

"I had other head coaching opportunities when I was looking to leave Kentucky," said Hamilton, who is an extremely young and active 63. "But I really just felt that my skills, which I had developed over the years, were better suited where we have a chance to go in and help rebuild a program that hadn't had a lot of success in recent years. There's just a different mindset and focus you have to have when you're building, as opposed to maintaining."

In some ways, Leonard "Hamp" Hamilton was made for jobs like this.

Jobs where you have to be resourceful. "He was driven," remembered Marziano, his teammate at Gaston College. "He was inspirational. Nothing, no matter what got in his way, was going to stop him. He was going to go around it, over it or through it. He played that way, too."

Jobs where you have to recruit elite players without the amenities of the programs you are competing against. "When he was at Austin Peay, he went into New York and beat out (Jerry) Tarkanian for Fly Williams," recalled his brother Willie. "He convinced Fly Williams, who would be the top scorer in the country, to come to this little town in Clarksburg, Tennessee. Good grief."

Jobs where you, as his father told him all those years ago, would have to not only be as good as the other guys, but be better than them and work harder.

Early Saturday afternoon, Leonard Hamilton's Seminoles defeated Virginia, 58-55, to improve to 7-1 in the Atlantic Coast Conference — a mark never before achieved in school history. The Seminoles also have set a new school record by winning seven consecutive ACC games.

They have beaten preseason No. 1 North Carolina by 33 points, knocked off the conference's perennial powerhouse, Duke, for the second consecutive season, and enter the second half of the season with the inside track on a first-ever regular-season ACC championship.

This just one year after going to their first NCAA Tournament Sweet 16 appearance in nearly two decades.

It has been an amazing turnaround, indeed.

Not only for the program, but for the boy who came from next to nothing, broke numerous racial barriers, achieved incredible success, uplifted his family and inspired so many others along the way.

"You don't realize the meaningful lessons that you learn when you're going through the struggle," Hamilton said. "At the time you're going through those challenges, you really don't know that they're any different than what other people are going through. So I feel like I have been blessed on both ends. I was blessed to have the lessons that those obstacles taught me, and I was blessed to have the opportunities where I could apply what I learned."

It is that type of perspective – the maturity his parents saw during his childhood, the confidence his friends witnessed in the neighborhood, the focus Mr. Moore saw in the classroom and the wisdom Coach Brooks saw at Gaston College — that have made it possible.

"If he put his mind to it, Leonard could pretty well do whatever he wanted," Brooks said. "To me, it was just an honor and a privilege for me to have him in my life."
